

Wallace's Political Fate In Balance; 7 Other Primaries Set

Eight primaries set for Tuesday add up to the biggest political day so far in this fast-moving campaign year with the fate of George C. Wallace's third party presidential hopes at stake in Alabama's gubernatorial runoff.

Attention also will focus on Senate primary voting in California, New Jersey, Montana and Mississippi and party balloting for candidates for governor in California, New Mexico and South Dakota.

Wallace faces a tough job since he cannot campaign widely in the initial primary last month by 12,000 voters, but failed to build the necessary majority.

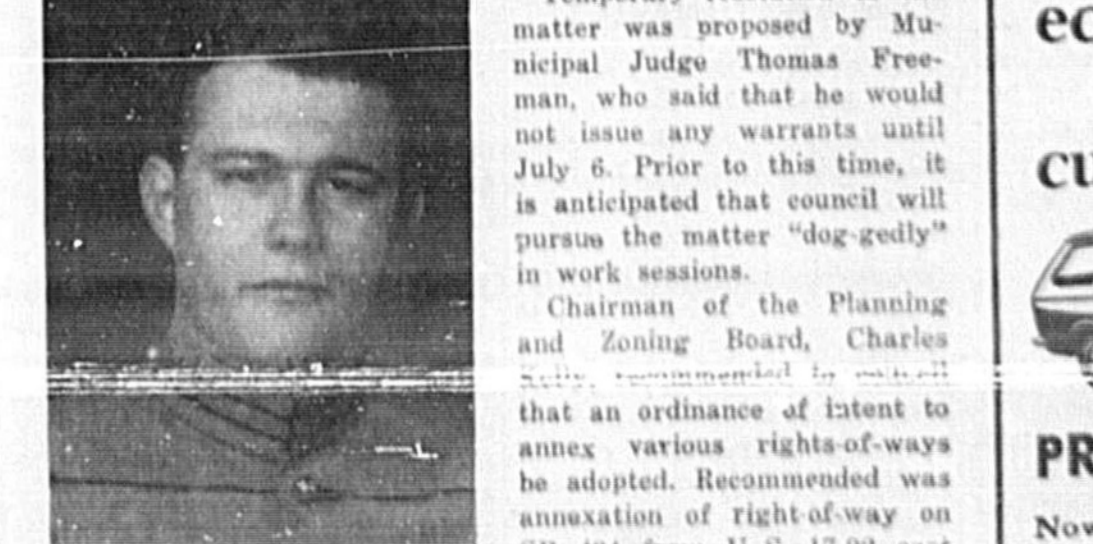

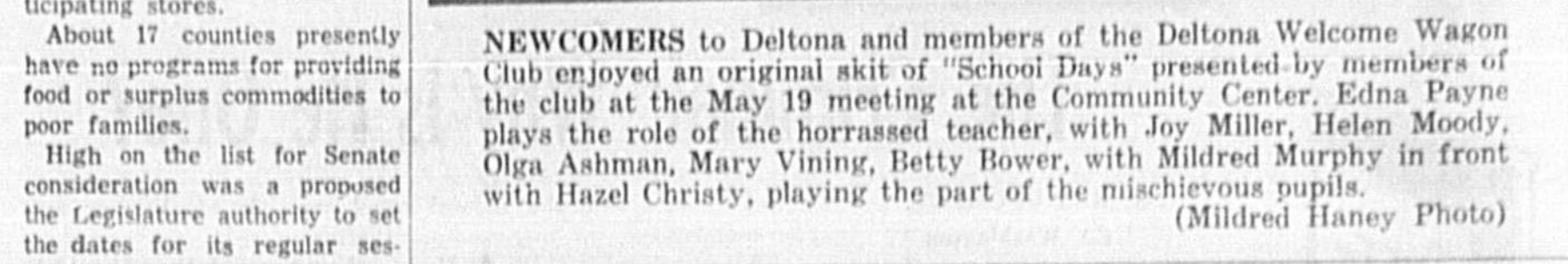

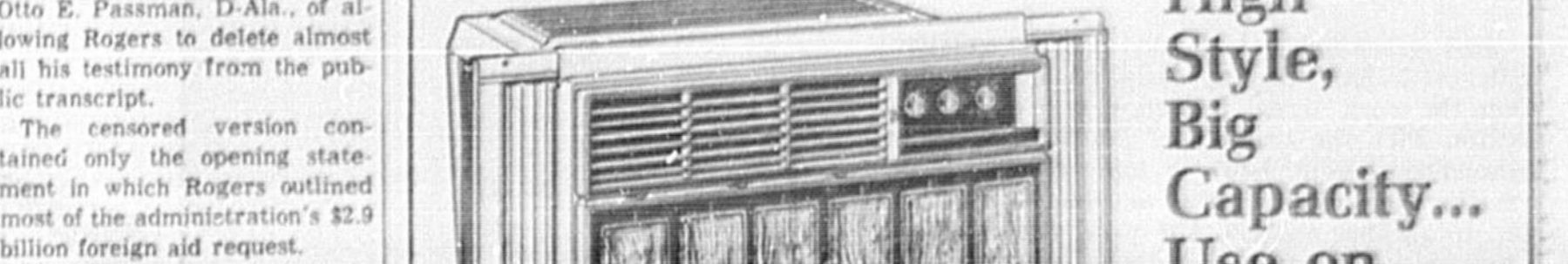

'Quake Death Toll At 1,000

LIMA (UPI)—Landslides and floods killed rescue efforts to reach devastated cities today in Northern Peru where the government estimated the death toll in Sunday's earthquake at 1,000. More after-shocks jolted Lima. The government said it was impossible to give a firm count of casualties because many were inaccessible due to destroyed highways and air strips. A spokesman for the National Information Office said Monday night the government believed there were about 1,000 dead and 8,000 seriously injured. It was Peru's worst earthquake disaster of the century. The government discounted reports that as many as 20,000 died, calling them "completely false." Two women Peace Corps volunteers were reported killed in the Andean city of Huaraz and two Catholic nuns from the United States were said to have died in the fining village of Chimbote. Huaraz, a city of 80,000 nestled in a semicircle of towering mountains 180 miles northeast of Lima, could not be reached Monday but had reports said 90 per cent of the houses were destroyed. Chimbote, 200 miles north of Lima, was accessible by water. President Juan Velasco Alvarado went there for a first-hand look aboard a navy boat.

Cosmonauts 'Coping' With Weightlessness

MOSCOW (UPI)—A veteran Soviet cosmonaut reported today he and his rookie crewmate were "coping well" with conditions of weightlessness and carrying out the flight program in Russia's first manned orbital flight in eight months. Soviet astronaut Neil A. Armstrong was dining with American cosmonauts on the outskirts of Moscow when Soyuz 9 was launched at 10 p.m. Monday in an unusual night shot from the Central Asia Soviet Space Center at Baikonur. Col. Andrian Nikolayev, 48, a Soviet cosmonaut, said in an official announcement on Soviet television 21 minutes after the launch that he was in command of the ship. His flight would involve no other flight engineer was Vitaliy Sevast'yanov, 35, making his first space voyage. The Soviet space agency has reported this morning Soyuz 9 was circling the earth every 88.50 minutes. Its orbit on the third revolution was reported to be 17 miles from earth at its farthest point and 12 miles at its closest. "I am said Soyuz 9 would conduct research into the effects of space flight on men, observations of various geological features of the earth, atmospheric studies and further performance of the spacecraft's operational and navigational system."

