Police step up patrols to calm fears, minimize threats

SANFORD — Only a day after what the national media labeled the "Attack on America," significant differences in the normal way of life could already be noticed in Seminole County.

Extra deputies patrolled the courthouse, while two separate false bomb alerts — one at the county services building and the other at Seminole High School — didn't help ease the horror from Tuesday. Seminole High School Principal Karen Coleman confirmed her school received a bomb threat Wednesday.

"We got a call at 11:28 a.m. that there was a bomb in the building that would go off at 11:30 a.m.," Coleman said. "We rang the bell immediately, and as the students and faculty were making their way out of the building I went on the intercom to tell all classes to go to the stadium."

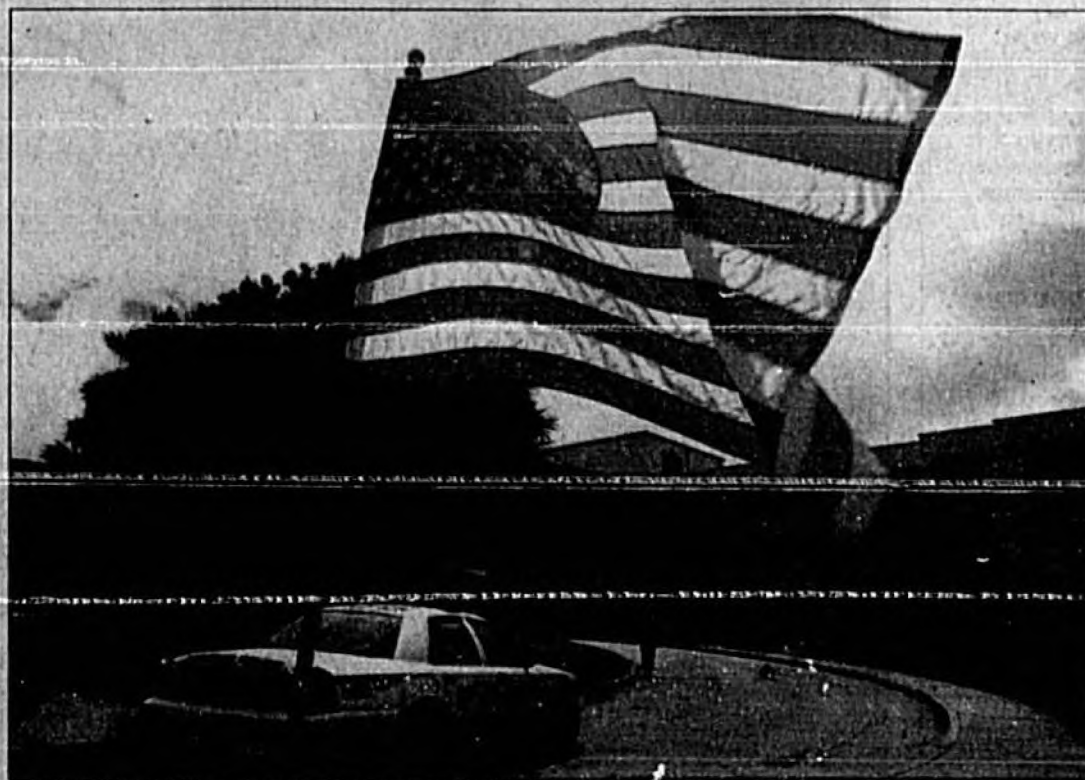
Coleman said the building was emptied in minutes and a preliminary check, as well as a thorough follow-up check by the Sanford Police Department revealed no bombs.

"Unfortunately, this was a situation where someone is trying to take advantage of this national tragedy," Coleman said. "We're not going to take any chances, though. I think it was a good exercise for our students, not only to react as quickly as they did, but to demonstrate to them that the school system and the police department continues to ensure their safety."

Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokesman Steve Olson said law enforcement agencies are operating on high alert.

"We have been advised by the national and state govern-

Residents line up to give blood

SANFORD — Twenty four hours after a plane flew into the north tower of the World Trade Center, people were waiting in line at Sanford's blood bank looking for a way to help in the face of tragedy.

As soon as the blood bank, located at 1302 E. Second St., opened its doors Wednesday morning, a line slowly formed outside the facility. By noon, more than a hundred people waited patiently for their turn to give.

A group of 10 employees from Featherlite Luxury Motorcoaches stood in line for more than an hour waiting to give blood. There were no complaints.

"It's the American way," Featherlite employee Laurie Hackett said. "The wait doesn't

matter. We've got to help our people. We can't be there to help, so this is what we can do." Featherlite was one of numerous Seminole County businesses that allowed its employees to take time away from work Wednesday to give blood. According to Hackett, more than half of the company's 324

employees planned on donating blood during the day.

"They told us if we wanted to come and give blood, they'd still pay us," said Featherlite employee Brandy Seidel. "They are very supportive."

Students express their concern through patriotism

SANFORD — A homemade U.S. flag juts out from a flower pot in front of Goldsboro Elementary School's office. In the flag's corner, "God bless America," is written in a child's handwriting.

Students at the school spent Wednesday morning making flags and writing letters in response to Tuesday's terrorist attacks on the United States. Goldsboro faculty felt the activity gave the children an opportunity to show their patriotism and support for the victims of the tragedy.

The activity followed a special morning broadcast made by

Principal Sherry O'Leary and Assistant Principal Jeanette Malone directed to the school's teachers and students. During the segment, the school administrators discussed how the children should express their feelings about Tuesday's events and how they could send messages of sympathy and support to New York City.

"During the activity, some students wrote letters, some students made flags and others wrote in journals," O'Leary said. "It depended on whatever was appropriate for each individual student."

Third-grader Collin Sugaski made a flag that echoed the feelings of many. "I hope some people made it. I wish this did not

happen. I wonder why someone did this."

On Tuesday, Sept. 11, two airplanes flew into both towers of the World Trade Center and a third plane flew into the Pentagon. Another crashed in Pennsylvania before it could reach what was believed to be its destination, Washington, D.C. So far, 18 hijackers have been identified, and the prime suspect is Osama bin Laden. More than 5,000 people are dead or missing.

Following reports of the attacks Tuesday, teachers were asked to keep televisions turned off at Goldsboro elementary, O'Leary said. At the end of the day, the remaining students at

SANFORD — As Seminole residents awoke Wednesday morning many may have hoped the horror from Tuesday was just a bad dream. The nightmare was indeed a reality.

Relief funds were immediately established in just about every corner of the county as residents banded together to help the nation recover from the terrorist attacks. From local firefighters to the small businesses in downtown Sanford to the students at Seminole High

School everyone was pitching in to help their fellow countrymen.

The Central Florida Fire Chief's Association and the Florida Fire Chief's Association Disaster Region 5 established the September 11th Fund for emergency workers and their families in New York City.

Citizens are encouraged to make a donation at any city or county fire station between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. Monies collected from the donations will go to the families of firefighters, police officers and other emergency workers in New York

City.

"Yesterday was exceptionally hard-hitting for all Central Florida firefighters and their families," said association spokesman Alan Harris in a released statement Wednesday. "Each realized how treacherous the firefighting career could be, and every family understood it could have been them dealing with a death."

