Lift desegregate order



School board member Robinson

School board member says

SANFORD — Some people think that it's time for the school district to get out from under the watchful eye of a federal court.

While some parents have been in contact with the U.S. Department of Justice regarding the failure, in their opinion, of the school district to comply with the 1970 desegregation court order, some people believe that the district is in substantial compliance and are calling for the district to apply for unitary status. "I believe the time has come,"

said Sandy Robinson, a member of the Seminole County School Board. "It's time to explore what we can do now."

Robinson said she has chatted with several attorneys who have told her they believe the district is now in substantial compliance with the court order. The Seminole County schools, she believes, are racially proportionate.

School board attorney Ned Julian has told the board that it should not be hasty in making an application for unitary status.

He has suggested that an attorney who is an expert in desegregation litigation be hired to review the district's statistics since 1970 to see if the proper strides have been made in integrating the district's schools. Such a review, he estimated, would cost about \$3,000.

Robinson believes the district will benefit from a lifting of the federal supervision of the court order.

"I believe in neighborhood schools," she said. "This will allow us to have neighborhood schools."

Robinson believes that the district would save "a little money" on transportation costs if it would be allowed to return to neighborhood schools.

Three vehicles wreck

An early morning accident at the intersection of County Road 427 and County Home Road just south of Sanford sent two people to the hospital in Orlando and snarled rush hour traffic for hours.

The accident involving two small trucks and an 18-wheel truck, occurred at about 7:46 this morning, according to Ken Roberts, director of emergency management with the Seminole County Department of Public Safety.

The truck apparently collided head-on with one of the vehicles and side-swiped the other one, Roberts said late this morning. He said the big truck had been traveling east on County Road 427 when the accident occurred.

He said he believed that at least one of smaller vehicles was traveling in the opposite direction.

Roberts said the truck, owned by Feeder Truss Company of Winter Springs, jackknifed when the driver tried to stop to avoid the collision.

A representative of the company said the driver was Bob Godwin. He was uninjured in the accident, Roberts said.

At least one of the smaller vehicles had to be cut apart to free the driver, Roberts said. Drivers of both vehicles were airlifted by helicopter to Orlando Regional Medical Center in Orlando for treatment.

Gooding's plans new market in Heathrow

HEATHROW — Plans continue toward moving the Gooding's Supermarket main office to Lake Mary. Plans were also announced for a new Gooding's Supermarket store to open this fall in adjacent Heathrow.

The 42,000 square foot supermarket will take over the former Publix building at Market Square shopping center, on Lake Mary Boulevard, just west of Interstate 4, at International Parkway.

According to Gooding's spokesman Mike Garlich, "The new supermarket will include a florist, fresh seafood shop, delicatessen and bakery."

Meanwhile, work continues toward obtaining required permits and site and plan approval for the move of the Gooding's main office to a 41 acre tract adjacent to Interstate 4, near Rinehart Road, within the Lake Mary city limits.

The Planning and Zoning Board approved a rezoning of the property from agriculture to high density commercial early this week. The matter now must go before the full City Commission.

"After that," said City Planner Matt West, "there are still several permits they will need before the matter can finally get underway."

Garlich commented, "The new property will accommodate extensive space for Gooding's current corporate offices as well as supplemental warehouse space."

Gooding's present corporate offices are located at 483 Montgomery Place in Altamonte Springs. They have been operating from that headquarters since 1982. Approximately 70 persons are currently employed. With the new Lake Mary corporate office, Garlich said, "I expect the staff will be expanded, providing some new jobs to the Lake Mary area". He added, "But until we get further into this project, we can't determine how many more people we may need."

Pending approval of the sale of the property to Gooding's, and obtaining approval from the City and its various boards, Garlich expects the actual move to Lake Mary would take place sometime in late 1993.

He commented, "Gooding's selected the Lake Mary site because of its central location and its proximity to Interstate 4 and new transportation routes in north Seminole County."

"Just like the people we are showing our appreciation to," Fedderson said, "individuals from each of these organizations have been doing an outstanding job in putting the event together."

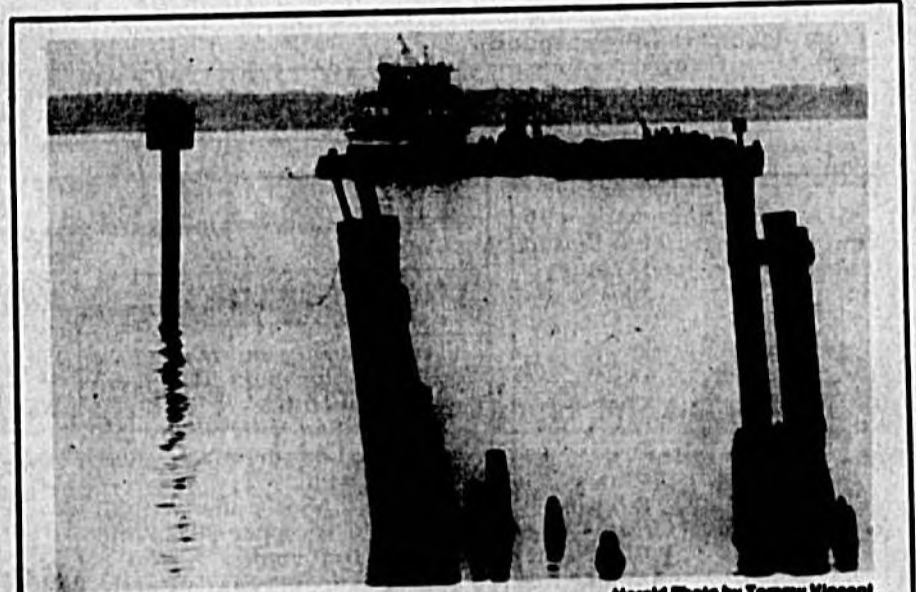

Look what's barged in to help build expressway

SANFORD — The Department of Transportation has brought two construction barges into the Sanford area. They will be used on the Lake Jessup bridge construction project.

The first of the barges arrived before noon yesterday, with the second scheduled for shortly after noon today. They were brought

up the St. John's River from Jacksonville, to the Marina Isle Fish Camp area, from where they will be taken to the bridge site.

"That's going to be tricky," said Bob Parker at Marina Isle. "The water is so shallow right now, they will have to go through three or four new sand bars before they get from here to the bridge."

Contractors group challenges ruling

JACKSONVILLE — A contractors group that challenged the legality of Jacksonville's minority set-aside program has appealed its case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Northeast Florida chapter of the Associated General Contractors of America is asking the high court to review an appeals court ruling that blocked its efforts to kill the program.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta ruled in January that the group didn't have standing to challenge the program because it hadn't shown its members were economically harmed.

