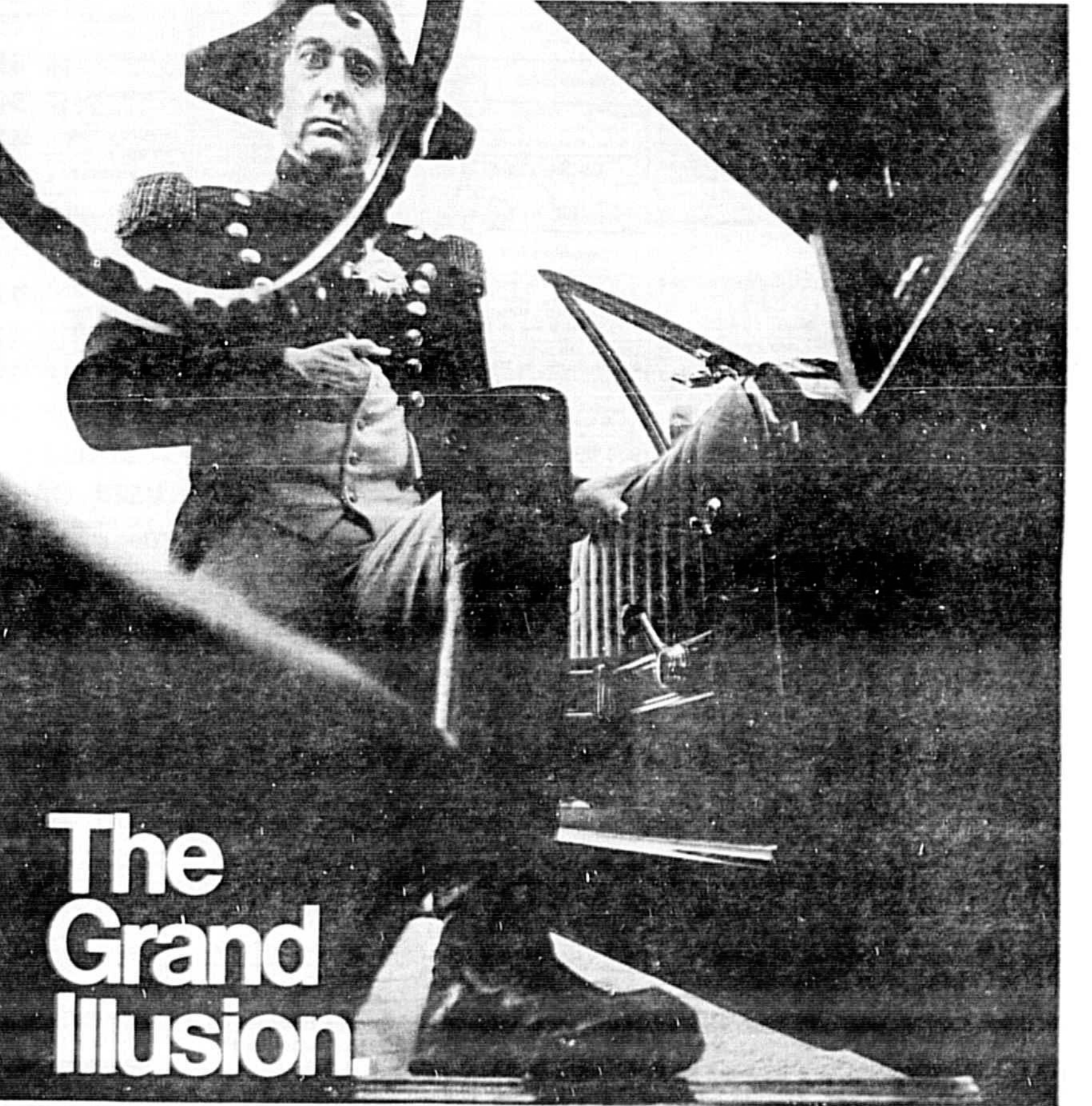

Invokes Christmas Blessing On All Men Pope Paul Deplores World Wars, Hatreds

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI today deplored the world's wars and hatreds as Christmas approaches. He cited Vietnam, the Indian subcontinent, Northern Ireland and the Middle East.

In a 3,900-word address to cardinals and bishops who work at the Vatican, the pontiff also strongly upheld precisely celibacy and warned Christians not to water down religious duties and discipline to make life "more comfortable and easy."

He called upon "all men of good will" to plunge into action to help their fellow men. "Let no one absent himself," the Pope said, "from all collaborative efforts to overcome the present difficulties in clerical life, did not find anachronistic this way of... selecting for the priestly ministry only those who... freely choose holy celibacy."

By near-unanimity the synod fathers voted to uphold the rule that priests may not marry. The synod split however on whether married men should be ordained to help refill clerical ranks, thinning by priests who quit the ministry.

Adding an optimistic note, the Pope said he had "the greatest confidence" that "sinners and deep love, with suffering for the Church, will be capable of bringing about constructive and positive results."

The pontiff closed his address by invoking Christmas blessings on "all men" and inviting them all to work for peace.

Counsel Is Appointed Probationer Is Remanded

In an "on and off" sentencing, Maria McCadden, who appeared at "high noon" yesterday before Circuit Judge Roger Dykes heard her case scheduled for further arraignment and hearing, pending the advice of counsel.

Miss McCadden, who appeared wearing faded blue jeans and tee-shirt, with her blonde tresses held in a pony tail, had entered a guilty plea on Feb. 23 to attempted possession of narcotics. She had been charged with possession of narcotics. The court placed her on probation for two years.

She was recently apprehended for violation of that probation, being charged with leaving the county without the knowledge of the probation supervisor in that she was seen at the El Rancho Motel in Maitland on Sept. 16 by Maitland detectives.

Further she is alleged to have been in possession of a hypodermic syringe and to have failed to adhere to a midnight curfew.

She appeared before the court on Dec. 14, said she wished an attorney and heard Assistant Public Defender Gerald Rutberg appointed to defend her. Later, she wrote the court she did not want counsel. Yesterday, she pleaded guilty to leaving the county and violating the curfew, but innocent to possession of the syringe.

However, Judge Dykes noted that he felt the defendant should be advised by counsel before entering the plea and again appointed Rutberg.

