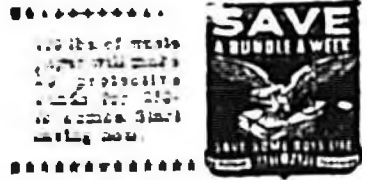

## Germans Surrender Unconditionally In Italy, Austria; German Armies Are Split And Trapped By Three Allies

### Nazi Field Marshal Is Taken In Bath; Patton And Clark Are Near Junction

**(By Associated Press)**  
The American Third Army driving for a junction with the Russians and a Czechoslovakian encirclement, advanced 25 miles into Austria. British and Russian forces in similar blows, compressed the width of the northern German Nazi pocket to 63 miles.  
Field Marshal Karl von Rundstedt, commander of the German forces on the western front until March, was captured in a hospital while taking a bath. Allied headquarters announced 1,500,000 Germans were captured in April. Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz, inexperienced in ground operations, has been named Hitler's successor.  
The three-army Allied drive into the Alpine redoubt reached within 100 miles of Gen. Mark Clark's troops in Italy. Doenitz, Hitler's Austrian birthplace, was captured by Patton's Third Army.  
The Paris radio said Red army troops have hoisted their flag over the Reichstag, where the German army died. British troops north of the (Continued on Page Two)

### Adolf Hitler Is Reported Killed In Berlin Fight

#### Adm. Doenitz Takes Over Leadership In Strange Ceremony

LONDON, May 2, (AP) — The Hamburg Nazi radio said last night that Adolf Hitler had died in the afternoon in Berlin and had been succeeded by Admiral Karl Doenitz, his personal choice as successor to command of the German nation.  
The report from the headquarters in Berlin said that the late Adolf Hitler, fighting to the last, had been shot in the back of the head in his headquarters in the "Fuehrerbunker" in Berlin. The German broadcast announcement, received by the Associated Press, was made in London at 10:27 P. M. (2:27 P. M. Eastern War-time).

**German Armies Are Split And Trapped By Three Allies**

Members of parliament and others expressed skepticism, fearing that perhaps the dramatic death broadcast was but an elaborate hoax.  
At the British foreign office the report of Hitler's death was accepted as true but official sources refused to comment on the possible accuracy of the Hamburg account of how he died.  
It was positive in any event that as soon as the European war was ended the Allies would demand that Hitler's body be produced to remove all doubt.  
A spokesman for Scotland Yard declined to confirm or deny reports that British police or the secret service had dental records, measurements and fingerprints of Hitler already on file so that identification would be possible even long after death.  
The Russians in the past have said repeatedly that they believed Hitler long ago had fled from Berlin and possibly left a "double" to "die in action" there to maintain Hitler's name as a Nazi martyr. The Germans have insisted many times daily, however, that he was in Berlin personally directing its faltering defense.  
The Germans furnished the report of Hitler's death tonight with all the trappings of drama of their command.  
At 9:45 P. M. (3:43 P. M. E. W. T.) the Hamburg radio instructed all Germans to keep tuned in on an important announcement. One minute later the renegade Englishman who throughout the war has broadcast Nazi propaganda as "Lord Haw Haw" reiterated the standby order.  
Then, 43 minutes afterward, there was a ruff of drama on the air and the unidentified announcer gave the report of Hitler's death and introduced Doenitz.  
Three days after the execution of Hitler's fallen Axis partner, Benito Mussolini, as the hands of Italian patriots in northern Italy.  
The announcement came just as American tanks rolled into the Inn river village of Braunau, Austria, where Adolf Hitler was born on April 20, 1889.  
Brief Pler  
Doenitz, the tough, 72-year-old ex-officer, who made his reputation as chief of submarine and then was elevated to command of the dwindling German navy, made a brief, unaccompanied plea to the German people to continue the struggle, concluding, "If we do all that is in our power, God will not forsake us after so much suffering and sacrifice."  
Then the radio played the German national anthem, Deutschland Ueber Alles and the Nazi party anthem, the Horst Wessel Lied. There followed three minutes of silence, then a special order of the day was read from Doenitz to the German military service.  
Re-reading the rest of his speech to the whole people, he had added line:  
"For every single one of you the oath of loyalty to the Fuehrer is transferred straight to my person as the Fuehrer's appointed successor."

