RAIN MERGER INTERESTS END STOCK SELLING

Corporation Formed Year Ago Goes To Wall As Obligations Begin To Come Due

Wsyndicate May Acquire Holdings

Producer Control Was Aim Merger Which Is 4 Million In Hole

CHICAGO, July 7.—Officers of the Grain Marketing Company, the \$26,000,000 corporation launched a year ago to facilitate the merger of four large mid-western grain firms in a project designed eventually to come under producer control announced Monday the stock selling campaign among farmers had been definitely abandoned.

John W. Coverdale, secretary-treasurer of the company, said the promotion work of the holding organization had not been pushed as vigorously as originally planned for the last thirty days, and that the firm must find other means of meeting \$4,000,000 in obligations falling due July 28.

Officers and directors of the company assembled early Monday for a special meeting to consider the future course of the enterprise. An advance of \$4,000,000 for operating expenses made by the meeting firms must be repaid July 28, and the original contract terms. Officers of the company now are working on other plans to meet the obligations.

A few hours before the directors assembled for their meeting one officer said one tentative proposition to enable the firm to meet its obligations was to effect the taking over of the enterprise by a syndicate of grain men and bankers who would inaugurate a stock selling campaign to farmers on a new basis.

There were several rumors this morning that a syndicate had been formed but operators were unable to name any backers of the new plan and officers of the company declined to discuss the suggestion.

Mr. Coverdale said recently that every dollar received from stock sales had been held in a separate fund so that should dissolution ever become inevitable, farmer stockholders would suffer no loss. The Grain Marketing Company of Illinois, was created in July, 1924, and the Illinois stock marketing act of 1923. The entire elevator and terminal marketing facilities of the two Rosenberg Company of Chicago and the Davis-Noland-Merrill Company of Kansas City, were to be merged in the Illinois Company, through which was to pass to Grain shippers through the stock purchases.

Cuba Will Establish 12 New Consuls in U.S.

HAVANA, July 7.—The growing relations between Cuba and the United States is reflected in the proposed establishment of 12 new consulates in the United States. The foreign relations committees of the senate and house of the Cuban congress are preparing a consular and diplomatic plan to provide for expansion of both services.

Income Tax Reduction Wanted By Coolidge

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 7.—President Coolidge feels that the best reduction in taxes should be made on income. Along the line he hopes that the planned tax reduction will provide for a general relief and at the same time make possible the greatest amount of returns in revenue. He thinks the maximum rate should be cut at least to 25 per cent. The President also stands on his previous pronouncement that inheritance tax should be greatly reduced if not completely wiped out.

AMERICAN'S BODY FOUND IN CREEK NEAR SHANGHAI

Blue Jacket Stands Off Mad Chinese Mob and Is Forced to Shoot One of Members; Situation Remains Serious

SHANGHAI, July 7.—The body of an American member of the crew of the American steamer President Pierce was found in a creek here Monday. The man's name was not given out and nothing has been learned about the circumstances surrounding his death.

American Shouts Chinese. WASHINGTON, July 7.—Consul General Cunningham at Shanghai published the state department Monday that Boatwain's Mate C. Dieck, attacked to the American landing forces there, had fatally shot a Chinese during a disturbance while he was inspecting posts in the international settlement.

Situation Unchanged. CANTON, July 7.—The situation brought on by the strike of natives remained unchanged Monday. Most of the Japanese residents, also most of the foreign missionaries, were leaving for Hong Kong. Residents of Shanghai, the foreign concession, fearing attacks, have kept a sharp lookout both day and night.

COURT DENIES RE-HEARING IN OIL LEASE CASE

Federal Jurist Fails to Sustain Government Counsel In Its Plea That New Evidence Has Been Discovered

Case Versus Mammoth Company Is Dismissed

CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 7.—Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy late Monday denied the motion of government counsel, Alteo Pomene and Owen J. Roberts for a re-hearing of the Teapot Dome least annulment suit on the ground that additional testimony for the government was available.

