### Sixteen die in vlolent weekend

LOS ANGELES - At least 16 people were killed in weekend violence ranging from family quarrels to a gang shooting that left a security guard dead and a 5-year-old gri and a teenager wounded, authorities said Sunday.

In the most recent slaying, a man was shot to death inside Las Playas restaurant in suburban Paramount about 5 a.m. Sunday, sheriff's Deputy Pat Hunter said.

Deputies sought two men seen running from the building after the shooting. Motive for the killing was unknown.

A gunman opened fire shortly before midnight Saturday at a party at the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall in the Wilmington district of South Los Angeles, when he and other gang members were barred from crashing a "presentation" party for a 15-year-old girl, police Sgt. Tony

### Police 'Bowl over' gambiers

NEW YORK - Striking on the heaviest gambling day of the year, police raided seven Mafia-run illegal sports betting operations that netted millions of dollars annually and arrested 17 men on the eve of the Super Bowl.

Capping a month-long investigation dubbed "Operation Bowl," police confiscated \$11,000 in cash and gambling records in the raids Saturday, which began about 5 p.m. and ended by 9 p.m., said Sgt. Raymond O'Donnell, a police spokesman.

### Another quake rocks USSR

MOSCOW - A strong earthquake rocked the Soviet Central Asian republic of Tadzhikistan Monday, triggering landslides that buried two small settlements and causing an unspecified number of casualties, officials and the Tass news agency said.

Tass said the epicenter of the quake, which measured 7 points on the 12-point Mercalli scale, was 31 miles southwest of the Tadzhik capital of Dushanbe near the village of Sharora.

By comparison, the earthquake which devastated parts of the republic of Armenia on Dec. 7 measured 9 on the Mercalli scale, or between 6 8 and 6.9 on the Richter scale.

# Property owners unite

### Lake Mary group expresses concern about road expansion, beautification

LAKE MARY - A group of property owners has banded together to form a group called the Lake Mary Boulevard Alliance of Property Owners and Taxpayers.


The group met for the first time last week at the First Seminole Bank in Lake Mary.

The approximately 50 people are concerned what the Lake Mary Boulevard Corridor plan. which calls for beautification as it is widened. will mean to them as tax paying property

They say they also are concerned that a proposed draft ordinance, which will enforce development standards along the boulevard, will restrict how they can use their property.

The draft ordinance was developed by the Lake Mary Boulevard Study Committee, a panel of 12 people representing the jurisdictions of Lake Mary, Sanford and Seminole County. The boulevard runs through all three areas. Randall Morris is its founder and chairperson.

# City to consider housing appeal

SANFORD - The city commission tonight will hold a public hearing to consider a request denied last week by the planning and zoning commission.

The commission will discuss rezoning 72 acres between Celery and Brisson Avenues from agricultural to planned unit development.

# **Bundy** just one day from death

#### United Press International

STARKE - Serial killer Ted Bundy, scheduled to die in Florida's electric chair Tuesday morning. confessed during the weekend to up to 14 killings, including two in Idaho in which he was not previously a suspect.

Meanwhile, America's most notorious death row inmate has canceled a news conference and a meeting with detectives, both scheduled for Monday, planning instead to undergo a psychiatric examination on the day before he is

Lawyers were expected to put in a last-ditch effort to prove that Bundy is insane, and therefore should not

be executed. The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals dented Bundy's request for a stay of execution Saturday, and Bundy's lawyers were expected to appeal to the Supreme Court Mon-

Bundy, convicted in the death of two Florida State University sorority women and a 12-year-old Lake City girl, described two killings in which he was not suspect to Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones and his chief investigator during an hourlong meeting Sunday.

'Re says he killed two women in Idaho. He described them and told where he had picked them up and told what he had done with them," Jones said.

Bundy told Jones the killings happened between 1974 and 1975. "One seems to be fairly possible. The other is tough to tell at this time." Jones said.

Bundy, a suspect in more than 20 sex killings in Washington state. Idaho, Utah and Colorado, confessed Saturday to 10 murders in Washington and one each in Oregon and Colorado

Robert Reppel, an investigator from the Washington state attorney general's office, told a Seattle television station that Bundy gave himdetails of the murders of eight women there while other reports put the figure at 11.

Keppel said he believed the confessions were part of a scheme to Bee Bundy, Page 3A

# Longwood firm may help develop bullet train

LONGWOOD - Not too far into the future, a glistening object traveling faster than a speeding bullet will be a part of the Orlando skyline.

And, a Longwood firm may play a role.

That object is known as a magnetic levitation train. It will carry passengers to their destinations at speeds in excess of

200 miles per hour The Florida High Speed Rail Transportation Commission in Tallahassee already is seeking applications from companies that want to finance, build and operate the high-tech mode of transportation, according to Diana Hull, communications director for the high speed rail. transportation commission

The commission presently has two high speed train projects underway. One is a \$2.2 billion rall project, which will connect Miami, Orlando and Tampa.

