
Juneteenth is a time for reassuring each other, for parades, prayers, and a gathering of neighbors and family members.

Hope floats at Seminole High Principal asks city to honor its swimming pool pledge

SANFORD - Seminole High School Principal Gretchen Schapker has asked the Sanford city commissioners to honor a \$500,000 pledge to help build a swimming pool.

Schapker found out this week that a request for the pool was not on the priority list for federal Community Development Building Grant funds. These moneys were approved for work on dirt roads in Midway, affordable housing, Boys and Girls clubs, the Rita Theater and for the Grove Counseling Center.

"We are disappointed and frustrated," Schapker told Sanford Mayor Larry Dale. "I am asking that this project not die and that the city com-

missioners do honor their offer of \$500,000 for the pool."

She said that Seminole High School Boosters will make "a Herculean attempt" to fund raise the additional \$250,000 for the pool. Earlier, the school officials thought it would take \$1 million but they now believe it is possible at \$750,000.

"Gretchen Schapker has asked for help and we'll see what can be done," Dale said Tuesday. "This has been a long battle to get this pool built. We need it here. We need it for the county as well as the city. There is no public pool in this part of the county."

Sanford City Commissioner Whitey Eckstein, who has taught at Seminole High for 20 years.

Downtown revitalization: Lake Mary forges ahead

LAKE MARY - The downtown area of Lake Mary ceased to be the center of activity when new businesses began opening westerly along Lake Mary Boulevard. It didn't happen overnight, but took several decades.

Now, efforts are under way to

revitalize the former downtown area, and again, it isn't happening overnight. Discussion on the proposal, complete with artists' conceptions, have been scheduled for at least 5 years.

This Thursday, another step in the lengthy process is about to be taken. The Downtown Development Feasibility Study is scheduled to be presented at the Lake Mary City Commis-

sion meeting.

Many questions remain to be answered, not the least of which is the funding mechanism. The city has previously said it would be difficult to finance the entire downtown redevelopment by itself, that without state or federal funding, outside grants, developer funding and the probability of

Group rallies to save historic park from development

SANFORD - They're not against development. They're just against it in Fort Mellon Park.

The Society for the Preservation of Fort Mellon Park is trying to get 3,000 signatures on a petition to bring the matter of development to the people. The group needs about 2,700 voters to sign the petition to get it on the ballot, but they are hoping for a few more just to be sure they have enough qualified signatures.

"We just want this to be a democratic vote where everyone who is against this...and everyone who is for it...has a chance to vote on it," said Sonny Raborn, a volunteer coordinator for the society.

Raborn said the group opposes the cavalier attitude of government officials, especially

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale, who "believe they are more qualified than the people" to make a decision on the issue of developing the park.


"This is the people's park," he said. "The people should be able to decide what happens to it."

Raborn said the group is not opposed to development. They believe that development is good for Sanford.

"It just does not belong there in the people's park," he said. "It has to be done...just not there."

The Society for the Preservation of Fort Mellon Park hosted a rally in the park last weekend and got nearly 100 signatures on their petition. They have not counted how many signatures they have in total.

National innovation award

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Seminole County has been selected by the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials to receive their annual Administrative Innovation Award for Seminole's Housing and Community Development Partnership Program.

Representatives from the county are invited to accept the award at the NAHRO annual convention in July.

The Community Development Partnership Program allows for a heightened communication flow between Seminole County and agencies that serve as partners for the housing programs offered.

While these agencies have their individual goals and missions, working together to achieve the goals set forth by Seminole County requires teamwork, communication and understanding.

The awarded program helps to bring together all the parties, and the three-person Seminole County staff. The program also allows staff to better gauge the success of the activities of the over 25 public and private agencies involved.

The program consists of an initial phase-in, printed materials for the agencies' use, monthly meetings, an exchange of expensive printed materials, and other elements.

The program has allowed for the interagency communication that can lead to the reduction of redundant efforts. For instance, in the process, several homeowners had filed with several agencies for the same assistance. The new communication led to a more centralized process for the citizens and provided a quasi-watchdog arm for the government to ensure residents do not abuse the system.

Also, the program allows for a standard timeline, etc. for the agencies, allowing for an easier process for the government staff, saving man-hours.

