

Apple products will carry warnings



Starting now, consumers will see warning statements at places where packaged fresh apple juice and apple cider products that have not been processed to prevent, reduce or eliminate illness-causing microbes are sold. The warning statements will inform consumers of the potential risks posed by drinking unprocessed juices, particularly to children, the elderly and persons with weakened immune systems. The Food and Drug Administration is requiring this warning to coincide with the start of this apple juice and cider season.

All other unprocessed packaged fruit and vegetable juices will be required to have the warning statement by November 5, 1998. To allow flexibility in meeting this labeling requirement, FDA is permitting manufacturers to place the warning statement on signs and place-

cards displayed at points-of-purchase for one year after the effective date of the rule.

These warning labels are part of a series of steps FDA is taking to enhance the safety of juices. If a packaged juice has not undergone pasteurization or a comparable treatment, consumers will see this warning statement: **WARNING:** This product has not been pasteurized and, therefore, may contain harmful bacteria that can cause serious illness in children, the elderly, and persons with

weakened immune systems. "Juices are a valuable part of a healthy diet, and people should be encouraged to enjoy them," said HHS Secretary Donna Shalala. "This regulation is designed to alert the public about the risks we know could be present in the small minority of products that forego such protections."

"Untreated juices are only about 2 percent of the total juice sold in the United State," said acting FDA Commissioner, Dr. Michael A. Friedman. "They are normally found at cider mills and farm markets, and less commonly at grocery stores. Today's action will help consumers more easily identify these untreated juices and appreciate their possible risks."

Children, the elderly, and those whose immune systems are suppressed due to cancer treatment, HIV infection or other significant health problems may

develop severe or even life-threatening conditions if exposed to foodborne pathogens that may be present in untreated juice products.

Although FDA does not require pasteurization to be declared on the labels of juices except for pasteurized orange juice, many pasteurized products are labeled "pasteurized". Frozen concentrates, juices sold in sealed containers at room temperature, and many refrigerated juices are treated to eliminate harmful bacteria.

Parents of children in day-care centers and schools that serve cider and juice may want to ask if the products are pasteurized or otherwise treated to reduce or eliminate illness-causing microbes. Also, parents of children on field trips to apple cider mills or farm markets should be aware of FDA concerns about untreated juices and cider.

Unless they're content with just having their faces plastered on a Wheaties box, when asked to endorse a product, athletes usually hustle themselves to do something. A star will do to show the efficacy of his hair on wind-chopped hair. A football player will eat meat and laugh, or at least pose with a football. When we, as consumers, see Michael Jordan, what are we seeing? As near as I can figure it, Michael Jordan's television persona is a person who's mildly surprised to find himself

on television, and would rather be doing something else, playing nice bits of golf, for instance, or taking a nap. Is that supposed to make me thirsty for Gatorade?

How does he decide what products he's going to endorse? Why hot dogs and not brown-and-servis sausages? Why Gatorade and not orange juice?

Why batteries and not power strips? Are these products carefully chosen so they will not detract from his image? Or is money the sole consideration? Maybe he sees these products himself. Does he know about the name in his Jordan line of clothing. Nike's untied on his huge feet, munching a dog, sipping a Gatorade as he chews long distances with animated characters from Warner Brothers cartoons?

Is there a Retirement Factor that must be considered before he will consent to endorse a product? Do his people bring him products, testing his reaction? If he mumbles, the product is rejected. If he groans, Mr. Jordan says no. If he laughs outright, the salespeople are shown the door. I just don't know.



Is the Ouija board more than a game?

If you went into a toy store this past Christmas to buy a Ouija board, the first thing the clerk probably did was to blow the dust off the box. The Ouija board is no longer a big seller.

This wasn't always so. In 1907, the Ouija board took Monopoly's spot as the most popular American board game. Sales hit their all-time peak in 1970 and have been leveling off ever since.

While the manufacturers regard the Ouija board as a game, some people are not sure that it is all that harmless. Many religious people feel it is positively evil—a tool of the devil himself.

How could anything sold at toy and game counters along with Tinker Toys and Barbie dolls have anything to do with demons and devils and the world of the occult?

I'll get to that. First, for those who know nothing about the game, let me explain how to play.

The Ouija board is a piece of wood about 2 feet long and 1-1/2 feet wide.

Printed on its surface are the letters of the alphabet and 10 digits. In either corner are the words "yes" and "no," and underneath the numerals is the phrase "Good-bye."

To operate the board, two people sit facing each other with the board on their knees and their fingers resting lightly on a heart-shaped indicator which is mounted on the board.

As questions are asked to the Ouija board, the indicator slides over the board and spells out messages in response to the questions, which may be about love and romance, the stock market, or where you are going on your vacation next year.

Sometimes the board answers in a foreign language. One board is said to have answered only in German, even though its owner couldn't speak a word of German.

Some boards are atrocious spellers, and it doesn't make any difference who is playing the game. Others cause to the extreme embarrassment of ministers and nice old ladies who may have the game on their lap.

What is the explanation for all of this? The common theory is that the answers come from the subconscious minds of those playing.

But bible-believing Christians have another explanation.

"There are two sources of hidden information and knowledge," says one Bible tract. "One is God and one is Satan. A person may seek such knowledge from God in prayer. But Satan and the powers of darkness can offer such information through the occult and thus gain access to our lives."

The best-known story about the strange powers of the Ouija board concerns a St. Louis housewife who was using the board with a friend when she got this message:

"Many moons ago I lived. Again I come. Patience Worth is my name."

