Attorneys were to present their opening arguments after luncheon. It was expected the state would call its first witness this afternoon.

None of the seven Panther members who survived the raid testified at the inquest which ended Wednesday.

### Dream Being 'Soured'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The men who made Col. Sanders' finger-licking Kentucky fried chicken famous says unscrupulous businessmen are soured the American dream of self-employment.

"The dream of being his own boss makes a man easy prey to hotshot promoters," John Y. Brown Jr. testified Tuesday before a Senate small business subcommittee looking into the \$90 billion-a-year franchising business.

Franchising today accounts for about 10 per cent of the nation's total goods and services. To 600,000 business places range from franchised restaurants to motels, from soft drink machines to animal hospitals.

The investor puts up time and money in exchange for training, a nationally known brand name business and a contract under which he must buy his supplies from the franchiser, sometimes, according to testimony, at inflated prices.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — The FBI kept secret today details behind the arrests of three men held in connection with the gunshot slayings of Joseph V. Blonski, United Mine Workers insurgent, and his wife and daughter.

In Washington, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover would only say that the three all from the Cleveland area, were charged with violating federal laws in connection with the deaths.

### Senators Seen Uniting On Crime Control Bill

 WASHINGTON (AP) — The election-year struggle over responsibility for securing crime rates gave way to a bipartisan spirit in the opening of Senate debate on an expanded crime control bill.

The measure is designed to equip the government with new legal weapons to dry up underworld gambling profits, prevent the corruption of local officials, and root out gangster infiltration of legitimate business and labor unions.

The measure, put together by a Senate Judiciary subcommittee headed by Sen. John L. McClellan, D-R.I., represents an amalgam of bills introduced by members of both parties, plus the recommendations of President Nixon and Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell.

McClellan told the Senate as the debate got underway Wednesday that the bill represented "one of the most thoroughly gratifying bipartisan efforts in which I have participated since coming to the Senate."

He expressed hope for unanimous passage, saying such support would tell the underworld the Senate intends to use all its constitutional powers to eradicate organized crime.

Less than half a dozen senators were on "bad" lists of the opening debate even though crime has been tagged a top election issue.

The measure would make Hayden, Stone Inc. see the market likely to remain on the defensive until the background news changes significantly.