Miss McCadden was remanded to custody.

177-House Plat Aired For Longwood Council

LONGWOOD — Representatives of Council Enterprises, of Orlando, revealed plans for a 177-house subdivision to the City Council Thursday night, along with request for annexation of the 32 acres adjacent to Longwood on the north. At present only 12 acres of the land is in the city.

Council was asked to consider annexing the developer to set up a package sewer treatment plant on the city's planned sewer site nearby to serve the area. The development represents the 32-acre parcel planned to be known as SkyPark Estates with homes for the most part 2½ in the \$18,000 to \$23,000 price range, is planned for the 32 acres adjacent to Longwood on the north. At present only 12 acres of the land is in the city.

Access to the planned subdivision is to be via a city easement, the representative said, and through connecting to a street that connects to Logan Drive in Longwood.

The request was referred to the zoning board for study and recommendation.

In other business Seacrest Construction Corporation, new owners of the 48-acre Devonshire property on SR 434, were advised to seek county opinion on its request that the city annex the county's portion of a city-owned tract adjacent to the city, the city attorney, at the same time, was instructed to prepare an ordinance of annexation for the 14 acre addition as Devonshire.

Again, we pause to commemorate the birth of a spirit Who suffered persecution and crucifixion to demonstrate a greater love than mortal man can conceive.

The gift of a Son at Bethlehem still reminds us that sacrifice is not obsolete and that brotherly love

is the cardinal precept for human behavior. Today the spirit of love speaks to us across twenty centuries to proclaim humanitarianism as the sacred obligation of all men and nations.

Christmas should be a day of reverent gratitude and neither gifts nor tinsel should detract from our commemoration of the birth of a Savior. The gifts of infinite value are those which express kindness, tolerance and compassion. There can be no real love without giving.

Our music should continue to speak to all of the magic and love of Christmas. Our carols remain the world's most loved music as they strike a chord of joy within the hearts of young and old.

It is our hope that the true spirit of this Christmas season — its joy, its hope and its childlike faith abide with you.

Don Oakley Says: Party Time Is Any Time

Such an everyday thing as one's attitude toward time can be a bar to understanding between the races.

So says a monograph, "How to Talk With People of Other Races, Ethnic Groups and Cultures," published in Los Angeles by an organization with the mouth-filling name of the Trans Ethnic Education-Communication Foundation.

As an example of the "hang loose" attitude of blacks, the monograph relates the experience of a white college professor who gave a dance for 20 couples, blacks and whites.

"The time of the party had been announced as 8 p.m. By 9:30 most of the whites had arrived but only one black couple. By 11 all the whites and one or two more black couples had arrived and the host and hostesses were beginning to wonder if they were being snubbed. And until midnight, when some whites were thinking of leaving, did the party begin in earnest. The blacks who arrived late made no effort to apologize. They had simply been awaiting an "A.P." (African People) Time."

It is not clear just what the message is here.



The implication cannot be that blacks are genetically different from whites in their appreciation of time for they were by nature unreliable and incapable of running a business like an airline which must (usually) adhere to strict schedules. The difference is a cultural one.

Big brother can't be implicated in that which makes of time a rigid, for if African People Time consistently runs two or three hours behind American European Time, it is a time that would also be pretty rigid. "White" time itself runs behind. "Black" time itself runs ahead.

And what about the black couple that arrived at 9:30 and then "hang loose" whites who don't arrive until 10?

Cancer Conquest Aim Of Funding

WASHINGTON (AP) — The man picked by President Nixon to launch what he called "an unprecedented attack" and "a great crusade" against the disease which each year kills more Americans than died in combat during all of World War II.

"I think it would be a great mistake to build up false hopes, to talk about crash programs, or to put success in any time frame," said Donna C. Schmidt in an interview after he was named chairman of the President's National Cancer Panel.

"All we can promise the American people is that we will give them the very best program American science can provide."

Nixon made the same point Thursday when he signed the

National Cancer Act and launched what he called "an unprecedented attack" and "a great crusade" against the disease which each year kills more Americans than died in combat during all of World War II.

"We would not want to raise false hopes by simply the signing of an act," Nixon told the congressmen, public officials and health group leaders at the bill-signing ceremony, "that we can say this:

"That for those who have cancer, and who are looking for success in this field, they at least can have the assurance that everything that can be done by government, everything that can be done by voluntary agencies in this great,

Judge Cracks Down On Pollution

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge here has declared all waste discharge into non-navigable waterways illegal and barred the federal government from legalizing them with discharge permits.

In addition, District Judge Aubrey E. Robinson, Jr., ruled that the government may not issue discharge permits even for navigable waters, unless it first prepares an environmental impact study on each permit application.

Some 20,000 applications have been filed by industries, many of which already dump wastes, treated and untreated, into waterways.

Robinson said no federal agency activity may be exempted from the legal requirements for an environmental impact statement merely because the action itself is intended to protect the environment.

Robinson's decision also appeared to enlarge the meaning of "non-navigable waters" to include many streams, rivers or lakes which the federal government would view as "navigable waters."

3 Die As Storms Hit State, Islands

A 26-foot sloop out of Yarmouth, Mass., was disabled in 15-foot seas seven miles off Fort Pierce. A helicopter finally hoisted three passengers to safety, but a fourth person—identified as an elderly woman—was washed overboard before help arrived.

The sloop Ian's Cradle radioed for assistance Thursday afternoon, reporting it was lost, hand torn sails and was taking on water, spokesman said.

The 45-foot trawler Island City was sunk 20 miles south of Miami early Thursday morning in heavy seas. Coast Guard officers spent nearly 15 harrowing hours in a tiny life craft.

Two of the crewmen tried to swim ashore from Bayside Bay and one of them drowned in the attempt. His identity was not immediately released.

A crewman on the 32-foot trawler Gulf Star fell overboard and drowned while trying to get back on the boat near Georgetown on Grand Cayman Island, owners of the boat said. He was identified as Danny Martin.

A spokesman for Gulfshore Seaford Co. of Punta Gorda said the boat had put in to Georgetown to make arrangements to fly the crew back to Florida for the Christmas holidays when the accident occurred.

