##### Bad burglar surrenders again

PORT LAUDERDALE — For the second time in a year, the same burglar was caught during a break-in and surrendered to irate citizens who gave chase in their cars, police said.

"Remember you got arrested by the girl last time?" Detective Robert Edgerton asked David Watson, 27, during Watson's arrest Thursday.

"You better give up this occupation. You're obviously bad at it."

Watson was rummaging through dresser drawers when homeowner John Giovanelli stopped home for lunch. Giovanelli, 40, saw the burglar and ran out of the house and yelled for a neighbor to call police.

The burglar bolted out the back door, scaled a 6-foot fence and ran off. Giovanelli chased him on foot but gave up after 1 1/2 blocks, police said.

Giovanelli ran back to his house, got a gun, jumped in his car and went looking for the burglar. Six blocks away he caught sight of Watson and fired his gun into a lawn to get his attention. Edgerton acted.

## Park work ahead of schedule; planners to add extra features

SANFORD — Last night's turnout of nearly 300 volunteers helping build a community playground at Park on Park has helped earn a bonus because construction is ahead of schedule.

After yesterday's goals were reached, playground construction supervisors decided the project is far enough ahead to add extras. Site coordinator Danny Lee said this morning. An old-fashioned porch swing, one of the details added to the plans last night, will be placed beneath oak trees at the southwestern corner of the one-acre park at Park Avenue and Ninth Street, he said.

Lee said crews will begin spreading gravel tomorrow, a day earlier than planned.

"We are far ahead of my expectations," Lee said.

Volunteers are still needed to help today through Sunday. In spite of progress during the first two days of construction, Lee said. Hand tools, extension cords and wheelbarrows are still needed, he said.

More than 40 local residents were at work on the playground before 8:30 a.m. today, picking up where last night's crew left off. Several local construction workers were to return to the park today following Contractor's Day yesterday.

Kathy Howard of the playground food committee said charcoal, sugar, salt and pepper are needed to help feed volunteers expected tomorrow and Sunday.

Trinity United Methodist Church, seven circles of the Garden Club of Sanford and several civic organizations are providing dinners for volunteers. Local restaurants have provided lunches.

Last night children scrubbed more than 40 tires in a special work area for volunteers ages 6 to 9. Children will continue scrubbing tires and sanding lumber today.

Movies are shown nightly from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. as part of Kids Camp, child care organized by the playground core committee. Activities are scheduled for children throughout the day tomorrow and Sunday.

Maria Jean's Day Care, located west of the park on Elm Street, is providing child care for toilet-trained children ages 2 through 9 whose parents are working in the park.

Anyone wishing to volunteer with construction, child care or meal preparation may sign in at the volunteer tent on the corner of Park Avenue and Eighth Street. Volunteers will work tonight until about 9 p.m., tomorrow from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Sunday 8 a.m. until the park dedication at 9 p.m.

A barbecue will be held in the park following the dedication.

## Not guilty, Kelleys tell judge

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioner Jennifer Kelley and her husband Eoghan Kelley today entered pleas of not guilty to a total of 115 charges of campaign finance violations.

Seminole County Judge William W. Henderson set a Dec. 13 trial date for the both Kelleys.

Neither Kelley nor their attorneys appeared in court this morning after previously filing their pleas with the court. No elaboration on the pleas was offered.

The Kelleys were charged last Tuesday by the State Attorney's Office with a total of 115 campaign violations, all misdemeanors.

Jennifer Kelley faces 63 charges alleging she violated state election laws. Eoghan Kelley faces 52 charges alleging violated state election laws.

If convicted, Jennifer Kelley faces a maximum of 63 years in prison and \$63,000 in fines. Eoghan Kelley faces up to 52 years in prison and \$53,000 in fines.

The charges stem from a complaint filed in April by Jennifer Kelley's opponent for the District 5 county commission seat, Art Davis.

State prosecuting attorneys allege Eoghan Kelley paid several people, including several past and present Seminole High School students, to work on

## Doctor testifies, says that shooting victims died within a minute

SANFORD — Daniel and Carolyn Dinda were both shot through the heart and died within a minute while in bed in their Oviedo home on June 6, 1988, according to Dr. Sarah Irgang, county medical examiner at the time.

Dr. Irgang, testifying Thursday in the murder trial of the Dinda's daughter, Stephanie Gardner, said Daniel Dinda, 65, was shot three times, twice in the chest and once in the back. The two bullets which entered the chest both went through the heart, one passing completely through the body and one lodging in the body, she said.

## County happy to get what it can from strapped DOT

SANFORD — Fighting a financially restrained Florida Department of Transportation, Seminole County officials will make an appeal today to upgrade state roads in the county.

But unless state lawmakers "create" new money for the state's roads, a FDOT spokesman said few changes, if any, can be made to their proposed five-year plan that includes \$65 million for Seminole County improvements beginning in October 1990.

Seminole County Commission Chairman Sandra Glenn said she was pleased with the proposal.

"Anything they give us will be an improvement," Glenn said. "We always want more but

we're glad to get what we can get."

Glenn said FDOT plans to build two major Interstate 4 interchanges during the next three years and several intersection improvements throughout the county will help traffic flow quicker.

A public hearing will be held in Orlando today so the state can hear comments regarding their construction plans. The comments will be considered before the final proposal is submitted to the Florida Transportation Commission in mid-December. The proposed plan will be submitted to the governor and Legislature by mid-January.

Nancy Houston, a spokesman for the Central Florida FDOT district in DeLand, said the plan is based on current money available to the state for road work and not any new revenues the

Legislature may create when they meet in a special session in two weeks. Lawmakers will consider new revenue sources, including additional gasoline taxes and bonds.

If more money becomes available, Houston said the projects on the list scheduled for the later part of the five-year period could be moved to an earlier year and "many more" projects be added to the list.

Among the major Seminole County projects recommended are \$10.6 million to rebuild the interchange of Interstate 4 and Lake Mary Boulevard, scheduled to begin in 1991. An \$8.7 million interchange of I-4 and County Road 46-A is scheduled for 1992. A \$3.6 million I-4 overpass at Center Street in Altamonte Springs is scheduled to begin next year.

## 1989 has been a tragic record year for state's 'gentle giants'

CRYSTAL RIVER — State wildlife officials say 1989 has set a record for manatee deaths in Florida, so far surpassing the number of deaths recorded during all of last year.

More manatees were found dead in the first 10 months of 1989 than in all of 1988, said Beth Beeler, an official with the state Department of Natural Resources, during a Citrus County Manatee Advisory Committee meeting Wednesday.

Through October, at least 136 manatees have been found dead in Florida waters, three more than last year, Beeler said. At least 11 were found dead during October alone, she said.

Beeler said she wasn't certain what caused all the deaths, but said 43 of them were the result of collisions with boats or barges, the same number of collision deaths for all of 1988.