The minority set-aside program channeled millions of dollars in city contracts to minority-owned businesses in the 1980s. It was struck down by U.S. District Judge John H. Moore II in May 1990, but his decision was overturned by the appeals court.

Dental assistants file suit

PALATKA — Eight female dental assistants have filed suit against their former boss after one of the women allegedly found a video camera hidden in an air-conditioning vent in the office bathroom.

The small, surveillance-type camera was connected to a television monitor and videocassette recorder in the laundry room of Dr. Alexander Milanick, said the Circuit Court lawsuit filed Tuesday.

In the suit, the women's attorney said the camera was used to watch the women, and the camera was pointed directly at the toilet.

Milanick denied the charges. "Under the advice of my attorney, I can say no more," he said.

Dog finds boy

PALM BAY — The 911 emergency call reported a 3-year-old boy missing from his home. Patrol cars arrived minutes later, closely followed by firefighters.

A distraught Kimberly Jones said she couldn't find her son Benjamin anywhere in the house Wednesday afternoon. Officers began scouring the house and neighborhood.

A K-9 unit was summoned, and officer Diana Whitlock led her German shepherd partner, Zeus, into the house to pick up Benjamin's scent.

Within minutes, Zeus ducked his head beneath the child's bed and gently prodded Benjamin awake with a wet nose.

A tearful but happy mother cuddled the yawning boy after pulling him from his hiding place.

Nonchalant burglar arrested

POMPANO BEACH — A nonchalant burglar was arrested after calling a cab from a home he broke into, loading up the stolen goods and having the driver take him to a pawnshop, police said.

"It's amazing. The thought of a criminal ... jumping into a cab at the scene of a crime," police spokeswoman Sandra King said. "Very strange."

Jeffrey Francis Wagner, 23, was charged with burglary of a residence, grand theft and dealing in stolen property. He confessed after his arrest, King said.

On Monday, Wagner's father came home and saw his son taking a videocassette recorder and chased his son down the street. He then called police, but Wagner already had called a cab.

Fugitives rounded up

MIAMI — More than 3,300 fugitives, including an accused Austrian serial killer and an alleged wrestler who killed his wife, were rounded up in a nationwide sweep, a Justice Department official announced.

The 10-week program dubbed Operation Gunsmoke involved federal, state and local agencies. Deputy Attorney General George J. Terwilliger III said Thursday on a visit to Miami.

Gunsmoke snared \$1.9 million in cash and property along with \$4.2 million in guns, drugs and other contraband, he said. The 730 weapons included assault rifles, sawed-off shotguns and handguns.

One of those arrested was Jack Unterwieser, an Austrian prison author arrested in Miami Beach in February on charges of killing prostitutes in his homeland. He is also being looked at as a suspect in the slaying of two prostitutes in Los Angeles.

Oil drilling moratorium bill passed

MIAMI — The U.S. House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries passed a bill that would implement an oil drilling moratorium for the eastern Gulf of Mexico until the year 2000, a Florida Congressman reported.

The bill passed in Washington contained language inserted by U.S. Rep. Porter Goss and was added Thursday as an amendment to a comprehensive, national energy blueprint expected to reach the House floor for a vote sometime later this spring.

Parents: Redefine brain death

TALLAHASSEE — The parents of baby Theresa, born with a partially formed brain, were misled into believing her organs could be donated to help other infants if the pregnancy wasn't terminated, their attorney said.

The parents, Justin Pearson and Laura Campo of Coral Springs, asked the state Supreme Court to create a new definition of brain death so other such baby's organs can be donated for transplants.

Campo could have obtained a legal abortion when she and Pearson found out the fetus was anencephalic, they said in a brief filed Thursday by attorney Scott Mager.

When told they would be able to donate the newborn's organs for transplants that

could save other lives, Mager said. "They decided to carry the baby to term in order to do so."

Theresa was born March 21 with a tiny stub of brain tissue that kept her lungs and heart pumping for nine days. Although doomed to die, she was considered alive under state law because she showed activity in her brain stem.

A Broward County judge ruled doctor couldn't remove vital organs, and an appellate court declined to review the case.

By the time Theresa died March 30, doctors determined that none of her organs could be saved for transplant. Her corneas were taken but were too immature for anything except medical research.

After the 3-pound infant was buried April 2, Pearson and Campo said they would pursue a change in the law defining when life begins and ends.

The state Supreme Court agreed to hear the case and scheduled oral arguments for Sept. 2. The attorney general's office will represent the circuit judge who ruled against Theresa's parents.

Mager's brief asks the court to establish a new category of brain death that would permit organ donations in cases of anencephaly.

Smith accuser becomes an advocate for rape victims

WEST PALM BEACH — The woman who claims she was raped at the Kennedy estate has become a victims' advocate since a jury rebuffed her charge.

Patricia Bowman says she is proof that a rape victim can overcome the worst the nation's handling of sex crimes can dish out.

"I maintained my dignity throughout the whole undignified process," she told reporters Thursday in her first news conference since William Kennedy Smith was exonerated of her allegations last December. "I fully believe in cooperating with all the authorities involved."

"People who might be frightened by everything I've gone through should know that you can survive the crime of sexual assault, you can survive media victimization and you can survive the criminal justice system," said Ms. Bowman, who had given a handful of interviews since the much-publicized trial.

She said she was still reluctant to talk to reporters because she believed she was victimized by news organizations that disclosed her identity, along with details of her personal life, before the trial.

The 30-year-old woman from the nearby town of Jupiter organized a seminar on rape Thursday as part of national crime victims' week, and said she has been quietly making

speaking appearances, working with legislators on bills to help rape victims and participating in victims' rights groups.

Smith, 31-year-old nephew of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., testified she had consensual sex with him. His lead attorney, Roy Black, said recently Smith didn't want to keep re-hashing the case and wants to get on with his life, including a medical residency that begins this summer at the University of New Mexico hospital.

Asked if Smith's acquittal undermines her credibility as a victims' advocate, she replied: "I know exactly what happened to me on March 30, 1991 (when she reported the alleged rape). I do not need six people to tell me what happened to me on March 30, 1991."

Ms. Bowman, who has a preschool daughter, said her victims' advocacy helps her "recovery and reorganization."

"I live a very full life," she said. "We're doing OK."

Denny Abbott, a Palm Beach County victims' advocate who was the rape crisis counselor who received Ms. Bowman's case, said her experience and activism have helped both victims' activities and herself.

"She's doing something productive and positive instead of sitting back and saying 'I never want to hear about this again,'" Abbott said.

Popularity may not save the manatee

TALLAHASSEE — Concern about the fate of the manatee brought the federal Marine Mammal Commission to Florida for its annual meeting as the death toll of the slow-moving sea cows continues rising.

"The magnitude of the problem for manatees is immense," John Reynolds, chairman of the independent federal agency, said Thursday. "Almost any human activity in any inshore body of water or wetland in Florida can and does impact manatees."