To help encourage rescue workers, a post office box has been established in New York for people across the nation to

Gabrielle blows out of state

SANFORD — By the time tropical storm Gabrielle reached Seminole County it wasn't much more than a whimper Friday afternoon.

County emergency officials met Friday at 8:30 a.m. and started monitoring the system in the county's Emergency Operation Center.

According to Seminole County Fire Chief and trained meteorologist Terry Shenk, the average county rainfall was about three inches by Friday afternoon. He didn't expect but an inch or two more. Shenk said the storm failed to intensify like meteorologists thought it would because it had "wind shear on top of it coming from the Southwest."

Although the tornado watch was extended until 5 p.m. Friday in Seminole County, Shenk said that was just a matter of precaution because things can happen "when you have that kind of twisting in the atmosphere."

"The National Weather Service called for winds at about 45 to 50 mph, but I didn't expect that," said Shenk about the winds that never topped 40 mph in the county. "They've done a good job spotting tornadoes and issuing warnings."

A cell near the University of

Officers crack large cocaine ring

SANFORD — Early Friday morning, law enforcement officers served searched warrants and made arrests with regard to a crack cocaine distribution organization.

In October 2000, the City/County Investigative Bureau and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration initiated an investigation into the illegal drug trafficking activities of Earl Jack Williams Jr., and members of his organization.

The investigation revealed that Williams was responsible for distributing kilogram quantities of crack cocaine, on a weekly basis, in the Sanford area and north Seminole County areas. The investigation has led to the issuance of 20 arrest warrants and 11 search warrants at 10 different Sanford residences.

Helping in the in the early morning operation were the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Sanford police, Altamonte Springs police, Oviedo police, Volusia County Sheriff's Office and Florida Highway Patrol.

Items seized include the following: a pound of crack and powdered cocaine with an estimated street value of \$24,000, a pound of marijuana

with a street value of \$1,000, five firearms, and \$3,700 cash.

Five other suspects are being sought in the investigation.

Student's medical history should be ready at hand

DEAR ABBY: The letter in your column about what legal documents students should have once they reach the age of 18 prompted me to write.

With college starting again, please recommend that students have a personal fact sheet on hand, in a place where it can be easily located. It should include important information such as parents' names, address and phone numbers, food and drug allergies, prescription and non-prescription medications and dosages, the name and phone number of their family physician, dentist and pharmacy, their medical history and insurance information, etc.

New friends and acquaintances may not know these facts, or in an emergency will not remember them. The time it takes to look up the information in school records may mean the difference between life and death.

Because of my complex medical history and numerous prescriptions, this has been a lifesaver after accidents, when seeing new physicians and in emergency situations — especially when out of town. I keep it on my computer and hand the information out when necessary. Doctors and nurses rely on having an accurate and complete list of data.

DEAR BETTY: You have made a good point. In the past, I have usually targeted these suggestions to older adults. But everyone who lives independently should obey the Boy Scout motto: Be prepared. And that means printing out copies of emergency information and informing friends, roommates and dormitory advisers where they can easily find it in an emergency.

DEAR ABBY: I'm responding to the letter from "Teen-Age Aunt in Illinois," who felt guilty about reporting that she saw her sister's boyfriend hit her.

Seven years ago, 19 days before my eighth birthday, my sister was murdered by her boyfriend. Then he committed suicide. My sister loved him very much, but he didn't love her. They had two children.

He hit me only twice, but every time he hit my sister I would grab my niece and nephew and hide with them under the table. Once I almost called 911, but he left. I was afraid of him, but my sister made me promise not to tell anyone — and I didn't.

I'm now 14, and we adopted my niece and nephew. I love them dearly, but I miss my older sister very much.

If only I had told my father what was going on, I might have saved my sister's life. I recently told my father what happened — seven years too late. I regret that I didn't tell, and I'll regret it for the rest of my life.

"Teen-Age Aunt" — if you love your sister and your niece, please tell someone!

DEAR REGRETFUL TEEN: Thank you for a powerful letter. You will never know how many lives you may have saved today by writing it.

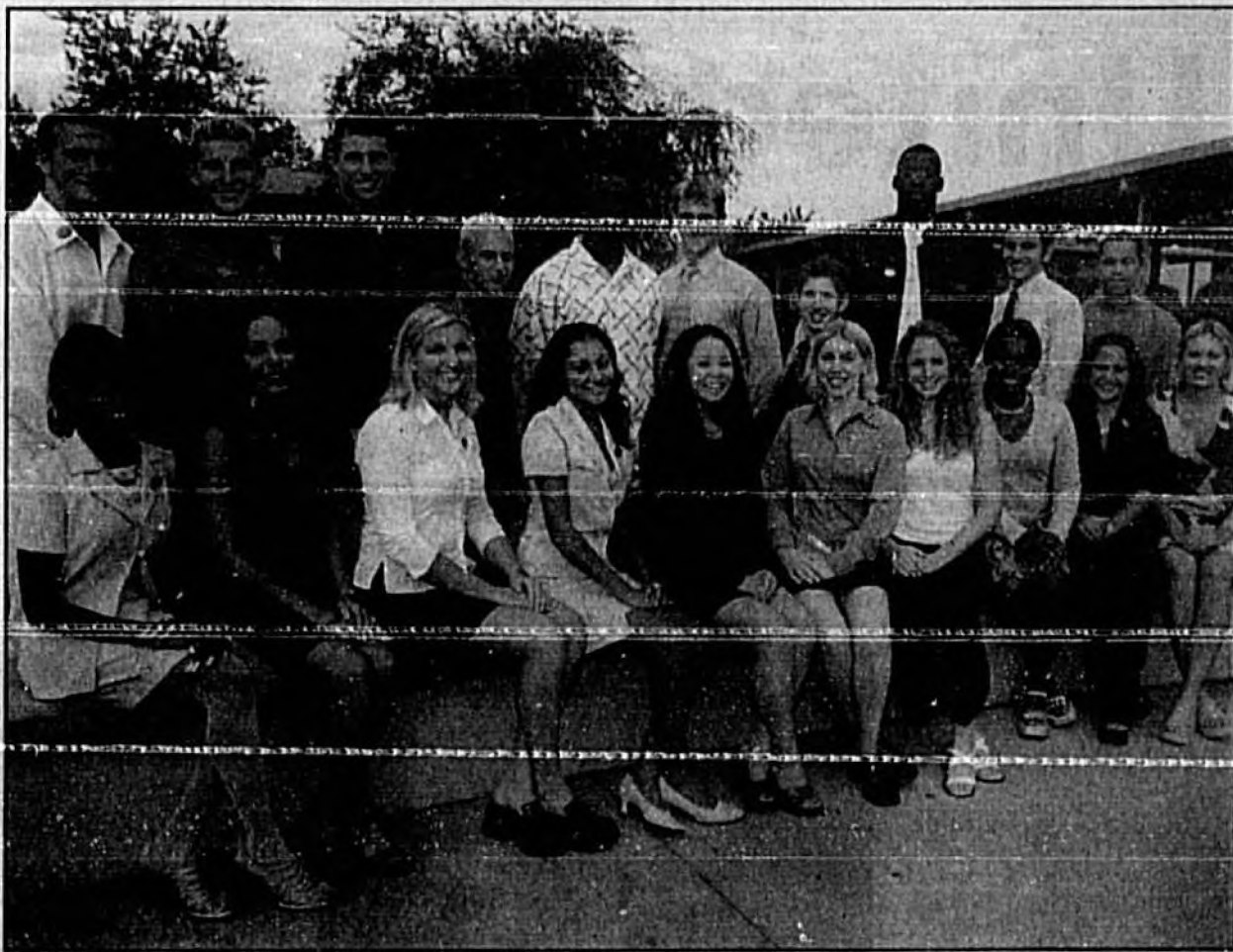

You were doing what your sister asked you to do, and at the age of 7, you couldn't have been expected to be independent enough in your judgment to have done otherwise. If you cannot let go of your feelings of guilt, talking them out with a professional counselor would be helpful. As much as one might wish it, no one can change the past. We can only change the future.

