To a question whether the Administration is considering any move to halt the longshoremen's strike in Hawaii, he replied no such move can be made under existing law.

Asked about a bill Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) planned to introduce today to give him temporary power to intervene in the Hawaiian shipping crisis, Mr. Truman said he did not know whether he wanted such power.

The President, commenting on the suggestion of Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) that he lead a new crusade for peace, said he has been doing just that ever since he took office in April, 1945, and will continue to do so.

matter now before the United Nations and, until an atomic bomb control plan is agreed to, disarmament talk must be delayed.

Does this mean that the world is not heading toward peace? No, Mr. Truman replied. He said it is moving slowly and gradually toward this goal and he expressed confidence we will gradually get it.

He brushed aside fears expressed by Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.) that the Senate-approved bill to tighten the present arm services unification act may lead to a defense director. He described such views as perfectly absurd.

As long as the Constitution makes the President commander-in-chief, he said, he does not think anyone else can take over the armed forces' leadership.

The President said he will express his opinions freely in the Missouri senatorial election next year since this is his home state.

But he added he may not take a stand for any candidate in the Democratic primary.

He said he will not take a hand in the special senatorial election in New York in November to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.). This is the business of the great state of New York, not his, Mr. Truman said.

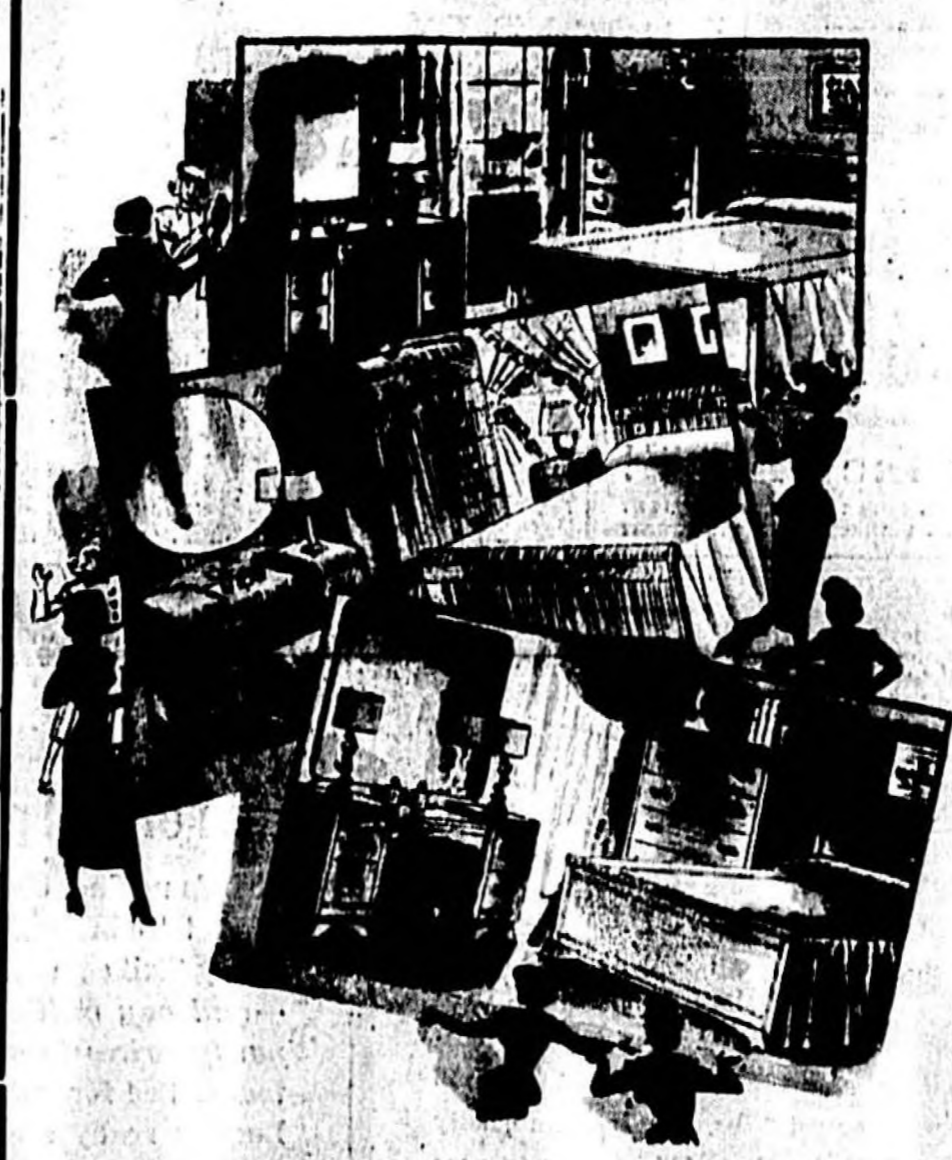

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### Farm Markets Hit All-Time High In Sales For 1948

JACKSONVILLE, July 7 (Special)—"With some year-end reports still not in, figures reveal that Florida State Farmers' Markets surpassed all previous years in the volume of business handled during the past twelve months," announced William L. Wilson, Director of the State System, which has 25 markets located throughout the State.

