

Paris Leads Way For Designation As New Style Center

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VIENNA, APR. 16—(AP)—As long as it is being told that Vienna, for decades, has been the source of many styles which were billed as "the latest from Paris."

Today, with Paris challenged freely as a style center, the Vienna scene are making plans to cash in. Those who doubt Vienna's claims are invited to check back through the styles of bygone years and compare them with "backnumber" French magazines published in Vienna.

At any rate, Vienna intends to market its style creations as "Made in Vienna," and as part of a campaign for world recognition, some 30 fashion houses have organized in this capital city of former Austria a co-operative headquarters and clearing-house known as "Haus der Mode in Wien" or "Vienna House of Fashion."

Here, in the Lobkowitz Palace, one of Vienna's most beautiful baroque structures, all questions of style creation and marketing are worked out. Twice yearly a "Modewoche" (Fashion Week) is held, in addition to frequent fashion shows in the palace and in the ateliers of member firms.

This year, as always, tailors' made (coat suits) are the most important garments. They are represented in a new style with considerably longer jackets held to coat length and sometimes buttoned full length. Jackets are accompanied by short and slim skirts, and waists of printed or hand-painted fabrics.

A combined frock which looks like a suit consists of a navy blue wretelle dress suited to an under-bonnet, of white-dotted blue surah, and to a short double-breasted jacket. The frock has a double row of buttons.

Everyday clothes of modest design get the most attention in every collection. The "amplis black dress" is made fresh with white trim and dressmaker detail, such as gathered pockets, tucks, draped necklines, and kimono sleeves which were introduced here last fall.

Navy blue poplin dresses and soft silk prints are offered for elegant wear, with skirts no longer bell-shaped, but still gracefully flared around the bottom.

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Many Fires Are Set In Assault

Attack Is Described As "Reprisal" For British Air Blows

Adolf Hitler's Luftwaffe smashed at London in the most violent assault of the war last night in an eight-hour rain of havoc and death in which 400 Nazi planes dropped more than 100,000 incendiary and countless high explosive bombs.

Berlin described the raid as "reprisal for the English destruction of the cultural and historic center of Berlin on Apr. 9," adding that it was "the biggest air raid of all times."

Crowded morgues, jammed hospitals and white blocks of smoldering fire-blackened wreckage testified to the fury of the attack.

Nazi pilots asserted they counted 80 major and countless smaller fires.

The throbs of low-flying planes mingled with the crash of guns so noisily that Londoners gave up all thought of sleep last night.

The raiders appeared to race over in a wide arc to drop their bombs and scurry away, followed by their planes in a thunderous stream.

The concentrated raid was described by some as the heaviest of this year, by others as the most severe of the whole war-time.

It was the first big assault on London since the British made their heaviest raid on Berlin Apr. 9, after which the German press published threats that the Nazis would retaliate "a hundred-fold."

Some observers compared this new destruction with that of last Dec. 29 when incendiaries rained fire and incredible damage on the ancient "City of London," the financial district.

For the first time in months hotel lobbies were crowded with guests in nightdress, unable to sleep in the din of battle.

The night was clear and starlit, and the British took advantage of it to send strong raiding squadrons against Boulogne and Cap Gris-Nez on the French coast, aiming at big gun emplacements from which the Dover area was shelled again Wednesday.

Apparently London was bearing the full fury of the German raiders, for the British Press Association said there were no reports of bombings elsewhere in England.

(Both the National Broadcasting Company and the Columbia Broadcasting System reported their London offices had been wrecked by bombs but that their staffs escaped. It was the thirteenth time CBS has been bombed out and the second for NBC.)

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A Vicious Circle
The government is tired of the steel industry and its efforts to get the steel industry and ultimately in all other major U. S. industries. It doesn't fix prices, with wages increasing being demanded on every hand, yet it is a rising spiral of prices that will be disastrous. If it does fix prices, it will be an even prettier kettle of fish.

Recently the C.I.O. made wage demands on the steel industry amounting to ten cents an hour for each of its 400,000 workers. Ten cents an hour isn't much, but for 400,000 men it is \$40,000 an hour, or \$1,600,000 for a 40-hour week. In the course of a year that can amount to \$38,000,000. An increase in expenditures of that amount of money cannot be made without getting the money from somewhere.