Traffic Fatality

Thomas Klindworth, 52, of Sanford died Tuesday in a one-vehicle accident, according to state troopers. He was killed at approximately 7:30 p.m. when he lost control of his pick-up truck on an exit ramp from the Greenway to County Road 426.

Counterfeit Purse

A Seminole County Sheriff's Office Lieutenant went undercover to bring down a Longwood resident selling counterfeit purses in an Altamonte Springs hair salon.

Thursday afternoon, Debi Rosenberg, 45, was arrested for vending good with counterfeit trademarks. The undercover agent purchased a Christian Dior purse for \$95 and Rosenberg reportedly asked not to tell anyone where she purchased the purse. When it was inspected by trained officials it was recognized as a counterfeit. Twenty-seven purses were confiscated from Moriah Brandons hair salon on State Road 434 Thursday.

The counterfeit purse names varied from Kate Spade, Boca, Gucci, Louis Vuitton and Christian Dior. Eight counterfeit watches, five fake wallets and nine counterfeit sunglasses were also confiscated at the hair salon. Another 11 counterfeit items were located at her residence.

According to the police report, "Rosenberg uttered she was stupid for selling counterfeit purses and she didn't think it was this serious of an offense."

The Americans

Editor's note: On June 5 1973, Canadian radio commentator Gordon Sinclair decided he'd had enough of the stream of criticism and negative press recently directed at the United States of America by foreign journalists (primarily over America's long military involvement in Vietnam, which had ended with the signing of the Paris Peace Accords six months earlier). When he arrived at radio station CFRB in Toronto that morning, he spent twenty minutes dashing off a two-page editorial defending the USA against its carping critics which he then delivered in a defiant, indignant tone during his "Let's Be Personal" spot at 11:45 a.m. that day.

The United States dollar took another pounding on German, French and British exchanges this morning, hitting the lowest point ever known in West Germany. It has declined there by 41 percent since 1971 and this Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the Americans as the most generous and possibly the least-appreciated people in all the earth.

As long as sixty years ago, when I first started to read newspapers, I read of floods on the Yellow River and the Yangtze. Who rushed in with men and money to help? The Americans did.

They have helped control floods on the Nile, the Amazon, the Ganges and the Niger. Today, the rich bottom land of the Mississippi is under water and no foreign land has sent a dollar to help. Germany, Japan and, to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy, were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debts. None of those countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States.

When the franc was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris. I was there. I saw it.

When distant cities are hit by earthquakes, it is the United States that hurries into help... Managua, Nicaragua is one of the most recent examples. So far this spring, 59 American communities have been flattened by tornadoes. Nobody has helped.

The Marshall Plan .. the Truman Policy .. all pumped billions upon billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now, newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent war-mongering Americans.

I'd like to see one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplanes.

Come on... let's hear it! Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo Jet, the Lockheed Tristar or the Douglas 107? If so, why don't they fly them? Why do all international lines except Russia fly American planes? Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon?

You talk about Japanese technocracy and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy and you get automobiles. You talk about American technocracy and you find men on the moon, not once, but several times ... and safely home again. You talk about scandals and the Americans put theirs right in the store window for everyone to look at. Even the draft dodgers are not pursued and hounded. They are here on our streets, most of them ... unless they are breaking Canadian laws .. are getting American dollars from Ma and Pa at home to spend here.

When the Americans get out of this bind ... as they will... who could blame them if they said 'the hell with the rest of the world'. Let someone else buy the Israel bonds, Let someone else build or repair foreign dams or design foreign buildings that won't shake apart in earthquakes.

When the railways of France, Germany and India were breaking down through age, it was the Americans who rebuilt them. When the Pennsylvania Railroad and the New York Central went broke, nobody loaned them an old caboose. Both are still broke. I can name to you 5,000 times when the Americans raced to the help of other people in trouble.

Can you name me even one time when someone else raced to the Americans in trouble? I don't think there was outside help even during the San Francisco earthquake.

Our neighbours have faced it alone and I am one Canadian who is damned tired of hearing them kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles.

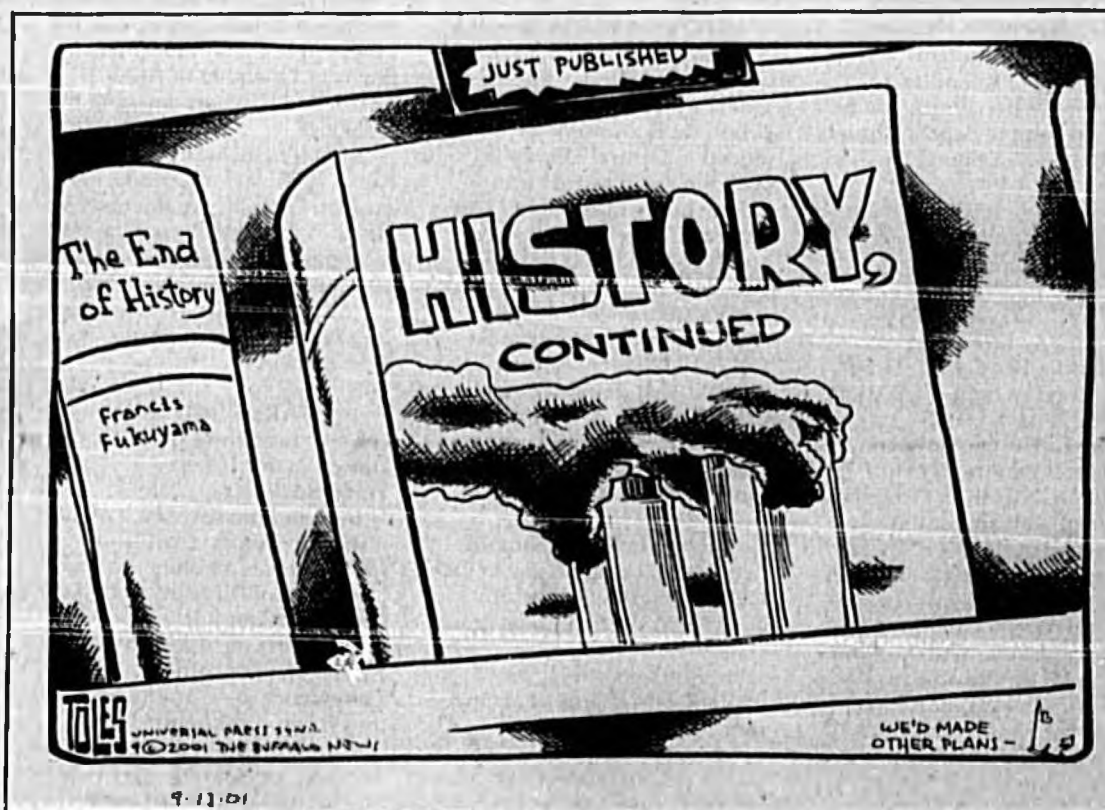
I hope Canada is not one of these. But there are many smug, self-righteous Canadians. And finally, the American Red Cross was told at its 48th Annual meeting in New Orleans this morning that it was broke.

