THOUSANDS IN CHICAGO GREET SMITH ON TOUR

Democratic Candidate Turns Smile On Big Throngs Which Jam Streets In Vicinity

Great Ovation Is Given Governor

Practical Politicians In Windy City Differ On Ballot Prediction

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—(INS)—Governor Alfred E. Smith today turned the full-grown smile, the grin that brought him the title of "the happy warrior," to 250,000 Chicagoans who lined the curbs and jammed street intersections where his automobile stopped for brief moments during his two-hour tour of the city.

That smile took Chicago by storm. A constant throng of thousands of people lined the curbs through the boulevard to Evanston along the route of the Governor's motorcade.

Officially that triumphal march was an inspection tour by the Democratic presidential nominee but reduced to practical politics it was the challenge of the Democratic ticket to the Republican ticket of Illinois to the Governor Smith directly to the voters for their approval.

It was an great ovation all through the downtown loop section. Men cheered and women screamed.

From the start of the process Governor Smith ate his usual hearty breakfast, but varied the usual fried eggs for scrambled eggs and increased the brandy to four eggs.

Practical politicians of the two opposing parties here in Chicago are as far apart as the poles regarding the outcome of the presidential election in Illinois.

Each Democratic leader at Tour Dismal—reference to the late George Brannon, an Democratic national committeeman from Illinois and state chairman as well as told Governor Smith that he will come upstate to the Cook County law on even terms with Herbert Hoover and that he will carry Cook County by between 100,000 and 200,000. This would give him the state by a wide margin.

While Democratic leaders have been pouring news like this into Governor Smith's attentive ear, former representatives James W. Good of Iowa, Hoover manager of the Western headquarters, with equal confidence asserts that Illinois will return a normal Republican majority for Hoover, which he estimates at not less than 500,000. Coolidge's majority over Davis four years ago was 378,000.

Apparently there was no reconciliation of these widely conflicting claims today. The Democratic leaders who surround Governor Smith on his three-day visit to the state are confident. The Republican leaders who are dismissed a half dozen blocks away are no less optimistic. Some of the practical politicians in both parties are going to wake up on the morning after election with a headache.

BUYING DEMANDS SWAMP BUSINESS IN DAY'S TRADING

Mechanical Equipment Of Market Falls Behind In Heavy Rush

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Impelled by an enormous country-wide buying wave, which again engulfed the stock market and tied up the mechanical equipment of the big banks, the "selected" industrial stocks and specialties forged ahead to a higher level of prices in billions trading today. Buying demand was far beyond the facilities of the market that the regular channels of communication with the board were blocked to the floor. The "licker" fell behind in the market, and many orders were cancelled because of the inability of the outside world to find out what was going on around the posts where the speculative leaders were traded in.

The dizzy pace of the market has been a matter of growing concern on the part of the conservative commission houses here, many of which have urged heaps of caution on their customers, particularly in their attitude toward the fast moving high-priced specialties. When confusion was at its height, shortly after midday, their brokerage houses and their customers liquidated thousands of shares of stock, the effect of which was to cause a halt in the speculative forward advance of prices. But for the most part these offerings were so well absorbed that the bullish leaders had plenty of confidence for their activities in their sections of the list.

Montgomery Ward, International Nickel and other high-flyers of the past week lost no time in resuming their new advance, under a sensational turnover. Montgomery Ward sold at 350 up an additional 19 points, and nickel carried its new gains to above 174, a new 19-point jump in American Smelting, at the head of the copper stocks, brought that stock up to 268, 59 points from the low of the year.

COOLIDGE WILL GREET GERMAN AIRSHIP FLIERS

Eckener And Officers Of Graf Zeppelin Arrive In Washington For Big Celebration

Will Make Trip To Arlington Grave

Wreath To Be Put On Tomb Of Unknown Soldier By Visitors

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—(INS)—The Graf Zeppelin and its crew arrived in Washington today to greet President Coolidge and high government officials the honor and dignity of a national day. They arrived from Philadelphia by train, quite in contrast to the flying visit last Monday when aboard the monster liner of the air they sailed majestically into the national capital out of a murky sky.

The airship was greeted through a misty sky as they rode in the automobile procession to the Carlton hotel, where they remained a short time before going to the White House for breakfast at eight o'clock with President Coolidge.

A busy day was arranged for the visitors. It included a trip to Arlington to place a wreath on the tomb of the unknown soldier, airplane and auto sightseeing trips, luncheon by the three air secretaries, a tea and reception by Dr. Kiep, and a dinner and a reception tonight.

