

UCF: Two schools better than one

SANFORD — The rapidly growing University of Central Florida may find a reprieve from its growing pains by developing and utilizing joint use campuses with neighboring colleges.

University President John Hitt made the suggestion last week to the board of trustees.

By 2010, Hitt estimates the primary UCF campus will be near its capacity of 48,000 enrolled students. Joint campuses with Seminole and Valencia community colleges could be the short-term answer.

"We are going to see this campus continue to grow," Hitt said. "Joint use campuses are opportunities to delay that 48,000."

Although the reality of a Seminole

Community College and UCF shared campus is several years away, UCF is beginning to play a greater role at the college's Sanford/Lake Mary campus. Beginning next fall, some students who continued their higher education after completing two years at SCC will no longer have to move to UCF to receive a bachelor's degree.

Local students will have the chance to earn a bachelor's degree from UCF in ele-

mentary education, criminal justice, psychology, liberal studies or legal studies from the SCC campus. That's a big change from when UCF only offered three classes at SCC in 1988, said SCC President E. Ann McGee.

"It's really an active partnership," McGee said. "We have a great working relationship with UCF."

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Five meetings planned to discuss area's water crisis

SANFORD — Seminole County leaders and water supply utilities will continue discussions May 23 on how to meet future Central Florida water supply needs.

Five sub-regional meetings will be held to bring together large water users whose future groundwater withdrawals have the potential to dangerously impact the Florida aquifer.

The sub-regional meetings are part of a new initiative first developed by Orange County Chairman Richard Crotty to help the east Central Florida area address water concerns. Crotty hosted two region-wide water supply meetings in January and February.

Two of the sub-regional meetings will be held Thursday at the Sanford City Hall. The public is invited to attend. The north Orange/Seminole area will meet from 9 a.m. to noon and the north/east area, including Volusia and Flagler counties and portions of Seminole and Brevard counties will meet from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m.

"This makes it more convenient for them to break into smaller working groups," said Jeff Cole, a spokesman for St. Johns River Water Management District.

Elected officials are invited to attend the meetings. The groups of water users and leaders will specifically address critical water issues. A presentation of what was discussed in the previous two meetings hosted by Crotty will also be a part of the regional meetings.

"What the focus of these round of meetings is trying to look at it (water crisis) regionally," said Chris Pederson, Central Florida coordinator for Florida Conflict Resolution Consortium.

To facilitate these discussions, the St. Johns River, South Florida and Southwest Florida water management districts jointly retained Florida Conflict Resolution Consortium, a neutral statewide center created by the state legislature and based at Florida State University.

Ceremony held for former chief deputy Owen

Times certainly have changed, just ask Sanford resident Ollis Owen. Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger recognized the 86-year-old Thursday as a 40-year honorary member of the Florida Sheriff's Association. In the process of the ceremony, however, the sheriff's office discovered a portion of their own history.

Owen was the chief deputy under Sheriff J.L. Hobby during the 1950s. The sheriff's office consisted of about a half dozen people including the sheriff back then, said Owen.

"It was a whole lot different," he recounted. "There wasn't much here, and there wasn't much going on like there is now."

The majority of Owen's patrol included the Sanford area, but he admits there was "a few people in

Watt resigns from Sanford

SANFORD — Finance director Donna Watt has resigned from the city of Sanford.

Watt, who has been with the city about five years, said she is leaving to join her husband in retirement.

"David and I talked for a long time, and there are a lot of things I want to do," Watt said.

Her resignation, submitted May 14, comes as the city is preparing its budget for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

While acknowledging that her leaving comes at an awkward time, Watt said she has been contemplating retirement for several months.

"There's never a right time to leave," Watt said. "If you wait for the right time, it'll never come. Sometimes you have to jump in with both feet."

Watt's resignation is effective Aug. 15, but with personal and vacations days, her last day in the office was May 15.

"I'll be available if there are any questions," Watt said.

Deputy Finance Director Kevin Smith will take over the budget process, a task he's done before.

"Quite honestly, it's not going to be a huge obstacle," said Smith, who has worked on the city's last seven budgets. "Donna was a valuable asset to the city, and we're going to miss her. But in May 1997 we had the same thing happen when (former finance director) Carolyn Small left.

