minutes from the cruiser Boston, and an anti-submarine exercise conducted by sonar-equipped helicopters from the Valley Forge.

The President and his aides, however, did get to see the surface-to-surface firing on the Regulus guided missile from the Saratoga. The Regulus, in turn, served as a target for Sidewinder missiles fired by attack planes from the Saratoga.

Return to Capital  
The Saratoga did not take part in the air-sea search and rescue mission because her 40,000-ton hull is so massive that she would not be of too much help in such operations.

Immediately after the president saw the Saratoga's Fury jet fighters knock down a Regulus, the big carrier turned back toward Mayport, Fla. The President flies back to Washington this afternoon.

**Thompson Lauded For Meritorious Service In Army**

Sgt. Ira S. Thompson of 101 East 10th Street, Sanford, chief clerk and court reporter, Staff Judge Advocate Section, the U.S. Army Infantry Center at Fort Benning, has received a Certificate of Achievement.

Presented for meritorious service from March 7, 1935, to March 4, 1937, the certificate read: "Through his outstanding ability, efficiency, initiative and strong devotion to duty Sgt. No time in the history of man has seen more progress than the last 100 years. For those today who fulfill the vision that is given unto them, there is the promise of great reward. Even through there are clouds upon the horizon of the world, this is still God's world."

These hours of vision and inspiration are not common and when they come they do not linger, but enough is given to us that we may fulfill God's promise and highest hope. Enough vision is given to us that our ideals may be more than just daydreams. For those who call upon the Lord, there is a promise that they shall run and feel the exhilaration of progress.

The third phase, "They shall walk and not faint." Reverend Carlton explained his last phase as follows: "The Chinese picture word for girl is the symbolized drawing of a girl, and the picture word for boy the picture of a boy. "It is an accident that the pictureword for woman simply adds a broom in the hand of the girl and the pictureword for man simply adds the hoe in the hand of the boy. It is the years of drudgery that show up the most of life and bring the most exacting tests. "Vision and inspiration only die as they are born unless it is the willingness to fulfill this vision in the application of one's life to it. He ended his inspirational talk with, "The true test of our success shall not be how much money we have or what our position in life is, but what our attitude and spirit is toward the necessary commonplace tasks of life."

### Green Says Keeping Adequate Records Aid To Farming

"It's important to have a good farm, but even more important to be a good farmer," Curtis J. Green, County Farmers Home Administration supervisor serving Broward, Flagler, Seminole and Volusia counties, said today.

He made the remark while discussing the progress of local farm families who are paying off farm loans. His agency now has on its books.

Making definite plans and keeping adequate records aids to good farming, he said.

The agency makes operating loans to help family type farm operators do profitable farming. Its loans and services supplement, but do not compete with, those of private or cooperative lenders. Necessary planning help and aid in working out farm management problems are parts of each loan transaction, Green said.

## Eight Violent Deaths Told On State Roads, Highways Over Weekend

### Top News In Brief

**NEW YORK** — Evangelist Billy Graham challenged Soviet leaders Sunday night to permit him to carry his "crusade for Christ" throughout Russia. Given the opportunity to preach unrestricted, Graham said, he could win more converts to Christianity in Russia than in any other country. He has visited during his seven-year crusade. But the 38-year-old evangelist said he would go to Russia only if he could have complete freedom of movement and was able to preach wherever he desired.

**WASHINGTON** — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today that the United States will never disarm "merely because of Soviet promises." To behave Dulles said it would be "reckless folly" for this nation to do that. He said, however, that the United States is actively seeking, through United Nations procedures, ways whereby armaments can be safely reduced.

Miscellaneous business from the floor and from members of the commission will be considered.

### Hundreds Attend Manufacturing Co. Open House Sunday

Hundreds of visitors filed through the completely air conditioned building housing Sanford Manufacturing Company yesterday as its doors were thrown open for the entire afternoon for the first time.

The open house "was a complete success," said Hyman Meltzer, president of the firm who was on hand to greet visitors and show them through the plant.

