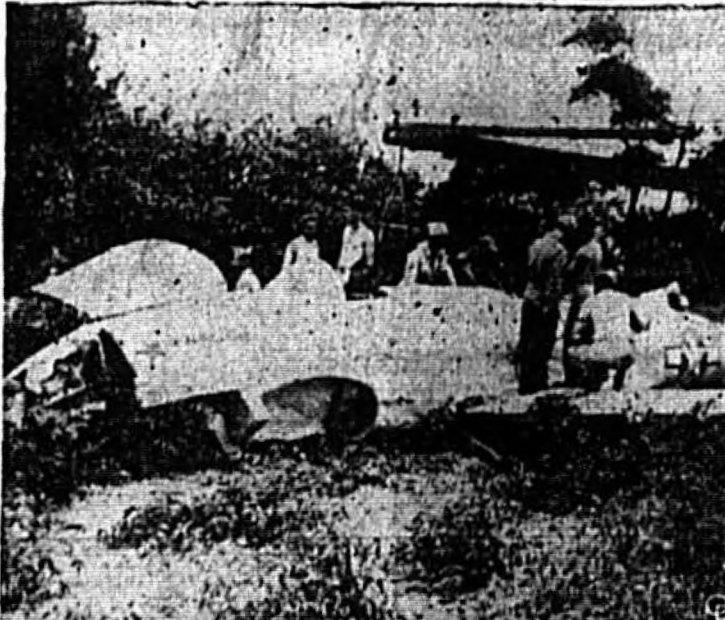

## Truman Signs Measure For Leave Pay Funds

Bill Also Provides  
\$30,000,000 To Buy  
Special Vehicles  
For Legless Vets

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8. (AP)—President Truman has signed an appropriation bill which provides funds for terminal leave pay for enlisted men. The measure authorizes the expenditure of \$2,431,708. It also provides \$30,000,000 for the purchase of especially fitted automobiles for veterans who have lost their legs.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7. (AP)—About 16,000,000 veterans stand to benefit by the terms of the GI terminal pay law. You or someone in your family may be one of them so here's what the measure is all about, as explained by a joint committee of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

The law which is specifically called the Armed Forces Leave Act of 1946—provides that every soldier, sailor, marine and coast-guardian-man or woman—be paid for furlough or leave time which was not used up before honorable discharge.

How do you figure out the unused time? Well, you have been allowed two and a half days furlough or leave for each month in service. But under the present law, you get only one day for each month. So the newly signed bill proposes to pay for it.

The settlements will be based on the rate of pay the GI was receiving at the time of his discharge. The time is computed at the rate of two and one half days per month—minus the time used up by actual furlough. The maximum number of days allowed is 180.

Any and every enlisted member of the armed forces who was honorably discharged—including the members of the women's branches—is eligible. Officers and warrant officers also are eligible for the unused time they accumulated while they were in enlisted brackets.

Of course, the armed forces will have a tremendous time settling the million and millions of claims. It will take about 60 days before claim forms are printed and distributed. But you or the veteran in your family have a simple job. All you have to do is pick up a claim form at your nearest Post Office—fill it out carefully—and mail it in. That's all.

It isn't necessary to write or call in person with the armed services in any way. That would just make the job all the harder for the clerks who have to do the paper work.

The settlements the GI's receive will be made in non-negotiable bonds which can be cashed in five years and will yield two and one half percent interest. However, the bonds are immediately negotiable if you want to use them for payment on GI Life Insurance. If you're entitled to less than \$50 you'll get it all by check. But any amount over \$50 will be paid off in bonds for each \$25 multiple and the balance by check.

Let's say, for example, you're entitled to \$80. You'd get three \$25 bonds and a \$5 check to complete the total amount.

Incidentally, if a veteran has died his survivors are eligible for this terminal leave settlement and they too should visit the Post Office where special instructions are available.

### City Will Get Naval Station Next Thursday

Adm. Ralph Davidson,  
Members Of Staff,  
Will Be Here For  
Short Ceremonies

The Sanford Naval Air Station will be officially turned over to the City next Thursday morning at 10:00 o'clock by Rear Adm. Ralph Davidson, USN, commander of the Sixth Naval District and Chief of Naval Air Advanced Training Command. It was announced yesterday afternoon by Comdr. H. A. Wheeler, commanding officer.

