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Board has questions for charter school

'Real concerns' about finances of proposed school

SANFORD — The Seminole County School Board still has some unanswered questions about Milestone Charter School, which will apply for approval on Tuesday.

The School Board on Jan. 11 decided to conduct additional research into the proposed charter school before approving it. School-district staff has met with officials of the charter school to gather information about the financial viability of the

plan.

"We did meet with Milestone Charter School officials," said Marion Dailey, director of instructional support services for the school-district. "We still have some real concerns, mainly about budgets for the school."

Key to the school-district is the rela-

tionship between the charter school and Ramsay Corporation, based in Coral Gables, which is securing financial credit for the school and giving technical support.

School Board members have said they want to ensure that policy for the school will be set by the Milestone Charter

School Board, and not by Ramsay Corporation.

In addition to providing support to charter schools, Ramsay Corporation also operates residential training programs with the Department of Justice and group homes for children, company officials said.

Ramsay will provide technical support and is agreeing to secure a line of credit for Milestone, but it will not have a role in school policy, said Michael Lyons, who founded Milestone Charter School in See School, Page 8A

New start-up airline eyes Sanford

SANFORD — Officials with the Orlando Sanford Airport are hoping to attract a start-up domestic airline based in New York which is looking into serving up to 44 cities.

Sanford's airport is competing with the Orlando International Airport for the service of JetBlue Airways, headquartered in New York's JFK International Airport. The company has \$130 million in financial backing, a record for an aviation start-up. Investors in JetBlue include Presidio Capital, George Soros and Chase Capital.

In February, JetBlue will begin service from New York City to Buffalo, N.Y. and Ft. Lauderdale. The company plans to serve 11 cities with 10 aircraft by the end of its first year

of operations.

JetBlue officials hope to expand routes to include 44 cities nationwide, from Portland, Maine, in the north, to Salt Lake City, Utah, in the west.

"JetBlue is one of our main targets," said Victor White, director of the Sanford Airport Authority.

White said the key to attracting the airline is improving the domestic terminal facilities at Sanford's

airport. The domestic terminal currently lags behind what other airports can offer in amenities and service. However, that will soon change because groundbreaking ceremonies were held Friday for a \$25 million, seven-gate expansion of the domestic terminal. The project is expected to be complete by January 2001, although airport officials hope the work may be complete in See Airline, Page 7A

Work begins on terminal expansion

SANFORD — Ground-breaking ceremonies were held Friday for the seven gate, \$25 million expansion of the domestic terminal facilities at the Orlando Sanford Airport. Construction began this week on the project, which is expected to be complete by January 2001.

Victor White, director of the airport, said the first new gate is expected to open during the summer of 2000.

"Hopefully we'll have some more announcements about

additional airlines we're bringing to the community," White said.

Plans for the expanded terminal include second-level boarding for up to seven flights at a time, and the capacity to handle up to three million passengers annually.

As part of the domestic terminal expansion, a ramp will be designed to give the airport

greater flexibility in servicing a variety of planes. The ticketing, baggage claim, concession and retail areas will also be expanded.

The domestic terminal, which will also handle overflow international traffic, will be expanded to 120,000 square feet.

The airport handled 1.2 million passengers in 1999, prior to See Terminal, Page 7A

County library system applauded by youth group

Alliance for Youth honors library's commitment to the future

SANFORD — The Seminole County Public Library System has received a "Library of Promise" certificate from America's Promise - The Alliance for Youth.

Suzi Goldman, the county's director of libraries and leisure services, was notified of the honor by Katherine Harris, Florida's Secretary of State. Seminole County Chairman Carlton Henley has signed a resolution in recognition of the certificate.

In thanking Goldman for her dedication and commitment to assisting children and being a Library of Promise, Harris said it was extremely pleasing how the county libraries have taken on the role "as literacy centers."

Harris said that good libraries help improve the quality of life for all Florida families. "It means so much to me to have the library community embrace this program," she said.

The Alliance for Youth organization is led by General Colin Powell and is dedicated to encouraging communities across the country to provide youth with resources that will aid them in becoming productive citizens.

The County Board of Commissioners wrote a resolution that said the county's library system nurtures healthy minds and provides structured activities for youth during non-school hours.

There are five branches of the county library system — Central Branch in Casselberry, East Branch in Oviedo, North Branch in Sanford, Northwest Branch in Lake Mary and West Branch in Longwood. The county library system is partnered by the county's school libraries and also with the Orange County Library System.

County Museum of History plans for growth of site

SANFORD — Within five years, the Museum of Seminole County History may be a large museum complex, and an outstanding focal point for tourists as well as local residents.

One of the first steps will be undertaken at the Jan. 25 meeting of the Seminole County Commission when Library and Leisure Services Director Suzi Goldman is scheduled to make a presentation regarding the five-year plan.

Goldman will ask the commission to reallocate \$8,000 in the Historical Museum's 1999/2000 budget. The money would be moved from the present line item of Contractual Services, to allow \$3,000 for personal services and \$5,000 for operating supplies. She will also ask the commission for direc-

tion in implementing the program for development, while maintaining proposed plan and established budget.

In a letter mailed to friends of the museum earlier this month, County Historical Commission Chairman Linda M. Batman outlined the restoration planned for the main museum building:

- Acquiring the original infirmary building which was part of the old folks home (present museum). A plan for renovation will make the building ready for exhibits, archival presentations and an area for meetings and exhibit design.

- Increasing and use the technology of archival preservation of pictures and documents. The Internet will also be an integral part with the high tech equipment.

- Creating an architectural area to exhibit farm equipment, See Museum, Page 8A

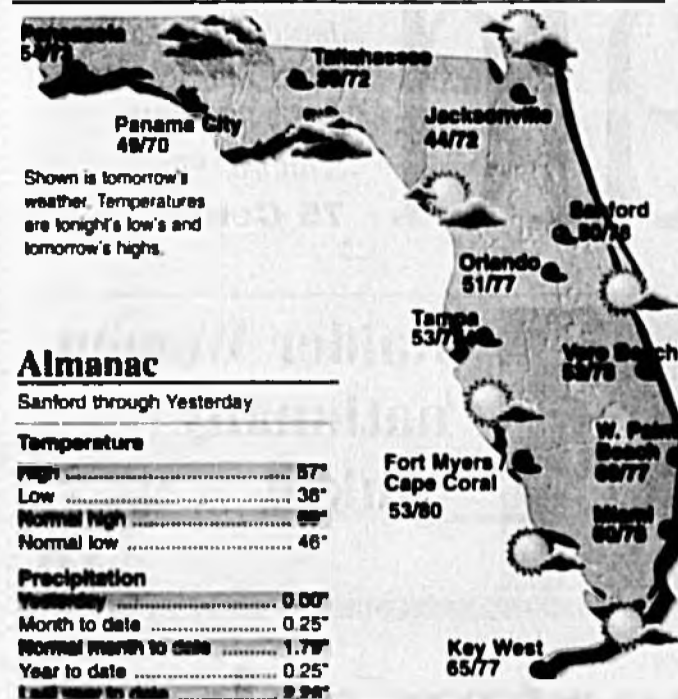

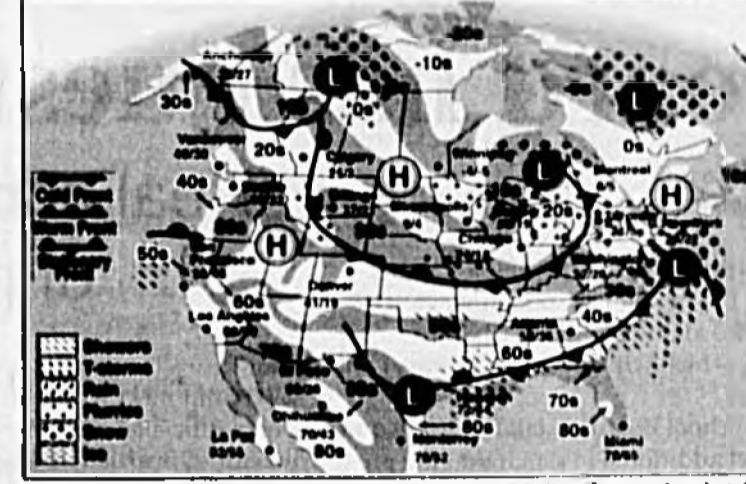

Everyone should plant a tree — not just on Arbor Day

Jan. 21, 2000 was officially declared as Arbor Day in the state of Florida. Unlike other designated days however, the event can, and usually is, observed in various communities on different days. For example, the Sanford area will see an Arbor Day event on Feb. 14.

