The State Legislature is about to open the flood gates for local candidates for county offices in the 1972 general election, and primarily for the sheriff's job. Current and proposed laws will increase salaries commensurate with the 1970 census. Right after the general election six years ago, local officeholders prevailed on state legislators for a pay increase, from around \$9,500 to \$11,500. Then again two years ago, after the election, from \$11,500 to \$15,500, or thereabouts, and not for all

The legislators are currently considering two bills to increase the sheriffs' salaries in all 67 counties, depending on

One bill would increase the Seminole County sheriff's salary from the current \$15,500 to \$17,050, retroactive to Jan. 1. The second measure would increase the sheriff's pay to equal the highest paid county elected official. In this case, it is the county school superintendent, who now receives \$19,000, and will be increased to \$22,000 if the 1970 census reveals Seminole County's census over the 75,000-mark. (Other officials receive higher recompense but are not elected county officials. Circuit judges, for example, are con-

sidered state officers.) Movement is under way, too, for a substantial increase in pay for the county supervisor of registration, according to our Tallahassee sources. Watch out for the "Stampede of Candidates" in 1972
