Authorities arrest 19 motorists during holiday operation

The City-County-State Traffic Safety Team conducted a special operation Labor Day weekend to promote safe driving and to target motorists who are impaired by alcohol and/or drugs.

The operation, which took place Friday and Saturday, resulted in the arrest of 19 people, 17 of whom were arrested for driving under the influence (DUI)-related offenses.

The operation was hosted by the Oviedo Police Department, but several other police agencies took part. Mobile patrols were on the lookout for impaired drivers, who were then pulled over and given roadside tests. Those placed under arrest were processed for pre-booking at the Oviedo Police Department and then transported to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility.

The arrest breakdown by department was 12 arrests for SCSO law enforcement officers, three by Oviedo police, one by Altamonte Springs police and two by Sanford police; one each for Officers Bill Crapps and Bill Erwin.

In addition to participating in the special operation, the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, as well as other police agencies, were on the lookout for impaired drivers and traffic law violators throughout the holiday weekend.

County delays Celery Ave. decision

For three years, Seminole officials have tried to regulate growth in area

An effort by Seminole County to control the density of growth along Celery Avenue will have to wait another year.

For three years, residents of the rural roadway have fought the county's process for considering a large scale land use amendment that would rezone more than 600 unincorporated acres west of Sanford's city limits. The last time the county commission considered the measure was six months ago and at that time they decided to

wait for more details to be ironed out. But last Tuesday little progress had been made, so they unanimously delayed the plan once again until next year.

Originally, the subject area included the Midway community between State Road 46 and Celery Avenue. However, it was later scaled back when more than 300 concerned residents attended a community meeting

at Midway Elementary.

"From that first meeting, I believe, most said they didn't want to see any changes, they didn't want to see anything happen," said Matt West, county planning manager. "But staff looking at this further — especially on Celery Avenue — whether county staff or property owners out there wanted anything to happen or not, it's been very obvious the city of Sanford is

interested in annexing this property."

Sanford on the move

According to county staff, Sanford has recently annexed several lots along Celery Avenue and could be considering several more. County officials say the annexation is not the problem, but rather the proposed density for future developments the city might consider. Two 300-home subdivisions the city has approved on the west end of Celery Avenue include densities of more than five lots per

REJUVENATING JUSTICE

Construction continues to move forward on the Seminole County Criminal Justice Center, located on U.S. Highway 17/92 in South Sanford near the Five Points area.

A groundbreaking ceremony was held on Jan. 23 and the \$45 million project is scheduled to be completed in September 2004. Crews are currently installing fire sprinkler piping in the basement and first floor.

The HVAC air handling unit and first-floor HVAC chillers were recently put in place, as was the roof and the slab of the first-floor mailroom. Masonry walls on the first floor are being constructed, and the second floor pre-cast panels are currently being built.