Sugar rations have been cut another 25 percent. The first thing we know we'll be buying it by the grain.

"Hitler," writes Martin Anderson, "is that he lived so long." Greater tragedy than that was that he was ever born.

Molotov is having a rugged time at the Frisco conference. He fights for the recognition of the Russian-sponsored Polish government and can't get it. He fights against the Fascist-minded Argentine government and it is recognized. But we hope he doesn't take his hat and go home.

When Count Bernadotte, returned to Sweden after a conference with Heinrich Himmler in Germany and was asked by reporters, "Did you bring peace back with you?" he replied, "Good morning." How much better way that is of handling the press when things are confidential than to tell them some lie.

Sanford landlords have apparently killed the goose that was laying the golden eggs. Raising rents higher than any other city in the United States, according to the OPA, they have been ordered to reduce them to the level of July 1, 1943. That's going to be a big saving to tenants, a big loss to some landlords.

In the first election held in France since the liberation, a surprising victory won by the many cities throughout the country by the communists. Of the total vote more than 25 percent were for the communists, the rest divided between the socialists, the social democrats, the conservatives, the royalists and perhaps a dozen other parties.

Germany announces that Hitler is dead and nobody believes it. One of the great disadvantages of telling lies is that the time soon comes when nobody will believe you even when you are telling the truth. Hitler may not be dead. If Hitler were going underground to escape the consequences for his many crimes, he would certainly want everyone to believe he was dead. And yet in recent weeks and months he may well be contemplated to have produced apoplexy, a fatal wound from a Russian weapon, or a suicide. But whether dead or not, his day is done as Germany's leader.

We day in this country will be celebrated, according to present indications, by sober rejoicing but not with the riotous orgy of enthusiasm which marked the end of the last World War. There will be no drunkenness this time, no mass street demonstrations with their wanton destruction of property. That is not the kind of celebration called for by persons who have lost a son in the service, by women whose husbands are still fighting the Japs in the Pacific, by those who have friends and loved ones in Europe soon to be transferred to other fighting fronts. A quiet service in the church with prayers for the future safety of American boys is more in keeping with the spirit of the times.

We have a great deal these days about the utility of trying to prevent wars as long as mankind, cruelty, hatred and vengeance exist in this world. And most Americans, we believe, want to prevent wars. Such a vain hope is not in our scheme of things at all. And then we read where Benito Mussolini was dragged from his hideout by a howling mob, shot to death and his body kicked in a public square where necessary kicked his bleeding body and spat on him. And we see a picture of German atrocities and we wonder if it is any worse for the Germans to burn the Poles than for us to burn the Germans, and whether there is any chance of getting rid of cruelty, hatred and vengeance in this world.

Frisco Background

In order to understand what is taking place these days at San Francisco, it is well to refresh our memories on what has been done with respect to American foreign policy during this war. Following a period of national isolation for nearly two decades in which we refused to join the League of Nations or to assume any leadership in international affairs, we suddenly reversed the trend shortly before Pearl Harbor and repealed the Neutrality Act and passed the Lend-Lease Act.

Fourth followed a series of important conferences and national commitments. Four months before the raid on Pearl Harbor President Roosevelt met with Prime Minister Churchill in mid-Atlantic and issued a declaration of principles which has become known as the Atlantic Charter. This consisted of eight statements on general policies which have been summarized into what is called the Four Freedoms: freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom from want, and freedom from fear.

In November of 1943 the foreign secretaries of Great Britain, the United States and Russia met in Moscow and reached a number of important agreements with respect to the war. They agreed in principle that the collaboration among them begun during the war should continue after the war in the interest of permanent peace, that a free and independent Austria should be re-established, that German government officials and German army officers, guilty of atrocities or crimes against other nations, should be returned to the nations in which the crimes were committed, and there tried and punished, and that the war should be continued against Germany by all three Allied powers until unconditional surrender could be achieved.

In December of the same year, the Cairo Conference took place among Roosevelt, Churchill and Chiang Kai-Shek declaring in favor of unconditional surrender of Japan and pledging each other against any territorial aggrandizement and demanding the liberation of all conquered territory from Japan and the freedom of Korea. The Tehran Conference met a few days later with Chiang Kai-Shek absent and Marshal Stalin present. There, the substance of the Moscow Conference was reiterated, especially with respect to the prosecution of the war against Germany and collaboration after the war in the promotion of peace.