The government anticipated that the steel industry would meet the situation by raising its prices. That would be the orthodox way to do it. If it costs you more to do business, you have to charge more for your services. But the government, already running in the red to the tune of billions, and faced with defense expenditures exceeding any in history, has issued an order that the steel industry can't raise its prices.

We don't know just how the balance sheets of the various corporations doing business in steel look. It may be that some of them can show this week's increase out of profits, as may be the case with others, though it is not likely that the losses out of reserves. But in any event it should be fairly clear to anyone that the profits in the steel industry are being squeezed out. If not eliminated altogether, they will be seriously impaired.

Now if this were all, it would be okay. Nobody cares anything about a corporation, least of all the government, and nobody cares for a stockholder. The only trouble is that not only are profits being squeezed out, but the government is not letting the steel industry do what it wants to do. The Billboard Nuisance
A bill being sponsored in the Florida Legislature by the Garden Clubs of the state to regulate highway billboards deserves the support of all civic organizations. Pointing out that Florida is almost literally being concealed behind billboards, the Times-Tribune reveals that since 1933 the number of signs on the highway between Jacksonville and Miami has increased from 12 to the mile to 23. From Orlando to Jacksonville there are 50 more large billboards than in 1934; from Jacksonville to Baldwin 37 more; from Deland to Daytona 17 more. From Fort Myers to Tampa on the Panhandle Trail the average has increased from 18 to 25 signs per mile.

Jackville is one of the worst offenders in the state in the matter of billboards along the highways of approach. It has 70 on one two-mile approach from the south on U. S. Highway No. 1. Most cities of any size, however, have heavily billboarded approaches, the booklet mentions particularly in addition to Jacksonville, Orlando, Mount Dora, St. Augustine, North Miami Beach, Ft. Myers and W. Palm Beach, Lake Worth, Miami Beach, Boca Raton, Coral Gables, Sanford and others.

Their billboards take a prominent place in the pictures reproduced in the booklet which is being distributed throughout the country as a part of the nation-wide effort to conserve and reclaim roadside scenery. Roadside scenery, highway associations, and even chambers of commerce, paradoxical though it is, are using immense sums and billboards in Florida, the survey shows. And this in face of the fact that it is a matter of common knowledge that attractive highways are a potent factor in increasing travel.

Steady Repair Program Needed To Protect Home

WASHINGTON, Apr. 17 (Special)—America's huge investment in home ownership estimated at \$50,000,000,000, must be safeguarded by an unintermitted maintenance and repair program, Federal Housing Administrator Abner H. Ferguson declared recently.

Nearly 20,000,000 families have a stake in this investment.

"It seems plain to me," the administrator said, "that a large portion of the nation-wide interest in defending our free way of life should be centered on protecting this enormous investment in home ownership.

"I can think of no better way to safeguard and protect this

some investment than to modernize. Repairs too long neglected jeopardize the value of properties, whereas repairs and improvements made in time safeguard not only family comfort and happiness but dollars and cents values as well.

"The average financial status of each home-owning family in this country is probably between \$3,000 and \$4,000, the largest investment ever made by the average family."

Mr. Ferguson estimated that more than one-third of the homes in the United States are between 25 and 50 years old.


These old homes, many of them in urgent need of repair, could play an important part in the defense housing program, Mr. Ferguson said. Large old properties in defense areas might profitably be modernized and converted into apartments, suites, and rooms to take care of defense industrial workers, especially where housing accommodations are still unsatisfactory.

In many cases, the revenue through rentals would offset the cost of modernization, Mr. Ferguson pointed out. The FHA property improvement and modernization plan provides for convenient monthly payments over a period of several years to amortize the cost of repairs or alterations.



"It really builds up my faith in the American people," Ralph bubbled over a spaghetti-and-meat-sauce lunch.

"We have people making love to seals, chasing greased pigs, putting on crazy clothes, and they love it."

The idea stems from old-fashioned parlor games—the kind Ralph and his two older brothers and their parents used to play on the Colorado farm.

So great is interest in "Truth Or Consequences" that Ralph has gotten up a "party book" of crazy consequences.

"To me," Ralph said, "this just goes to show that Americans at heart are still the democratic folks of pioneer days, when parlor games and square dances were depressions of the community spirit."

Ralph might still be on the farm if his mother hadn't been ambitious for him to go to a "big school." The family moved to Oakland, Calif. While attending University of California, Ralph worked for a small radio station.