Gov. Bob Martinez and the Cabinet approved last week measures to restrict boating speeds on the state's waterways in an effort to make them safer for the docile sea cows, and for people.

But officials say violators simply are not watching out. Beeler said of the five deaths recorded this year in Citrus County, where manatees congregate in the winter, two were attributed to boat-barge collisions, two to natural causes and one was undetermined.

Ship freed from reef

MIAMI - A Yugoslavian ship grounded on sand and coral in the Dry Tortugas for three days was pulled free Thursday night by commercial tugboats, Coast Guard officials said.

The 473-foot container ship, which had been emptied of fuel oil, was refloated with ease shortly after 9 p.m. Coast Guard Petty Officer Steve Sapp said, adding that no spills or pollution were reported.

Officials were transporting the ship to deeper water, where it would be inspected for damage, Sapp said.

A commercial salvage company hired to free the ship decided earlier Thursday to delay an effort to refloat it until the 390 tons of fuel oil aboard the vessel was removed. Workers began removing the oil Wednesday, dumping it into barges.

Two thousand honor Lexington dead

PENSACOLA - A sea of drea whites covered the deck of the USS Lexington Thursday as 2,000 people came to honor a pilot, three sailors and a civilian killed last weekend when a jet crashed on the carrier.

"We've lost really good Lexington shipmates. Irreplaceable citizens of our Navy family and the Pensacola community," Capt. C. "Flack" Logan told the crowd.

Under gloomy skies, about 600 invited guests boarded the 40,000-ton Lexington to join 1,400 crew members for the tribute. A huge U.S. flag was draped behind the flower-flanked podium.

A pilot's helmet, three sailor's hats and the headgear worn by civilian technicians aboard Navy ships were reminders of the dead men.

Potential buyers looking at Braniff

ORLANDO - An aviation entrepreneur and an investment banker are separately exploring the possibility of buying Orlando-based Braniff Inc., which declared bankruptcy in late September.

Officials said Wednesday that both men - investment banker John Latahaw and Farhad Azima, who owns an aviation leasing company in Kansas City and has owned two charter airlines - have expressed interest in acquiring the carrier.

Like Azima, Latahaw has ties to Kansas City, where Braniff has a major hub.

Braniff moved to Orlando from Texas earlier this year and filed Chapter 11 bankruptcy Sept. 28. Since then it has been flying an abbreviated schedule.

Attorneys for the airline told a bankruptcy court in Philadelphia this week that Braniff could run out of operating capital by November 10 if it does not get more money. The carrier has hired Merrill Lynch Capital Markets to explore ways of generating income, including through sale of the airline.

School principal charged with smuggling

MIAMI - A school principal and four companions were arrested on smuggling charges as they returned from the Dominican Republic with bundles of cocaine taped around their waists, customs officials said Thursday.

Caridad Molina, 49, was arrested Monday with four female companions upon her return from Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic, aboard an American Airlines flight. She is the principal at the Lincoln-Marli School, a private elementary and secondary school in Miami.

Customs inspectors said each of the five women had a 10-pound bundle of cocaine taped around her waist. The inspectors said they were suspicious because of the women's bulky clothing and nervous behavior.

Arrested with Molina were Carmen Lopez, 53; Josefina Valido, 49; Norma Travieso, 55, and Inelda Perez, 50, all of Miami. Molina is a U.S. citizen and the others are all resident Cuban aliens, a Customs spokesman said.

All were turned over to the Florida Joint Task Group for prosecution. During their investigation, Task Group agents arrested a sixth woman, Buice Bermudez, 39, of Hialeah, and seized \$20,000 for her home.

The Florida Joint Task Group is an anti-drug task force made up of the Drug Enforcement Administration and the U.S. Customs Service.

Bankers investing in Martinez campaign

TAMPA - Investment bankers who have profited from the \$2 billion in bond issues approved by Republican Gov. Bob Martinez during his three years as governor are helping fuel his 1990 re-election campaign.

The governor has collected at least \$183,500 in campaign contributions from investment bankers, many of them from out of state, plus another \$130,000 from stockbrokers and other investment firms for a total of \$313,500 according to the latest campaign contribution reports.

Some of the firms' ties to Martinez stretch back to his days as mayor of Tampa, when he approved 12 bond issues worth \$718 million. Martinez later drew criticism for putting the city in debt far into the future.

Helicopter carrying drug agents crashes

Search intensifies for missing agent, cause of crash unknown

MIAMI - A helicopter with four U.S. Customs agents and two Bahamian police officers aboard crashed into the Atlantic Ocean south of Marathon, and the search intensified Friday for one agent still missing, Customs officials said.

Rescuers from the Navy, Coast Guard and Air Force added vessels and broadened the search area at dawn for the

missing Customs agent, who officials declined to identify, said Mike Sheehan, a U.S. Customs spokesman in Miami.

"At the last count we had two Customs planes, two Coast Guard helicopters and two Air Force aircraft, also one Customs vessel, two Coast Guard cutters and the Navy hydrofoil," Sheehan said.

Five of the other officers were recovered from the water with no apparent serious injuries

shortly after the mishap Thursday night, he said.

The agents were pursuing a speedboat suspected of carrying cocaine when the crash occurred about 9:30 p.m. Thursday some 75 miles southeast of Homestead Air Force Base, he said.

"They are very optimistic they will pick up the sixth guy," Sheehan said.

All six were able to leave the helicopter and "sound off" to each other after the crash, he said.

"It was our understanding all were able to get their life vests, which were inflatable, as they

were getting out of the helicopter," Sheehan said.

No cause has been determined for the crash of the \$6 million, jet-powered Black Hawk helicopter, which can travel faster than 200 mph.

The Bahamian officers were aboard in case the speedboat strayed into the islands' jurisdiction, Sheehan said.

"We have an ongoing regular program with them. They fly with us and in case something happens in the Bahamas we can land there. We need them aboard to make arrests in the Bahamas," Sheehan said.

Two killed in charter plane crash

MONTVERDE - Two people were killed Thursday when the light plane they were flying crashed into Lake Apopka northwest of Orlando, Federal Aviation Administration officials said.

FAA spokesman Jack Barker said the twin-engine Piper Aerostar went down about 8:40 a.m. on a flight to Orlando from Mount Pleasant, Texas.

The cockpit of the cargo plane, which belongs to Cherokee Express Charter of Orlando, was found by Orange County Sheriff's deputies Thursday, said sheriff's spokeswoman Denise Gainer. But she said the two men in the plane had not been found.

Deputies continued the search for the victims Thursday night. Gainer described the effort as a "very slow and painstaking" procedure because the murky lake water makes vision difficult.

Names and hometowns of the two victims had not been released pending notification of relatives. But a Cherokee official said both were Florida residents, and one was employed by Cherokee as a pilot. The other was a private passenger, she said.

