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Talk turns to action on Lake Mary boating

LAKE MARY - The Lake Mary City Commission has previously discussed a draft ordinance dealing with boating regulations on the city's many lakes. It was never officially adopted.

Now, City Manager John Litton wants to know if the commissioners wish to pursue it or not.

"We really haven't had marry complaints, only a few," Lit-ton said. "And Police Chief Beary wants to know if he should consider any enforcement."

A request for the informa-tion is scheduled in the City Manager's Report during to-night's city commission meeting.

The ordinance proposal has been prompted by a few citisen complaints, Litton said mostly from people living along lakefronts. We haven't had any serious injuries reported though," he added.

City employees have moni-tored activities, especially on

Big Lake Mary. In some cases, where problems have been observed, owners and/or operators of the boats involved have been contacted directly. but guidelines are still mid to be needed.

The new ordinance draft follows the guidelines established by state statutes and the Coast Guard regulations. It applies to any water vehicle, regardiese of whether or not it in mechanically pow-ered. Most of the require-ments deal with public safety.

Under the ordinance, if approved by the city, children under the age of six will be required to wear a Coast Guard approved life saving vent or apparatus at all times, as must persons water skiing. The only exemptions would be for alders participating in sanctioned water-aki tournaments, or persons who ski barefooted

Consumption of alcoholic beverages is also prohibited. as is possession of an open container

Sanford considers 50-year lease

Hotel and conference center up for Monday discussion

SANFORD - The Sanford City Commission on Monday will consider a proposed 50-year lease agreement with the company that wants to de-velop a hotel and conference center on nine acres of Fort Mellon Park.

Under the lease, PRA development would pay the city \$750,000 per year in base rent, plus a percentage of ho-tel revenues. The 50-year lease would have two auto-

matic, 10-year renewals.

From the 13th month of operation through the 36th month, PRA development would pay the city 1 percent of hotel revenues minus base. of hotel revenues minus base rent. After that, PRA would pay 3 percent of hotel revenues for the remainder of the

"I think it's a good agree-ment." Sanford Mayor Larry, Dale said. The commission hasn't had a chance to review it yet."
The hotel's completion

deadline is Dec. 31, 2002, although the city can grant extensions due to delays.

There would be a 120-day period in the lease for the developer to prepare a feasibility study and financial analysis, and for the city to perform environmental audits and title work.

Millard Hunt, chairman of The Society for the Preserva-tion of Fort Mellon Park, said that without a feasibility atudy the City Commissioners lack a critical basis for making a decision about the

lease.
There is no way to evaluate the proposal that's been made without a feasibility study," Hunt said. There would be a 1-year

contingency period to obtain agreements for public finding, permitting for piers and to execute operational agreements.

PRA development is pro-posing to build a 300 room full service hotel, and 15,000 to 20,000 square feet of conference rooms. There would be commercial and retail space, a pier restaurant and concessions. There would also be a 35,000 to 50,000 square foot multi-purpose center for banqueta.

City officials are seeking Tourist Development funding from Seminole County to assist with the public portion of the conference center.

PRA development would pay the city \$3 million to-ward the public portion of the project.

Hotel proponents not giving up fight

SANFORD - The group formed to oppose a hotel and conference center proposed for Fort Mellon Park in continuing to fight against the project.

Millard Hunt, chairman of the Society for the Preserva-tion of Fort Mellon Park. said developing a hotel and conference center on the park is a gamble with tax-payer assets.

"The basic concepts, the size, the location, and the funding plans are flawed."

Hunt said the proposed 50-year lease, with two 10year extensions, will tie up public land for too long. Sanford officials are seek-

ing Tourist Development Council funding from the county for the conference center. The county has not decided how much funding to provide. Hunt said he wonders if

the county will provide funding necessary to support the conference center.

"As far as I can tell the Sanford project is dead," See Pight, Page 5A

French find open arms in U.S.

SANFORD - A group of 28 students and two teachers arrived several weeks ago from France to not only sample a bit of the American culture but see a few sights along the

way.
Several families in the community as well as members of the Sanford and Deltona Churches of Christ served as hosts to the young people. Over 15 families from Geneva, DeBary, Lake Mary, Sanford and Deltona opened their homes and their hearts with a little hospitality.

