Red Testing Poses Nuclear War Fears

EDITORS NOTE: Following is an analysis in depth of the meaning of Russia's intention to test huge bombs, written by UPI space and nuclear energy writer Joseph L. Myler, who has been covering these fields since the first Postwar A-bomb test at Bikini.

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — Soviet Russia has confronted the free world with the threat of thermonuclear devastation launched from space.

That is implicit in Russia's announcement that it will resume testing to develop "superpowerful nuclear bombs" equal in violence to 20, 30, 50, and 100 million tons (megatons) of TNT.

Such weapons, the announcement said, could be delivered anywhere in the world by rockets like those which put Yuri Gagarin and Gherman Titov into orbit around the earth.

U.S. atomic officials take the threat seriously. They believe this country also should resume testing to perfect promising new weapons with which to hold the Russians at bay.

The Russian decision ends a 34-month unpoliced moratorium on nuclear testing which this country, at least, has scrupulously honored.

Many officials, among them Atomic Energy Commissioner Robert E. Wilson and Sen. Stuart Symington, (D-Mo.), believe the Russians have cheated with secret underground tests. This, however, cannot be proved.

Whether or not Russia has been staging underground tests,

it is obvious that the new explosions will have to be detonated on the surface, in the atmosphere, or perhaps in space. They will be too big to be contained underground.

The White House, noting this fact, said the Soviet decision "presents a hazard to every human being throughout the world by increasing the dangers of nuclear fall out." It also constitutes a "threat to the entire world," the White House said, "by increasing the danger of a thermonuclear holocaust."

Why the Russians should be thinking of a 100-megaton weapon, except perhaps as a terror device, puzzles American nuclear experts. Russia has a two-to-one edge on the United States at the moment in rocket weight-lifting ability. It is natural that she should want to

But 100 megatons is just too much bomb if all you want to do is destroy an enemy's cities. As Commissioner Wilson has pointed out, it would "over kill." One 20-megaton bomb could destroy a metropolis.

The answer may lie in the U.S. program to install "hardened" missile-launching bases. Soviet missiles now can hurt up to eight megatons of destruction at an enemy. But missile accuracy being what it is, it might take as many as 1,000 rockets to knock out a couple of hundred American missile bases.

If through some unsuspected breakthrough, the Russians should become able to pack 100 megatons of power in their rocket warheads, they could assign far fewer rockets to the "first strike" mission

of knocking out U. S. launching sites.

The 100-megaton warhead also might be useful as a blackmail and terror weapon in orbiting space platforms capable of launching H-bombs at earth targets on radio command. Sen. John Stennis, (D-Miss.), has said Soviet space shots, including Titov's 17-orbit trip, show Russia can "launch missiles from orbiting space platforms to destroy earth targets."

Ten 100-megaton warheads, exploded simultaneously at an altitude of 300 miles could scorch half a dozen American states.

This country has all the big bombs weapons it needs. What it would like to test is so-called third generation weapons for restricted battlefield uses.

One of these is the neutron bomb, a small H-bomb that would kill soldiers with radiation without destroying buildings or other structures. Experts differ on whether the neutron bomb would be worthwhile. They are more dubious about the 100-megaton bomb planned by Russia.

By talking in terms of huge bombs, Russia blasted hope of achieving an East-West test ban which the White House said would have been a "major breakthrough" in the search for an end to the arms race and could have kept additional countries from making weapons.

The nuclear nations now number four — Russia, Britain, France, and the United States. U. S. experts say Red China could make a bomb in a couple of years and a dozen other countries could join the club in the mid-1960s.

Nasser Paratroops Reported Smashed

DAMASCUS, Syria (UPI) — The Syrian revolutionary command said today its forces "wiped out" a 200-man Egyptian paratroop unit dropped in the Latakia port area.

Almost simultaneously, Damascus Radio announced formation of an 11-man civilian government that would rule independent Syria by decree until "free elections" produced a "legislative assembly."

Sixth Fleet Plans Visit To Troubled Area

ROME (UPI)—A large contingent of the U. S. Sixth Fleet is preparing to move into the eastern Mediterranean for a "long-planned" visit to Lebanon, American naval sources said today.

The units are expected off Beirut on Tuesday and will remain through Oct. 8, the sources said. It was stressed that the visit had nothing to do with the Syrian revolt and that the visit had been "long planned."

