## CHANGE 3,000 ELECTORS STOR IS ARE QUALIFIED R'S PLEA IN THIS COUNTY

Number of Registered Voters Is Virtually Same As At Spring Primary, H. C. DuBose, Registrar, Says

Observers Predict Vote Will Be Light  
City Voting Precincts Are in Courthouse Basement, Overland Motor Co. Office

Seminole County has approximately 3,000 electors qualified for tomorrow's election. Because of the lack of issues, the voting is not expected to be as heavy as that which marked the primary in the Spring when there were at least two Democratic candidates for all of the offices to be filled. Virtually the same number of voters are registered as at the spring primary, according to H. C. DuBose, supervisor of registration.

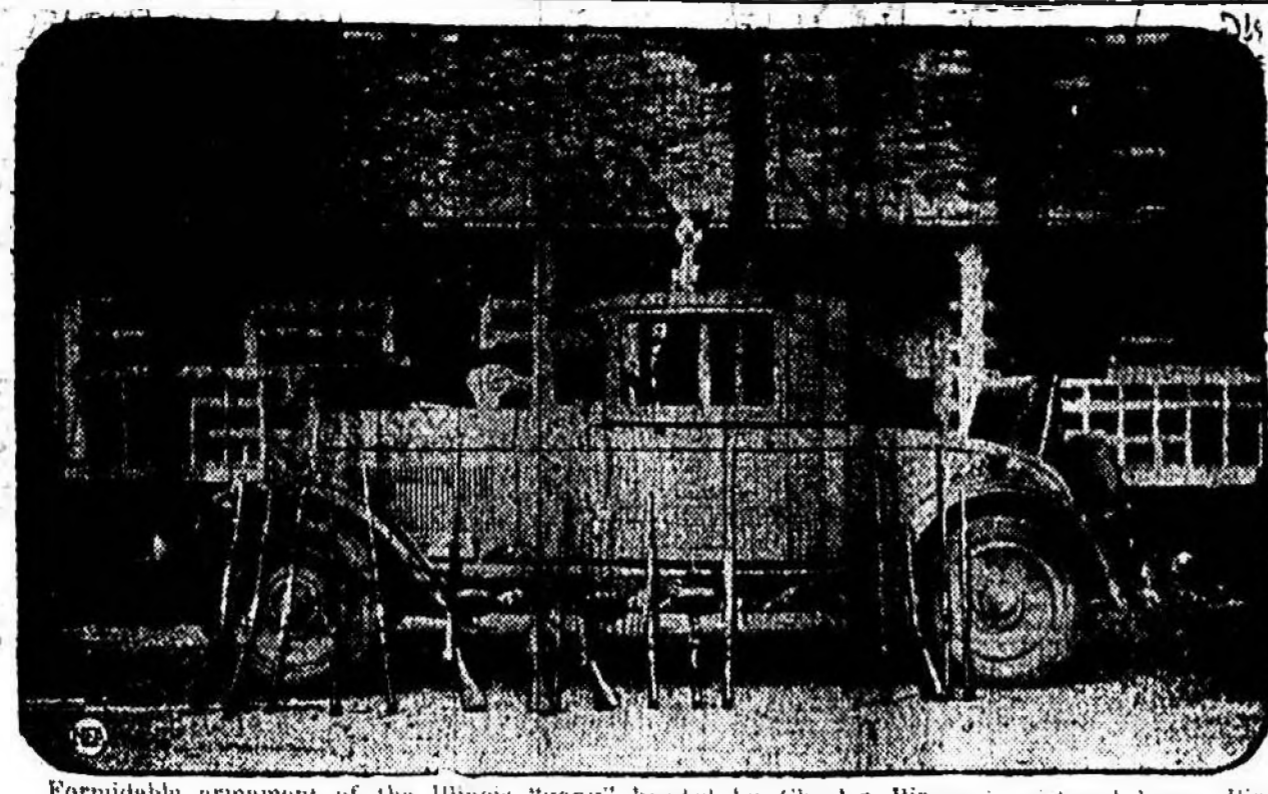
The county is overwhelmingly Democratic. The Republicans have not put up any candidates for the state legislative assembly, and their candidates for congress are not considered as having any show of election by Democratic spokesmen here.

