Axis Capture Of Bir Hacheim In Northern Africa Is Reported

Re-adjust Lines For Caucasus Thrust; RAF Planes Blast Northern France

The Germans reported the capture of Bir Hacheim in northern Libya today after days of bitter fighting against the British and Free French.

London sources acknowledged the report probably is true, but military circles believe the fall of the inland

crushing blow to the Allies. British armored columns with artillery and infantry moved with Axis forces east of Bir Hacheim yesterday to relieve pressure on that beleaguered French fortress which has withstood a steady two-week battering.

Axis land and air forces smashed against the stronghold Tuesday with redoubled fury—direct orders from Berlin and Rome, it was reported by prisoners taken by the British.

Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini—apparently annoyed by the brilliant defense of the inland anchor of the British desert line by soldiers of a country they thought they had made impotent, sent orders that the post must be taken at any cost.

As many as 50 Nazi Junkers bombers rained bombs on the Bir Hacheim compound. Forty Stuka dive bombers also participated, without forming the Free French flank.

Axis land forces led by the German-Italian tank formations moved forward from the ring of mines and barbed wire, but the French artillery and machine gun fire repulsed them.

Auto Traffic In State Is On Fast Downward Spin

TALLAHASSEE, June 11 (AP)—Florida automobile traffic, which increased steadily from 1934 to 1941, is on a downward spin of a scale exceeding that of any other state.

Gasoline consumption is off 17.5 percent for the first four months of 1942, reflecting a greater proportionate decrease in the travel than in city street traffic.

Traffic decreases for April, contrasted with April of 1941, ranged as high as 45.5 percent at a checking station on U. S. 17 near the St. Johns River at Sanford. The station counted an average daily traffic flow of 1,322 vehicles.

The research and records division of the State Road Department reported yesterday that the traffic counts for February were 24.6 percent less than for the corresponding months of 1941. The average decrease for all States was 24 percent.

Walter Parker, director of the records division, noted U. S. 92 near Plant City as the highway with the most traffic in Florida. The count for February was 4,725 vehicles daily in April, but this was 12.1 percent less than the year before.

Extensive Work Will Start At Base Next Week

Release Of Steel Rail For Siding Secured From WPR

Extensive construction at the Naval Operational Training Base here is expected to start at the first of the middle of next week.

Plans Are Being Made For Second Gas Registration

Plans for the second gasoline rationing registration of some 25,000 Seminole County motorists are being worked out by the Rationing Board and A. B. Peterson, secretary. It was announced today.

The date of the new registration program has not been announced at Washington. It is expected to be the latter part of this month or early in July. The present rationing cards expire July 1.

Mr. Peterson revealed that a change will be made in the previous signing in that Sanford motorists will sign at the Armory instead of schools. The registration will be extended over a period of six days in order to avoid the rush caused in the previous signing. Mrs. Roby Loring will assist Mr. Peterson in organizing registrars for the city. Various places throughout the county, to be used as registration places, will be announced later.

According to instructions received so far from Washington, A cards for automobiles and D cards for motorcycles will be issued. Drivers who need more gasoline than provided by the A card will be given an application blank to fill out and mail to the rationing board. None of the extra gas cards will be issued at the registration, it was added.

Nazis Shift Attack Back To Kharkov

Fall Of Inland Defense Anchor May Not Be Bad Blow To United Nations

(By Associated Press) The United States, Britain and Russia officially disclosed today they have reached a full understanding on the urgent task of creating a second front in Europe in 1942.

A White House announcement issued simultaneously with the British statement in London said President Roosevelt and Russian Commissar Molotov have reached an agreement. It didn't state specifically when or if the powers decided to open a second front. Simultaneously, the British announced the signing of a 20-year mutual security pact with Russia.

(By Associated Press) The Germans, held off at Sevastopol, have taken the offensive in the Kharkov sector, 100 miles north of Moscow, re-adjusting their lines for an eventual thrust at the Caucasus.