Wallace, who toured over Alabama politics for six years, returned to reverse a home base setback today in a show-down Democratic runoff that could affect the shape of the 1972 presidential campaign. In eight states, from New Jersey to California, voters were choosing party nominees for the Senate, Statehouses and Congress in the year's biggest outpouring of ballots. Not powere were the national states so high as in Alabama, where Wallace sought to wrest the governorship from Albert Brewer, a one-time protégé who has become a formidable threat to his presidential campaign.

Sanfordites Face 50% Utility Hike

By BILL SCOTT

Accepting House amendments, the Senate unanimously passed a bill to prohibit cities from charging customers outside its limits a rate more than 20 per cent above that charged city residents for gas and electricity. The cap for water and sewer services is 50 per cent above city charges.

When the bill becomes law, unless vetoed by Gov. Claude Kirk, Sanford will have to cut back its rates to those charged before Oct. 1, 1969, date the new water and sewer charges became effective along with the city's fiscal budget for 1969-70.

The State Legislature in a Tuesday action passed and sent to the governor today a bill putting a cap on rates cities can charge gas, electric, water and sewer utility customers living outside the municipal limit.

Sanford's utility rates are being raised by another 50 per cent to offset the loss in funds expected to occur when a new state act puts a cap on utility rates charged municipal customers living beyond the city limits.

The bill, backed by Sen. Jerry Thomas, Jupiter Democrat, is not to be confused with another bill filed by Rep. E. Pope Bassett, Seminole-Orange Republican, that would place Seminole County's city utilities under the State Public Utility Commission, and thereby regulate water and sewer charges to outside city customers.

However, the action proposed by Sen. Thomas may do what Bassett intended his legislation control utility rates.

If the act becomes effective before Oct. 1, then the city will have to obtain operational funds to offset the loss.

This could be accomplished by two methods:

Raise city rates 25 per cent more, and under the law, this would allow city to pass on to out-of-town customers another 25 per cent thereby recognizing the loss to prevent municipal operations from going into the red.

Another way to deal with the problem would be for City Commission to raise inside city customers the full 50 per cent increase.

Vendors Probed

What to do about licensing vegetable vendors who sell their wares along county highways and the start of an award to be given monthly to store clerks and employees for courtesy highlighted this morning's meeting of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce commercial committee.

Boatner said he was informed that these roadside peddlers are affecting business of grocery stores and wondered if all have been licensed by the county or city.

The chairman particularly mentioned tomato trucks parked on Highway 17-92 west, and said these should be checked to determine if they have been properly licensed.

Clyde Long, committee member, mentioned that this was the function of the sheriff's office but Boatner brought out that it was also part of the committee to look into complaints brought by member merchants.

William Reck suggested a resolution be passed calling on the law officers to check licenses and John Krider, Chamber manager, brought the subject to a conclusion by explaining that it is a function of the Chamber to have a "better business bureau" and, under this provision, he would take steps to see if these firms have been properly licensed.
