Colony Feds "B" Squad Will Meet Ocala "B" Combine In Prelim

Coach Leonard McLucas will lead his Seminole High School basketball team into action in the first contest of a 20-game schedule this evening at 8:30 o'clock when the Ocala Wildcats will be met on the local floor.

Originally expected to lead the nucleus of his squad, Jack Purdon, Billy Eckhart, Lester Phillips, John Morgan and Darrell Ferguson, in as his starting lineup, the local member made a last minute change, deciding to use Eckhart and Art Williams as his forward combine, Purdon as center, and Ferguson and Morgan as guards.

Eckhart and Purdon, both seniors, are enjoying their second season as members of the squad, as are Ferguson, a sophomore, and Morgan, a junior. Williams also a member of the varsity squad for the first time.

Ready to rush in at a moment's notice will be F. Merchant, Phillips, Brailley Odham, Jimmie Supper and Pete Mandon, who, in all likelihood will make up the remainder of the main squad. All, with the exception of Mandon, gained more or less experience as members of the squad last season.

Eckhart and Purdon, who will be members of the starting lineup tonight, started for the Colony Feds against Ocala a year ago when the latter trimmed the locals in the opening game at Ocala by a 42-25 count. Eckhart led the McLucas-tutored lads in their scoring, accounting for nine points. Morgan and Ferguson also saw action for nine points in the same contest.

The Feds will not enter the game tonight entirely without previous experience, having played for short intervals in City League games, alternating with the B squad which is entered in the independent loop.

Agricultural Prospects

A new program is in the process of formation in the Department of Agriculture which is expected to be of vast benefit to American farmers throughout the years to come. Secretary Wallace declares that "Agriculture is no longer the forgotten industry of the United States" as he recalls that during the past four years farm income has increased from \$4,500,000,000 to \$9,000,000,000.

- Insisting that it is of the utmost importance to industry as well as agriculture that this farm income be maintained, the agricultural Secretary outlines a ten-point program for maintaining farm prosperity, as follows: 1. Free opportunity for farmers to organize. 2. Fair and stable income for the farmer, on an equal with city incomes. 3. Supplies of farm goods adjusted to adequate home needs and foreign demand. 4. Foreign policies to encourage peace with other countries and an expanding market abroad for American farm products. 5. Conservation of the soil and other natural resources. 6. Turning below-standard land to non-farm uses. 7. Crop insurance, to cushion the shock of drought, flood, frost and plague, combined with the ever-normal granary. 8. Better opportunities for the man with the hoe to own his land, and increased security for tenants and owner-operators. 9. A higher standard of living for the poorer farmers. 10. Industrial policies to insure abundance for wage-earners and farmers alike.

There are only two possible developments which stand in the way of the continued prosperity of the American farmer, according to Secretary Wallace, one of them domestic, the other foreign. In the event of another serious drought, credit and relief resources would be strained in some sections. In the event of a European war, foreign markets would be made more inaccessible.

Learn To "Stop"!

How few people seem to know that a "stop" sign at an intersection means stop. And the funny part about it is, those signs are placed there for their own benefit, for their own safety, to warn them that some other driver is just as likely as not to be racing down upon them from the right or left.

"You'd almost think that a large number of automobile drivers do not know how to read," says the Miami Herald. "Or else they don't give a continental. At the intersections of every street in the city that crosses a 'through street' there is painted in large letters on the pavement, in plain sight, the word, 'Stop'."

"The purpose of the sign is to induce drivers to stop and take a good look at any traffic that may be moving in the through street, which, ordinarily, has the right of way. The sign is placed there to call attention to the lives of the people. But a good many drivers fail to understand that the word spelled s-t-o-p, means stop—a dead stop.

"The reckless ones sail up to the through street, slow down a trifle and speed along, taking chances that no one is moving along the other street. And it is just that tendency to take a chance that brings on the accident. Almost every day one or more accidents are reported as arising from the impatience of the driver who wants to get across, whatever the hazard.

"Squeaking brakes, narrow escapes, loud denunciations and even arrears do not seem to cool the ardor of the reckless driver who is always in a hurry to get somewhere so that he can turn around and hurry back."

CANDLELIGHT

"The dignity of history..." One hundred years ago when the smoke of Indian camp fires drifted hazy blue smoke among the moss hung oaks on the St. Johns River, when Osoeka signed the paper of surrender and agreement of the Seminoles to the white general's proposition of emigration for Oklahoma with a quivering knife blade that meant war, when Colonel Zachary Taylor was heavily laying on wagon roads across the state to collect the important army headquarters, when Major Dade and his little band of 120 men were massacred in ambush on the banks of the Withlacoochee, Captain Charles Mellon was killed in battle on the shores of Lake Monroe on February 8, 1837.