The concept of the day is to call attention to the importance of planting trees. Trees are part of the life cycle of mankind, and without them, our oxygen supply would be depleted greatly. It brings to mind a television public service announcement several years ago: A small lad and his father visit a museum where a tree is on display. The youngster has never seen a tree, because fires and land development have eliminated them from the face of the earth.

Yes, planting a Drake Elm at the Student Museum in Sanford Friday, and planting the "Lil' Senator at George Touhy Park on Feb. 14, aren't going to revitalize our area's woodlands, but they stand as a symbol of the need to do such planting.

Florida lost a great deal of woodlands in last year's forest fires. That alone should be an omen to all of us regarding the need to replace them. Nature is doing some of this by itself. People driving by the forest areas devastated by the fires can see how new trees are springing up. But some of the replanting must be done by the people.

We need trees — certainly for the wood they produce, but mostly for the continued beauty of our land and the life-giving air they produce.

Miranda overturned — not all agree

Long after the Supreme Court's 1966 Miranda decision requiring police to tell criminal suspects their rights before questioning them, I spent six months with a squad of New York City homicide detectives.

Generally, police do not welcome reporters hanging out in their workplace, but a veteran member of the squad was a fan of Charlie Parker and had read some of my writing on that nonpareil alto saxophonist. With that detective's imprimatur, I was able to be there so often that the other detectives became used to me.

They would tell me some of the particularly sickening details of murders they had to clear. Without exception, they took the job personally and were determined to find and put away the killers.

I wanted to find out if they felt that the Miranda warnings were impediments to justice. Over time, I asked each one separately about Miranda while we were also talking about other matters.

With only one exception — the youngest and newest member of the squad — each said essentially the same thing. Their comments, which are similar to those of a good many other police officers around the country, are particularly pertinent since the Supreme Court will decide during this term whether Miranda warnings will continue to be mandatory to justify admitting confessions in federal prosecutions.

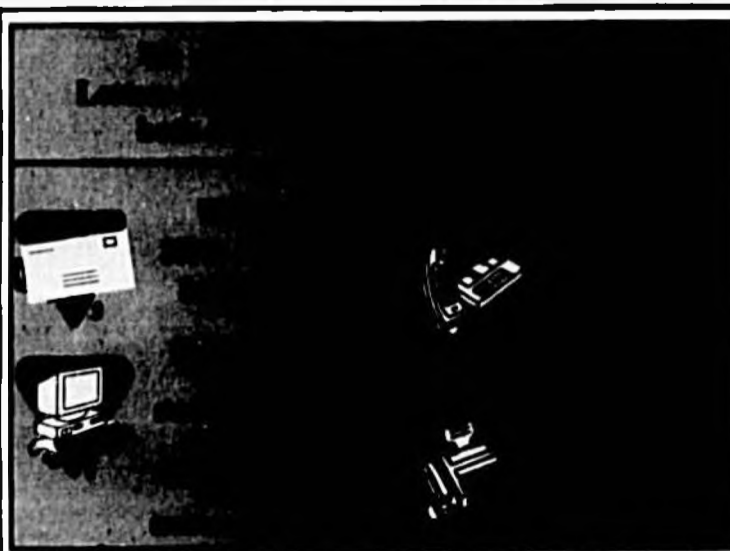
The case, Dickerson vs. United States, comes to the court from the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals. It ruled that Section 3501

of the 1968 Omnibus Crime Control Act requires that voluntary confessions must be allowed in evidence in federal cases, even if they were not preceded by Miranda warnings. The warnings can continue to be given, but will not determine the validity of the confessions so long as they are voluntary, considering all the circumstances of the interrogation.

Moreover, if the Supreme Court agrees with the Fourth Circuit, individual states will then be able to legislate their own versions of Section 3501 and Miranda will become only a shadow of its former self.

The homicide detectives I queried regarding Miranda said that at first they had angrily resisted the Supreme Court justices who insisted on handcuffing police officers, yet had never been in danger of losing their lives pursuing suspects on mean streets.

But as significantly more of their arrests held up in court because of Miranda, they became at ease with the warnings.

On the other hand, the single most determined opponent of Miranda's mandatory warnings will argue against them before the Supreme Court. Paul Cassell, a professor at the University of Utah College of Law, has been selected by the

Court for this historic role.

In the Nov. 30 issue of Criminal Justice Weekly — a valuable new magazine that covers key cases and trends in criminal law — Cassell engaged in a debate with Professor Yale Kamisar of the University of Michigan's law school.

"In recent years," Cassell said, "the Court has shown itself disenchanted with rigid rules that exclude reliable evidence from criminal trials.

Instead, the Court has placed increasing emphasis on the search for truth as the fundamental value underlying the criminal justice system. Look for the Court to uphold the Fourth Circuit's ruling in Dickerson."

Yale Kamisar, however, recalled what Justice Hugo Black said during oral arguments in the Miranda case: "If you are going to determine the admissibility of a confession

each time in the circumstances... one by one... it is more than we are capable of doing." And it is more than increasingly overburdened lower-court judges are capable of doing.

And Kamisar added a point made by Justice David Souter in *Withrow vs. Williams* (1993): "In protecting defendants' Fifth Amendment privilege against self incrimination, Miranda safeguards a fundamental trial

right." Even the one holdout among the homicide detectives I asked about Miranda softened his opposition as he saw the Charlie Parker admirer leading the squad in confessions without raising his voice or his hand. He would spend a long time in the cell getting to know the suspect.

It didn't always work, but Miranda did stand in the detective's way.

Yale Kamisar is confident the Supreme Court will not get in Miranda's way.

There are prosecutors and national police organizations, to be sure, urging the Court to overturn Miranda. But far from all cops on the street agree.

Nat Hentoff is a nationally renowned authority on the First Amendment and the rest of the Bill of Rights.

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Debate over flag more politics than principal

The controversy over whether to continue to fly a Confederate flag from the dome of the South Carolina state capitol is more about politics than principle. A serious discussion of race and opportunity would not be wrapped around a flag. But in an election year all appeals to facts and common sense are put aside in favor of demagoguery, division and appeals to voting constituencies.

There are serious arguments in favor of removing a flag that was hoisted in 1962, not 1862. The flying of a Confederate flag at the capitol was a response to the growing power of the civil rights movement and had little to do with "heritage." But just as clear are the political games being played by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and its fellow journeymen. This isn't about a flag. If it was, as black economist Walter Williams has noted, they would be protesting the American, not the Confederate, flag, because slavery existed much longer under the Stars and Stripes than in the brief confederacy represented by the Stars and Bars. No, this is about embarrassing white Republican presidential candidates in hopes that they will call for the flag's removal and thus alienate sufficient numbers of white South Carolina voters to hurt GOP chances in the elections.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson — upset that, while he was defending expelled high school thugs in Illinois, NAACP President Kweisi Mfume stole the limelight — is now calling for a boycott of Georgia on Super Bowl Sunday and even wants black football players to make some sort of protest. Georgia has a likeness of the Confederate flag incorporated in its state flag. Maybe Jackson thinks black players will refuse to play or refuse their pay. No way.

Vice President Al Gore noted

that "only the GOP White House hopefuls" refuse to disavow the flag because they are "so scared of the extreme right wing." Yet, as the Washington Times reported, when he was governor of Arkansas, Gore's boss, Bill Clinton, signed a bill that designates a star in the Arkansas state flag as symbolic of the Confederacy, and Arkansas law observes an annual Confederate Flag Day the Saturday before Easter. Gov. Clinton made no effort to repeal that law during his 12 years in the Statehouse. It would have cost him votes then. Now he and Gore think disavowing the flag can win Gore votes.

Lowering the Confederate flag in South Carolina will not improve the lot of one African-American. It is a continuing diversion by so-called "black leaders" to keep many of their followers beholden to them and to the Democratic Party. The real problems for blacks who are poor (and thankfully their numbers have dwindled significantly in recent years) are economic and educational, situations that have less to do with race than with family structure.

