O'Hanlon admits Sunshine Law violation

OVIEDO — The Oviedo City Council unanimously agreed to close a two-week old investigation into possible violations by councilmen Tom O'Hanlon and Chris Jepson after O'Hanlon admitted the two unintentionally violated the spirit of the state's Sunshine Law.

Oviedo City Attorney William Colbert had been investigating whether the two newly elected city council members discussed public policy outside of council chambers shortly after they were elected.

"I believe that it is possible I may have unintentionally violated the spirit of the

Sunshine Law," O'Hanlon said in a written statement.

Colbert said that unintentional violation of the Sunshine Law is a less serious offense than intentional violation.

Intentional violation of the Sunshine Law is a second degree misdemeanor that carries possible jail time, a fine, the responsibility for attorneys fees, and the potential for removal from office.

However, unintentional violation of the Sunshine Law is a Civil Infraction, not a misdemeanor. It does not carry the possibility of removal from office by the Governor or prosecution from the State Attorney's Office. Colbert requested that the investigation be closed because of

O'Hanlon's statement.

"I think it took courage for him (O'Hanlon) to say that," Colbert said. "It renders what we've been asked to do perhaps moot."

City Councilman Tom Hagood said that he believes O'Hanlon and Jepson have learned from their experiences, and that an investigation is no longer needed. "What we needed to find out has been determined at this time," Hagood said.

On Oct. 4, shortly after taking the oath of office, O'Hanlon and Jepson both called for City Manager Eugene Williford to be dismissed, saying that while they were campaigning they heard too many complaints about city services.

Since the Oct. 4 meeting, allegations were made by residents that after being elected O'Hanlon and Jepson privately discussed the move to oust Williford before the council meeting was held.

O'Hanlon and Jepson said that although they have met privately multiple times after being elected and discussed how to make a motion as well as service on the council in general terms, they have not discussed specific matters.

"I tried to bring Mr. Jepson up to speed on how the city works, how Robert's Rules work, and how to make or withdraw motions," O'Hanlon said.

Jepson, who provided the lone vote See O'Hanlon, Page 8A

Finishing what Dad started

Cyclist medals in race his father didn't finish 3 years ago

SANFORD — Jon Davis completed on Monday a Golden Age Games 10K cycling race that his father was unable to finish three years ago.

Wearing the same T-shirt his 80-year-old father wore the day he collapsed four miles into the 6.1 mile race, 53-year-old Jon Davis won the bronze medal in the event this year.

"My dad's name 'Elliott' was on the shirt," Davis said, "so I took it to the Shirt Works in Winter Park and had them add 'Remembering' above his name and 'My dad' underneath."

As Davis pedaled to the finish line, he said he felt his father's presence.

"Of course, I was thinking about him and sensing he was

urging me on," said Davis, who attended the 1996 event that

turned out to be his father's last racing competition before passing away that same year.

"They called for an ambulance that day for my father," Davis said. "Since we were so close to where my mom and dad lived (at Bram Towers), I

ran there to get his inhaler. I ran fast enough to be back before the medical team arrived."

On Monday, Davis was back to finish the race for his father. Before the race, he went to Bram Towers to have breakfast with his mother, 75-year-old Rosemary Davis, just as his

dad had done in 1996.

At 53, Jon Davis was eligible to compete in the 50-54 age bracket of the 10K event. For the first time, the Golden Age Games allowed 50-year-olds to compete. The youngest competitors previously had been 55 or older.

Police nab nine in drug bust

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Some creative police work by agents of the City/County Investigation Bureau led to the arrest of nine individuals on various drug charges over a four-hour period Friday night.

Initially agents executed a search warrant at 200 Magnolia Avenue just east of Altamonte Springs and arrested the occupant Devon Anderson, 39, on charges of possession of cocaine, possession of less than 20 grams of cannabis, and possession of drug paraphernalia shortly after 7:30 p.m.

After executing the warrant the agents set up a reverse sting operation just outside Anderson's home. They were approached by eight other people seeking to buy drugs over the next four hours.

All were arrested including

one of the drug buyers who was also charged with carrying a concealed firearm, a 22-caliber pistol.

Sanford teacher dies in hit-and-run

Police need public's help locating mystery driver

SANFORD — Sanford police are seeking assistance from the public in helping solve a traffic homicide, the result of a Saturday morning hit-and-run accident that left a 28-year old man dead and a woman hospitalized in stable condition.