Judge Kennedy also signed a decree dismissing the lease annulment suit against the Mammoth Oil Company, entering the dismissal as of June 19, the date of his decision in the case.

Government counsel sought to reopen the case to present additional testimony on the alleged transfer of Liberty bonds from the Continental Trading Company of Canada for Harry F. Sinclair, to Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, who negotiated the lease for the government.

Their motion requested that the Canadian courts have since ruled that he must answer all the questions.

Judge Kennedy in his order dismissing the lease annulment suit against Harry F. Sinclair's Mammoth Oil Company stated that the question of the validity of the original order of the May 30, 1921, transferring the jurisdiction of all naval reserves from the navy department to the interior department was immaterial.

In evidence presented by the government in seeking the case against Judge Kennedy's ruling that the Canadian courts have since ruled that he must answer all the questions.

Sanford Women Are Painfully Hurt In Wreck On Monday

Mrs. Alfred Lila and Mrs. L. M. Telford of this city are confined to their homes today, suffering from painful but not serious injuries received in an automobile accident, which occurred near Maitland Monday afternoon, when a Buick Sedan driven by Mrs. Lila, turned over. Mrs. M. E. Moyer, Miss Louise Wells, and Miss Rebecca Stevens, the other occupants of the car, received slight injuries.

Mrs. Lila, stated today that just before reaching Maitland, a tire on a rear wheel went flat, causing the car to skid about on the road. The brakes were applied and the sedan swerved diagonally across the road and then turned over on its left side.

Mrs. Telford, suffered a fractured rib, it was learned. The top of the automobile was damaged badly and the rear glass was broken. No further damage to the car was reported except that the fenders were "somewhat bent."

American Debt Commission Names Dates For Meeting Various Foreign Missions

WASHINGTON, July 7.—The American debt commission for the first time, has been compelled to arrange a program designating periods of time in which it can meet with representatives of debtor nations.

Announcement was made Monday that the treasury was prepared to negotiate with the Belgians on their government's debt here between Aug. 6 and Aug. 16, allowing less than two weeks to dispose of this funding arrangement.

Notice was sent to the French embassy simultaneously, that the commission could meet with the delegation from Paris at any time before or after those dates.

Ambassador Dueschier, of France, had requested the treasury to fix a time when the commission from his government could be received, and was informed by Acting Secretary Winston, of the treasury, as secretary of the American commission, of the program that had been drawn up. No information was forthcoming from the embassy as to when the Paris delegation might be expected.

It was noted that in scheduling the period from Aug. 5 to Aug. 16 to the Belgians no time was designated for resumption of the Italian negotiations with the expected return to Washington of Mario Alberti, one of that government's commissioners. Officials declined to comment on this, and the result was a flood of new rumors that the Italian negotiation was to be delayed longer than when indicated when Mr. Alberti left for home to assemble additional data.

This also caused a renewal of speculation as to whether the American commission desired to reach an agreement with the Italian ahead of the French. It was suggested unofficially at the treasury that there would be time for conferences with the Italians before meetings with other groups, but to observers of the policy thus far the suggestion did not carry conviction.

The treasury has resorted to the utmost secrecy in dealing with foreign debtors, and as such new negotiation has got under way an understanding has been arranged for bidding comment by participants in the conferences. There has been no change in that plan with respect to today's announcement of the program of meetings, and comment was withheld on all phases.

General Naulin To Direct Fight Against Rifles. PARIS, July 7.—General Stanislas Naulin, commander of the Thirtieth army corps on the Rhine, has been appointed supreme commander of operations in Morocco. He is now on leave but will probably return to Morocco at the earliest possible moment.

In announcing the appointment, Premier Painleve said what was needed was a young and vigorous officer well versed in the methods of both European and colonial warfare and thoroughly acquainted with the mentality of the natives.

General Naulin, he added, possessed those qualities to an eminent degree.

