Autonomy For North China 'Ex' From Vet Is Agreed To Organizations

National Government Avoids Clash With Japan By Agreeing To New State Move

Japan To Advise New Government

Japanese To Control Operation Of New State In Far East

Chinese officials at Peiping said today they had agreed to autonomy of North China because of fear of the Japanese army. Five provinces flanking up the area will receive financial and economic independence from the republic, although still acknowledging nominal sovereignty of the national government.

Chinese sources said that Major General Koshiro of the Japanese army had presented ultimatum to China demanding action on the autonomy plan by noon tomorrow. From Tokyo came word that the new state will operate under Japanese control, with Japanese commissars, both civil and military, "directing" the new government.

The new state will be governed by the "autonomous council of the Republic of China," Hsiao Chang-Ying, governor of Chahar, said today.

General Sung Cheu-Yuan, commander of the Peiping Tientsin military area, may be chairman of the council. He formerly was governor of Chahar but was ousted under Japanese pressure when he became commander of the garrison here he made friends with the Japanese and since then has been one of the most important pro-Japanese leaders in the north.

The new regime will be completely independent in civil, military and financial affairs. Chinese officials now in office probably will be retained for the time being.

A majority of Chinese appeared to favor the movement and many of them vociferously were in favor of it because of their opposition to banking financial policy and the tax situation.

Mayor T. L. Dumas today authorized Secretary Ralph F. Bagwell of the Chamber of Commerce to make the announcement, the latter adding the information that nearly all the city officials have made reservations for the banquet.

Advance reservations for the function must be made, Mr. Bagwell said, and he urges those who intend going to the banquet to let 500 persons can be accommodated.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Word reached the capital today that friends of Senator William F. Borah will enter his name in a number of next year's presidential primaries, unless they get a positive word from the Idaho Republican.

Coming from reliable political sources, the word served to emphasize the possibility of a particular duel between Borah and Hoover. The word Hoover either will enter the Republican nomination in the course of the party shall take. Whether or not Borah and Hoover become sworn combatants for the nomination, this and other developments have indicated that they are rapidly moving into leadership of two opposing factions within the party.

Gut Answers Queries About Age Long Past

Following his address on the glacial age delivered in the First Congregational Church Sunday night, James Gut told an interested audience he would be glad to answer questions. The address was about 20 minutes long but the questions kept the archeologist on the platform for an hour. It was reported by the Rev. J. B. Root, pastor of the church.

Asked how he could be sure bones found in the St. Johns and Wekiva Rivers and Lake Monroe in Seminole County were those of a certain animal, Mr. Gut answered by asking, "How do you know whether you are cutting celery or cabbage?" Another querulous person wanted to know how it was that bones of wolves requiring a cold climate and of mastodons that inhabited tropical climates were both found in this section. This was easily answered by Mr. Gut who explained that the coming of the glacial ages ago caused marked changes in the climate, and that some of the bones found might have been in the ground from 60,000 to 200,000 years.

Mr. Gut told the audience that in ages past there lived in Central Florida such animals as the mammoth, mastodon, sabre-toothed tiger, three-toed horse, lions as big as the African lions of today and ground sloths.

Cotton Production Control Act Will Get In Test Court

High Tribunal Gives Georgia Governor Right To File Suit

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Over the protest of the government, the Supreme Court yesterday agreed to let Governor Eugene Talmadge of Georgia file a suit attacking constitutionality of the Bankhead cotton production control act.

This was the first request received by the high tribunal from a state seeking to start original action in the Supreme Court against New Deal legislation. Usually cases are started in lower courts and brought here on appeal.

The high court already had agreed to review a case brought by Lee M. Davis, planter, which attacked the Bankhead act. But some attorneys contended it could be decided without passing on the validity of the act itself.

Most sought to compel the Government to pay back the \$100,000,000 in cotton which had been withheld to show he had complied with the act. His petition was dismissed by lower courts. Arguments will be heard here in December with government attorneys participating.

Speakers Take 'Ex' From Vet Organizations

Armistice Day celebration in their town.

In his address to the veterans State Commander Hopper of the V. F. W., himself a Legionnaire, and former district manager of the Legion, expressed confidence that more would be accomplished by the veterans' groups in forgetting differences "as we are all working for the same purpose, for justice to the veterans, especially the disabled, and to instill in the hearts of the people principles of peace and security."

Veterans of 1898 were "ticked from pillar to post," he said, because they had no voting strength, and then the "damnable economic act" took from them what they had until the larger veterans organizations got together and demanded that they be given justice.

"Those who decide to have a war are always beyond the means of making a profit out of war," he said, but the V. F. W. stands with the Legion in the contention that both capital and industry should be drafted in the event of another war.

"There is a comradeship here in this group tonight that you won't find up town tomorrow," he said. "There is something about service under the flag that makes

for friendship, that instills that feeling of love, or our fellow man that the Nazarene taught, a feeling we found in the sacrifices we made in the service.

Holding in his hands the old Springfield a General left on his locomotive 37 years ago, Mr. Shelley told some of his experiences in transporting soldiers to the Port of Tampa during the war of '98 and said he wanted the Legion to have the old rifle because "you in the American Legion have done your part."

"I hope you will maintain and perpetuate this organization to which you have the honor to belong," said Mr. Shelley. "You earned that honor, honestly, and every one who served in the war should feel it an honor to belong to this organization. Then referring to communism he declared that "it is up to you to watch this thing, to fight against the element that is trying to overthrow our government, and you can do it, because you have been tried and not found wanting."

The speaking came after the 100 veterans had started away 20 gallons of stew, 15 gallons of coffee, and quantities of fry bread, pickles and beer. After the meeting Hayward Walker, past commander of the local post, showed a picture of a hundred feet of millionaires, and their old engine in the Armistice Day parade.

No Extension To Be Made Of Emergency Aid

Direct Relief Will Cease On Nov. 30
Says C. W. Williams, Off. of State Office

Relief Extension Asked By Mayors

Appropriations For 1936-37 Are To Be Asked Of Congress