The housewife passed it off with a laugh. But for the next 25 years, "Patience Worth" dictated, via the Ouija board, a continuous flow of poetry, plays and novels to the housewife who never before had written a line of literature.

The Ouija board was invented by William Fuld of Baltimore in the late 1890s. The name is a combination of "oui" and "ja," the French and German words for yes.

Fuld was as baffled as anybody by the Patience Worth story. As a matter of fact, he always seemed surprised when the board came up with correct answers to any questions.

Driving for car owner Rob Dyson, Weaver captured the successful team's first pole position at Daytona with a time of 1:40.888 (127.05 MPH).

The much anticipated entry of the Chevrolet Corvette in the GT3 class paid off big for Canadian native, Ron Fellows, driving the #2 GM Goodwrench Chevrolet Corvette C5-R.

Fellows captured the provisional pole for the GT3 class with a time of 1:48.994 (117.68 MPH) and was 15th overall in a field of over 60 competitors.



Katie, Katie canoe lady

Katie said she was three years old when she went out in a canoe with her mom. At 17, she paddled a canoe to her first job at Boeing Aircraft.

At 73, Katie is still paddling.

"I've been in canoes ever since then," she said. "A boy who lived in Seattle brought his canoe across Angle Lake. He courted me in a canoe."

When Katie met Russ Moncrief 30 years ago, he courted her on a canoe at Lake Sue in Winter Park.

The couple owns Katie's Landing, the popular campground and canoe launch on the Wekiva River. They've managed the place more than 25 years but have it up for sale for \$1 million.

Katie and Russ have a home on the Wekiva and will continue to paddle their kayaks daily. "We each have a kayak," she said. "That gives us a chance to paddle together - yet on our own."

Katie said it is easy to distinguish singles from married couples when they come to Katie's Landing to rent canoes. "You can tell the minute they start to get in the canoe," she said. "The single guy asks 'can I help you.' The marrieds do what they do. You'll hear things like 'get me out of these trees.'"

Now and then, Katie says she'll see a couple facing each other in the canoe and paddling nowhere.

Several years ago, Katie says that land developer Everett Husky and his wife, Ingrid, went canoeing from Katie's Landing. Katie said that Husky brought along his brief case and a cellular phone. When the canoe tipped over, Husky missed his last call.

"Arnold Palmer and Gary Player have gone canoeing from the landing," Katie said. "So did Buster Crabbe, the actor who used to play Tarzan."


"A couple took their 3-week-old baby on an overnight camping trip," Katie said. "That's the youngest we've seen. We ask for a driver's license for those renting the canoes."

Frequently, guests rented each of the 100 canoes available at Katie's Landing, the only Seminole County launch site on the Wekiva. The County Commissioners recently turned down a \$700,000 deal to purchase the landing. That ended four years of negotiations between the Moncriefs and county staff.

Katie said she was disappointed that the sale was rained, hoping that the site would become a county park. That would have helped to preserve one of Florida's most unspoiled waterways.

"We can't continue to manage the place," Katie said. "We hope that whoever comes in will care about the river and the environment as we have. This is a place to experience the magic of the natural Florida."

"There is nothing quite like being out on the river, leisurely paddling your canoe," Katie said. "Like the ads on television, it's priceless."

Pregnant inmate escapes

SANFORD - An inmate, who was taken to the hospital to give birth to her baby, escaped Thursday while still wearing the hospital gown. Police relocated her shortly later, hiding in a person's home.

Angela Kay Patton, 26, escaped at 4:10 p.m. from Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford. She was hooked up to three IV's and monitor belts. When the supervising deputy went to the bathroom, Patton removed her IV's and left the hospital.

Deputies relocated Patton within minutes three blocks away in a residence near Second Street and Myrtle Avenue.

Patton was still wearing her gown and the baby monitoring belts when she was found, said Seminole County Sheriff's spokesperson Deanna Brown.

Patton was taken back at the hospital, handcuffed, and hooked up to the IV's. Her labor was to be induced Thursday night.

Patton has three prior arrests in Seminole County, from July 1998 through Jan. 26, for charges of possession of controlled substances, failure to appear, larceny, resisting and obstructing an officer without violence, trespassing and escape. She will face an additional escape charge for Thursday's incident, Brown said.

Patton is a former dancer at Circus Circus, Brown said.

Straying from the agendized issues, members of the environmental groups used the public hearing to continue to object to the Commission's request for funding of a new river study, stating that additional study of the river will open the river protection act up to tampering every five years.

"Please do not fold spindle or mutilate this sacred piece of legislation," said Deborah Deal, representing the Wekiva Hunt

Club Community Association. "Please hold to the standards of the 1988 Wekiva River Protection Act, maintain the rural character and densities as called for in this act."

Commissioner Randy Morris said it was a misconception that the Commission's action would somehow diminish the affect of the 10-year-old act.

"We are not proposing a change in the act," said Morris. "The environmental study of the river will actually strengthen protection because it sets some benchmark standards that heretofore haven't been done." Morris reiterated a stand he took at the Jan. 12 BCC meeting, saying that the Commission would not pursue the funding request without the support of the environmental community. "You're the last critic we want," he told Lee.

Morris defended the actions of the BCC, saying, "I defy anyone to name a county in the State of Florida that has done more to protect the environment on an ongoing basis consistently and has been a role model for the state than this one, including this commission."

The votes were unanimous to approve both the addendums and the moratorium.