The high schoolers arrived in America by plane and were shuttled about by E.Y. Fry and Ronda Galloway to their many destinations. The English teachers, or

schoolmasters as the French youth would say, Monique Zibi and Nathalie Lesaure, also accompanied them to such locations as Disney World, Cape Kennedy, Universal Studios, Busch Oardens, the YMCA in Lake Mary, a local bowling alley in Longwood and numerous arcas for shopping.

Ronda Galloway, in cooperation with Monique Zibi from France, assisted with travel. itinerary, housing and other activities. Calloway shared that one of the most intereating things about the boys and giris was learning about the difference in the cultures of the French versus Ameri-

She mentioned that French students go to school some aix days a week without frequent breaks or liberties.

They were amazed at how much freedom American schools have. They told how they are not allowed to talk, they have no breaks and the rules are so much stricter. They were horrified when they heard about the shootings in Colorado. They said that something like that would never happen in France because kids couldn't even think of buying guns. They have a very high respect for their teachers (schoolmasters).

Oalloway added that the group was overwhelmed by the "kind acts that everyone showed to them. They were all excited about being here." in particular, she mentioned that she was most impressed

with the 'great community support received from the See French, Page 3A



Luckily, a cat belonging to Rayborn's brother-in-law had just given birth to kittens.


"I asked whether she'd be interested if I could find her son another kitten," Rayborn said. "And she said yes.






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A glimpse into Whitey's class

The man's given name is Herbert, but it's been a long. long time since anyone called him that.

Ever since he was a towheaded Wunderkind at Archbishop Malloy High School in New York City, he's been "Whitey" Eckstein.

Eckstein said he was given the nickname "Whitey" by basketball coach Lou Carnesecca who went from Archbishop Malloy to become one of America's best college coaches at St. John's University.

At 54, Eckstein is completing his 30th year as a teacher in Sanford. He has been a City Commissioner for 13 years. He and Patricia Eckstein have five grown children, each educated at the University of Florida also his alma mater.

A man who has taught as long as Eckstein learns a lot about himself and the hundreds of students he encounters. Eckstein says he is fascinated at how smart high school students have become. He is aware, also, . that they are very sensitive and want to be respected.

"We went to school," he said, "we had no choice. We gave our teachers respect. Today, the kids will not give you respect unless you give them respect. They don't want to be put down, laughed at or criticized.

"You can't con these kids, you can't make yourself out

to be more important or better than they are. They're not impressed easily. They've seen too many flaws in people - in the president, their own parents, their heroes. They've seen a lot of people who have lied and cheated. They do understand right from wrong. and I believe in their future."

Eckstein said he suspects most of today's young people have little fear of anything. When we made mistakes, we had to go to Confession immediately," he said. "I don't hear any Mea Culpa, Mea Culpa, Mea Culpas anymore. Again, these kids will change. Like I said. they're smarter and more mature than other generations."

Eckstein said that students gain knowledge not available years ago. This is important because, he said, they probably read much less. He said he tries to make history relevant to what's happening today. When he teaches about World War II, he has the students talk about what is

happening now in Yugoslavia. When Whitey Eckstein was educated by Marist Brothers at Archbishop Malloy he wore a suit and tie to class. Today. he frequently wears blue jeans when teaching History or geography at Seminole High School. He's earned space in the comfort zone.

In addition to his teaching and City Commission duties, Eckstein is an avid sports fan - especially baseball. Mickey Mantle was his childhood hero. The Yankees were his team.

When school closes in two weeks, Whitey and Patricia Eckstein are headed to Trenton, N.J. to see the Trenton Thunder play. Their son, David, is Trenton's second baseman. Whitey said Wednesday that David was hitting .289. One day, Whitey expects to see his son play for the Boston Red Sox.

A parking garage and mirface parking would provide at least 600 parking spaces.

pier. According to a letter from an attorney representing PRA development to the city. Sheraton hotels have agreed to be the project's flagship. The agreement has not been released. Dale said the agreement depends on the results of a feasibility study.

The first lease proposed by PRA development, rejected by the City Commission, would have given the developer first rights to build any hotel or similar project on city owned land, including the Orlando Sanford Airport, for 70 years.

The city would have re-ceived \$1 per year for the lease for 70 years, with two optional 20-year renewals. PRA would have paid the

city I percent of gross revenues from the 13th month of operation through the 21st month. The city would have received 2 percent of gross revenues from the 22nd month through the 36th month, and 3 percent for the rest of the lease.

