

Thirteen years ago the whole world suddenly turned the most joyful in its history. The entire populace of every country in Europe and America poured into the streets where they danced and sang and gave vent to their feelings of cheer and happiness such as Old Sol had never seen before.

Why were they happy?
Was it because the Allies had won a great victory
and the Germans had surrendered? No, it was not, if that find been the cause of all the joy, Germany and Austria would not have participated in it. They would have been sad. But on the contrary, they were as happy about what had just happened as the French or the Americans. had just happened as the French or the Americans. The Armistice had been signed.

The last shot had been fired. The great war was over The war to "make the world safe for Democracy" had been won. The "war to end wars" was now a matter of history. There would be no more fighting, no more bloodshed, no more death and destruction.

That was why everyone was happy. Everyone among the civilian population of Europe and America had some son, or father, or husband, sweetheart, or dear friend, doing his bit in the trenches. Now that son, father, husband, sweetheart of friend. If he had been spared thus far, could return home, to his loved ones.

As long as people remember the great joy of that occasion, the tremendous thrill of the news that the war was over, there will be no new declarations of war by the nations which participated, no calls for volunteers, no conscriptions, no cantonments or trenches.

Though today Jap and Chinese troops are being massed

on the Manchurian border, ready to fly at each other's throats; and Soviet Russia too, rattles her sabre and un-limbers her light artillery; and the League of Nations moddles in a troublesome Oriental problem; and the American state department takes dangerous steps to stop this street corner brawl; there will be no war for us.

The soldiers of 1914 and '18 fought a war to end wars, and though they may not have ended wars for the Japs and Chinese of for others who had no part in the World War, they ended wars for themselves. Until such time as some mad nation shakes his fist at our front door, our young men will no more take up arms to stop someone