The magnetic levitation train, a smaller project in terms of distance, will be centered on Orlando, according to Hull,

### Police shoot suspect in Miami

MIAMI - One man was reported shot early this morning in what appeared to be a police-involved shooting in Liberty City. which was rocked by civil unrest last week

Police said two Metro Dade County officers investigating a fire shortly after midnight heard gunshots in the area and found at least two people involved in a gunfight.

The officers reportedly fired their guns and one suspect was hit, but it was not known who fired that shot or the suspect's

"Any time we have a police-involved shooting or what appears to be a police-involved shooting, we do take precautions and extend the perimeters and make sure everybody is eafe and that we can get to witnesses easier," said police officer Al Hidalgo Gato.

The victim was in stable condition and one other person was taken Into custody.

Two days of violence erupted last week in Miami's predominantly black Liberty City section after a white Hispanie police officer fatally shot a black motorcyclist in nearby

The early Monday violence came after what police described as a calm night during Sunday's Super Bowl.

### Bahamians love Florida Lotto

ORLANDO (UPI) - Opportunistic travelers are earning as much as \$5,000 a week carrying Florida Lotto tickets to enthusiastic customers in the Bahamas, a newspaper reported

Lotto is so popular in the Bahamas that players routinely pay \$10 for a playing card that sells in Florida for \$5, the Orlando Sentinel reported. The couriers earrying those cards pocket the extra \$5 as a carrying fee.

"I know about 20 people who do It," said Lenny Bowe, a taxi and tour service operator in Hassau who spends \$30 a week playing three Lotto cards. "They take the first flight over on Saturday and come back Saturday night."

Charles micy, a Nassau limousine uriver, said he has bought as many as 1,500 or 2,000 Lotto tickets on his weekly trips to Miami. He said a friend who owns a Nassau restaurant has purchased up to 3,000 tickets on a single trip

"It's really popular here," Riley said, "Everyone's trying to Riley buys his tickets at a food store near his Carol City

relatives' home. It takes about 45 minutes to buy 1,500 tickets, The Lotto trade is apparently legal, even though Florida law

prohibits selling tickets for more than the \$1 the state charges. The law does not address a "handling" charge, and Fiorida officials have no enforcement power outside the state even if the trade were found to be lilegal.

Lotto's popularity has not been lost on Prime Minister Lynden Pindling, who plans to start up a Bahamian national lottery. But islanders say a national lottery would probably have little effect on the Lotto trade.

"I think people will play here, but there's no way they can hurt the Florida lottery," said Bowe. "The pots are bigger

Lotto jackpots are usually based on the number of tickets sold the week before. The Bahamas simply does not have enough people to build the multimillion-dollar pots Floridians have grown accustomed to.

. The Bahamas has 250,000 residents and attracted 3 million tourists last year. Florida has 12 million residents and draws more than 34 million tourists a year.

So far, few Bahamians have won big. According to Lottery Department spokesman Ed George, only 15 of the 16,629 people who won \$600 or more last year were Bahamians. Florida lottery officials welcome Bahamiana customers, as

long as they do not create an illegal black market trade. George

### HRS client deaths draw criticism

FORT LAUDERDALE - At least 266 people under the jurisdiction of the state department of Health and Rehabilitative Services have died in the past two years, many of unnatural causes, a newspaper report said Sunday

The report, which drew strong criticism Sunday from an HRS spokesman, was based on HRS documents made public through a lawsuit brought by the Fort Lauderdale News and Sun-Sentinel in December 1988. The newspaper said "in some cases" the deaths were the

result of abuse, suicide or other unnatural causes The 266 total included 127 children who died in their homes

or in state-licensed centers. Of those, 77 died of abuse or neglect, bizarre accidents or other unnatural causes, the newspaper said.

Some of the children had been placed under HRS protection. while others had come under HRS review because they were born with severe medical problems. Others had siblings who were the subject of repeated allegations of neglect or abuse.

# Nelson, Stuart planning for 1990

ORLANDO - The opening battles in the 1990 governor's race are already being fought in Orlando, where Congresaman Bill Nelson and state Sen. George Stuart Jr., are vying for support from Democratic fundraisers.

Both Nelson and Stuart claim they can lure votes away from Republican Gov. Bob Martinez in heavily Republican Central Florida. Both are trying to discourage any further Democratic regardless of who the Democrats competition and attempting to nominate. lock up supporters.

as possible gubernatorial candidates are Attorney General fundraiser Richard Swann, who Bob Butterworth and former U.S. Rep. Kenneth H. Buddy MacKay of Ocala, who lost a 1988 Senate bld to Republican U.S. Sen. Connie Mack of Cape Coral.