There was a possibility, one source said, that the visit may be cancelled in view of the Syrian uprising. Syria is just north of Lebanon.

The Syrian port of Latakia on the Mediterranean was reported to be the scene of a battle today between Egyptian paratroopers and Syrian rebel forces.

The office of the U. S. Naval Attache in Rome said that Sixth Fleet units scheduled to visit Lebanon include an aircraft carrier, a submarine and a number of cruisers.

Robber Beats Up Deputy

POLK CITY (UPI)—A convicted robber beat up a deputy and escaped from custody Thursday night, but was fatally wounded in a gun battle with two other deputies today.

Azel D. Davis, 36, died this morning at a Lakeland hospital. The Osceola County Sheriff's Office said Davis was serving a six month to 10 year sentence at the Kissimmee Road Camp, for an armed robbery at Clearwater in 1959, when he escaped from the camp Wednesday.

He was recaptured by the Highway Patrol at Callahan near Jacksonville Thursday. Osceola County Deputy David Murphy was returning him from Jacksonville to Kissimmee Thursday night when Davis escaped again.

Rail Rate Cuts Are Recommended

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) hearing examiner today recommended reductions ranging from five to 15 per cent in maximum authorized railroad rates for grain shipped to the Southeastern states.

ICC Examiner Edward L. Boisseree made the recommendation in a report on the long-pending southern governor's grain rate case.

President Gamal Abdel Nasser said today he had cancelled plans for large scale military actions against Syria after provincial garrison commanders there joined the revolt.

The announcement on Damascus Radio gave no details of the fighting. Neither did it mention any Syrian casualties.

The newly announced Syrian transitional government is led by 47-year-old Dr. Mamoun Alkuzbari, a lawyer who was Syrian parliament speaker and who president in the pro-Western government of President Adh Binhabill in 1953.

In Cairo, up to three hours after news of the Damascus government formation, the Egyptian press still is undecided as to what the next Egyptian move might be.

Both announcements came less than 48 hours after Syrian army officers revolted against the three-and-a-half-year merger of Syria and Egypt in the United Arab Republic.

Thursday, Nasser ordered the Syrian First Army to march on Damascus and crush the revolutionists—who at that time held the radio, the airport and were besieging the local military headquarters.

Late Thursday night, Damascus Radio said the first army had joined the rebels. The radio broadcast a stream of messages from military commanders all over Syria. Aleppo Radio in the north also was transmitting similar announcements.

In repeated manifestos over the Damascus Radio, the "supreme Arab revolutionary command" declared it revolted because of Syria's "poor relation" status in the U. A. R.

Gestapo Tactics Hit At County Home

Two residents of the County Home today accused the Superintendent of the facility of "Gestapo tactics," roughing them up and threatening to throw them out if they talk to the press.

One of the residents who asked that his name be withheld said, "I don't know what they would do to us, if they found you talking to us." He told a Herald reporter this morning that he was roughed up for playing the television set.

One 70-year-old man said that the superintendent threw him on his cut and "tried to beat me up."

He also said he was dragged to his room on one occasion. He held me down and told me "I'd better watch out."

"They tell us if we complain they'll throw us out and won't even let us use the telephone," another said.

"The only way I can speak to anyone is by letter," another said.

"Please don't use our names," one said, "They'll do something to us."

Home superintendent J. P. Beal when questioned by the Herald on the charges, declined any comment.

A Herald reporter and photographer went out to the facility on Hwy. 17-92 this morning to talk to the two men after the paper received a letter from one of them citing the conditions there.

The letter said, in part, that "the citizens of Seminole County should know what is going on here. The present superintendent roughed up three of the elderly men with his hands, threw one down on the floor and dragged him to his room."

When informed of the letter, County Commission Home Custodian James P. Avery promised a full investigation into the matter.

Commies Widen 'Death Strip'

BERLIN (UPI)—Communist police marched 3,000 East German workers into fields and garden plots at dawn today to deepen the "death-strip" along the Berlin border.

Men and women were sent to work with pick-axes and shovels to clear out trees, gardening sheds and other obstacles to create a clear field of fire on would-be refugees trying to escape across the border to West Berlin.

A U. S. Army helicopter and military police patrols near the border observed the Communist action, witnesses said.

The "death-strip" operation on the border between the East Berlin district of Treptow and the American sector of Neukoelln was being repeated on a smaller scale at many other places around West Berlin, police reported.