Notes from the Florida Film Festival

MAITLAND - The 7th Annual Florida Film Festival will be showing a special restored version of the 1962 classic, *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Recently, the film, which stars Gregory Peck and Robert Duvall in his big screen debut, was named as the 34th best film in the American Film Institute's Top 100 Films of America.

To Kill a Mockingbird is actually a replacement for Alfred Hitchcock's *The Trouble with Harry*. This is the film's East Coast premiere after being restored by the Universal Studios Archive. The movie has been renovated with better quality image and sound. "We're at a stage where a lot of these films are being restored," said Rich Grula, marketing director for the Enslan Theater and the festival. "This is the third U.S. showing."

Based on Harper Lee's novel, *To Kill a*

Mockingbird won three Academy Awards including Peck's performance as Atticus Finch. The story is about racial prejudice in the Deep South. It is also a maturation of two youngsters. Tomorrow's showing will start at 7 p.m. and the film will run for 2 hours.

In addition to *Mockingbird*, another notable classic will be shown. Cliff Robertson will be hosting a showing of the 1968 movie that brought him the Oscar, *Charly* in its 30th Anniversary will be a part of "An Afternoon with Cliff Robertson...". The showing will be at 1:30 p.m. Saturday.

In a side note, the Florida Film Festival will be running *Kiki's Delivery Service* and *Once We Were Strangers* again. These repeat screenings come at the foot of tremendous popular demand.

Kiki's is a coming of age story about a young witch who goes to a small town to

perpetuate her magical abilities. The second encore screening will be held Saturday night at the Colonial Promenade. The movie will be screened at 7 p.m.

Once We Were Strangers is a modern romantic comedy that was a huge success at the first screening Saturday, June 13. The encore screening will be held at 9:30 p.m. at the Colonial Promenade.

Tonight at a 5 p.m. screening at Colonial Promenade is a touching documentary called *Calling the Ghosts*. The new feature gives graphic, disturbing accounts of women in Bosnian concentration camps. But it also shows the hope and survival, both physically and mentally, from the atrocity these various women had to endure. The documentary will be preceded by another called *Memories Do Not Burn*...

floating a loan, it would be impossible to develop the area. Also remaining unanswered is whether or not citizens of the city as well as business owners and operators are sufficiently supportive of the project, which is being touted as a method of bringing more shoppers into the Lake Mary area.

Then too, there are questions regarding a possible decline in traffic on Country Club Road and Lake Mary Boulevard, once the new CR-40A interchange to I-4 is built and the widening of the interstate is completed.

Following a study of previously submitted information, the city staff is recommending the commission approve an investigation into the costs of a continuation of the original study. The suggestions include investigating appropriate funding, an approach to development support through the city infrastructure, geographic support, developer interest, assessment of property owners interest, and public support.

The downtown redevelopment discussion is scheduled under the Special Presentation portion of the city commission meeting.

As of earlier this week, the commission will conduct the following meetings:

- Work session - regarding the Orlando-Sanford Airport Noise Abatement Committee work on reducing noise in the areas of Lake Mary where fly-overs are deemed movable to a less problematical area. The work session will begin at 5 p.m. in the commission chambers.

applauded Schapler for her efforts to get the pool constructed. "This will save a lot of lives," Eckstein said. "I give Gretchen all my support. The city needs this. I'm all for it."

Commissioner Brady Leonard said he believes the commission should honor its earlier pledge even though he was the lone nay vote. "If this is the way the commission feels, then it should go on, but I personally don't believe the city should be in the swimming business. The School Board ought to be responsible for the swimming team and physical education classes."

Schapler said that there had been a strong feeling that "we would get at least a portion of the grant money. The other projects are good ones, of course, but we thought we would get a slice."

"We have not given up hope," she said. "Our boosters have done some wonderful things to help build the baseball field, a weight room and track. They have never undertaken anything this large but it can be done. We need time, hope and hard work. It will take a year or so."

One of the possibilities to help make the pool a reality is that the Seminole County School Board give the property to the city and allow Sanford to operate the pool, assuring the certi-

fied swim teachers would be hired. "The pool would be a profitable enterprise when big swim meets were scheduled here," Schapler said. "We envision a lot of people coming to Sanford for sporting events."