The Way We Were: 100 years at Holy Cross Church

This is a continuation of a history of Holy Cross Episcopal Church taken from the 1973 booklet "Holy Cross Church, the First Hundred

In 1886, the rector of Holy Cross was Rev. S. B. Carpenter. Rev. L. Turgrand was Assistant, B. F. Whitner, Senior Warden: and John King. Sec-

retary.
Bishop Young had died in 1885 and the diocese met in special counsel in March 1886 at which time the Rev. Edwin Gardner Weed was nominated and confirmed as bishop. Under Bishop Weed's guidance, the Church in Florida made rapid progress. It had grown from seven churches in 1838 to 80 parishes and organized missions with 54 ministers in 1888.

An interesting note men-tioned in the booklet which was found in Tequests. Vol. 24, 1964, tells of the trip that President A. Arthur made to Florida. The President, Secretary of the Navy, William E. Chanceller, and the Presi-dent's private secretary and his chef left Washington on April 5, 1884 and arrived in Jacksonville on April 6. Because of an outbreak of smallpox there, they continued on to Sanford arriving on the 7th. The President expressed surprise at finding such a beautiful place as Sanford and accommodations so admirable.

After dining, the presidential party was driven to the Belair Orange Plantation of General Henry Sanford, where, much to the delight of the visitors, some of the fruit was still on the trees. Secretary Chandler shucked his coat and gaily climbed a tree to pick some oranges.

On Monday, April 9, President Arthur left for Kissimmee. Having spent Sunday in Sanford, it could be assumed that the group attended church services here, quite possibly at Holy Cross.

While in the Kissimmee

area, the President visited with remnants of the Seminole Indians. There he was quite successful as a fisher-



April 11, the President returned to Sanford, badly sunburned, but in good health. Though not eager to leave Sanford, he embarked April 13.

The General Convention of the Episcopal Church of 1892 divided the diocese into two separate ones; Holy Cross was transferred to the new diocese, the Missionary Ju-risdiction of South Florida. The Right Reverend William Crane Gray was its bishop and the organizational convention was held at Holy Cross Church, Sanford.

Holy Cross expanded and grew during the 1880's and by 1891 it was out of debt. However, great financial dis-aster struck Florida with the freezes of 1894-95. Many parishioners moved away and those remaining were left without means of livelihood. The church was unable to retain regular rectors so services were held by the lay readers and visiting clergymen. One of the latter was Rev. Samuel Day who acted as rector from 1900-1904. He also maintained missions at Lake Mary, Sylvan Lake, and Enterprise. He used a naptha launch to cross Lake Monroe to Enterprise. Holy Cross was finally able to en-gage a regular rector in 1913 when the Rev. Arthur Searing Peck came from Galesburg.

In 1914, Bishop Gray at-tended the dedication of the first Parish House. Senior and Junior Chapters of the Brotherhood of St. Andrews were formed and were well attended by both Episcopalito make the Parish House a

community center. Along with a library, billiard table and bowling alley, a moving picture machine was in-stalled. During the same period, Holy Cross fielded a baseball team.

At this peak period of growth and community activity, disaster came again. On Nov. 27, 1923, the church Parish House, Rectory, club rooms and all records were destroyed by fire.

The congregation soon betion of a new church to be built in the Spanish style. Father Peck exerted a major influence in the building of the new church, but he resigned effective January. 1925. Holy Cross was incorporated on March 27, 1923.

The first service was held in the third church of Holy Cross Parish on Easter Sunday, 1925. It is this building and Parish House that continue as the home of the parish. Services were held by Rev. James G. Glass, retired Dean of St. Luke's, until November, 1925 when Rev. Mortimer Glover became rec-

The parish house was completed in 1927 and the church school began to grow rapidly. A large residence was purchased next door on Park Avenue, but soon after Mr. Glover's arrival, this property, on the site of the present McKinley Hall, was sold and the rectory at 818 Palmetto Avenue was built.

Actually the site of this new rectory had been deeded by General Sanford to a Negro congregation with the usual clause of reversion to the Sanford estate if it should be used for other than a church.