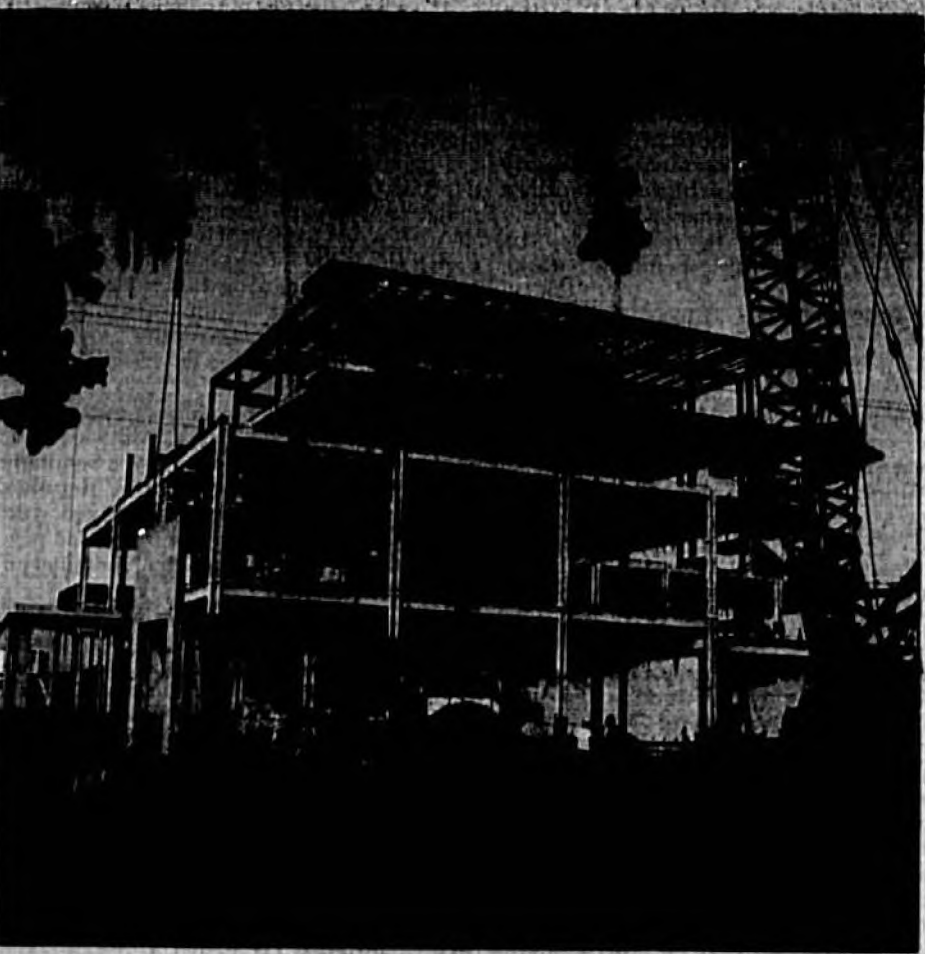
Crews are also installing the metal decking on the central second- and third-floor areas. Soon workers will begin installing irrigation and sodding around the retention



pond, as well as placing the first-floor architectural precast panels. Grading and stabilization of the parking area will continue, and the waterline

will be tied into the City of Sanford's and Seminole County's water systems.

30 JUN 03 Well, we have no power again, and it is dark and very hot and sweltering. I am sweating profusely right now. This is exactly what Hell is like. I hate this place. I hate the heat. I hate MREs. I hate the Navy because they went

home. I hate the Air Force because they went home too. I hate the marines because they are way down south where it's safe. I hate all the politicians in Washington. I hate those who sent us here. How do I get out of Hell?

I hate this place, and for the first time in my 12 years in the army, I'm starting to hate soldiering. At this point I'd

gladly trade places with an inmate at the state penitentiary. At least they have a nice cell, good food and nobody is trying to kill them and there is a good reason for them being there. Plus they know when they're getting out. We don't have any of those luxuries and feel totally for-

Former students nabbed for Lake Howell vandalism

Two former Lake Howell High School students were arrested Tuesday in conjunction with last month's burglary and vandalism of the school.

Darrell Brent Singleton, 19, of Casselberry, and Steven Vincenty, 17, of unincorporated Winter Park, are accused of burglary, criminal mischief, trespassing on school grounds and crimes while wearing a mask or hood.

According to Steve Olson, public information officer of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, the two will be tried as adults and charged with felonies.

According to police reports, the two gained access to the school at approximately 1 a.m. Aug. 4,

the first day of school, by cutting the barbed wire on top of a 6 foot chain link fence located on the west side of the school.

Once inside the school, located at 4200 Dike Road, near Casselberry, Singleton and Vincenty ransacked the schoolyard causing more than \$4,000 worth of damages, including spray painting obscene graffiti on several buildings, sidewalks, vending machines, pay phones and windows. The two also defaced several school paintings and murals.

The two males who attempted to disguise their identity by wearing ski masks, were caught on several of the school's 11 surveillance cameras. School officials and the school resource deputy reviewed the tapes in order

Lake Mary gov't to be homeless for 7 months

The staff of Lake Mary City Hall will temporarily relocate to the local police department in mid-September in order for the building to undergo a transformation.

The move, which is scheduled to begin Sept. 15, is a direct result of "major" renovations needed at the current city hall location at 100 N. Country Club Road in Lake Mary.

As employees are moving items out, construction workers will begin staging for the seven-month long job.