Nevertheless, West Berlin police said, at least eight do-or-die East Berliners managed to cross the border to safety today.

American officials shrugged off a Communist protest against the U. S. army's helicopter-lift of seven refugees over a mile of East German territory from the isolated enclave of Steinstueck to West Berlin.

West Berlin newspapers gave top headlines to U. S. Air Force Secretary Eugene M. Zuckert's pledge Thursday that America is "determined to maintain uncontrolled air access both for military personnel and civilians" to Berlin.

The plan still met immediate objections from the United States and other Western powers.

Soviet Ambassador Valerian A. Zorin submitted to some delegations a draft resolution declaring that:

"The General Assembly, on the recommendation of the Security Council, as a temporary measure up till April, 1963, invites Mr. X to organize the work of the secretariat together with Mr. A, Mr. B and Mr. C, his deputies, and believes that these persons will do their utmost to act in common agreement in discharging the functions of the secretariat which have been entrusted to it by the UN Charter."

Probers Say State Must Take Blame

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Highways Investigating Subcommittee said today the state must assume a full measure of blame for the Florida highway scandal.

The subcommittee based its finding on two weeks of public hearings and an exhaustive investigation held last year. The probe uncovered a series of alleged pay-offs from contractors to state personnel working on the interstate highway system.

In its report, the subcommittee confined itself to the relationship between contractors and state personnel and did not delve into the second Florida hearing which dealt with abuses of rights-of-way.

"The subcommittee must find," the report said, "from the evidence before it, that the state itself must bear a full measure of responsibility of unwarranted complacency in the light of all that has been shown that occurred."

Navy Puts On 'Beeg Shew'

The Navy put on a "rilly beeg shew" for the Chamber of Commerce Clubbers at the Lake Golden recreation park Thursday, as Capt. Robert Slye and his men showed the local folks how the Navy rescues people with their helicopters and how the demolition team does its dangerous and nerve-tingling work.

Cdr. Joe Andrews, operations officer took the mike and described some of the ways that the Navy and other services Air Search and Rescue teams operate.

"We never have, and never will, deny assistance to anyone in distress," said Cdr. Andrews and went on to describe several recent events in which the rescue services of the station were called into quick and expert use, by the various kinds of jams that people get themselves into, all over central Florida.

Then the HUP helicopter, whose engine, Cdr. Andrews said, "was originally designed for a Sherman tank," flew in low over Lake Golden, where a Navy crewman, in bright orange suit was "drifting" in a boat, and had set off flares to signal the plane.

With expert maneuvering the helicopter made several passes with a sling which finally came within reach of the "stranded boater," and when he slipped his arms and shoulders into the rig, quickly hoisted him aboard.

Then the thoughtful helicopter pilot, Lt. Cdr. Harrison Finkel, blew the boat up on the shore, with the prop wash from his rotor blades and dipping the nose of the HUP three times in a courtesy to the audience, flew away with his "rescued" passenger, to the hearty applause of the Coffee Clubbers.

Not to be outdone, Lt. James Bradford, demolition team officer brought up his display of the type of bombs, flares and rockets that might be found around beaches, bombing areas and in the woods and brought home by souvenir hunters.

He also told some spine-chilling stories about "finds" right around Central Florida, which without the expert knowledge of the demolition team men, could have resulted in disaster and tragedy for many people.

Playing a little trick on the audience, Lt. Bradford took a hammer and showed how the unwary souvenir hunter may try to take the cap off a bomb at the same time the demolition officer had an accomplice set off a charge of explosives, cached a safe distance away, which caused a mighty cringe among the "captives" audience, even though they became aware a few minutes before he did it, that he was going to pull some kind of a stunt.

A bomb produces heat of several million degrees and any person close to the explosion cannot survive. A one megaton explosion could kill an unshielded person eight miles from ground zero. A 20-megaton blast could kill a man 20 miles away. It could even cripple and maim persons at much greater distances.

The shock waves from the blast travel about nine times as fast as winds in a major hurricane, or around 900 miles an hour. These waves could kill a person miles away from ground zero. But a person might save his life by lying flat on the ground or in a ditch. Few buildings could withstand these waves if they were within a nine mile radius of the blast.

The heat and shock waves can be detected easily enough, but fallout is something else. It cannot be detected by sight, taste, smell, hearing or touch.