Hope Seeking PW's Release

PHU HAI, Vietnam (AP) — Canadian Bob Hope said a South Vietnamese official told him that American prisoners of war would be released "tomorrow" if President Nixon sets a date for total U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam.

Hope, giving additional details today on his 90-minute talk Thursday with Nguyen Van Thanh, first secretary of the North Vietnamese Embassy in Vietnam, Laos, said:

"I would say the odds are very long," he declared.

During his meeting with Thanh, Hope made an offer of an unspecified donation to North Vietnamese charities including orphanages in return for the release of American prisoners of war.

While he did not mention any specific amount during the meeting, he said at an earlier news conference in Bangkok that he was thinking in terms of about \$10 million that could be raised through benefit shows in the United States.

The seven-point peace plan was advanced by the Communist side at the Paris talks last July 1, and has been rejected by the Nixon administration.

The first point said all U.S. prisoners would be released if the U.S. government sets a terminal date for withdrawal from South Vietnam.

The 68-year-old comedian, speaking to newsmen after a performance for GIs at this northern base, said his chances appear slim for obtaining a visa to enter North Vietnam to negotiate for the release of prisoners as a "private citizen."

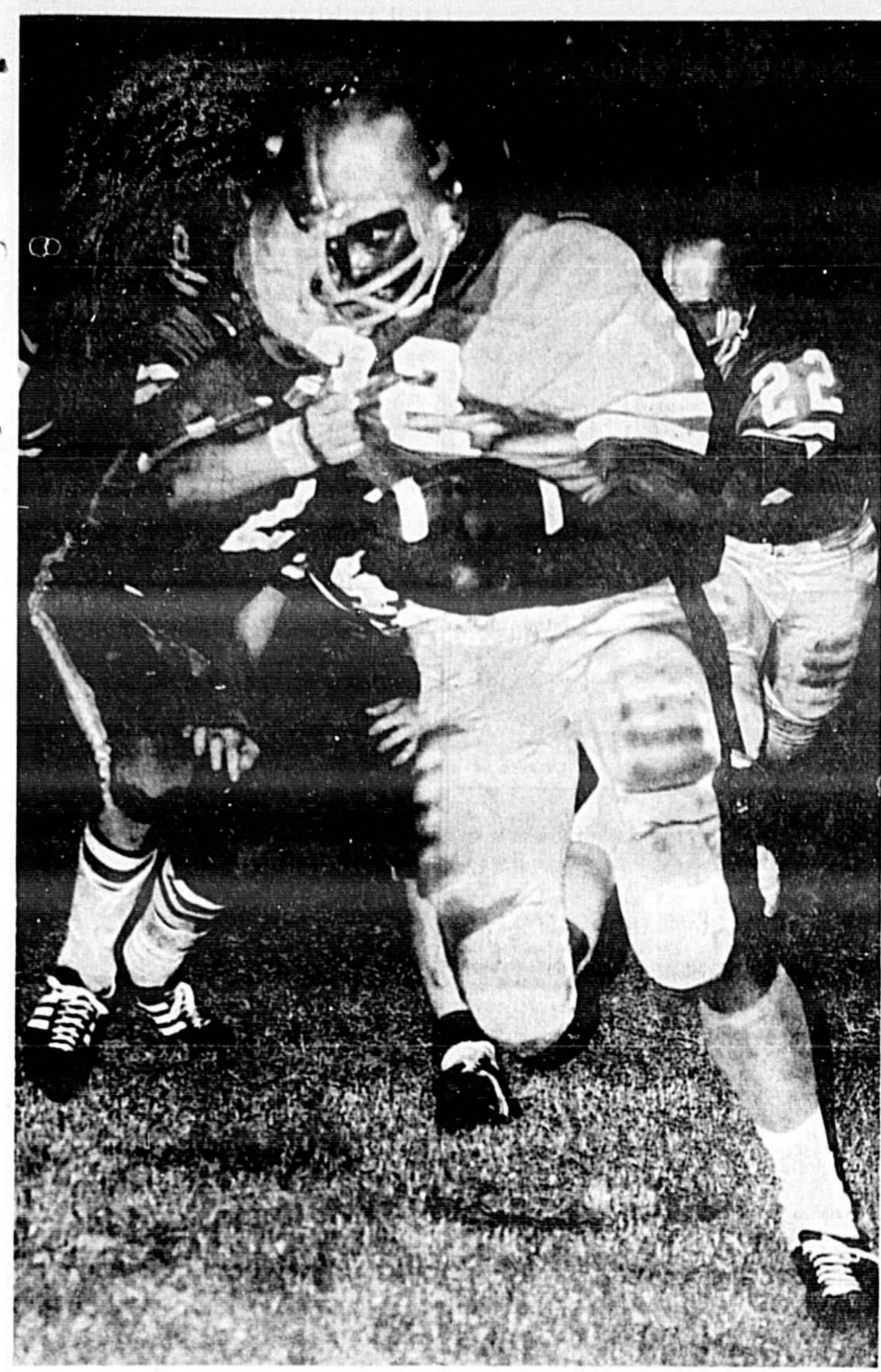

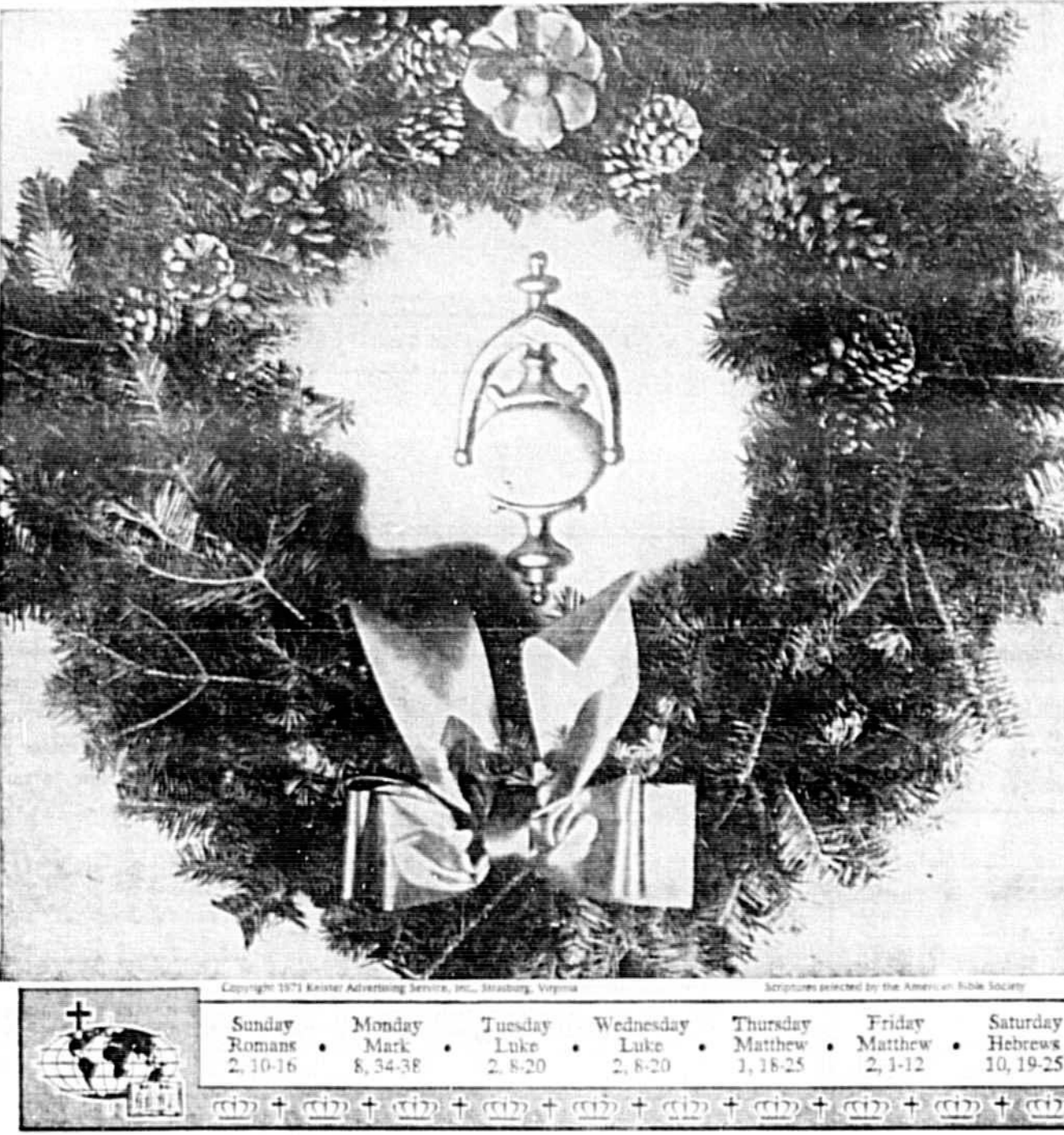

Lights and candles have always been associated with Christmas Day. They were used both on the tree, and lighted in the windows of the houses.

This is in keeping with the celebration of Christ's birthday; "Christmas" means "mass of Christ," the word derives from the church celebration of the day, which formed a very important part of the holidays observance in early medieval days.

It is not the actual birthday of Christ we observe, for that date is lost in legend. There was no celebration for over 200 years after His death!

The Romans had a great feast in honor of Saturn, the Sun God. This Saturnalia was held in December at the turn of the winter solstice. The northern races celebrated the Yuletide (heaven winter feast) at the same time, decorating trees with lights. These lighted trees were called sun trees.

About 400 A.D. the Pope, Julius I, fixed December 25 as the date on which Christmas was to be observed, and ordered masses to be held to replace the pagan rites.