This year's disasters .. with the year less than half-over... has taken it all and nobody...but nobody... has helped.

After Sinclair's editorial was rebroadcast by a few American radio stations, it spread like wildfire all over the country. It was played again and again (often superimposed over a piece of inspirational music such as "Battle Hymn of the Republic" or "Bridge Over Troubled Waters"), read into the Congressional Record multiple times, and finally released on a record (titled "The Americans"), with all royalties donated to the American Red Cross. (A Detroit radio broadcaster named Byron MacGregor recorded and released an unauthorized version of the piece which hit the record stores before Sinclair's official version; an infringement suit was avoided when MacGregor agreed to donate his profits to the Red Cross as well).

Sinclair passed away in 1984, but he will long be remembered on both sides of the U.S.-Canadian border — both for his contributions to journalism, and for his loudly proclaiming what no one else at the time would stand up and say.

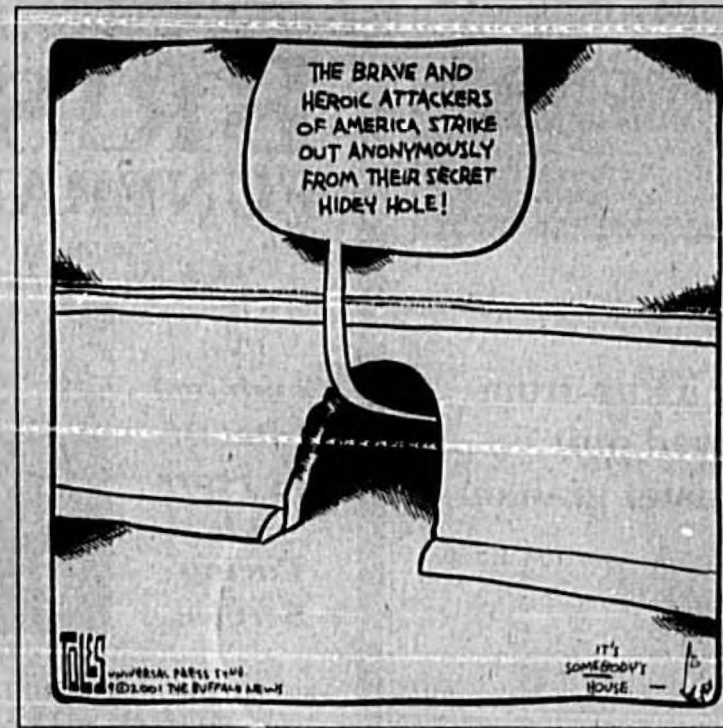
any way that we can throughout the nation to those who have been affected.

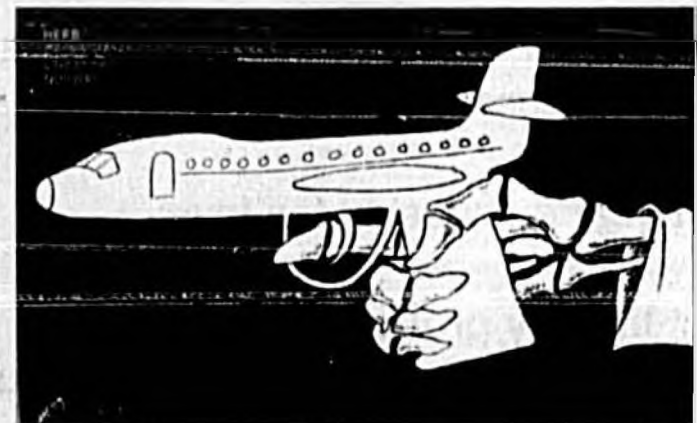

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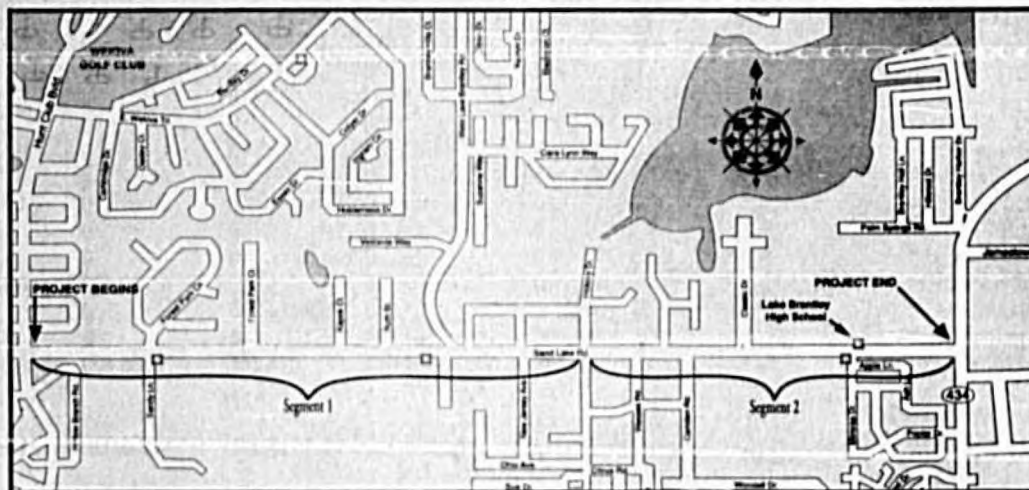

While large corporations announced donations of millions of dollars to relief funds Wednesday, smaller companies in Sanford also looked for ways to contribute.

Kelle Taylor, manager of the Sanford country hot spot the Barn, started the morning by calling her local printer. She decided selling bumper stickers remembering September 11th would be a great way to raise money for the Red Cross. Her efforts didn't stop there as she also started calling local businesses asking for them to donate products.

Through Saturday night the Barn was selling raffle tickets or the donated merchandise with all the proceeds of the raffle also going to the Red Cross. Taylor expects to raise more than \$1,000.

"Everybody needs help up here, but you feel so helpless when you watch the TV," Taylor said.

"Them people up there would have done it for us — they did it during Andrew," said Barn employee Denise Carlette about why she considered the relief efforts so important.

State creates task force to study racial profiling

State Attorney General Bob Butterworth recently assembled a 13-member task force to study discriminatory law enforcement profiling.

The task force is yet another step taken by the state in eliminating the practice of racial profiling. In June, Gov. Jeb Bush signed a bill that required all law agencies to implement antiprofiling policies by Jan. 1.

The diverse group included several politicians, a NAACP representative, a clergyman and top law enforcement figures, including Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger.