What is believed to be the first Negro church in Sanford had been erected there in 1870. At their request, Mrs. Sanford had donated a bell which had been dedicated on April 17, 1871. In the 1920's it seemed advisable that the Negro congregation build a new church on Locust Avenue. Holy Cross defrayed the purchase price of the land for this new church which is still in use today. The Palmetto Avenue property was then deeded to Holy Cross for

their new rectory. (In the research done by Brenda Elliott a few years ago, we find that the first black church was New Salem Baptist Church which dates from 1867. According to this reference. General Sanford deeded two lots on Palmetto Avenue for a colored church and parsonage which were

nately, the church was destroyed by fire, for the second time. November 14, 1921, and the bell, donated by Mrs. Sanford, was taken to the city dump. It was reportedly discovered by Mrs. A edly discovered by Mr. A. V. French who returned it to the congregation. The bell is on display at Mt. Moriah Primi-tive Baptist Church at 1100 Locust Avenue. Their property on Palmetto Avenue was sold to Holy Cross in 1926 and the church relocated to 1500 W. 12th Street in Goldsboro.

It was reported in a newspaper article of unknown date that when the church burned, the congregation split into two groups. New Salem relocated to Goldsboro and Mt. Moriah to Georgetown).

That's okay, neither am I. Of course if you're a sunbird from New York, Los Angeles, Atlanta or Cieveland, maybe you should feel kind of a tingle. Chances are, you'll be rooting for your teams come October.

That's the problem. Owners, players, fans, television executives and everyone else constantly talk about the need to bring the game back to a level playing field and, once again, nothing is being done.
Whether the players like it or not, there has to be some sort of

revenue sharing plan.
First of all, there's too much money for everyone not to get

flithy, disgustingly wealthy.
Secondly, if they don't share
the wealth, the players will lose
everything they've worked for
since the first labor agreement

over 25 years ago.
If they don't share the wealth, major league baseball is going to eventually consist of about an eighth-team league made up of all-star teams.

That's kind of the way it is

Look at the pennant races. In the American League East. New York (wealthy) leads the way over two small-market teams. Boston and Baltimore fa wealthy team that doesn't know how to spend).

Cleveland (new stadium) should have the central clinched by Memorial Day over Chicago (tight owners), Detroit and two teams with absolutely no chance of winning (Kansas

City, Minnesota). In fact, the Royals former first baseman Jeff Conine was quoted in Sports Illustrated at the start of the year as saying the Royals knew they had no chance of winning the division and were just playing for fun. In the west, Texas (new sta-

dium) is leading Anaheim [Disney] while Oakland flounders in last.

Let's examine. The first place teams are money mogula New York, Cleveland and Texas. printing their own currency.

In last are Baltimore, Minnesota and Oakland. One of them is a joke and the other two can't afford to compete.

In the National League, Atlanta (new stadium) leads the east over New York. Florida, which chopped its budget by nearly 300 percent last year, has baseball's worst record. just in front of Montreal.

There really isn't much economic disparity in the central. although Houston and St. Louis which lead the way, are in better financial shape than bottomdwelling Pittsburgh, Cincinnati

and Milwaukee. Out west, San Francisco and Los Angeles lead the way while the budget-slashing Padres

struggle. First place: Atlanta, Houston,

San Francisco. Last place, Florida, Cincin-

nati, San Diego.

Is baseball so blind to not realize that it will lose fans from more than half of the teams in the majors if they don't do something to give them hope?

Baseball's solution is to recommend that cities build new stadiums and give them to the owners for no rent or economic

In other words, baseball is holding the small markets hostage. It's already told Montreal to build a new stadium or lose the Expos. Detroit, Milwaukee, Pittsburgh, Minnesota, Seattle, Cincinnati, Philadelphia and San Diego are all bottom-

Protecting yourself from sun and heat

SANFORD - Florida is nicknamed the Sunshine State for good reason. The daily dose of sun may be good for tourism, but overexposure to the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays is not good for

Anglers should take a few precautions to prevent sunburn and reduce their risk of skin cancer over the long haul. Remember to protect yourself from UV rays reflected off the water as well as from directly overhead—you can suffer sunburn even while standing in the shade of a boat awning or other cover. Also be aware that sunburn can occur even on cloudy days. Use a good sunblock lotion with an SPF (Sun

Protection Factor) of at least 15. If you're going to be fishing all day and there are no places to get out of the sun, or if you have very sensitive skin, use a sunblock with as high a rating as you can find. Some lotions are sweat or water-proof, an advantage in most angling situations.

To obtain the maximum benefit, apply the lotion to all exposed skin about twenty minutes before going outside. Don't forget ears, nose, face, back of the neck, and-if wearing sandals or going barefoot-tops of feet.