"I'm going to be busier, obviously," Smith added, "and it will probably mean that me and my family won't take a vacation for a while. We've got good people who know how to do their jobs. It's just a matter of hunkering down and getting the work done."

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Clark receives club's Humanitarian Award Seminole County deputy honored for assisting local family experiencing crisis

Seminole County Sheriff's Office Deputy James Clark was honored recently by the Sanford Lakeside Lions Club.

Each year the club awards its annual Eugene Gregory Humanitarian Award to a Seminole County Sheriff's Department employee who demonstrates community service beyond his or her job description. The award honors the late Eugene Gregory, a deputy killed in the line of duty in 1998. Gregory was known for his commitment to community service.

"(Gregory) served the community beyond his policing duties," said Steve Harriett, chief deputy of

the sheriff's office. As an outdoorsman, Gregory "mixed well in that rural setting and the community at large."

Harriett said Gregory could communicate "on all levels," which earned him respect in the community. He was known for assisting the elderly by bringing food to them and for helping other citizens in need.

Clark received this year's award for assisting a family in crisis. His involvement with the family began in August 2001 when he answered a domestic disturbance call at the home in Altamonte

Springs. Inside the home, Clark found desperate conditions — no food available for three boys, a father lost to alcohol and the children making do with "life on the streets."

"The eldest of the three boys had been selling drugs to compensate the family's income," wrote Sheriff Don Eslinger in a letter nominating Clark for the award.

Clark contacted the Department of Children and Family Services, but learned that the family failed

Central Baptist minister of music retires

Jack Thomas served church for 23 years

The Rev. Jack Thomas, Minister of Music and Senior Adults at Central Baptist Church in Sanford, will retire on Sunday May 26 after 23 and a half years of service.

Two special services at Central Baptist will celebrate more than two decades of musical contribution by Thomas to the Central Florida community.

Thomas and his wife of 42 years, Sherrill, are perhaps best known locally for their creation and direction of "Living Pictures," an Easter presentation of drama and music that ran in Sanford for 16 consecutive years, attracting thousands of visitors from all over the state.

For many years, Thomas directed the annual Sanford Easter Sunrise Service on Lake Monroe. He has also been a frequent visitor to local hospitals and nursing homes, and he leads "Happy Hearts," an organization that provides Christian

activities and meetings for active senior adults.

Thomas was born and raised in Eatonville, Ga. He took his first job directing music at age 18. After serving in the U.S. Air Force and graduating with a Bachelor of Arts in Music Education, he served as music director in churches in Georgia, California and Alabama before joining the staff of Central Baptist in January 1979.

Thomas is an accomplished singer and musician who plays the tenor saxophone, clarinet, trombone, piano, recorder, accordion, drums, and auto-harp. He sings with the "Florida Baptist Singing Men" and was a member of the guest choir at the International Music Festival in Bern, Switzerland.

Though looking forward to retirement, Thomas closes this chapter of his life with mixed emotions.

"In considering my many years at Central Baptist, I feel the greatest blessing to me has been to personally see those who were young children at the beginning of my ministry grow up and take their place in the church music ministry here and in other churches around the

country as participants and leaders," Thomas said. "You cannot see this in a short ministry stay. One of my priorities has always been to develop the new talent that the Lord has brought to our church. These people and others in the congregation have truly become a part of my expanded family. I love them all dearly."

Thomas will be greatly missed by the church members and staff.

"I have never served with a finer minister of music than Jack Thomas," said Jimmy Dale

Patterson, pastor of Central Baptist. "He combines a unique combination of talent and humility. I will miss him very much."

"Jack Thomas has given more than just his God-given musical talent to Central Baptist Church," said David T. Farr, chairman of the Board of Deacons. "He's given his heart, his love of music and every ounce of his being. Jack's influence has touched so many lives that his 'song' will be sung for many years and generations to come."

Special services on Sunday, May 26 honoring Thomas will feature many of the hundreds of musicians and vocalists who have been a part of his ministry in Sanford over the past 23 years. There will be a morning service from 10 a.m. until noon, and an evening celebration service from 4 to 5:30 p.m., followed by a reception at the church.

