Farm Help Available

The plan of the War Department in demobilizing the troops will be received gladly by the farmers of Florida, is the belief of J. O. Traxler, farm help specialist, located at the University of Florida. He says it will be the means of distributing farm help over the state quickly, and where most needed; and helps the soldiers to secure positions before being discharged. The plan adopted requires a letter from the employer, asking for the release of the soldier; or in case the soldier has a farm of his own or is needed on his father's farm, a letter from a relative or friend, asking for his release, making a statement as to the needs of his services and his ability to perform them. Such a letter is addressed to the Camp Commandant and the release is secured, provided the soldier cares to accept the employment offered. In case the address of a soldier is not known, a letter addressed to the Adjutant General, War Dept., Washington, D. C., enclosing the letter of request will be forwarded to the Camp Commandant in which the soldier is located.

In order that the agricultural interests may secure the most desirable men for the farm, it is imperative that those engaged in agriculture make application to the War Department at once.

Army Casualties.

While it was understood that the casualty lists given out by the government up to and including the time of the signing of the armistice were incomplete, perhaps the country was hardly prepared to see the total number of reported casualties increase, within about two weeks after the signing of the armistice, from less than 80,000 to more than 260,000. This would seem to indicate that the fighting during the last few days of the actual period of hostilities was extremely sanguinary. In this connection it is reported that during the latter part of the conflict more than half of Germany's western army was concentrated in front of the American forces in the desperate but ineffectual effort to stem the advancing tide of the Allies.

The total casualties reported by General Pershing up to November 26th, not including prisoners, was 262,693. That part of the report giving the number of prisoners was unintelligible and is therefore not available.

Y Recruiting to Close January 1.

In the hope that this month's intensive recruiting campaign will make available approximately the necessary quota of Y. M. C. A. secretaries and executives needed overseas, all the recruiting offices in the

Southeastern Department have been ordered to close on January 1st, 1919. The Florida secretary, Mr. A. W. Honeycutt is making every effort to produce Florida's quota by the first of the year. He states that the Department's decision to close the offices makes it imperative that a large number of men from Florida enlist during the remaining days of December.

According to the plans of the Department, most of the time that remains will be spent in the army and navy camps recruiting officers and enlisted men who have qualifications, and are anxious to see overseas service. While the greater percentage of recruits is expected from this source, it is hoped that the colleges and universities of the state will release quite a number of educational administrators for the overseas educational program. High school principals are also needed. There is furthermore a demand for outstanding specialists in religious work. Good chauffeurs and mechanics, entertainers and high-grade athletic directors of Christian character and leadership are still called for.

There is no longer need to recruit men for any of the following forms of service: Warehouse superintendents and workers, store room clerks, bookkeepers and construction superintendents, carpenters, electricians and plumbers. There is a need, however, for a limited number of high grade accountants, stenographers,

Outlook for Cabbage

A warning note comes from the U. S. Department of Agriculture to the effect that southern growers should consider the existence in the north of large surpluses of cabbage and onion crops, says the State Marketing Bureau.

The cabbage crop in nine northern states in which late summer cabbage is most extensively grown is reported to be the largest since 1915. In New York and Wisconsin, two states which store cabbage on a large scale, the crop is estimated to exceed that of 1917 by 22 per cent, and estimated increase of approximately 29,000 tons. If the quantity of stored cabbage is directly proportionate to the magnitude of the crop, the observers say it is likely to be more abundant during the spring of 1919 than it was during 1918. A great deal of kraut has been made, but most of the cabbage has been carefully stored to be marketed in accordance with demands.

Prices for cabbage last week ranged from \$16 a ton in New York, \$20 a ton in Wisconsin, to \$25 in New Orleans.

Reports from fourteen states where onions are extensively grown, show a surplus of more than a million bushels or about 10 per cent

more than in the fall of 1917. This increase with the regular carry over for market in the spring of 1919, may meet demands. Prices last week for onions ranged from \$1.30 per 100 pounds in New York and Boston, with top price in New Orleans at \$2 a hundred.

It will be worth while for Florida growers of these two staples to give consideration to existing conditions, and take in connection with it the possibility of crowded railway facilities.

Soldiers Coming Home

On the morning of December 2nd, 1918, the first large contingent of American soldiers, which came over from Europe on the Mauretania (a sister ship of the Lusitania), arrived in New York harbor. This group consisted of about 4,000 officers and men. Immediately upon the discovery of the vessel, an enthusiastic and noisy welcome commenced, and when New York city was reached the boys were greeted by thousands of people

eager to show how glad every one is to have our boys back home. This first contingent of our overseas army is being rapidly followed by others and it is reported that a total of from 150,000 to 175,000 will return from foreign stations during the month of December.

In addition to the many thousands of men to be brought home from Europe and discharged during the present month it is estimated that about 700,000 men in the army will also be released during the Christmas season. The transportation problem involved in this task will be tremendous, and it may be impossible to carry out the program completely; however, in view of the extensive experience in the matter of army transportation gained during the war period, we may reasonably expect that demobilization will proceed with record-breaking speed.

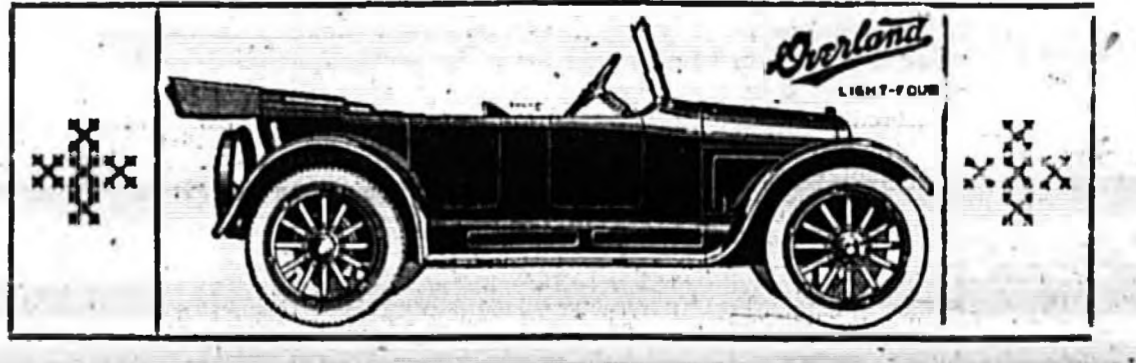