On Oct. 7, 1944, delegates of the United States, Great Britain, Russia and China met in Washington and drew up the Dumbarton Oaks Proposals, providing for a world organization devoted to the maintenance of peace and security, which are the basis of the conference now being held at San Francisco. A charter was actually drawn and agreed upon by the Big Four calling for the establishment of a Security Council of 11 members and a General Assembly of representatives from all of the United Nations, as well as for the creation of a General Staff Committee composed of the military leaders of the five major powers.

Later these proposals were amended at the Crimea Conference held at Yalta in February of this year at which Roosevelt, Churchill, Stalin agreed that all members of the Security Council should have one vote each and that seven votes, including those of the Big Five, would be required on any action involving the use of force. It was also agreed that Russia should have three votes in the General Assembly and Britain six with all other nations having only one.

The question of Poland was also considered at this time and it was agreed that the eastern frontier of Poland should follow the Curzon Line, established by a British commission shortly after the last war but never recognized by Poland, and that compensation to Poland for this loss of territory should be made up by concessions from Germany on the western frontier. It was also agreed at the Crimean Conference that Poland should be represented at the forthcoming San Francisco conference but that the representatives should be chosen not by the Russian-sponsored Lublin government, or the Polish Government in Exile at London, but by a new Government of National Unity to include members of all factions. This government has not yet been formed and furnishes the basis for the present controversy at San Francisco.

In addition, there have been many lesser conferences and agreements looking to the ultimate stabilization of the world, such as the Bretton Woods Proposals which recommend the creation of an International Bank of Reconstruction and Development financed by the major powers and devoted to the reconstruction of war-devastated areas and the re-establishment of a sound economy in liberated nations, as well as the creation of a huge international monetary fund for the purpose of stabilizing the currencies of the world.

In a democracy it is important that the people themselves study and understand these problems since they in the long run are the ones who will have to pass on them.

Home - Seekers

Columnist Dorothy Thompson writes from London that 90 per cent of the people are demanding detached or semi-detached houses. They don't want "tenements" but up-and-down stairs, with "their own door keys and a hedged-in plot of garden, however small."

In short, the English people want privacy. And Americans mostly want the same thing. It may not seem so, in these war times, when there has been such a vast movement of people from small towns to cities, drawn by war plants and the livelihood connected with them. But it is really a rare person who doesn't like at least a little plot of ground to putter around in, with a bit of lawn and a few flowers and vegetables.

We are likely to see a considerable expansion of such gentle and neighborly activities after the war, with millions of people looking for a little imitation of the bucolic life, and probably transportation to and from the country better than it has ever been before.

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TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

It is fitting as we watch with eager hopefulness the conference now in progress in San Francisco that we, as individual citizens, give sober and serious thought to the purpose that occasioned its assembly.

The fruitlessness and bitter agony of WAR is recognized by all sane thinking individuals. The desire for peace is strong in the hearts of mankind, yet because we have long smothered our sanity and reason with blankets of selfishness, greed and hate and built our world house on such insecure foundation we find ourselves engaged in the most brutal and destructive conflict in man's pitiful history.

We will again fail to establish lasting world peace unless the people of the world unite their prayers and their sincere unselfish efforts to that end. A step in this direction and one that gives genuine promise of eventual success, is the move to establish a "Federation of the World."

On April 26, the Florida Legislature became the 13th State to pass a resolution memorializing Congress on World Federation. The plan, advanced originally by Robert Lee Hunter of Greenville, N.C., is simple and workable. It recognizes the world as one great unified body of mankind, with the various nations making up its states or subdivisions. Our difficulties have all arisen because the world as such has never had a real government of law that could operate on democratic principles.

While every individual on the face of the earth is a citizen of this world, no effort has been made to develop in the individual a true sense of a responsibility of such citizenship with its attendant obligations. We have set up municipal, state and national governments and established laws for each that protect and safeguard the individual through government of laws. When a citizen of such government units commits a crime or violates a law against the city, state or nation, he is arrested, tried and if found guilty, punished.