Poverty figures for blacks and whites have declined in the last 60 years. In 1940, 87 percent of the black population was considered poor; 48 percent of whites were also poor. By 1995, according to the Census Bureau, black poverty had declined to 26 percent and white poverty to 9 percent.

The sharpest drop in black poverty occurred before most civil rights legislation and the so-called War on Poverty in the '60s. The census figures show that black poverty ceased its rapid decline about 1970 and has stayed close to that level ever since. A major reason is the enormously high birthrate among black, unmarried women and lack of male supervision, leadership and good role modeling in families. Seventy percent of babies born to black

women in America are out of wedlock, nearly three times the illegitimate white birthrate. The fallout from such unstable family situations often is reflected in school where, as reported in the trade newspaper Education Week, 58 percent of fourth-graders in the inner cities can't read.

Shouldn't such figures be more frightening than a piece of cloth flying from a state capitol? Why aren't "black leaders" doing something about this,

other than asking for more government money to subsidize failed programs? Putting the black family back together ought to be of greater importance than taking down a Confederate flag. But actually doing something to help needy people would bring success, and success is the last thing demagogues want. It costs them votes, political power and money.

Mariner Post-Acute Network files Chapter 11 bankruptcy

In light of a bankruptcy announcement made this past week by Mariner Post-Acute Network, the Florida Agency for Health Care Administration is on alert for any quality of care issues at Mariner-owned nursing homes in the state.

The nursing home chain offi-

cially filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Wilmington, Del. This past Tuesday, as it pursues a reorganization plan, Mariner owns and operates 28 nursing homes throughout Florida, comprising approximately 3,100 beds. The closest home to Sanford is located in DeBary.

"For months, we have actively tracked Mariner-owned homes and other chains in financial trouble, monitoring for any quality of care issues," said Ruben I. King-Shaw, Jr., AFCA Executive Director. "All Mariner homes in Florida have recently been subject to these inspections and to date, we've found no serious concerns related to financial or

fiscal issues. We will continue to closely monitor the care provided to Mariner patients through regular and frequent inspections."

The agency's monitoring is part of a broader contingency plan that includes financial tracking and analysis of troubled nursing home chains. Since January of 1999, AFCA has dedi-

cated personnel and resources to review each publicly traded chain's performance, including stock prices and corporate Securities Exchange Commission filings.

In addition to financial analysis and quality of care monitoring, the agency receives regular bed availability reports from nursing homes around the state should the need arise to place

patients in other facilities.

Based on our own market research and frequent conversations with Mariner officials, our early warning system appears to be working," said King-Shaw.

"We are taking responsible steps and working with the nursing home industry to see that patient health care needs come first and continue to be met."

"We have developed the management and technical expertise to handle much more capacity than we are currently handling," Carmany said. "We want to control our growth to make certain we don't exceed our capabilities, but we are prepared for growth of 750 to 1000 percent this year."

Also on tap, according to Carmany, is new products. "I think we'll be supplying thermal transfer labels and pen feed labels before the end of the year."

Carmany foresees sales of \$3 to \$4 million in the next three to five years.

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Sanford business plans \$2 million expansion

SANFORD — A company which manufactures ambulances and specialty rescue vehicles is planning a 35,000-square-foot expansion of its Sanford facilities.

American La France, located at 700 Aero Lane, plans to expand its existing 45,000 square foot manufacturing facility to 80,000 square feet, a capital investment of \$2 million.

The company currently employs 114 Sanford area residents, and expects to employ another 108 as a result of the expansion. The average annual salary is \$32,000.

"It's a good deal for the city," said Sanford Mayor Larry Dale. "That's more jobs for people."

In addition to the manufacture of vehicles, American La France also distributes medical supplies and equipment wholesale.

No date has been determined for when the company would begin the expansion project, according to city officials.

During the last two years, American La France has purchased nearly \$1 million of goods and services annually from Sanford area businesses. The company expects their purchasing to increase 15 to 20 percent as a result of the proposed expansion.

To fend off competition from Texas for the project, the Sanford City Commission during a 7 p.m. session Monday will consider awarding \$31,500 in economic incentives to match incentives that the Seminole County Board of Commissioners will also consider.

In addition, the City Commission will consider the waiving \$20,000 in building permit and plans review fees.

The total state contribution to the incentive offered would be \$252,000.

Commission to discuss Ordinance 3205

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission meeting on Monday will likely draw a large crowd, with a proposed ordinance requiring social service programs and other businesses to get permits to operate within the city on the agenda.

Under the proposed city-wide ordinance, which has stirred heated debate, new social service programs would be required to receive approval by both the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Commission, similar to the way the city approves on-site sales of alcoholic beverages.

In addition to social services, other programs affected by the ordinance would include churches within the downtown business district, temporary labor services, day care facilities for six or more people, residential care facilities for 15 or more residents, outdoor noncommercial amusement facilities, retail sales and services, pawn shops and bail bond companies.

The Planning and Zoning

Commission said that it also would like hospitals, medical clinics, hotels and motels, funeral homes and crematoriums to be required to seek permitting under the ordinance.

Proponents of the ordinance say it represents long-needed planning that will prevent the clustering of agencies in areas such as Goldsboro and the historic district.

"This represents good planning," said Sanford Mayor Larry Dale. "It is something we've needed for a long time. As for the controversy over social services, we're not prohibiting them. We're simply making them a conditional use."

Meanwhile, many leaders of social service programs and church clergy say that city leaders need to be careful to maintain an ability within the city to assist the needy.

Opponents of the proposed ordinance have said the city is trying to limit the number of social service agencies serving the needy.

Monday will be the first hearing on the ordinance by the City Commission. It will require two hearings to become law.

Programs already legally established would not be affected, unless their services change substantially. However, new programs would need to meet changed zoning requirements.

The programs would be separated by at least 1,500 feet from similar businesses or agencies and would have to be at least 300 feet from any residential area. The programs would also need to demonstrate that they would not be detrimental to the character or development trends in the area.

According to a city survey provided by the Department of Engineering and Planning, out of 20 social service type of programs such as the Salvation Army in Seminole County, 14 are located in Sanford.

The majority of the programs are clustered in Goldsboro and the city's historic district, city officials said.

The 1990 U.S. Census lists 16.3 percent of Sanford residents as living below the poverty line.

Much of the debate concerning the ordinance has centered upon a proposed program to provide meals to the needy within Sanford's historic district.

Jean Metts, director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, plans to hold the dinners for the needy several days per week from 4:30 p.m. to 7 p.m.

The agency is located at 407 W. 4th Street, within an area zoned for special commercial use, near homes within the residential historic district.

Metts has said the ordinance could be detrimental to incoming social service agencies.

On Jan. 10, Metts accused the City Commission of fostering racial prejudice within the historic district through the proposed ordinance. She will offer a formal apology for the remarks on Monday.

The City Commission will meet 7 p.m. Monday at Sanford's City Hall.

a pioneer development of the citrus and celery industry. The cattle, turpentine and fishing industry will be expanded as a living museum complex.

Although the five-year plan is extensive, no budget or revenue sources have been established.

For the present museum building, the five-year plan calls for restoring the exterior, replacing the roof and wooden floor, updating public restrooms, repainting, renovating the patio and basement, and other work.

For the overall complex, plans suggest acquiring the infirmary building for a multi-purpose building for agriculture and cattle exhibits, building an exhibit

pavilion, fencing the enclosure, putting up picnic tables, and other work.

Storage areas and many other improvements are also listed in the Historical Society's plan.

The present Seminole County Historical Museum building is on the grounds of the Five Points Complex. The building is a typical Florida Stucco, built in the bungalow style of the 1920s, and was the county's first and only "Old Folks Home" opening in 1926. In 1964, the building was converted to county agricultural offices, and officially became the museum in 1983.

Society President Douglas Stensyrum, in a letter to the county commission, wrote, "We real-

ize the tremendous demands being made upon the commission in this period of unprecedented growth in our county and throughout our area. We hope, however, you can continue your support of the Historical Society's vision for the museum. With the implementation of this complex program, we believe the museum will be, in five years, a very valuable part of the cultural life of Seminole County."

The five-year plan is scheduled for presentation before the commissioners at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 25, in the County Commission Chambers.