Police indicate that at approximately 1:04 a.m. Saturday morning, Henry Lee Williams and Coretta Mitchell, 19, were traveling westbound on East SR 46 aboard Williams' 1997 yellow Suzuki motorcycle.

A vehicle traveling eastbound, described as a dark colored mid-sized sedan, resembling a Ford

Taurus or possibly a Chevrolet Lumina, turned north on Summerlin Avenue causing the motorcycle to strike the passenger side of the car. Both Williams and Mitchell were ejected from the motorcycle upon impact. Williams was pronounced dead at the scene while Mitchell remains hospitalized in stable condition.

Police suspect that the vehicle involved in the hit-and-run suffered significant passenger side damage with one or more of the passenger side windows smashed out.

Sanford police are requesting information from anyone who may have witnessed the accident or know the whereabouts of the suspected vehicle and driver. Officer Morenster of the Sanford police department is handling the case and may be contacted at 407-322-4141.

Williams was a popular coach and security guard at Teague Middle School in Altamonte Springs.

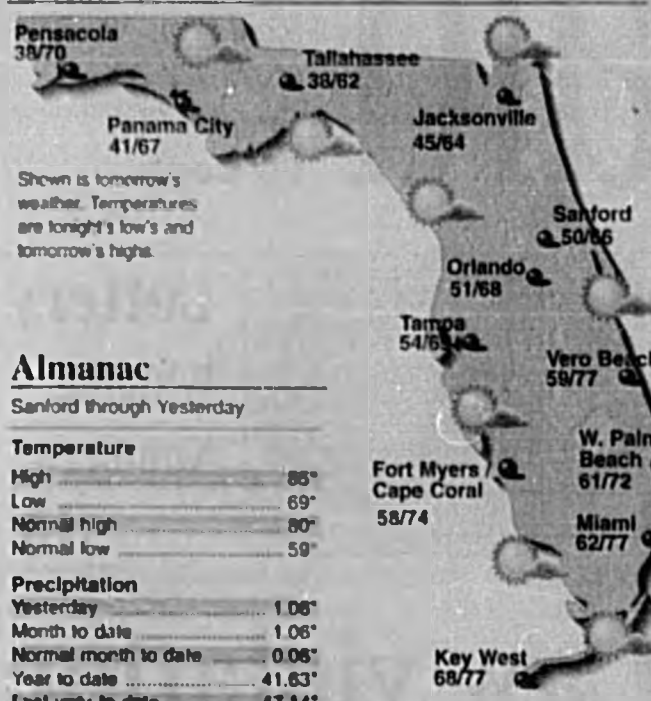

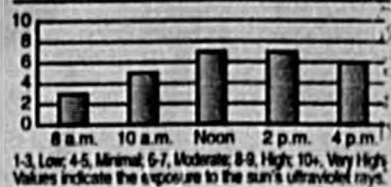

Max Patkin was the game's last funny man

He didn't hit home runs or steal bases. He didn't pitch a no-hitter or strike out the side.

Max Patkin didn't do any of these things. He only made us laugh.

We laughed with him in Peoria, we laughed with him in Mobile. We laughed with him in dimly lit minor-league ballparks all across the country. And a few years ago we laughed when Max Patkin landed a cameo appearance in the movie, "Bull Durham."

Patkin, who died last week in Paoli, spent six decades entertaining baseball fans. There were other "Clown Princes" before him and after him, but Patkin, who was 79 when he died, is the one America will hold nearest to its heart. Cap askew. Droopy trousers. Sweet, goofy Max Patkin.

Bill Veeck, sport's fun-lovingest owner, gave Patkin his first gigs right after World War II. To Veeck, a night at the ballpark meant a good game, hot dogs, and entertainment. He introduced exploding scoreboards, a midjet batter and Max Patkin.

Earlier, baseball had a number of entertaining ballplayers and coaches. Casey Stengel once produced a bird under his baseball cap. Nick Altrock and Al Schacht did comedy routines while employed by the Washington Senators. In the 1950s, Jimmy Piersall was a good but wacky major-league outfielder. Bird Fidrych amused fans in the late 1970s.

Patkin's repertoire was always from the sidelines. He'd do slapstick between innings, and also in the first base coach's box. The home club would let him coach an inning each night. He'd mimic the opposing team's pitcher or first baseman. He'd gather dirt, spit and rub the dirt and spit over his face. We always laughed. He made us laugh.