Reynolds said widespread public support and the efforts of government and private agencies may not be enough to save the endangered manatee.

"My concern is that Florida manatee recovery is ... in doubt," said Reynolds, a marine scientist at Eckerd College in St. Petersburg.

Topping the list of concerns is poorly managed human population growth in Florida, which has almost 1,000 new residents a day, most of whom settle within 10 miles of the coast.

The number of manatee deaths climbs correspondingly with the number of registered boats, Reynolds said. Florida now has 750,000 registered boats.

The plant-eating marine mammals found in the rivers and coastal waters of Florida, southern Georgia and the Caribbean are frequently killed in boat collisions.

Reynolds also noted a lack of money for enforcement and habitat preservation, industry opposition to new regulations and the sheer size of the problem.

The death rate of manatees was up 11 percent in the year ended in April. In the past three years, 550 manatees were recovered dead, he said.

Reynolds said discussions at the three-day meeting might lead to a revision of the state's manatee recovery plan. He called the 1989 document, signed by the heads of 13 groups and agencies, an excellent plan.

An aerial survey counted 1,200 to 1,400 manatees in Florida and Georgia waters in 1991.

Source: Officials in Dominican palace, police protected drugs

MIAMI — A shipment of 880 pounds of cocaine to Miami was protected by a top official in the presidential palace of the Dominican Republic, a federal law enforcement source said.

At least one additional Dominican official, an important officer in the national police force, also was involved in the drug deal, the source told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity.

"These are high-ranking government officials," the source said Thursday. "The president of the Dominican Republic knows who they are. He was briefed (Wednesday) by his own people."

The Dominican officials protected the drug deal and knew about the flight that carried the

cocaine to Miami this spring, said the source.

Dominican President Joaquin Balaguer's office refused comment on the allegations Thursday, and the Dominican Directorate for Drug Control said only that an investigation was under way into the case, and arrests have been made.

Drug police in both countries have become concerned because Balaguer has made no immediate moves against the officials, the source said.

The 880 pounds of cocaine arrived at Miami International Airport from Santo Domingo on April 9, and Drug Enforcement Administration agents monitored the shipment in a cargo area until seizing it Wednesday.

Dominican drug police arrested 20 people in that country, according to Jim Shedd,

spokesman for the DEA office in Miami.

Shedd refused to comment on the links to top Dominican officials. But he said Dominican police have asked U.S. help in finding two other major figures in the ring, Jose Andres Marcos and Guillermo Enrique Torchio Hernandez.

The DEA spokesman said the cocaine originated in Colombia, and was airdropped off the coast of the Dominican Republic, which shares the Caribbean island of Hispaniola with Haiti.

"The cocaine was then taken to an apartment where it was dried by special heat lamps," Shedd said. Dominican police found not only lamps, but wrappers, high-frequency radios and traces of cocaine in the apartment in Santo Domingo, the capital city.

City may ease sign codes on apartments

SANFORD — A proposal may be forthcoming to ease restrictions on apartment signs in Sanford. A meeting was held yesterday to discuss possible recommendations.

City codes are very restrictive over rental signs at Sanford apartment complexes. Apartment managers have asked for consideration of changes during the economic slowdown.

Yesterday, City Manager Bill Simmons met with managers of six of Sanford's apartment complexes to seek a solution to the problem. "I've had letters and conversations about the problem," Simmons said, "and I asked for this gathering to find out what kind of changes you would like to have."

Simmons said he was willing to ask the City Commission for changes if they were deemed necessary. "Preferably," he said, "I would like to find a way to refine or expand something that is already on the code, rather than asking for any changes."

At the present time, the city allows apartments to place their rental signs up at specified locations for only 60 days, after which they must be taken down and not replaced for six months.

The apartment managers agreed that the present economic shortfall indicates the signs should be up for longer periods of time, in order to increase rentals.

Cedar Creek's Terry Font commented on a recent report that indicated Sanford presently had one of the lowest occupancies at apartment complexes. "We would like to have our occupancy at at least 90 percent where it normally is," she said, "but with the present low

economy, many of us are down to only 60 to 70 percent."

Another apartment manager reported, "Since we had to take our signs down in April, we have had 31 percent fewer drive-in inquiries about our rentals."

Among items discussed were the possibility of allowing larger signs. The present ordinance calls for a maximum of 16 square feet of apartment complex signs. Most of the signs have only the name of the apartments.

City Planner Jay Marder explained, "Of course you can put whatever you want on the sign, but it can't exceed that size."

Another approach advanced by Simmons was the possibility of having apartment rental signs allowed out over weekend periods. "The problem is," he said, "where do we have our limits, how much is enough and how much is too much?"

Simmons recommended the apartment complex managers or representatives submit either a consolidated or individual response to the matter, making suggestions on what they would like to have proposed.

"Keep in mind," he said, "these should have a time limit only in keeping with the present economic conditions." He suggested making a proposal to the City Commission for only a one year period.

Simmons also suggested the time period to be considered be only from the first of May through the end of September of the present year.

The city's building supervisor, Gary Winn commented, "This must deal strictly with residential multi-family apartment complexes and not be a change that will cause problems with commercial sign restrictions."

Older, not poorer

It turns out that 1991 didn't just seem different, it was different. For the first time since 1958, consumers reduced their debt last year, paying off more on cars, houses and credit cards than they borrowed. They broke a string of 33 consecutive years in which they went deeper into debt. Unlike other recent recessions, which were primarily driven by inflation, this is a debt-driven recession. It may not be "verging on a depression," as economist John Kenneth Galbraith has said, may not even be the worst California recession since World War II, as Kevin Scott, director of the Commission on State Finance, calls it. But with 7 percent national and 8 percent California unemployment, it's bad enough. In the 1982 recession, national unemployment went over 10 percent.

It's clear from the Federal Reserve Board's latest statistics how consumers are reacting to this recession. Unlike in the recessions of 1973-75 and 1981-82, they are cutting back debt. They owed \$728.4 billion on Dec. 31, 1 percent under the figure for a year earlier.

Since 1958, through good times and bad, consumers increased debt. As inflation increased, as it did after 1973, borrowing made some sense. The dollars you paid back were worth less than those you borrowed. It's the lender who lost.

Fueled by government policy in the 1980s, which loosened lending constraints, deregulated the savings and loan industry and stimulated spending with huge deficits, borrowing got out of hand. As Charles Bowsher, the government's comptroller general, said recently, "Interest on the national debt started eating us up."

It ate up consumers as well, as merchants found out at Christmas. People weren't buying new stuff because they're still paying off the old. What's more, with inflation down, they're paying off in real dollars.

The recession will end when the adjustment is made. The fall in consumer credit last year is a good sign. Households are correcting vulnerable positions.