The crash was the second this week in Florida involving a Piper Aerostar. Early Wednesday, an Aerostar went down near Fort Myers, killing one person and injuring another.

Officials had not determined the cause of either mishap.

Twelve charged in mob-related drug ring

MIAMI - An alleged member of the Sicilian Mafia and 11 other people were indicted on charges of operating a smuggling ring that shipped cocaine from Colombia and Florida to Italy and New York, the FBI said Thursday.

The 34-count indictment, returned late Wednesday by a federal grand jury in Miami, identified John Galatalo, 44, as the ringleader and as a member of the Sicilian Mafia.

Galatalo was charged with leading a continuing criminal enterprise, the so-called "kingpin" statute that carries a mandatory 15-year prison term.

"He is a significant player in the Colombian scheme of things," said FBI spokesman Paul Miller.

Galatalo has ties to Jose Gonzalo Rodriguez Gacha, one

of the leader's of Colombia's Medellin cartel, Miller said.

In late 1987, Galatalo's ring shipped 1,320 pounds of cocaine from Colombia through the Caribbean island of Aruba into the Mediterranean and ultimately to Sicilian Mafia leaders in Sicily, said William Gavin, special agent in charge of the Miami FBI office.

The shipment was one of the first documented shipments of a substantial quantity of cocaine directly from Colombia to Sicily, Gavin said.

"This case demonstrates the direct relationship by the Sicilian Mafia members and drug organizations based in Colombia and south Florida," Gavin said.

The indictment, which followed a two-year investigation by U.S. and Italian police, also charged that the group shipped various amounts of cocaine by

car and train from Miami to Sicilian Mafia members in New York from 1985 through 1987.

"This is part of an ongoing effort to smash the Sicilian Mafia's influence in cocaine and heroin smuggling in the United States," Miller said.

Said Gavin, "It also demonstrates the present worldwide co-operation which is under way and necessary to investigate and prosecute individuals responsible for the distribution of cocaine."

The indictment supercedes a June 1989 indictment charging Galatalo and Angelo Fontana, 26, with cocaine distribution.

Galatalo, 44, and Fontana, 26, both of Miami, were out of jail on bond on the earlier charges but have been reporting to court officials regularly, Miller said.

Justice officials have asked their lawyers to arrange their surrender for an additional bond hearing on the new charges.

Suspect believes he is God; judge finds him fit for trial

FORT LAUDERDALE - A man claiming that he is God was declared mentally fit to stand trial for murdering his mother by a judge who noted that TV evangelists also claim divine connections and are considered sane.

The ruling Wednesday by Broward County Judge Robert Carney reverses his finding last year that Charles Moore was unable to understand the charges against him or assist his lawyer in his defense.

Moore, 30, is accused of clubbing his mother, Lula Mae Moore, 54, to death with a crowbar during a crack cocaine-induced fury in their home in April 1988. Later, he injured his nephew and a passer-by with the crowbar, investigators said.

Moore is charged with first-degree murder and two counts of attempted first-degree murder. If convicted, he could be sentenced to the electric chair.

Psychiatric nurse Sharon Schwartz said Moore probably would not lose sleep over the prospect.

"His feeling is that he really wouldn't die, that he's omnipotent and everlasting," Schwartz testified.

Schwartz, who testified she does not think Moore is competent to stand trial, noted that Moore promised to buy her a Rolls-Royce when he inherits the Earth.

Moore also thinks cocaine is the bread of life, testimony showed.

Six months ago, the judge agreed that Moore was incompetent to stand trial. He approved a state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services request to make Moore take powerful drugs aimed at altering his behavior, over Moore's impassioned and profane objections.

On Wednesday, a calm and quiet Moore was back in Carney's courtroom for another competency hearing. Doctors at a Miami hospital concluded he is competent.

Assistant Public Defender Ryal Gaudiosi presented three witnesses - Schwartz, a psychiatrist and a psychologist - who testified to the contrary.

They said Moore refuses to let anybody cut his hair, worn in dreadlocks, because he

regards his hair as his godly crown. The witnesses also testified that Moore believes he did nothing wrong in killing his mother, because he is God.

Carney acknowledged that Moore has mental problems but said the defendant's belief that he is God does not make him unable to stand trial.

The judge pointed out that television evangelist Oral Roberts claimed to have spoken to God, to have been visited by him and threatened with a one-way trip to Heaven if he did not raise a specific amount of money. Others have also made claims to divine connections, he noted.

"I think with Jim Bakker and others, there has been quite a bit of talking to God lately, with God making quite a few pronouncements," Carney said.

Testimony indicated Moore does understand the charges against him and has some understanding of how the judicial system works, Carney said. That makes him competent to stand trial, the judge said.

Carney scheduled Moore's trial to begin Dec. 11.

Poaching suspects rounded up

ORLANDO - Four men from Central Florida and one from Alabama have been arrested by Montana game wardens in what officials describe as the state's most severe poaching case in recent history.

Among those arrested was an auxiliary Osceola County deputy sheriff and a former Osceola deputy whose job included enforcing wildlife laws and arresting poachers.

The five men killed 38 antelope and nine deer in eastern Montana, leaving most of their parts rotting in the field where they were killed, Montana wildlife officials told the Orlando Sentinel.

The five were arrested over the weekend as they tried to ship nine coolers containing 525 pounds of antelope meat through the baggage counter at Logan International Airport in Billings, Mont.

Investigators also found four antelope heads hidden inside the men's luggage. The heads were prepared for mounting, officials said.

## MAN ARRESTED ON DRUG CHARGES

### Man arrested on drug charges

LONGWOOD — Thomas Keith Tempesta, 21, 790 S. Grant St., Longwood, was arrested last night by Longwood police on charges of possession of a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia.

# New park for Lake Mary ahead

LAKE MARY — A new park may be in the works for Lake Mary, the city commission decided last night.

The commission also decided to designate a committee to fill the shoes of a defunct architecture firm to oversee the construction of the new city hall, and to pay some of the firm's bills so plans for the building could proceed. Commissioners also sent the planned rezoning of land that abuts the Hills of Lake Mary subdivision to the planning and zoning committee.

The commission decided to rank Glattig, Lopez, Kercher, Anglin Inc., Orlando, as its first choice to be the designing engineers for the Lake Mary Central Park. The park will be at the northwest corner of Lake Mary Boulevard and Country Club Road.

The commission listened to presentations from three engineering firms. The other two were John B. Webb and Associates and Henigar and Ray, who were ranked second and third, respectively. A contract will be negotiated at a later date.

The park will be developed in conjunction with the city hall building to create a defined

downtown area. Conceptual designs call for a pond with a fountain, a covered amphitheater, picnic shelters and sidewalks.

Problems with the architects of Lake Mary's new city hall have forced the city commission to direct a previously-appointed city hall committee to oversee the project.