If a citizen of Miami, for example, were to murder a citizen of Tampa, these two communities would not declare WAR on each other and attempt to establish justice through the death and destruction of both cities and their inhabitants. We seek out and punish the guilty. We follow the course, Florida as an individual or a group of individuals band together anywhere and engage in unlawful practices.

If we want world peace, we must establish a World Federation, made up of all nations regardless of race, creed or nationality and set up a code of International Law, not for Nations, but for all individuals, then we will be able to punish the law-breakers and protect the innocent and law-abiding. We now recognize a citizen of Seattle, Washington, Bangor, Maine, or Miami, Florida as an American. We respect his rights and privileges as such whatever he may be, so long as he remains law-abiding. — We don't care what his race, color or creed may be, but accept him as equal.

## Germans Surrender Unconditionally In Italy, Austria

(Continued From Page One) German forces as well as the combined forces, nearly 1,000,000 men were estimated to have surrendered.

All of these already had overrun virtually all of the northern portion of Italy, including such great cities as Milan, Turin and Genoa.


The news also appeared near the front lines in northern Germany. British and Russian troops were swiftly contracting that pocket with massive blows from the west and east.

Battered enemy elements in the north were forced to plunge through a shell swept corridor near Lubek as British Second Army units, supported by American airborne troops, drove swiftly in a breakthrough north of the Elbe River and came within nine miles of cutting off Denmark and Schleswig-Holstein.

The Moscow radio reported that riots had broken out among German sailors at the Baltic port of Rostock, now 25 miles away from the Second White Russian Army spearheads.

In heavy strafing attacks RAF warplanes destroyed or damaged 1,207 German vehicles yesterday and today on jammed roads between Lötzing, Berlin and Lubek. Pilots reported seeing huge

## Nazis Fleeing Germany In Confusion Toward Norway; Hostilities Cease In Holland; British Enter Denmark

### Barges, Transports Sunk By Bombers In Action Worse Than Dunkerque

(By Associated Press)

Swedish reports today said the British have invaded Denmark, surging past the "open cities" of Kiel and Flensburg. To the south, the American Seventh Army joined the Fifth Army at Vipiteno, ten miles inside Italy in the snowy Brenner Pass.

Salzburg surrendered unconditionally and 500,000 Germans surrendered within 48 hours in the north. The Nazis are holding out north of fallen Hamburg in chaotic flight by land and sea toward Norway.

Planes, tanks and artillery turned the German flight into a debacle of burning ships and wrecked land transports. An unconfirmed Swedish dispatch, quoted in the southern Juland reports, said only slight resistance was met, chiefly at the border city of Aabenraa.

On the southern anchor of the front a late British broadcast (heard by NBC) tells of the surrender of Innsbruck in Austria. The American Seventh Army has joined with the Fifth Army at Vipiteno, ten miles inside Italy in the snowy Brenner Pass.

The General Eisenhower sent his personal congratulations to the Allied commander in chief of the Mediterranean theater on the surrender of the German army in Italy. The General—in his informal note—told Field Marshal Alexander that the Marshal and his great command should consider themselves the toast of the United Nations.

General Ike then added this comment: "Your brilliant successes should give even the stupidest German final proof that he is defeated."

### Chinese Launch New Attack To Rout Japanese

#### Suzuki Cabinet Gets Severe Criticism For New Reverses

(By Associated Press)

A general Chinese counter-offensive to rout the four-pronged threat to the American Changkiang air base threw the Japanese armies into reverse on every front today. One city was recaptured and 3,000 Nipponese were killed in the initial thrust by the Chinese including American-equipped armor troops.

Japanese reverses are so widespread that the Suzuki cabinet was subjected to newspaper criticism similar to that preceding the downfall of previous Tokyo governments.

The Yanks captured Davao City in the southern Philippines, along with two airfields. Minor gains were reported against the Naha line on Okinawa. Two light U. S. warships were sunk and others damaged by suicide aircraft, bombers and boats. Super-fortresses struck southern Japan again.

Chinese gains were reported against the heavily fortified Naha line, the Okinawa outer perimeter which has cost American forces 16,000 casualties, including 2,500 dead. This compares with approximately 21,000 Japanese killed in Okinawa and U. S. casualties of 12,000 on two Jima, including 4,180 dead.

American losses were boosted by a new announcement of naval casualties for six weeks, 5,551, including 1,111 killed, 3,001 missing, 2,440 wounded. This does not include casualties on two light naval transports and others damaged in a combined attack last night by suicide planes and boats and high flying bombers.