"We will basically make this building technologically state-of-the-art," said City Manager John C. Litton. "The renovations are needed badly. Our staff has outgrown this building over the years — we have had a 200 percent

growth in population." According to Litton, another key factor in the decision to renovate city hall is the need for storage space. Currently, the city uses off-site storage facilities, which have become inconvenient, making it difficult to retrieve and keep track of the city's records.

The move, which will affect the entire city hall staff of 30, should last a week. During this time city hall will function with a limited staff. The full spectrum of services will resume Sept. 22 at the Lake Mary Police Department, located at 165 E. Crystal Lake Ave.

During the renovation, the building's infrastructure will undergo a complete overhaul, including wiring, carpet replacement, wall coverings and remodeling of the commission chambers. The building will also receive a

Airport under way with \$1.6 billion expansion

The Orlando-Sanford International Airport in Sanford is in the midst of a \$1.6 billion expansion program that will see almost continuous new construction at the airport facility through the year 2020.

Diane Crews, vice president of administration at the airport, said workers are now focused on extending the airport runways to accommodate larger flights, including more international flights. Three runways are targeted for extension, including Runway 9L-27R being expanded to 12,000 feet, which will accommodate virtually all commercial aircraft. Crews said the airport's significant economic impact in the area and the need for more new jobs is driving the expansion program.

"Right now Orlando-Sanford International Airport stimulates more than 4,600 jobs in the area that pay more than \$130 million annually," said Crews.

"We are focused on expanding Orlando-Sanford International Airport in ways that will facilitate more commercial and industrial growth in Seminole County," she added. "Tourism revenues are welcome and they are of tremendous significance to the area, but what we really want to stimulate is more long-term industrial and commercial growth."

Senior citizen thwarts Canadian lottery scam; reports it to SCSO

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is warning residents not to fall for a lottery scam that has been reported in the area recently.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office was notified last week that an alleged scammer called an 80-year-old woman telling her she won \$2.5 million in the Canadian Lottery. To collect the prize, the woman had to come up with nearly \$13,000 to cover the taxes. The caller said a representative would stop by to pick up a cashier's check.

Instead of falling for the scam, the woman contacted the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. Surveillance was set up at her home, but no one showed to collect the money. The alleged scammers called and told the woman to, instead, mail the check. The call was traced to British Columbia, Canada. It's uncertain whether the alleged scammers ever intended to send somebody by to get the money.

Representatives from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Economic and Computer Crimes Unit urge residents to be vigilant with regard to the Canadian Lottery, and other, so-called lottery scams. Calls out of the blue, claiming that a prize has been won should trigger concern, especially if the person has not actively played in such a lottery. Requests to send money to cover taxes, costs, etc., should also cause concern.

Anybody with information about such scams, or who alleged scammers have contacted, are urged to call their local law enforcement immediately.

Attorney general demands probe of gas prices

Florida Attorney General Charlie Crist has requested that the U.S. Department of Energy assist the State of Florida to obtain a full explanation of the most recent spike in gasoline prices.

In a letter to Energy Secretary Spencer Abraham, Crist asked the Department to require oil companies to provide a much better explanation for these recent price hikes.

"For the sake of our economic well-being, we must broaden the scope of those becoming involved," said Crist. "Right now there are citizens who are being forced to park their cars due to an inability to afford current prices. They can not understand how the companies are posting record breaking profits while their budgets can not afford fuel for automobiles."

Across the nation, prices have risen to record, or near-record, levels. Florida is approaching the records set in March of this year.

At that time, the attorney general's office, in conjunction with the Federal Trade Commission, researched prices around the state. Representatives of the major oil companies visited Florida and provided various factors as the causes of the price spikes.

No illegal activity was discovered and prices dropped soon thereafter.

The current situation is being investigated largely because of the speed in which prices rose. The causes of the March rises are largely resolved, leaving consumers to wonder why this is occurring in late summer.

