

Southern Hospitality Proven To Soldiers In Army Maneuvers

FIRST ARMY PUBLIC RELATIONS DIVISION, CAMDEN, S. C., Nov. 19.—(Special)—"Southern hospitality" is no longer just a phrase to thousands of Yankee troops participating in the First Army Maneuvers who are in the Southland for the first time in their lives. These men from the North-eastern states had read and heard about the famed southern hospitality—but now they are getting a real taste of it. And they like it.

Marching, riding, maneuvering over the 6,000,000 acre "battlefield" in the Carolinas, the men of Lieut. Gen. Hugh A. Drum's army are daily coming into close contact with the natives of these parts—establishing friendly relations and building up a basis of mutual understanding, the value of which is incalculable.

All out—that's the attitude the people of the Carolinas have taken with regard to entertaining the soldiers. They have opened up their hearts and their homes to these visitors—men who are far from their families, from the familiar bluff hills of New England. These soldiers could be mighty lonesome lad were it not for the warmth of

the southern hospitality. One man last weekend had a typical experience while sauntering down the shady streets of the town near his camp. He had nothing to do and but little money in his pocket. A friendly voice from a nearby porch called to him: "Come on up here, soldier, and talk a while."

Naturally, the man accepted and was virtually adopted. He was taken to a football game Saturday afternoon, a movie that night, church Sunday morning. He wanted to return to camp after Sunday dinner but his kindly hosts insisted he stay for supper.

Southerners are constantly offering automobile rides to First Army soldiers. Even grandmother and mother are in the spirit of the thing. On their way to town to take some soldiers along with them has been witnessed many times.

To keep the men entertained, country club members are turning over to them their clubs, balls and links wholesale during weekends. Hotel rates are cut, homes are opened up, dances staged and movies, bowling, roller skating and football games financed. In fact, anything with in reason, and some things that aren't, are made available, somehow or other.

The churches, of course, always welcome those who need companionship. Invitations to attend any of the week day or Sunday services are given out almost every time there is a gathering of soldiers.

Here's a welcoming speech by the spokesman for a country club in which a U. S. O. dance was in progress:

"You all are welcome here and we want you to go ahead and have a fine time. Pretty soon we'll arrange another affair like this one and you can come back again, but meantime we'd like to know you boys better. So don't forget, come to church Sunday or any time you want and I'll bet you meet some nice people who will ask you home to dinner."

Inviting lights glow nightly from the windows of churches. Inside there is a drink of ice water to soothe throats parched by a hot sun and hard work, easy chairs, magazines and newspapers, writing facilities, a piano which is the center of an in-

Treadway Again Named Chairman Of Polio Drive

ORLANDO, Nov. 19.—(Special)—Chester B. Treadway of Orlando has been named for the second year as state chairman of the annual "Fight Infantile Paralysis" campaign, according to word received here from Keith Morgan, national chairman for the Committee for the Celebration of the President's Birthday.

Mr. Treadway, managing director of the Florida Chain Store Association and chairman of the state Planning Board, was re-appointed leader of Florida's campaign on the basis of the "splendid program" conducted last year, according to Mr. Morgan.

Immediately following his appointment, Mr. Treadway selected W. Cecil Grant, Daytona Beach attorney, to act as State Organizer for the campaign. Grant, who will act under Treadway's guidance, will be in charge of appointing city and county chairmen and will work with these committees in organizing local charity events—dances, fashion shows and mile-of-dimes drives—throughout the state. He will serve without recompense, according to the state chairman.

Linton E. Allen, president of the First National Bank of Orlando, was named by Treadway for the second year as state treasurer of the campaign. Gordon R. Ewell, former newspaper man, was again named publicity director of the drive. Both Allen and Ewell also serve without salary. Manager of the Orlando offices of the campaign will be Mrs. Billie DeVane.

Although plans for the statewide celebration are not yet complete, the chairman announced the drive will be completed on January 30 when festivities will reach a climax in every community with a charity ball on the President's birthday.

Announcement of the appointment of county and city chairmen for the campaign will be made in the next future, Treadway said.

'Hoodoo' Doctor's Black Magic Tricks Disclosed By Trusty

A black hooded figure stands in flickering candle light before a smoldering image of Buddha, head bowed while he mutters mysterious, incoherent words of magic that raises his piercing eyes to his audience. A mystery of life is about to be revealed.

Holding a ring of bones in his hand, the figure stabs at his instrument for delving into the black magic of the unknown. From the ring is suspended a heavy cord, weighted by a curved slab of polished wood and circled by a large wheel.