Brian Ballard, the governor's operations director, said Martinez expects to carry Orlando and the surrounding area in the 1990 governor's race

Other Democrats mentioned pressure on Mayor Bill Frederick and longtime Democratic have been forced to choose between the two after supporting both Stuart and Nelson for years.

Frederick, mayor of Orlando since 1980, said he is backing Stuart because "he's creative and he's got a good mind and he's always been a supporter of local governments."

Swann committed to Nelson early in the governor's race because he considers him "an attractive Democratic candidate

Stuart and Nelson are not only fighting for campaign money. but also over who has the right to claim Orlando as home.

Although former Gov. Reubin Askew moved to Orlando after his term ended in 1978, the city cannot claim any governor among the 40 who have been elected since Florida attained statchood in 1845.

Both Stuart and Nelson have two offices in downtown Orlando, near City Hall. Nelson has his congressional and campaign offices. Stuart has his business and campaign offices.

## **Abortion ruling** could start battle

CLEARWATER - Florida politicians anticipate a bitter battle that could cost many their jobs if the Supreme Court returns control over abortion laws to the states.

The Supreme Court entered its landmark Roe v. Wade decision on Jan. 22, 1973, climinating all state restrictions on abortions. But an increasingly conservative court is expected to rule sometime this year on a Missouri law that could return local control to the states.

That would put Florida politicians on a hot seat many would rather avoid, the Tampa Tribune-Times reported Sunday.

Quite frankly, there's probably a lot of legislators who would be relieved if the Supreme Court came back and said they couldn't do anything." said Michael Martinez, a political science professor at the University of Florida.

Many court watchers say they do not expect that to happen. If the court did not intend to act on the Missouri law, they argue, the justices simply would have ref-

signal a reversal of Roe v. Wade or at least a fatal blow to it." said Ken Connor, legislative vice president of Florida Right to life.

That, Connor said, would mean a "political fight of the century" between pro- and anti-abortion forces during the 1990 legislative session.

No matter how they vote. legislators would be virtually assured of angering many constituents - perhaps enough to ruin their chances for reelection.

"It can obviously make or break a politician's career," said Sen. John Grant, R-Tampa. Grant was one of the major forces behind a new Florida law requiring parental consent before a minor can get an abortion.

"It's an issue that comes from the gut," added Janis Compton-Carr, director of the Floida Abortion Rights Action League. "It's not one that people will compromise on, and it's not one they'll give up.

Martinez predicted legislators would settle on a compromise, perhaps limiting abortion after the first trimester or banning the use of public funds for abortions.

# Rare plants face extinction

JACKSONVILLE - Botanists fear that 72 endangered Florida plants will become extinct within the next 10 years, victims of the state's rampant growth and lack of plant protection.

Nationally, 680 plants will probably become extinct within the next decade, according to a recent study by the Center for Plant Conservation. Most of those plants are found in Florida or four other states and territories, the Florida Times-Union reported Sunday.

Florida is a major trouble spot both because of its rapid development and the fact that a subtropical climate has generated a great variety of plants in the Sunshine State. More than 4,000 species of plants are native to Florida.

Growth has also led to near-extinction for many animal species, including the Florida panther, the manatee and the Key deer. But those what's in it."

animals are protected under state law - endangered plants

"Basically, a landowner can bulldoze or herbicide any encangered plants on his own property," said David Martin, a botanist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Rare plants should be protected. Martin said, because of their scientific potential Studying rare plants can lead to improvements in agriculture, and each unstudied plant may contain chemicals that can be medically useful.

"The amount of wetrd chemicals lurking in plants, and the chance that some of them perhaps would be useful to humans, is enormous," Martin

When rare plants are destroyed before their potential can be explored, he said, "You run a risk of destroying the library before you know



### More fake police calls reported

When one of the projects is completed, it could make Florida the first in the nation to have magnetic levitation trains the type of which already are on test tracks in Japan and west Germany, according to Hull.

A magnetic levitation train, as its name implies, is levitated above a guideway or monorail track by magnetic forces and the train's power is furnished by electricity. The train is as streamlined as a passenger jet. only much lighter in weight.

It is safe, fast and ecologically advantageous as it generates no exhaust fumes.

"It offers an alternative. It helps solve the problems of our transportation system. This type of technology is energy efficient. There's not much impact on the highway," Hull said.

The project will be mainly backed by private investors. although the state has jurisdiction over the franchise award. Hull described it as a "new trend" in transportation with the private sector as the primary financer and operator.

"Research has shown it can operate profitably," Hull said. The project will need to be the

coordinated effort of a team of e impantes for technology, financing and the construction of the guideway.

The high speed rall commission expects three companies to submit applications and a \$500,000 application fee by March 2 to build and operate the magnetic levitation train in Florida. The commission expects to hold hearings on the proposals in June.