"The people of Florida and the United States need to have a full understanding of why this is happening and why everyone is not sharing the pain," wrote Crist.

gotten about. I went by the first Iraqi police station we opened back in May and went inside and there was handshaking between me and the IPF [Iraqi Police Force]. I got my photo taken with Hassan, the interpreter, and Hammad the IPF officer. I remember Hassan's first day of work when he walked in for a job and Hammad is always happy to see me. We've had no power for more than two days. We can't sleep at night as the temperatures inside are over 100 degrees. I went out with two teams to scour the area for ice. We decided to take a trip to BIAP [Baghdad International Airport] where we have a small PX now, but no ice being sold anywhere. It was getting dark and the rats come out at night to shoot at us. I did not want to go back empty handed without ice for the platoon, so we saw an ice cream truck and figured he might have some ice. I gave the go ahead for my patrol to pull a stop on the ice cream man, just like we have done before with suspect vehicles to see if he had any ice he'd sell us. One humvee swung in front and blocked him in while the other went behind him right in the middle of traffic. He had no ice. So we headed back in and saw we had electric power, which is now back off again

and it is hot. I need to get some sleep now. **1 JUL 03.** Nothing significant today except we visited a school in the New Baghdad area. The teachers and staff were all women, as that is one of the few jobs they can hold. We then had tea with the teachers, staff and the headmistress. They said I looked like Harrison Ford. We then went back to New Baghdad police headquarters and were warmly greeted by the IPF as we were the first to get their station up and running. I talked with the police chief for that zone and got a picture with him. He told my translator for me to come back again because he likes me and considers me a good friend. **2 JUL 03** We are now officially detached from the 3rd Division and attached to the 2nd Armored Cavalry Regiment, which we have been working with all along. We are told by the Regimental Commander that we are going to be awarded the "Order of the Spurs" for fighting with the cavalry, which means we would earn our combat spurs and Stetson hat. The only thing is you have to purchase is your own spurs and Stetson. Plus I am now officially authorized to wear the 2nd cavalry patch on my arm, my fourth combat patch. That's great, Dad with the 11th Armored Cavalry patch

from Vietnam and me with 2nd Armored Cavalry patch. *Editor's note: The Second Armored Cavalry Regiment that Staff Sgt. Carlson is attached to is descended in direct lineage from the 2nd Regiment of Dragons. This Regiment's first assignment was in 1836 at Fort Mellon on the shores of Lake Monroe during the Second Seminole War. To learn more about this unit, visit the Sanford Museum to see the "From Fort Mellon to Baghdad" exhibit.* I bought an Arabic phrase book which I studied on the way to an arrest. I am on break right now after having apprehended a guy for aggravated assault with a weapon and his brother for obstruction of performance of a military mission. Now we are getting ready to go back out and bust up an armed Baath Party group and haul them in. They can be dangerous. We never made it to that Baath Party deal as we ended up helping a man get two tractor trailer trucks from the person who stole them. We're still "surviving" in the bombed-out cigarette warehouse with bat crap all over the floor. Living space is tight, no way of getting away from other people to keep sane. I finally found out who Satan is, he's the landlord of this hell hole and he does not want us to leave here. He keeps turning up the heat and does not like us today because it's about 115 degrees outside. I am so tired of T-Rat meals. I haven't had much of a good meal in more than three months. Sometimes I buy something for lunch when I'm in Baghdad on patrol. I wish I had a mess of collards with ham hocks, or some of those big lima beans.

Flood insurance a priority for Florida residents

Even as communities hit by Hurricane Claudette recover, officials of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) remind renters and property owners that the most active portion of the 2003 hurricane season is still ahead, and they urge those in Atlantic Gulf Coast states to purchase flood insurance policies quickly to obtain financial protection from floodwaters and storm surge. "Buying flood insurance is one of the most important things people can do to help themselves recover from flood damage," said Michael D. Brown, FEMA Director and Under Secretary of Homeland Security for Emergency Preparedness and Response. "It's especially critical during hurricane season for residents along our coasts and inland to safeguard their property against the devastating effects of widespread floods." The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), administered by FEMA, makes federally backed flood insurance available in communities that adopt and enforce floodplain management ordinances to reduce future flood losses by regulating new construction. Currently, more than 4.4 million policies representing \$640 billion worth of coverage are in force in nearly 20,000 participating communities—most communities in the U.S. "Flood damage, unlike wind damage, is not covered by homeowner's or business insurance policies," Brown said. "This coverage must be purchased separately and is available only in communities that participate in the NFIP. There's usually a 30-day waiting period before a new flood insurance policy becomes effective, so don't wait until the water is rising." Brown also had a warning for people who think they can rely on federal disaster assistance in lieu of flood insurance. "Disaster assistance is only available when