"I'm excited about the appointment and with working with the attorney general and others on this issue," said Eslinger who is also the president of the Florida Sheriffs Association. "I really feel good about the legislation that called for the antiprofiling policies."

According to Eslinger, he said he plans to

bring a law enforcement perspective to the task force that many of the other members may not have.

"I've been with the sheriff's office for 23 years — 11 of those years as a practitioner," said Eslinger. "I have a perspective that other members of the task force do not possess."

The 13-member panel will hold its first meeting Sept. 13 in Tallahassee with several planned presentations and an open group discussion.

"An individual's race, ethnicity, or any similar distinguishing characteristic should not be cause for suspicion of wrong doing and subject that person to special treatment by the authorities," said Butterworth in a released statement.

Senior Bishop John Adams of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Jacksonville is one of the 13 task force members, highlighting the increased role religion is playing in crime and punishment is growing.

On Sept. 24 and 25 the University of Central Florida will host a conference where

theologians, criminologists and policy makers will gather in Orlando to assess religion's place in crime and punishment. The conference is sponsored by the UCF's Department of Criminal Justice and Legal Studies in the College of Health and Public Affairs and the Department of Religion at Western Maryland College.

"Public dialogue on religion has intensified in the past decade with the passage of laws ranging from the Religious Freedom Act of 1993 and the 'Charitable Choice' provision of the Welfare Reform Act of 1996 to the Religious Protection Act of 1999 and the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act of 2000," said Karol Lucken, conference chair and UCF professor of criminal justice. "The 'faith factor' in politics currently is expressed in religious jousting on both sides of the death penalty issue and President Bush's creation of the Office of Faith-based Programs and Community Development."

the school — about 150 students were picked up early — were told a tragedy had occurred in the northern part of the country.

"I asked one mother why she wanted to pick up her child early," O'Leary said. "It wasn't because she thought her child wasn't safe. She told me she just wanted to hold her child."

Although the children were not told the details about Tuesday's event, O'Leary and Malone went from classroom to classroom talking to each teacher about the attack.

"It was very emotional on Tuesday," O'Leary said. "But, we asked the teachers to try to keep things normal and calm."

On Wednesday, O'Leary said

the faculty and staff tried to keep things as routine as possible. The older students still had club day, and the younger children continued their lessons. However, staff and guidance personnel were on hand in case any of the children needed to talk about the events of the past few days.

"Wednesday was an emotional day for us, probably more than on

Tuesday," she said. "I think this has an effect on all of us. For the children, only time will tell."

"We have to let the children know they are part of a great country, and we will survive this."

agents to look after buildings that are deemed assets," said Olson, noting that additional deputies could also be seen at area schools and government buildings.

Increased patrolling means a higher visible presence, but Olson quickly pointed out that SCSD didn't want their actions to create any more fear.

"We encourage people to go about their daily business and live their lives," Olson said. "We don't want to dismiss what happened Tuesday, but if we're fearful its as almost the terrorist attack has happened to us [here in Seminole County]."

While no overseas terrorists have attacked Seminole County, locals are reportedly

terrorizing individuals that have connection to the Islamic faith, said several Muslims who wished not to be identified.

"The meaning of Islam is actually peace," said Riyaz Jivraj who also alluded to that many area Muslims are feeling the brunt of Tuesday's disaster. "Basically suicide and killing people are against our faith.

It's an individual thing [with the terrorists] not a religion, thing."

Jivraj is the sales and purchasing manager at the ACD Corporation off East Lake Mary Boulevard which specializes in computer peripherals. The company moved several years ago from New York and employs about two dozen. Like Jivraj, most of the employ-

ees are from East Africa and practice the Islamic faith.

Jivraj said there was tremendous grief and sorrow shared by all the employees Tuesday as many of them have family and friends in the immediate area. Tragically, the company had a great deal of customers that worked in the World Trade Center who may have perished in the attack, said Jivraj.

"It's ignorant people taking matters into their own hands," said Jivraj about the attacks on Muslims in the county. "It is affecting our business and personal lives, too."

when a Boeing 767 slammed into the north tower of the World Trade Center at 8:45 a.m. Eighteen minutes later, another Boeing 767 crashed into the south tower of the Center.

At 9:40 a.m., American Airlines Flight 77 slammed into the Pentagon. About an hour later, officials confirmed United Airlines Flight 93 crashed in Pennsylvania. More than 5,000 are dead or missing as a result of the attacks.

By Tuesday afternoon, Central Florida Blood Bank dispatched a

courier with 200 units of blood to a Virginia blood bank. Others were planned to be dispatched during the next few days.

Tana Quiles, a registration specialist at the Sanford Blood Bank, said she didn't expect so many people Wednesday to give blood at the Sanford facility. However, the number didn't upset her.

"I've never seen anything like this before," Quiles said. "The support has really been great. And, this has been a great line."

Even when it began to rain, people remained in line waiting for their turn on one of three

beds in the facility. To make the wait more tolerable, Quiles and other volunteers handed out juice and soda to the donors.

Although thousands of Central Floridians have already donated blood during the past few days, Quiles said there is no limit on how many people can give.

"There is never too much," she said. "If it is not going up there, it is needed down here."

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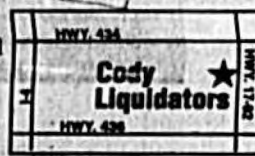
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Motorists should watch for road closings

As construction surrounding Interstate 4 and the Central Florida Greenway escalate the Herald will continually update motorists with transportation developments.

I-4 — RAMP CLOSURE

The Florida Department of Transportation is announcing the closure of the on-ramp to eastbound I-4 from US Hwy 17/92 at the St. Johns River Bridge. The ramp will be closed on Monday, Sept. 24 after the morning rush hour. This ramp will remain closed throughout the construction of the new eastbound bridge over the St. Johns River. The alternate access to I-4 eastbound will be at the SR 46 on-ramp.

Opening of a new on-ramp to eastbound I-4 from US Hwy 17/92 is expected in the early

2004. Variable Message Signs will be in place along I-4 near the St. Johns River Bridge on September 17, 2001 to announce the ramp closure to the motoring public.

Closure of the ramp is part of the \$102 million bridge replacement project that consists of the construction of two separate bridges flanking the old bridge, ultimate removal of the old bridge and the rebuilding of the approaches. This design/build project also includes the construction of an additional general use lane in each direction along I-4 from Orange Blvd. in Seminole County to Saxon Blvd (SR 472) in Volusia County.

Granite Construction Co. and PCL Civil Contractors, Inc., in a joint venture, are constructing the project with URS Corporation providing the

design. Metric Engineering Inc. is providing the Construction, Engineering and Inspection (CEI) services for the Department.

Hwy 17-92 — LANE CLOSURE AND LANE SHIFT
One northbound lane along Hwy 17-92 under I-4 is closed during construction activities. This lane will be re-opened prior to September 24.

I-4 — LANE CLOSURES
Installation of the temporary barrier along I-4 west of the St. Johns River Bridge to west of Saxon Blvd is complete. Lane closures along I-4 in this area will discontinue.

Construction activities within the median near Orange Blvd. will begin in the very near future. There may be traffic slow

downs due to drivers watching the activities. Please drive slower through the construction zone and allow extra time in your commute to account for potential delays.