The safest plan is to assume that you are in a fallout area until Civil Defense officials make a check.

The unit of measurement for radiation is the roentgen. A human being can stand between 400 and 600 roentgens of radiation. Say the measurement outside your shelter was 300. That means that your body would absorb 300 roentgens an hour and in two hours or less you would absorb enough to be fatal. More exactly, in two hours you would absorb 600 roentgens minus the radiation decay rate, which is rather fast. If it were not for radiation decay an area of fallout could never become inhabitable again.

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Executions Only Starting, Castro Says

MIAMI (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro declared early today the firing squads which resumed wholesale execution of his foes this month have only begun their work.

In a 2 1/2 hour speech broadcast by Radio Havana, Castro said his "revolutionary tribunals" are now dealing with the Cubans who were arrested by the thousand at the time of the abortive April invasion.

That awaits them, he said, is a meeting in Havana's Republic Square. "They face the most severe punishment — the firing squad."

The riflemen who have killed nearly 1,000 Cubans during Castro's 33 months in office executed 26 so far this month alone. The prosecution has demanded death for three more Cubans now on trial.

The bearded revolutionary charged as usual that Cubans who oppose his "socialist" regime were "infiltrated by imperialism and the U. S. Central Intelligence Agency."

Today's speech was the first in more than a week in which Castro did not hammer away at the theme that the United States is preparing to overthrow his regime.

Holy Cross Episcopal Church School teachers held their first monthly meeting at 7:30 p. m. Thursday in the Parish House.

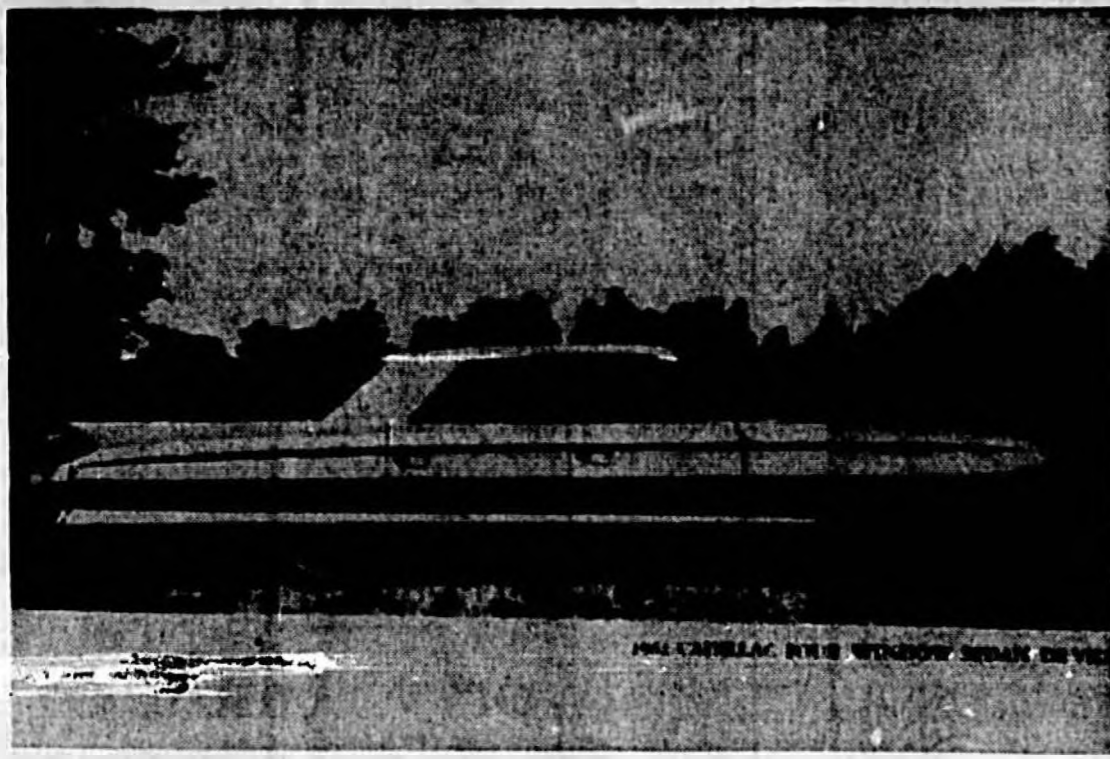

Nixon Charged With Buying GOP Nomination

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—California's never placid political waters were whipped into a storm today with a former governor's charge that Richard M. Nixon tried to maneuver himself into the unopposed Republican nomination for governor.