Admiral Davidson will be accompanied by members of his staff and there will be a short ceremony for the presentation to which the public is invited.

The City will take the station over on a revocable permit for the real and personal property to which they will have custody until the Government makes a permanent settlement with the City, according to Comdr. Wheeler. The Navy will retain five buildings for storage purposes, with Lieut. C. Amos, U. S. N. in charge. A small staff of civilian and naval personnel will be retained.

Edward Higgins, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, in commenting on the transfer, stated that this completes the work of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, in negotiating with the naval authorities for the Naval Air Station.

The Chamber of Commerce was authorized in November of last year to prepare the necessary briefs and present them to the various departments of the Government, stating the desire of the City and County to secure the Naval Air Station for the purpose of conducting an airport vocational training school, hospital center and a county fair association.

The Chamber of Commerce said, feels gratified with the results of these negotiations. The organization was one of the prime movers in developing an airport here in the early stages of the war, and assisted the City Commission in securing a Navy operation.

Mr. Higgins stated that the plans for the use of the station at the present time are as follows: Roy H. Browning and Harry K. Robinson will operate the airport for the benefit of the public and will also institute a GI training program. They will take over immediately after Aug. 15.

Officials of the Federal Post Office Hospital Building are taking inventory now and plan to take over the dispensary and whatever other buildings are necessary for the medical center. The Intercession Biblical College of Intercession City, Fla., has indicated its desire to find space and operation in the station vocational training school. A representative, C. A. Madly, is expected to arrive this week to complete negotiations.

Other enterprises that have indicated their desire to find space are as follows: a reliable light manufacturer wishes to put in a light plant on the site.

### Soviet and Australian Delegates Tangle In Verbal Battle On Voting Proposal

PARIS, Aug. 8. (AP)—Russia and Australia produced unexpected fireworks at today's session of the Paris Peace Conference. The delegates had gathered expecting only a routine approval of rules procedure previously agreed upon in committee.

Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov thrust the session into confusion by declaring that Russia will not agree to the voting procedure adopted by the Rules Committee. He accused the United States and Britain of manipulating decisions reached by the Foreign Ministers Council. Molotov faulted first on his head for making the Australian delegate Herbert Evatt act in a way to create opinion.

The Australian delegate, Herbert Evatt, accused the Soviet Union of manipulating the session. He said that the Soviet Union was trying to force a vote on the Rules Committee's proposal.

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### Giant Cedars In Hidden Grove Rival Famed Redwoods In Size

WASHINGTON—A six-month rest on the shelf is in prospect for the General Housing Bill.  
The measure is called the Wagner-Ellender-Taft bill to advertise its bi-partisan sponsorship. It wraps up the administration's whole long-range program for overcoming a 16-year deficit in housing.  
Sen. Taft (R-Ohio), one of the authors, says he doesn't look for passage for another half-year. That was a shock to National Housing Administrator Wilson Wyatt, who wants the "W-E-T" bill passed now. He declares it is

"indispensable" to his job of finding shelter for veterans.  
But the W-E-T bill is all snarled up in the House Banking and Currency Committee. It passed through the Senate with hardly a yelp of opposition.  
A variety of parliamentary snags has kept the committee from getting down to business. Members have objected to hearings for lack of a quorum or because the House is in session or on other technicalities which could be overlooked if the committee members wanted to push the bill along. A few members have raised the cry of "stalling" without effect.