Now if the federal government would just do the same.

Is my Coke worth \$88 million?

In India a few decades ago, I remember a scorching hot day when I had trudged through several villages in connection with my work.

At the fifth village, the white-bearded head of the village panchayat (ruling council) ushered me to a small canopied setting. We exchanged the gentle, hand-prayered "Namaste." Then, with a copious, snaggle-tooth grin, he said a few words of welcome in Hindi and handed me an invitingly (and surprisingly) cold bottle of Coca-Cola.

It was like dying and going to heaven. Everywhere I went in the world, I invariably encountered the ubiquitous Coke — a dust-choked back road in Egypt, the Gaza strip, a once elegant hotel in Beirut, a night club in Ghana (where I took second place in a high-life dancing contest), Liberia, Alex Haley's little village in Gambia, Tanzania and South Africa.

Like Mother's Day, baseball-game hot dogs and Fourth of July barbecues, Coca-Cola defines who and what we are. It is a synergy of our gestalt, our panache, our global pre-eminence.

But I will no longer drink it. I have no choice. I can no longer support an \$88 million habit.

That is the total salary and benefits (especially stock options) that Coca-Cola pays its chief executive officer, Paul Golzueta.

But, according to a superb Wall Street Journal supplement on executive pay, "A Little Pain and a Lot of Gain," Golzueta's total direct com-

penensation is only \$3.9 million. That is minuscule next to H.J. Heinz CEO Anthony J.F. O'Reilly's obscenely sybaritic \$74.7 million, U.S. Surgical CEO Leon C. Hirsch's \$22.5 million and National Medical CEO Richard K. Eamer's \$16.9 million (no wonder health-care costs have gotten out of hand).

The list is lugubriously endless.

How much is Golzueta worth? \$5 million? \$10 million? \$15 million? I don't know. As former Supreme Court Justice Potter

Stewart once said of pornography, "I can't define it, but I know it when I see it."

And \$88 million to run any corporation defines the pornography of greed.

Of course, economic greed built this country. "What's wrong with greed?" asked the Wall

Street broker played by Michael Douglas in "Wall Street." "Greed is good."

Greed has endowed this nation with a standard of living and an appreciation of the good life second to none. It also has landscaped our neighborhoods with the homeless, the unemployed, the poor and the racially exploited.

Still, I remain an unapologetic, gold-plated buy American, America First capitalist, trying to fulfill William Graham Sumner's advice: "If you live in a country that is run by a committee, make sure you're on the committee."

I've spent my life trying to be on the committee. And I can appreciate those who subscribe to a Veblen canon of conspicuous consumption: "When you've got it, flaunt it."

But I also know that there has to be some ethical limit to what any one person can earn and enjoy off the labors of others, especially in these economically uncertain times.

A USA Today survey of 243 deans of business schools found that more than 85 percent of them thought that neither Hirsch nor Golzueta nor O'Reilly were worth their pay.

But 73 percent oppose the economic futility of setting a cap on CEO pay. The paradox further thickens with 51 percent supporting the concept of CEOs making no more than 20 times the average worker's salary.

Watergate redux and Leona

WASHINGTON — As the 20th anniversary of Watergate approaches, a number of current and former congressional investigators who worked on the original investigation believe they have now solved the major remaining mysteries surrounding the burglary of the Democratic National Committee. For two decades investigators have puzzled over the "why" and "what" questions — why the break-in and exactly what were the burglars looking for?

Last year in the popular book "Silent Coup," authors Len Colodny and Robert Oetlin came out with a novel theory. The break-in, they alleged, was masterminded by then White House counsel John Dean. Dean, say the authors, was attempting to determine if the Democrats had any evidence that his wife Maureen might have once worked as a part-time call girl for a woman named Erika Rikan. Rikan — also known as Cathy Dieter — was running a high-class prostitution ring. Among its clients, said the authors, was the Democratic National Committee.

The Deans said the allegation was nonsense, and they have gone to court. Now a new book has been published giving another, much more plausible, reason for the break-in.

In his memoirs, Robert Maheu — longtime aide to reclusive billionaire Howard Hughes — says the break-in's purpose was to learn if the Democrats, and especially then DNC Chairman Larry O'Brien, had evidence that Hughes had illegally given Richard Nixon \$100,000.

Maheu says he passed along to the Nixon campaign two cash payments of \$50,000 that were never reported. Subsequently, Maheu acrimoniously broke with Hughes and fled a multimillion-dollar suit against him.

Maheu says Hughes believed he was a close friend of O'Brien. In reality, while the two had known each other for years, they were not close at all. Maheu says he subsequently learned from others close to Hughes that the billionaire became convinced Maheu had told O'Brien about the payments, and that O'Brien was waiting for a strategic time to break the story.

Maheu says Hughes made his suspicions known to people high up on Nixon's staff. He believes they sent in the burglars to bug O'Brien's office. Maheu says he is sure of this because the leader of the burglars, E. Howard Hunt, worked for a Washington, D.C., public relations firm that represented Hughes.

There are a few smiles around the Justice Department these days over the fate of New York hotel queen Leona Helmsley, 71, who has begun serving at least one-third of a four-year prison term for income tax evasion. As an elderly first-time offender, Mrs.

Helmsley should be serving her sentence in one of the federal prison system's minimum-security facilities — one of the so-called "Club Feds." Instead she has reported to the Federal Medical Center in Lexington, Ky., an aging and overcrowded medium-security facility that is actually one of the tougher federal lockups in the country for women.

Why is Leona, now known as inmate No. 15113-054, being made to do hard time? Because — and this is the cause of the smiles — her high-profile appeals lawyer, Alan Derahowitz, effectively argued her into Lexington.

As a Federal Bureau of Prisons official put it: "Derahowitz left us no choice. He argued vigorously, and supplied all sorts of supporting data, that Mrs. Helmsley is not a well woman and requires constant medical attention. Lexington is our only facility that has a women's hospital attached. Given the vehemence of Derahowitz's arguments, the judge had to order she be placed in a medical environment, and the only one we have is Lexington."

The betting around Justice is that Mrs. Helmsley will shortly change appeals attorneys, and that her health will undergo a turn for the better. It is assumed that she will petition the court and the Bureau of Prisons to change prisons, probably asking to be sent to the minimum-security facility in Danbury, Conn.

I reported previously on the Census Bureau's attempt to fire a young demographer, Beth Osborne Deponte, for estimating the number of Iraqis killed during the Gulf War and its aftermath, and then giving that estimate — 86,194 men, 39,612 women and 32,195 children — to a reporter who called for the information.

Now the Census Bureau has reconsidered. After several members of Congress, the American Statistical Union, the ACLU and a major Washington law firm all came to her aid — and her story appeared in newspapers and on television around the world — her bosses have decided to let her keep her job.