Showdown Is Sought In Libya As Axis Armies Are Hunted By English Forces

Italians Claim Counter Attacks

Defenders Of Moscow Said Driving Back New German Attack

BERLIN, Nov. 21.—(AP)—Calling Americans "cultureless barbarians" and President Roosevelt a "poor fool," Dr. Robert Ley, head of the German Labor Front, told 15,000 laborers from 14 European countries that unless Europe "finds herself," she will be crushed by America. He accused his listeners that Moscow would fall in one way or another.

British ignored forces already within 10 miles of besieged Tobruk after an 80-mile advance in 26 hours, today were reported seeking the main bodies of Axis troops in Libya for a showdown battle.

A British spokesman said, "The main battle is not yet joined. Nothing is on a large scale yet."

The Italian high command asserted Fascist and German columns were "firmly sustained" in new British attacks in the Libyan offensive, and "passed to counter attack and repelled enemy armored formations."

The Soviet radio described "bloody fighting in progress" in the western sector of Moscow's 200-mile defense arc, and claimed the defenders are driving back a violent new German offensive.

Terrible fighting is planned near Kholm, where the Russians are claimed to be inflicting "tremendous" German losses.

In the Moshkoff sector, 67 miles west of Moscow, the Russians admitted the Germans had driven a wedge into the defense lines.

Ivan Maslov, Russian ambassador to London, said "Hitler's blundering in the East has completely failed."

American-armed British tank units, smashing as far as 80 miles inside Libya in a great offensive movement last night to reach the coast, were reported to have been shot of besieged Tobruk, outer defenses after smothering an Italian tank force in the first major test of U. S. war materiel.

The central British spearhead penetrated northwestward from Sidi Omar, near the Egyptian frontier, to reach on the esplanade above a maze of gullies, which led down to the sea, where a British garrison has been holding out since mid-April.

A number of Italian tanks and 150 Fascist prisoners were taken in an engagement enroute to the night, a desert caravan about 65 miles from Sidi Omar, the communique said.

The Russian line above Moscow appeared yesterday to be buckling back under the shock of a series of strong, new German offensives about the capital, but the southern Red anchor was reported holding firm at Tula against violent tank and infantry assaults. At least 100,000 German troops were in frontal action around Tula, which is 100 miles below the capital, and about Volokolamsk, some 65 miles to the northwest of Moscow, while other large invading forces were heating at the Kalinin defenses, 30 miles still farther north.

1st Lt. P. M. Vickery has been selected by a board of officers to attend Officer Candidate School at Fort Benning, Ga. Sergeant Vickery is the second man from Sanford selected to attend the officer's school. Frank Ray, the other candidate, is scheduled to complete his training near Dec. 15.

Of the 250 men in his regiment, Sgt. Vickery was the only person selected in this month's quota and he is the sixth soldier from the 124th Infantry to report to Benning.

At the beginning of the national emergency, the Sanford man was first sent to Camp Perry, D. National Guard, and participated in the Louisiana maneuvers. When he received his appointment to Sgt. Vickery was assigned to the Central Postal Directory at Benning.

Sergeant Vickery is the second man from Sanford selected to attend the officer's school. Frank Ray, the other candidate, is scheduled to complete his training near Dec. 15.

Weygand's Retirement

General Maxime Weygand, the one man in the whole Vichy government in whom the United States had confidence, has resigned. It is generally understood in this country that he was forced out as commander of French forces in North Africa by his old friend, Marshal Petain, who finally yielded to persistent pressure from Berlin.

It is now reported that General Weygand, following his resignation and word of encouragement to his army, has gone to the Riviera for a rest and to write his memoirs. But a youngster like Weygand—he is only 74—does not retire, nor is he yet ready to write his memoirs, with the world in such turmoil as it is at present and with his own country in such a degrading position as France now finds herself.

The very fact that Weygand resigned seems to us conclusive evidence that he has no intention of playing into the hands of the Nazis. If he had been sympathetic with their cause, or even with French collaboration with Germany, it would have been easy enough for him to have retained his job simply by agreeing to do whatever Hitler may want done.

But Weygand was not sympathetic. In fact, he hates the Germans and bitterly resents their invasion of his country. Without a doubt there must be smoldering within the breast of this old warrior all the enmity of Germany which an entire lifetime of fighting Germans is able to generate, as well as some hope that his days on this earth will not end until he has had an opportunity to square accounts.

There may be little or nothing which Weygand can do at the moment. He has no arms or equipment to give his army if he could raise one. He could not even hang on to the one he had in North Africa without inviting the complete subjugation of unoccupied France by the Nazis. But there is little doubt that when the time comes that the United States can supply the arms, millions of Frenchmen would flock to Weygand's banner.

We expect to hear more of this famous French general before the war is over.