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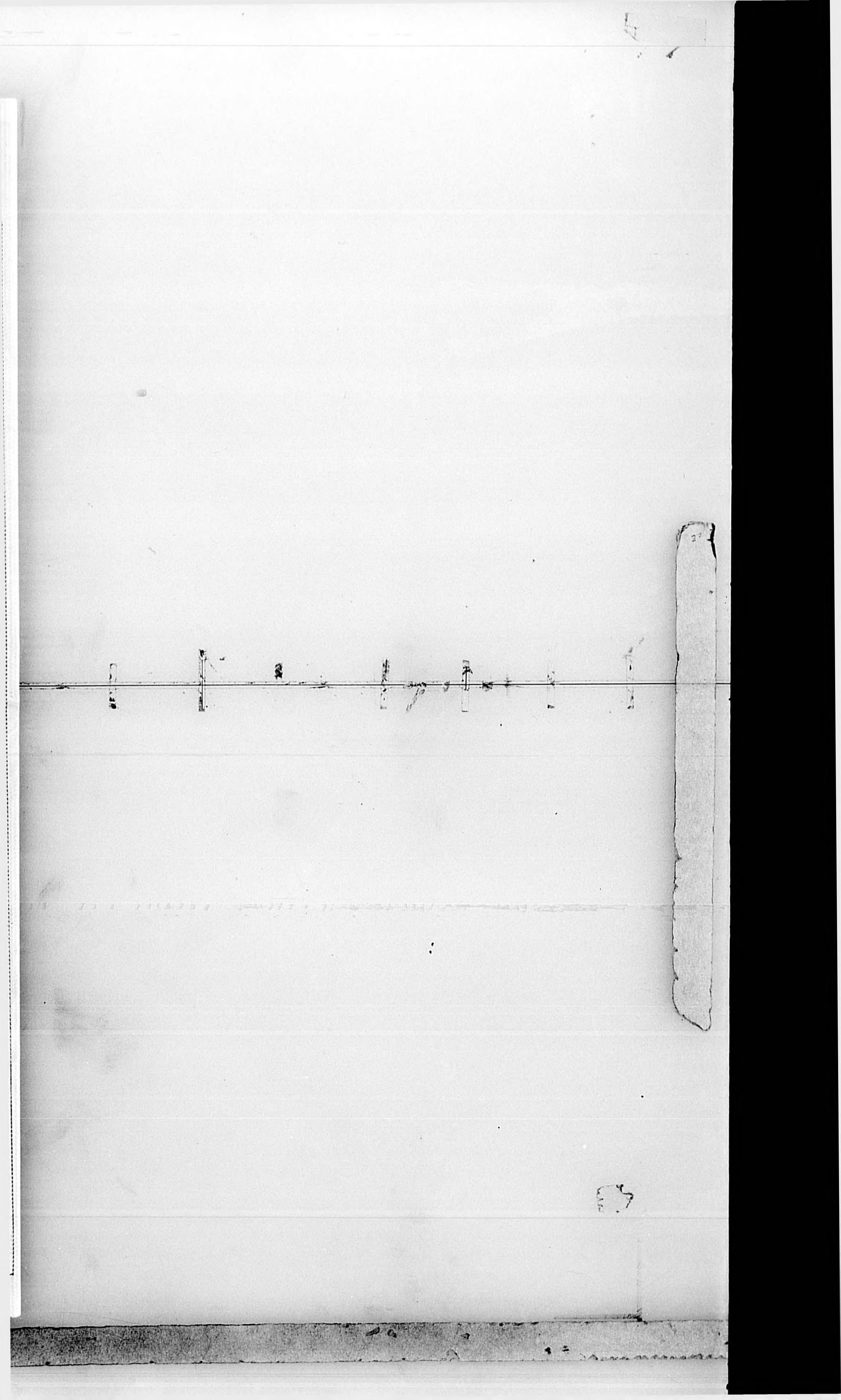
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Church leaders to battle Monday

With ranking in hand, Raiders challenge No. 4 CFCC

SANFORD - The Seminole Community College women's basketball team had to lose a game before the national pollsters paid attention.

At one point the Raiders of coach Ken Patrick won 14 straight games and did not lose game from late November through early January. But it

was not until after a loss to Daytona Beach Community College last Wednesday that the local group got its due.

SCC, which is now 21-3 on the season, claimed the No. 17 spot in this week's national poll and the No. 4 ranking in the Florida Community College Athletic Association state poll.

Despite the recognition, the Raiders still trail Central Florida Community College of

Ocala (No. 1 in the state and No. 4 in the nation), defending state champion Gulf Coast Community College of Panama City (which owns a win over SCC and is ranked No. 5 nationally and No. 3 in the state) and Daytona Beach (No. 15 in the nation and No. 2 in the state) in the voting in both polls.

SCC is also ranked lower than defending National

Champion Trinity Valley College from Texas (No. 13), which the Raiders beat soundly on a neutral floor in Mississippi two weeks ago.

SCC will get a huge test of its ranking tonight (Saturday) as it heads to Ocala to challenge the CFCC-Patriots (21-2), the defending Mid-Florida Conference champions.

CFCC has been tough on the Raiders in recent years, but if

there is a ray of hope, a comparison of recent like opponents show SCC beating a team from Puerto Rico 78-34, while the Patriots only prevailed 67-60 over the same squad the very next day.

The Raiders will play their next home game on Wednesday, February 2nd, hosting Daytona Beach starting at 6 p.m.