The County Commissioners met this morning to make final arrangements for the election. The ballots are being printed today. Clerks and inspectors who have been asked to serve in the 11 precincts of the county are as follows:

## ITALIAN POLICE HUNT MUSSOLINI CONSPIRATORS

Accomplices of Youth Who Attempted to Kill Premier Are Sought as Authorities Believe Big Ring Exists

BOLOGNA, Italy, Nov. 1. (AP)—Having escaped assassination for the sixth time in the four years he has been Premier, Benito Mussolini, whose slogan is "live in danger" was undaunted as ever today as search was made for accomplices of a youth who tried to kill "Il Duce" and then was lynched by infuriated Fascist yesterday.

As Mussolini was leaving the stadium after opening the Congress for the advancement of science, a slender, blonde youth, about 18 years of age, pressed forward toward his automobile and fired an automatic pistol.

The youth was seized by infuriated black shirts, who felled him, stabbed him 14 times, choked and bent him and then dragged the body through a milling mass of humanity.

The youth was slain several minutes after the pistol shot. The bullet missed only by a fraction of an inch imbedding itself in the Premier's chest. It ripped both sides of his coat, cut the sash of the Order of Saint Maurice and Saint Lazarus across his breast and entered the sleeve of the mayor of Bologna who was sitting in the automobile beside Mussolini.

Mussolini, as when previous attacks were made upon him, was unperturbed. As crowds gathered in the path of his automobile, almost overturning it in endeavor to get close enough to ascertain whether he was injured, he sat upright, showing not the slightest sign of nervousness. The incident greatly excited the 50,000 persons in the stadium.

Immediately after the shooting Signor Turati, secretary general of the Fascist party, in a proclamation to the black shirts indicated that accomplices would be vigilantly sought and punished. "The first gesture of justice has been accomplished," said the proclamation. "Now the accomplices must be punished."

## SCHOOL COUNSEL URGES DEFEAT OF SCHOOL MEASURE

Fred R. Wilson Says Proposed Amendment to Appropriate Funds for School Permits Gerrymandering

The proposed constitutional amendment to appropriate funds for the common schools from the general revenue fund sought to be defeated, Fred R. Wilson, attorney to the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction, told the Herald today.

T. W. Lawton, superintendent of public instruction, last week asked members of the Sanford Kiwanis Club to vote against the amendment.

"The interests of the several counties are not sufficiently protected," Mr. Wilson said. "There is too much room for gerrymandering in the legislature. The idea of state funds for the common schools is fine but the principle in which the assistance is to be extended should be determined in the amendment and not left to the legislature."

"I think the amendment ought to be re-submitted to the people and allowed to go over to the next election so that it can be more definitely set forth. The principle positively ought to be declared in the amendment."

"If the distribution is left to the legislature, too much assistance may be given to one county and not enough to another county. The amendment as it is drawn up is not worded to protect the interests of the several counties. The amendment permits the gerrymandering of funds."

## COLLEGE HEAD BACKS HERALD IN CAMPAIGN

Dr. Murphree Says Paper Omitted Part Of Interview With Associated Press

Letter Praises Anti-Liquor Policy

Calls Drinking Among Students Difficult Question to Solve

In a recent letter to The Sanford Herald, Dr. A. A. Murphree, president of the University of Florida, declares that an article printed in a local morning newspaper omitted certain parts of his interview with the Associated Press regarding bootlegging at the University and thereby gave the wrong impression of his attitude toward the anti-liquor campaign of The Sanford Herald.

Declaring that the bootlegger and his business has presented the most difficult problem that he has ever had to deal with among all the administrative matters that have come before him, Dr. Murphree thanks The Herald for its stand and co-operation and states that he is with it to the bitter end in its fight to outlaw liquor, its sale and its use.