Eliminating Nazi Fifth Columnists

Joseph Stalin had been waging undercover warfare against Germany for six years prior to Hitler's invasion of Soviet Russia last summer, according to Joseph E. Davies, former United States Ambassador to Moscow, who reveals in the American Magazine that the famous Russian "purges" of the late thirties were in fact the elimination of Fifth Columnists.

"In the light of present facts and after an examination of the record," Mr. Davies writes, "there can be no doubt that those defendants were in the employ of the German and Japanese high commands. Practically every device of the German Fifth Column as we now know it in Europe, South America, and even in the United States, was disclosed in the testimony of the Russian Quislings."

"But the Russians were acutely aware of the menace as early as 1935. As fast as the Germans and Japanese built, the Russians destroyed. That, in brief, is the real story behind the Russian purges—and one of the chief reasons for the magnificent Russian resistance to the Nazi juggernaut. Much of the world contrived the famous trench trials and purges from 1935 to 1938 to be outrageous examples of barbarism, ingratitude and hysteria. But it now appears that they indicated the amazing foresightedness of Stalin and his close associates."

Mr. Davies points out that a unique feature "in this latest Nazi stab-in-the-back" is that not a word has appeared about any inside work for the Nazis behind the Russian lines. There were no Siedler Heinlein, no Czechoslovakian Hachas, Berans or Chvalkovskys, no Slovakian Tisos, no Belgian Degrelles, no Norwegian Quislings in the Soviet picture.

"The testimony at the trials," Mr. Davies writes, "revealed that Trotsky had been planning to take advantage of a general European war to foment revolution within Russia and oust Stalin. But when the war didn't come in 1938 or 1937 he grew tired of waiting and played into the hands of the Nazis by contacting the German (General Staff, Working through Red Army leaders inside Russia, Trotsky agreed to co-operate with the Germans and pave the way through espionage and sabotage for an effective invasion."

"Many commentators have concluded that the purges seriously weakened the Red Army. I believe that the exact opposite is the truth. The house cleaning of traitors eliminated some of the higher commanders, but it brought about the promotion of younger and frequently more imaginative men who, while lacking the experience of their predecessors, made up for it in initiative and loyalty."

"There are no saboteurs, secret agents or Fifth Columnists to co-operate with the invaders because the Russians were sufficiently farsighted to eliminate them before it was too late."

"That is a fact which other liberty-loving nations might well ponder."

ONE OF THE ODDITIES of the War Between the States is that it began and ended on the same man's farm. Four years earlier, when the war started, McLellan owned a farm on the battlefield of Bull Run and, since his home was appropriated as headquarters for one of the Confederate generals, decided that if the war was to be fought in that territory he had better go elsewhere. He moved some 200 miles to southwestern Virginia, at that time outside the area of hostilities. But the action caught up with him and the war that started on his old farm, ended on his new one.—Your Life Magazine.