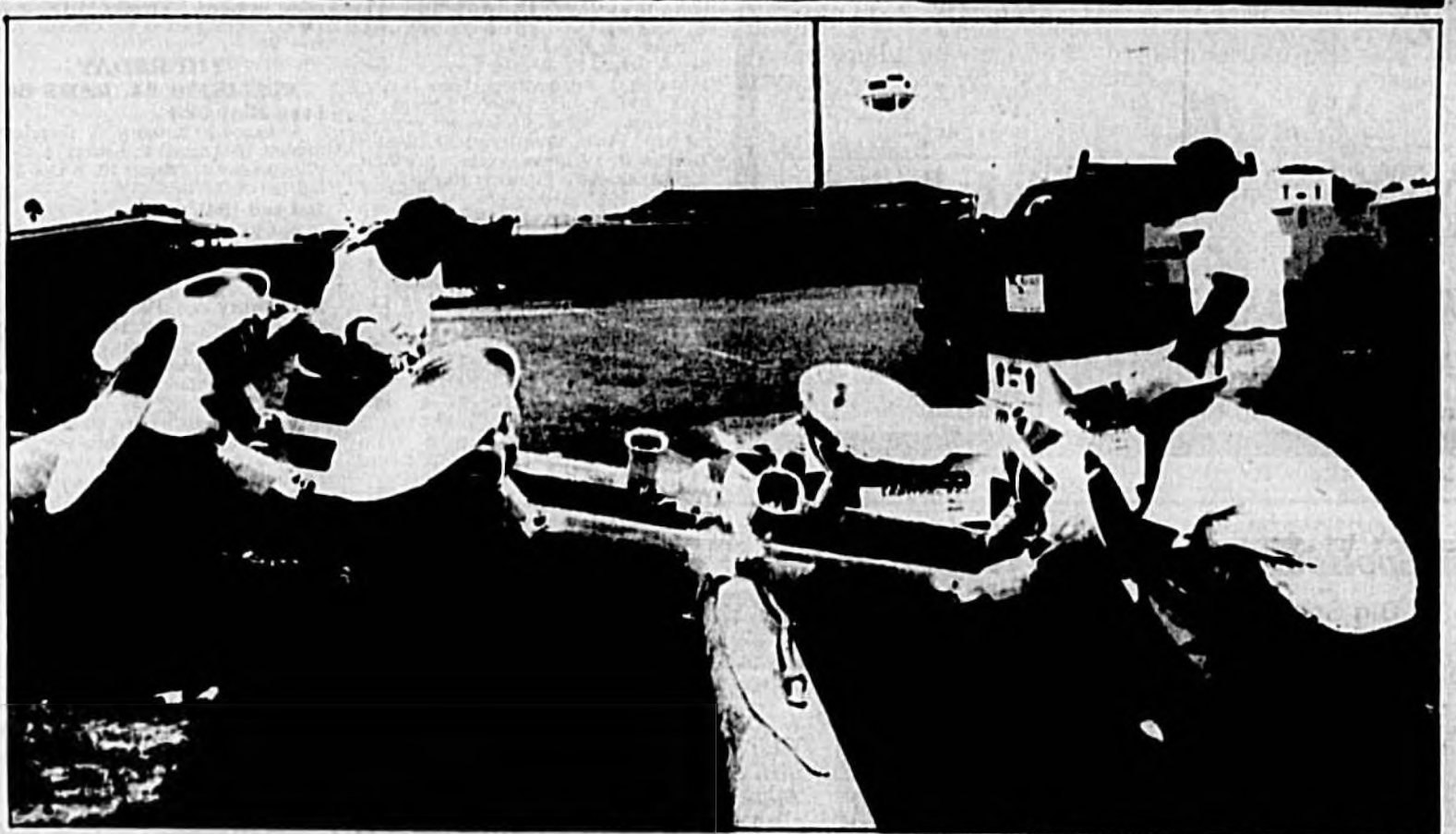
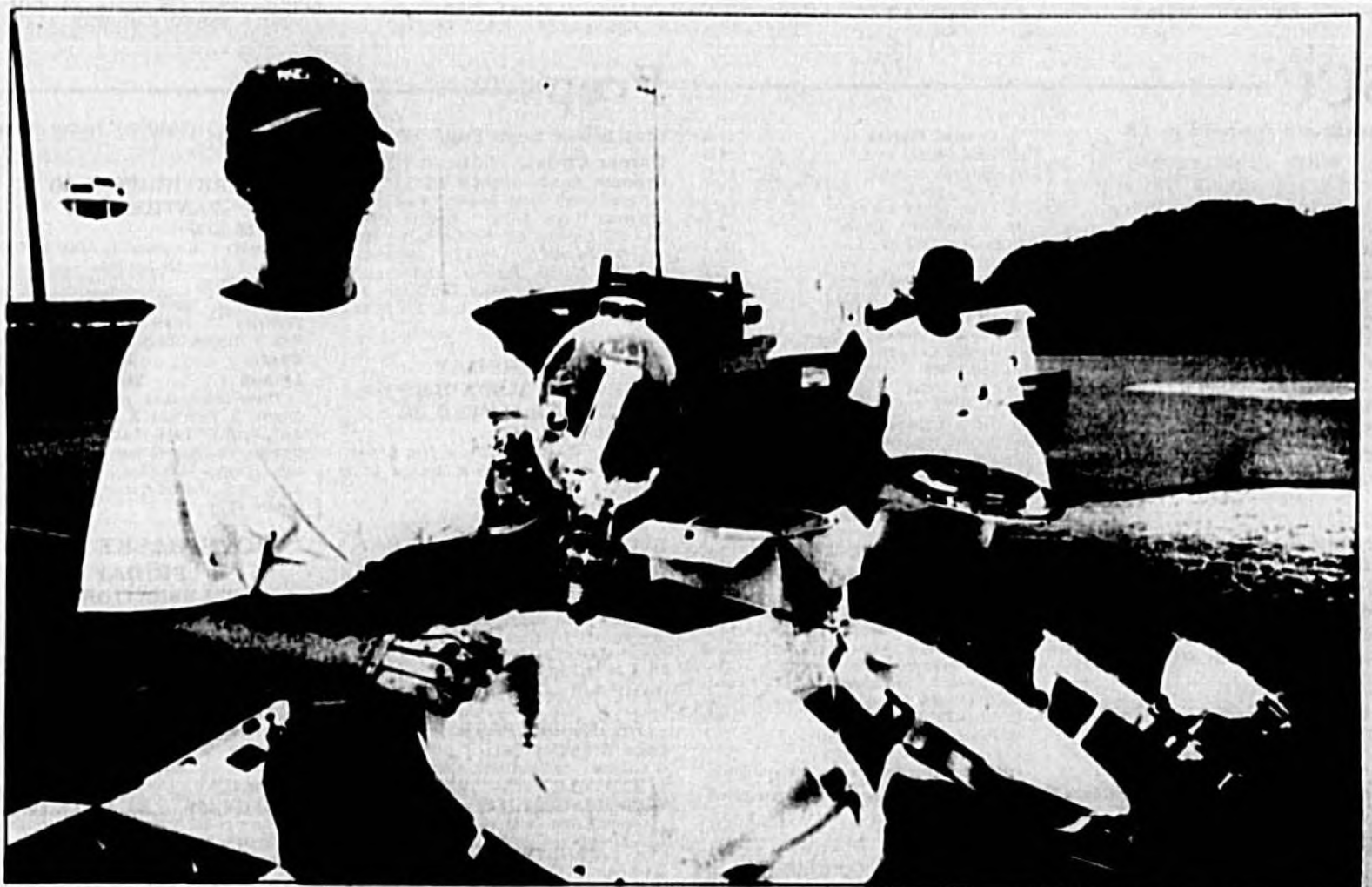