The commission last night also decided to pay three sub-consultants half the \$17,710 owed them by Catalyst Incorporated Architecture, the architects for the new city hall. The commission paid the money so they could get the sealed contract documents.

Catalyst Incorporated closed shop owing \$17,710 to the sub-consultants. The city opened new bids for the project and received a dozen proposals, but none of those were found suitable to take over where Catalyst left off, the commission agreed.

City staffers and a city hall committee comprised of the city building official and several developers will oversee the project indefinitely.

The commission also decided to send the rezoning of a 7-acre parcel off State Road 46-A which abuts the Hills of Lake Mary subdivision to the planning and

zoning committee. The commission decided that notification of the Nov. 14 planning and

zoning meeting should not be mailed out to residents by certified mail.

## State faces hiring freeze, spending cuts

TALLAHASSEE — State officials are considering a hiring freeze for the first time in seven years, and are urging sharp spending cuts by all agencies in the face of a projected state budget deficit of \$230 million.

State budget director Patricia Woodworth sent a letter to Cabinet members and department heads this week advising that they fill only essential job vacancies, put off major equipment purchases, restrict operational expenses and keep travel to a minimum.

The budget problems are being blamed on lower-than-expected state revenues, and come at a time when Republican Gov. Bob Martinez is insisting he will veto any new taxes to run the government. Meanwhile, legislators will later this month consider major increases in highway and child protection spending.

Lawmakers are considering raising motorists' fees and gasoline taxes to pay for mounting transportation needs. They're also expected to draw from the state's \$147-million reserve fund to strengthen child protection programs.

### Clarifications

The location of the body of a man who was shot to death during an apparent drug transaction was incorrectly reported on Monday, according to Sanford police. The body was found along W. 13th Street about a block and one-half west of U.S. 17-92 and not in the parking lot of a business at that intersection.

In the police briefs column Thursday, the arresting agency was incorrectly reported in an item about two men charged with loitering to engage in narcotic activity, and in another item about a man charged with the sale of a substance in lieu of a controlled substance. The arrests in both incidents were made by Sanford police officers.

## An odd crime-fighting tool

It might not have been exactly what Mortimer Adler had in mind when he founded the Great Books Program at the University of Chicago in the 1940s, but it was a novel idea for sentencing drug defendants. A judge in Alabama sentenced two brothers to read some of the more widely known novels and write book reports on them.

The judge said he was tired of revolving-door sentencing — of seeing the same faces again before his bench. So he tried to change the outlook of Henry and Isaac McQueen by introducing them to the ideas and moral judgments in such books as Fyodor Dostoyevski's "Crime and Punishment," George Orwell's "Animal Farm" and John Steinbeck's "East of Eden."

Adler's view was that every American should know what was in certain basic texts. He created a program for the University of Chicago in 54 volumes dealing with the philosophy and literature of Western civilization.

Adler was no snob. He maintained that the average voting citizen could read and understand such works and later helped market a set of great books that was sold much the way encyclopedias are. Adler even added a volume of his own as a guide — "How to Read a Book," written in 1940.

Judge John Rochester, in his own way, seems to be applying Adler's thesis — that people will be better citizens if they are exposed to good literature. The test will be whether they turn out to be better citizens, or merely better-read criminals.

## A glimmer of hope

Raymond Ede is a Lebanese Christian politician who wants to run for president of Lebanon, even though he has been in self-imposed exile in Paris for the past 15 years. He will campaign from Paris as well, he has said. If he wins, it's not known whether he plans to govern from Paris.

Who can blame the man, given the death and destruction that has been visited upon long-suffering Lebanon? Fourteen years of fighting has killed thousands and destroyed what at one time was a prosperous Middle Eastern economy. A "war of liberation" launched last March by Christian military leader Michel Aoun has killed at least 850 people and left Beirut a burned-out shell.

It's hard to imagine anyone wanting to run for anything in a country synonymous with religious violence and political chaos; a country that has been without a president since September. Now, however, there is a glimmer of hope. Just a glimmer.

Members of Lebanon's parliament have agreed on a new constitution that would increase the power of the country's Muslim majority and lead to talks on a Syrian military withdrawal. The new constitution also acknowledges a Syrian role in Lebanese affairs.

Syria has long coveted Lebanon, which was carved out of the old Turkish Empire after World War I and administered by the French under a mandate from the League of Nations. The prospect of a Greater Syria, which would include Lebanon, worries Israel, and rightly so. Nevertheless, continued strife in Lebanon works to no nation's advantage, and that includes Israel.

The key to the agreement is the concession by the Christians to more equitably share power with the Muslims. Although General Aoun quickly rejected the plan, some observers say he's likely to change his mind since many among the Christian leadership have accepted the plan.

The general should look around him at the devastation he has wrought in his futile war with the Syrians. Then he should accept the plan, too.

## Germany is going to be reunited

A thousand years ago, back in 1988, when President Reagan and Mikhail Gorbachev signed the INF treaty, Richard Nixon and Henry Kissinger led their old gang in a concerted attack on the agreement. By depriving NATO of the intermediate-range nuclear missiles that could reach Moscow from Western Europe, they argued, we were fatally undermining West Germany's confidence in its security. It would now feel that it had no choice but to edge toward neutralism. Moscow would tempt it further with offers of reunification with East Germany, and there would go NATO's ballgame.

How times have changed! Less than 18 months later, it's the Warsaw Pact nations that are bolting for the door. The whole geopolitical scene has altered almost beyond recognition. What thoughtful Western European observers are worrying about today, I discovered at a recent conference in France, is not the Soviet threat but the prospect of a reunited Germany.

This is an ancient and well-credentialed fear. As Winston Churchill remarked, the Germans tend to be either at your feet or at your throat. There is nothing in the least unreasonable about concerns, in both Western and Eastern Europe, that a reunited Germany may prove far more than the continent wants, or is able, to handle.

We might as well begin, however, by recon-

ciling ourselves to the inevitable. Germany is going to be reunited sooner or later — and probably sooner, the way things are going in the East. With the Soviet Union preoccupied with its own economic and social disintegration, the East Germans — like the Poles, Hungarians, Estonians, Lithuanians, Ukrainians and many other subject peoples inside and outside of the Soviet Union — sense that now is the time to break free. The East German communist regime will no doubt hang on as long as it can, and perhaps longer than most, but the centrifugal pressures are immense and will ultimately prevail.

Once East Germany ceases to be communist, it will have lost its separate identity and its *raison d'être*: reunification with

West Germany will therefore be inevitable.

It seems almost equally inevitable that, just as Japan looks to mainland China as its biggest potential market, Germany will look to the satellites and peoples of the Soviet Union (or whatever successor states emerge from its wreckage) as the logical consumers of German goods.