Even when San Diego came up with the Chicken, and every other team had a mascot, Patkin was in demand at big-league and minor-league ballparks. He visited with fans and signed autographs. He greeted folks at the turnstile and posed for pictures.

One of Patkin's caps and pictures of him are displayed in an exhibit at the Baseball Hall of Fame. It would be hard to ignore the joy he brought to so many fans. Max Patkin was the last funny man in baseball. Good enough to be nominated for some All Century team, don't you think?

No passion in the passion flower

The name of passionflower is given to any of the vines of the genus *Passiflora* which produce a very unique flower.

The word passion does not refer to any aphrodisiac effect from chemicals produced by the plants, quite the opposite, the plants produce a compound called passiflorin which is given to hyperactive children to slow down their reactions.

The name *Passiflora* comes from the interpretation that the floral components represent the elements of the crucifixion of Christ.

Passifloras are mainly native to America with few species from Asia and Australia. They are grown mainly for their unique flowers, which bloom from spring through fall, but some others are planted for their edible fruits.

Red passionflower: Native to southern Brazil. Woody vine with oblong leaves, 6 inches long and 2 2/3 wide. Flowers are brilliant scarlet with white-pink-and-purple corona, measuring 5 inches wide. Fruit round, 2 inches wide, with acid pulp and many minute seeds.

Blue passionflower: Native to southern Brazil. Somewhat

hardy vine that grows best in temperate with frost-free climate. Flowers are 3-4 inches wide and have white to pale pink sepals and petals.

The corona is deep purple at the base, white in the middle and blue at the tips. Leaves have smooth edges and 5 to 7 lobed.

Two cultivars are recognized: "Constance" with fragrant pure white flowers and "Grandiflora," with larger flowers.

Many hybrids are available from crosses between the blue passionflower and other *passifloras*. Hybrids are popular because of their larger flowers and disease resistance. Hybrids usually will not bear fruits.

Maypop: In Florida, a *Passiflora* known as maypop grows wild throughout the state. This cold-hardy specie can be found all the way to Pennsylvania and westward to southern Illinois, Missouri and Kansas. The leaves are deeply 3-lobed, 3 to 6 inches long, with serrate margins. The maypop produces blue-purple flowers and small, ovoid but edible fruits, about 2 inches long.

This plant is a great ornamental vine for Central Florida and the food source for caterpillars of the zebra longwing and Gulf fritillary butterflies.

Purple passion fruit: Both the purple and the closely related yellow passion fruit are the source of passion fruit juice, one of main ingredients of the world-famous "Hawaiian punch." Both plants have trilobed leaves 4 to 7 inches long, with fine-toothed margins.

The purple passion fruit bears dark-purple, rounded fruits, about 2 inches long. The fruit of the yellow passion fruit is deep yellow in color and similar in shape but a little larger than the purple passion fruit. The fruits contain numerous small, black seeds that are individually surrounded by deep orange-colored sacs that contain the juice.

In Florida, the purple passion fruit flowers in early spring and the fruits mature from 60 to 80 days later. The yellow passion fruit flowers from spring until late fall, with a break in early summer.

Pollination is essential for fruit production on passion vines. Flowers of the purple passion fruit can be self-pollinated, but many yellow passion fruit flowers will not set fruit unless their flowers are dusted with pollen from a differ-

ent vine that is genetically compatible.

The most effective insect for pollinating passion fruit is the carpenter bee, a large solitary bee similar to the bumble bee in appearance. Honeybees, because of their small size, are not good pollinators. Hand pollination may be the easiest way to ensure fruit production on a few vines growing in the home garden.

Fruits are never picked from the vine, ripened fruits are collected when they fall to the ground.

Giant granadilla: The plant has round-oblong leaves 4 to 8 inches long, the stem is characteristically square in cross section. The flowers droop like old-fashioned lampshades and their petals are deep maroon on the inner surface.

The fruit is irregular, oblong 4 to 8 inches long, weighing 8 to 16 oz or more, and has a thick, edible rind. The black seeds are individually surrounded by juice sacs. The fruit turns deep golden when fully ripe and may be picked for local consumption at this stage.

You should not have to keep reminding her. Tell her once and for all that you don't want your son and your relatives surveying her "assets" — so in the future, unless you're alone, she MUST keep them covered.

