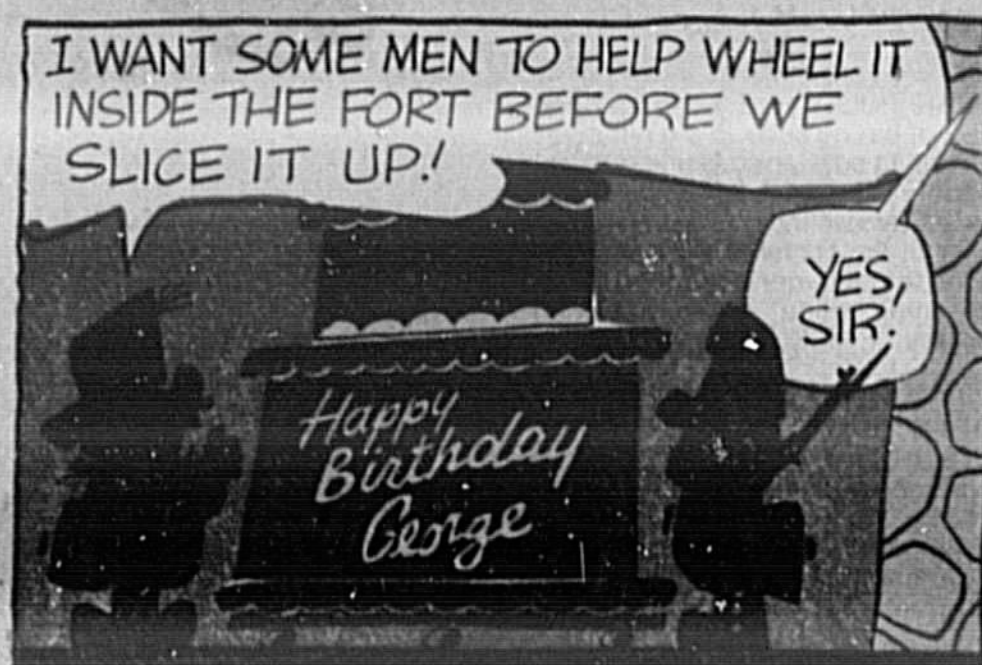

Longwood's Mayor Vows 'Emergency' Ordinance Veto

LONGWOOD — Mayor Eugene Jaques, at 10 a.m. Tuesday, will veto an "emergency" ordinance adopted by council banning parking on Seminola Boulevard's paved surface and Askew to turn down a recommendation that police departments with less than 10 police officers be phased out.

Jaques told The Herald City Council over the past 12 weeks will be signed into law, he said. These include a state development review law; an ordinance annexing Seminola Boulevard, portions of SR 427 north and the Al Stolle properties west of SR 427 with industrial and commercial zoning; and off Seminola with business office. He normally opens and closes his business before and after regular city hall hours.

The resolution which Jaques will sign is directed to Gov. Reubin Askew and requests Askew to turn down a recommendation that police departments with less than 10 police officers be phased out.

Jaques told The Herald City Council over the past 12 weeks will be signed into law, he said. These include a state development review law; an ordinance annexing Seminola Boulevard, portions of SR 427 north and the Al Stolle properties west of SR 427 with industrial and commercial zoning; and off Seminola with business office. He normally opens and closes his business before and after regular city hall hours.

Of the parking ban which would have affected, for the

most part, patrons of the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club (SOKC), Jaques said the ordinance in his judgment was not an emergency.

"The city council apparently had no public complaints about the parking," Jaques said. "It could have used proper procedures in adopting the ordinance to give the people an opportunity to speak on the matter."

Council Chairman Don Schreiner, who sponsored the emergency, the provisions of state law requiring reading of the proposed law at two separate meetings, advertisement and public hearing are waived.

"From all indication the city council spent a considerable amount of time on the ordinance — enough time to have

boundaries of the Seminola Boulevard right-of-way. According to the city charter, council can override a mayoral veto by a six majority. Council's next meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m., Jan. 6 when Councilman-elect J. R. Grant and Jerry Connell receive their oaths of office.