The new commander, who will replace Marshal Lyautey, is 55 years old, he served a long time in North Africa, was in command at Oran for a year and lived two years in Morocco. He also was in Syria during the European war, where he commanded the Twenty-first army corps.

General Naulin's appointment, the premier explained, would relieve Marshal Lyautey of the responsibilities of military operations and permit him to devote his energy to his heavy administrative and political duties.

In conclusion M. Painleve repeated what was said in the official note issued by the war ministry Sunday night, giving them assurance that, though some of the loyal tribes had seceded and numerous attacks had been made on the French by the Rifians, who broke through the front line in the Taza region, there was no cause for alarm. He added that the French forces would be grouped in new concentrations and that counter action of an important nature would be taken against the Moors.

Remove Women and Children. FEZ, French Morocco, July 7.—It was officially announced Monday that the French have removed all women and children from Taza, as a precaution. Sunday night the French admitted reverses on the front near Taza in the war with Abd-el-Krim's Rifians.

INDIANA CHIEF OFFICIAL PAYS COOLIDGE VISIT

Governor Jackson, Enroute to His Home From Conference in Maine, Stops to Pay A Friendly Visit to President

Coolidge and Butler To Speak Next Sunday

Former Senator David Walsh Mentioned as Opponent of Butler in 1926 Elections

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 7. Gov. Jackson of Indiana called on President Coolidge Monday at White Court. His visit was purely a social one and it was said that politics were not discussed. The governor who was on his way home from the governors conference in Maine, was accompanied by Mrs. Jackson.

The President and Mrs. Coolidge remained in seclusion during the day, and decided to remain here tomorrow, the first anniversary of the death of their young son, Calvin, rather than to go to Vermont where the son was buried and the president's father resides.

It is the intention of Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge to spend today quietly, although the president expects to spend some time at work. He also will hold his semi-weekly conference at noon with newspaper reporters.

Will Speak Sunday. President Coolidge starts the third week of his vacation with one engagement of political importance on his schedule. His appearance Sunday at an outing at which the principal speaker besides himself will be Senator Butler of Massachusetts, chairman of the Republican national committee and his political and personal intimate. Senator Butler probably will be opposed for re-election next year by former Senator David I. Walsh.

Saturday's outing will be held on the farm near here of Ralph S. Bauer, a Republican candidate for mayor of Lynn. His guests in addition to the president and Senator Butler will be Gov. Fuller and editors of Essex county newspapers, the outing is an annual affair.

During the week, Mr. Coolidge is expected to confer with David Milvane, Republican national committee member from Kansas, who is campaigning at Magnolia. Mr. Milvane predicts that barring an industrial depression Mr. Coolidge will have little if any opposition for the Republican presidential nomination in 1928 and will be re-elected.

Mrs. Coolidge took her first dip in the ocean Monday since she and the president came here for the summer.

With Mrs. Adolphus Andrews, wife of the president's naval aide, she enjoyed a plunge in a pool in front of White Court, which is protected somewhat from the surf by rocks.

Mrs. Coolidge is an ardent follower of outdoor life, usually walking several miles daily. She in the temperature today gave her first opportunity to take to the water, which is still fairly cool.

Some neighboring children were in the same time, but the beach at this point is practically private. Secret service men showed away a couple of photographers who had learned of Mrs. Coolidge's plan.

The president continues to confine his exercises to walking daily. It is doubtful if he will follow Mrs. Coolidge's lead.

BIG BOOSTER DAY CELEBRATION TO BE STAGED HERE

Will Be Held on Thursday, July 16 at Municipal Athletic Field; Fats and Leans Will Play Baseball Game

A mammoth Booster Day celebration, which it is declared, will eclipse any celebration of its kind ever staged here, will be held in Sanford Thursday, July 16, according to an announcement made today by C. L. Britt, president of the local baseball club.

