Hollenback Tragedy Arouses Public Action

Tragedy spotlighted a national problem when Robert Wayne Hollenback, 14-years-old, was found hanging in a cell of the Seminole County jail.

There have been such reactions that a search for someone on whose shoulders blame could be rested—thus escaping the community neglect where all such inadequacies must logically reside—is not only unwise but it is, at the same time, unfair.

For the tragedy is a product of a system and an attitude which is not peculiar to Seminole County nor to Sanford. To remedy these factors will require much more than a quick outburst of public emotions or the adoption of any easy, quick or superficial program.

Whether or not this would mean a hike in taxes is not at all certain. But if so, the dollars paid are not the purchase price. What is needed is a resolve by concerned citizens

Dishes Potatoes By Many Carloads

GRAND FORKS, N.D. (AP)—Every woman has decisions to make about potatoes. Usually it's whether to mash, bake or scallop them.

It used to be that way, too, for Mrs. Glenn Gumila, a Crookston, N.D., housewife. Then in 1951 she became manager of her family's farm. Now her decisions are whether to hold or to sell, how many to plant, and when to build a new storage warehouse.

When Mrs. Gumila goes to the cities, she shops and has lunch in a tea room like other women. Also, she might sell 40 or 50 carloads of potatoes from the farm.

Through she does no actual farm labor, Mrs. Gumila does the selling and cost accounting for the crops raised on the farm of her late father. The 2,000 acres of land includes potatoes, sugarbeets and grain.

"My grandfather," says Mrs. Gumila, "whipped one of the first carloads of potatoes out of the Red River Valley. That was in 1880."

"It is possible for a woman to run a farm," says Mrs. Gumila, who is known as "Jody" (Johanna) by her friends. "But she adds, 'being a woman is nothing but a handicap in the potato business.'"

Mrs. Gumila earned a Phi Beta Kappa key at the University of Minnesota and a magna cum laude on her diploma.

Now Jody manages the acreage with her mother, a silent partner.

Her husband, Glenn, an electrical contractor, isn't too interested in farming. The Gumila children are Leonard, 12, Julie, 11, and Rocky, 7.

Jody who was Peoria Queen in 1954 is most often published as an outstanding area gatherer. "People think all I do is get," says Jody, whose name appears in reports of women's getting events. "Actually, about the only times I have gotten in the last five years have been with the children or in tournaments."