Although 10 signs posted on both sides of Seminola Boulevard in proximity of the dog track were, "Cars Parked Here Will Be Towed Away," Police Chief Tom Hennigan said the parking ban is not enforced.

Hennigan estimated cost to a person whose vehicle was towed away would average \$25. The proposed ordinance included penalties of \$5 for the first offense; \$10 on second offense; \$25 and-or five days in jail on third offense and \$300 and-or six months in jail on fourth and subsequent offenses.

He added that a first step now should be establishment of the

Foreign Exchange Students Entertain Hosts At Farewell

foreign students visiting here for the first time treated their hosts to a colorful variety show banquet at the Altamonte Central Floridians this weekend when a contingent of

International Visitors, led by Dr. Luis Perez of Sanford, sponsored the week-long visit of the 49 students to Central Florida.

Dr. Perez, president of the council, told the group, "We hope this visit will help us understand and realize that among all people, differences are not so big after all, that our differences do not mean we cannot talk and enjoy each other."

He presented each of the students a "diploma" from the council. Their enjoyment and appreciation of the visit was evident in their eagerness to entertain their hosts.

"We just learned how to do this dance ourselves," said one Thai student, just before his group went on to demonstrate a classical and a folk dance. But their enthusiasm brought down the house anyway as they entertained special guest, Miss Florida — Delta Burke, of Orlando — to join them.

Two Thai students also demonstrated their boxing style. Thai boxers use feet, elbows and knees with amazing dexterity as well as hands in a fashion similar to the American television personality King Pu.

The students, all doing post-graduate work at American colleges and universities, were sent to this country for at least a year's study to gain insight into organizing and helping develop their own countries. Many are on leave from key government

and teaching positions to which they will return.

The 20 countries they represent include many of the undeveloped, or emerging, "Third World" countries.

The students started their Christmas tour of Central Florida in Sanford and have spent the last week visiting Cape Kennedy, Disney World, and the homes of Seminole and Orange County residents getting to know Americans.

Most expressed amazement and enthusiasm over the

School Board May Lose \$400,000

The Seminole County School Board may be short \$400,000 in money generated from local property taxes next year, Asst. Supt. of Finance Roger Harris said today.

Harris said state officials may reduce the allocation to

local school boards. The reason, according to Harris, is the money crunch which is currently being felt in Tallahassee. Less money is flowing into state revenues because of a sluggish economy, and Gov. Reubin Askew has asked state officials to find ways to cut costs.

For example, the Board of Regents, which oversees Florida's nine state universities, has been asked and has agreed to cut costs next year by as much as \$9 million.

"It's pure speculation, but we have been told indirectly that the local effort will be increased in order to finance public education," Harris said.

Armed Robbery Suspect Is Jailed

Altamonte Springs police today arrested a suspect in the early morning armed robbery of a convenience store and Sanford police are searching for a shotgun handi who robbed a supermarket Sunday night.