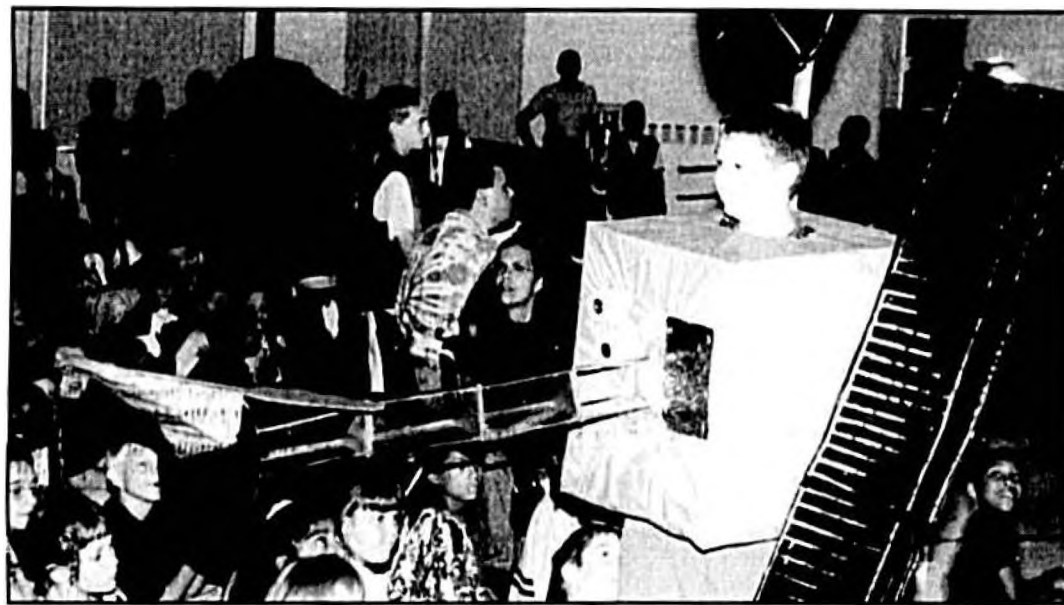

SUMMER SURPRISE DESSERT

- 1 cup fresh seedless grapes, halved
- 1 cup fresh whole blueberries
- 1 cup fresh strawberries, halved
- 1 cup fresh peaches, cut in bite-sized pieces
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 cups dairy sour cream

In shallow 9-by-12-inch glass dish, combine all fruit and mix well. Sprinkle brown sugar over the fruit. Top with sour cream. Cover with plastic wrap; refrigerate 3 to 4 hours or overnight. The sour cream will seep through the brown sugar to the fruit.

To serve, gently stir the fruit; spoon into sherbet glasses.

TIP: Any combination of fruits may be used: fresh plums, kiwi, raspberries, pitted Bing cherries, etc. However, FRESH peaches, FRESH grapes and FRESH blueberries are a necessity. Frozen or canned fruits are NOT recommended.

Other than patrolling an area that now takes dozens of deputies, the largest concern for the sheriff's office in those days is now a dying illegal trade.

"The biggest problem we had was moonshiners," he said. "We didn't have any of these dope runners."

Although prohibition had been lifted, distilling liquor was illegal without necessary permits. Several of the old photographs Owen displayed at Thursday's ceremony were of moonshine raids, including one a Chuluota bust that was completed with the help of

Florida Beverage agents.

"We got two or three stills from out there," Owen said about the Chuluota area.

The least of the sheriff's office problems was an overcrowded jail. There was never more than five or six people in the jail at one time, Owen said. With a county population of about 30,000, there were fewer crimes, but that doesn't mean Owen didn't see his fair share of scuffles.

He distinctly remembers trying to arrest an Orlando man on a Seminole County warrant when the man pulled a butcher knife and tried to stab his partner.

"I just pulled my gun and put a shot in his shoulder,"

Owen said. "He probably would have killed that deputy if I hadn't shot him."

It was the only time Owen had to fire his .38 special handgun in his three and a half years at the sheriff's office. Owen had left the Atlantic Coastline Railroad for his brief law enforcement career, and then returned to work as a conductor until he retired in 1978. Since 1961, he has been a resident of the Sylvan Lake subdivision.

In addition to his 40-year honorary member certificate, Owen was given a Chief Deputy's badge as a token of appreciation. The new badge is considerably larger than 1950 version, Owen noted.

Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard praised Watt for her work with the city.

"She's a financial whiz," Lessard said. "She will be sorely missed by my office. Fortunately, we have Kevin Smith available to step in for Donna. The city's not going to miss a beat. This is

Kevin's second time to step up and take over the budget process."

Lessard said he doesn't expect many changes in how the finance department prepares the budget. However, there will be some changes in how he approaches the budget.

"I'm going to be more closely

involved with this budget" than in previous years, Lessard said. That includes writing the budget message, a duty normally reserved for the city manager.

Lessard said his concerns about the budget predate Watt's resignation. In a report to city commission and City Manager Tony VanDerworp, Watt predicted the

city would miss its revenue projections by more than \$500,000. Most of that — \$400,000 — is a result of lower interest rates. There are also shortfalls in building permit fees and the half-cent sales tax, about \$200,000 in each category.

The shortfall projects are offset by a projected increase of \$200,000

in franchise fees from Florida Power & Light, and nearly \$600,000 in savings from a hiring freeze Lessard pushed through last fall.

Lessard said he expects revenues to remain slow and increases in expenditures, particularly health insurance. He also notes the city needs to find money to

fund several capital projects, from upgrading infrastructure and streetscape along 1st Street to building a new fire and police headquarters.

"This is an exciting and challenging time for the city of Sanford," Lessard said. "We need to set the right tone for the budget challenges that lie ahead."

to qualify under the department's guidelines.

"(Clark), of his own accord and finances, provided the family with cleaning supplies and groceries to begin a rehabilitation effort in all aspects of their lives," Eslinger wrote.

The deputy enrolled the youngest boys in sports programs and took them to practice. The eldest boy's life turned around when Clark helped him get a job and assisted him in reinstating his driver's license.

"To this date, this young man has not returned to street corner drug sales," Eslinger noted.

In addition, Clark gave the family his personal computer game system and video games, as well as providing them with various household appliances.

Clark also provided the boys with an incentive to improve their lifestyle. If the boys behaved properly and did all of their assigned chores for a set period of time, he agreed to take them on a

day trip to Busch Gardens. "This trip came to fruition and according to the children, was one of the most memorable times in their lives," Eslinger said.

Clark joined the sheriff's office in March 2001. He earned a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice in 1998 and spent approximately two years as an officer with the Altamonte Springs Police Department.

"I am very proud of Deputy Sheriff James Clark's efforts on behalf of this family," Eslinger said. "His understanding of and commitment to the sheriff's office organizational philosophy and values during his relatively brief tenure with our agency is an indication that there are many more families who will be helped by his compassionate law enforcement services."

The first jointly used UCF and SCC building is not far away. The two schools are close to breaking ground on a high tech training facility in the Interstate 4 corridor.

The entire project was initially estimated to cost about \$17 million for the land purchase and building construction. A gift, however, from a local developer should reduce the overall price tag.

The Pizzuti Companies donated six acres on International Parkway to SCC. About \$9 million also has been allocated by the state for the high-tech project. According to McGee, the land donation comes with a stipulation that ground must be broken by the fall of 2005.

While the news about the facility funding is good, community college funding in general is bad, McGee said. The state legislature allocated about \$6 million to the

project this year and another \$3.1 million last year. Seminole Community College is the fastest growing state college in the last five years, however, the annual budget remains close to the same, McGee said.

"My first priority is SCC," she said. "I didn't get any money for this year's growth and I won't get any for next year's."

Seminole Community College receives about 75 percent of their funding from the state. Last year

the college experienced a 23 percent growth rate. The annual budget of \$45 million, however, increased only \$150,000, she said.

Hitt warned the UCF board of trustees that developing new joint use campuses with other schools such as SCC, might not be feasible without the help of the state legislature.

"It's not really under our control," he said to trustees indicating that additional funding will be needed for the future projects.

CERT teams participate in hurricane drill

On Saturday, May 11, Universal Orlando and the city of Orlando's Fire Department hosted CERT 2002, a hurricane disaster response drill for community emergency response teams (CERT).

Twenty-seven teams from Florida participated in the drill, including three teams from Seminole County. Local middle and high schools students volunteered as "victims."

Universal's New York area

was the site of the "damage" done by Hurricane Peggy. Medical facilities were provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency's response team serving Central Florida.