Meanwhile, the weather held the RAF from Germany for the second consecutive night. Nazi leaders in the low countries and northern France were blasted. Rome reported a raid on the Taranto naval base.

German troops have started another offensive on the Kharkov front after last month's heavy fighting in which the Nazis had claimed the "annihilation" of three entire Red armies there. The Soviet announcement early today.

Nazi Vengeance Squads Wipe Out Czech Village

LONDON, June 11 (AP)—German vengeance squads, utterly wiped out Lidice, a Czech village of 1200 persons Wednesday, killing all the men and deporting the women and children on the ground that the population had harbored the two assassins of Reinhard Heydrich, the late German ruler of Bohemia-Moravia.

Complaining this most savage single act of repression in the history of German occupation of continental Europe. Goats and German soldiers ransacked the village, leaving nothing but rubble, the German-controlled radio announced from Prague.

Lidice is a village of coal-miners and woodworkers a few miles west of the Czech capital and not far from where Heydrich, the "gangster" favorite, was wounded by two patriots while driving along a winding road two weeks ago.

The assassins, who leaped upon Heydrich's car with a roadside pistol and bomb, have not been caught.

Shortly after Prague and Berlin radios had announced the fate of Lidice "as the hiding place of the Heydrich murderers," German authorities in Prague disclosed that 25 more Czechs had been executed today in the capital and 50 in Brunn for a total of 308—exclusive of the Lidice dead—to be slain since the attack on Heydrich.

In London, authorities of the Allied and exiled governments of the continent estimated that 500,000 persons had been shot or hanged in all Europe since the beginning of the German conquest.

Only yesterday during Heydrich's elaborate funeral rites in Berlin, Goebbels' Chief Himmler vowed continuing vengeance on the killers. The slaughter of Lidice was his meagre sequel.

House Group Boosts Tax On Cigarettes

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee today decided to increase the Federal tax on cigarettes from 5-1/2 to 7 cents a pack in order to raise \$60,000,000.

Chairman Douglas said the committee planned to displace the Treasury request to increase the tax on cigars and other smoking devices designed to raise another \$40,000,000. The committee rejected the Treasury request to establish a tax differential to be established between 10 and 15 cent brands of cigarettes.

U. S. Midway Victory Causes Greatest Jap Navy Disaster

A Soldier Says Good-Bye to His Girl—and Dog

2 Enemy Fleets Converged On Island, With Half Of Ships Either Sunk Or Hit

(By Associated Press) Dramatic accounts of the Midway battle today estimated half of the Jap ships were sunk or damaged in the greatest naval disaster in Jap history. The Hawaiian Islands were saved invasion by two enemy fleets.

An estimated 180 enemy planes participated. It was a "better show than the world series" in the way jubilant crew members of one of the United States Army's B-17 bombers summed up the battle. Two big

The huge invading force, it was said, was in addition to the individual number of ships sent against Dutch Harbor about the same time.

The battle of Midway moved so rapidly that the final returns still are not scored. It ended, for the time being at least, Saturday night, when pursuing American forces took the Jap fleet remnants in the dark.

Until the final accounting the score as reported by Admiral Nimitz stands at two and perhaps three Japanese aircraft carriers sunk, with all of their planes, one destroyer, one battleship and eight to 10 other ships damaged.

Nimitz reported the loss of one American destroyer damaged to one United States aircraft carrier, and the loss of an undetermined number of planes.

Pipeline To Illinois Will Be Constructed

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The War Production Board gave permission yesterday for the immediate construction of an oil pipeline from Longview, Texas, to Salem, Ill., to increase the petroleum flow to the East but gave no indication that it would bring any relaxation of the gasoline rationing in the Atlantic States.

The board announced that the pipeline would provide "an increased supply of oil to the East Coast area within six months," but Donald M. Nelson, chairman of the WPB, said it probably would be used primarily for fuel for the Army minimum oil and secondarily for gasoline, is now \$21 a month.