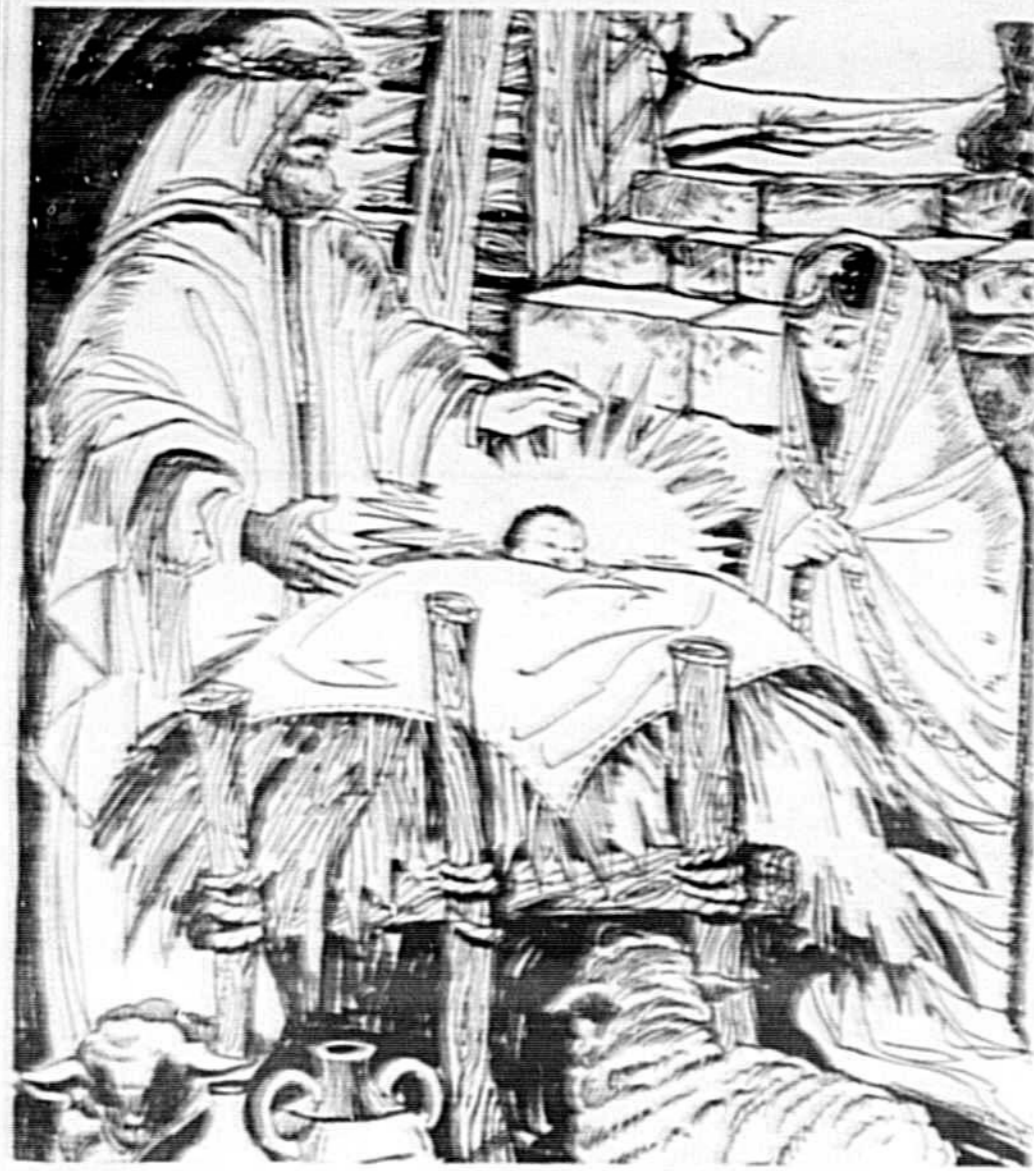

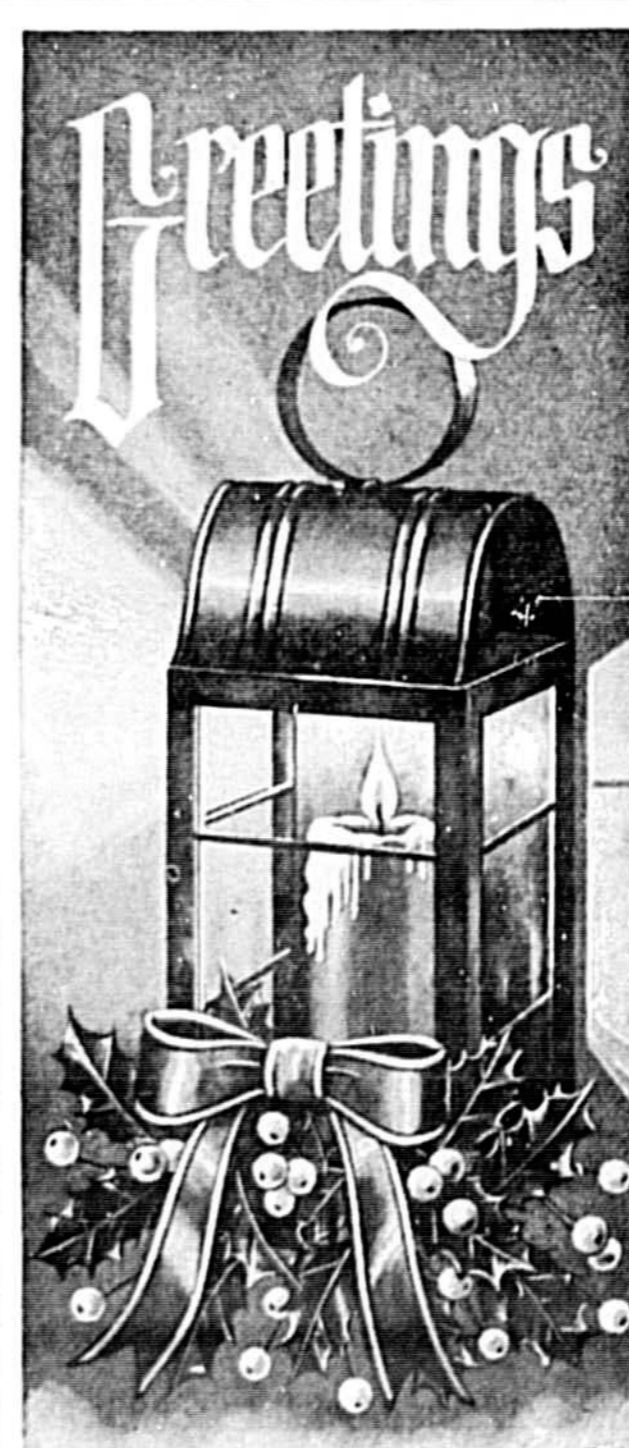

the musical tradition of Christmas

The musical tradition of Christmas is believed to have begun in 125, when Telesphorus, Bishop of Rome, decreed that "in the holy night of the Nativity of our Lord and Savior, (all) do celebrate public church services and in them solemnly sing the Angel's Hymn..."



Since then, literally thousands of carols have been written by such as Sir Walter Raleigh, Martin Luther, Johannes Brahms, Francis Scott Key, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow and Pope Pius IX.

But Christmas songs weren't called carols until well into the 13th Century, because, during most of the Middle Ages, priests and monks did all the singing inside the churches.

His eyes, how they twinkled!
His cheeks, how merry!
His nose like a cherry!
His droll little mouth was drawn
up like a bow, and the beard of his chin was as white as the snow.

The people were only allowed to sing and dance outside, making up words and tunes about the birth of Christ. The French word "carole" and the Italian "carola" both mean a ring dance accompanied by singing, and from this comes our word carol.

The first American Christmas carol was written by a French Jesuit missionary named John de Brebeuf. He composed a song called "Jesus is Born" for the Huron Indians with whom he worked in the early 1600s.

ANCIENT HEBREW PRAYER

did the moon-silhouetted face of a 19th century handyman inspire one of most famous poems?

Written almost 150 years ago by Clement Clark Moore, this poem helped create one of the great legendary figures of all time, the "plump and jolly old elf," Santa Claus, who up to that time was depicted as rather a paunchy and somber St. Nicholas whose living prototype had been at the Fourteenth Century.

According to tradition, Moore read the poem to his children that Christmas Eve, although it seems more likely that the children were already in bed by the time he finished writing the poem. He probably read it the next day — Christmas Day, 1822.

But whenever he read it, the poem was an immediate success — not only with his own children, but with others.

Moore's "The Night Before Christmas" earned him lasting fame. It eclipsed his important work in linguistic scholarship and it is fitting therefore that the famous ballad has now been translated into more than 50 languages.

