# County delay animal shelter opening

## Building inspectors won't issue certificate of occupancy until safety issues are fixed

SANFORD — The Friday grand re-opening of the Seminole County animal shelter hit a temporary road block as county building inspectors denied the facility a certificate of occupancy. Despite the obstacle, the first-time fund-raising events still netted more than \$25,000.

Before the "Whine and Cheese Lock-Up" fund-raiser Friday, building inspectors presented a list of about 10 areas that needed to be fixed before the certificate of occupancy could be granted. Through a temporary certificate the event still took place, but when the lights went off every-

body went home — including the animals.

Routine operations will continue in that manner for several weeks until the building passes final inspection. Eight to 10 animals will be transported from the Orlando facility to the renovated Seminole shelter every day of operation, said Barbara Weltzer, SPCA of Central Florida Executive Director.

"We didn't want people coming up to the gate and thinking nobody was home," Weltzer said about the creative fix until the building is totally completed. "We hoped the project would be done sooner, but that's the way it goes with construction. I can't wait until the whole building is 110 percent and not just 85 percent."

The transported animals will be up for adoption at the shelter on County Home

Road from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays and from noon to 4 p.m. The shelter will be closed during bad weather because the animals will be kept outside until the final inspection.

The majority of the problems were part of the original structure, said Weltzer. The SPCA of Central Florida was created this year as a partnership between the Orlando and Seminole shelters. The organization temporarily closed the Seminole shelter in July for renovations, as it was determined major repairs were needed to meet its standards.

# Cooking with an artist's flair

## Chef Kenny Stingone creates a masterpiece with Da Vinci

SANFORD — Nestled between the antique stores and other shops in Magnolia Square lies a colonial-style building with a Mediterranean flair.

The unassuming building located at 107 Magnolia Ave. is now the home of Da Vinci, a dining place with Mediterranean inspired cuisine. Owned and operated by Kenny and Holliday Stingone, the newest restaurant in downtown Sanford has already attracted a loyal following with its creative and ever-changing menu.

"Since we've opened, I'd say 90 percent of our business is repeat business," Kenny said. "I've seen most of our customers a minimum of five to six times, which is a testament to me that people are coming in and really enjoying their dining experience."

It isn't surprising. Before a person even looks at a menu, the restaurant offers a com-

fortable atmosphere with its glass chandeliers and Italian artwork.

According to Holliday, it didn't take long to transform the restaurant, which previously housed The Bistro, into a dining area with an urban flair.

After three months of renovation work, the restaurant opened in June.

Although the physical work on the restaurant developed in a short time span, the idea of owning a restaurant was a dream in the Stingones' minds

for some time. Kenny, who is the restaurant's chef, has been cooking since he was 14.

"He's from a big Italian family and grew up cooking," Holliday said. "He is very cre-

# Locals preparing for state budget ax

SANFORD — As Tallahassee legislators look to trim a \$47 billion state budget in the face of an expected \$1.8 billion revenue shortfall, local officials are keeping a watchful eye.

"The state has the habit of passing problems along to counties and local governments," said Seminole County Manager Kevin Grace.

"Depending on what they do, it could be we have to do more cutting," Grace said it won't be until December or January before the county has a "good feeling" on what's happening with sales tax revenues. At a Sept. 25 county commission meeting, Grace

# Officer warn parents about door-to-door candy capers

SANFORD — The terrorist attacks have affected the way America travels and receives mail and now its threatening to change the Halloween tradition of door-to-door trick-or-treating.

The Sanford Police Department is encouraging parents to send trick-or-treaters only to houses where they know the residents and to utilize special Halloween events such as the Sanford Main Street's trick-or-treat with the merchants.

"In my opinion, I would not be surprised to see less trick-or-treaters," said Cleo Cohen public information officer for Sanford police. "I think they'll be more controlled in where they're going too."

One Hallow Eve's Night event that is expected to see a dramatic increase in attendance is the Spooky Hollow in downtown Sanford. Sanford police and Cohen suggest the Main Street trick-or-treating from 6 to 8 p.m. and other controlled trick-or-treating events such as the Altamonte Springs "Halloween in the Park" at Crane's Roost from 4 to 8 p.m. as good substitutes from asking for candy door-to-door.

"They sent out a newsletter saying buy more candy this year — we're going to have a lot more kids," said Molly Meyerholz of Molly and Me antiques.

# California dreamin'

## Julian Wimberly of Sanford buys cars using California man's identity

SANFORD — Armed with several forms of false identification, Julian Bartholomew Wimberly, 26, of Sanford rang up financial obligations at 10 to 15 local businesses.

Now investigators are following a paper trail of payment books, checkbooks and credit cards that leads to Huntington Bank in Longwood and the state of California.