"Record breaking sales totaling \$35,996,679.95 is all the more remarkable because individual prices generally in commodities have been lower during 1947, the previous record breaking year, which totaled \$33,896,218.60. It should be borne in mind though that unfortunate weather conditions in competitive states might have had some bearing on the demand. However, Florida has naturally some advantages over these areas in the method of handling produce. One major advantage is our system of markets at which it is possible for buyers to obtain one item or a carload for cash-on-the-bargain-head-to-the-farmer. Nathan Mayo, Florida's Commissioner of Agriculture who dreamed up this system is to be congratulated as indeed are the 25 Managers in charge of the individual operations.

"Market Managers and officials attending the 13th Annual Conference of the State Markets System here in Jacksonville can well be proud of this fine accomplishment," said Mr. Wilson.

An outline of the program for this meeting to be held at the George Washington Hotel, on July 7, 8, 9, is concerned largely with the problems confronting the managers and the sessions are to be informal discussions of these problems, such as "Trading and Marketing Poultry" led by Lamon Williams, Manager of the Bonifay Market, F. H. Risher, Director of the Poultry and Egg Division of State Department of Agriculture has indicated he will be present for this discussion, R. E. Johnson, Manager of the Plant City Market, National Association of Producers will discuss the meeting of the statewide organization of market managers. A major discussion will be conducted on "Field Cattle Sales" by M. V. Mackison, Manager of the Palmetto Market; S. C. Phillips, Manager of the Florida City Market; M. E. Williams, Manager of the Fort Pierce Market; and J. L. Warren, Manager of the Pompano Market. Frank Conner, Manager of the Wauchula Market will discuss the value of inter-market communication and exchange of commodity and price information. Sandy Anderson, Manager of the Sanford Market will talk on the value of Advertising, while R. B. Alvarez, Manager of the Starke Market will lead the discussion on Transportation problems.

It is anticipated that two members of the State Marketing Board, Commissioner Nathan Mayo and Neill Rhodes, Commissioner of the State Marketing Bureau, will be present at most of the sessions.

The Annual Dinner will be held at 7:30 P. M. on July 8, at which Nathan Mayo, Commissioner of Agriculture, will be the honor guest. Congressman Dwight Rogers of the 5th District of Florida plans to be present as does Attorney General Richard E. J. Edlin, State Treasurer, Wilbur King, Chairman of the Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission, D. J. V. Knapp, Executive Director, State Live Stock Sanitary Board, Harold Cole, Executive Vice President, Florida State Chamber of Commerce, and G. E. Copeland, Director, Citrus and Vegetable Inspection Division.

On July 9 the session is to be devoted entirely to the livestock markets in which both state-owned and independent markets will participate.

(Continued From Page 1, Sec. Two) Economic Advisers is known to have told Mr. Truman weeks ago that it favors a "lesser goal" for tax increases. Some advisers fear that a determined drive for higher taxes would frighten business into further retrenchment.

On the other hand, to drop the request for higher taxes entirely would amount to putting a presidential okay on red-link financing, in view of the Treasury's report one week ago of a \$1,800,000,000 deficit in the fiscal year which ended June 30.

Few officials would predict that Mr. Truman will abandon his proposal for tax-boosting; he might soften it, they said. And he already has stated—in the January report—that some excise taxes "should be repealed."

They expected a renewed call for a raise in the minimum wage from 40 cents an hour to 75 cents. It is considered likely too that Mr. Truman will take note of the passage of the housing legislation as an aid to the building industry.

Pending legislation sponsored by Senator Murray (D-Mont) provides for "economic expansion" including loans by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to expand industry, develop resources, etc.

One legislator who has urged on Mr. Truman a vigorous fed-

eral program to forestall recession said he got the impression the President will "slap hard" at the idea the country is facing a bad business slump.

There seemed little likelihood he would drop these requests entirely; in his January message, he declared the government needs "both anti-inflationary weapons and anti-deflationary weapons so that it will be ready for either contingency."

(Continued From Page 1, Sec. 2) Soon after he landed from a cruiser Auril was handed an "open" letter signed by Ferhat Abbas, hot-eyed secretary-general of the Nationalist UDMA Party. It urged him not to forget "the hungry multitude while you are seated at table with the wicked rich."

"The least that we can say," this letter continued, "is that of all the men who will address you in the name of the Muslim population not one of them has been elected by universal suffrage. They represent only themselves and the prefects who have chosen them."

Stern-faced Governor-General Maurice Edmond Nagegelen retorted with angry contempt: "Ferhat Abbas may claim he represents seven million Moslems, but really he represents no one but himself."

The governor-general was particularly indignant at the Nationalist leader's charge that he faked the elections for Algeria's parliamentary assembly by packing it with selected Arabs.

(Official election returns gave the party of Assembly President Sayah Abdelader a 96 per cent majority of the votes cast.)