Meanwhile the sworn opposition—the National Association of Real Estate Boards, the Home and Property Owners' Foundation and allied groups—have been getting in some good licks. They particularly don't like the public housing features of the bill.  
People in the National Housing Agency (NHA) ascribe the delay to such "pressure" upon legislators. Whatever the reason, it looks as though Congress will leave the bill on ice until the next session, starting Jan. 3, unless an extra session is called in the fall.  
Most members of Congress apparently feel content for the present with having passed the Patman Act, or emergency housing law, aimed at giving quick relief to the housing problems of

millions of returning servicemen. Why That Act Won  
The Patman Act now is law, but both bills were in the legislative mill at the same time. The urgency of the veterans' program not only gave the Patman Act the right of way but obscured the aims and intent of the long-range legislation.  
Essentially, the difference is this:  
The Patman Act gives NHA and industry the tools to build 2,700,000 hurry-up homes in two years, primarily for veterans.  
The W-E-T bill is the government's idea of how to push private and public housing into building 1,250,000 homes a year for the next ten years for the whole population.  
These are the differing approaches to the housing problem:  
The Patman Act—  
1. Is a bottleneck-buster, providing \$400,000,000 in subsidies to spur output of building materials along with priority powers and other extraordinary weapons.  
2. Gives Wyatt, as "housing czar," the authority of a wartime czar to boss other agencies around as he sees fit.  
3. Grants veterans priority on the purchase or rental of the houses built.  
4. Seeks to insure a fair-price by requiring the builder to agree to a ceiling before he gets authority to start construction.  
5. Gives government support to the prefabrication industry, by letting the government guarantee to buy any "prefabs" that the builder cannot market themselves, within certain limits.  
6. Increases the authority of the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) to insure mortgages by \$1,000,000,000, and lets FHA take higher mortgage risks than are common in peacetime.  
7. Expires Dec. 31, 1947.  
The Wagner-Ellender-Taft bill would—  
1. Freeze NHA in its wartime status, with permanent jurisdiction over FHA, Federal Public Housing Authority and Federal Home Loan Bank.  
2. Authorize research in new materials and lower cost methods, provide for market studies so that private contractors would know when and where to build; grant \$25,000,000 to aid local planning.  
3. Strengthen the lending powers of the Home Loan Bank and expand FHA's authority to insure mortgages as twin stimulants to private building.  
4. Provide FHA mortgage aids for middle-income home buyers—the so-called "no man's land" of families too well off for the public housing but too poor to build their own homes—by introducing a 5 percent down payment, 4 percent interest rate, a 32-year repayment period.  
5. Authorize a \$1,000,000,000 program of "yield insurance." This would guarantee a return on the investment of large-scale builders in rental housing for housing for moderate-income families.  
6. Provide federal aid for slum

clearance through loans to communities.  
7. Permit resumption of the public low-rent housing program providing 500,000 dwelling units in the first four years.  
8. Provide federal aid for farm and rural housing, through loans and contributions capable of housing 250,000 families in the first five years.

**FINANCIAL BENEFITS ARE NOT ONLY ONES ACCRUING FROM WORK**  
Hard work always has been the most respected way to get ahead financially. But the recent World War possibly revealed that hard work—which nearly everyone is trying desperately to avoid—carries physical and mental benefits in addressing 4-H club members at their National Camp in Washington this summer General Lewis B. Hershey, director of Selective Service, said that hard work might have prevented much of the physical and mental disability which disqualified five million men from service in the armed forces during World War II. He declared that, regardless of the advance of science and mechanization, hard work is still necessary for the health and development of the human being.  
Parents of the present generation, wanting to shield their children, try to see that the youngsters don't have to work as hard as their parents did. But General Hershey believes that if the youngsters had had to keep the wood box filled it might have helped two million men who were rejected for mental instability to make the proper adjustments to life.  
Leaders attending the camp adopted a national 4-H health program, the aim of which is to help youth share in the responsibility for improving home and community health conditions and to help young people to develop sound bodies and mature personalities. The 1,500,000 club members in the United States have the theme "Building Health for a Strong America" as one of their guideposts.  
General Hershey declared that the 4-H group typifies, as few other groups do, the right way to

build personalities that can work hard, think clearly and take a constructive part in community and governmental affairs.  
"Citizens trained in this way will fulfill the obligation of democracy as well as enjoy its privileges," he said.

The Value Of Schooling

The increasing appreciation of the value of education has become evident in recent years and particularly since the war, as hundreds of thousands of GIs head for college under the GI Bill of Rights and hundreds of high school graduates also heading in that general direction bring the total seeking admission to considerably more than can be accommodated.