According to Seminole County Economic Crimes Investigator Dan Purcell, Wimberly used a false driver's license and birth certificate with a California man's information

to attain a \$35,000 loan from Huntington Bank for a Lincoln Navigator.

Once the first payment was due, Wimberly defaulted and Huntington Bank contacted Brian Keith Johnson of Temple City, Calif., the man who bank officials thought received the loan. Wimberly was then baited back to Huntington Bank when investigators asked bank officials to advise Wimberly he needed to pick-up his temporary tags.

Last Thursday, Wimberly arrived at the bank at 10:30 a.m. Seminole deputies intercepted him on Interstate 4 and bank officials identified him as the loan benefactor. Wimberly was initially booked in the Seminole County Jail as "John Doe" until paperwork arrived over the weekend that enabled him to provide positive identification

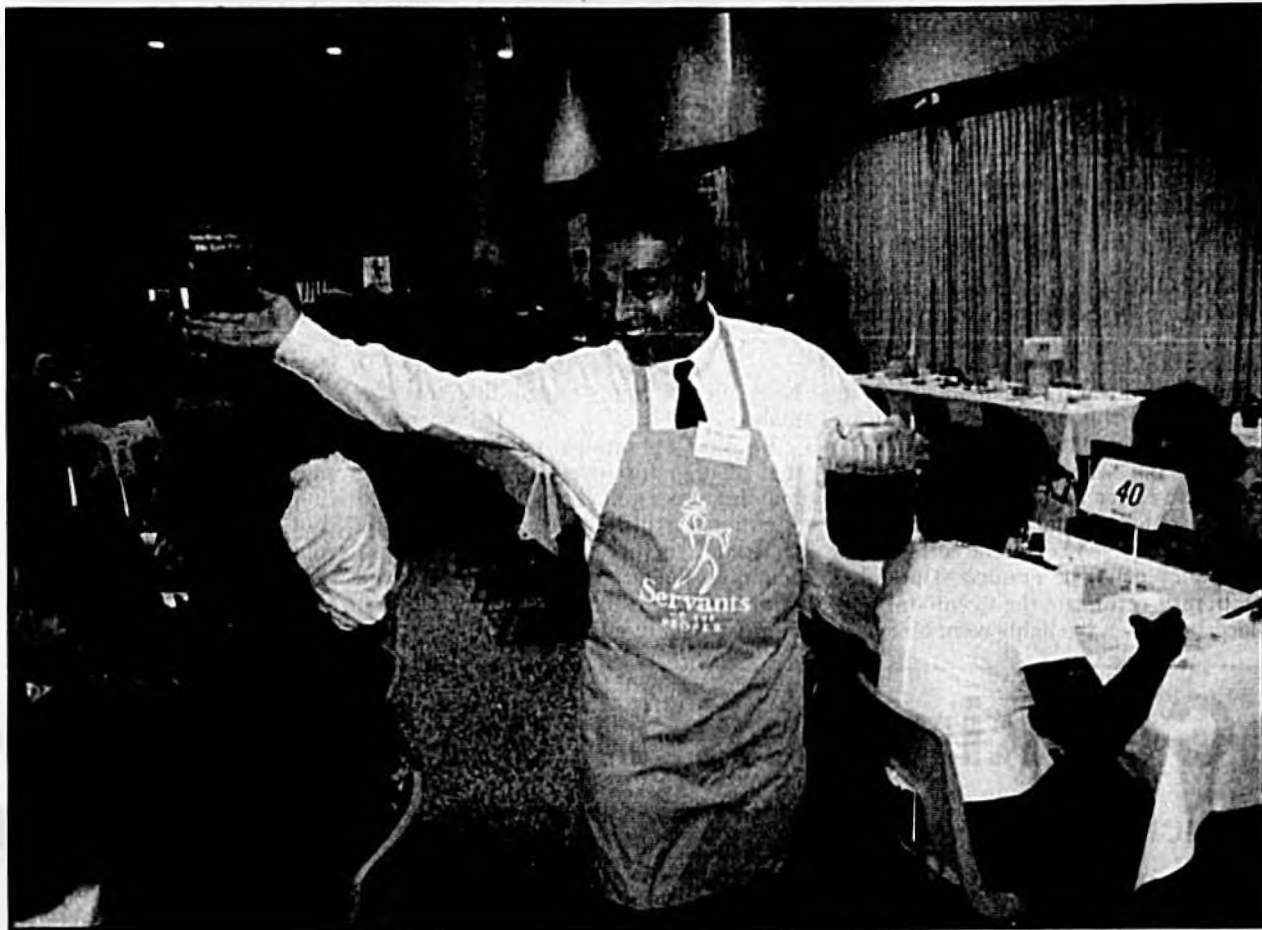

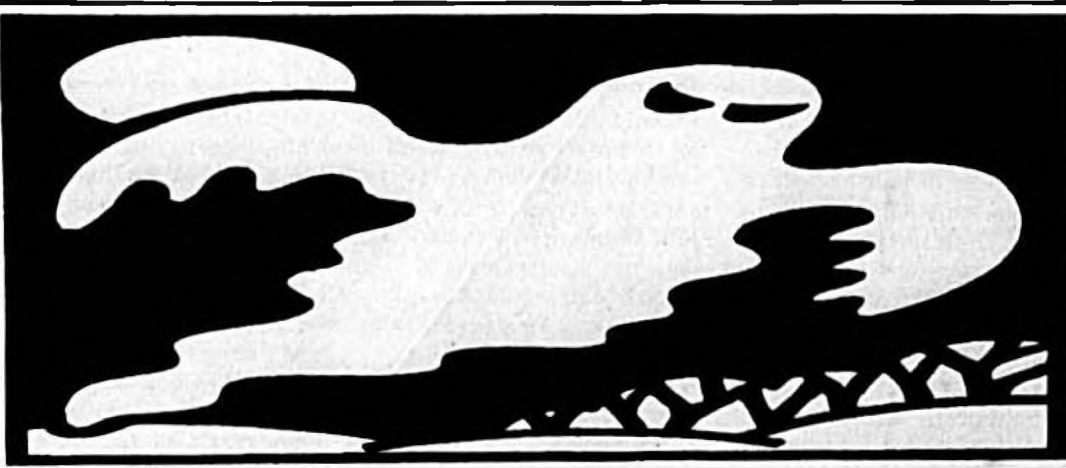

ative and artistic, and it doesn't surprise me he got into cooking. He's just got that nature to create and experiment."

Only a few years after he created his first recipe, Kenny became an apprentice for a European chef to fine tune his cooking skills. He eventually came to Florida, where he built his resume as a chef, working in the kitchen at some of the fine dining restaurants in the area, including Park Plaza Gardens and Cafe de France.

Now, Kenny chooses what's on the menu, which includes a constantly changing collection of appetizers, entrees and desserts, depending on the creative mood of the gourmet artist.