The army camp on this site was called Fort Mellon after his death and here the settlement of Maitlandville grew that later was to become the City of Sanford. Thus, on Feb. 8, 1837, Sanford celebrates her hundredth birthday.

Last year, Sanford had an exciting birthday party with the Sallie Harrison Chapter of the D. A. R. playing hostess and many illustrious guests, including the Florida Historical Society. In the afternoon, at the Woman's Club, the early days came alive again with the interesting stories told by the descendants of the pioneer families and with such concrete reminders as old homespun blankets, Indian arrowheads, pictures of the first wharf on the St. Johns, and quaint yellow maps.

In the evening, the Florida Historical Society gathered at the Mayfair. Among the speakers were Mr. Joshua C. Chase, of Winter Park, president of the Society, Mr. Irving Bacheller of Winter Park a relative of the Sanford family, President Hamilton Holt of Rollins, Mr. T. A. Mellon, one of the Pittsburgh Mellons and a member of the same family as the Captain Thomas Mellon for whom Fort Mellon was named, and Mr. S. O. Chase of Sanford, owner of "Belair," the experimental grove started by General Henry Sanford.

Sanford will have another birthday party, and there will be the added glamour of reaching the hundred year mark. According to Mrs. Herman Lehman, the very chairman of Founder's Day for the Sallie Harrison Chapter D. A. R. and Mrs. Samuel Puleston, the Regent, great plans are afoot. In recalling the early days of this section Sanford has been lucky in having D. A. R. Captain Mrs. J. N. Whitner, one of the beloved women of the State, a "lady and scholar" who combines a knowledge of Florida history gained both from books and from rich personal experiences.

Sanford has also been fortunate in having the aid of Professor A. J. Hanna of Rollins in the historical research work. It was he, who at the request of the Sallie Harrison Chapter, selected the date that would be most fitting for Founder's Day, and Sanford owes him a debt of gratitude for the generous gift of his careful scholarship.


It seems somehow peculiarly appropriate that a Rollins professor should help in the making of Sanford history, for there is a very close link between Sanford and Florida's oldest institution of higher learning, the "little white building" that has gained international prominence under the leadership of Hamilton Holt. It was in Sanford on April 28, 1855 that the first meeting of the Board of Trustees of Rollins College was held in the old Lyman Bank Building. It was at this meeting that Rollins was incorporated, organized, and named, and, therefore in a civil sense at least, Rollins was born in Sanford!

At a recent occasion at the University of Miami, Mr. J. C. Chase, and Professor Hanna were on the program and they both pointed out the importance of Florida history in the development of the State. Winter visitors, like any visitors, are attracted by local color and romance. We have so much of it here in Florida that we take some of it for granted and forget to mark it "that he who runs may read." We boast, and very rightly, about the gold of our sun and citrus, the blue of our sea and our sky, but we do not always remember the history of our great past.

In not the old Spanish mission at New Smyrna more interesting when we add to the arresting beauty of its unusual homestead such the imagined footfalls of the sandaled feet of Francisca's monks? Are not the waters of St. Augustine more appealing when we see rising in another bay, the Discal pulchra of today — the Spanish pulchra of yesterday? Are not the shores of the Withlacoochee more exciting if we have read Clifton Safford's "Ballad of Major Dade"?

ORANGE PRODUCTION AND PRICE



LAKELAND, Jan. 7.—Florida citrus growers now produce twice as many oranges as they did in years before 1923, and supply one-third of the oranges in markets of the United States, according to figures compiled by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

Production of oranges in Florida has increased at a more rapid rate than in California, the other major growing area. Greater production in the two most important growing sections, coupled with the increase in production of grapefruit, has intensified the marketing problems of orange growers. Moderate increases in the production of oranges are expected for the next three or four years, and more marked increases in the production of grapefruit are expected during the next five or six years, thus further aggravating the marketing problems of citrus growers.

The accompanying illustration, based on figures from the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture, shows the trends of orange production in the Florida, California-Arizona, Texas and other growing areas, and the trend of the farm price of all oranges produced in the United States. While average prices in each of the orange growing areas may vary from year to year, the national price trend shown in the illustration serves to indicate the general downward course which orange prices have followed in the various producing sections.

Artificial Bunny Does Not Fool Wise Greyhounds

Determination And Speed Counts In Chasing Rabbits

MIAMI, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Racing greyhounds chased a mechanical rabbit around the track, but they know as well as the fellow betting on them that the electrically driven cotton-tail is a fake.

They know because they have developed their swift-moving legs running after live bunnies.