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—A slight decline in orange production was noted yesterday by the Department of Agriculture in placing the estimated national production at 83,545,000 boxes. This compared with 84,038,000 boxes last season and a 1930-39 average of 60,283,000.

The department's monthly crop report, compiled on June 1, conditions, estimated this season's grapefruit production at 39,812,000 boxes, compared with 43,025,000 for last season and the 1930-39 average 24,383,000.

LONDON, June 11 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden disclosed today that Russian Foreign Commissar Molotov has been in Washington, where he had "most satisfactory talks with the President."

Officials said the blaze was confined to a section of the ship's general cargo.

Alleged German Spies Are Nabbed

BALTIMORE, June 11 (AP)—Three German-born Americans, active leaders of the city's German American Bund, were arrested today by the FBI on charges of espionage. The men were charged with passing information to Germany and Japan.

The accused, including Gerhard Wilhelm Kuntz, former bond head where whereabouts now are unknown, and Anastase Vostanitsky of Thompson, Conn., world leader of the national Russian revolutionary party, were indicted on a charge of conspiracy to violate the 1917 espionage act.

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2 Powerful Army Teams Will Face Gridiron Pros

WASHINGTON, June 11, (AP)—Two of the most powerful football squads ever put together, chosen from the cream of the nation's gridiron stars now in the Army, will start training Aug. 22 for a whirlwind six weeks campaign, against teams of the National Professional Football League.

Six games already have been definitely scheduled, at Los Angeles, Cleveland, New York, Boston, Brooklyn and Madison, Wis., and there probably will be five or six other appearances of the Army All-Stars, including one at Denver. Entire proceeds of all except one contest thus far scheduled will go to Army Emergency relief. One team will be known as the "Eastern Army All-Stars," the other as the "Western Army All-Stars," the latter probably making its headquarters in the vicinity of Chicago. It is not planned that the two army squads shall meet in the course of their spectacular careers, but it would not be surprising if they yielded to popular demand and stage an "army championship" after they have finished battling the professionals about.

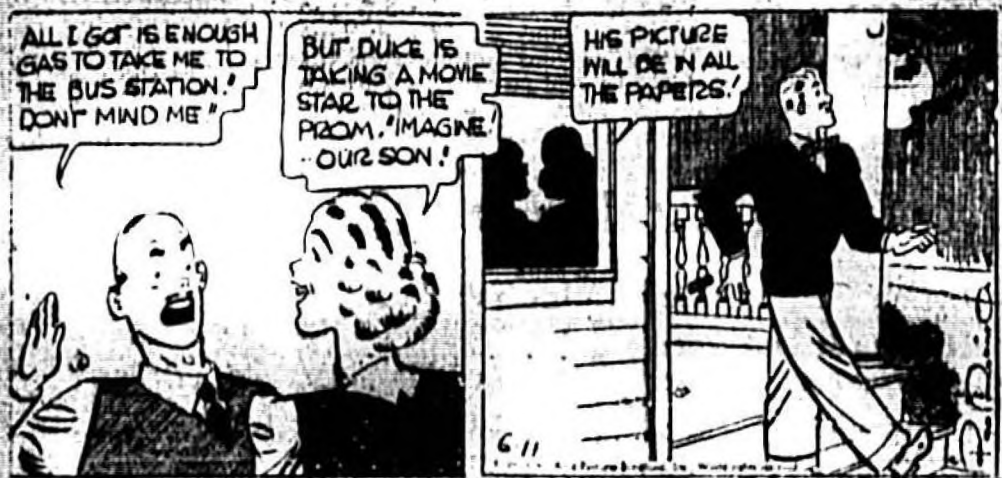

U.S. Merchant Ship Rams And Sinks Sub

HAVANA, June 12, (AP)—A United States merchant ship rammed, shelled and apparently sank a submarine which had machine-gunned her as she was near a Cuban port about 10 days ago, press dispatches from a Cuban coastal city said Thursday.

The submarine surfaced a few miles offshore. Two men came up on deck and immediately began machine-gunning the U.S. ship.