Visitors were shown how patterns are arranged on fabrics which are cut by machine and the intricate system of sewing garments together by using as many as 12 different types of sewing machines.

Manufacturing units of plants, the Sanford firm, ships its completed merchandise to every section of the country and to a number of foreign markets.

Ladies visiting the plant for the first time were amazed at sewing machines stitching with feet needles at one time, other machines which attach buttons in "second" machines for buttonholes and various parts of a garment.

Marvin Meltzer, plant superintendent and vice president of the firm, demonstrated the use of various machines to visitors.

Meltzer said yesterday "I am amazed at the number of people interested in what we do here. This has been a wonderful day for us."

In addition to the company heads on hand to greet the visitors at the Sanford Manufacturing Company Open House there were Mrs. Milton Ratner, wife of the firm's secretary, from New York; Mrs. Ann Meltzer, treasurer of the company, and Mrs. Betty Goldstein, sister of the concern's president, of New York.

### Stock Market Drops

**WASHINGTON** — President Eisenhower suffered an upset stomach during the night and was confined to his bed in the White House today.

Shortly after noon he was reported to be "progressing very satisfactorily."

After a night of nausea and vomiting, the President was under the treatment and observation of three doctors.

At 12:20 a. m., press secretary James C. Hagerty said: "The President is progressing very satisfactorily. He has had no nausea from his upset stomach since early this morning. He is now sleeping comfortably."

"His pulse, temperature, respiration, and blood pressure continue to be normal. As reported earlier, his electrocardiogram shows no change."

Barring any important change in his condition, the next White House statement on his illness was not expected until 4 or 4:30 p. m. today.

Hagerty said there is "no indication that his digestive upset is related in any way to the President's recent illness operation or his heart attack."

The President's operation for ileitis—a form of intestinal obstruction—was performed a year ago Sunday.

Eisenhower's temperature and blood pressure were normal. But his physician, Dr. Howard McC. S. Jr., advised him to stay in bed. All engagements for the day were canceled.

**Blueberry Pie**

Hagerty said the stomach upset was "apparently caused by something he ate which disagreed with him."

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was overheard telling Chairman Thomas S. Gordon D. H. of the House Foreign Affairs Committee that Eisenhower's condition was "nothing serious" and that he had "eaten some blueberry pie" which apparently disagreed with him.

News of the President's latest illness hit the New York stock market hard. Stocks dropped one billion dollars and tickers were running 15 minutes behind.

Hagerty said the President had complained of nausea when he and Eisenhower left the White House Sunday night to go to American University here for an honorary degree and ground-breaking ceremonies.

Eisenhower went through the rain-marred ceremony without showing any signs of illness.

Eisenhower returned to the White House shortly after 10 p. m. and immediately called in Snyder, who arrived about 10:30 p. m. Snyder remained at the White House throughout the night.

## Time For Seminole County To Demand Consideration In Locating Airport

Now is the time for civic minded Sanford and Seminole County boosters to get behind a move to locate an airport where it would better serve the communities of Central Florida.

It has long been the contention of The Sanford Herald that, even in its present location, the airport designed to serve all of Central Florida, is definitely too close to one community and already entwined into a mesh of highways and byways to the point that it is inaccessible.

Now, it seems that the idea has become ghostly inessential that the plane terminal should be moved farther south instead of in the opposite direction where it would serve more and more of those who use air travel.

The two boards of commissioners, those of the City of Sanford and of Seminole County, should demand that action be taken to move the airport, destined to be ONE that serves Central Florida, to an area that would be accessible to Sanford, Deland, Leesburg, Mt. Dora, Eustis, DeBary, and all of the other communities in this section.

The apathetic action, so far, on the parts of these two governing bodies is detrimental to the accelerated growth of the Sanford and Seminole County community—for as each one of the groups have already found out, the availability of transportation sources to a community is necessary for attracting the type of industry desired here.