In 1992 the nations of the European Economic Community are scheduled to integrate their separate national economies into a larger whole, without trade barriers. Though there is still considerable resistance (especially from Britain) to certain particulars of the new arrangement — such as whether the various countries will have a common currency — there is no doubt whatever that the long-term direction of events will be toward the development of a super-nation with a single super-economy: Europe Inc., as it were, ultimately including Eastern Europe.

That will confront the rest of the world with a wholly new set of problems, but it is reasonable to hope that the old bugaboo of a recrudescent Germany won't be among them. The Germans will undoubtedly loom large in the new super-nation, but it may well be that Germany as such can be "blended down" by intimate contact with its former rivals, and persuaded to play a peaceful and productive role.

## Mondale should be President

WASHINGTON — The Redskins, the only professional team to play its games in the city of Washington, have a quarterback, Mark Rypien, of whom it is said, with fatal accuracy, "Every time he gets hit, he fumbles." The same, sadly, can be said of government in Washington.

Sports reporters notice things like Rypien's tendency to give up the ball when sacked. Political reporters, unfortunately, tend to be less attentive to a pattern of failure on our best, especially when it involves a whole institution, rather than an individual. A few years back, one New Yorker remarked that for 25 years, "the New York Times had reported everything that happened in the New York City schools except that they were collapsing." The same thing can be said of most of the Washington press corps and the national government today.

Truth is, few Washington reporters know much, or care much, about what goes on inside government. We write about scandals, when they are gamy enough, and about the handful of policy fights which pit the White House against Congress, like the battle over capital-gains taxes. But the question whether government is working well — or working at all — is not one that usually draws our interest.

Today, by almost any measure, government is working very badly, so badly in fact that even journalists are beginning to notice it. When Stanley W. Cloud, a veteran Washington reporter and editor, took over recently as Washington bureau chief of Time magazine, he persuaded his editors to do a cover story, headlined, "Is Government Dead?"

The answer, Cloud's story said, is that if government is not dead, it increasingly "looks like a costly irrelevancy today... Under the shadow of a massive federal deficit that neither political party is willing to confront, a kind of neurosis of accepted limits has taken hold from one end of Pennsylvania Avenue to the other." Whether the challenge is an oil spill in Alaska or a hurricane in South Carolina, an abortive coup in Panama or a democratic revolution in Eastern Europe, the government's response is slow, grudging and massively inadequate.

When confronted by a crisis or even an unexpected opening, it fumbles. And on the larger, long-term challenges — things like the decline of the schools, the deterioration of our transportation system, the scourge of drugs and the steady accumulation of unpaid debt — its tendency is to postpone hard choices and posture rather than produce.

The explanation is two-fold. What we choose to call a government is no such thing. In our era of debilitated political parties, Washington is run by 536 individual political entrepreneurs — one President, 100 senators

and 435 members of the House — each of whom got here essentially on his own. Each chooses the office he seeks, raises his own money, hires his own pollster and ad-maker and recruits his own volunteers.

Each of them is scrambling to remain in office, no matter what. And each of them has commitments and objectives he considers paramount. When George Bush says, "Read my lips," each member of Congress replies, "I want mine." And the result is the paralysis of which Time wrote.

The second part of the story is laid out in the October issue of a magazine called Government, Executive, a sort of trade paper for the bureaucracy. In a piece called "Hollow Government," writer Mark L. Goodstein cites example of how the budget cuts of the 1980s have left "federal agencies increasingly unable to perform the missions for which they were created."

His story is a compendium of examples of government struggling with outmoded equipment and inadequate staffing. A former Internal Revenue Service commissioner says the IRS computer system "is somewhere in the ice age." At a time when the nation is aging and new programs for the elderly are being enacted, the Social Security Administration has had a 30 percent cutback in personnel.

The root of this problem is that Presidents and Congresses in this decade have lacked the courage to ask people to pay for the government services they receive. This year's budget fiasco compounds the hypocrisy. When the political cowards in the Bush administration and on Capitol Hill decide last month it was easier to admit failure than to reach agreement on a budget, that triggered automatic, across-the-board cuts in hundreds of domestic and military programs.

No one seems to know or care what those \$16 billion cuts will do to the people who depend on those services. The President and Congress are engaged in a conspiracy of silence to keep the public from putting the blame where it belongs.

## Whose gun is it anyway?

WASHINGTON — The new director of the U.S. Information Agency, Bruce Geib, found a little gift left behind by his predecessor in the office safe — a gun. "What am I supposed to do with this damn gun?" he asked his aides as they rushed around trying to find out why it was there.

The USIA refused to tell us anything about the mysterious weapon, claiming it was a "security matter." We pieced the story together from other sources, including the former occupant of the director's office, Charles Wick.

Wick was USIA director through the administration of his good friend, Ronald Reagan. Wick told us he ordered the gun — he can't remember if it was a .357 Magnum or a .45 — for his personal security. He believed he was in the line of fire for those who would take aim at President Reagan, particularly the Soviets.

Wick and his wife, Mary Jane, have known the Reagans since the 1960s in Bel Air, Calif., when their children attended the same private school. Mrs. Wick is one of Nancy Reagan's best friends. The Wicks were the Reagans' traveling companions on a recent Japanese tour.

"There was a lot of publicity about Reagan's friends," recalled Gilbert Robinson, Wick's No. 2 man at USIA. He remembered telephone threats against Wick and his family. The attempted assassination of Reagan by John Hinckley in 1981 only heightened their fears.

One former colleague told us that Wick was "obsessed with security," and spent \$32,000 making his home more secure. Wick and Robinson talked about the possibility of a gunman making it to Wick's office, and decided that Wick needed a gun. So Robinson was put on the job. He wrote to the Justice Department for advice and was told that hand guns were illegal in Washington, D.C. Wick could only keep a gun if he was sworn in as a special deputy U.S. marshal.

Wick liked the idea, and so did Robinson. They both got guns and were made special marshals. They had at least two practice sessions on the firing range.

Wick makes no excuses for his actions. He told us that the Soviets were "hot and heavy about me then," lambasting him on Radio Moscow as "a latter-day Gorbachev." It was not unreasonable, at the time, to think that they might try to kill him, he said. After all, he added, the Soviets have been linked to an assassination plot against the pope during the same period.

The State Department, of which the USIA is a part, apparently agreed with Wick, or at least was smart enough to accommodate a friend of the first family. Wick took four State Department security guards wherever he traveled abroad. He wore a bullet-proof overcoat that was so heavy that it once dragged him down to the curb when he stepped out of a car on a European trip.

After Mikhail Gorbachev came to power, Wick felt safer. A staunch anti-communist in the Reagan mold, Wick switched from Soviet target to Soviet friend. Wick struck up working relationships with some Soviet leaders and was instrumental in negotiating a "disinformation pact" with them in which the Soviets agreed to stop jamming Voice of America broadcasts and stop spreading bizarre lies about the United States.