LIGHTS GO UP AT ZINN BECK FIELD



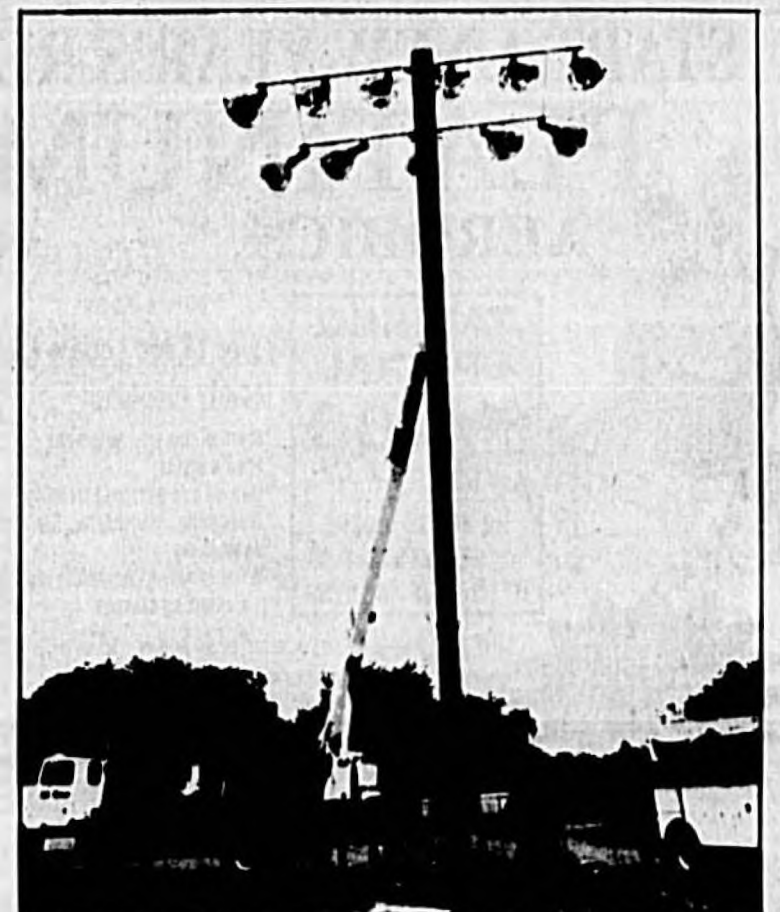

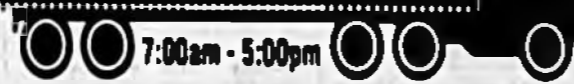

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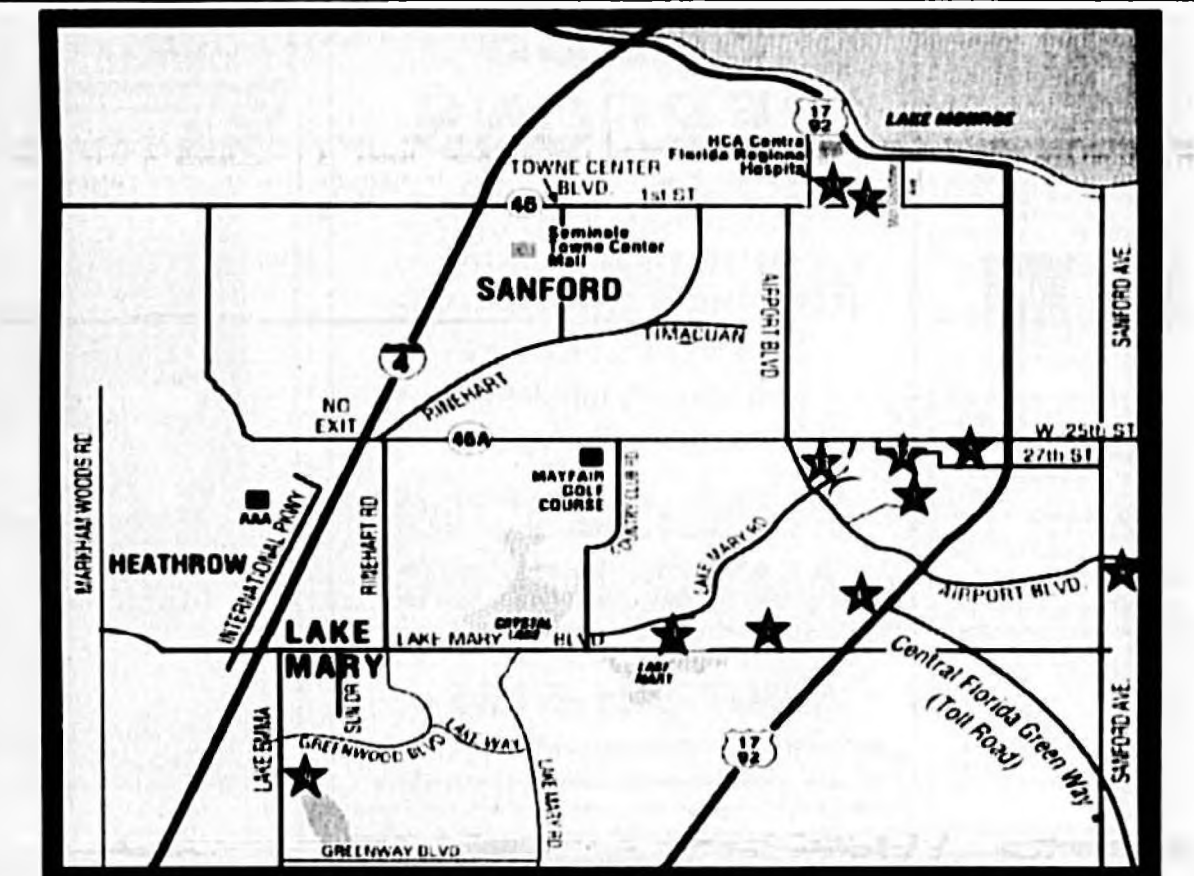

Coffeemakers perfect for one-cup cookery options

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: Some time ago, you had a STUMPED in your column who wrote about a book called "Canteen Cup Cookery" (recipes for cooking a meal in your canteen cup), which was given out to soldiers during the Second World War. You couldn't find it anywhere and wondered if one of your readers might have a copy of the book or a source for it. Did you ever get a reply from anyone? If you located it, I'd really like to know.

DEAR JOHN: Unfortunately, we never did — though we received a number of letters from World War II

veterans who remembered having used it while in the field. Recently, however, we read a review of a book called "Cooking Without a Kitchen: The Coffeemaker Cookbook" by Peter Mazonson (MCB Publications, 10922 Whisper Hollow, San Antonio, TX 78230, \$7.95; your local bookstore can order it for you). This intriguing little volume requires no expensive purchases and only one utensil: an electric coffee maker. The review reads, "Perfect for the traveler who is tired of room service, the college student who has no cooking skills, RV owners trying to cook as they bounce down the road and sportsmen trying to keep it simple."

We don't know why the recipes in the "Coffeemaker Cookbook" couldn't be adapted for use with a can of Sterno and a canteen cup... or even a flak helmet should you happen to have one handy.

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: Can you find me directions for hand-knit leg-warmers? My daughters would love me forever if I could knit some for them in colors of their choosing.

DEAR MARY: Here's what we found. One size fits all. **LEGWARMERS** Using knitting worsted (experiment with gauge; in ribbing slightly stretched, 3 stitches = 1/2", four rows = 1/2") on Number 9 or 10-1/2 needles, depending on weight of yarn used, cast on 27 stitches. Ribbing: Row One, Wrong Side P 1, * K 1, p 1; repeat from * across. Row 2: K 1, * p 1, k 1. Repeat from * across. Work in ribbing increasing one stitch at each edge every 2" nine times, working added stitches into ribbing pattern (45 stitches). Work even in ribbing until piece measures 21". Blind off loosely in ribbing. Sew back seam.

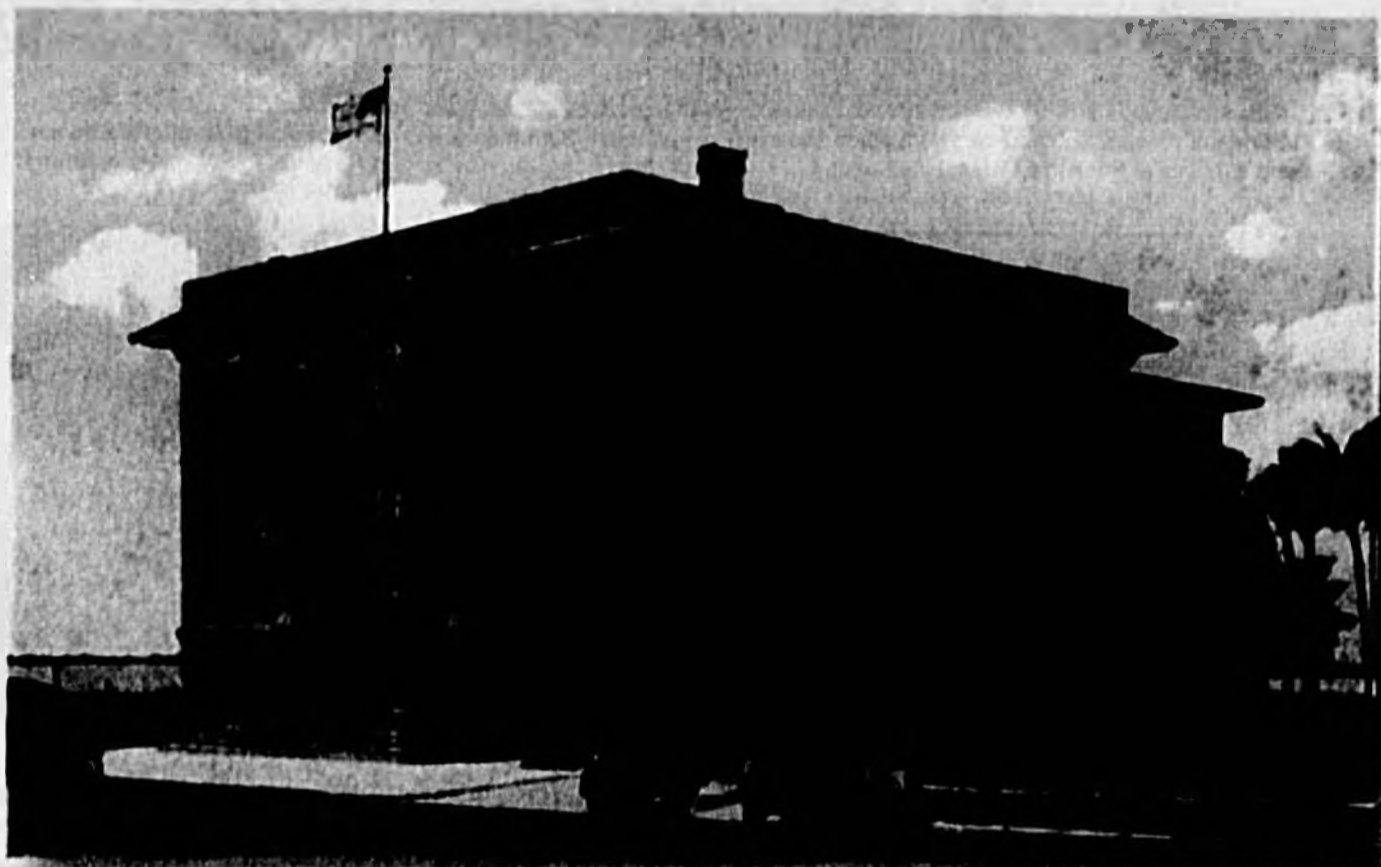

Postcards from 'The City Substantial'



A peek at Sanford in the Florida Boom era

In those glorious days of yesteryear when Sanford was known as "The City Substantial," the Asheville (N.C.) Post-Card Company sold several thousands souvenir folders of Sanford.