## Experts Plan Study Of Report Linking Cigarettes, Cancer

WASHINGTON — A government health spokesman says that government experts will make a close study of the American Cancer Society's report linking cigarette smoking to cancer and other ailments.

"He said it was 'likely' the National Institutes of Health, an arm of the U. S. Public Health Service, would evaluate the report. But he said this would take 'some time.'

The spokesman noted that the evidence against cigarette smoking was based only on statistical data thus far.

"It needs to be tested in the laboratory," he said. He conceded, however, that the statistical evidence raised a "real and serious" public health problem.

He said the question of possible links between smoking and cancer and other ailments already is under intensive government investigation. He termed it "an inescapable problem with which we should and must be deeply concerned."

The spokesman said the American Cancer Society's final report on its four-year study of 100,000 men made public yesterday, follows "basically the same lines" as another report disclosed several weeks ago.

The previous report, made jointly by experts of the American

## Semi-Pro Team Beats Clermont; Takes Solid Hold On Second Place

### Palatka Will Be Host To All-Star Game

It looks as though one of the Florida State League's charter members is about to realize a 21-year dream.

Driving ahead with steam to spare while a determined St. Petersburg squad was trying its best, Johnny Vander Meer's bustling Palatka Redlegs Thursday night won the honor of being host to the annual All-Star game June 21, and clung to their four game lead over the Saints.

If the Redlegs can hold or improve this lead, they'll win the first half crown by midnight June 20, setting a new record for Palatka since it first entered the league in 1936. No Palatka team has ever finished a season higher than third; no all-star game has ever been held there.

The week ahead will pretty well tell the story for Palatka plays in St. Petersburg Wednesday and Thursday. So far, St. Pete holds four victories in seven tilts with the Redlegs. As a fitting first half finale, too, Palatka will be at St.

Pete Thursday night, June 20, in what might be a battle for first place.

Meantime, no one should discount five of the remaining six clubs, and their chances at nabbing the first half crown and the chance this offers at a play-off which determines the pennant as well as winner of a \$800 players' purse.

Daytona, Tampa, and Orlando, "hottest" clubs of the past week, are not too far out of first, nor is Leesburg and Cocoa. Not in years has the league seen such streaks of heat and such abrupt cooling off by clubs. A week ago Cocoa jumped from seventh to third by winning seven out of eight. Last week Cocoa lost seven out of eight and was back in seventh, for instance!

While the pennant race kept at least seven managers busy, four new records were established during the week, ending Thursday midnight. Gainesville earned 16 times for a new mark by a single club in a nine inning game. The next night, Tampa erred nine times and Gainesville seven for a total of 16 bobbles in nine innings, another new record. Sunday night, Leesburg's Freddie Hust had 12 assists in 14 chances at shortstop, a new assist mark at that position. Tuesday night, St. Pete had 21 assists and Daytona 17 assists, a total of 38, for a new league record for two clubs inside nine innings.

Nob Wilson still was leading the dwindling number of 300 or better batters, while Tampa's Harry Coe, Daytona's Floyd Shiver, and Cocoa's Julio Guerra were head and shoulders above the rest of the hurlers—at least in victories.

## Green Says State May Be Short \$40 Million

### Seen In Next 2 Years

TALLAHASSEE 10 — Comptroller Ray Green told the Cabinet today that taxes levied by the 1957 Legislature might be 40 million dollars short of money approved to run the state in the next two years.

Green said he thought the legislative conference committee appointed to smooth out differences between the House and Senate tax bills raised tax income figures to balance the bills with the record appropriations.

He said the committee said some \$3,200,000 would be raised by doubling the intangible tax on bank deposits. But he pointed out the state collected only \$10,000 last biennium from this source.

The Cabinet was split on where a savings could be found. Green wanted to notify state agencies not to hire new personnel because money for their salaries might have to be withheld.

Education Supt. Tom Bailey and Agriculture Commissioner Nathan Mayo wanted to withhold capital outlay funds or delay action on many of the buildings which would take more than two years to construct.

Budget Director Harry Smith told the Cabinet "every agency should be notified to be prepared not to enter into new programs until the commission finds out what the figures will be."