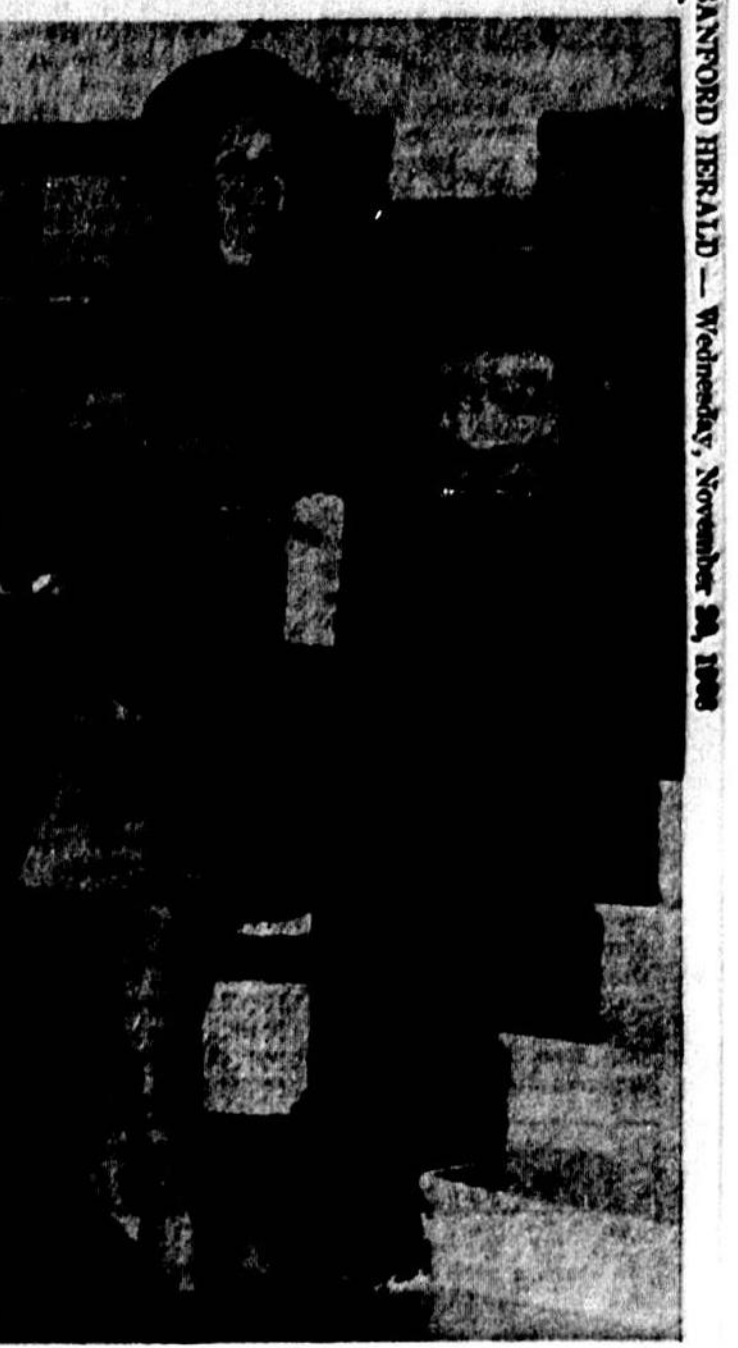

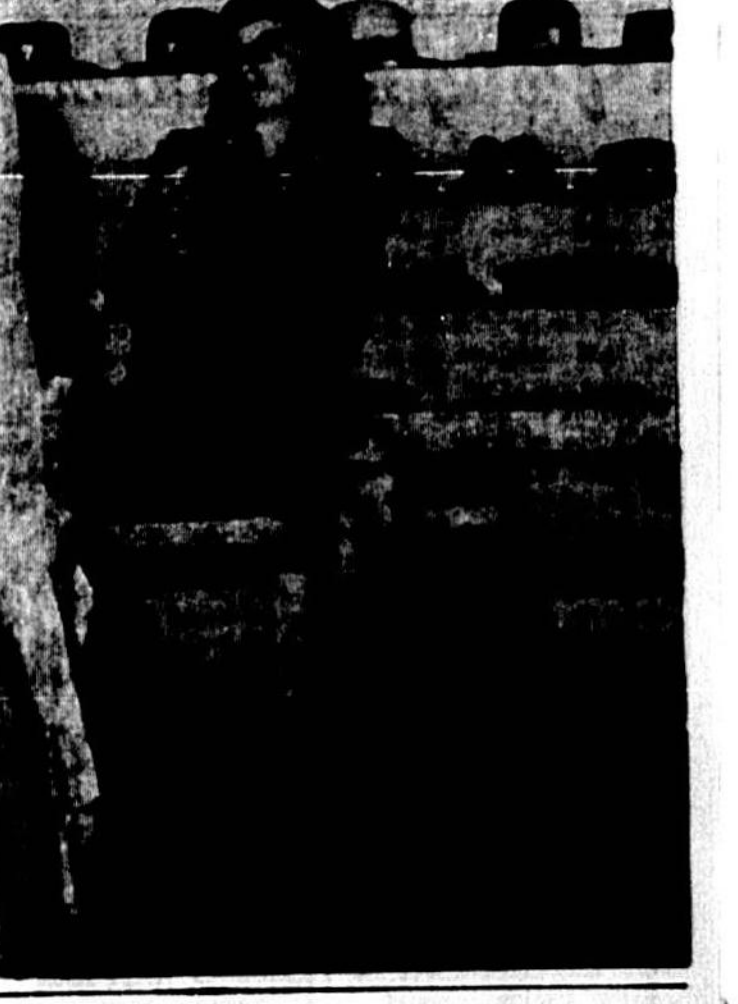

A Recipe For Yams

Scrub yams in cold water. In a saucepan, cover yams with boiling water. Boil rapidly, covered, for 15 minutes. Centers of yams will not be soft; they will finish cooking in the next step. Peel yams and cut into half-inch thick crosswise slices. Into a 10-inch skillet, turn the corn syrup, brown sugar, butter, orange rind, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Stirring several times, bring to a boil. Simmer for five minutes. Add yam slices in one layer if possible. Cover and simmer, basting several times, until yams are completely soft (but will keep their shape) and look glazed—about 20 minutes. Serve at once or reheat gently. Makes six servings at a festive holiday dinner.

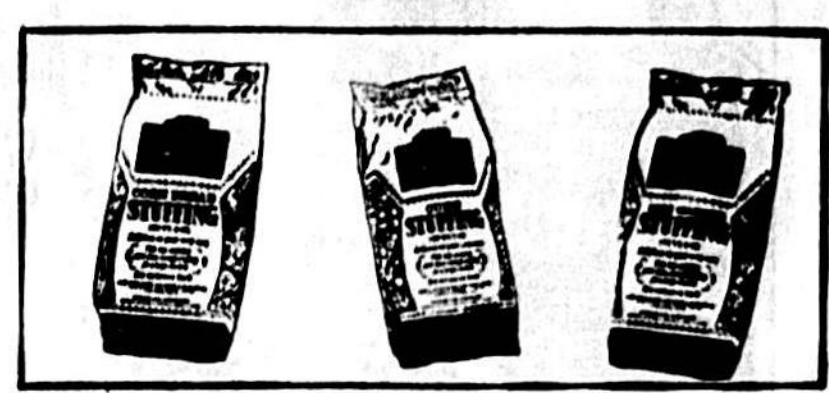