Pointing out recently that there have been some changes in the world since the days of Daniel Boone when it was more important to be able to kill a "bar" than to spell it, Dr. Ralph J. Eymann, dean of education at the Florida State College for Women, has recommended that at least two years of college should be made available for every young person in the United States who wants to take advantage of it, regardless of finances.

Declaring that "the school has to prepare the younger generation to handle the great problems in the future" and that the power of the nation rests in the hands of its people, Dr. Eymann cited a seven point program which it is the responsibility of the schools to provide the younger generation, as follows:

- 1. Read, write and speak well.
2. Know literature, art and music well.
3. Grow in moral, spiritual and religious living; be honest, have fine character and good judgment.
4. Know science and mathematics well so they may cope successfully with the growing complexities of a technological world and also be successful in a biological world that is not too mild.
5. Understand the purposes, problems and ways of life of people of other lands so they may successfully work and live with them.
6. Have the know-how and will to work through indoctrination and discipline.
7. Reflect richness of living in leisure.

American Silk

Japan may be driven out of the world silk markets by low-priced silk made in America, according to David Markstein, writing in Forbes' Magazine.

The problem of cheap enough labor to unwind the cocoons has always been a stumbling block to that industry in this country, but a solution has been found in an electronic reeling machine invented by Gustav Beckman.

No yarn has ever been produced which equals silk in beauty of texture and finish, though rayon and nylon are serious rivals in the field.

Oldest City

Was the world's oldest civilization located in South America? The late Arturo Posnansky, archaeologist and museum director, thought so.

With all the trappings of a "great show on earth," the stage was set for Pearson's triumphal march on the alleged citadel of the high kiegles.

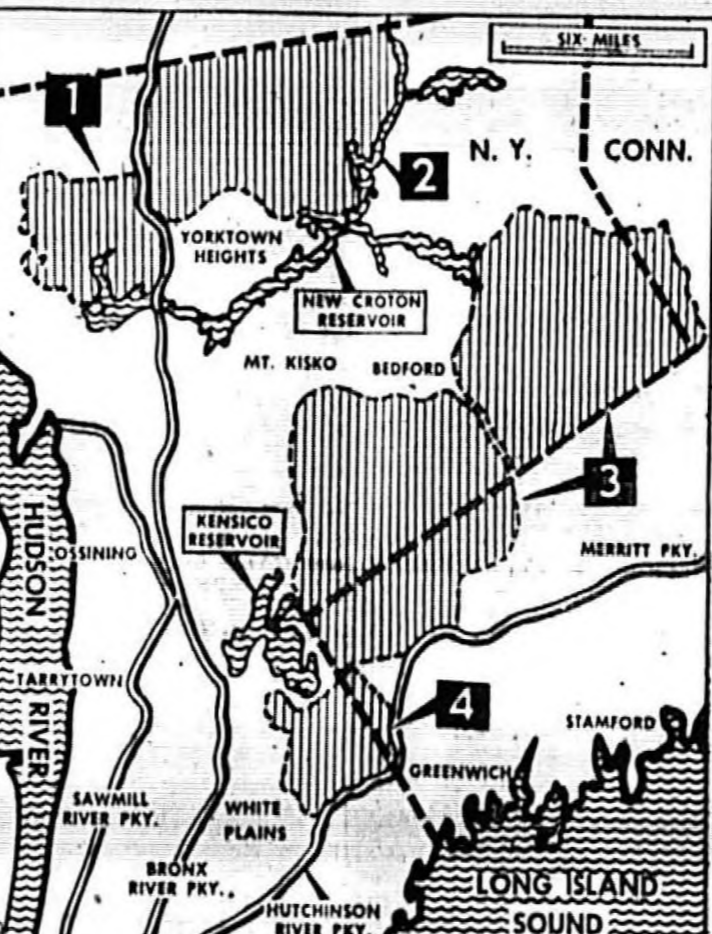

### New York Plans To Complete Highway In Five Years

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 7—Five years from now, New York State expects to have completed "the greatest highway in the world" stretching 486 miles from the state's southeastern tip, through the Hudson and Mohawk valleys, to the Pennsylvania border at Lake Erie.