Each folder contained 18 different views — including one of a celery farm, the post office, the Seminole County Court House, the Hotel Forrest Lake, The City Administration Building, the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Station, First Street and scenes from the St. Johns River.

Alicia Clarke, director of the Sanford Museum, said the souvenir folder was printed during the "Florida Boom" of the 1920s. The museum has one of the folders on display with other city souvenirs of the period.

"There are 500 — perhaps as many as 700 — post cards of Sanford," Clarke said. "Most go back to the turn of the century. Others are from the Boom years, before the Great Depression. There was a lot of optimism in the city. The Chamber of Commerce came up with 'The City Substantial' slogan."

Clarke said the slogan was among a half dozen that have been used through the years. Sanford has also been known as "The Celery City" and "The Kalamazoo of Florida." It is known today as "The Friendly City."

Q: How do you feel about winning the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Good Citizenship Award?
A: I am very honored. I never expected it. It's nice to know that everything I do is appreciated.

Q: What is the most rewarding aspect of working with children?

A: When I see them somewhere outside, just seeing their enthusiasm for learning new things, watching them say "ooh" and "awe" at the world around them, knowing that I contributed in some small way to that is very rewarding.

Q: What concerns do you have for the children?
A: I worry about whether they are aware of the dangers that are out there. Many of them seem so innocent and a little naive. Not that everything in the world is evil, but there are a lot of dangers such as drugs, violence and peer pressures. There are a lot of peer pressures out there.

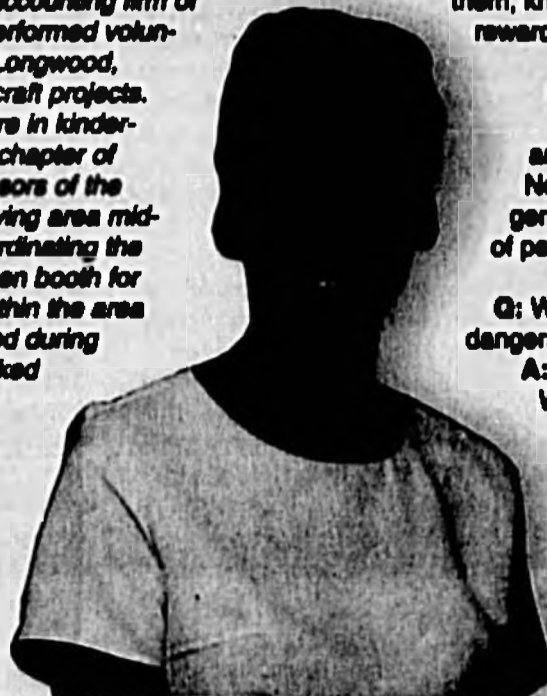
Q: What advice do you give children about how to deal with the dangers that they may face?

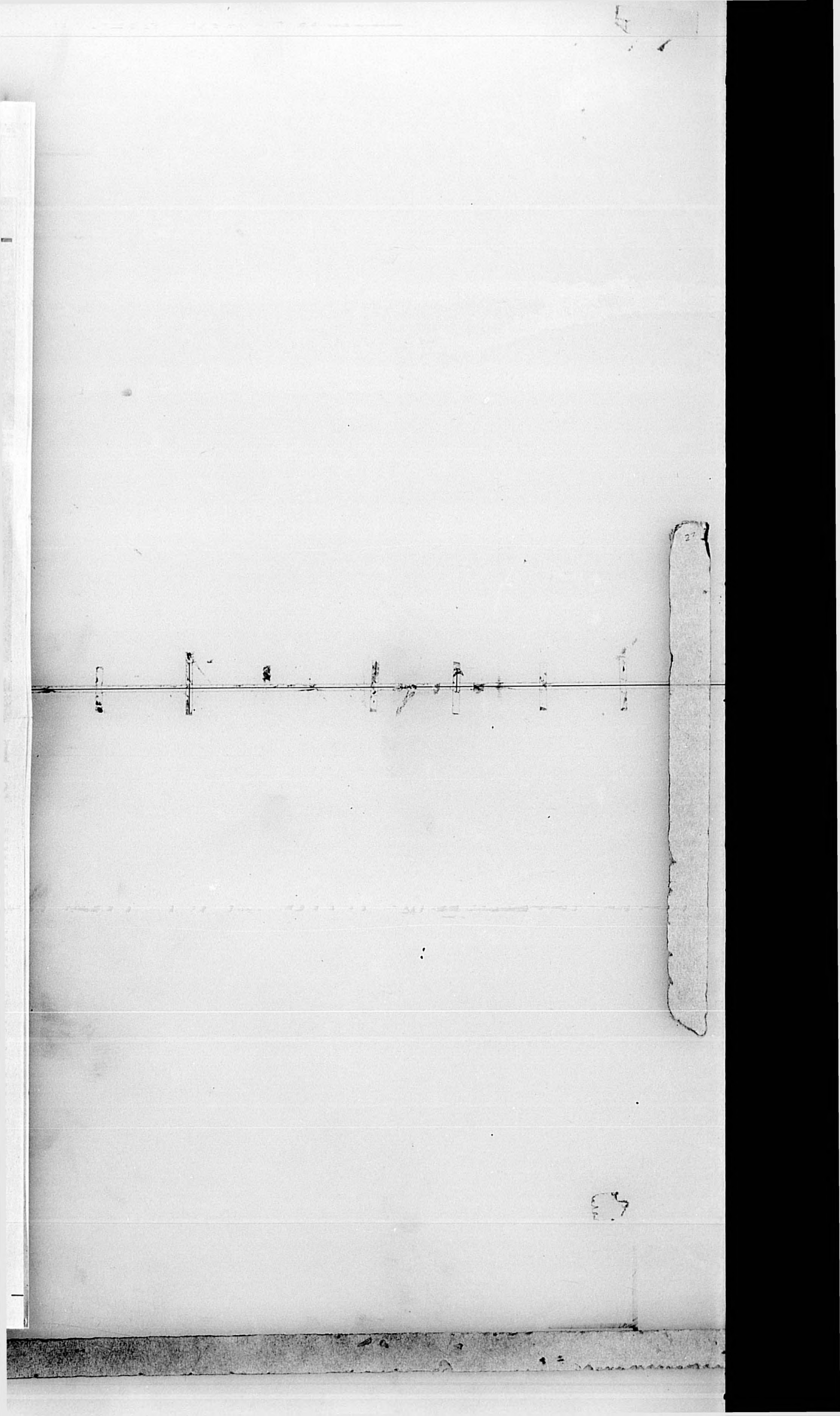
A: I tell them to keep your faith, be it religious or otherwise. Whatever happens, just keep the hope that things will get better, because they will.

Incentive for all organ donors should be to do the right thing

DEAR ABBY: I am not normally a person who would write to you, but I am prompted to do so as a result of the letter you printed relating to obtaining inheritance tax, estate tax or income tax incentives for people to become organ donors.

I am a lawyer who practices in the estate and tax field, and I thought that the proposition was interesting from that standpoint.

However, as a registered organ donor, I question both the proposition and your support of it. My questioning does not concern the need to get more organ donors, but it concerns the motivation of people to donate organs in return for tax relief.

I am concerned that our society needs to have "incentives" to do that which is right. Do we really need to have income tax deductions to support our favorite charities? Do we need tax incentives to encourage people to employ persons otherwise unemployable? Will charitable giving collapse if, for some reason, charitable deductions were eliminated from the Internal Revenue Code?

I would hope that the answer to these questions would be no, so I am not in support of the person who suggests that we give incentives to encourage people to become organ donors. The incentive should be that you are doing the right thing for the right reason. There is no other incentive necessary.

ALFRED K. HETTINGER, ALLENTOWN, PA.

DEAR MR. HETTINGER: The answer to all of your questions could well be "yes." And I agree with you that no incentive other than doing the right thing for the right reason should be necessary.

However, at this time 66,717 people are on organ-donor waiting lists, praying for a heart, a kidney or a liver that will save their lives. Last year, 4,800 people died waiting for that prayer to be answered.

Is it more immoral for someone to die because there is a shortage of organs available, or to offer tax incentives to those who would otherwise bury their dear departed, organs and all? To me, it seems like a terrible waste.