Pork becomes hot entree in Congress

WASHINGTON — Pork has become the main delicacy of political connoisseurs in Washington. It is not a side dish, but the main course — served up on sterling platters with parsley by politicians trolling for votes and contributions.

The 1992 federal budget is layered with as much as \$97 billion of pork. In each congressional district, the tax money of the many has been spent on the needs of a few to satisfy the re-election lust of one.

Brian Kelly, author of "Adventures in Porkland" (Villard Books), which will be published later this year, quotes one former congressman who explains pork this way: "Pork is money that a congressman or senator tries to get for his own district, but wouldn't dream of trying to get for anyone else's."

Or, as one Maryland professor defines it: "Pork is spending with a zip code attached to it."

Last month President Bush sent Congress a list of 68 wasteful pork-barrel projects that are costing taxpayers \$3.8 billion. In the coming weeks, Washington is expected to erupt in a huge food fight over pork-barrel programs — pitting project against project, politician against politician.

Estimates by private economists show that for every \$2 billion in waste and pork that is trimmed from the budget, \$2,000 in tax relief would result for every family in Albuquerque, Buffalo, Des Moines, Indianapolis, Omaha, Peoria, Portland and San Antonio.

Congress is now embroiled over such weighty questions as funding celery and asparagus research, low-bush blueberries, the \$200,000 Vidalia onion project, the \$100,000 mechanical tomato harvester and the \$100,000 blackbird preservation project. And, in the supreme irony, \$100,000 for swine disease research.

Then there is the \$50,000 for a grape entomologist, \$100,000 for seafood promotion, \$200,000 for the world soccer games and even \$500,000 for the Syracuse Symphony.

At a time when the national debt is \$4 trillion and interest payments on it are the fastest-growing expenditure of the federal budget — faster than education, faster than health care, faster than construction for new roads and bridges — frivolous spending adding up to billions remains one of Washington's perennial scandals.

A pork-barrel project that has turned into a metaphor for the whole mess is the "Lawrence Welk Museum," which was recently shelved after touching off a firestorm.

"And ah-one, and ah-two, and ah-five hundred thousand dollars!" shouted Sylvio Conte, the late congressman from Massachusetts who delighted in deriding his colleagues for slipping strange spending items into many bills that became the law of the land. He was tweaking those responsible for a \$500,000 grant to make a memorial out of Lawrence Welk's boyhood farm in Strasburg, N.D.

"What will they do for an encore?" Conte mocked his colleagues. "Earmark funds to renovate Guy Lombardo's speedboat? Or restore Artie Shaw's wedding tuxedo?"

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., the prince of pork, promised his constituents several years ago he would steer more than \$1 billion in projects as appropriations chairman, and has more than delivered. Byrd nearly pulled off the ultimate pork coup by forcing the CIA to relocate chunks of its operations to West Virginia.

To be sure, the pork buffet in Washington contains endless entrees that are difficult to keep track of.

Political admakers

They are a growing campaign influence

WASHINGTON — Media consultants. In the 1990s, politicians dare not hit the campaign trail without them.

Political admakers are everywhere. From the White House right on down to the mayoral and city council level, candidates are paying for the admakers' advice.

Once treated by the campaigns as mere producers, media consultants today sit at the candidates' roundtable of decision making. They can earn hundreds of thousands of dollars — sometimes millions — in a single campaign.

They've moved away from their commercial counterparts on Madison Avenue to become political specialists with their own power center — Washington.

There's enough business to keep 200 political media consultants working full time, up from about 30 in 1989.

The big name consultants — Roger Ailes, Bob Squiter, Frank Greer and Bob Shrum — have become as synonymous with politics as candidates themselves.

"In many ways they've become the gods of the election wars," said Larry Sabato, a University of Virginia political science professor.

Sabato attributes the media consultants' rise to two things: the growing dominance of television and the increasing specialization and complexity of campaigning.

"It's evolved because selling a product is far different from selling a human being," Sabato said. "These media consultants have done literally hundreds of campaigns in their careers. Elected officials, if they're lucky, may have been through 10

elections." The consultants now do much more than just make TV ads. Some like Greer, who is leading Democrat Bill Clinton's media team, are well-known for calling news media to point out opponents' inaccurate ads and gaffes in hopes of generating stories.

The consultants also coordinate the timing of the ads, arrange staged events that will garner free exposure, anticipate opponent's responses, write stump speeches and coach candidates during debates or television appearances.

"It's most important that a candidate's paid and free media strategies are uniform, that you're saying the same thing on your commercial that you're saying on the stump. That's where we come in," said David Axelrod, a veteran Democratic admaker also working for Clinton.

Ever since politics began there has been a need for the image-making power of advertising. War hero William Henry Harrison mastered it as far back as 1840 with his "Log Cabin Campaign."

Advertising has since become increasingly sophisticated and — with the rise of television coverage of presidential campaigns around 1980 — more dominant as well. Some of the images have even outlasted the campaigns.

In 1988, Ailes created the "revolving door" of furloughed Massachusetts criminals to help

President Bush portray Democrat Michael Dukakis as soft on crime. He followed that with pictures of the polluted Boston harbor and Dukakis riding awkwardly in an Army tank — images from which Dukakis never recovered.

The increasing significance of the admakers is illustrated in simple numbers.

Herb Alexander, a University of Southern California political science professor, calculated that Bush spent \$31.5 million on advertising in the 1988 general election — about 68 percent of his total budget — while Dukakis spent \$23.5 million, or about half his total.

Alexander said the industry standard for admakers is to receive compensation for all production costs plus a commission of between 10 percent and 15 percent of the total purchased media time — meaning 1988's presidential admakers easily earned in the millions of dollars.

Advertisers also have risen in stature within the campaigns.

Ailes, whose campaign work dates back to Richard Nixon, said by 1988 media consultants had moved from the role of outsiders to a "seat at the table."

"It all fell under the heading of message but it really came down to deciding who is our audience, what is our vehicle, what is the response we'd like to have and how are we going to handle the opponents' message."

Former bank president, 'Gib' Edmonds dead at 59

KING VERDICT AFTERMATH Trouble flares in Tampa

TAMPA — Five vacant homes were set ablaze and a police officer shot at as bottle-throwing youths roamed through a neighborhood in a "ripple effect" from the Rodney King verdict in Los Angeles, authorities said.

Two reporters suffered minor injuries in the scattered incidents late Thursday that police say peaked with about 100 to 200 youths in the streets. Three people were taken into police custody.

"This is the calmest riot I have ever seen," said Bob Gilder, former president of the Tampa NAACP, who blamed the media's presence for inflaming tensions. "The King decisions were wrong but to throw rocks and bottles at people is also wrong."

Police continued to patrol the predominantly black College Hill area in east Tampa as the incidents that began about 9 p.m. slackened.