But the gun remained in Wick's and Robinson's office. "I never thought of getting rid of it," Wick told us.

### Senate votes for North pension

WASHINGTON — The Senate has voted to restore retired Marine Lt. Col. Oliver North's \$23,000-a-year retirement pay that was suspended by the Navy when he was sentenced for felony convictions in the Iran-Contra affair.

On a 78-17 vote Thursday, the Senate passed compromise legislation that solved the politically sensitive position it was forced into in August by conservative Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., who proposed that the retirement pay be restored. The legislation still must be passed by the House before the Navy can again start writing checks to North.

Rather than address North's case specifically as Helms' first proposal did, the compromise proposal offered by Helms and Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph Biden, D-Del., revised an ambiguous part of the document shredding law North was convicted of violating.

The Navy, on the advice of the General Accounting Office, suspended North's checks because the GAO concluded that it had serious doubt about whether North should get a pension because it believed he could be considered to hold an office of the U.S. government. The document shredding statute bars those convicted from holding a federal office.

The compromise declared that as far as the shredding statute was concerned, "no person who is a retired regular officer of the armed forces of the United States shall be considered as holding an office of the United States." It is retroactive to the first of this year, so it covers North.

### Fisherman snag submarine

WESTPORT, Wash. — The Coast Guard is investigating an incident in which a fishing trawler apparently snagged a submerged submarine off the Washington coast and was dragged backward and nearly capsized.

Three crewmen aboard the Westport trawler Recruit were "terrified" when the submerged submarine began pulling the boat through the water, the vessel's captain said Thursday.

The crew dropped \$20,000 worth of equipment over the side to prevent the submarine from pulling their ship under water.

A U.S. submarine "is known to have been operating in the general vicinity," said Lt. Cmdr. Keith Arterburn, spokesman at the Trident Nuclear Submarine Base at Bangor.

Navy officials declined to say whether the submarine in question was one of the eight Trident vessels based at Bangor.

### Controversy erupts over oil spill bill

WASHINGTON — Lawmakers criticized proposals to override state oil spill liability laws as the House began consideration of legislation that would create a single federal system to speed cleanup and payment of spill damages.

The "state pre-emption" issue took center stage in the opening hours of debate Thursday on the comprehensive oil spill bill, which would expand the federal cleanup role and clarify the liability of spillers for cleanup costs and damages to fishermen and others suffering income or property losses.

The legislation sets liability limits for oil spillers, provided accidents are not caused by "gross negligence or willful misconduct" on the part of a spiller's employees.

The liability limit for supertankers would be about \$115 million and range up to \$350 million for deepwater ports — far below the estimated \$2 billion cost for cleaning up the Exxon Valdez oil spill in Alaska.

The bill also would establish a \$1 billion federal trust fund — financed by a tax on oil — to pay for emergency cleanup action and compensation above the liability limits or when a spiller drags its feet on paying damage claims.

# \$305 billion defense bill approved

WASHINGTON — The "Star Wars" missile defense program suffered its first actual cut in a compromise \$305 billion 1990 defense authorization bill that also provides a "soft landing" to Grumman's F-14D Tomcat fighter.

In addition, the bill developed by a House-Senate conference committee Thursday cuts back on the B-2 stealth bomber program and requires that it pass a number of technical hurdles. The Pentagon also must give Congress a report on the plane's cost, now pegged at \$530 million

a copy for 132 planes. It gives Grumman a brief reprieve by buying a final installment of 18 Tomcat fighters, and allows research work to continue on the V-22 tilt-rotor Osprey being developed by Bell Helicopter and Boeing's helicopter unit.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney had recommended killing both the F-14D and the V-22, but the programs had strong constituencies on Capitol Hill.

Cheney, traveling in the South Pacific, said in a statement issued at the Pentagon that the deal "sounds fairly good. ... The conference agreement also re-

cognizes that we cannot afford lower-priority defense programs (like the Tomcat and Osprey). I would have preferred a higher level of funding for SDI."

The deal on defense programs did not sit well with everyone on Capitol Hill, and Rep. Larry Hopkins, R-Ky., bemoaned the inability to kill off items such as the two aircraft.

"This is not a conference report. It is a coroner's report showing that all the vital signs of this institution are paralyzed, that it has shown neither the courage, judgment nor vision to fulfill its constitutional duty to provide for the common defense

of this nation," said Hopkins.

But Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said the compromise bill was "a solid framework for defense in an era of constrained resources."

The bill puts up just \$3.8 billion for the Strategic Defense Initiative program often dubbed "Star Wars," down from the \$3.9 billion the program got in the last fiscal year. It was the first actual cut administered to the program that has encountered increasing questions about its goals and mission. The administration had sought \$4.9 billion.

Carolyn Dinda, 56, was hit with two bullets in the chest, one of which passed through the heart, Dr. Irrgang said.

Gardner's attorneys are not denying that their client shot her parents, but claim she was insane at the time.

Earlier Thursday, Marine Capt. Richard Gardner, Stephanie's former husband, testified he taught Stephanie how to shoot a gun and that she was a good shot.

Gardner said at one time the couple would shoot targets about twice a week and that Stephanie was a natural shooter. She was never afraid of a weapon.

He said she had shot guns ranging from "a large machine gun to a small pistol and everything in between."

Jurors heard testimony Wednesday that showed Stephanie Gardner had bought a .38 caliber pistol from an Orlando hardware store about 11 hours before her parents were killed.

The Dindas were killed in the bedroom of their rural Oviedo home, where Stephanie had lived with them for about three months. She was in the process of being divorced by her husband.

Capt. Gardner, appearing in court in his Marine Corps uniform, testified for both the state and the defense Thursday. He said that a Virginia court had awarded him custody of the couple's two children after a hearing a few days before the murders. He said he argued at the hearing that Stephanie was an unfit mother because of her mental condition.

After the hearing, the court ordered him to allow the children to visit their mother for

three days and two nights and they arrived at the Dinda home on June 5, he told the jury.

Gardner said Stephanie's mental health began to deteriorate in 1984 when she began to be obsessed about her health.

"She believed she had various medical problems and bought medical books and would sit and read them for hours," he said. Gardner said his wife went to see many doctors, "all of whom found nothing wrong with her, but she thought they were all wrong."

In 1986, Gardner said Stephanie left a note saying she took the children to the base commissary, but was gone all day.

"She called late in the afternoon and said she wanted a divorce, and that I should get out of the apartment so she could get her and the children's belongings."

"I talked her into coming home and talking to a psychiatrist and he talked her into going into the hospital for 28 days," Gardner said.

Upon her release on a promise to seek marriage counseling, she "called me every name in the book as soon as we were out the door of the hospital," he said.