CERT 2002 was designed to simulate the damage caused by a Level 3 hurricane hitting Central Florida. Each team was assigned an area of Universal Studios to locate, classify and move living victims to a centralized staging area for treatment or transfer to a hospital.

"Dead victims" were moved to a morgue for safety and removal to a final burial site.

Each team selected a team leader and assigned members to locate and assess victims, transfer victims to staging areas or the morgue, provide first aid, and maintain communications between team members.

Several Seminole County residents participated in the drill. Leading a team was Joe

Julsal, with assistance from Lake Mary Deputy Fire Marshal Wendy Benton. Locating and assessing the victims were Sharon Forbes and Louis Peare. Thomas Forbes helped carry the injured to the treatment area. Serving as general assistant and photographer was Laura J. Gimpelson.

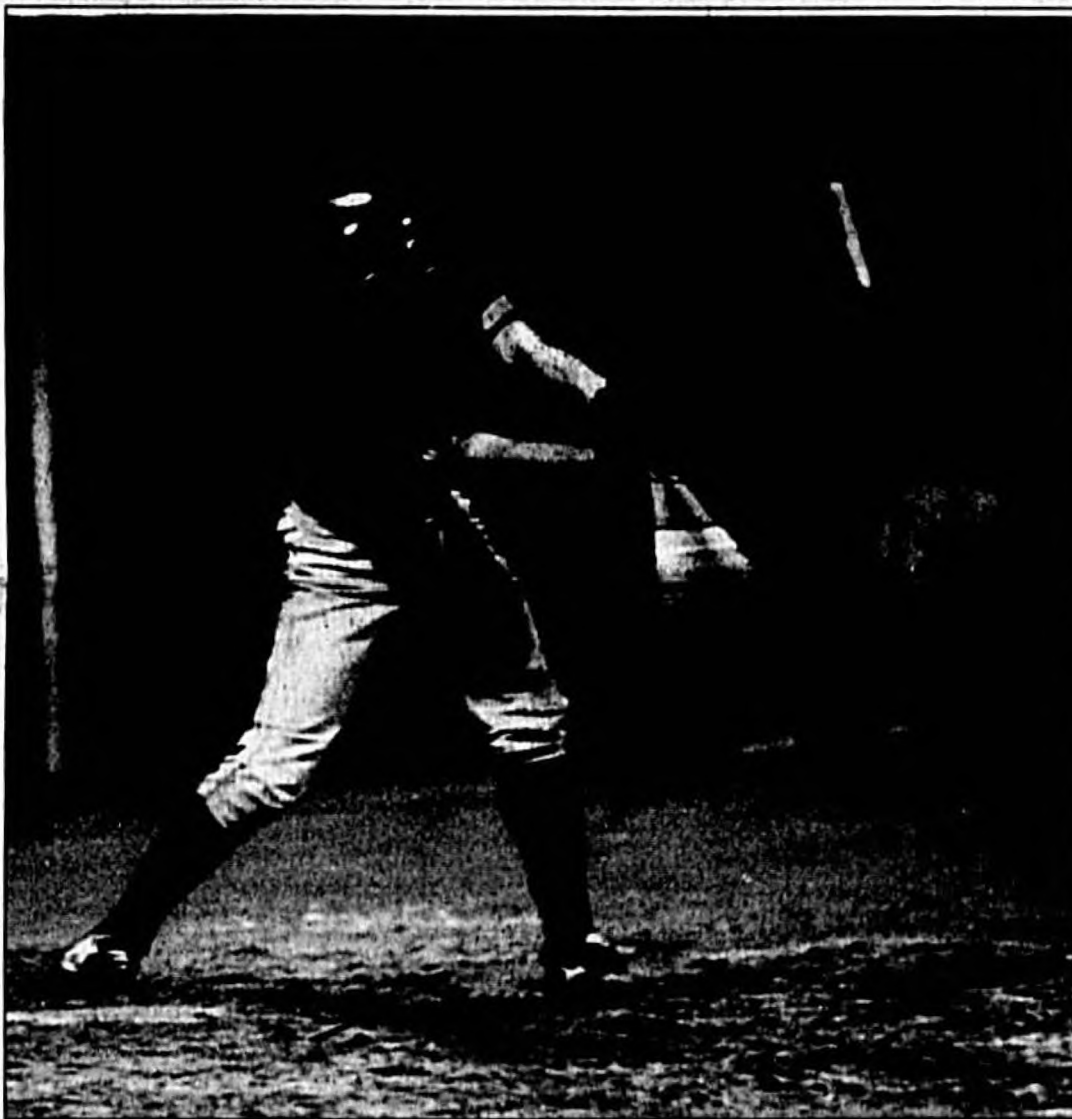

Tourney time for college baseball

DeLAND — The upcoming week will be a very important one for several former Seminole County baseball stars.

With Conference Tournaments beginning for NCAA Division I schools and the NAIA National Tournament starting Friday, at least six players and a coach from this area will have stomachs full of butterflies.

The wait is actually over for at least four of those seven as the Southeastern Conference (SEC) Tournament and Atlantic Sun Conference Tournament kicked off play this morning (Wednesday).

Senior Jeremy Frost finished 2-for-3 with two home runs and three RBIs to lead the University of Central Florida to a 6-5 victory over Mercer on Senior Day Saturday afternoon at Jay Bergman Field. The win for UCF clinched at least a tie for the regular season championship in the Atlantic Sun Conference and it also gave UCF the No. 1 seed in the A-Sun Tournament in DeLand at Stetson University.

The Oviedo High School graduate and former Sanford Post 53 star became the first UCF player to hit two home runs in a game since he did it himself earlier in the season vs. Long Island on March 14. The home runs in consecutive at-bats was also a first for a Golden Knight since Mike Myers hit two homers in a row May 19, 2001 vs. Jacksonville.

The win pushed UCF's record to 36-20 overall and 23-7 in the A-Sun while Mercer dropped to 22-32 and 13-17 in the conference. The victory was also the Golden Knights' sixth in a row and their second straight three-game sweep of a conference opponent.