### Man Is Seeking To Locate Dance Pavilion On River

Possibilities that a floating dance pavilion and snack bar will be located along the sea wall near Fort Mellon Park came to light at the meeting last night of the Board of Sanford City Commissioners.

John Kennedy Jr., of Fern Park, proposed to the board of commissioners last night that a large boat, now tied up at the city pier and bandshell, be turned into a pleasure boat.

The young man, appearing before the commissioners, stated that he would like to transform his boat into an attractive recreation facility to be used for dancing and as a snack bar.

Commissioners reminded Kennedy that the city is contemplating the use of the new Sanford Civic Center for teenage dances and other forms of recreation.

City Manager Knowles told the board that Kennedy's plan is to use the boat for a unique place for dances and parties.

Kennedy told the commissioners that his boat is certified to carry a passenger load of 114.

Questioned as to the type of recreation facility being planned for the boat, Kennedy explained that he would like permission to pull the floating pleasure boat up to the sea wall and build a catwalk onto the craft.

"I do not intend to sell beer, wine or liquors," Kennedy said, and he added, "I will not allow it to be brought on board."

Commissioners granted permission for the new enterprise provided that it be policed in such a manner that there would be no reflection on the city.

The Board of Sanford City Commissioners was told last night that a contract was awarded to a Leesburg contractor for the construction of the Sanford State Farmers' Market.

H. N. Sayer, Sanford's Finance Director, advised the commission that Gregg, Gibson, and Gregg of Leesburg had approached him for bond applications and had stated that his firm "had been awarded the contract."

City Manager Warren E. Knowles advised commissioners that 17 alternatives were used in the bids and said "they are used sometimes to get the cheapest building possible."

Commissioner Earl Higginbotham stated "That thing becomes more confusing every time I hear about the Sanford State Farmers' Market."

"If they're going to build a fire trap we should look into it," said Commissioner Merle Warner.

The question came up in regard to the Sanford State Farmers' Market when discussions about the redefining of fire districts in possibly include all of the C-1 and C-2 zones began.

Architects will be asked to appear before the Board of Commissioners to discuss the possible redefining.

"Such a change," said City Manager Knowles in his memorandum to the City Commission, "would not affect single and double dwellings but it would eliminate wood frame construction of all other buildings in the area."

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### When Is A Sign Not A Sign?

When is a sign not a sign? Such a question kept into the Board of Sanford City Commissioners' discussion last night following its adoption of an ordinance prohibiting signs on public property and regulating signs on private property.

A member of the audience asked the commissioners if their new regulation included price tags. It was explained that price tags include the huge cardboard and metal displays showing prices of merchandise such as gasoline and produce.

"They must go, along with all other signs which are not constructed to meet the specifications of the city," it was explained.

The new ordinance, adopted last night, eliminates all signs on public property regardless of the nature of such displays.

It also requires that permits be obtained from the building inspector and city manager for the erecting of placing of signs on private property. Placing of the sign is controlled by its size. However, all signs must be ten feet above the ground level. Regulating the distance from the property line, the ordinance states that signs must be placed back a distance of five feet plus the height of the sign.

Commissioner Earl Higginbotham, apparently opposing some of the details of the ordinance, especially the height plus five feet regulation, said "We have a building on First St. more dangerous from falling than any of these signs."

City Manager Warren E. Knowles called for a policy, to be set by the Board of Commissioners, regarding signs that do not now conform to the sign ordinance. "I will ignore them or will inform them that signs must conform," he asked.

Commissioner Merle Warner stated "I think all signs should conform to the ordinance we have adopted."

Mayor Gatchel commented "There's no sense in having a law on the books that is not used. I think we should start a gradual clean-up of signs around here with a time limit of six months."

### Confab Speaker Says Pride Most Offensive Sin

FOREST CITY (Special)—Pride was named the sin "most offensive to God" and the sin "most hopeless and incurable" by a leading Seventh-day Adventist clergyman here today.