Goodwin J. Knight, himself a candidate for the nomination, said Thursday that a Nixon emissary telephoned him Sept. 7 and told

him, "Dick will be willing to give you anything you want in California, including the Supreme Court, if you don't run."

Nixon, who announced for the governorship Wednesday night, was not available for immediate comment.

Robert Finch, Nixon's campaign manager in his unsuccessful bid for the presidency last year, promptly said the former governor's claim of a proffered deal was "absolutely preposterous."

Knight made the charge shortly after repeating his intention of staying in the race.

"It was right after 1 p. m. on Sept. 7 when I received the telephone call," he said. "I knew what it meant—it was a message from Nixon. I had two others in the room lean over and listen."

"He said: 'I telephoned to tell you Dick is going to run for governor.'"

"He asked, 'Would you be willing to meet with Dick and Bob Finch?' then he said 'Dick will be willing to give you anything you want in California, including the Supreme Court, if you don't run.'" Knight added.

"If Nixon denies this," Knight said, "I have proof of the telephone call to my private number and my witnesses."

One of Nixon's closest associates said late Thursday night he felt the former vice president answered the question at the new conference at which he announced his candidacy for the governorship.

The spokesman, who declined to be identified, pointed out that the question had been raised at the conference and Nixon was asked if there was any basis to the story.

"None at all," Nixon replied.

Liz Mobbed By Italian Film Fans

ROME (UPI) — Elizabeth Taylor, wearing a silver evening gown with a neckline that plunged to the waist, was mobbed Thursday night by cheering Italian film fans as she left Rome's Sistine Theater.

Miss Taylor's husband, singer Eddie Fisher, charged to the rescue. He shoved her into an automobile and locked her inside.

The actress and her husband had just left the theater where she had received an Italian movie "Silver Mask" award in a ceremony that turned into a near-riot.

The uproar started when about 40 uniformed and plainclothes policemen stopped photographers

from getting close to the stage to take pictures of Miss Taylor. There were shouts of "stop the ceremony" and "where are the organizers?"

The photographers eventually ran around the stage and into the wings, from where most of them were able to take pictures of the beautiful actress in the provocative gown.

Liz and Eddie rushed from the theater as the photographers shouted, struggled and argued with the police.

When they got outside, they were mobbed by a crowd of 3,000 screaming Italians. For a few moments, Miss Taylor was lost

in the mob and all that could be seen of her was a bouquet of flowers she held aloft.

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Faith In UN

The United Nations, its future imperiled as never before, may find the seeds of survival and new strength in the late Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld's final official testament to the UN's overriding purpose.

With the frosty detachment and deliberately "gray" language which made his peculiarly the symbol of international impartiality, Hammarskjöld in his last annual report sketched out two futures the UN might embrace.

In the one, the organization would serve mainly as an arena of competition, of intermittent conflict among the varying interests and ideologies of the West, the Communist bloc and the neutral or unaligned nations.

Through he never mentioned the Soviet Union by name, he made clear the Kremlin-sponsored proposal for a three-headed UN secretariat roots itself in this notion: that the UN is a kind of shifting battleground but nothing more.

The other future he foresaw—and the one he unmistakably believed in—would make of the United Nations an arena of co-operation, an impartial ground above the struggle, a fixed place with a life of its own, presided over—with steadily enlarging executive authority—by an independent secretariat devoted to the general world good.

Lefty as this may sound, no one who knew or dealt with Hammarskjöld had any doubt that he worked for just these goals.

As a realist, he knew full well how deeply the UN is today embroiled in power politics and the problems of change. He declined therefore to brand it as a failure, saying "It would seem more correct to regard this as a failure of the world community."

The remedy he prescribed was for member nations jointly to "increase their efforts to make political realities gradually come closer to the pattern established by the UN charter."

To Hammarskjöld that charter stood as a great, flexible, beckoning instrument capable of drawing most if not all the member states down the path of fuller co-operation.

In the charter he found positive, specific sponsorship of a wide range of economic and social activities aimed at the mutual betterment of the participating lands.