The No. 1 seeded Golden Knights will face the No. 6 seed Samford in the opening game at the 2002 Atlantic Sun Baseball Championship at 11 a.m. this morning at Melching Field at Conrad Park in DeLand.

UCF will be looking to repeat as A-Sun champions after winning the conference crown in 2001.

At Birmingham, Alabama, the SEC Tournament also kicks off at 10 a.m. (11 a.m. locally) when the University of Georgia takes on the University of Florida.

The Bulldogs (30-25 overall, 15-15 in the SEC) are loaded with SAC talent as Oviedo's Justin Holmes and the Sanford duo of Chaz Lytle and Rick Eckstein are associated with UG.

 Eckstein is in his first season as top assistant and third base coach for the Bulldogs, while Lytle and Holmes as two of the team's top players.

Lytle, who transferred to Georgia after earning All-America honors at Daytona Beach Community College last year, has had a remarkable season and has emerged as the leader of the 'Dogs.

The junior will be looking to break to school records today as he has evened the Georgia marks for hits (102) and stolen bases (30) in a season.

The 102 hits led all SEC players by a wide margin. Drew Meyer of South Carolina was second with 94 hits. The 30 steals were second only to Meyers' 33.

The outfielder is also first in hits in conference games also with 52 safeties and stolen bases, 12-for-18.

His .397 batting average (102-for-257) is 4th in the SEC. His other SEC stats, fourth in Plate Appearances (275), first in At Bats (257), first in triples (7), tied for eighth in runs scored (55) and eighth in total bases (136).

Holmes, a junior who transferred in from South Florida, has also had a big season, starting in 26 of the 55 games and appearing in 36 games.

The second baseman hit .316 (62nd among all SEC players), collecting 31 hits in 98 at bats, and has scored 20 runs and driven in 16. He is also 5-for-6 in stolen bases.

Former Lake Brantley teammates Juan Rojas and Justin

In the event of a tie for the award in either the overall, girls or boys divisions at the end of the school year, the following tiebreakers will be used: (1) number of state team championships won; (2) number of state team runners-up finishes; (3) number of regional team championships won; (4) number of regional team runners-up finishes; (5) number of district team championships won; and (6) number of district team run-

ners-up finishes.

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Jones flips on apartment decision

SANFORD — City commissioners will reconsider their denial of a four-foot height variance for an apartment complex on Airport Boulevard.