The love of stretching their lean, long-tailed bodies after any quarry is what impels them to chase dummy rabbits, says Art Wilson, one of the leading kennel owners and trainers, here for the Florida season after a successful campaign in Massachusetts.

Stamina, determination to win and speed count for a lot, but schooling in the fields for racing on the closed course is important.

Before their first race—usually at about the age of 18 months—most bunnies are turned out after live rabbits and entered in cross country coursing events.

Usually under guidance of an older dog they are introduced then to the electrically-operated rabbit running around the track on a metal rail.

If the young dog shows zest in pursuit of the dummy, he is practiced on starting from the box and later raced—if he doesn't, he may never be raced, or he may be schooled some more in the field. Sometimes the best couriers are the poorest performers on tracks.

Good time for a dog running the five-sixteenths of a mile track is 31 seconds, depending to a large extent on the size and shape of the track and whether the rabbit is placed on the inside or outside rail. They're much swifter in straightaway cross-country coursing. Ordinarily, a dog's speed is measured through his fourth year. Valuations range from \$50 to \$1,000, but a good racer can be bought for \$500.

"There aren't any such things as a 'home' world track record for dogs," says Wilson. "There can't be when no two tracks are built alike. Of course, there are individual track records."

The racing diet? One meal a day usually barley, meat, spinach and biscuit.

"Those vitamins the doctors talk about count just as much with dogs as they do with human beings," Wilson says.

"Two fast dogs won't necessarily produce a litter of good racers. You've got to study their blood lines back for generations to see if their different qualities will blend successfully."

"All the training in the world won't help a dog win races if he isn't bred right. If his breeding is good he will have stamina and a determination to win. These are more important than speed."

Some 1,500 dogs are kennelled for the 90-day seasons at four tracks hereabouts.



Insurgent General Orders Execution Of 15,000 Troops, Deserters Assert

England, France Continue Efforts

Hitler Expresses Desire For 'Reconcili- ation Of Peoples'

MADRID, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Madrid's defense command today ordered a 24-hour evacuation of 2,500 non-combatants to the south and announced 11 Fascist deserters related that one of the insurgent generals ordered 15,000 persons shot in the first six months of the civil war.

Twenty-five hundred women, children and old men were the first to be evacuated to a new city in empty Madrid of all but fighters and make it the military school of a siege. Their destination was Ciudad, in Real Province.

From the Coruña high command in the south came the deserters' stories. It was General Gonzalo Queipo de Llana, Fascist southern commander, who ordered 15,000 executions, they were quoted as saying. They also said while battalions of German troops, completely equipped with supplies, ambulances, fast motorcycles, trucks and automobiles, joined insurgents at Seville.

As the work of removing non-combatants from Madrid went on, both sides of the civil war rushed up supplies for a new battle.

Great Britain and France continued preparations on land and sea today for trouble in Morocco, according to the news directly to General Francisco Franco, the acknowledged leader of Spain's Fascist movement.

In Germany Adolf Hitler, who denied the regular German troops have invaded Spanish Morocco, had conciliatory words and expressed desire for "real reconciliation among peoples" as he talked with diplomats but he said nothing about Spain.

Britain again demanded that interested governments stop sending volunteers to the "little World War" and banned British enlistments in Spain.

Belgium believed that Italy might agree to stop volunteers from going to the aid of the (Continued On Page Three)

Former Associated Press Correspondent Lays Honor At Feet Of Czecho- slovakian President

Dr. John Palmer Gavit of New York City and Winter Park was the principal speaker at the Rotary Club held at the Mayfair Hotel today. Formerly chief of the Washington Bureau of the Associated Press, and later editor of the New York Evening Post, Dr. Gavit told Rotarians of many of his personal experiences with people of all types and nations during his quest for news.

Though he paid tribute to President Roosevelt, former President Wilson, and termed former President Taft a very dear friend, Dr. Gavit said that none of these was the greatest president he had ever known. That designation he reserved for Dr. Thomas G. Masaryk, president of the central European republic of Czechoslovakia.

Peopled largely by Bohemians, Czechoslovakia, Dr. Gavit declared, is probably the most literate nation in the world, ranking above England, Finland, and Sweden where the widest opportunities for the lowest classes are generally said to exist. President Masaryk himself was the son of a most unusual woman, who for many years served as a cook in a private home, Dr. Gavit said.

Dr. Gavit also cautioned his audience not to become headline readers. "Find out what is in the story underneath the headlines," he advised. "That is where the real truth lies."

A steady but growing trend toward electrification in Sanford was evidenced through 1936, it was reported today in an annual review of Florida Power and Light Company activities by H. H. Coleman, local manager of the firm.