Paratrooper led British and Indian forces sloping through heavy rain were reported successfully wiping out the Japanese hangar in the capital and the city of Burma which they entered yesterday. The Nipponese have been fleeing the city for weeks and supporting American jets reported a rooftop sign which said "Japs gone."

Whatever Japanese remained in the vicinity of Rangoon were reportedly trapped by yesterday's landing on the Bay of Bengal at the mouth of the river.

### Berlin Chancellery Is Ablaze After Futile Search For De Fuhrer's Body

PARIS, May 4. (AP)—General Dwight Eisenhower announced today that all enemy forces in Holland, northwestern Germany, and Denmark, including Heligoland and the Frisian Islands, have surrendered effective at 9:00 A. M. (2:00 A. M. EDT) tomorrow.

LONDON, May 4. (AP)—Allied air forces struck continually at German shipping fleeing toward Norway and Denmark and toward a coast sinking at least 55 vessels and damaging scores of others in assaults yesterday and last night.

Pilots on dawn patrols around the North Sea and Baltic coast reported the Germans still were trying frantically to escape the onslaught in anything that would float.

The evacuation attempt was today being a completely unorganized mass of refugees which included a number of strafed U. S. Navy North air force B-24's which called in to assist the British in the evacuation of refugees from the coast.

An unconfirmed Swedish report said that General Admiral Karl Doering was negotiating with Field Marshal Montgomery at Flensburg near the Danish border for a surrender. The German radio broadcast the report.

### German Doctor Admits Killing 21,000 Himself

110,000 Murdered By Nazi Physicians As 'Unworthy To Live'

UNITED STATES 12TH ARMY GROUP HEADQUARTERS, May 3. (AP)—Dr. Gustav Wilhelm Schuebe said recently the Nazi annihilation institute at Kiel killed from 110,000 to 140,000 persons "unworthy to live" during the nine months he worked there.

Schuebe, a crippled drug addict captured by 1st Army troops recently admitted he had murdered about 21,000 persons. He told his story voluntarily and showed no feeling of guilt, but occasionally became evasive when he appeared to sense that his actions might be viewed as crimes.

The annihilation institute was established after the Germans captured Kiel in 1941. Schuebe was there about five months before he became head of it. He remained at the institute until the end of the war.

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### Sgt. William Colbert Visiting His Parents

Sgt. William Colbert Jr., who was wounded in action in Germany on Feb. 9 while serving with the First Army, arrived Thursday afternoon for a 90 day visit at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Colbert, 218 East Eighteenth Street.

Sgt. Colbert, who came here on leave from an Army hospital at Memphis, Tenn., was accompanied by Mrs. Colbert. He arrived at New York on April 13, after having been hospitalized in Paris, Belgium, and England, and was then transferred to Memphis after being hospitalized a short time in New York.

Overseas he participated in battle on the Belgian Front, and in the push of the First Army toward Cologne. He has been in the service since July 1942 and received training with the Infantry at Ft. McPherson, Ga. and Camp Pickett, Va. He graduated from Seminole High School in 1933 and from the University of Georgia in 1942.

Sgt. Colbert has been awarded the decoration of the Purple Heart, the steel combat ribbon, the Bronze Star and the Purple Heart with oak leaf clusters.

### Big Four Nearing Accord On Change In Oaks Proposals

Stettinius Reports He Is Satisfied With Progress Of Meeting

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4. (AP)—The Big Four are reported near agreement on major changes in the Dumbarton Oaks plan for a world organization designed to keep the peace. This accord is regarded by officials of 46 United Nations as a long step toward preventing deadlocks even after Foreign Commissar Molotov returns to Moscow.

Secretary of State Stettinius is reported pleased with the progress of his talks with the Russian, British and Chinese representatives about amending the Dumbarton Oaks proposals.

This is what the Americans want:

1. An international organization functioning "in keeping with the principles of justice."
2. Clarification of the Dumbarton Oaks blueprint, worked out last fall by the four sponsoring nations as a guide for the world organization shall function within international law and assist in perfecting it.
3. The development and safeguarding of human rights.
4. Provision for a successful change in world conditions.
5. A definite system of trusteeship.