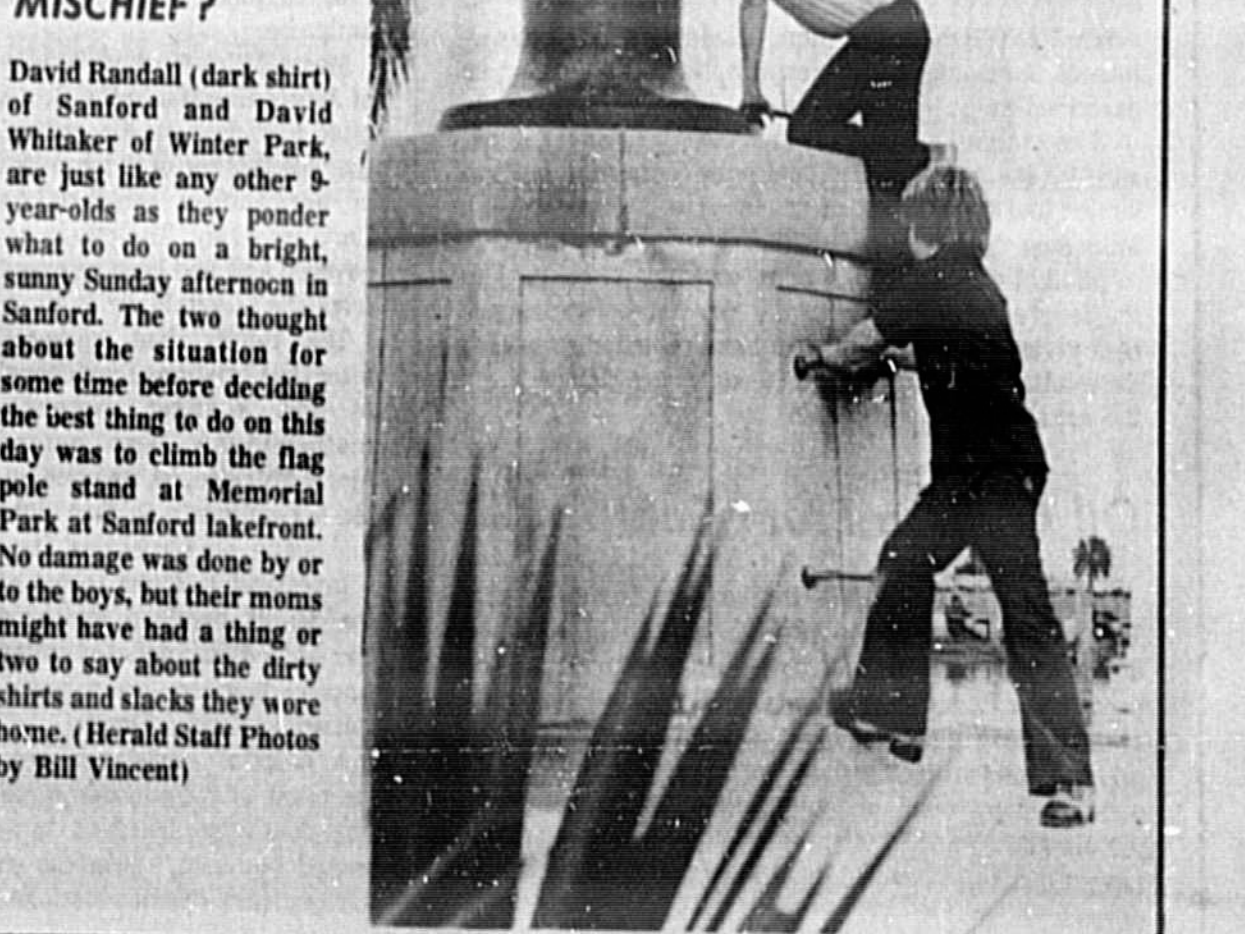
Sgt. Ed Overman and Jim Martindale arrested 27-year-old Thomas W. Chappell at Red Carpet Inn, SR-436 and I-4, two hours after the 3 a.m. hold-up of the 7-11 store at SR-436 and Grace Boulevard.

Police said they received an anonymous telephone tip that a man who got away with \$200 after holding the convenience store clerk at gunpoint was at

the motel. Officers said an automatic pistol and a quantity of money were confiscated and Chappell is being investigated in connection with recent robberies in Orange County.

Altamonte police said a separate robbery Sunday night, involving a brown bush-type jacket, entered the store, picked up a package of cigarettes and a carton of soft drinks before wandering aimlessly inside the store.