During the day, reapply as necessary especially if you've been swimming or are perspiring heavily. Overuse of sumblock is seldom a problem. Some people also use lip balm with sunscreen in it.

Consider wearing long pants and a longsleeved shirt to minimize exposed skin. A hat (preferably with a wide brim) and sunglasses are as essential as a rod and reel. Many anglers swear by polarized sunglasses, which allow you to see beneath the surface of the water.

Hot and humid weather also places people at risk of heat exhaustion or life-threatening heat stroke. Symptoms begin with thirst, weakness, dizziness, headache, and muscle cramps. If left untreated these symptoms can quickly lead to collapse, unconsciousness, and even death.

Drinking plenty of water is the key to preventing heat-related illness. Fruit juices and sports drinks help, but avoid alcohol and caffelnated soft drinks (these tend to increase urination, hastening dehydration). Limit exposure to the sun and avoid strenuous exercise, particularly during the heat of midday.

Heat stroke-when the body's cooling mechanisms no longer work—is a medical emergency. Symptoms include red, hot, dry skin (or, conversely, pale, cool, and damp skin); lethargy; confusion or anger: dizziness, fatigue; and col-

Move the victim to a cool, shady spot and remove or loosen tight clothing. Bathe the victim with cool water and wet cloths, especially around

the head, neck, armpits, and groin. Give sips of water if the person is conscious. Heat stroke cannot be fully treated in the field; seek immediate medical help.


FISHING FORECAST

Look for irregular features to hold bass. Tiny Rapalas fished with six-pound spinning tackle is the key for fast action and a lot of fun. Bream and speckled perch will also readily strike this small

Sebastian Inlet has good action with snook. redfish, flounder, trout and jack crevalle. Live shrimp or finger mullet are top batts, while swimming-minnow lures will also produce their fair share of fish.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral has little to report in the way of offshore action due to high seas. A predicted cold front this weekend will also keep the ocean stirred up. When seas subside, expect dolphin to show from 160 feet on out. Wahoo will also be scattered in these depths. King mackerel will be roaming Pelican Flats and 8 A reef. Inside the Fort, expect flounder and sheepshead. Trout and redfish are rated as fair on the flats of the Banana and Indian riv-

Pay attention to the marine forecast before taking on the rocks at Ponce Inlet. Drum, redfish, small bluefish, sheepshead, jack crevalle, and a few flounder will be ready and waiting. Live or dead shrimp is batt of choice, while finger mullet are also popular. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.



Declarer started with his club king. a club to dummy's ace, and a club ruff in hand. Trusting their plays, declarer deduced that West had begun with 2-2-6-3 shape. And he spotted a beautiful ruse: Seres called for the spade two, and when East played the seven, he covered with the eight!

After West won with the 10, he had to open up the diamonds, conceding a trick to declarer's king. Seres won three spades, three hearts, one dia-mond, two clubs and a heart ruff in

Of course, it is easy to say that East should have played his king on the first round of trumps, or that West should have won with the ace, not the 10. But honestly now, would you have found either of those plays? I'm sure I wouldn't have.





The most valid method of evaluating drugs — both prescription and over-the-counter — is to test them in rigorously controlled scientific experiments that are ordinarily reported in reputable medical journals. In most cases of stroke — when there is permanent damage — nerve and brain manent damage — nerve and brain tissues have died. There is no proven way to restore such tissues to an



acceptable level of function. While we all yearn for "magic" cures for mankind's ailments, such advances are more likely to originate in medical laboratories than in the pages of tabloid publications. Save your money.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My pregnant granddaughter craves dill pickles. Could too many of them harm her? Does a pregnant woman's diet affect the unborn child?

DEAR READER: In many respects, a baby's health directly reflects the pregnant mother's diet. For example, a deficiency of folic acid may cause nerve defects in the unborn, too little iron can stunt fetal development, some pesticides and petrochemicals often lead to stillbirths. The list is a long one. long one.

Your granddaughter's craving for dill pickles is probably harmless. Nonetheless, the high salt content of the pickles could certainly aggravate hypertension, leading to eclampsia, a medical condition that can be fatal to mother and child. In my opinion, your granddaughter should report her craving to her obstetrician, who will monitor the situation and give guidance when needed.

As a rule of thumb, pregnant women must follow a nutritious and healthful diet that contains adequate amounts of protein, vitamins and min-erals. To do less is to jeopardize the mother's (as well as the baby's)