HSST Corporation, of Longwood, is one of the companies who is expected to submit an application to Florida High Speed Rail Transportation Commission. The company's home office is in Tokyo, Japan, but it has recently established an office in Longwood.

HSST has demonstrated the technology of the levitation trains at various fairs worldwide including the Vancouver Expo 1986, and the Saltama Exposition last year in Japan.

We're just on the brink of putting it in a regular transportation system. The fares haven't been determined. The cost depends on the routes," Mowbray

### Medicare fairness

The new catastrophic provisions of Medicare went into effect Jan. 1, but some senior groups and members of Congress already are agitating to have them changed. The reason? Some beneficiaries are discovering that President Reagan and Congress, in expanding Medicare, also reversed the long trend of shrinking the share of the costs of Medicare paid by older Americans themselves. But Congress shouldn't be stampeded into a retreat.


Few people object to the new benefits the law provides. The catastrophic provisions, for the first time, put an annual cap of \$2,000 on the amount of out-of-pocket expenses elderly Americans must pay for Medicare-covered acute care. To protect those for whom even that amount represents a financial calamity. the law requires state Medicald programs to pay the Medicare premiums and out-of-pocket expenses of elderly persons with incomes below the poverty line. These provisions close the worst gaps in Medicare's coverage. relieving millions of senior households of the fear that hospital and doctor bills will wipe out the assets upon which their future security depends.

The dispute arises from the fact that Medicare beneficiaries themselves will pay the bill through an increase in the flat Supplemental Medical Insurance (Part B) premium and a new supplemental premium collected as a surtax on Medicare-eligible people who pay more than \$150 in federal income taxes. Next year, the supplemental premium will be a 15 percent surcharge, up to a maximum of \$800 per person; by 1993, when the new benefits are completely phased in, the surcharge will increase to 28 percent. up to a maximum of \$1,050.

Some senior groups complain that it is unfair to ask elderly citizens to pay the costs of this new program. But where's the unfairness? Right now, the cost of Medicare hospitalization (Part A) is borne entirely by workers through payroll taxes; in the past 15 years, the share of Medicare Part B costs paid by taxpayers has risen from 50 percent to 75 percent, even as Medicare costs have soared. If society can ask minimum-wage workers to support Medicare, government's fastestgrowing program, why is it unfair to ask as much of retirees?

The new supplemental premium is geared to the ability to pay: According to estimates by the accounting firm Price Waterhouse, two-thirds of the single elderly and half of the couples will owe no surtax at all. Next year, only 6 percent of elderly households (those carning more than \$90,000 as couples and \$45,000 as individuals) will pay the maximum \$800-a-person premiums. For the large majority of elderly people, the Medicare premiums they must pay for the new program will be offset after 1989 by reductions in the cost of their private Medigap insurance policies.

As U.S. Rep. Bill Gradison, R-Ohio, points out, this financing of the new Medicare benefits is not a case of asking Peter to pay for Paul's benefits, but of asking Peter to pay a little larger share of Peter's own benefits. Idealy, America should have a universal health insurance system for both Paul and Peter, with each household contributing according to its ability to pay. But until that day comes, there's nothing unfair about asking older Americans of adequate means to share the burden of protecting retired citizens from the medical costs of aging.



# Conservatism comes of age

WASHINGTON - George Bush's inauguration bash is wrapped less in red, white and blue bunting than in gray worsted. By the composition of his Cabinet, heavily weighted with people who have carried the weight of office before, Bush has completed a process that Ronald Reagan began.

It is the transformation of the Republican Party. The party now is reconciled to the reality of modern government's role in life. Republicans recognize that governance is a dignified, difficult, learned vocation for seasoned professionals such as those Bush has chosen.

Reagan's contribution to this process was his almost complete acceptance of the welfare state that evolved at a remarkably steady pace under his predecessors of both parties for half a century. Republicans remain free to talk like Jessersonians, celebrating that government which governs least. But they will live in, and want to be the dominant party in, Hamilton's America, it has a strong central government that requires a professional political class for the executive branch.

Until recently, conservative ideology caused many Republicans to regard service in Washington as akin to jury duty. Perhaps it had to be done, but it was not supposed to be fun or fulfilling for long. Bush's remarkably scamless transition testifies to a change.

The passage into the Bush era began well before the election, with the installation of Bush supporters at Treasury (Nicholas Brady) and Justice (Richard Thornburgh). It speaks well of Bush's self-confidence that he has not been afraid to cobble together a large part of his administration from material at hand in Reagan's Washington. The most interesting person in the upper reaches of Bush's administration - Richard Darman - has been here before. Indeed, he barely left.