"We're deploying our police officers to make sure we don't have any more groups assembling and starting more trouble," Tampa Deputy Police

Chief Curtis Lane said late Thursday. "Right now, it's calm out there and we're here for preventive purposes."

Lane said a car had been burned as well as some furniture near a street. Police also had a report of minor damage to a fire truck.

Michael Tyrone Leggett, 18, and two others were detained by police after two shots were fired at an officer on foot patrol, police said. Only one who wasn't identified remained in custody with charges pending.

Leggett denied shooting at police and told The Tampa Tribune that people took to the streets and committed violence because, "if they don't do it now, white people are going to keep doing it."

He was referring to violence that has broken out in Los Angeles, Atlanta and elsewhere in the country following the acquittal of four white officers in the King police brutality case.

"We were hoping there wouldn't be the ripple effect here to Tampa but certainly we were prepared for it," said police spokesman Steve Cole. "Obviously, this is nothing like Los Angeles. This is nothing like even Atlanta."

Black residents save white victim

LOS ANGELES — Mob cruelty nearly killed Reginald Oliver Denny, but the kindness of strangers saved his life.

T.J. Murphy watched TV reports of the white truck driver pulled out of his cab and beaten by black mob. He told his roommate: "Somebody's got to get that guy out of there."

So Murphy and Tee Barnett, both of them black, sped toward the South Central Los Angeles intersection where a bleeding and incoherent Denny had managed to crawl into the cab of his truck.

"It was just like Rodney King. They beat, beat and beat him," Murphy said of Wednesday's attack, referring to the black motorist who was beaten last year by four white policemen. The officers' acquittal on assault charges in the case triggered uprisings in Los Angeles and other U.S. cities.

Murphy, a 30-year-old unemployed engineer, said he and his roommate climbed into the truck with Denny, 36. Then a young black woman jumped on the side of the truck, he said, and shouted steering instructions to Denny, who began to drive with his eyes swollen shut.

As the gravel truck began to move, another young black man jumped in the driver's seat and drove. The woman climbed in-

side, cradling and comforting the injured man.

"You're going make it," she kept telling Denny as she held him up. "You're going to be OK."

Barnett drove in front of the truck, putting on her hazard lights to help clear traffic.

Finally, the rig screeched into the driveway at Daniel Freeman Memorial Hospital, and Denny began to have convulsions.

Hospital officials said Denny was in stable but critical condition early today.

"He's responding to some simple commands like 'Blink,' 'Nod your head.' He's still on life support," said administrator Peter Bastone.

Don Kelley, 28, was grateful to the four black strangers who rescued his roommate.

"Those people didn't even know him and risked their lives to aid him," Kelley said. "If no one had helped him, he would be dead."

Denny's boss said he'd been sent on a job that took him through "the predominantly black neighborhood just as the verdicts were announced."

"He's John Q. Public," said Charles May, his boss at Transit Mixed Concrete, which has established a trust fund for Denny. "It was unfortunate that he was at the wrong place at the wrong time."

Bush lets cities privatize assets to raise cash

WASHINGTON — President Bush is opening the door for financially strapped cities and states to convert their most valuable concrete assets to private ownership in exchange for much-needed cash.

Bush said private ownership could "serve the public more fairly and more efficiently."

Representatives of cities welcomed the change, but said it must be examined closely.

And a spokesman for the Transportation Department said no official was prepared to discuss the change — which could result in the sale of highways, bridges or even airports — because the subject was "too new."

The executive order Bush signed Thursday directs the federal agencies that helped pay for building local roads, bridges, airports, sewage treatment plants, parking garages and other facilities to reverse previous policies that called for a return of the entire federal investment.

The new policy would permit states and cities to keep a much larger slice of the proceeds of any sale.

"The fundamental reason for it is because every level of government is broke," said Robert Poole, whose Los Angeles-based Reason Foundation has been a champion of the idea for 15 years.

"This is a way for state and local governments to liberate large amounts of capital that they have tied up in physical assets and use that money for other pressing needs," Poole said.

The Reason Foundation estimates that assets in the hands of state and local governments could bring in \$226.8

billion on the open market.

Poole said that until now, the barrier to selling those assets was the federal government's insistence in receiving a pro rata share of its original investment.

"It would have been too big a barrier to jump over financially," Poole said in an interview. "By removing that barrier you give privatization the green light."

A number of privatization projects are either being considered or actually under way.

California has granted franchises to private developers to build four toll roads in the state.

Poole said a decision may be near on selling Los Angeles International Airport to private investors.

Massachusetts Gov. William Weld has expressed interest in selling the Massachusetts Turnpike, and New York Gov. Mario Cuomo is exploring the possibility of seeking buyers for LaGuardia and Kennedy airports.

Poole said Maryland Gov. Donald Schaefer has expressed interest in finding a private buyer for the Baltimore-Washington International Airport.

But a representative of cities that might benefit from Bush's new policy expressed a degree of caution Thursday.

"We wouldn't want anyone to say we had to do it," said Doug Peterson, a policy analyst for the National League of Cities. "But things that would give our cities more options would be welcome."

"You also want to be assured that you will continue to have the quality of service that you need," Peterson said. "You want assurances that an airport, for instance, continues to provide the services its passengers need."

"You've got to look at it closely," he said. "A lot of these things are public sector for a reason. And the reason was that the private sector wasn't interested in doing them."

Peterson said the privatization concept will produce not just immediate cash but long term revenue from federal and state taxes and local property taxes.

The Price Waterhouse accounting firm estimates that over a 40-year franchise period the Dulles Toll road near Washington will pay \$2 in taxes for every dollar received from the public investment, he said.

The surface transportation authorization bill Bush signed into law earlier this year also moved toward opening public works to private investment.

It permits tolls to a far greater degree than in the past for road, bridge and tunnel projects receiving federal aid.

"For the first time private entities may own the toll facilities," the Transportation Department said in summarizing the bill. "A state may loan the federal share of a project's cost to another public or a private agency constructing the project."

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Gorbachev's prescription for America

MOSCOW — Mikhail S. Gorbachev says America was too slow in offering help to the former Soviet republics and too quick in trying to impose its will on the world.

In an interview with The Associated Press, the former Soviet president also warned that Russian "reactionaries" might seize power unless Boris Yeltsin slows the pace of reform. Gorbachev, appearing rested, relaxed and energetic, spoke Thursday, two days before a planned two-week U.S. visit.

The 61-year-old former president, driven from the Kremlin last December as the Soviet Union was replaced by the Commonwealth of Independent States, said he had no plans to return to politics. But he saw his "duty in supporting reforms as an individual."

He criticized himself and presidents Bush and Yeltsin. He said Yeltsin was moving too fast on reforms, that he himself had moved too slowly, and that Bush hadn't offered help quickly enough.

