Axis Capture Of Bir Hacheim In Northern Africa Is Reported

Re-adjust Lines For Caucasus Thrust; RAF Planes Blast Northern France

(By Associated Press) The Germans reported the capture of Bir Hacheim in northern Libya today after days of bitter fighting against the British and Free French.

London sources acknowledged the report probably is true, but military circles believe the fall of the inland

a crushing blow to the Allies.

British armoured column with artillery and infantry, assisted with Axis forces east of Bir Hacheim yesterday in relieve pressure on that besieged Free French fortress which has withstood a steady two-week battering.

Axial land and air forces smashed against the stronghold with redoubled fury on direct orders from Berlin and Rome. It was reported by prisoners captured to British.

Axial land forces led by McGermanian tank formations driven from the surrounding areas north did get inside the ring of mines last Sunday, but the French artillery and machine gun fire repelled them.

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Auto Traffic In State Is On Fast Downward Spin

TALLAHASSEE, June 11 (AP)—Florida automobile traffic, which increased steadily from 1934 to 1942, is on a downward spin at a rate exceeding that of any other state.

Gasoline consumption is off 17.8 percent for the first four months of 1942, reflecting a greater proportionate decrease in highway travel than in city street traffic.

Traffic decreases for April contrasted with April of last year, ranged as high as 42.5 percent at a checking station on U. S. 17 near the St. Johns River at Sanford. The station counted an average daily traffic flow of 1,822 vehicles.

The research and records division of the State Road Department reported yesterday that the traffic counts for February were 24.6 percent less than for the corresponding month of 1941. The average decrease for all states was 7.6 percent.

Walter Parker, director of the research division, said U. S. 92 between Miami City and the highway with the most traffic in Florida. The counting station there clocked 4,700 vehicles daily in April, but was 11.1 percent less than the year before.

Extensive Work Will Start At Base Next Week

Release Of Steel Rail For Siding Secured From WPRR

Extensive construction at the Naval Operational Training Base here is expected to start at the first or the middle of next week. Lieut. G. T. Swiggum, USNRC, said that work will begin on the signing of a 20-year mutual guarantee treaty with Russia.

Work has been going on at the base for several days, but the full program will get underway soon. At present, temporary buildings are being erected at the huge field.

Lieut. Swiggum revealed that the release of steel rail to extend the sidings of the railroad spur at Fort Reed has been secured from the War Production Board. And this will be completed within a few days. The siding will have 1,150 feet added to it in order that incoming materials may be conveniently transferred to the base.

It is expected that materials, including lumber, wire, rock and all products needed in constructing the various buildings, runways and taxi strips, will begin to arrive immediately. Rains the last several days have had little effect on the present work at the huge site, which will have an appropriation of nearly \$8,000,000. However, when the extensive work starts next week, rains then would prove a handicap. The Watt and Nichols Construction Company of West Palm Beach is the general contractor.

Nazi Vengeance Squads Wipe Out Czech Village

LONDON, June 11, (AP)—German vengeance squads, estimated to number 1,000 persons Wednesday, killing all the men and deporting the women and children, on the ground that the population harbored the two assassins of Reinhard Heydrich, the late German chief of state.

The communiqué did not indicate the outcome of the fighting in this area, where the Russians recently said they had thwarted Nazi plans for a big Spring offensive. On the present front, the Russians are holding their own.

Fall Of Inland Defense Anchor May Not Be Bad Blow To United Nations

(By Associated Press) The United States, Britain and Russia officially disclosed today they have reached a full understanding on the urgent task of creating a second front in Europe in 1942.

A White House announcement issued simultaneously with the British statement in London said President Roosevelt and Russian Commissar Molotov have reached an agreement. It didn't state specifically when or if the powers decided to open a second front. Simultaneously the British announced the signing of a 20-year mutual guarantee treaty with Russia.

The department's monthly crop statistics for Jan. 1 conditions, estimated this season's grapefruit production at 39,818,000 boxes, compared with 43,038,000 for last season and the 1930-39 average of 24,383,000.