By his measure, the "competing interest" concept the Russians espouse is at opposite poles from this basic and highly promising charter objective.

He saw the charter, too, as a clear, unassailable declaration of the principles of equal political rights, economic opportunities and justice for all nations and peoples.

All these visions are very general, but it may be argued that it is precisely on these broad yet fundamental grounds that the United Nations is today under its greatest challenge.

The Soviet Union wants to alter the UN radically. Hammarskjöld, in his last article of faith, is telling all countries big and small that they have in the UN an agency which can be shaped and adapted in hard practice to serve the dreams that accompanied its birth 16 years ago.

Ghost Makes Babies Laugh In Their Sleep By Tickling Them

NOTTINGHAM, England (UPI)—Several families in an apartment house here claimed today they are haunted by a female ghost that goes around tickling a baby.

The ghost, whom the families believe is a woman who killed herself in the house several years ago, is claimed to:

Reach out its arms in a gesture of appeal.

Show itself only to women.

Move articles from cupboards.

One of the tenants, Leslie Weatherill, said: "We are moving out. We have only lived here a week but my wife has seen the ghost twice."

Reginald King, another tenant, said his child began to laugh un-

explainably as it slept in its cot. "When one of the children we have staying with us got up, she asked if that 'strange' woman would be coming back. She had seen her tickling the baby."

King added: "Although no men here have seen the ghost all of them will tell you how frightened they are. Even on a warm night they suddenly feel their rooms go cold and drafty. We know we are being watched."

A third tenant, Louis Leonard, said a bar of soap was missing and later found. "Knives have been moved mysteriously from the cupboards to a table," Leonard said.

Rev. George Muxlow said the "couples are extremely frightened by what has happened."

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Amendments to the Small Business Act of 1958 just approved by Congress are expected to increase greatly the Small Business Administration programs to promote economic growth and decrease unemployment.

A principal expansion will come in loans to small business investment companies. SBA's authority to buy debentures of a local investment company is being stepped up from \$150,000 to \$400,000. It is also authorized to loan up to 50 percent of a local company's capital and surplus. This will enable such a company to start with \$1.3 million.

The local investment companies are being given authority to make loans of up to \$500,000 without SBA approval from Washington. But SBA procedures for enforcing compliance with regulations has been strengthened.

SBA may now suspend charters of companies whose affairs are out of order.

In a separate measure, SBA is being given additional authority to work with Department of Defense and General Services Administration to obtain more subcontracting for small businesses from the government's prime contractors.

This new authorization is the result of Congressional disapproval of Department of Defense for giving 84 percent of its prime contracts to big business corporations.

Congress is also giving Small Business Administration \$250 million more money for its job.

Subject to final appropriations on which there is little doubt, Congress has authorized an increase of \$150 million for the business loan program. This brings the total to \$725 million.

The disaster loan authorization is being increased by \$25 million to a total of \$150 million. This program permits loans to small business firms displaced by federal construction of highways, urban renewal projects or other public works.

The small business investment company authorization is being increased by \$75 million to a total of \$325 million.

This makes the total lending authority available to Small Business Administration in revolving funds \$1.2 billion.

Actual funds appropriated have already been stepped up by \$20 million this year. Pending in a final supplemental bill still before Congress is another \$130 million appropriation. This would make total funding \$890 million to date.

This increase in financing reflects the rapidly increasing SBA activities under its new administrator, John E. Horne, former administrative assistant to Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama.

Soon after taking office in February, he sent letters to 8,000 local chambers of commerce and development companies to promote his agency.

He got a heavy reply. SBA field offices were then put to work on prospects.

The Area Redevelopment Act of 1961 then gave SBA two new jobs to do. Department of Commerce assigned it full responsibility for marking small business loans in depressed areas. And Department of Agriculture delegated to SBA the making of small business loans for rural depressed areas.

Any such area in which Labor Department now reports unemployment higher than 6 per cent automatically becomes eligible for SBA loans at 4 per cent instead of the normal 5 1/2 per cent. Also, standards for determining what constitutes a small business are liberalized by 25 per cent.

Horne is now trying to shift part of his program out of straight government financing and into commercial banking channels. He has just announced that if a private bank will take one-fourth of any small business loan of up to \$350,000 at whatever interest rate it wishes to charge, the government will take the other three-fourths at 5 1/2 per cent.