Santa Claus Getting Fatter in Italy

Most Italians exchange gifts on Epiphany, January 6, the day the good witch Befana distributes gifts to good boys and girls.

Up until a couple of years ago she was unchallenged for the favor of youngsters. Now, however, in increasing numbers, Italians look to Santa Claus to bring gifts on the day most Western Europeans do, on Christmas Day.

Santa became popular after World War II, he was known as Babbo Natal (Father Christmas). In those days Santa was thin, but observers say that in recent years the jolly elf grows ever fatter.

Another indication of change: The season starts earlier too. By mid-November, just like in America, merchants were putting up Christmas decorations. The picturesque Zampagnari, shepherds from the Abruzzi hills, arrived in Rome weeks ahead of time to play carols to their bagpipes.

St. Francis Tried to Awaken Christ-Spirit Among the Hedonists

Like all the stories about Francis of Assisi, the following story bears record of his faithful conformity to the example of humility and poverty personified in his Lord, Jesus Christ.

Long ago, in the 13th century when Francis went about doing his good deeds in a dark world, he and a few of his companions were celebrating the festival of Christmas in the friars' lodging at Rieti. Some of the monks thought it fitting, because of the presence of a high ecclesiastic, to lay out a table "a bit special," and set out a table with white linen and glassware.

When Francis saw the elegance of the table he called one of the monks and told him to tell the friars not to wait for him if he should not come promptly at mealtime.

When the friars had got midway into the feast there was a knock on the door. Francis entered, leaning heavily on a beggar's staff and advancing meekly as a pauper. In a beseeching voice he called out, "For the love of the Lord God, give alms to this poor, infirm pilgrim!"

The visiting priest and all at the table gasped with astonishment. Finally the guest of honor broke the startled silence. "For the love of that Lord whom thou hast named, we will give you of the alms which the Lord has given us."

Francis humbly accepted the platter and bread the prelate offered him and sat down on the dirt floor beside the table.

Again silence fell over all. The friars looked miserable and unhappy with their beloved leader squatting on the ground like a beggar, and could not eat. Francis at last spoke:

"When I saw the table worshipfully and sumptuously laid out, I thought within myself it was not the table of poor men of God who daily go from door to door for alms. For it becomes me, dearest, more than other men, to follow the example of the humility and poverty of Christ, because we are professed and called to this before God and men.

Dear brothers, the feasts of the Lord and of the holy men of God are rather honored with the want and poverty by which those godly men conquered heaven for themselves than with the elegance and superlativity which they are far removed from heaven."

Francis spoke these words with a gentle voice, without the edge of reproval and reproach.

No wonder men and women from all walks of life were compelled to believe in the love of God because they saw it witnessed daily in the life of this little man of God!

In Manhattan's diplomatic circles there are 74 consulate offices and dozens of United Nations missions. Hundreds of officials celebrate the holiday season in many typical as well as national ways that reflect the traditions of their homelands.

Though New York is famous as a city of great warmth and hospitality during the Christmas season, these little foreign centers give a special, variegated glow of their own.

The Consul General of Sweden, for instance, occupies the great gray 18-room mansion at 600 Park Avenue. The magnificent house, with its 18 rooms and seven baths, was built in 1912 by the architect James Gamble Rogers.

The house now decorated for Christmas with dozens of Swedish straw animals and stars and copper bowls full of greens and candles on every window sill is festive and beautiful, particularly with fires roaring in the great fireplaces.

The modern Greek Christmas echoes the country's seafaring past. Youngsters make paper boats to set adrift in the sea or on rivers . . . St. Basil, who distributes Christmas toys, makes his rounds in a boat . . . and pictures of anchors appear in countless windows. Decorative icons capture this spirit; they depict not only saints and religious symbols, but ships, anchors, and letters of the alphabet as well. Members of the family can make them of plastic clay imprinted with a pencil or swab stick, then painted with water colors and baked in an oven until they are firm.

Greek "welcome trees" are poles garlanded with evergreen and water-repellent tinsel, then topped with flaming torches.

The ancient custom of burning the Yule log at Christmas is preserved on many French tables in the shape of a log and then covered with chocolate and colorful icing decorations.

No French homemaker would dare set a holiday buffet table without a carefully arranged centerpiece of red roses. They're also used liberally in decorating the home, along with a variety of greenery, bright ribbons, and baubles.

Holly — as in the Advent wreath bearing four candles — guarded against witches, thunder and lightning. The wreath itself is an early symbol of victory and glory. On three of the four Sundays of Advent, a candle is lit while the family joins in prayer. Four candles are lit on the final Sunday, denoting the coming of the Saviour as the Light of the World.



Greens and apples together, as in the tri-light tree, signify hope for the forthcoming spring. On Christmas Eve, the family gathers and sings carols. Father lights the first candle, and Christmas Eve dinner is served. The second candle is lit on Christmas Day; the third on New Year's Day when the festivities end.

Tart jam, a favorite with Austrian cooks, provides unexpected holiday flavor in Linzer Cake, a plum jam filling in a bread-crumbed nut crust. The little Nut Butter floozies are adapted from Zauner Krapfen.

"In with the good luck, out with the bad" is the spirit in which misfortune is smoked from house and stable in Austria. The sparkler man holds sparklers to be lit on Christmas Day.

Medieval Holiday Festivities

"In the Twelve Days of Christmas My true love said to me... The verses are among the most popular of the Season. They date back to 867 A.D. when the Church proclaimed the period of twelve days, from the Nativity to Epiphany, a period of celebration.

It is in fact the big holiday of the year in most countries where Christianity exists. In medieval England festivities ranged the calendar day and night. There were jousts, with knights in armor; poems; flying, and lances flashing in the sun, and wimpled ladies watching from the stands. There was banqueting, caroling, and also "mumming" which originally was a pantomime dance performed by groups who wore both costumes and masks. Minstrels and jugglers plied their arts, made music and mirth.

In the Middle Ages, when few people could read, and entertainment as we know it did not exist, a minstrel was of necessity a multi-talented fellow. One of these, in listing his accomplishments, after noting the many instruments he can play, says: "I can sing a song well and make tales and fables. I can tell a story against any man, I can make love verses to please young ladies, and can play the gallant to them if necessary. Then I can throw knives into the air and catch them without cutting my fingers. I can do dodgers with a string most extraordinary and amusing. I can balance chairs and make tables dance. I can throw a somersault and walk on my head."