The couple separated and while separated, Gardner said Stephanie accused him of using CIA and Naval Intelligence officers to spy on her; of using satellites to take pictures of her and to send radiation which was "displacing the children's souls" and said intelligence officers had installed a radio transmitter in one of her teeth while she was asleep. She also claimed that the couple's son, Ricky, was a twin and that Gardner and his mother had taken Ricky's twin when born and that he was being raised by her mother-in-law and a doctor in Orlando.

At another time, he said Stephanie stopped taking the medication the psychiatrist had prescribed, claiming she was pregnant, although she had undergone a tubal ligation when her son was born. "She claimed the tubal ligation was reversed while she was sedated in the hospital, and that she had then been artificially inseminated," Gardner testified.

Gardner said he tried to get Stephanie committed to a mental hospital in Virginia, but "coordinating between the military base where we lived and the state authorities was very complicated."

Mrs. Gardner was later committed to a Kissimmee Hospital by an Osceola County judge about six months before her

arrest. She was released after about three months, and moved into her parents' home.

Stephanie's aunt, Dr. Ruth Colbert, testified she was called by Stephanie the night of June 6 and asked to come to the Dinda residence. Dr. Colbert, who works at a University of California at Berkeley clinic, had arrived at her mother's house a few miles from the Dinda's a few days before to care for her mother.

She said Stephanie called about 11 p.m. and asked her to come over at once. "I said 'not on your life,'" Colbert said she had talked to her brother, Stephanie's father, several times about the friction between Stephanie and her parents, and "I didn't want to get into the middle of an argument."

However, she said Stephanie told her she had shot her parents and they were both dead. She also said she was going to call her brother-in-law, Cecil Gardner, and have him come and get the children.

Colbert said she called the Rev. Daniel Estok, then administrator of the Lutheran Haven home where Stephanie was employed, and a friend of Colbert's, and asked him to drive her to the Dinda's.

Upon arrival, Colbert said she was met by Stephanie outside the house, and went in with her and "I checked to make sure the children were all right."

"I asked Stephanie if she was

sure her parents were dead. She didn't say anything, but went to the kitchen and came back with a foam cup containing several bullet casings, and she shook it in my face," Colbert said.

She testified that Stephanie spoke in a "flat unemotional voice, and her eyes were real weird," Colbert said Gardner's eyes "had no expression; almost as if they were turned inside and were only acting as a visual monitor so she wouldn't run into a wall or something."

After Cecil Gardner arrived and took the children with him, Colbert said she put Stephanie in Rev. Estok's car then went into the house and called 911 to report the murders, and the first patrol car arrived within minutes.

Other major projects include adding lanes in 1991 to State Road 436 between Oxford and Lake Howell Roads, a \$4.5 million project. Also in 1992, turnpikes will be added at the intersection of State Road 46 and Longwood-Markham Road at a cost of \$108,000.

State Road 46 is scheduled to be resurfaced from Summertown Avenue in Sanford east more than four miles to Lake Jesup and west of I-4 at the entrance of Lake Forest to the Lake County line. Both projects are expected to total \$2.1 million. In 1985, the state plans to repave SR 46 between Lake Jesup and the Volusia County line and add paved shoulders, a \$2.7 million project.

## Officials say no to hotel for nudists

OCALA — A couple who wants to operate a bed-and-breakfast hotel that would allow nude sunbathing is getting a hard time from local residents and the Marion County Planning Commission.

Despite a favorable staff recommendation, the planning commission on Monday turned down a zoning change that would allow Dorothy and David Coleman to operate their old 12-room, 100-year-old home as a bed-and-breakfast inn. The Colemans have sunk \$300,000

in the project. The 6-1 vote followed an emotional debate in which local residents called nudity a sin and some opponents were labeled as "self-righteous."

Last year the planning commission voted down a zone change the Colemans would have needed to open a nudist club on the site.

Local residents are opposed to the hotel because, as one said, they don't want Ocala to become the "nudist capital" of the country and because it doesn't fit in with the community's "moral flavor."

"If some people have an uncontrollable urge to revert to the aboriginal state of their forebears ... perhaps they might find a suitable compote in the Amazon jungle," said Ocala resident Desmond Austin.

Other opponents said curious children climbing trees to get a peek of the nude sun worshippers might harm themselves spiritually and physically.

But the Colemans have had nude guests at their home without anyone knowing because "they simply can't see into the place," said their lawyer, Larry Collins. They just want to turn a little profit.

## Martinez calls for agency to monitor college athletics

MIAMI — Gov. Bob Martinez called Thursday for the creation of an internal watchdog agency that would help prevent the type of scandal that has befallen the University of Florida's athletic program.

UF's football and basketball programs have been the focus of a federal investigation that began last year into allegations that athletes were involved in drug use and sales, and that coaches and boosters provided money to the athletes.

Head basketball coach Norm Sloan, 63, and his

staff were forced to resign Tuesday after Sloan said he was presented evidence of NCAA violations involving athletes no longer at the school.

Their resignations came only three weeks after head football coach Galen Hall suffered a similar fate. Hall resigned after admitting to NCAA violations that included unauthorized salary supplements to assistant coaches.

All of the involved coaches have denied any knowledge of drug use by athletes and cash payments to players.

According to two published reports Thursday,

sources said internal prosecutors had planned to seek a grand jury indictment against Sloan, an action that may have prompted his decision to resign.

In his comments to the Board of Regents Thursday morning, Martinez said little could be done to change that situation, but steps could be taken to help prevent future NCAA violations.

"There is a great deal that is right about our universities, a great deal to be proud of. And that includes the athletic programs," he said. "But there are some things that are not right, and

these things must be addressed."

He said the regents should create an Office of Athletic Standards and Practices to monitor the conduct of athletic programs throughout the state university system.

The office, he said, should consist of representatives from both athletic and academic interests within the system.

Martinez also called for a comprehensive review of the number of student athletes who graduate from college; the number who actually become professional athletes, the current occupations of the others, the health and economic welfare of all former student athletes and what they now feel their collegiate athletic experience meant to them.

Young people who receive an athletic scholarship ... It's not a minor league for professional sports. This is a university system," he said. "Only a handful of them get there. What happens to the others?"

The governor said the regents also should look into how boosters affect athletic programs and that consideration should also be given to eliminating freshman eligibility, shortening spring training and giving athletes more time for academics.

Martinez said any proposals should be studied with caution, however, because the athletics is an important component to the athlete's college and life experience, as well as the college itself.

"Because athletics are such a significant part of our universities — both for the student body and the communities in

general — it is essential that we do not diminish the quality of our state's outstanding collegiate athletic programs when compared with those of other states," he said.

Chancellor Charles B. Reed, who has proposed many of the same reforms, welcomed the governor's proposals and said the Board was planning to outline its own set of proposals at a meeting Friday.

Most important, he said, was for Florida colleges and universities to work together on a program for national reform. Reed said the institutions should develop a platform for consideration at the NCAA's meeting in Dallas in January instead of going there divided and "canceling out each other's votes."