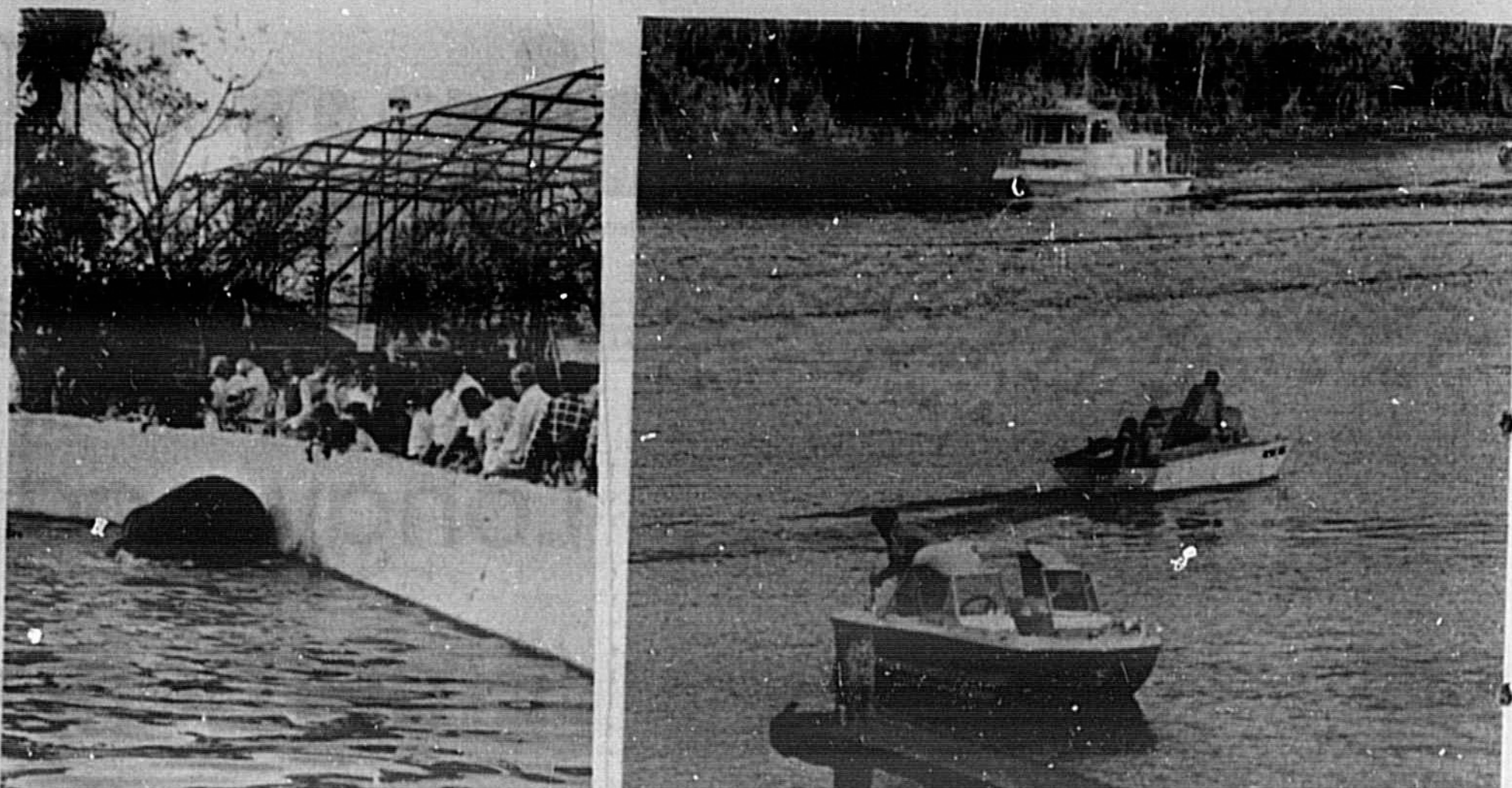

Involved In Domestic Spying

Three More CIA Officials Step Down

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three more top officials in the CIA's counterintelligence division are stepping down in the midst of a reported policy dispute and allegations that the agency was involved in domestic spying.

"Colby is using this to clean house," a well-informed source said of the departures.

Meanwhile, it was learned that Angleton, named in published reports as the overseer of the alleged domestic spy operation, once served on an interagency panel that reported directly to the White House on the threat of domestic demonstrations and disturbances.

The so-called Intelligence Evaluation Committee was headed by Robert C. Marland, former assistant attorney general and now a defendant in the Watergate cover-up trial.

assisted by a staff which included Richard Ober, who has been named as the man who ran the CIA's alleged domestic surveillance activities on a day-to-day basis.