Artillerymen aboard the American ship replied with one of their ships striking the submarine.

The captain then put his ship across the submarine and threatened to sink it with his main gun.

Flying Tigers Shoot Down Enemy Planes

Japanese Take Nancheng And 2 Other Chinese Cities In Sweeping Advance

(By Associated Press) The Flying Tigers of the AVG today shot down seven and possibly eight of 18 Japanese planes in an air fight over Kweilin, the capital of the Kwangsi province. Kweilin is an important base for Chinese forces in the south.

It has been under almost daily air bombardment, and the AVG evidently has been assigned to meet this threat.

It was reported that the Japanese have taken Nancheng, and two western Chinese cities in sweeping through the Kiangsi province.

Menacing the Japanese advanced position in western Chekiang province, strong Chinese regular and guerrilla forces have begun attacks in the last few days behind the lines the Japanese pushed in the encirclement of Chusan, Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek's high command announced last night.

A communique declared that Chusan still held out despite the vital Chekiang-Kiangsi railway into the interior of China, and said the Chinese forces behind the Japanese lines were destroying bridges and even recapturing some small villages.

Two fierce fights were reported raging for control of the last 170 miles of the railway still denied to the Japanese despite their hold on both the Hangchow and Nanchang terminals.

One struggle was in the vicinity of Chongshan, 12 miles west of Chusan. The other was spread over a large triangle south of Nanchang.

The Chinese high command acknowledged the invaders had captured Taunglin, 40 miles south of Nanchang, but said they met stiff resistance, which developed into a bitter battle near the town.

Allied Agreement Is Seen As Prelude To Second Front Against Germany

(By Associated Press) Marshal Von Bock's Nazi armies are reported attacking in a great new battle around Kharkov today amid indications the zero hour may be near in the long heralded German summer offensive.

The Soviet command acknowledged the drives making headway against bitter resistance.

Seventy-four Allied Axis assaults in the Crimea. The Reds admitted the Nazis are pushing forward the attack on the Crimean front.

Meantime weather grounded the RAF for the third successive night.

The Germans have thrown strong tank and infantry forces against Soviet defense positions on the Kharkov front and fierce battles have developed the government announced.

Stiff fighting continued to rage in the Crimea where the Germans were smashing against the Soviet naval fortress of Sevastopol. The Red army was reported fighting heavy losses on the Crimean front.

In the Crimea, fighting there during the night, Soviet command announced, nearly 10,000 German officers and men were killed.

The communique stated there were no significant changes in the situation, although earlier bulletins had reported a breakthrough which combined with the great battle of the Crimea and the Ukraine brought the war in the Russian front to the highest pitch of the year.

There was much aerial combat in the Black sea and again far to the north of the Arctic.

Soviet command stressed the importance of the Russian front.

In contrast to the pace of the German summer offensive, Russian command indicated the German summer offensive was moving along at a terrific pace through the most important of the Red army's defenses in the Ukraine sector.

The agreement between the United States, Britain and Russia, according to the press and peace agencies, was a peace treaty.

Effective at 12:01 A. M. June 15, the basic unit value of "A-1" and "B-1" cards now in use will be increased from 3 to 6 gallons to provide card holders with sufficient motor fuel to tide them over the two-week extension period.

The temporary plan originally was set to expire June 10. The extension was ordered to permit the training of registrars and ration boards in the new and more stringent system.

Card holders who have exhausted all the units of their ration cards by June 15 must apply to their local ration board for an extra allotment.

OFA said, however, that such an extra ration should be no gasoline needed between July 1 and July 15, since the ration to be allocated by the present card was intended to fill all morning needs to the end of this month.

The new plan which replaces the present temporary plan will apply more rigid and more complete control over the flow of gasoline throughout the Eastern shore area.

Frank Higgins, rationing board secretary, said that the board has no regulations that were needed for the emergency plan, but that the reason some card holders are rationing gasoline is that they are not making necessary home visits.