# It's no farce: RATS are back

SANFORD — The 1980s have been a decade for comebacks. Christopher Reeves brought back George Reeve's Superman character; Michael Keaton gave a new interpretation to Adam West's Batman; and beginning tonight, the RATS are back.

The Roundallers Acting Troupe (known by insiders as RATS) will stage its first play since the 1980s, when the curtains closed on the community theater group.

"Egad, the Woman in White," the first of four productions of the troupe's 1989-90 season, will begin tonight at 8 p.m. at the Sanford Woman's Club, 309 S. Oak Ave.

"If people are not laughing by the end of the first act, I'll be majorly disappointed," said director John Ober.

The farce, set in the late 1800s in England, is based on Wilkie Collins' serious, Victorian classic "The Woman in White." Tim Kelly adapted that play into a comedy. The Roundallers have adapted Kelly's adaptation, and will entertain with Vaudeville acts at intermission time.

The Roundallers Acting Troupe was originally formed in 1966 at the old Capri Club, a Sanford club for teen-agers, founded by Jim Talmadge of Sanford. The troupe staged a number of successful plays, but the troupe disintegrated when the Sanford Naval Air Station closed. The naval base had furnished the troupe with actors, directors and plenty of community support.

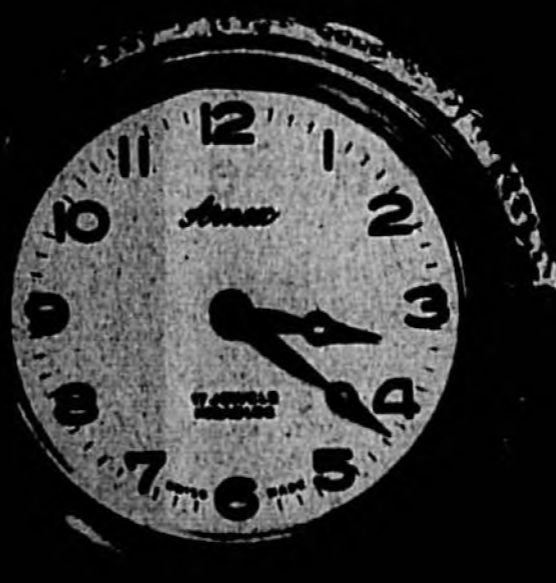
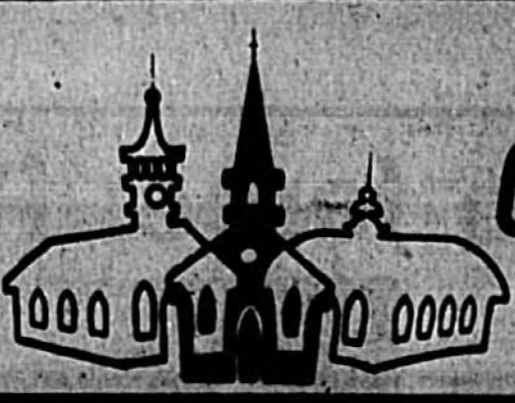

## 'Pony Express' comes to town

**SANFORD** — For members of the First Presbyterian Church: It's time to hit the happy trails.

Throughout this month, church members should keep their eyes peeled for "The Pony Express." Last Sunday, the station master began passing out saddle bags to raise money for the church's 1990 budget, according to Bert Hollingsworth, elder and chairman of the stewardship committee.

This is the second year First Presbyterian Church is using the Pony Express method to raise money, and Hollingsworth said the tactic has increased "benevolence giving"

by \$25,000. "It's unique. Something different," Hollingsworth said.

The Pony Express is headed by a station master who distributes saddle bags to trail bosses. The bags contain the names of 10 church members and a map to get to their homes. Each person on the top of the list receives a saddle bag from the trail boss. After filling out the "giving card" specifying an estimate of giving and placing it in the designated pocket, the person delivers it to the next household.

"We tried to keep it in groups of 10, so that nobody is burdened with going too far," Hollingsworth said.

The bags are being circulated throughout

the Presbyterian community and are expected to reach 520 families who are members of the First Presbyterian Church, 301 Oak Ave., Sanford. They hope to raise \$225,000 through 1990 to support a \$292,000 budget for next year. The money, to be collected throughout the year, goes to the Central Florida Presbytery which sponsors 76 churches, the Thornwell Orphanage in Clinton, S.C., missions, and the operating expenses of the church, according to Hollingsworth.

In the past, the money was collected through voluntary pledges.

Hollingsworth said this method is "a little more systematic and everybody is involved."

## Lutheran parish defies rules by calling two gay pastors

**SAN FRANCISCO** — A Lutheran congregation, defying denominational rules, has voted to call two lesbian seminary graduates as assistant pastors without requiring them to remain celibate, parish officials said.

The two women — Ruth Frost and Phyllis Zillhart — will be part of a pastoral team leading the newly-organized Lutheran Lesbian and Gay Ministry in the San Francisco area.

Under terms of the call voted by the congregation, the two women will not be required to swear to remain celibate, thus violating denominational guidelines.

A third member of the team, seminary graduate Jeff Johnson, a homosexual, is under consideration for a call by a second bay area congregation.

The call to the two women sets up a direct confrontation with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the 5.3 million-member parent denomination of First Trinity, which voted to call Frost and Zillhart.

A call to Johnson is currently under consideration by First United Lutheran Church, also of San Francisco.

Johnson is already working for the newly-established gay ministry.

The decision of First Trinity to call the two lesbians, graduates of Northwestern Theological Seminary in St. Paul, Minn., raises a series of theological questions in the recently-formed ELCA over the nature of ministry, the role of local congregations in the call process as well as the nature and meaning of human sexuality. It could lead to the parish's expulsion from

denomination.

Under rules adopted by the ELCA — a 1988 merger of three other Lutheran bodies with sharply different procedures for calling pastors — ordination is dependent on certification by the national church or a regional body, the synod.

In addition, guidelines adopted by the national church after Johnson and two other gay seminarians openly announced their homosexuality, required that all candidates for ordination promise to be forever celibate unless they were married.

"We disagree strongly with our church body in these guidelines and believe this is an issue of justice," said the Rev. James DeLange, pastor of St. Francis.

"The long ministry of this congregation with gay and lesbian people and biblical scholarship over the last 20 years inform us that neither homosexuality nor its expression in committed relationships is wrong," he said.

"In fact, in our congregation and in our city we have witnessed many same-gender relationships of love and commitment that are as life-enhancing as are good marriages."

DeLange said his congregation has met with Frost and Zillhart and decided their 5-year-old "love commitment is as life-enhancing as our marriages."

Bishop Lyle Miller, head of the Sierra Pacific Synod of the ELCA, which oversees the San Francisco bay area, has said he approves of the new ministry being established by Johnson, Zillhart and Frost but cannot endorse the call and ordination under current church guidelines.