The proposed complex, The Groves at Sanford, has been a contentious issue for residents who live in the Sanora subdivision. The developer, BNG Partners Inc., requested a variance to build 14 three-story apartment buildings with a maximum height of 39 feet, four feet higher

than the city codes allow.

The Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission has granted the variance for other apartments to allow for a steeper pitched roof. However, the board at its Feb. 7 meeting restricted the height of six buildings to two stories along the south side of the BNG development because those structures were adjacent to an exist-

ing single-family subdivision.

The developers appealed the decision to the city commission. During the April 22 meeting, representatives for BNG offered a compromise to build three two-story buildings that about single-family homes. In return for being allowed to build three three-story buildings that about two-story townhouses in Sanora. They

also agreed to eliminated all balconies on the south side buildings that overlook the subdivision.

The commission rejected the appeal on a 3-2 vote, with Mayor Brady Lessard and commissioners Randy Jones and Art Woodruff on the winning side. Three weeks later, Jones, using a parliamentary procedure that allows a party on the majority side of a vote to bring any matter back before the commission, asked that the appeal be placed on the May 28 agenda.

Program puts children's books in department's waiting room

Spending time in a waiting room is never much fun. Especially for children.

The Seminole County Health Department, in partnership with the Seminole County Public Library System, is making it a little more entertaining for its younger visitors by providing a reading program in its waiting area. New books arrive at the facility each month for pre-school children to read alone or with their parents.

"The idea is for kids to have books to read while waiting for medical treatment," said Margie Johnson, Seminole County Public Library youth services coordinator. "It's a way of giving children, who may otherwise not have the opportunity to visit the library, new books to read."

The Health Department reading program began in 1990 through money from a federal grant, Johnson said. Although funding for the program ended after three years, library officials decided to continue providing books to the facility through their own efforts.

The Lake Mary corporation gave the library program 1,200 books to distribute to the Health

cles. Owners were given three weeks to move the cars.

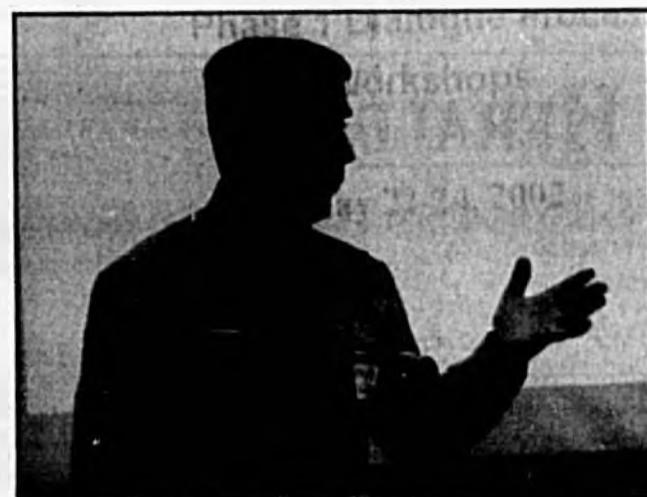

Regions gather to find water consensus

SANFORD — Water and the possible lack of it was the buzz around Central Florida last week as five sub-regional meetings discussed the issue in hopes of establishing a consensus for action.

The five regional meetings are part of the East Central Florida Water Supply Planning Initiative. The initiative began earlier this year when Orange County chairman Richard Crotty hosted two region-wide water supply summits.

The regional meetings are an

extension of Crotty's water summits. The three water management districts in east Central Florida 10-county area financed the regional meetings last week and several to follow.

The regional groups are designed to identify specific water supply concerns for each region, develop strategies and to reach a consensus for what is the next step in battling in the potential water crisis.

Two of the five regional groups met at Sanford City Hall Thursday. The first group incorporates the north Orange and south Seminole counties. The second group includ-

ed Volusia and Flagler counties and portions of Brevard and Seminole counties.

Officials at the second meeting included utilities officials from DeLand, Ormond Beach, Sanford and Port Orange, and elected officials from Brevard, Edgewater and Sanford.

One of the primary goals set for the group Thursday was to rank water supply challenges in the specific region. Many of the issues are interrelated, but officials worked to categorize about 14 issues. The issues areas included hefty topics