the President issues a major disaster declaration," he said. "Even then, it is quite limited—and usually in the form of a loan that must be repaid, with interest. It is hardly a substitute for flood insurance, which also covers losses from small, localized flood events." "Flood insurance may be purchased through most insurance companies and licensed insurance agents," said FEMA's Mitigation Division Director Anthony S. Lowe, who administers the NFIP. Lower said the maximum coverage amounts for a single-family home are \$250,000 for the structure and \$100,000 for its contents. Renters may also purchase up to \$100,000 of coverage for their personal belongings. Maximum coverage for businesses are \$500,000 for buildings and \$500,000 for contents. The NFIP is a self-supporting program. All claims and operating expenses are paid from policyholder premiums, not tax dollars. Furthermore, it is estimated that NFIP building standards prevent \$1 billion in flood losses annually and reduce the burden of disaster relief costs on all taxpayers. For information about flood insurance, property owners should contact their insurance agent or call the NFIP's toll-free information line at 1-800-427-4661. Flood insurance information is also available on FEMA's Website at www.fema.gov/nfip. On March 1, 2003, FEMA became part of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. FEMA's continuing mission within the new department is to lead the effort to prepare the nation for all hazard and effectively manage federal response and recovery efforts following any national incident. FEMA also initiates proactive mitigation activities, trains first responders, and manages Citizens Corps, the National Flood Insurance Program and the U.S. Fire Administration.

their utility bill using the drop box located in the city hall parking lot will find the box relocated to the Frank Evans Center parking lot at 158 N. Country Club Road. This location is approximately one block north of its current location.

Residents who plan to attend upcoming city commission meetings, held the first and third Thursdays of each month, will need to report to the Lake Mary Community Center, located at 260 N. Country Club Road.

According to Litton, the renovations of the building, constructed in 1997, have been in the planning process for three years making it possible for officials to save the funds needed for the project. As a result, residents of Lake Mary will not feel the effects of the project through a tax increase.

"In late spring or early summer of 2004, we look forward to moving back into a renovated city hall, of which all Lake Mary residents can be proud," said Litton.

Dale contends by protecting the Celery Avenue corridor with a low density residential zoning it would not change the character of the neighborhood and his fami-

ly's way of life. McLain said he too was all for protecting the quality life in the area.

"I've invested my livelihood in the community too," he said. "We have 40 acres there that we built a new house on it..."

"My concern is unmanaged growth by the city of Sanford annexing a parcel at a time and developing under their rules is going to allow the community to be much denser than what I think is appropriate..."

Three and Out

Despite the urging of Dale and McLain, the remaining four commissioners could not reach a majority on what to do with the proposed land use amendment until their third vote.

County staff were seeking the approval of the commission on the basis that they would have the interlocal agreement with Sanford and the district overlay with the community completed by end of the year.

Commissioner Randy Morris said he was confident with voting in favor of the

land use amendment as long as the commission would have input in the agreements as they came forward before December.

"Bottom line, for the first time I feel an agreement is within reach," added Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide.

Commissioner Grant Maloy, however, did not share the same security in reaching a deal with the city as he said he felt uncomfortable with the unmade decisions.

"I almost feel like we need a meeting with Sanford commissioners to work these out," he said. "I'd feel much more comfortable if some of these details were worked out."

Commissioner Carlton Henley responded, "I feel like Commissioner Maloy. I don't feel like anything has been accomplished since last time."

And that is how the voting lines shaped out for the three-year-old issue. Maloy made a motion to delay the Celery Avenue land use amendment until next year, and the vote was split 2-2 with Morris and Van Der Weide objecting. Then Morris countered with a motion to approve the measure, and Maloy and Henley objected.

To avoid the risk of killing the plan all together, the commission then unanimously voted to delay the project to next spring.

Now that's the way to finish off a season.