Horne is also setting up new small business advisory councils. Through the big industry BAC formerly functioning under Department of Commerce has come a cropper, SBA wants its regional small business advisory councils already in existence expanded into a system of state councils.

And a new national council made up of the 15 regional council vice chairmen holds its first meeting in Washington this month. It will be dedicated to maintaining free enterprise.

Casselberry Man Wins Citation
 John Lady, Casselberry Alderman, is one of six students of the Rollins College Center for Practical Politics who have been cited in the Congressional Record by Congressman A. S. Herlong Jr. for their outstanding leadership in the field of politics.

In the citation, Herlong praised the work of the center which is operated under a grant from the Maurice and Laura Falk Foundation and is directed by Dr. Paul Douglass, Professor of Government.

Tresh Named Most Valuable
 MONTREAL (UPI)—Shortstop Tom Tresh of Richmond, now playing for the parent New York Yankees, today was named the International League's Rookie of the Year for 1961.

Tresh's selection was announced by Al Nickleson of the Toronto Globe and Mail, president of the International League Writers' group which did the balloting.

CASE K-411: Horace Z., aged 58, is a former college professor who has become blind.

He is a widower and applied to our Scientific Marriage Foundation for introduction to a congenial and certified woman.

Thanks to the newspapers which helped launch the SMF by their generous publicity when we first started this interfaith project, we are now introducing 1,500 certified people every month.

Many, however, don't get husbands or wives because we have an excess of women applicants, especially after the age of 35.

Up to 35, however, we have many business and professional men, or young farmers and other skilled workmen, that we actually have a shortage of girls.

And a lot of widowers from 35 to 45, with young children, have hesitated to date a local girl, feeling it would be unfair.

"Dr. Crane," they tell me, "it seems like too much to ask a woman to take on both a new husband and a ready-made family, too."

But many women actually prefer to meet such a prospect, especially if the girls are approaching 40 and feel they may never be able to have youngsters of their own.

We also have many handicapped people who are blind or deaf or spastics, etc.

Horace was a cultured, fine man whom we introduced to a widow of a banker.

She was a gentle, Christian woman, who drove her own car and who proved to be a wonderful wife to Howard. Within 6 months of their introductions, they were happily married.

Many splendid people who aren't physically handicapped whatsoever, are tied down to office or teaching jobs so they lack opportunity to shop around. Maybe the few local prospects are unsuitable in religion or education, etc.

Our SMF simply widens their range of selection and thus helps prevent unhappy unions.

Horace had no local prospects

so he might never have been able to remarry if the SMF hadn't been operating.

It is more difficult for us to match up the handicapped, since we must first write to the other party and explain the case.

Right now we have a college man, cultured and making a good salary. He is under 40 and travels in connection with his work.

But he is both blind and deaf! A wife who could drive a car and serve as his go-between would not only be a boon to him, but a great aid in his helping other handicapped people.

He talks well and writes admirably, for he didn't lose his sight or hearing (ill later in his school career).

He would naturally like to meet a gracious woman under 40 who might fall in love and become his wife and companion in his travels, for he can easily support a wife and family, too.

Our SMF is a non-profit, educational foundation, of an interfaith type, with over 2,000 priests, rabbis and Protestant ministers serving as our local counselors.

They have a personal interview with each applicant and check the latter's 3 character references, so our applicants are doubly screened and above average in culture, education and morality.

