on Ralph arrived Saturday to spend WEATHER AND CROP CONDIT-IONS IN FLORIDA FOR THE WEEK ENDING JANUARY 10, 1922.

> Temperature: The temperature average 3 degrees in the extremosouth to 8 degrees in the west above the normal for the week. Daily maxum were well up in the 80's over much of the section.

> Precipitation: There was a continued deficiency in rainfall, except that the week's total was much above the normal in much of the section west of the Chattahoochee iver. The total at Pensacola for the week was 2.10 inches, being an excess to 1.16 inches.

Condition of Crops; The weather was too warm, as a rule, for the best development of cabbage, celery, and lettuce, but the mild temperature stimulated other truck. Strawberries were rather plentiful in contral counties, especially in the Plant City section; a few berries were to be had in northern counties. The crop is generally well advanced. Shipments of calibage, celery, lettuce, and other truck continued from southern and central counties. The planting of white potatoes is active in the Hastings section, and land is being preparbe for melons in central counties. The ont crop generally did well during the week, although it, like most other crops, would be benefited by moderate rains. Fertilizing groves receive attention, and plowing for general crops was advanced although work has been delayed to some extent by dry weath-Ranges are in fair condition. Sunshine was about normal in the west, where it was deficient.