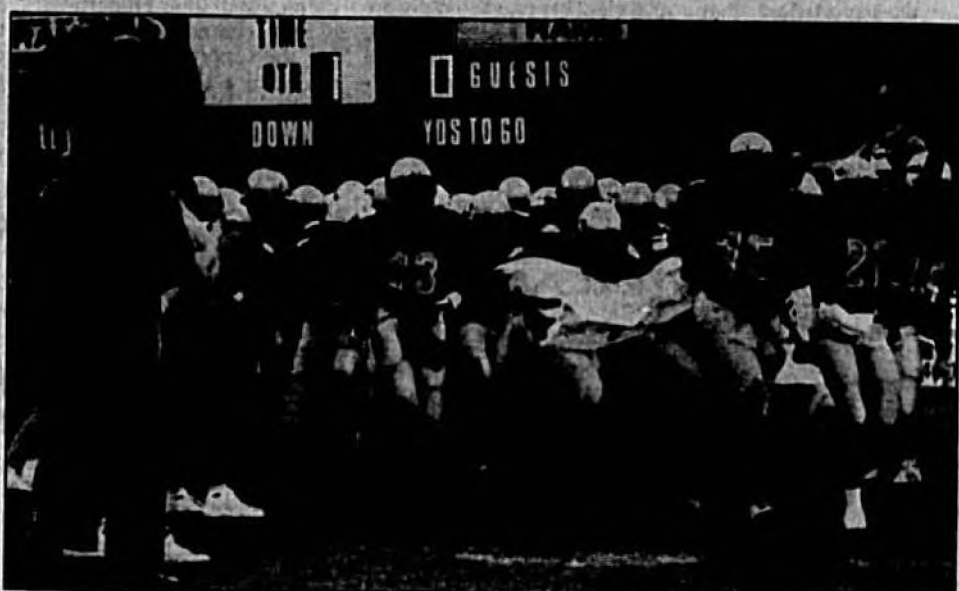

Hokies topples Golden Knights

No. 9 Virginia Tech (1-0) held off a valiant UCF (0-1) rally as the Hokies topped the Golden Knights 49-28 Sunday in Blacksburg, Va.

The largest crowd in the Commonwealth of Virginia history, 65,115 fans, witnessed the contest at Lane Stadium at Worsham Field.

The game featured both teams going on extended scoring runs as the Hokies started the game with 28 straight points before UCF answered with 21 straight of its own. Virginia Tech responded with a 21-7 run to close out the game.

Virginia Tech scored on its first four possessions while UCF went three-and-out three consecutive series to start the game.

Virginia Tech scored first as the Hokies marched 80 yards in 11 plays. Kevin Jones ran in from one yard out to give Virginia Tech a 7-0 lead. Jones set up the goal-to-goal situation with a 25-yard run earlier in the drive.

Virginia Tech continued to pour it on early as the Hokies scored on their next three possessions to take a 28-0 lead.

UCF finally got on the scoreboard with 6:43 to go in the second quarter when Ryan Schneider tossed an 11-yard touchdown pass to Tavaris Capers.

The touchdown pass for Schneider marked his 22nd consecutive game that he has thrown a touchdown pass. The streak of 22 consecutive games also tied the UCF school record held by Daunte Culpepper.

The Golden Knights marched in for their second straight touchdown as Alex Haynes scored on a 16-yard touchdown run to cut the deficit in half at 28-14.

U.S. disabled water ski team wins Gold Medal

The U.S. Disabled Water Ski Team won the team gold medal Sunday as the 2003 Disabled Water Ski World Championships concluded at Cranes Roost in Altamonte Springs.

The United States, which won a total of 32 individual medals during the four-day biennial event, finished with 14,302.6 points in defeating defending champion Great Britain, which tallied 14,072.1 points. Italy (9,926.1 points), Australia (9,313.8 points) and Switzerland (6,505.0 points) rounded out the top-five placements. For complete team and individual results, go to www.USAWATERSKI.org.

It marks the United States' fourth world disabled team title, but first since 1999. It also marks the first time since the inception of the world championships in 1993 that a

team has won the title on its own soil.

Competition at the Disabled Worlds included slalom, tricks and jumping events. Within each event, skiers who were partially (V2/3) or totally blind (V1), paraplegics or quadriplegics (MP1, MP2, MP3), and arm or leg amputees (with or without prostheses) competed against athletes with the same disabilities. Hosted by Altamonte Sports and sanctioned by the International Water Ski Federation (IWSF), the sixth biennial event featured 68 athletes from 15 countries.