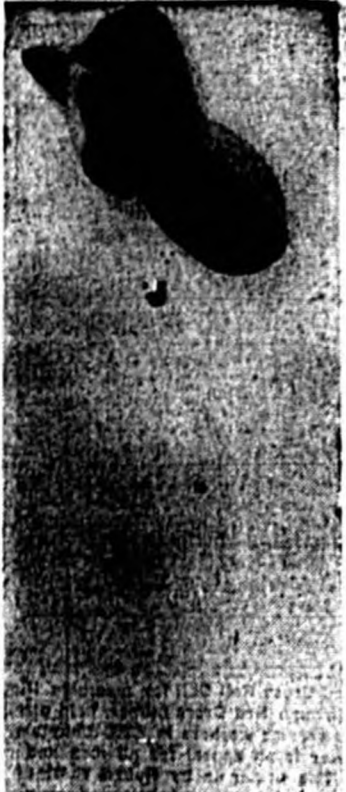

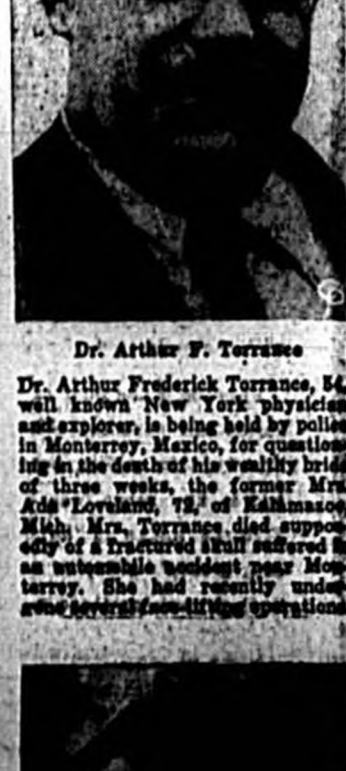

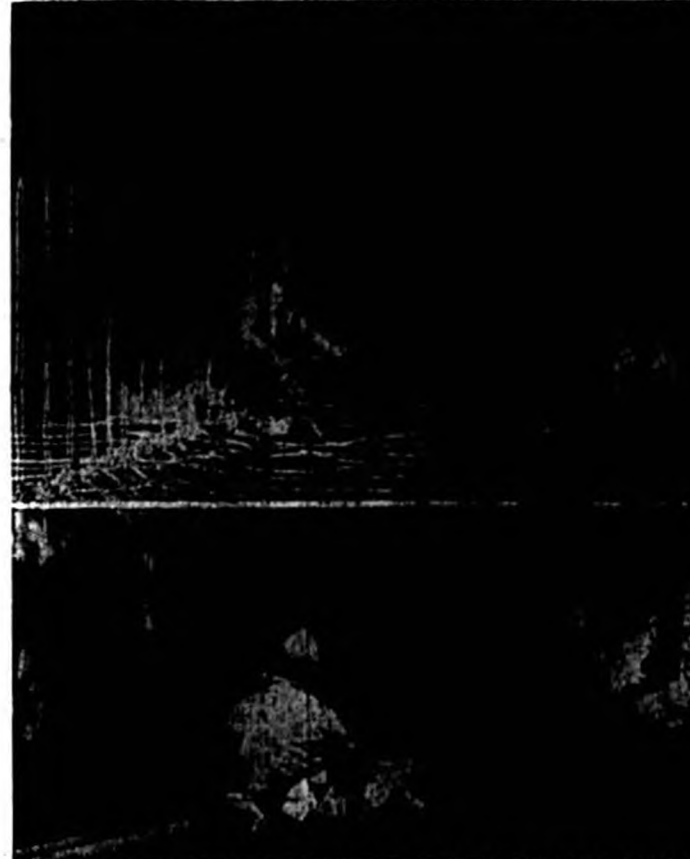

THE SOUTHERN GARDEN
By Camilla Bradley
EDITOR OF HOME GARDENING MAGAZINE

In a Southern community where gardening is a year round activity, we must be alert during the winter to protect our plants against a sudden freeze. Northern gardeners have spent the last month getting ready for the inevitably low temperatures ahead, but here in the South an unexpected freeze is apt to catch us unprepared and our gardens will suffer accordingly. One cold snap can be just as devastating to a totally unprotected garden as a whole season of protracted cold.

Proper mulching is one of the best forms of protection that can be given to tender roots. A number of materials, including peat moss, bagasse, pine needles, Spanish moss, well rotted saw dust, oak leaves and straw, have been used with success. The use of leaves or straw requires a little special handling. These substances, being very light, should be weighted down with a little soil to keep them in place in spite of strong winds. Dairy manure is recommended as a mulch for shrubs and trees in some localities. This is effective only in those sections where consistently low temperatures prevail. During alternate spells of warm and cold there is a danger of stimulating new growth which would ultimately be destroyed. However, this is a good practice in sections where plants remain dormant all winter. Under these circumstances the manure forms a warm blanket over the roots until Spring when it can be turned into the soil to do its work as a fertilizer.

Victory Is Claimed By British In Big Massed Tank Fight In Northern Africa

German Advance On Moscow Costly

Soviets Report That Foe Wants Moscow Despite Any Cost

The long-suffering British garrison at Tobruk has broken out around the port and German and Italian armored forces split and partly cut off in eastern Libya are being ground between British tank columns, the Eighth Army headquarters declared today.

ANKARA, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The opening of a British offensive in North Africa, with American equipment playing an important part, has pulled neutral Turkey nearer to the British-Russian alliance, diplomats here believe.

Moscow is a prominent Turkish general, back from an inspection of the German-Russian battlefield, was reported to have described Nazi losses as "enormous" and the general situation of the German war machine not so good as it is represented to be.

The Germans announced today the capture of Rostov-on-Don, the "pivot" to Russian oil barrels, in bitter fighting while on the North African front the British claim a victory in the first collision of the massed tank forces.

London says a terrific "night" has knocked out half of the German tanks and surrounded 700 more near Tobruk. The Soviets report that the Germans apparently are under orders to take Moscow at all costs, but the advance is slow and costly.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Germany is prepared to transform her armistice with France into a formal peace settlement in return for sweeping concessions in North Africa, reliable quarters in Europe informed the Associated Press today.

These quarters said Germany's desire for air bases, routes for the transport of men and supplies to help withstand the British offensive in Africa lay behind the vigorously pursued negotiations of the past ten days.

One European political observer said it was apparent the Nazis attached more importance to winning France in Africa than having Italy in the fold. High French and German leaders will meet soon, possibly to discuss upon some new form of collaboration or even out-and-out French capitulation and full membership in the Axis, reliable sources reaching the Associated Press from Europe said Friday night.