DEAR ABBY: A year ago you were kind enough to publish a letter I wrote dealing with infants who are thrown away, abused or killed by their parent or caretakers. I concerned the news accounts of the death of one such toddler that haunted me. Shortly after, you published a letter written by a nurse who said that for the first time an infant had been abandoned on the grounds of the hospital where she worked. She thought perhaps my letter had prompted that child to be abandoned in a safe place. I hope so.

I would like to thank you for printing my letter, Abby, and share some information that may save more infants who are at risk of being abandoned or abused. Programs exist to help them. The first is the Baby Anthony Program in California, with a statewide, confidential crisis toll-free hotline: (800) 606-BABY

(2229). The other is a national 24-hour toll-free hotline called Project Cuddle. That number is (888) 628-3353. I hope you will pass this along to your readers because recently there were two more stories about abandoned babies.

One was found alive in a garbage can, another found dead in a field.

The phone numbers are for women and young girls who find themselves pregnant and do not know where to turn for help. They are also for caretakers who feel they must somehow get rid of the child. Some of these women and young girls will never see a doctor or any other health-care professional about their pregnancies.

I still believe there should be a legal and safe location for caretakers to take these infants, and no "manhunt" to add to the feeling of despair that led these people to think the only way for them to cope is to "get rid" of the child.

Thank you again for the opportunity to ease the trauma the original "Baby Girl Doe" created within me. I almost feel as though her message to the public has been received and some lives have been saved because of her. She remains in my mind and heart, but she is no longer heavy, thanks to you.

DEAR DOROTHY: I'm pleased to spread the word about the Baby Anthony Program and Project Cuddle, for parents who are overwhelmed and cannot tolerate the responsibilities of parenthood. They provide a sensible alternative to abandonment or child abuse.

Good advice for everyone — teens to seniors — is in "The Anger in All of Us and How to Deal With It." 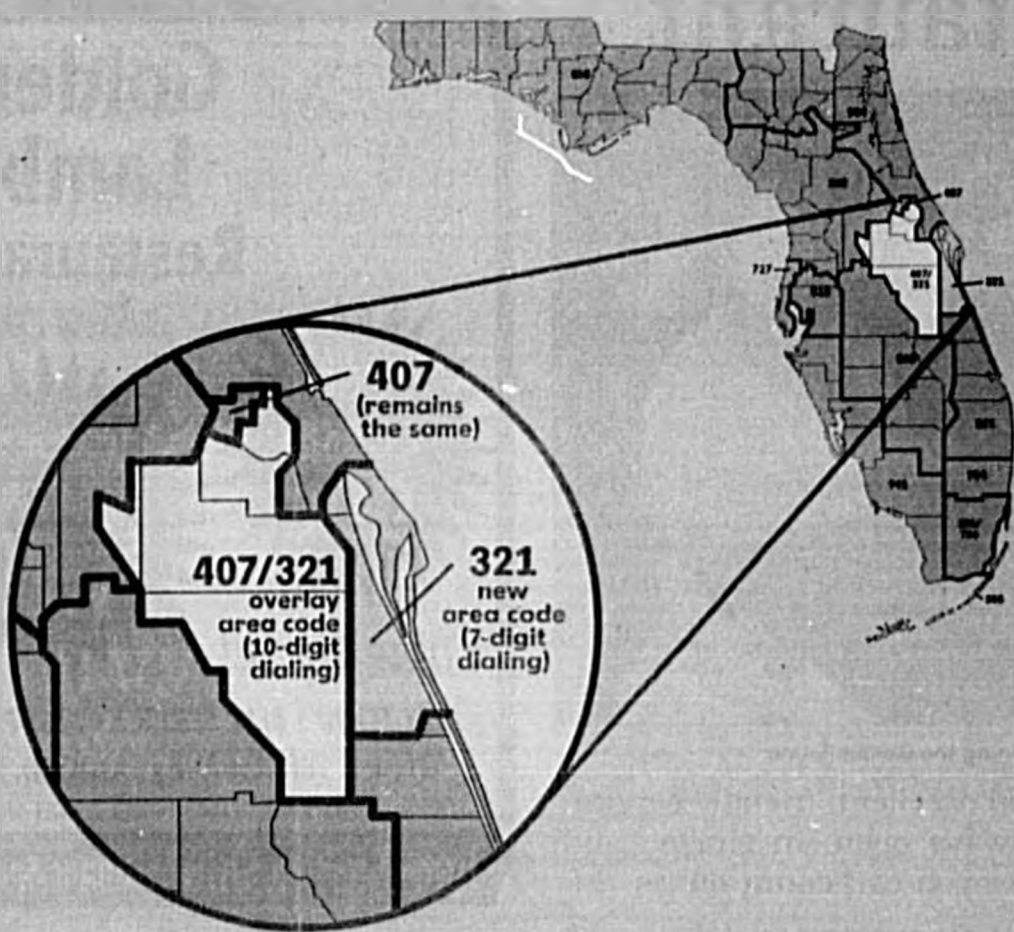

against Colbert's investigation on Oct. 18, denied violating the Sunshine law.