Advancing his views on prohibition Dr. Murphree replied to a letter from The Herald enclosing the garbled Associated Press dispatch and stating that from it the wrong impression was being allowed to prevail in regard to the President's attitude toward bootlegging and liquor drinking at the University. Dr. Murphree's letter follows:

"Your very kind letter and clippings are at hand. Your letter is especially appreciated. The statements you make in that communication are absolutely correct, and I am with you to the bitter end in your fight to outlaw liquor, its sale and its use, especially among students. It has presented the most difficult problem that I have ever had to deal with among all the administrative matters that have come before me."

"The Associated Press dispatch did not give my interview as a whole, and thereby left the wrong impression. I thank The Herald for its stand and for its co-operation. But I did say that The Herald's editorial seemed to suggest that I was lenient towards drinking among college students, and when I was interviewed I tried to correct that impression, for I have always taken a flat stand against the bootlegging student and the equally criminal students who 'buy or drink the illicit stuff.' I have had United States Revenue officers here as plain clothesmen to help me discover the dirty bootlegger, seeking to debauch the youth of our state. I have repeatedly asked for the return of these agents, but unfortunately the force has not been large enough, nor has the department had sufficient funds to supply us with the needed assistance."

"However, the agent that we had two years ago could not find that any student was bootlegging. We have dismissed students repeatedly for the violation of the University law against the use of intoxicants, and we shall continue to do so. There is no difference in the attitude of The Herald and the attitude of myself in that particular."

"I hope The Herald will continue its campaign. It can count on me for the most hearty co-operation. I think I said this in my full interview in the Associated Press. If the Associated Press will take another story from me, I shall be glad to make it clear that there is no degree of leniency shown students at the University who buy or drink intoxicants."

## Election Interests Of South Centered In Only Four States

ARLINGTON IS TO BE BURIAL PLACE OF DEAD AVIATOR

Crack Navy Pilot's Name Is Added to Long List of Men Who Have Lost Lives for Air Service of the U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The name of another viking of the air has been scratched regretfully from the list of the United States Navy.

And Lieutenant Frank H. Conant, 2nd, one of America's entries in the coming Schneider cup speed races, has joined those pioneers who have made the supreme sacrifice in the naval aviation service of their country—the list that includes Chevalier, Landdowne, Mustin, Chase, Schiff, Rodgers and others.

Lieutenant Conant, practicing in a high speed plane for next month's International cup events at Norfolk, Virginia, crashed into shallow water at Winter Harbor, 20 miles north of Norfolk, Saturday. His body, strapped to the seat and with his parachute undisturbed on his back, was recovered some seven hours after the accident and will be buried tomorrow at Arlington national cemetery.

Conant, born at the Naval Academy at Annapolis, November 13, 1898, was graduated there in 1919 and was assigned to the battleship Oklahoma as an ensign. The next year he requested flight instruction, and in addition to his regular duties, was qualified as a pilot at the Hampton Roads air station.

His air experience comprised more than 1,300 hours in 38 different types of ships, including the piloting of a plane shot from a catapult aboard ship. He was one of the 25 expert "precision" aviators who took off from and landed aboard the flight deck of the carrier Langley. His other feats were many in addition to his recent record two hour journey from Mitchell Field, L. I. to Hampton Roads in a service type, single seater pursuit plane.

Mrs. M. Aspinwall Dies At The John Hopkins Hospital

Mrs. M. C. Aspinwall of 1119 Myrtle Avenue died at the John Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, Md., last night, according to word received here. The body will be sent to Sanford, arriving here Wednesday. The funeral services will be held Friday, the hour and place to be announced later.

Her husband, Murray C. Aspinwall died Sept. 14 of this year following an automobile accident. Mr. Aspinwall was riding his three-wheeled vehicle on Oak Avenue on the night of September 13 when he collided with a moving automobile, the driver being blinded by the lights of another car. He died the following morning as the result of acute dilation of the heart, superinduced by the nervous shock of the accident.