ORANGE AVENUE CONSTRUCTION

Pile driving at the Orange Avenue Bridge began on Aug. 1 and will continue through September. There will be no I-4 lane closures associated with these construction activities.

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

MAGIC RE-SIGN TROY HUDSON

ORLANDO — The Orlando Magic have re-signed free agent guard Troy Hudson, General Manager John Gabriel announced Monday (Sept. 10). Per team policy, terms of the deal were not disclosed.

Hudson (6-foot-1, 170-pounds) played in a career-high 75 games last season with the Magic, averaging 4.8 points per game, 2.2 assists per game, and 1.4 rebounds per game in 13.5 minutes per game.

He also started in seven outings, averaging 13.7 ppg., 6.1 apg., 1.9 rpg., and 1.14 steals per game in 36.7 minpg. during that span.

He scored in double figures eight times, including a career-high 30 points on January 2nd against New Jersey. In that contest, Hudson poured in 20 points in the fourth quarter alone. He also led (or tied) for the team high in assists on seven occasions.

In 62 games during the 1999-2000 season with the Los Angeles Clippers Hudson made 38 starts, averaging 8.8 points, 3.9 assists and 2.4 rebounds in 25.7 minutes per game. Hudson led the Clippers in assists 25 times, in steals 10 times and in scoring on three occasions.

Hudson went undrafted in 1997 and was originally signed as a free agent by Utah on Oct. 3, 1997. He has appeared in 170 regular season games during his NBA career with the Jazz, Clippers and Orlando, averaging 6.4 points, 2.9 assists and 1.8 rebounds in 18.5 minutes per game. Hudson has also played in 59 games in the CBA from 1997-99, where he averaged 21.2 ppg., 4.0 apg and 2.7 rpg in 27.3 mpg.

Hudson finished his collegiate career at Southern Illinois, leaving after his junior season (1996-97). He became SIU's all-time leading two-year scorer with 1,144 points and the school's all-time leader in three-point field goals with 225. He averaged 21.2 ppg., 4.0 rpg and 2.2 apg in his career at SIU.

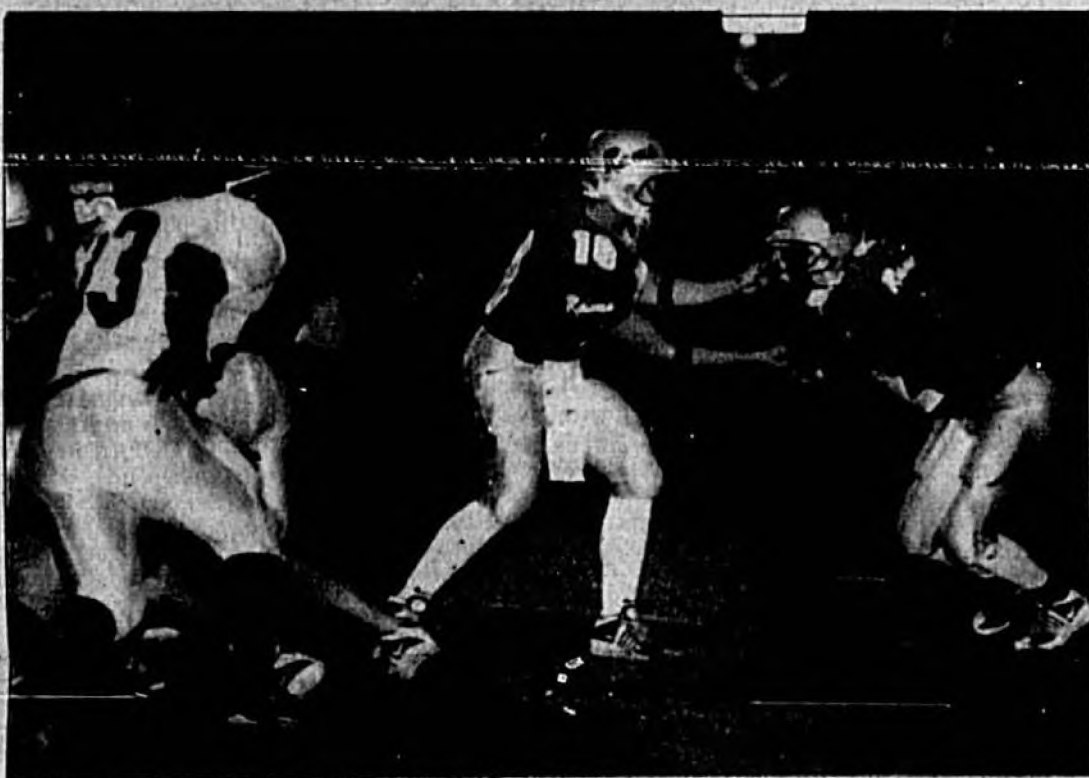

event for the weekend of October 18th.

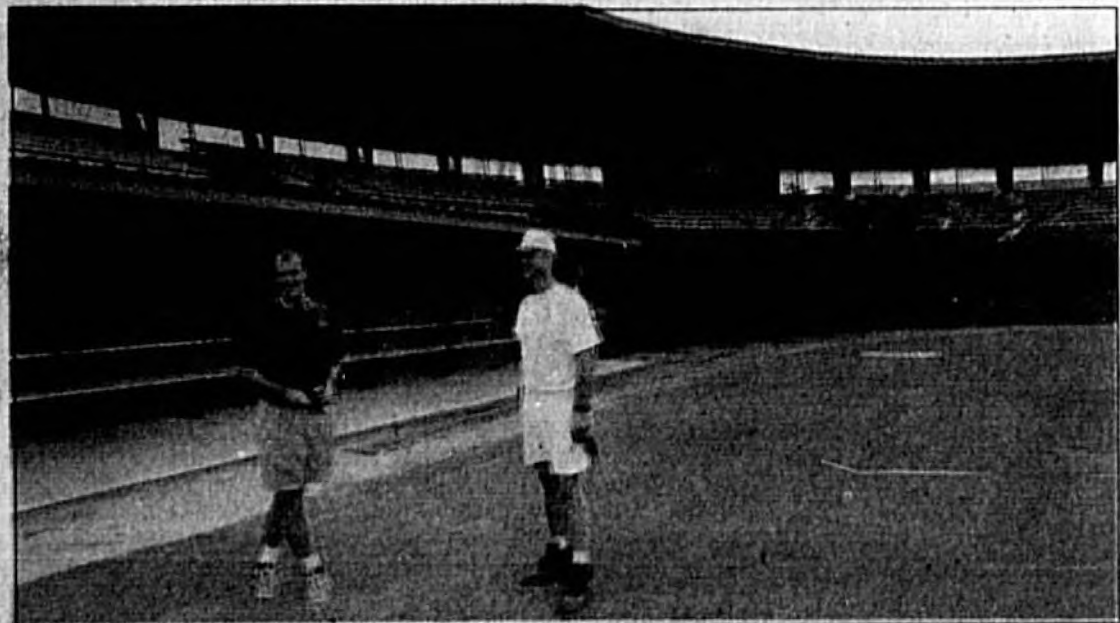
The exact schedule has not been set as of yet, but hopes are to run the double elimination tournament exactly as originally planned.