During last autumn's campaign, conservatives sent delicious thrills of terror down one another's spines by saying, "If Dukakis is elected, the government will fall into the hands of intellectuals grown in that hothouse of unrealism, the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard." Bush won, but the government is to a considerable extent in the hands of card-carrying Kennedy-schooler Darman, 45. who is head of the Office of Management and

A graduate of Reagan's White house and Jim Baker's Treasury Department, Darman is devising a strategy for complying with Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction target. Darman is the right man to test Bush's theory that we can grow our way to sufficient balance in the budget.

Darman believes that recessions are not

necessary, are not inherent in the cyclical working of capital-ism. Rather, re-

cessions happen because policymakers in the public and private sectors make mistakes. The science of economics and the art of business management are sufficiently advanced that such mistakes can be avoided indefinitely If he is right, then Bush is right: No new taxes are needed. We shall see. For now, Darman is the most intellectually selfassured man Washington has seen

since Darman's boon companion, David Stockman, went off to write his kiss and tell memoirs, which told the sad story of Stockman's misplaced certitude.

As Bush begins, the most alarming imbalance in Washington is not budgetary, it is institutional. Bush, the model of the Republican man of government, must win for the executive branch the struggle for supremacy.

Bush is the first President in 12 years who has served in Congress. Under Carter and Reagan. Congress. already provoked by Nixon. grew more assertive and grasping. Bush may think he can work well within the system that candidate Reagan a decade ago denounced as "the Washington buddy system." Bush may think the get-along-by-going-along approach is just the application of kinder-and-gentler-ism. But it is a recipe for continued congressional

Bush should remember that he is the beneficiary of the great change wrought by the advent of broadcasting and other technologies of mass mobilizations. Presidents have only recently acquired political weight because of broad participation in presidential elections Malcolm Shaw, a British professor of politics. says it was not until the 1920s that Presidents were elected by receiving the votes of more than 10 percent of the "free population." Even the "strong" Presidents received less -Jackson (5.8 in 1832), Lincoln (6.8 in 1860), Cleveland (8.8 in 1884), Teddy Roosevelt (9.3 in 1904). Wilson (8.9 in 1916).

Today the executive branch is more suited than Congress to Republicans who regard goverance as a profession.

The conviction of former Rep. Mario Blaggi, D-N.Y., for accepting illegal gratuities has piqued the moral outrage of Congress — at least the public moral outrage. Some members are loudly calling for stricter rules. But,

privately, 48 of them went to bat for Biaggi asking the judge to go easy on him. The letters indicate how difficult it will be to get the monkey's hand out of the cookie jar.

If Biaggi did nothing else, he reminded members of Congress of something they can easily - that it is illegal for them to take anything of value because they performed an official

vouching for act for the giver. Biaggi Now it's time Congress rewrote Its

official rules to conform to what is already federal law. House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, and Minority Leader Robert Michel, R-III., promised to assign an ethics reform task force to the job. That task force should begin with a trip to the file room of the federal court for the Eastern District of New York.

There, among three boxes of testimony and correspondence relating to the Biaggi case, the task force will find a raft of letters from members of Congress standing behind their compatriot. At the time the letters were written. Biaggi had already been convicted of accepting illegal gratuities. He accepted a Florida vacation for himself and a companion from a Democratic party boss after after he helped an ailing local shipyard in Brooklyn. The party boss owned an insurance brokerage firm and the shipyard was his client. (Blaggi was later convicted on a seperate racketeering charge involving Wedtech Corp.)

Forty-eight lawmakers, including Wright and Dan Rostenkowski, D-III., and even former House Speaker Tip O'Neill. D Mass., asked the judge to go light on Biaggi in the gratuities case because of his record of public

But two of those letters went beyond simply vouching for Biaggi as a nice guy who deserved a break. Reps. Mervyn Dymally, D Calif., and Robin Tallon, D-S.C., argued that the gifts may have been proper.

Tallon's comments so concerned Judge Jack Weinstein that he read parts of the letter in court, although he didn't name the author. Here is Tallon's argument:

When it comes to entertaining, suffice it to say that no one entertains his enemies and that socializing with a congressman is aimed. in part, at advancing the interest of the lobbyist's client. ... It seems that, under the standard applied in the Biaggi case, even legal campaign contributions could become the basis of a gratuity prosecution if the contributor were motivated by a desire to show his gratitude for past congressional action. I can assure you that most members of Congress are not aware of the broad scope of this law, and many who have taken free trips and the like are wondering what the implications of those activities are.

If that is true, then it's high time members of Congress "wondered."

Dymally seemed more concerned that Blaggi's conviction might put a dent in the loot. "I fear that anything more than a suspended sentence in this case would ... cast doubt upon the entire range of legitimate political practices associated with gifts and contributions to elected officials, thereby creating a chilling effect on both donors and

recipients alike." A chilling effect? Bring on the ice.