Active Fight In North Carolina

Congressional Seats in Four Districts Are Goal of Politicians

(By The Associated Press)  
Contests for Senatorial and Congressional seats in Virginia, North Carolina, Louisiana and Kentucky, and a heated gubernatorial race in Tennessee draw chief interest in Tuesday's election in the South, with confirmation of Democratic nominees a mere formality in most states.

Active Republican opposition to the re-election of Senator Lee Sovernman, has been made in North Carolina by Johnson J. Hayes, who is popular in the western section of the state, while in Kentucky Senator Richard P. Ernst, Republican, is opposed for re-election by Congressman Aiden W. Barkley.

Republican opposition has developed in six North Carolina Congressional districts, while in Virginia Democratic candidates for three seats in Congress have Republican opponents.

While the candidacy of Governor Austin Peay, of Tennessee, holds chief interest of voters, incumbents in two Congressional districts have Republican and independent opposition. Governor Peay is opposed for re-election by Walter White, Republican.

In the first Louisiana district, James O'Connor, Democratic incumbent, has Republican opposition of Governor J. G. Hardman, Democratic nominee for Governor, will be formally confirmed.

While some Republican opposition has developed to one Senatorial and four Congressional campaigns in Florida, chief interest centers in the strength of the Republican vote.

George Unopposed  
In Georgia Senator W. L. George is unopposed for re-election, as are 12 candidates for Congress. In one district, the Republican candidate conceded defeat and withdrew from the running. Dr. L. G. Hardman, Democratic nominee for Governor, will be formally confirmed.