Proposed rule would halt marine life feeding

AMELIA ISLAND — The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), during its Sept. 5-7 meeting at Amelia Island, directed its staff to prepare a rule to ban the practice of divers in the water using food or other substances to attract marine animals. Commissioners cited the possibility that artificial feeding may alter the natural behavior of marine animals, causing public safety concerns.

At least four scuba diving tour operators in Florida use food to attract marine predators for

adventurous divers. For the past two years, the FWC has worked with the dive industry to develop a set of guidelines regarding marine life feeding. However, during the Sept. 6 session of the FWC meeting, tour operators said the proposed guidelines were too restrictive and indicated they would not abide by them. Commissioners then passed a motion to draft a rule which would make it illegal to feed marine life during such dives.

"Feeding marine life disrupts the natural behavior and feeding habits of fish and other animals," FWC Chairman David

Meehan said. "That is not in the best interest of marine life, and it could pose a threat to public safety."

Commissioners emphasized their decision to draft the rule is not linked to recent publicity about conflicts between sharks and beach goers. Most shark bites occur near shore in shallow water, but scuba divers frequently dive much farther out and in deeper water.

Despite wide-spread attention in news media this year, 2001 has not been an extraordinary year for such incidents, and they are not linked to marine-predator-feeding dive tours. Most

bites have been minor, and there have been no fatalities in Florida. Marine biologists believe most of the bites have occurred where sharks — while feeding on schools of bait fish near shore — mistake swimmers, waders or surfers for food in murky waters at peak feeding times.

Beach goers can minimize risks by avoiding the water during morning and evening hours, staying out of murky waters all together and by avoiding wearing shiny jewelry that may resemble bait fish to sharks.

Commissioners will vote on the rule during their Oct. 31 - Nov. 2 meeting in Key Largo. The proposed rule would not prohibit fishermen from using bait to catch fish.

The FWC also approved a new rule to reduce the length of weekend closures to commercial mullet fishing so the closures occur from 12:01 a.m. Saturday until 12:01 a.m. Monday, rather than the old closure hours — 4 p.m. Friday until 8 a.m. Monday. Weekend closures take place July 1 - Jan. 31 each year. FWC biologists believe mullet populations can withstand the additional harvest without disruption to the species' recovery.

Another new rule approved by Commissioners provides that enforcement of the oyster minimum size limit be conducted on the water only. In addition, no one requested a hearing concerning a new rule allowing harvest of ocean triggerfish by anglers and spear fishermen. The rule will take effect without a vote by the Commission.

Also on Thursday, Commissioners received a staff report on the status of queen conchs in the Florida Keys.

On Friday, Commissioners directed staff to schedule public workshops regarding a proposal to close shrimping areas in the lower St. Johns River in exchange for allowing shrimpers to fish in certain areas in the upper St. Johns River. The FWC also considered various federal fisheries management issues and directed staff to draft a rule to reduce the daily bag limit on snook from two fish to one and add May to the summer closed season on snook on the Gulf Coast. No changes to snook fishing rules for the East Coast are under consideration at this time.

The Commission also directed staff to draft a rule to extend the current moratorium on issuance of blue crab endorsements.

Management of public hunting lands dominated the agenda during the Wednesday session. After setting the quota of general-gun vehicle permits for Holey Land, Rotenberger, Everglades and Francis S. Taylor wildlife management areas (WMAs) for this year, Commissioners approved a series of rules to add or delete acreage from various WMAs, wildlife and environmental areas (WEAs) and mitigation parks. Commissioners also increased the number of quotas for permits for the Osceola WMA in line with acreage increases in the dog-hunt and still-hunt areas. Other rule changes adjusted bound-

aries and rules within other WMAs and established regulations for fish management areas.

Another new rule prohibits dogs and the possession or consumption of intoxicating beverages on the Weeki Wachee River tract, south of County Road 550, in the Chassahowitzka WMA. It will also prohibit public access between sunset and sunrise.

Also, Commissioners:

- Welcomed newly appointed Commissioner Rodney Barreto.
- Appointed Dr. David J. Nye as a member of the Board of Directors of the Wildlife Foundation of Florida.

- Approved an increase in the subscription rate for Florida Wildlife magazine.
- Approved a staff request to start a process to down-list the red-cockaded woodpecker from threatened to species of special concern.

- Considered a migratory bird regulations update.

- Reviewed and discussed major proposed changes to wildlife and freshwater fisheries regulations for 2002-2003.

- Heard a staff report on the Advisory Council on Environmental Education.

- Presented its Employee of the Year Award to Karen L'Heureux, a long-time employee in the agency's Personnel Office.

- Accepted a donation to the Wildlife Foundation of Florida by the Florida Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation.

The next Commission meeting is tentatively set for Oct. 31 - Nov. 2 at Key Largo.

Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) are eligible for cash rewards if their information leads to an arrest. Rewards range from \$50 to \$1,000, based on the severity of the violation — from fishing without a license to intentional taking of endangered species. Callers may remain anonymous and do not have to testify in court.

"The expansion of Wildlife Alert is something to get excited about," Col. Robert L. Edwards, director of the FWC Division of Law Enforcement, said. "For the first time in Florida's history, citizens will be eligible for cash rewards when they report marine law violations. Rewards will be paid for reporting violations of net limitation laws, trap robbing, exceeding the bag limit,

endangering marine mammals and violations of other important saltwater resource regulations. We are convinced Wildlife Alert will greatly enhance the protection of Florida's marine resources."

Wildlife Alert was organized in November 1979 under the former Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. More than 19,000 arrests have been made, and more than \$264,000 in rewards paid out since it began, which makes Wildlife Alert one of the most successful citizen-reporting projects in the nation. It also predates all other conservation reward programs except Operation Game Thief in New Mexico.

The Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission became the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission on July 1, 1999 and assumed marine

resource responsibility. Work began immediately within the Wildlife Alert Reward Association to expand the program into the marine area.

Thirteen private citizens dedicated to the protection and conservation of Florida's fish and wildlife resources make up the association and oversee the program. FWC's executive director, Dr. Allan L. Egbert, appoints members to the association for two-year terms. Penalties assessed by court judges against individuals found guilty of violating conservation laws and tax-deductible donations from individuals and organizations fund the rewards.

Historically, the public has reported violations to Wildlife Alert through five toll-free numbers in the FWC regional offices. Violations were reported to the former Florida Marine Patrol (FMP)

through 1-800-DIAL-FMP. The FWC now has one toll-free line for reporting all violations. The new statewide number is 1-888-404-FWCC or cellular, #FWC.

Duty officers answering Wildlife Alert lines will provide a code number to callers and give instructions on how to follow up on their reports. Duty officers will then immediately provide the information by radio to FWC law enforcement officers working marine or inland areas. This will ensure a quick response to the scene. Convictions are not required for a caller to be eligible for a reward, however, callers must include enough information about the violation and a description of the suspects, vessels, registration numbers, vehicles, etc. to enable officers to investigate and make an arrest.