Algeria's assembly -- a concession towards limited self-government made by the French a year ago -- consists of two "colleges." One is composed of Europeans, the other of Arab members, in an equal proportion. It may discuss local measures and draw up its own budget, but all legislative questions have to be submitted to the governor-general or to Paris for approval.

Algeria itself has a peculiar situation in the French union, as the former French empire is now called. All its citizens—whether Europeans, Arabs or Jew -- have French nationality. Unlike Tunisia and Morocco which are protectorates, general control of policy is directed by Interior Minister Jean Koch in Paris.

Algeria also sends three Senators and ten deputies to sit in the national assembly in Paris.

While this may bring the country certain advantages through a closer association with the mother country, it is a constant irritant to the nationalist sections of the population.

Artificial lungs are needed by five to 15 per cent of polio patients when their breathing muscles are temporarily paralyzed. In last year's epidemics, 20 per cent of patients in South Dakota needed such help. Ten per cent did in Los Angeles, but in other areas only three percent required the breathing aids.

The new lung costs about \$1,200, compared with \$2,000 for the big iron lung.

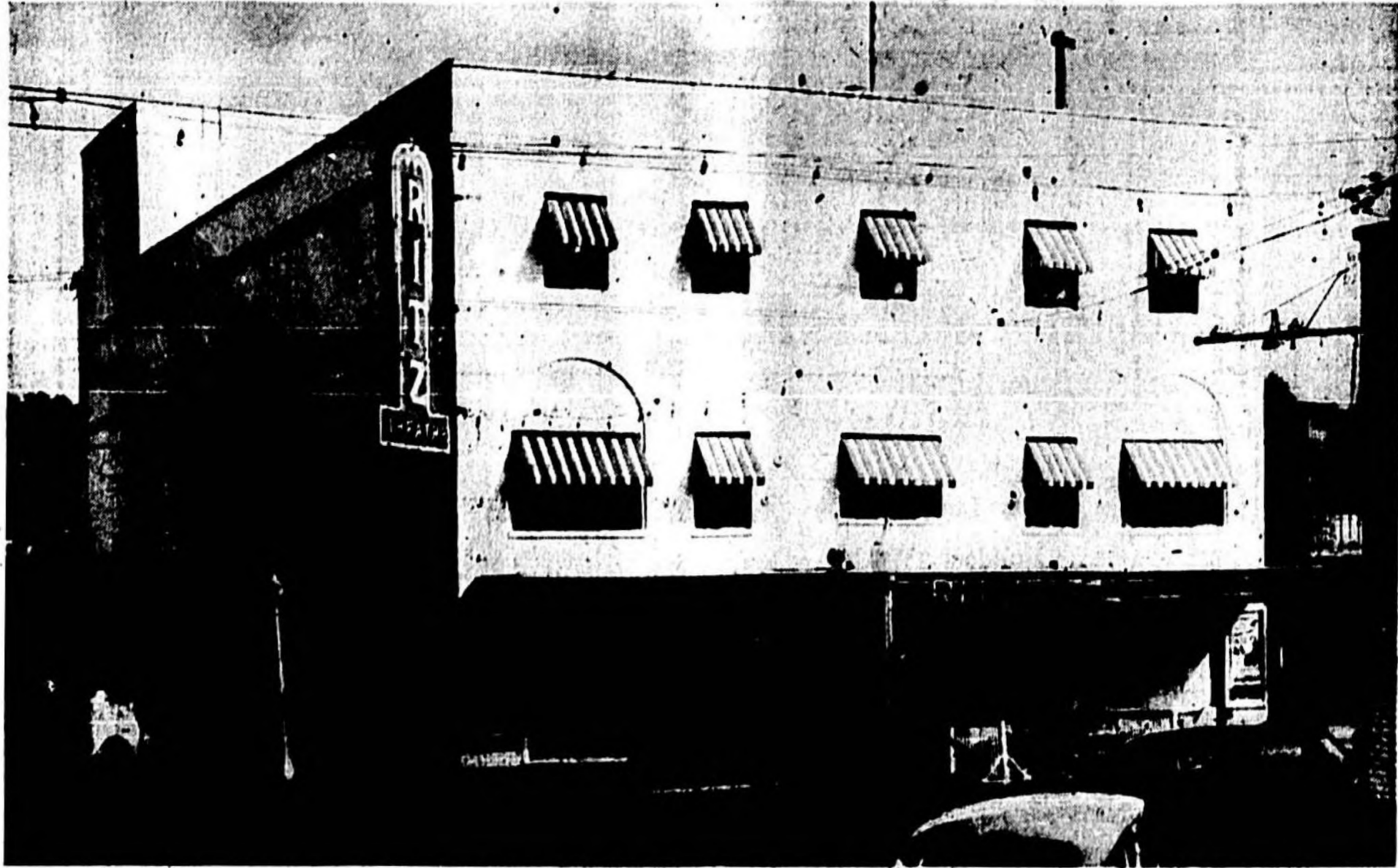