Some of the commissioners who know of Schapler's request seem willing to extend the pledge. The issue will be discussed at a work session Monday. The commissioners will then place the swimming pool issue on the agenda for the July 22 public hearing.

Lake Brantley and Lyman high schools have swimming pools but there is a need for an Olympic sized pool in the north end of the county to serve not only the school but the entire community. Everyone from toddlers learning to swim to seniors would use the facility.

Commissioner Velma Williams said that she was all for the building of the pool. "There's a dire need for it," she said Tuesday. "I voted yes when we allocated the money in the first place, but I thought then the School Board would help secure the CDBG funds."

"All I ask now is that they come up with the correct way to utilize the pool so there is equal time for the swimming teams and students and for the community as well. When will the community get to use the pool? I want to know how this will play out."



"I'm very proud of our staff," he said. "We have great teachers and they serve as great role models. When you win a trophy like this that says you are the best in the state, you have to credit the administration, the faculty and the fan support and, especially, the booster club. It takes a great organization to have all of these things."

How do you top 1987-88? Might not be too hard. Lake Mary hasn't lost an overall lot of its top senior athletes and the three girls state championship teams all return at least most of their nucleus.



New options for impotence treatment

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am 76 years old and cannot achieve an erection with any sort of stimulation. My doctor has given me yohimbine, testosterone shots and injections into the penis — all without benefit. Are there other options I could consider?

DEAR READER: You seem to have a physical cause for your impotence that has not responded to traditional therapy. Therefore, the problem may be caused by age-related circulatory deficiency: Because of arteriosclerotic plaque, your penis cannot fill with blood and become rigid.

In my opinion, you should be examined by a urologist, who may choose to prescribe Viagra (a new pill for impotence) or MUSE (a pellet placed in the urethra before sex).

DEAR DR. GOTT: In a recent column on sexually transmitted diseases, you advised a reader to be "cautiously selective" in picking a partner. This is wrong. Selectivity doesn't confer immunity. For example, a woman can have an STD and not even know it. Condoms and abstinence are the only ways to avoid infection.

DEAR READER: Granted. But I also said that it's impossible to test for all STDs and that "any sexual activity carries potential risk." Fortunately, most STDs are curable, the notable exceptions being herpes and AIDS.

I believe that prudently picking a partner goes a long way toward reducing the risk of STDs. Moreover, a loving couple is not likely to use condoms indefinitely. Sooner or later, they will have — gasp! — unprotected sex; for example, if they marry and decide to start a family. Your observations become less valid when carried to their logical conclusions.

Nonetheless, abstinence and condoms certainly make a world of difference for couples who are experimenting, rebelling or just starting out. Unquestionably, the epidemic of STDs among the young could be reduced if people practiced safer sex.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I drink about 10 cups of weak tea a day (with skim milk). Is this habit dangerous?

The third bid that changes

By Phillip Alder

We are continuing to look at bids that have a different meaning when they are made in the balancing position — that is, when the dealer opens and there are two passes around to you.

In the direct position (second seat), a jump to two no-trump is played by almost everyone as unusual, showing at least five cards in each of the two lowest unbid suits. (That is, the minors over one heart or one spade, or hearts and the unbid minor when the opening is one club or one diamond.)

In the balancing position (fourth seat), a jump to two no-trump is natural. It promises 19-20 (or 20-21 or 21-22, by partnership agreement), but might be a point or two lighter when

the hand contains an excellent six-card minor. You are promising at least one stopper in the opener's suit, and preferably more when he has bid a major. (This is because he is known to have at least a five-card suit. A minor-suit opening may be in only a three- or four-card suit.)

After West led the heart queen, declarer saw six top tricks: two hearts, two diamonds and two clubs. If South conceded a club trick, West would clear hearts and defeat the contract when in with the spade ace.

As West was marked with the spade ace from his opening bid, South started with the spade four. If West went in with the ace, declarer would have nine winners via three spades, two hearts, two diamonds and two clubs. However, when West ducked, declarer won with dummy's spade jack, then switched to clubs. This time, his nine tricks were one spade, two hearts, two diamonds and four clubs.