Gorbachev refrained from criticizing Bush by name, but said Washington "has to be reproached."

He said billions of dollars were spent on the Gulf War, but money was harder to find "to support democratic changes which will create a new world for 100, 200 years ahead... It is narrow-minded thinking, and I cannot understand it."

Looking back on the collapse of the Soviet Union during his own seven-year tenure in the Kremlin, Gorbachev said he should have not have hesitated in curbing ethnic tensions and legalizing private ownership.

"We all are always smarter when we look back on our life," said Gorbachev, appearing reflective but by no means regretful or defeated. His brown eyes twinkled during the 50-minute conversation, and he gestured with his arms and eyeglasses to underscore his advice to world leaders.

He met with AP reporters around a rectangular wooden table in an office at the think tank he founded after quitting as Soviet president. The walls were bare and the room had no memorabilia from his time in the Kremlin or world travels.

Gorbachev rejected "the proposal that America should become the policeman, teacher, or prosecutor or instructor" to the world. "America will stand to lose by that."

Some Americans think their country "should again try to lead the world in this murky time. I think this claim has an aroma of unrealism about it, of utopia."

State titles on horizon

Lyman's Bresnick leads state track meet qualifiers

WINTER PARK — Seminole County may not be sending many athletes to next Saturday's Class 4A state track meet, but those who will represent the county next weekend should do so in fine style.

Heading the group will Lyman High School's Ktana Bresnick, who won the girls' 1,600-meter run (5:11.3) and 3,200-meter run (11:25.3) at Thursday's 4A-Region III meet at Showalter Field to lead the Greyhounds to a second-place finish behind Palm Beach Lakes, 61-39.

The Oviedo girls placed ninth (17). Lake Mary came in 11th (13), Lake Howell was 12th (12) and Lake Brantley tied Melbourne for 18th (3 1/2).

Lake Brantley was the highest-finishing Seminole County boys' team, scoring 23 points to take seventh. Vero Beach edged Oak

Ridge 47-43 for the boys' title. Lake Howell's boys, the District 9 champions last week, were 10th (15), Lake Mary took 13th (11 1/2), Lyman came in 16th (7 1/2) and Oviedo tied Melbourne for 19th (4).

Kelly Kobia of Lake Howell and Lake Brantley's Anthony Washington also were double qualifiers. Kobia won the girls' discus throw (138 feet, 5 inches) and finished third in the shot put while Washington was the regional champion in high jump (clearing 6 feet, 6 inches) and took second in the triple jump.

Lake Mary's Shannon Cook was nearly a triple qualifier. Cook, who won the shot put (40 feet, 1 1/2 inches), just missed advancing in the long jump and discus.

Other local regional champions were Lyman's Rita Greenberg in the 800-meter run (2:20.1), the Lyman girls' 4 x 400-meter relay (4:05.3), Lake Howell pole vaulter Matt Bowman (13 feet, 9 inches) and

Law protects medically insured

If you're buying additional health insurance to supplement Medicare, commonly called "Medigap" insurance, a new law now protects you from paying for coverage that duplicates your other health insurance. As of Nov. 5, 1991, it is illegal for an insurance company or agent to sell you a health insurance policy that provides any of the coverage you get from Medicare, Medicaid or any private health insurance you have — even if the new policy would pay benefits without regard to the other coverage.

The sale of more than one Medigap policy to a beneficiary comes under special scrutiny. If you want to replace an existing policy you'll have to sign a

statement declaring you'll drop the old policy when the new one is in place. You'll have 30 days to review the new policy and decide if you want to keep it.

For Medicare beneficiaries age 65 or older, the law provides a one-time, six-month period during which you can select a Medigap policy and be assured

that you won't be turned down for health reasons. The six-month period always begins the first month in which the beneficiary, age 65 or older, enrolls in Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance).

During the open enrollment period, a Medigap insurer may not deny you a policy or place conditions on the issuance or effectiveness of a policy based on your health status, past claims experience, or medical condition. If you are in poor health, an insurer may not discriminate against you by charging you a higher premium than it charges anyone else enrolling during this period.

A 1992 Guide to Health Insurance for People with Medicare,

describing Medigap coverage and policies, has been published by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA). It is available at local Social Security offices.

Complaints about the marketing practices of companies providing Medigap insurance can be reported to a free hotline: 1-800-638-6833.

DEAR E.S.: It is vital that you contact the woman immediately so that she, too, can be tested for the HIV virus. If she tests positive, it is almost certain that she will want and need to be under the care of a physician — and it is definite that she should have counseling to deal with the trauma of such a diagnosis, as well as information on how AIDS is and is not spread to others.

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How to tell when kids are with wrong crowd

DEAR MARY: My daughter is 14 years old and finishing 9th grade. I have noticed that she has changed her group of friends this year, although her middle school buddies are all at the same high school she's at. I really don't know these new friends; she never brings them around, but I have the feeling they are not the kind of kids I want her to be with. I've mentioned this to her, but she says that they're just fine and I'm just being paranoid.

To tell the truth, she may be right, but I'm real concerned. How can I tell if she's starting to run around with the "wrong" kids?

POSSIBLY PARANOID
DEAR POSSIBLY PARANOID: At this point, you really can't tell whether you have a problem because you don't know these new friends.

So, your first obligation to your daughter is to get to know these people. Talk to your daughter about it. If she is extremely resistant, I would consider this a warning signal. Let her know that you must know the people she is with and where she is at all times. You may even want to call her friends' parents and introduce yourself.

Rest assured that your daughter will probably say she doesn't want you to do any of these things. However, I feel strongly that our responsibility as parents is to help our kids make decisions in high-risk areas.

Your daughter's friends will be much more important in shaping her behavior and attitudes during the next few years than any other factor, including you. If her friends do not have high morals and values, they will drag her down to their level; she will not raise their standards to meet yours.

Bad company brings good kids down, never the reverse. As Charles Swindoll, noted psychologist and author has said, "When a white glove is placed in mud, the mud DOES NOT get 'glovey.'"