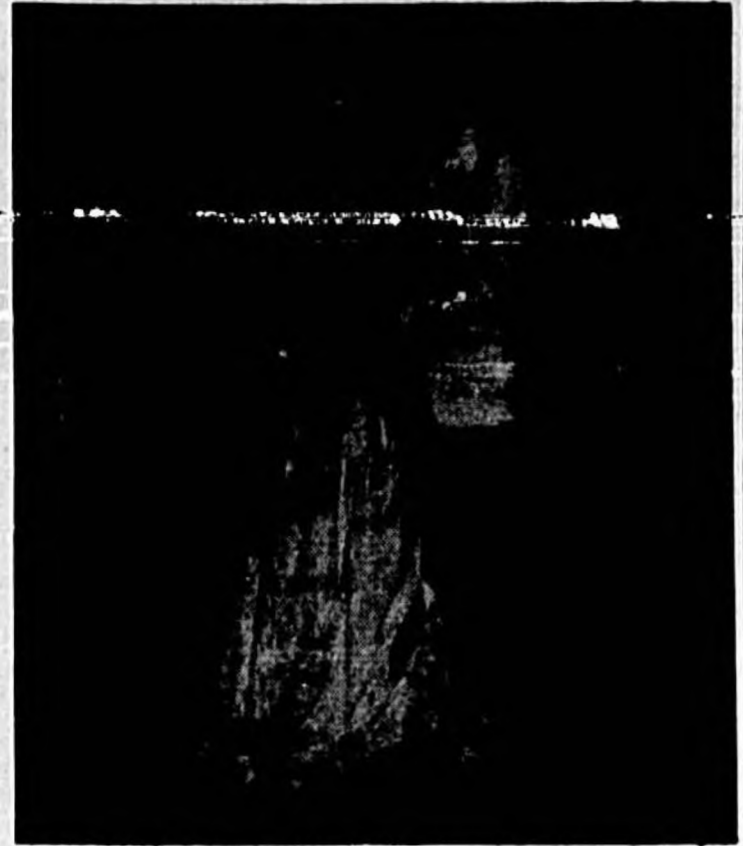
Pat De Rosa, maid of honor, wore a street length blue dress with matching headpiece of feathers.

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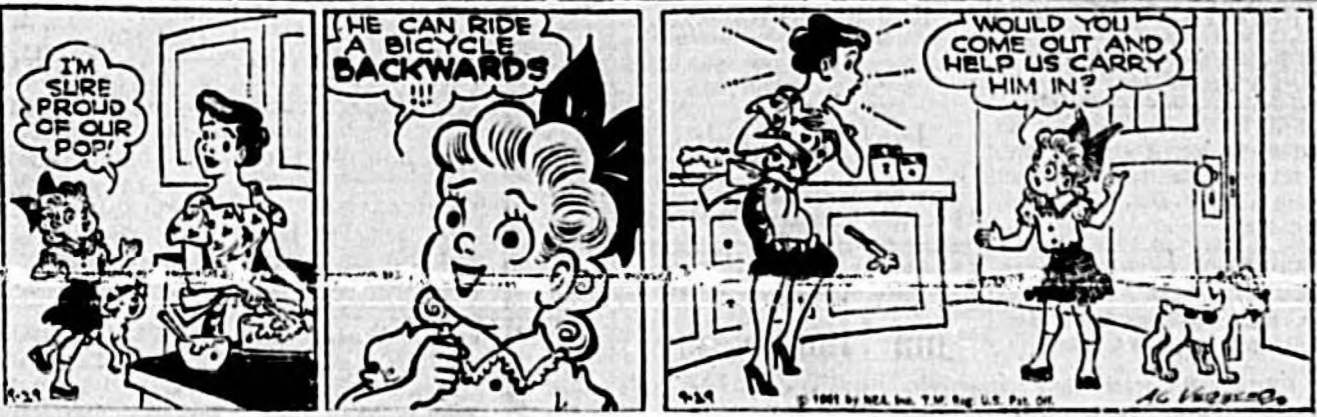

Judge Joseph E. Gold cleared Liston Thursday after commenting the huge fighter "has a little bit of a juvenile in him."

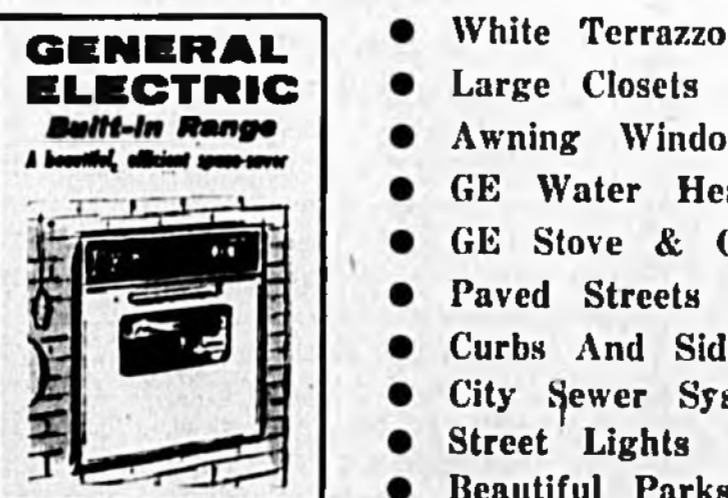
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
