

#### Uniform Road Rule

Greater uniformity in traffic ordina

The laws of the forty-eight states are practically unanimous in requiring motofists, who are involved in accidents, whether there is personal injury or property damage, to give their names and other information to the occupants of the other car. The "hit-and-run" driver who falls to stop after an accident is universally condemned and has no rights before the law anywhere.

It is interesting to note that the speed limits vary all the way from 50 miles an hour in North Dakots to 25 miles an hour in Missouri, which provides that a driver who has an accident while exceeding that limit must prove that he was not driving recklessly. Nineteen states have discarded the fixed speed limits altogether and prescribe a rate that is "reasonable and proper." Of the states which fix a maximum limit, 13 stipulate 45 miles an hour and eight call

These wide variations in speed limit regulations are merely examples of un-uniformity of traffic ordinances throughout the country. They emphasize the importance of blanket road rules which will be applicable in the North, East, South, and West and which will make the life of the travelling motorist easier and safer.