Angleton has denied any involvement in illegal domestic spying. Ober, once an aide to Angleton and now on the National Security Council staff, has declined to comment.

In addition to Angleton, 57, whose resignation was requested by Colby 10 days ago, Raymond W. Arthur Garry, 48, chief of operations, and William J. Hood, 54, executive officer, are also leaving the agency at the end of this month.

The CIA's mandatory retirement age is 65 for most of its employees, but the agency requires those who have served overseas to retire at age 60 and urges others to do so as well.

One source said Colby had been Angleton's choice to ultimately succeed him as counterintelligence chief.

A source who worked with all four officials said their decisions were influenced in part by added benefits available to government employees who retire before the end of the year.

The source said allegations of domestic surveillance and a long standing policy dispute with Colby were the major factors in the retirements of Rocca and Miller.

It was learned that Angleton's name was mentioned in one draft of the 50-page report on the alleged domestic spying that Colby has forwarded to President Ford. Details of the reference to Angleton could not be determined.

A well-informed source said the counterintelligence staff disagreed "totally" with Colby over interpretation of events in the Soviet bloc and was more suspicious than higher policy-makers about the Soviet Union's expressed desire for détente.

Angleton and his staff were said by this source to believe that the agency was being destroyed by Colby's disclosures of agency activities, including CIA involvement in Chile and agency contacts with U.S. journalists abroad.

The source added that the counterintelligence staff objected in general to Colby's policy of increased public appearances, particularly his debate earlier this year with Daniel Ellsberg at a panel sponsored by a research group critical of the CIA.

Boston School Members Face Jail

BOSTON (AP) — Three Boston School Committee members facing possible fines or jail terms for refusing to implement further integration have failed to find a compromise to resolve contempt of court citations.

Chairman John J. Kerrigan, John J. McDonough and Paul Ellison were cited Friday for civil contempt by U.S. District Court Judge W. Arthur Garry, however, gave the three the weekend to reconsider their decisions before he imposes penalties.

All three men were to appear this morning before Garry. The three officials said they would rather go to jail than back down on their disapproval of the Phase Two desegregation plan. That plan, scheduled to be implemented next fall, calls for the busing of some 15,000

students, compared to the 18,000 Boston pupils now being bused.

Integration of Boston schools has been accompanied by sporadic racial violence, especially in South Boston.

Garry ordered the school committee to present a plan which it approved to the court by Dec. 18. A plan prepared by the school department staff was rejected by a 3-2 vote of the school committee but delivered to the court by school committee lawyers.

The Boston chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the plaintiffs in the case, asked at Friday's hearing that the dissenting committee members be fined \$300 a day until they comply with the court order.

Meanwhile, lawyers for the city prepared to take their appeal of the federal court desegregation order to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The U.S. Appeals court recently upheld Judge Garry's decision.

Rationing Favored Over Gas Tax

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government should try to curb energy demand by rationing and allocation programs rather than by raising gasoline taxes, three congressional Democrats say.

Reuss and Rep. Mike McCormack of Washington were interviewed about energy issues Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press," while Sen. William Proxmire of Wisconsin spoke on ABC's "Issues and Answers."

All three agreed that fuel conservation was essential and that voluntary programs have not worked.

Proxmire called first for an allocation program for petroleum, then rationing. "I think it didn't work and finally a tax is the only thing that will work," he said.

Proxmire also called for a tax cut to revive the economy, a move endorsed by Walter Reuther, president of the First National City Bank, the second biggest bank in the country.

In other economic developments, Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butts said in an interview with U.S. News and World Report that food prices will continue to increase for at least six more months, an annual rate of 15 per cent.

Bethlehem Steel Corp., following U.S. Steel, has announced a price increase for its rolled steel products.

Jack Huxtable, in charge of the U.S. Agency for International Development's program in the Ban Houei Sai area, said they left because of a "total breakdown in law and order."

"We didn't want to leave all our (Laotian) friends, but it became very evident this morning that we could not stay," said Huxtable, 36, from Richfield Springs, N.Y.