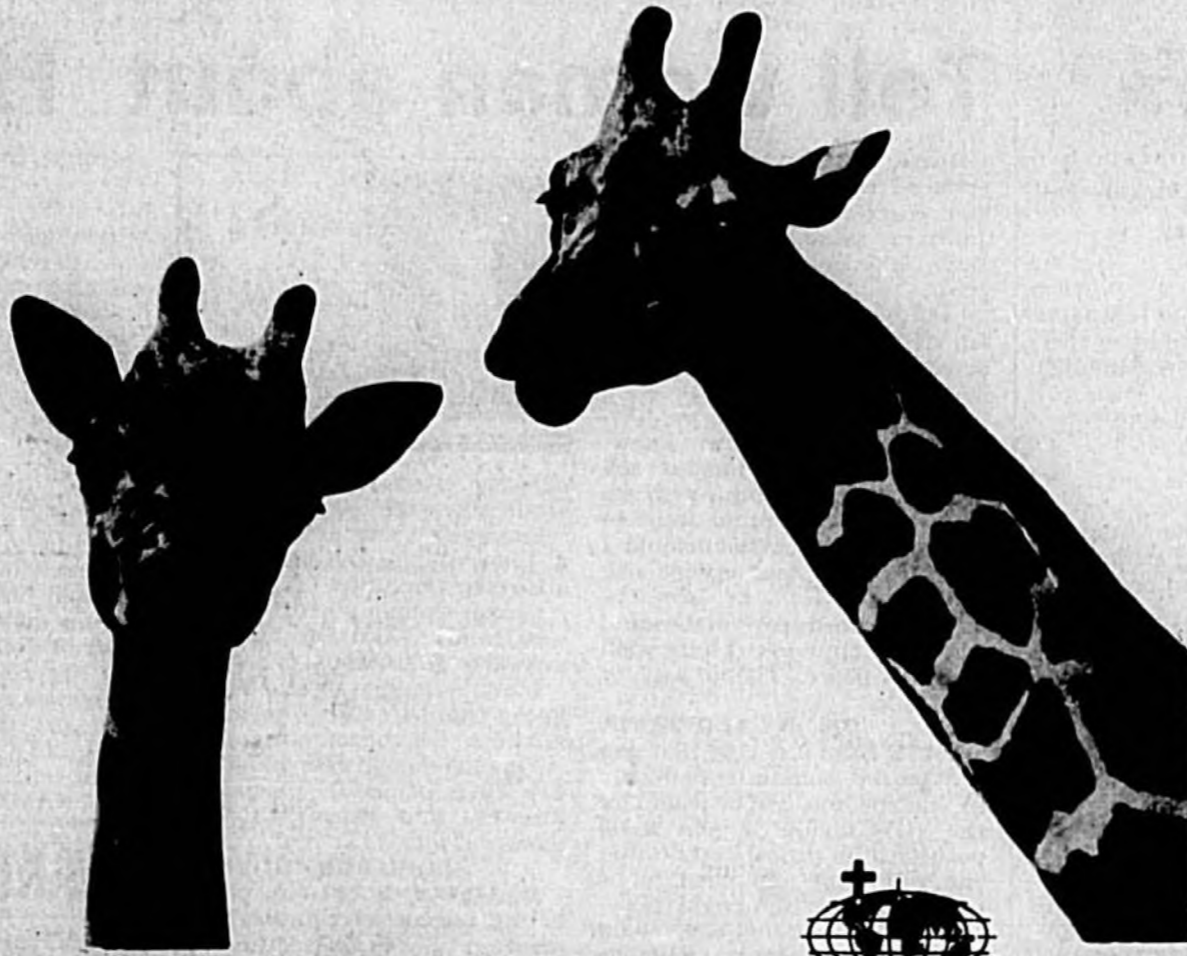

At the close of the conference, Wallace B. Smith, president of the church, encouraged attendees to be informed by their past and challenged by the present, as they "Go with Christ."

During the week the legislative assembly passed several resolutions, to include:

The legislative assembly was comprised of 2,800 delegates representing over 245,000 international members.

- Acknowledge this country's dependence upon God.
- Give thanks for the many blessings the country has received.
- Ask God to guide our leaders, and to bring healing, reconciliation, and wholeness to our nation and its people.
- Pray for the restoration of marriage and family commitments.
- Seek God's guidance for the country's governmental leaders.
- Intercede for healing and reconciliation within America by prayer.

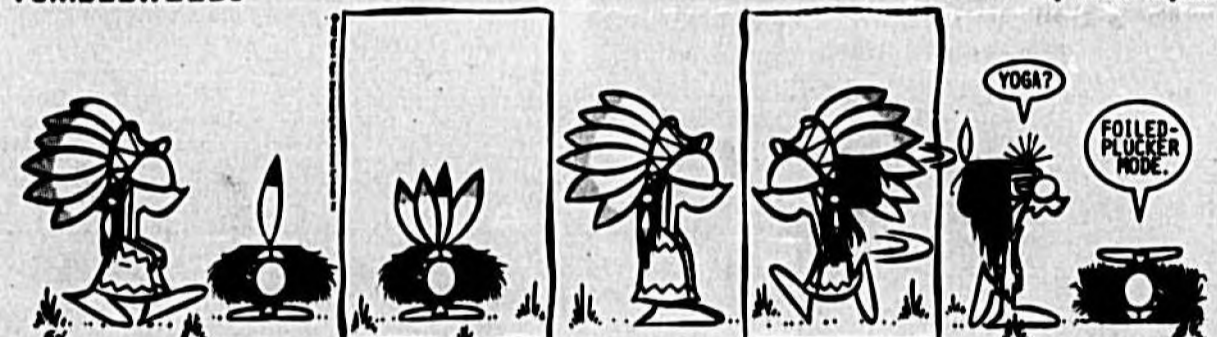

Drug therapy will treat bowel disease

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from chronic diarrhea and have gone through tests consisting of sigmoidoscopy and colonoscopy with biopsy. I was diagnosed with granulomatous colitis from results of the tests and a stool specimen. My gastroenterologist indicates the disease is rare, and he has relatively no information on it. Can you enlighten me?

DEAR READER: Granulomatous colitis is a form of Crohn's disease, a chronic inflammatory disease of the bowel. Ordinarily, Crohn's disease affects the last portion of the small intestine. Frequently, the first part of the large bowel is affected, too. In less than 20 percent of cases, only the large bowel is affected; this is called "granulomatous colitis." Regardless of the location of Crohn's disease, symptoms are the same: abdominal pain, fever, weight loss and diarrhea. The disorder is also associated with arthritis, eye and mouth inflammation, and severe skin reactions, leading many experts to believe that it is an autoimmune disease. Crohn's disease is usually diagnosed by special X-rays of the intestine (barium enema and/or small bowel series). However, since granulomatous colitis can mimic other inflammatory bowel disorders, such as ulcerative colitis, colonoscopy and biopsy may be required, as they were in your case.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from a hiatal hernia, minor mitral valve prolapse and low blood pressure. I often feel as if my face, hands, arms and legs have a drawing feeling. I have fluttering in the center of my chest and suffer joint pain. Could this all stem from stress?

DEAR READER: Low blood pressure is difficult to define. Whether your blood pressure is too low depends on your age, level of activity, general health and whether you are taking medicine. Young, healthy individuals often have very low

blood pressure (around 90/60); this is normal. On the other hand, a BP of 100/70 would be much too low for an elderly patient who is taking anti-hypertension medicine. In general, blood pressure variations would not cause the symptoms you describe. Could your problems be due to