This English minstrel, of course, had his counterpart in Europe, where the twelve days were celebrated too, with feasting, pageantry, and song. In England some of the "pretty devices" preceding the banquets in the big halls on Twelfth Day are unbelievable-sounding concoctions which included castles with cannons and ships with guns which, at the proper moment, were fired against each other in semblance of a rousing battle.

Portugal and Spain reportedly was the path taken by the Kings. Here on the route of the Magi the Wise Men are of particular importance in the Andalusian countries. Sidewalk shops and kiosks offer reproductions for sale in glittering array — some of carved wood, some of paper-mache or pottery.

Today, more sophisticated Americans emulate these old-world craftsmen. They make Wise Men using cans and plastic foam heads embellished with bright and ingenious decorations. Custom decrees that the Magi be met on Epiphany Eve at the edge of town. In Portugal, young and old go

out that night, carrying a variety of food for men and animals. This colorful caravan also offers presents such as artfully arranged bouquets of dried flowers, grasses, and feathers, and splendid metallic palm-tosses bound with beads or mirrors at their centers.

But alas for the welcoming committee, the Magi always seem to slip into town by another road. When the disappointed children have eaten the goodies and returned, they are consoled by finding the Wise Men assembled in the village church. Then they parade in with their wonderful gifts for the wild Kings.

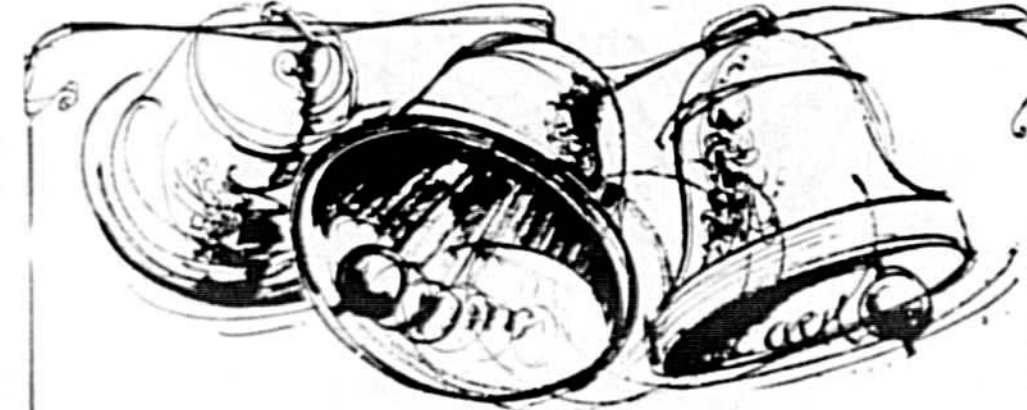

The custom of decorating homes with green branches actually harks back to the days before Christ's birth.



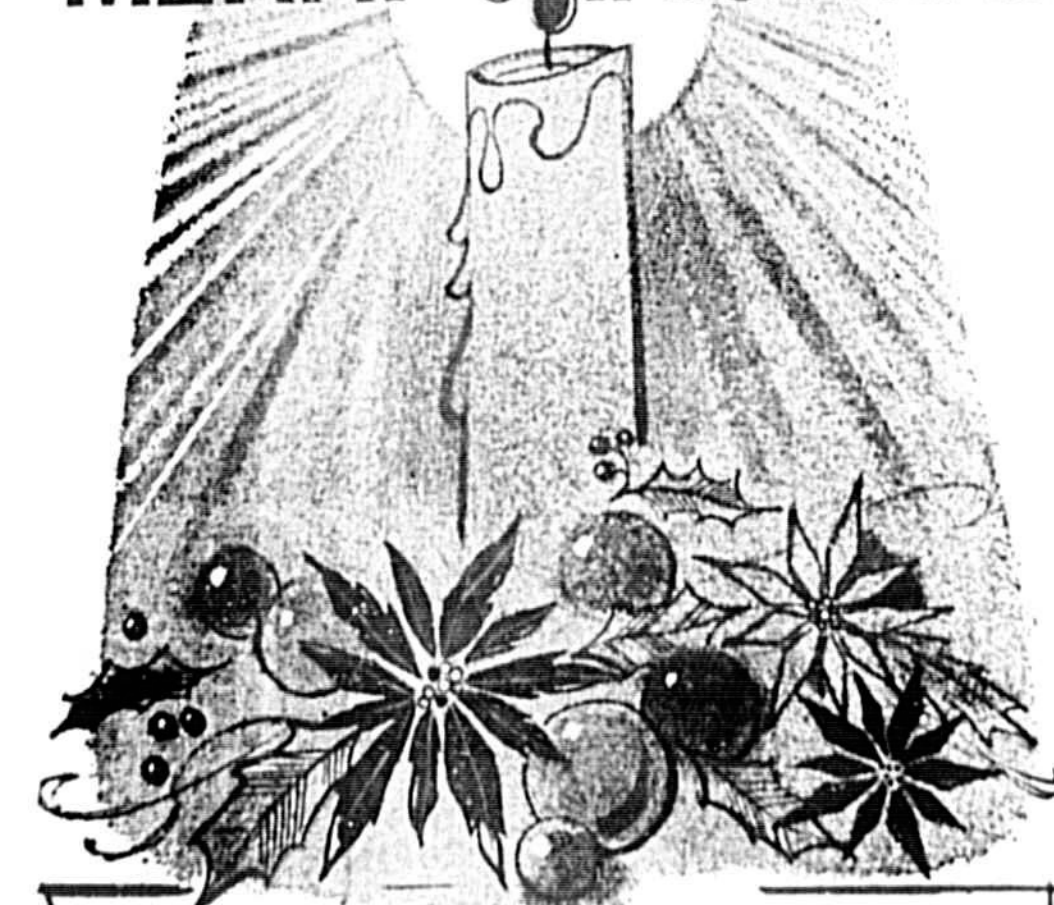

obscure ecclesiastic was the 1st Saint Nick

St. Nicholas, the Bishop of Myra, born in the fifth century in Patara, Turkey, was a living legend during his lifetime because of his love of people and his charities.