### Jurors to decide fate of accused killer

NEW YORK — The 13-week-long murder trial of accused child killer Joel Steinberg neared an end Monday as jurors prepared to decide whether the disharred millionaire lawyer beat to death the 6-year-old girl he raised with his live-in lover.

Steinberg, 47, is accused of beating little Lisa Steinberg into a fatal coma Nov. 1, 1987, leaving the child's naked body on a tiled bathroom floor and then waiting more than 12 hours to summon medical help.

The case was to go to a six-man, six-woman jury Monday, Steinberg could face up to life in prison if convicted of second degree murder, the most serious charge against him.

In a case that has become a national symbol of child abuse. Steinberg's ex-lover, Hedda Nussbaum, 46, offered the most damaging testimony against him.

Nussbaum, allegedly battered over the years into slavelike submission by Steinberg, testifled she waited more than 12 hours for his permission to summon medical aid for the unconscious child. The delay cost Lisa her life, prosecution

Dushanbe is about 1,200 miles east of the Armenian quake

The worst earthquake on record in the Soviet Union took place in 1948 in Turkmenta, a Soviet republic near the Iranian border. At least 100,000 people died in that disaster, which was hushed up by dictator Josef Stalin. Information was only officially released in the aftermath of last month's Armenian earthquake.

# New president gets down to business

WASHINGTON -- George Bush was in the Oval Office at dawn Monday to begin tackling the challenge of presidential leadership and nurture whatever political honeymoon he might be accorded by Congress and the American people.

With the inaugural festivities behind him, Bush got down to business by having breakfast in the Oval Office with Vice President Dan Quayle and swearing in top members of his staff, who in 72 hours removed the last vestiges of the Reagan era.

Bush scheduled an afternoon meeting with his Cabinet nominees, to whom he delivered a detailed set of marching orders on Jan. 12, and planned to speak by telephone hookup to

abortion foes staging an annual march on Washington.

Riding a crest of good will, Bush and his senior advisers plan a busy first full week in office, intended to reinforce the themes of his inaugural address and begin to explore how best to achieve the promises of his campaign.

Interviewed Sunday on the CBS News program "Face the Nation," White House chief of staff John Sununu sald Bush will take steps over the next few weeks to outline his priorities and demonstrate "that a conservative president can be compassionate."

As a crucial part of that process, Bush will meet Tuesday with the Republican and Democratte congressional leaders to

to the urgent Issue of the federal budget deficit and in foreign

Emphasizing Bush's desire to 'reach out a hand to Congress," White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater suggested the meeting could help forge a spirit of cooperation in advance of nitly gritty negotiations on deficit

But while welcoming the willingness to negotiate, some key members of Congress have said they want to see what Bush has to offer by way of compromise before speculating on how the talks will be conducted or where they might lead.

Sununu promised that Bush, who is slated to address a joint session of Congress on Feb. 9, will offer proposals capable of promote bipartisan approaches cutting future deficits without

reneging on his "read my lips" pledge of "no new taxes.

"The problem with the budget is not arithmetic." he said "it's politics. And what George Inish did in his inaugural address is really extended his hand to Congress. And he's convinced that Congress is willing and able and, in a very positive sense, eager to share the credit for solving the deficit problem."

The peal of church bells Sunday signaled the formal close of the 51st presidential inaugural, a \$25 million extravaganza that signaled changes in style and substance from the White House occupied by Ronald and Nancy Reagan.

This visit is in the spirit of our deep-felt conviction that a new era has begun in the Middle. East," said Dumas, who earlier met separately with Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir. Foreign Minister Moshe Arens and President Chaim Herzog

We feel that a chance definitely exists to find a solution, a solution which will ensure peace, stability and security in the region, and therefore it is incumbent upon us to seize this chance.



# Niners drive to title

#### United Press International

MIAMI - The Super Bowl finally lived up to its name Sunday and Joe Montana lived up to his reputation as perhaps the best big-game player in the pro football history.

With all the pressure his chosen profession can produce bearing down on his shoulders. Montana responded with a performance that became Instant football lore.

He drave San Francisco 92 yards in the final three minutes and threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to John Taylor with 34 seconds remaining that brought the 49ers a 20-16 victory over the gallant Cincinnati Bengals.

"When Joe Montana hangs it up, he will certainly be looked upon as one of the greats," said Cincinnati Coach Sam Wyche, who came close to leading his team to the biggest one-season turnaround in NFL history.

I don't know anyone who has played as wellin the clutch games as he has. They won it. We didn't lose it. This will go down as one of the best Super Bowls,"

After a string of one-sided and unexciting Super Bowls, the Bengals and 49ers produced a game to remember - one filled with big plays,

critical turning points and high drama.

San Francisco's Jerry Rice, voted Most Vaulable Player, caught 11 passes for a record 215 yards. In Rice's three postseason games he caught 21 passes for 409 yards and six touchdowns.