Colbert said that even indirect discussions outside of council chambers could be a violation of the Sunshine Law. Colbert said the investigation, including taking voluntary statements of anyone involved, would have taken about 30 days.

O'Hanlon and Jepson live two blocks from each other, and say they have been friends for 12 years.

In addition, O'Hanlon and Jepson have met with other council members. O'Hanlon met separately with council members John Benson and Tom Hagood, while Jepson also had a private conversation with Benson.

"I have spoken to everyone," O'Hanlon said.

State laws allow council members to talk in private, so

long as public business is not discussed.

Benson and Hagood both said they gave general advice and background on several issues facing the city, as well as other topics not related to city business. They said they never discussed public policy in any detail.

Hagood said they discussed matters that had arisen while campaigning.

O'Hanlon also said he spoke privately with Council Chairman Bob Dallari after running into him in a park or a restaurant, although Dallari said a conversation never took place.

Both O'Hanlon and Jepson said that since the allegations have come up over possible violations of the Sunshine law, they have stopped meeting.

Several Oviedo residents asked the council to have possible Sunshine Law violations by O'Hanlon and Jepson investigated in greater detail.

"It wasn't the city council who requested the investigation, it was citizens," said Valerie El-Jamil.

Other residents said that prolonging the investigation would distract the council from performing the city's business.

"The issue of dismissing the city manager was a constant topic of the campaign," said George Stewart.

LONGWOOD — Shortly after 7 p.m. tonight, Longwood voters should know if the composition of their city commission remains the same or if there will be new faces on the board. Voters will go to the polls

today between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. to decide commission seats in Districts 1 and 4 as well as cast ballots on 21 questions pertaining to the city charter.

City Clerk Geri Zambri will be using a telephone modem to connect the city's voting machine to the county Supervisor of Elections office and anticipates having tabulated results within 20 or 30 minutes of poll closing. Thus far about 50 absentee ballots have been received at city hall.

Incumbent Rusty Miles is challenged in the District 1 race by John Maingot. Miles is seeking his second term on the board while Maingot is a political newcomer. In the District 4 race incumbent Annamarie Vacca is seeking her third term. Butch Bundy, also a newcomer to elected office is

challenging her.

Voters likewise will decide 21 ballot questions, many dealing with administrative housekeeping measures, but a few that should attract voter interest. Among their decisions will be whether to remain with a simple 3-2 majority required to hire and fire key city personnel such as the city administrator, city attorney, and city clerk, or change to a required supermajority of four-fifths.

City Hall, located at 175 West Warren Avenue will serve as Longwood's sole polling place. A new state law requires registered voters to provide a photo identification, preferably a Florida driver's license and Florida ID prior to casting ballots. Those with no photo identification must fill out an affidavit prior to voting.