For tomorrow a luncheon at the National Press Club and a dinner by Harry Wardman, Washington builder, were on schedule. Dr. Eckener will leave at 3:30 o'clock tomorrow for Akron, Ohio, to confer with officials of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, American manufacturers of dirigibles. On Monday he will return to Chicago, returning that night to Lakehurst.

On Wednesday night, the Graf Zeppelin will moor at Scott Field, Belleville, Illinois, and return Thursday to Lakehurst.

On the trip west, Dr. Eckener announced the zeppelin would fly over Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago and St. Louis.

YOUTHFUL SLAYER GOES TO DEATH BUOYED UP BY RELIGIOUS FERVOR RECENTLY ACQUIRED

Trap Is Sprung At 10:16 In Morning

Victim Chants Litany As Executioner Gets Apparatus Prepared

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Cal., Oct. 19.—(INS)—Grimly, cool to the threshold of execution, William Edward Hickman, 21, of Kansas City, Mo., dropped through the gallows to his death this morning for the kidnaping and murder of 12-year-old Marian Parkes, of Los Angeles.

Trapped after he had entered the death chamber the noise had been adjusted and the trap was sprung.

Buoied up by religious fervor, Hickman walked with firm tread in the fatal 13 steps of the high-grooved scaffold. He studiously avoided the gaze of the 300 or more persons gathered below to see his punishment for a crime which checked the civilized world. He looked over and above the heads of the crowd; his neck drawn back as he stared upward. He appeared to the crowd that he was about to collapse, but this was only his legs crumbling under him as the trap dropped with a thud which brought exclamation from the closely grouped spectators.

The fatal paroxysm entered the chamber a few seconds before 10:16 o'clock. James B. Holohan, tall, stocky, shaggy, stern-faced man was in the lead.

He was followed by Father William A. Fleming, pastor of the Church of San Rafael, who has been spiritual adviser to Hickman. The priest, a significant figure in his black cassock, was repeating the litany begun as Hickman stepped out of the death cell when Father Fleming commenced speaking the words: "Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy."

In a weak voice, Hickman responded: "Christ, have mercy."

With rapid steps the group, two abreast, descended Hickman and the official executioner, Robert-Hopwood, in front, walked through the two wooden doors leading from the death cell to the execution chamber. All the while Father Fleming continued the litany with Hickman, making "half" audible responses.

Hickman, prepared for his death to the scratch strains of a phonograph playing "The Blues."

As he walked around his flower-decked gurney, the "die" dropped in emotion over his appearance. (Continued on page three)

and Turkey required passports. "In all applications," the department continues, "for passports, as well as in the original registration at the consulate, Mr. Hoover established the United States as his permanent residence."

In every application, he signed the usual form, that he intended to return to the United States with the purpose of residing and performing the duties of citizenship. There never has been the slightest question of Mr. Hoover's American citizenship.

It is no secret at Republican headquarters that Hoover has taken this attack on his citizenship closer to heart than any criticism of his public career. Consequently when his political opponents unjustly attacked him on this score he regarded it as a "gratuitous" insult. He has wanted to silence these attacks for a long time, but his political advisers urged against it.

The action of the State Department brought the whole matter to public print and Hoover expressed his opinion on the whippers that he had tried to vote in a British election. Now both Hoover and his advisers believed the whippers have been taken out of the campaign.

Dr. Hubert Work, Republican national chairman, subsequently issued a statement denying rumors that Hoover once had voted in a British election. Work said Hoover had been subjected to whispers that he had once applied for British citizenship. Work denounced this charge as false and declared he had a certificate from British authorities, certifying that no application of this character or a similar character was ever considered or presented.

The collection includes many species of marine invertebrates such as corals, sponges, trilobites, brachiopods, cephalopods, gastropods and other creatures which lived in the sea 100,000,000 years ago. The nature of this life indicates that in those

early days the Arctic region probably had a tropical climate, said Roy. Last winter, when the expedition went into its winter quarters near Nam, Labrador, where a scientific station has been established, Roy took the ship to Newfoundland, where he made collections of fossils of marine invertebrates of that country, mostly

trilobites, or pre-historic crab-like animals, of the Cambrian age, more than 500,000,000 years ago. Modern trilobites, and also the insects of the present day, are believed to be distant cousins of these trilobites.