The celebration is being arranged for and sponsored by the Sanford Baseball Club officials, who announce that on that day they will offer to the people of this community and visitors from various sections of Florida a fine program of entertainment and one which will be enjoyed by everyone.

Of the outstanding features of the program are the baseball game between the "fats" and the "leans" to be played before the regular game on that day between Sanford and Lakeland, and a big fireworks display at the municipal athletic field that night.

The tentative program as outlined by Mr. Britt, starts with a parade at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon. The parade will probably be formed in the downtown section, it was stated, and will march through the principal streets of Sanford and thence to the ball park. At 2 o'clock the baseball game between the "fats" and the "leans" will begin.

Mr. Britt stated that the following men have signified their intention to play on the team representing the "fats" of this city: Hodges, G. E. Henry, Hodgson, Hall and Paul Keely. It is expected that R. C. Bower, J. G. Ball and J. B. Lawson will also be added to the lineup. Announcement as to who will represent the "leans" has not been made but will be given out later.

Mr. Britt further announced that the various merchants of this city are donating a number of handsome prizes which will be given away during the festivities to people attending the ball game. Over 100 prizes will be given away, he said. Further information regarding the nature of the prizes will be announced later.

Arrangements are already being made, said Mr. Britt, for the large fireworks display which will be staged at the ball park beginning at 9 o'clock on the night of the celebration. Many large center-pieces in addition to the rockets of various sorts will make it one of the best displayed in this community, he declared.

Funds received from the celebration will be used in the support of the local baseball club and Mr. Britt urges all young women of Sanford, who have time available to help in the sale of tickets. The tickets will be sold for \$1 each and represent admission all of the afternoon activities.

As a matter of explanation, Mr. Britt said that holders of second ball tickets will be allowed admission only to the regular baseball game between the Celery-feds and the Highlanders.

Supreme Court May Set Aside Judgment. TALLAHASSEE, July 7.—The supreme court today was asked to set aside the judgment of the Volusia county circuit court in the case of Aubrey Lee Nickels, convicted and sentenced to death on a charge of criminal assault upon a white woman. This is the fourth time the case has been before the supreme court. Twice has Nickels been tried and convicted and is now being held in the Jacksonville jail.

FEDERAL JUDGE WILL NOT HEAR SCOPES TRIAL

Judge Gore Refuses to Issue A Restraining Order and Evolution Case Goes to Dayton

May Take Appeal To Supreme Court

Scopes and Taxpayer Both Offer Petitions Monday's Hearing

COOKEVILLE, Tenn., July 7.—Refusal to Judge John J. Gore to issue a federal restraining order here Monday afternoon insured the appearance of John T. Scopes in Rhea county circuit court at Dayton Friday to answer a charge of violating the Tennessee statute prohibiting the teaching of theories of evolution in public schools. John R. Neal, leading counsel for Scopes, said before the decision was rendered that he was certain the case will finally reach the supreme court of the United States and after the denial of the petition announced that he would in the near future apply to Judge Ben Hicks, federal judge for Eastern Tennessee, at Chattanooga, for a federal court order in the case. However, Dr. Neal said that the case will go forward Friday at Dayton. Judge Hicks is now holding court in Detroit. Scopes also said he would go on trial Friday and asked The Associated Press to so inform the people of Dayton.

Judge Gore at the outset of his decision pointed out that the petitioner is under indictment in Rhea county and that the case is pending undetermined. He stated that he was of the opinion that he was not justified in granting the writ.

Two petitions were presented, one by John T. Scopes and the other in behalf of Robert M. Wilson. Both were directed to Governor Austin Peay, State Attorney General Frank Thompson and A. T. Stewart, attorney general for the eighteenth judicial circuit of Tennessee, as defendants. Scopes' petition advanced the claim that he was deprived, under the Tennessee law, of liberty and property without due process of law. Wilson's plea contended that the law deprived him of the right to properly educate his children.

Both contended that enforcement of the law is not a valid exercise of the police power of the state.

