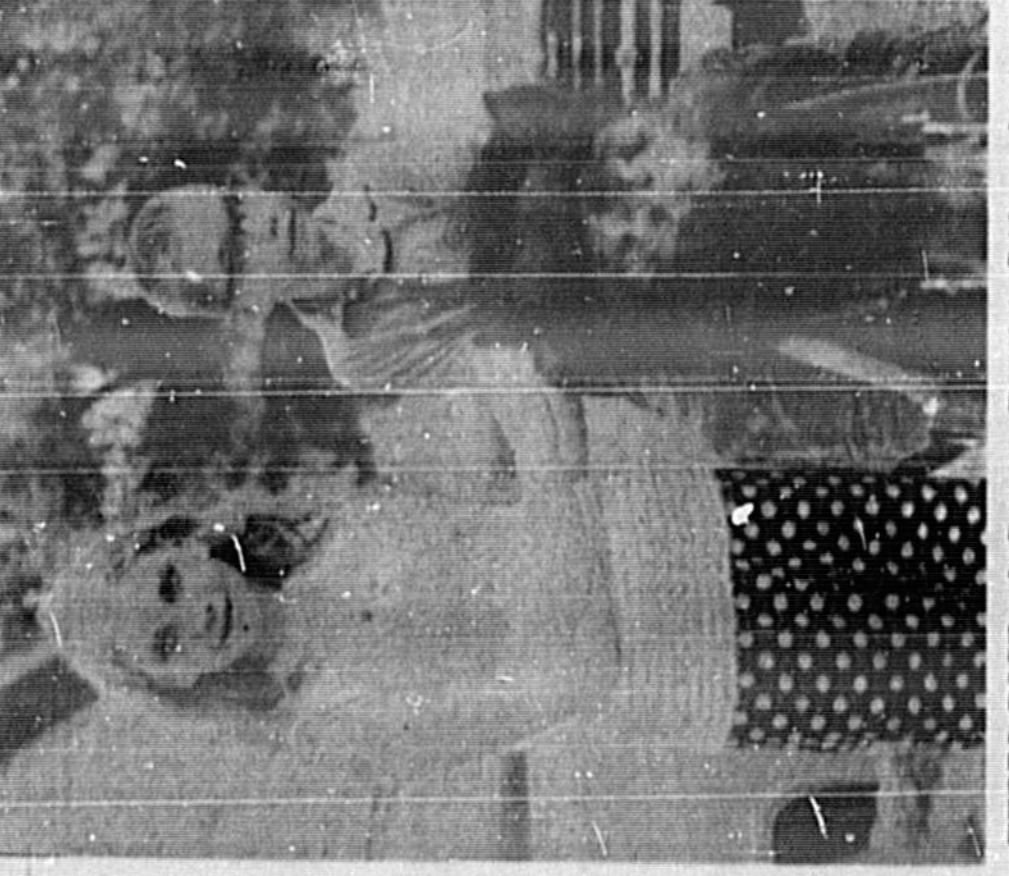

Forest City P. O. Safe Stolen; Burglars Busy
