Warning Words!

Julian Goodman, president of the National Broadcasting Company, recently warned that government pressure on the news media could "create a clear and growing danger to the freedom of information secured by the First Amend-

Speaking to a Sigma Delta Chi group at the University of Texas, Mr. Goodman suggested a three point program for action against "unwarranted government intrusion" with any news operator: Full publicity of any government action threatening the flow of news; Explanation to the public of the issues and its rights; Support of newsmen's legal defenses when their rights are at stake.

Mr. Goodman said, "The intent of the attackers doesn't matter, but the effect does. It can limit legitimate news coverage. It can narrow the range of the newsman's sources. It can dry up the flow of information to the public."