Nicknamed fondly Noel Baba, he was known as the saint of virgins, for helping poor and unmarried girls to secure dowries for marriage.

He was also the favorite of seamen. Even pirates respected him because of his uncanny sixth sense about weather. His bones, believed to have curative powers, were stolen from his tomb here and carried to Bari, Italy, 1092, where they still rest.

Why is St. Nicholas associated with Christmas? Festivities of St. Nicholas Day, which falls on Dec. 6, used to extend until Christmas time, and were so popular that finally the two were incorporated into one — making St. Nicholas the symbol of Christmas.

The St. Nicholas Festival found its way into the United States with Dutch emigrants and St. Nicholas' name gradually became Santa Claus.

No Christmas services are held in the Church of St. Nicholas in downtown DeLand (ancient Myra) because there are no priests or any Christians here now. The church, with a gendarme station and trees blocking its view from the street, has now been completely restored by the Moslem Turks.

The interior is lighted through glass-covered arches and windows behind the altar. Mosaics on the floor of the 48 by 24-foot nave and frescoes of saints on the walls inside the church and the courtyard are still visible.

Nobody mad at anyone, in particular... and yet (at this early writing) we had 502 become a statistic!

Again, via rationalization, you assume that some were negligent either through excessive drinking or by their poor driving habits... but how about those who didn't stand a chance. They weren't drinking; were within the speed limits, etc. and yet also included in this waste of human life on our highways!

Something has to be done about it... and I do mean NOW!

We used to have a pretty good law around Seminole County a couple years back on handling those DWIs. As I remember it, for the first offense there was a stiff fine... and if it occurred again, you had to serve 10 days in the local bastille.

What ever happened to that law?

The city of Chicago now has implemented a similar law with effective results.

Molodt convicted of driving under the influence of intoxicating beverages were sentenced to a minimum of seven days in the pokey and hit with an unconditional revocation of their driver's license for a year.

It worked... last December, traffic fatalities during the final 14 days of the year dropped 62 per cent; from an average of 22 killed during those weeks in previous years to only eight in 1970.

Injuries dropped more than 50 per cent, from 2,002 the previous year to 994 in the last two weeks in 1970.

Only one of the 1970 auto deaths involved alcohol. Earlier holiday figures showed that more than 50 per cent of the fatal Chicago traffic crashes involved drunk drivers.

**Parolee Is Jailed
On Rape Charge**

A 24-year-old South Seminole Raiford parolee is being held in county jail charged with the Christmas rape of a 19-year-old Winter Park girl. Det. Sgt. Raymond Parker said David Marion Mullis, Mattland carpenter, is being held without bond on a county warrant charging him with the rape of a friend's fiancée.

The detective said Mullis attended a holiday party at the home of a friend and asked his alleged victim to "give him a lift home."

Mullis, according to Parker, assaulted the girl twice at separate south county areas after placing a knife to her throat and threatening her life unless she submitted.

The first assault is alleged to have occurred on a dirt lane known as Grove Avenue, which is off Howell Branch Road and Bear Gully Road. The second incident is reported to have happened on Dyke Road, between Red Bug Road and Howell Branch Road.

The victim said she was made to disrobe by Mullis and deputies reported finding several articles of woman's clothing left at the rape scene.

Parker said after the second assault, the victim was released but warned not to call police.

Instead the girl returned to her fiancé's home and he called sheriff's officers to advise them of the attacks.

A warrant was obtained from County Judge Wallace Hall. Mullis voluntarily came to the sheriff's office after receiving notification.

Parker said Mullis is in parole from Raiford Prison after conviction on a breaking and entering offense.

**Janitor Bequeaths
\$300,000 Estate**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Sam Hamilton, a shy, quiet man who spent his declining years as a dishwasher in a mission and a janitor at the stock exchange has left a \$300,000 fortune.

His bequests became known over the weekend. They include \$150,000 to the Life Lane Mission in San Francisco and \$100,000 to Messiah College in Grantham, Pa. Both are operated by the Brethren in Christ Church.

Confirming the bequests, Rev. Paul Hill, superintendent of the mission, said Hamilton also had willed \$1,000 each to more than a dozen friends he had aided during the 25 years he lived at the mission.

Hamilton entered a convalescent home at Upland, in Southern California, in 1969, and died there last April 4 at the age of 89.

The minister said the staff knew that Hamilton had some money but was surprised at the amount.

He worked at the Pacific Coast Stock Exchange for many years, and "he apparently picked up some pretty good tips," said Hill.

At the mission he paid \$50 a month for his room, always in cash, and earned his meals by helping in the kitchen.

Nevertheless, he stressed, it's satisfactory and "we have lots of bare spots in the inventory which means that many items are sold out." Exchanges, he said, are "so far, so good"...

Noting that many persons wait until after the new year to begin their exchanges, "There is good customer traffic today," Cowan said.

Ending on a note of levity, The Herald's Oris Williams, co-owner with Larry Blair, of the doggie domain, Caro-Sell, quipped that "Physicians" was "frustrated and decorated as well as the Christmas trees and decorations at the people palace sporting and 'a green box,' and were pedicured to the nth degree."

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Stan Levin and family woke on the morning after Christmas to find their home engulfed in flames. They just managed to escape with little more than the clothes they were wearing.

Friends, neighbors and strangers were moved by the tragedy.

Within a few hours donations began pouring in and now, much to his dismay, Levin says he is almost better off than he was before.

"I don't think it's fair for a family to come out of a disaster with more than they had when it happened," said Levin, an elementary school teacher.

A fire department captain named Levin, his wife, Estelle, and their three children a vacant house across the street, friends, neighbors and strangers filled it with furniture and groceries and neighboring children collected two jars of an undischarged amount of coins and paper money.

"Bless them all for their tremendous generosity... I'm an independent guy and I hate taking charity but what can you do when people just take over and insist you let them help?" Levin asked.

Fire investigators said the blaze apparently started in the living room of undetermined cause.

The Levin's two daughters suffered minor cuts and bruises.

Levin said he is going to try and restore his blackened home, but right now, "Somehow I've got to thank all those people—the many, many people I don't even know."