After graduation he hitched his way to New York to try to crash into big-time radio. He ate on 29 cents a day while doing bit parts on radio shows, then won out over 68 others in an audition for a chain announcing job. In six weeks he was announcing Major Bowes' program.

After two years he quit, and didn't want to be an announcer all my life," he explained, "so I hatched the "Truth Or Consequences" idea. It was really simple. Most quizzes were brain-twisters or humdrum. I figured that if I kept the brain-twisters and put hilarity into a parlor game everybody would want to hear it. Looks like they did."

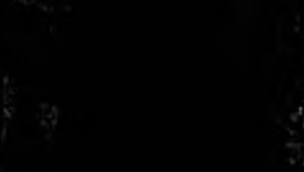

Ivvie A. McPhail, Lumber Employee, Dies In Accident

Loses Balance, Falls Beneath Wheels Of Moving Log Train

Ivvie A. McPhail, of 1403 West Third Street, Sanford, an employee of the Wilson Cypress Lumber Company near DeLand, was killed instantly at 7:48 o'clock yesterday morning in Lake county when he lost his balance on the flat car of a moving log train, falling forward directly into the path of its wheels.

The accident happened about 15 miles from DeLand, where McPhail lived part of the time in a lumber camp. He was about 30 years old.

His four wheels of the car cut their way completely through his body, mangling it beyond recognition from the neck down, before the engineer could bring the train to a stop.

Several other Wilson Cypress Company employees watched the accident, turning it entirely unavoidable, so no inquest is expected to be called, it was reported by the Allen-Summerhill undertaking firm in DeLand, which has charge of the remains.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. J. L. Hallam and Mrs. O. R. Jenkins of Sanford, and Mrs. W. N. Scott, Jr., of Winter Garden, and a son, J. W. McPhail of Orange City. Funeral arrangements will be made later by the Allen-Summerhill Company in DeLand. Burial will be in Perry.

Lord Josiah Stamp Is Killed By Bomb

LONDON, Apr. 16.—(AP)—Direct hits by German bombs on a country home have killed Lord Josiah Stamp, 60, by the valuable business brain of the British empire, his wife and their 10-year-old son.

In full, six members of the household died when the Stamp home at Shortlands, on the southern outskirts of London, burst apart under the impact of high explosive bombs at the height of London's greatest raid and collapsed on a shelter.

Death of Lord Stamp was a blow to the economic leadership of the empire. Since the start of the war he had been a principal adviser to the government on the economic problems of the struggle and had headed an inter-departmental committee on co-ordination.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16.—(AP)—General Marshall said Thursday the Army would give officer training to approximately 10,000 selective service soldiers annually.

Allies Have Lost War, Col. Lindbergh States

CHICAGO, Apr. 16.—(AP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh asserted last night "it will be a tragedy to the world—a tragedy even to Germany—if the British Empire collapses, and said his war was lost by the Allies, even before it was declared.

He called for unity among people opposed to United States intervention and urged an address prepared for a rally in the Chicago arena sponsored by the American First Committee, declared "it is not yet too late for us to save our own country from the greed and failure of this war."

She was born in Panama county, Miss., and recalls the day the war spread to her own home.

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British Army Clings To Mount Olympus; Situation Is Described As Serious

17,000 Men Are Taken By Nazis

LONDON, Apr. 18.—(AP)—The British government warned today it would commence "systematic bombing of Rome" if either Athens or Cairo, Egypt, is attacked. The government charged the Italians were prepared to drop "captured British bombs upon Vatican City" should Rome be raised by the British. "The greatest care" should be taken not to bomb the Vatican, the government's statement said.

By Associated Press—Greek troops staggered back today under the juggernaut smash of the Axis invasion armies, and while the British clung grimly to Mount Olympus on the east flank of the Allied line, it appeared that the 13-day-old Balkan battle was approaching its final stage.

"The situation is developing unfavorably," Athens acknowledged. London, warning, said some additional troops were pronounced needed.

Berlin followed up the capitulation of that Balkan outpost by announcing that 17,000 prisoners had been taken on the Greek front, and that the battle was going successfully for Nazi armies despite the "most difficult terrain and weather conditions."

After 12 days of fighting, Yugoslavia's 1,300,000-man army surrendered unconditionally. By contrast, Holland lasted only five days against the Nazi blitzkrieg, Poland 18, Belgium 19, and France 46.

In the western air war, British gave a swift answer to the violent Wednesday night raid on London by striking hard at Berlin.