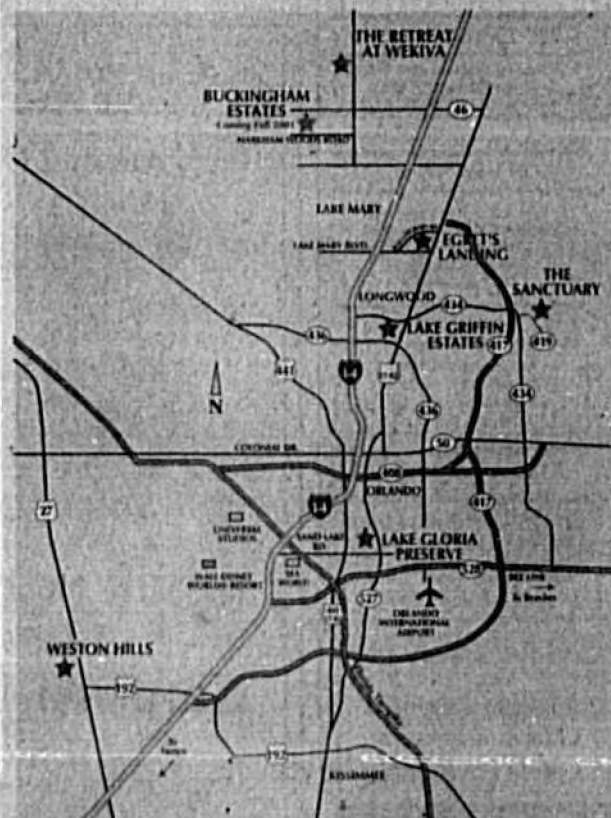

Baseball Town, USA

Sanford is a baseball town, always has been. Whether you're talking about legends of the game like Babe Ruth, Jackie Robinson, and Willie Mays or home-grown talents like Buddy Lake, Tim Raines, and David Eckstein, Sanford baseball fans have seen their share of Major League talent perform on the local ballfields.

At the heart of this baseball town has been the Historic Sanford Memorial Stadium. Though it's not the city's original stadium, it has hosted its share of famous ball players and big events. The New York Giants called Sanford home for Spring Training during the 1950s.

In recent years, activities at the stadium declined as age and weather began to deteriorate the facility. But a 2-year, \$2 million renovation program is giving the 50-year-old stadium new life. Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard said rebuilding the stadium would allow the city to

once again host premier softball and baseball events.

"This stadium is the crown jewel of a very nice recreational complex," Lessard said. "We are returning to our baseball roots."

Lessard said he hopes the new stadium will help Sanford's youth strive for athletic excellence like Sanford legend Buddy Lake. Lake, a 1930 Sanford High graduate, faced some of the greats as a spring training player for the Boston Braves, but he is best known, for a July 17, 1947, game against the DeLand Red Hats. Lake, playing for the Sanford Giants, pitched a perfect game and hit a homerun in the final inning to win the game. The amazing part is the game — and Lake's pitching arm — lasted 19 innings.

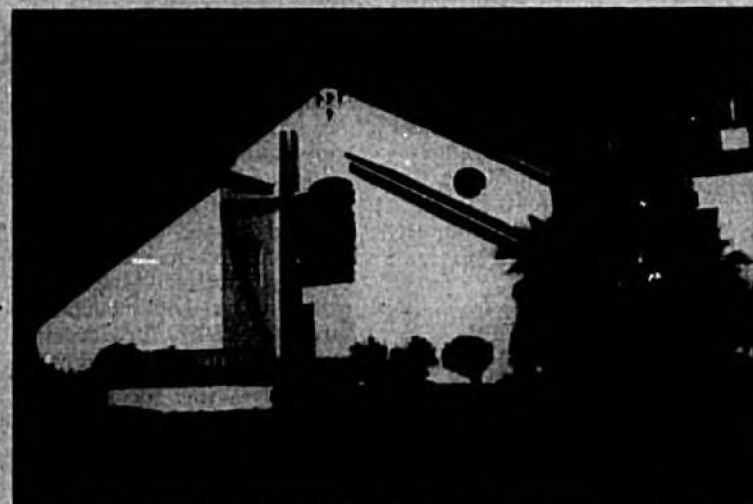

Native Asian evergreen thrives in Central Florida

Podocarpus are evergreen trees that will thrive well throughout Florida. Of the numerous species,

..... Podocarpus macrophylla or yew podocarpus and Podocarpus nagi are the most common ones grown in this region. These trees are native to China and Japan and are very cold hardy.

Leaves may reach four inches in length and about one-fourth in width. Male flowers are yellow, catkin-like and will gradually turn brown and fall to the ground. Female flowers are greenish in color and not too noticeable.

Male and female flowers grow in separate plants. The fruit is berry-like, purplish, and the fleshy part is about one-half inch in length.

The green seed is attached to this fleshy stem. The fleshy stem is edi-

ble but the foliage has been considered somewhat toxic to some animals, especially cats.

Culture

Best growth can be expected when plants are set in a well-drained, improved soil, in sun or partial shaded location. Plants should be set at the same depth they were grown in containers or field. A saucer-shaped depression around the plant is desirable to retain water.

Plants should be watered daily for a few days by filling the depression, and then only as needed to prevent wilting. Container grown plants can be set out at any time. Field-grown plants that have been properly handled, balled, and burlapped may also be transplanted successfully at any time.

However, large, field grown plants, are difficult to move and survive without previous root pruning. Many growers will not sell these large field-grown plants immediately after digging.

They will carry these plants for a few weeks to harden them off and to determine if they will survive. Because of this problem, it usually is best to transplant large plants during the cooler season—fall, winter and spring.

Trees are fertilized according to their size. Trees with less than a 6-inch trunk diameter will require 2 to 3 pounds (four to six level coffee cups) of a 6-6-6 type fertilizer or its equivalent, per inch of trunk diameter per year. Trunks over 6" in diameter will require 5 pounds (10 level coffee cups) of fertilizer per inch of trunk diameter per year. The fertilizer should be split in two or three applications.

These trees are very sensitive to magnesium deficiency; therefore this plant nutrient should be included in your yearly fertilization program.

Use

Trees will grow into fairly large trees if permitted to grow naturally. Thus they will make good specimen plants or may be used for tall hedges or screen plantings. Yew podocarpus has been used to a great extent in foundation planting and as a hedge. In both cases, frequent shearing will be required to prevent overgrowth in their location.

If not pruned, it can grow up to 50 feet height.

Podocarpus foliage has also found use in flower shops floral designs. There are commercial growers that produce these plants specifically for the florist use.

Propagation

Plants can be started from seeds or cuttings. Seeds often are found sprouting while still attached to the fleshy stalk on the plant.

Four to six inches tip cuttings is another means of producing new plants. Cuttings will require 10 to 12 weeks to root.

Pest And Diseases

Scale insects on twigs or leaves can affect this plant. Fungi may cause leaf spots, and in severe cases, affected foliage will drop prematurely. Control consists of sanitation and fungicide applications.

Root rot, a disease affecting the plant root system can eventually cause its death. No chemical control is available.

Sanitation will help prevent or delay root rot. Some plant parasitic nematodes can affect the plant root system causing gradual plant decline and eventual death. No chemical product to control this problem is available to the homeowners.

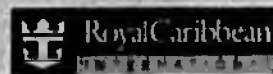
