

POWs Tell Of Brutal Torture By Reds

The hours of lonely darkness in Hanoi; hours with only memory for company; hours that stretched into days, into weeks, into a timeless

The beatings whose only end was unconsciousness. Or capitulation. Or death. The hope and the faith. And the determination to somehow stay whole while in the enemy's telling, freed at last from the restraints that kept the details of their ordeal from the nation they

The POWs spoke at news conferences and interviews about what it was really like as captives of the North Vietnamese or the Viet Cong. Until now, they had kept silent lest they jeopardize men still held prisoner. The last of the 587 POWs originally scheduled to be released arrived at Clark Air Base in the Philippines on degradation and determination poured out at

One man told of letting maggots eat away dead flesh to clean out his festering wounds; another told of a torture called "the strap" that paralyzed the nerves; a third said he was kept "like an animal in a cage."

The former captives made these points: The prisoners were beaten, drugged, Communists who sought information or antiwar statements. Many of the men finally broke, but they tried to provide as little information as possible beyond the regulation name, rank and

serial number. Conditions improved somewhat late in 1969; food rations were increased and the prisoners

were allowed to speak to one another.

State Asks Capitol Phone Rate Rollback

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin asked the Florida Supreme Court today to rollback a rate increase on Capitol telephones on grounds the Public Service Commission acted arbitrarily in boosting Centrex rates. Southeastern Telephone Co. of Tallahassee did not ask for an increase in rates for Centrex— the system installed in the Capitol complex of buildings last year to eliminate switchboards-and the commission received no testimony on its cost, Shevin said.

The General Service Department estimated the increase would cost the stat \$12,100 a month-\$2.75 each on 4,400 Centrex phones.

Gov. Reubin Askew and the Cabinet overrode Shevin's objections last week and, by a 6-1 vote, directed him to petition the Supreme Court for a rollback. Shevin said "it is practically impossible" to win a Supreme Court reversal of a PSC order but promised to prosecute the appeal vigorously

The PSC voted 2-1 on Feb. 28 that all of the \$2.4 million rate increase allowed Southeastern should be place on business telephones, with no increase in residential rates. Shevin's petition to the Supreme Court said the PSC had taken no testimony at hearings last year on cost of the service and that Company Vice President







Sadat Tricky, Too

Lebanese Motives Questionable

By HARRY DUNPHY

Associated Press Writer BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - President Anwar Sadat's government shakeup seems aimed more at muting criticism in Egypt than increasing preparations for war with Israel. Sadat named himself prime minister Monday night, supplanting Aziz Sidky, to "escalate the confrontation" with Israel, he said.

On Tuesday, he increased the cabinet from 32 members to 37, doubled the number of generals to six, and brought in 19 new men. Abdel Kader Hatem, former minister of culture and guidance, was named second in command as first deputy prime minister for culture and information. To many observers, the situation remains unchanged

Egypt preparing for war to strengthen its bargaining position but continuing diplomatic efforts to find a peaceful settlement. Sadat again had harsh words for U.S. failure to pressure Israel into breaking the Middle East deadlock. He also in-

dicated relations with the Soviet Union, Egypt's main supplier of arms, were improved. But it was clear from his speech that concern about the domestic front was a major factor in his decision to take the premier's portfolio

Nothing Sadat has tried on the diplomatic front has worked, including the expulsion last July of 20,000 Soviet advisers, and criticism of him and his regime has been building

There were Moslem-Christian troubles last fall. At the beginning of the year thousands of university students demonstrated to protest the continuing deadlock with Israel and lack of campus freedom. Hundreds of intellectuals and journalists were purged

from the ruling party and their jobs after Sadat accused them of trying to undermine his authority. The people also are grumbling about high prices, breakdowns in public services, cumbersome bureaucracy and

So out went Sidky, the Harvard-educated architect of Egypt's postwar industrial revolution, and other technocrats in the 14-month-old cabinet. The right-wing Beirut newspaper L'Orient-Le Jour called them scapegoats but added, "From now on the boss is short of alibis and he knows Sadat acknowledged that some criticism of his regime may

have been justified, saying, "I do not hide the fact that there still is some slackness in our work." But he added, "We found out that some departments are engaged in side battles which are far from the general struggle." The implication was that he would put an end to this "or otherwise these matters could constitute a danger to

our strength." Among the cabinet changes, Sadat put generals in charge of supply and internal trade, seeking firm control of supplies so that they are spread about equitably despite the current austerity program.

Much, Much Good From Satellites

Every day, the nation's earth resources satellite, called ERTS, makes 188 orbits of the globe-44 of them crossing parts of the United States. Its photographic mapping of the world may produce a quantum leap forward in our understanding of resources at a time when the use of some seems to be approaching critical limits.

There have been a few fairty detailed news stories about some of the findings of ERTS, but they have hardly scratched the surface. Out at the Goddard Space Flight Center in nearby Maryland, more than 35,000 color prints have already piled up as results pour in from the tireless ERTS. The accumulation will soon be mountainous. It is no exaggeration to say that, with the swift aid of

computer analysis of ERTS pictures, we are in process of learning more about every patch of the earth's surface than has ever been known before. Every acre of presently used farmland, whether cultivated or in pasture, can be studied. The photographs. taken from a height of 570 miles, detect the kind and

condition of crops and the types of pasture grasses. They show, of course, where crops are failing because of disease or unfavorable seather. They may show more scrupulously what agricultural experts have long said, that in this overcrowded world there are still countless square miles of usable but

presently unused farmland. It is no exaggeration, either, to say that computer analyzed ERTS findings can provide us in minutes or hours with useful information it would take earthbound farm specialists weeks to acquire.

What ERTS is doing is so revolutionary that I intend in a few later reports, to set down some of its findings which have thus far barely been hinted at in published accounts We'll be learning far more about the mineral, chemical and other resources of earth and sea-the places where we may find useful new things, the places where the incredibly sharp detail of satellite pictures may reveal abuses of the globe's riches more convincingly than earth bound inquiry discloses.

I know a midwestern industrial executive, for instance who says candidly that in and around Chicago (and probably many other centers) some manufacturers, supposedly bound by strict antipollution regulation, wait until nightfall to perform certain work which pollutes the air These violations are hard to police. But the penetrating eye of ERTS can show us nearly every plume of smoke or

Ground engineers and planners are getting decisive and often corrective guidance from ERTS. Already pub lished is the fact many lakes and streams in som nations are at some distance from present map showings The controversial trans-Brazilian highway, slashin through tropical jungles, is at least 20 miles off its plotte course at some points. ERTS is the second "working satellite" in steady use

the other being the one which daily plots the weather and gives us television pictures of meteorological changes. Not yet well known is the prospect we may soon have a third-an educational satellite capable of transmitting "lessons" to any part of the inhabited earth, verbally by radio signal and then pictorially, through constant use of countless sending channels.

Arthur Clarke, Ceylon-based British essayist and science-fiction writer (author of the celebrated piece which became the movie "2001: A Space Odyssey"), told a group of scientists and newsmen here that such a satellite may give the world the greatest educational break. through in its history.

Now what's all this about the uselessness of space exploration and its irrelevance to pressing human needs?