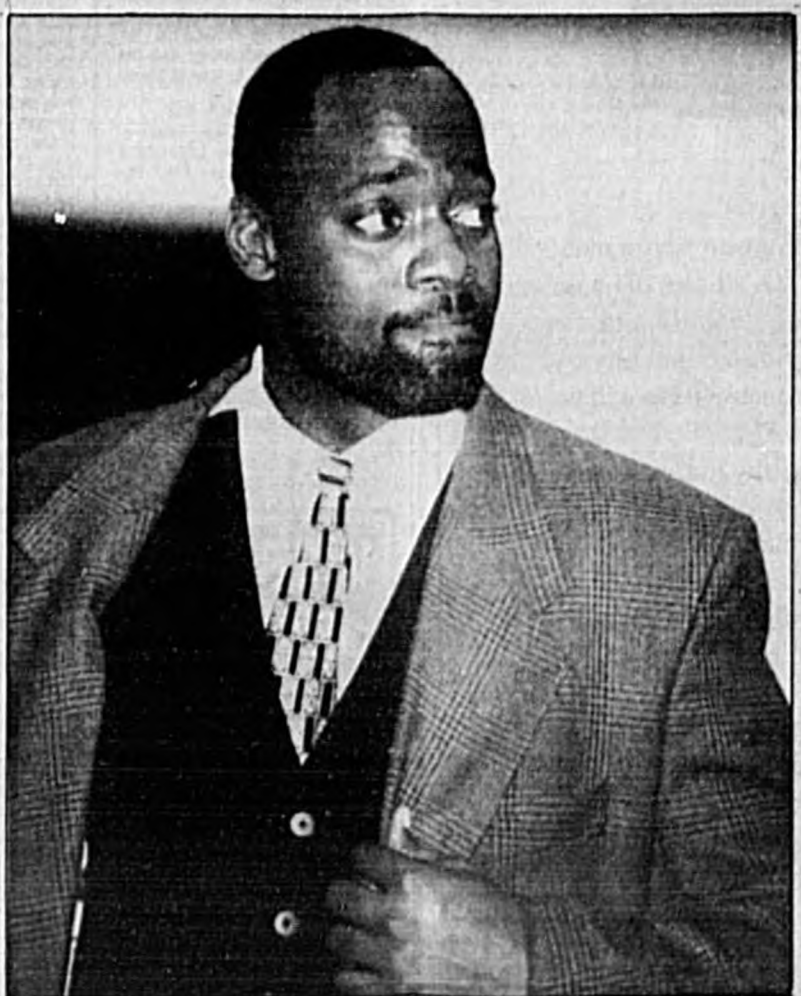
The game will be televised locally on the Magic Network's new Flagship station, WRBW-UPN65 and broadcast on the radio on WDBO-AM 580.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Think of them all

In bridge, the number of plays is restricted. First, you are constrained to follow suit, then, if you are on lead, it will be obvious that several cards are fatal choices. Still, many fail to consider all the possibilities.

In today's deal, how should the play proceed in three no-trump? West makes the unfortunate choice of the spade two for his opening salvo. South wins with the spade queen, then finesses the club 10. What next?

North invited game with his raise to two no-trump because they were using a 15-17 no-trump. Opposite 16-18 points, North should jump straight to game, counting one point for his fifth club.

Perhaps you thought this was one of those deals in which East should win deceptively with the club ace, not the

queen. However, if he does that, then returns a spade, South wins with the ace (he knows from West's spade-two lead that the suit is splitting 4-4), and finesses the club nine. East wins with the queen, and the defenders cash two spade tricks, but declarer takes the rest. South has lost only two spade and two club tricks.

Instead, East should consider how to stop declarer from getting three club tricks. And there is a way. After winning the first (or second) club trick with the queen, East switches to the heart king: the so-called Merrimac Coup. This dislodges dummy's entry. As long as East ducks one round of clubs, winning the third round with his ace, the dummy is dead. Alternatively, if declarer ducks the heart king, East switches back to spades immediately. Whichever, the defense comes out on top.

ASK DR. GOTT

Let comfort determine mattress choice

DEAR DR. GOTT: My daughter plans to purchase waterbeds for her two girls, 11 and 16. I believe that a firm mattress is best for growing children; my daughter disagrees. Who is right?

DEAR READER: The argument about which is best, a soft mattress or a firm one, has yet to be resolved. Some people sleep more comfortably on a waterbed, while others prefer a harder surface. For a growing child, either is acceptable, depending on personal preferences.

Let me raise a practical point that may be the crux of the issue. If the girls find that they don't like waterbeds, will your daughter be willing to switch back? Waterbeds can constitute a significant financial investment and, once purchased, will probably be permanent. Therefore, unless your granddaughters have had waterbed experience, they could be stuck with your daughter's decision. Hence, I'd like to ensure that their preferences — and not the adult's — are considered.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have no sex life to speak of. Without sexual activity, what happens to the hormones produced by the body? Are they absorbed

or excreted?

DEAR READER: Sex hormones, like other complex chemicals in the body, undergo metabolism and degradation. What is needed by certain organs is used; the rest is broken down by the liver and excreted. DEAR DR. GOTT: A biopsy taken by my gynecologist showed that I suffer from a skin disease called lichen sclerosis et atrophicus. What is this?

DEAR READER: This relatively rare dermatological disorder is marked by flat white pimples with hard centers, flanked by inflamed borders. The cause is unknown.