Referring in his decision to the contention of counsel that it was the court's duty to grant a temporary restraining order to remain in force until a hearing and determination of an application for an interlocutory decree, Judge Gore said that even if he had the power to grant a temporary restraining order he was of the opinion that he should not do so upon the allegations made in the petition.

The object of the injunction sought in this case is to restrain the officers of the state from prosecuting the petitioner for violation of an act which said officers are expressly charged to enforce in the only way in which they are authorized to proceed by law, he said.

Dr. Neal's suggestion that the case will finally reach the supreme court made before the court's decision was announced today, was a statement for his client in case of conviction in the Rhea county court. It was assumed that the state of Tennessee would have filed an appeal had Judge Gore's decision this afternoon been in favor of the plaintiff.

In his lengthy ruling, Judge Gore did not discuss the constitutionality of the Tennessee statute under which Scopes was indicted but gave his decision on the question of his territorial jurisdiction. He cited the United States Constitution and statutes and numerous precedents to uphold his belief that he did not have jurisdiction in the case. One precedent cited was that Dayton is in the Eastern federal district of Tennessee while his district is Middle Tennessee.

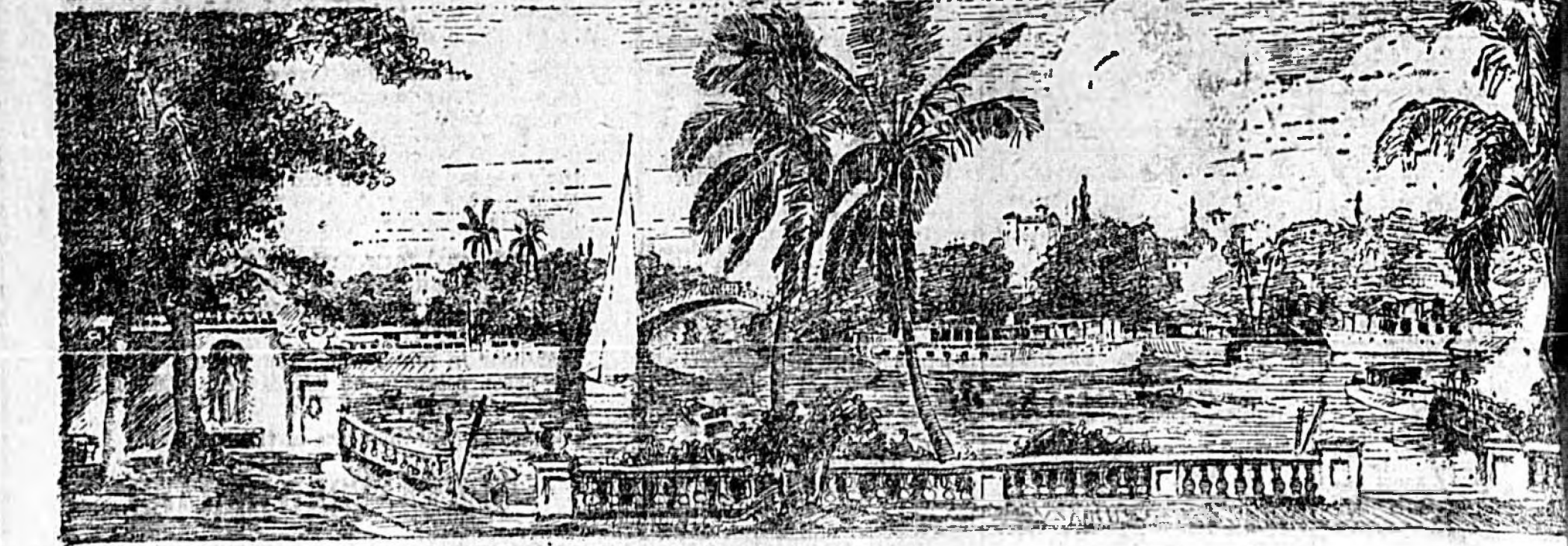

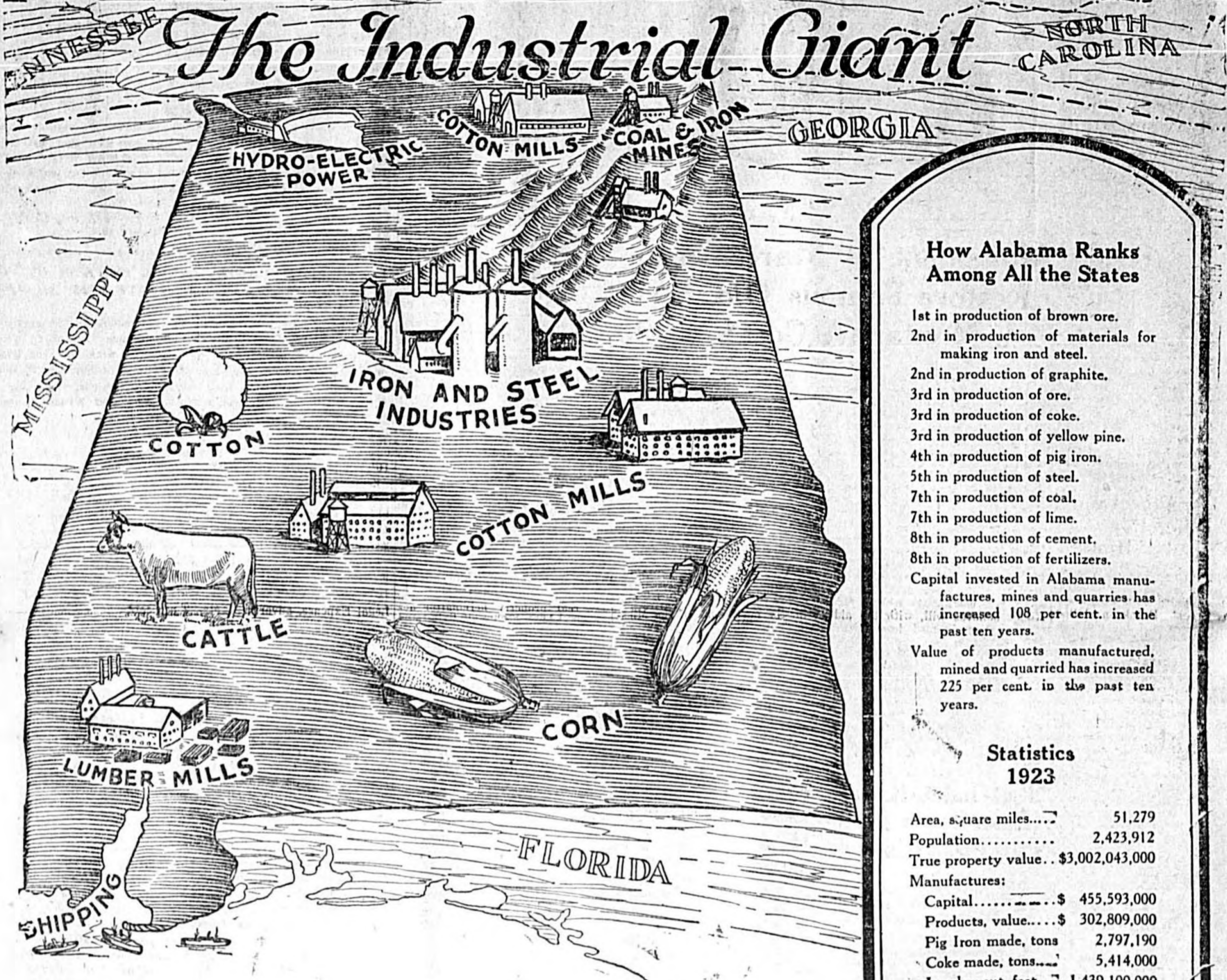

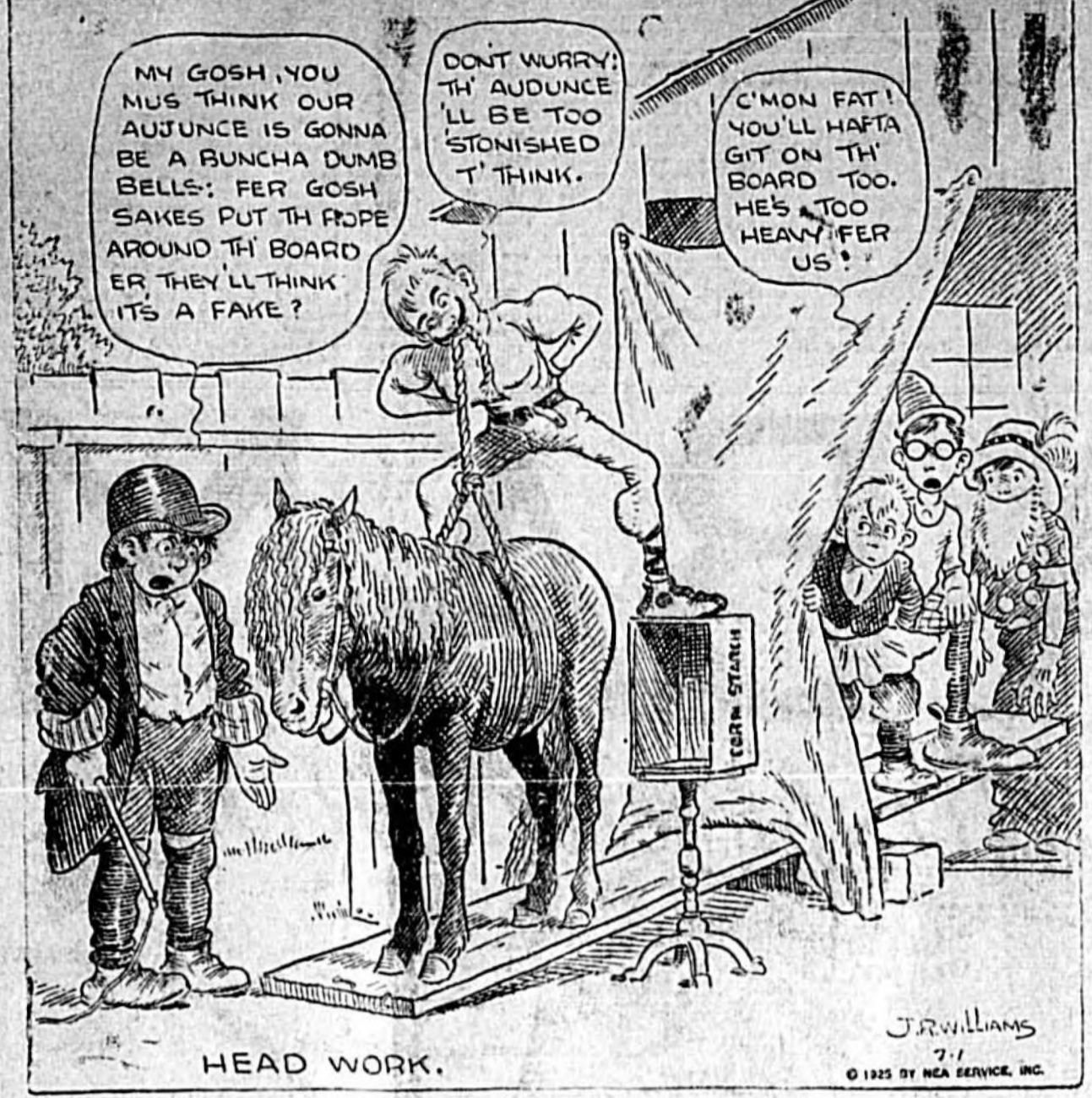