But despite such heroics. Montana remained the premier figure. He completed 23 of 36 passes for 357 yards, breaking the Super Bowl record of 340 yards set a year ago by Washington's Doug Williams.

It was Mondana's third Super Bowl apperance - all victories - and he has yet to throw an interception in an NFL title game.

The three Super Bowl wins in this decade stamps San Francisco as the team of the 1980s and perhaps gave Coach Bill Walsh a happy exit from the game. Although Walsh declined to discuss his future after the contest. San Francisco owner Edward DeBartolo said during Super Bowl week he expected Walsh to retire.

"It was one of the great games I've been involved in." Waish said. "We put it together in the final drive. So much credit goes to our entire team for having the poise to hang in there and stay with it. Cincinnati had a lot of momentum.

"It's a great moment for me, personally,"

The Bengals, a 7 1/2-point underdog, demonstrated early on a infld, blustery day at Joe Robble Stadium that they challenge all day.

Despite speculation the Bengala' defense would be easy prey for the 49ers, Cincinnati fought San Francisco to a 3-3 halftime tie.

San Francisco's Mike Cofer kicked a 41-yard field goal in the first period and Cincinnati's Jim; Breech had a 34-yarder in the second period to; account for the second-lowest scoring first half in: Super Bowl history.

The Bengals took a 6-3 lead on a 43-yard Beech field goal and Cofer tied it with a 32-yarder with 50 seconds remaining in the third period.

Then, after almost 45 minutes of missed opportunities and flerce defense, the drama that football fans hope for and seldom see in a Super Lawl began to unfold.

On the kicketf following Cofer's tying field goal, Cincinnati's Stanford Jennings - who became a father 24 hours earlier - brought the Super Bowl to life by running the kickoff back 93 yards. He bolted up the middle and was untouched until he reached the goal line, putting the Bengals ahead

# Reupholstery saves chair's hide

If you have a chair, a sofa or even a bedcover that is in good shape, but just doesn't fit into the updated decor of your home, it'd be a shame to throw it out.

Or if that favorite chair has been so worn by the resident couch potato that the stuffing is falling out all over the place, perhaps it's time to reupholster the offending pieces.

"A good rule of thumb is that if it is still in good shape and still fits in with your room decor, keep it," said Kitty Corley, owner of Nix Bedding in Sanford.

Corley said that people often bring in a chair that is a style they probably wouldn't purchase at the store today, but it has been in the family for years.

While it can cost upward of 8250 to redo a chair, it is almost a bargain censidering the cost of new furnishings. And the quality of today's assembly-line pieces can't compare with that of yesterday's models.

Recent interior design fashion has called for furniture and draperies in matching fabrics. This task is easily accomplished by buying fabric for both jobs at the same time.

"Redoing furniture is no easy task," said John Bassen, an



employee at U.C.R. Upholstery in Longwood. "We usually recommend that people hire a professional to do the job, but a lot of people attempt the job themselves. Sometimes it works out all right; other times, we end up fixing the botched job."

Seminole Community Colleges and various other continuing educational institutions offer classes in basic reupholstering techniques. A course description from the SCC brochure suggests that a working relationship with your sewing machine is a pre-requisite for the class.

"It's more than just sewing the cloth together," warned Corley. "You have to know about furniture construction so you can repair springs, do the repadding and such."

Various books on the subject point out that with older furniture, the coil springs are hand-tied and that if the ties break, the piece becomes lumpy and uncomfortable

## Vines drive themselves up the wall-in style

Vines include all plants, whether woody or herbaceous, that require some support for their proper development. There are annual and perennial vines, woody and herbaceous vines, evergreen and deciduous vines, flowering vines and vines grown primarily for their foliage or fruit.

Vines offer an interesting variation in plant form. They are available in the landscape or their practical and aesthetic qualities. Vines can be used in several ways—on walls, arbors or other overhead structures, as groundcovers and as a screening material on baffles.

If vines are to be satisfactory in the landscape, they must be well adapted to the environment in which they are to be grown. It is important that one choose a vine that is adapted to Central Florida.

Other factors—amount of sun, type of soil, protection from buildings or other vegetation—also enter into considering the type of vine that can be grown and its proper placement within the landscape.

Plant the more tender species on the

south and east sides of a house to lessen the degree of cold injury, since the cold winds are generally from a north to northwesterly direction.

The amount of sunlight required by vines varies, but most vines grow and flower best in full sunlight to partial shade. Vines prefer a loose, well-drained soil containing some organic matter.

When planting vines, give the same care as for other ornamental plants. Deciduous vines (such as wisteria and grapes) do best when planted during the winter months. Evergreens may be planted at any time during the year, with late winter or early spring being the preferred time. Container-grown plants are preferred to others, and care should be taken to disturb the root system as little as possible during the planting or transplanting procedure.