My philosophy coincides with that of the late Robert Test, who wrote the following:

TO REMEMBER ME: At a certain moment a doctor will determine that my brain has ceased to function and that, for all intents and purposes, my life has stopped.

When that happens, do not attempt to instill artificial life into my body by the use of a machine.

And don't call this my "deathbed." Call it my "bed of life," and let my body be taken from it to help others lead fuller lives.

Give my sight to a man who has never seen a sunrise, a baby's face or love in the eyes of a woman.

Give my heart to a person

whose own heart has caused nothing but endless days of pain.

Give my blood to the teenager who has been pulled from the wreckage of his car, so that he might live to see his grandchildren play.

Give my kidneys to one who depends on a machine to exist from week to week.

Take my bones, every muscle, every fiber and nerve in my body, and find a way to make a crippled child walk.

Explore every corner of my brain. Take my cells, if necessary, and let them grow so that someday a speechless boy will shout at the crack of a bat and a deaf girl will hear the sound of rain against her windows.

Burn what is left of me and scatter the ashes to the winds to help the flowers grow.

If you must bury something, let it be my faults, my weaknesses, and all my prejudice against my fellow man.


Give my sins to the devil. Give my soul to God. If, by chance, you wish to remember me, do it with a kind deed or word to someone who needs you. If you do all I have asked, I will live forever.

Making innocence a priority

Maybe you had Pokemon or the Harry Potter books for the children on your Christmas lists last month. As for me, I picked out "Pollyanna" and "Changes for Liberty" from the American Fork Collection.

These are books that espouse the imagination and innocence of children. The Wieszel, the winner of the Nobel Peace Prize, said the world today is not a place we would want to bring our children into, yet we must be said for the world desperately needs the innocence of childhood brought back. Except that now a days we take that innocence from children too soon.

In every corner of contemporary culture, childhood innocence is under assault, says Michael Medved, the film critic. "The idea of parental protectiveness has been overwhelmed by relentless pressure from a society that seems perversely determined to frighten and corrupt its young in a misguided effort to 'prepare' them for a harsh, dangerous future."

Let's go back to last summer and look in on a family reunion in progress.

The hot dogs have all been devoured and the children tucked out after a day of fun are sprawled out on the floor in front of the television set watching a baseball movie called "Major League."

What could be more all-American than a Sunday picnic, baseball and kids with mustard on their chins? Except that this was one of the saddest little scenes I have ever witnessed.

These were boys and girls between the ages of 5 and 12 listening to some of the foulest language ever uttered. But no little child spoke up to say, "Oooo, he said a bad word." No one got up and said, "I'm going to tell Daddy what that man said."

What if Daddy had known what the children were looking at? One father, who did watch the movie for 10 minutes, said when he got up to join the other adults on the back porch, "Good movie, but what awful language!"

The TV played on. These are parents who want a better environment for their children and themselves. They recycle and don't smoke. Do they see the irony of what was happening in their living room?

Do I sound like Pollyanna? I am glad. You know, I hope, the story of the 11-year-old orphan girl who comes to live with her Aunt Polly in Vermont and changes the heart of an entire town with her happy outlook. She does it by teaching the townsfolk to play the "glad game," which involves finding something to be glad about in everything that happens.

When old Tom, Aunt Polly's bent-over hired hand, can't find anything to be glad about, Pollyanna reminds him he can be glad he doesn't have to sleep so far to do his weeding — "cause he was already bent part way over."

The word Pollyanna is used today mostly in a disparaging sense, referring to someone whose irresponsible optimism fails to take account of the hard facts of the real world.

Pollyanna's critics want to warn children and their parents about the dangers of living in an unreal dream world. What they should be doing is helping to build a world that will be safe for the hopes of motherhood, safe for the dreams of childhood.

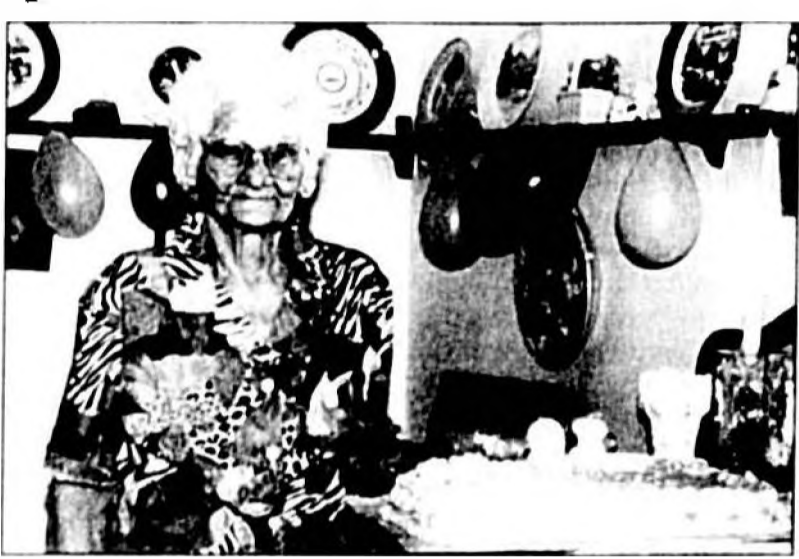

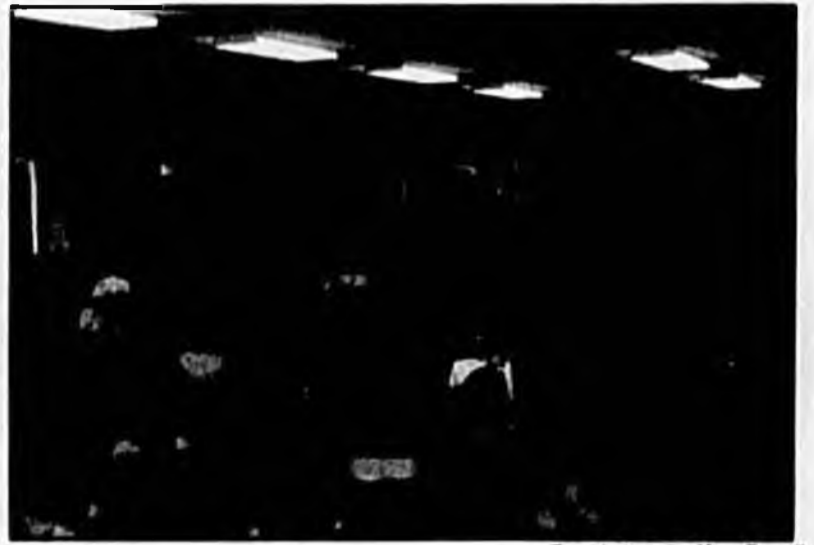

The publisher of the Sanford souvenir folder wrote "Sanford, Fla., on the headwaters of the St. Johns Rivers, holds the same position to Jacksonville that Albany, N.Y., on the Hudson River, bears to New York City. In fact, Sanford has been called the Albany of the South."

Clarke said not all of the buildings in the souvenir folder remain. One that does is the Hotel Forrest Lake.

"That was the first name for the hotel," Clarke said. "It later became known as the Mayfair Hotel and is now the Indian Tribes Mission. It was owned for awhile by the New York Giants baseball team, whose minor-league organizations trained in

Sanford."

The Post Office building pictured in the folder remains on First Street at Palmetto and is now used for technical services space for the county library in Sanford.

The ACL Railroad Station is gone. So is the old Seminole Court House.

"The Clyde Street, St. Johns River Steamer Osceola," pictured in the folder was shut down in the early 1930s, Clarke said. "That was the last of the great river boats," she said.

The South Florida Railroad was constructed, linking Sanford with Jacksonville, Lake Mary, Longwood and Altamonte Springs. It became the largest shipper of oranges in the world.

Clarke said postcards from Sanford's heyday are not easy to find.

"We have post card collectors who live here and have accumulated nice collections. Others who may be starting a collection will have to do some serious searching."

Mrs. Lexoma Howell of Sanford supplied the Seminole Herald with the Sanford souvenir folder, which she said her son found during a visit to a flea market in Southern California several years ago.

"I wanted to share the pictures with people who may get the chance to ever see them," Mrs. Howell said. "Many are quite beautiful. Sanford certainly had a lot it was proud of in those days."