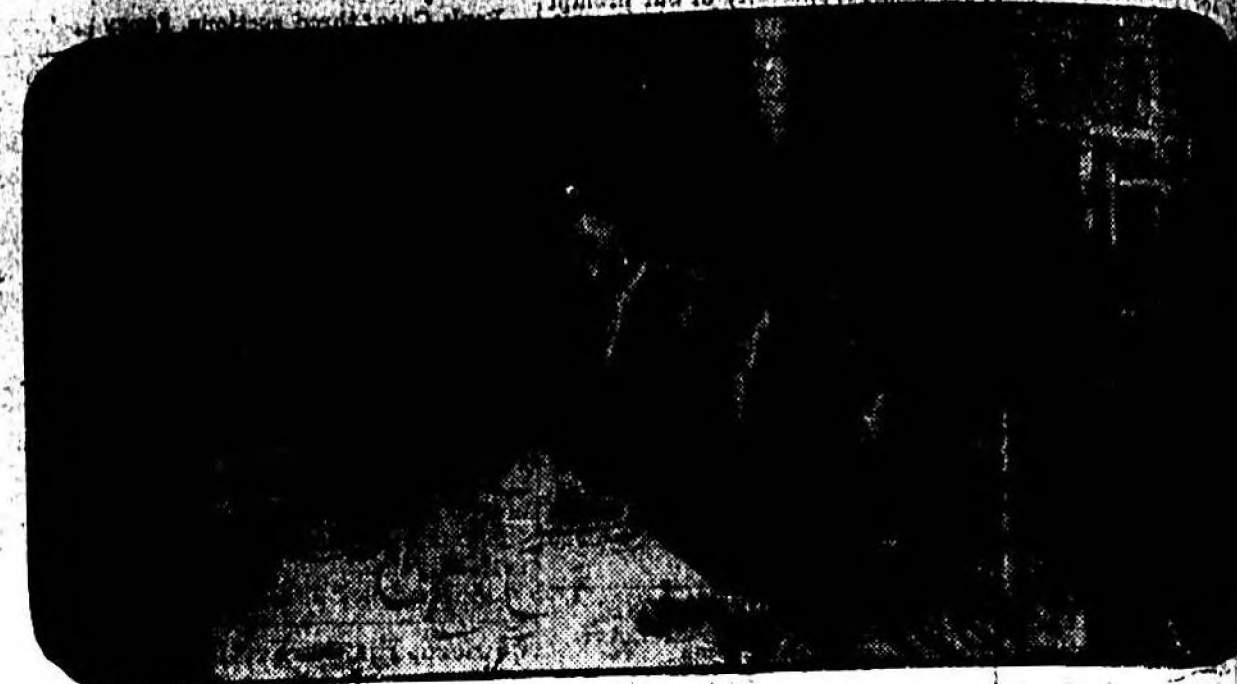

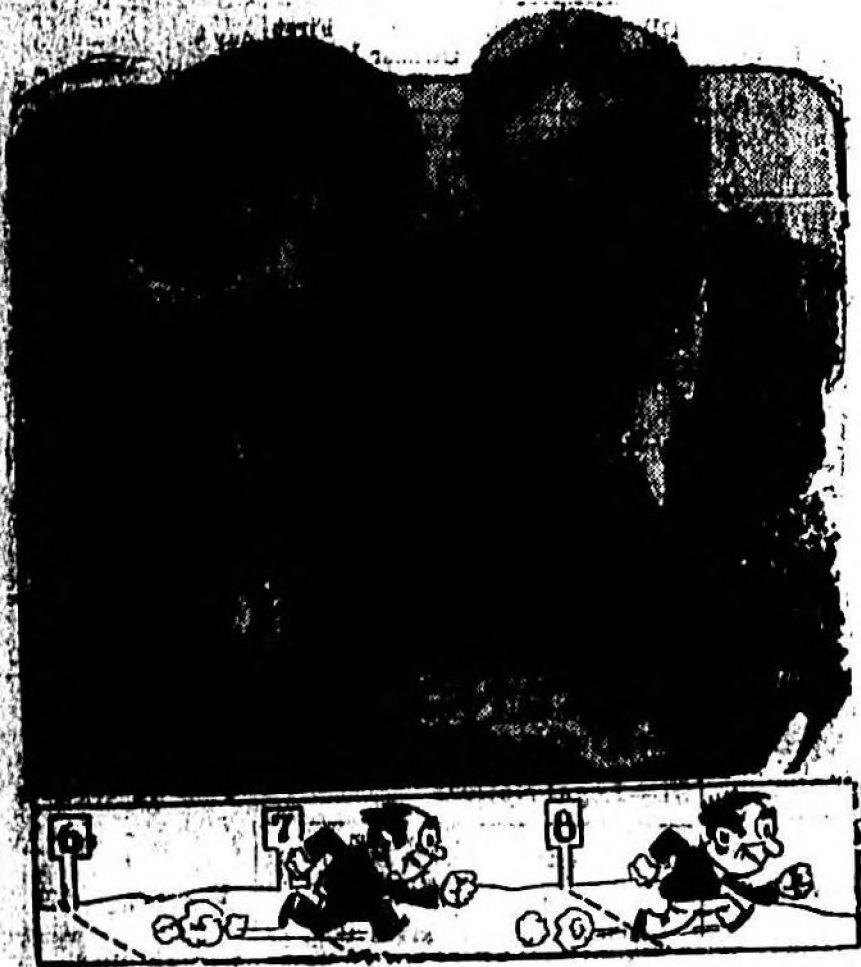

# Wrong Ballots Are Reported Sent Out From Tallahassee

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 1. (AP)—With the general election for Florida for tomorrow morning, an error, considered grave by Democratic nominees for the supreme court, has been found in the ballot for Leon county, and the same mistake is believed to be on other ballots of the state, it developed here today.

In the group for supreme court, the ballot reads "Vote for two," where there are two regular terms and three unexpired terms to be filled.

A Tallahassee printing firm which printed the ballots for Leon county stated that the same state ticket ballots had been sent to other counties of the state.

The secretary of State's office has nothing to do with printing the ballot, according to H. Clay Crawford, secretary of state. If an error has occurred the county commissioners are responsible, he said, as the ballots are supposed to be prepared in accordance with the election call.