The planting site should be prepared several weeks before plants are obtained. Add organic matter in the form of peat moss, compost, leaf mold or well-decomposed manure to the soil at the time of the initial preparation. Spread from 4-6 inches of the material selected over the planting site, add ½-1 cup full of balanced fertilizer (6-6-6 or 8-8-8), and spade it into a depth of 1 foot.

Deciduous vines that are bare-rooted should be cut back to a height of 6-12 inches. Container-grown or balled and burlapped plants usually require no pruning at time of planting. Holes for these plants should be one third larger than the ball of earth attached to the root system. Set the plant in the hole and adjust the depth so that the surface of the container or ball is at ground level. Carefully remove the container and fill around the plant with good garden soil. Newly set plants should be well-watered after planting and during dry weather. Finally, mulch the soil around the base of the plant with straw, leaf mold or bark chins.

Newly set vines generally will not need fertilizing for the first season if proper planting practices are followed. Two to three feedings may be given each year to established plants. The amount to apply will depend on age and size of the plant, fertility

of the soil, amount of organic matter supplies and the condition of the plant.

Ornamental vines require little pruning except to keep them in bounds. Prune flowering vines shortly after they have flowered. Pruning before flowering removes some of the buds. Pruning late in the summer removes next year's flower buds.

Many vines are grown for the beauty of their flowers. Probably the most snowy and spectacular tropical vine available for planting is the bougainvillea, but it is sensitive to freezing temperatures.

The golden-yellow bell-shaped bloom of the Allamanda vine can be seen throughout most of the year in south and warmer parts of Central Florida. Some other outstanding flowering vines are coral-vine, trumpet creeper, rangoon-creeper, painted trumpet, Carolina yellow-jessamine, purple or queens wreath, flame-vine and Chinese wisteria.

Some vines are grown primarily for their foliage: English and Algerian ivy, pothos (Hunter's robe), climbing or creeping fig. marine ivy and philodendron species. These vines are ideal for heavily shaded areas in your landscape.

Low temperature, more than any other factor, usually will determine the kind of vine that can be successfully grown in a given area of the state. The trumpet creeper, painted trumpet, Carolina yellow-jessamine, Confederate-jasmine and Chinese wisteria are a few of the more hardy vines suited to the climatic conditions found in northern Florida. Many of the tender vines can freeze down during the winter and sprout from the roots the following spring

To be effective, vines must be a part of an overall landscape plan. When properly used, they may add a new and handsome dimension to your landscape.

## **CPK** level reveals hurts, heart attacks

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband had an elevated CPK level but diabetes was ruled out. What does this enzyme indicate?

DEARREADER: Creatinephosphokinase (CPK) is a protein enzyme that is present in muscle tissue. Although the blood stream normally contains a measurable amount, most of the enzyme is held by muscles. When muscles are damaged, bruised or injured, they release their CPK into the blood. This causes a marked rise in the blood level of CPK.

In the laboratory, technicians can not only measure blood CPK but can differentiate between the types of CPK that are released from voluntary (skeletal) muscle and from heart (cardiac) muscle. Therefore, CPK determinations are a useful way of diagnosing heart attack.

When cardiac muscle is damaged by a blood clot, the tissue leaks CPK; the amount measurable in the bloodstream gives an accurate indication of the extent of the heart attack - or whether It has occurred at all. For example, if a man has chest pain, faints and falls, striking his arm or leg, the CPK will be high. In such a case, the doctor needs to know whether the elevated CPK is due to the fall or to a combination of the injury plus cardiae damage.

Did a heart attack cause him to faint? The lab can solve the problem. If there was no heart attack, the skeletal CPK will be elevated and the cardiac CPK normal. In the presence of a heart attack, both skeletal and cardiac enzyme levels will be

CPK bears no direct relation to diabetes, increased blood sugar. From the information you supply, I conclude that your husband either strained, pulled or brutsed a muscle; his heart evidently was not affected. Ask his doctor to explain the type of CPK that was clevated and why. Diabetes is usually diagnosed with an analysis of the blood sugar, not of muscle enzymes.



A 5-0 club split is not a serious problem if East has all five, but to protect against West's having all the length. South must lead a low club to dummy's J-10. That will sacrifice a trick in many instances. but that is a fair price to pay to guarantee making the slam contract. However, even this

Suppose you play low from dummy on the opening lead. East plays the jack and you winthe king. Now you lead a low club to dummy's jack, West playing low. You return to your hand with a diamond to lead another club. West now goes upwith the oueen and plays back a diamond. Where has your transportation gone for the fifth club trick? What you must do to be absolutely safe for 12 tricks is win the ace or queen of spades in dummy, then come to your hand with a high diamond to lead upto the J-10-3 of clubs in dummy. Now your communication is secure since you can return via the second diamond for another club play toward dummy and save the king of spades until you