The \$202,000,000 high-speed toll-free Thruway, now under construction, is designed to serve 90 percent of the Empire State's 13,500,000 residents.

Six lanes, three on each side of a mall, will span the state, with no traffic lights, no grade intersections and no urban hindrances.

**Speedup Lanes Planned**

Arterial routes will link cities with speed-up and slow-down lanes merging with the Thruway, which will be open to both commercial and passenger vehicles. The exits and entrances will be spaced an average of four miles apart, to accommodate local, short-haul traffic.

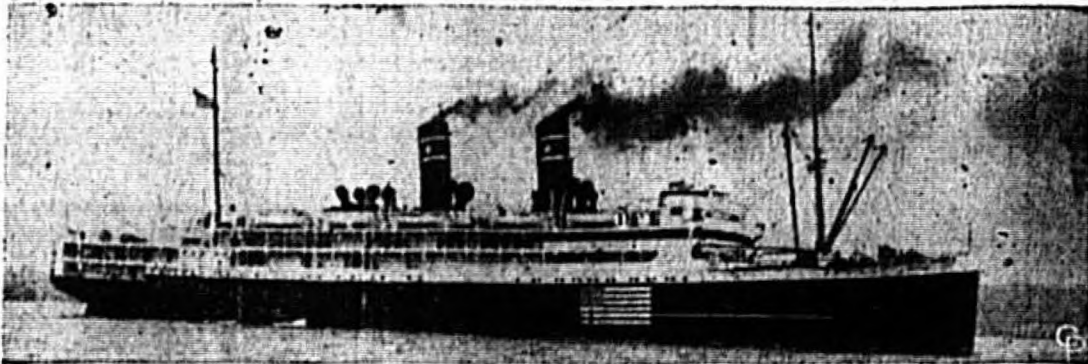
You will be able to see at least 1,000 feet ahead at all times. A minimum curve radius of 2,800 feet and a maximum grade of three percent, are planned.

**Compared With Others**

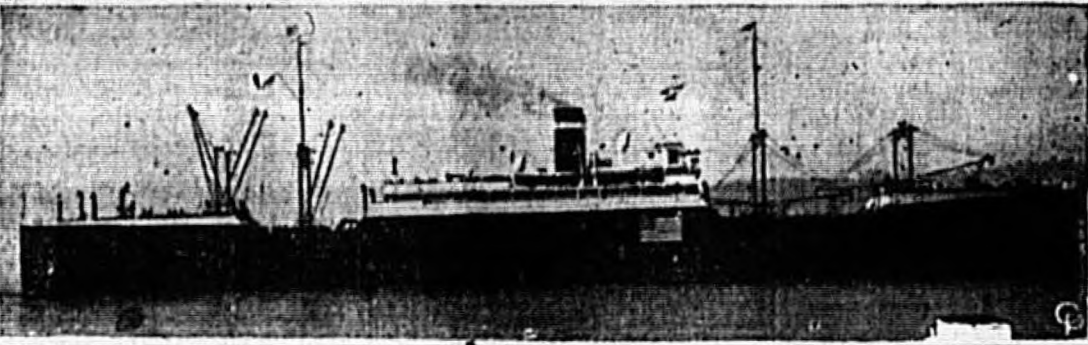
State Highway Works Department officials supporting Governor Thomas E. Dewey's claim that it will be "the greatest highway in the world," say these combined features can not be found elsewhere.

Pennsylvania, for instance, has a similar transportation asset in its seventy-million-dollar turnpike, opened in October, 1940. But the turnpike is much shorter (160 miles), has only four lanes and charges tolls.

The steel and concrete Thruway, described by Dewey as the 20th Century counterpart of the trade-

The Berkshire will extend eastward from the Catskill to the Massachusetts border, near the hamlet of state line.

The Mohawk will cover the westward region to a point north of Liverpool and Syracuse, where it will join the Ontario section.

The Ontario will run through the Finger Lake region, past Rochester, around Buffalo and into the Erie section at Cazenovia Creek.

The Erie, skirting Lake Erie, will stretch to the Pennsylvania border, while the Niagara section will connect the Erie with the Rainbow Bridge leading into Canada.