repairs, the organization will have to fork over a few more dollars to rectify the problems outlined by the building inspectors.

"None of it was earth shattering, but some of it was safety issues," said county building inspector Tom Helle. "It's a tremendous clean-up, and they're down to the wire. It has to be a safe environment not only for the animals but people

advised commissioners that staff was preparing two contingency plans — one that prepares for a 5 percent decrease in projected sales tax revenues and another for a 10 percent decrease.

On Monday Grace said it was "probable" that one of those contingency plans will have to be enacted. Grace said the shortfall produced by the state budget as may have an impact in the county's budget from anywhere to a few hundred thousand to \$2 or 3 million.

For the first time ever, the county prepared two fiscal budgets this year and that extra preparedness could help with potential cuts. Grace said despite the economic slowdown he anticipates the prepared 2002/2003 budget to still be 90 percent reasonable accurate.

Having the two budgets prepared helps "see what your headed toward in a financial planning standpoint."

"Our frustrations is we just went through the budget process," he said. "We have already done our belt tightening to have a balanced budget. Nobody wants their programs cut. Everybody is trying to keep from getting cut."

That includes Seminole Sheriff Don Eslinger who recently visited lawmakers in the capital to lobby for the funding of several law enforcement programs, said Sheriff spokesman Steve Olson.

"We're watching the events in Tallahassee with great interest," Olson said.

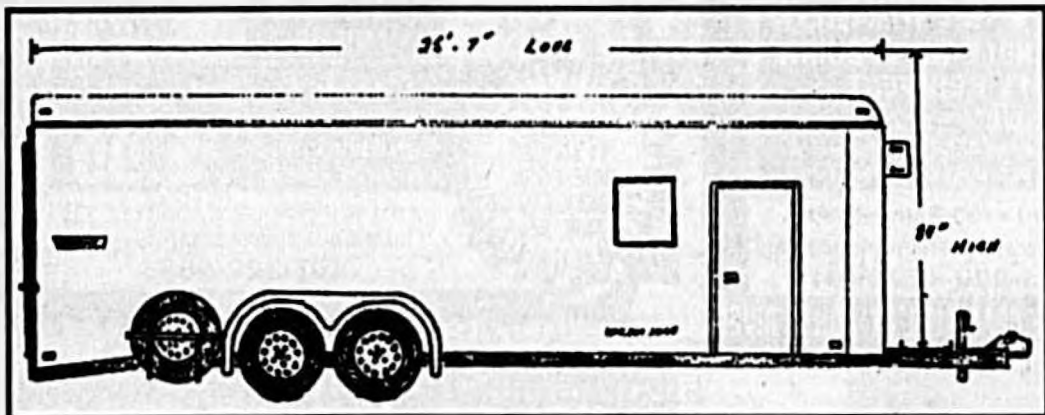

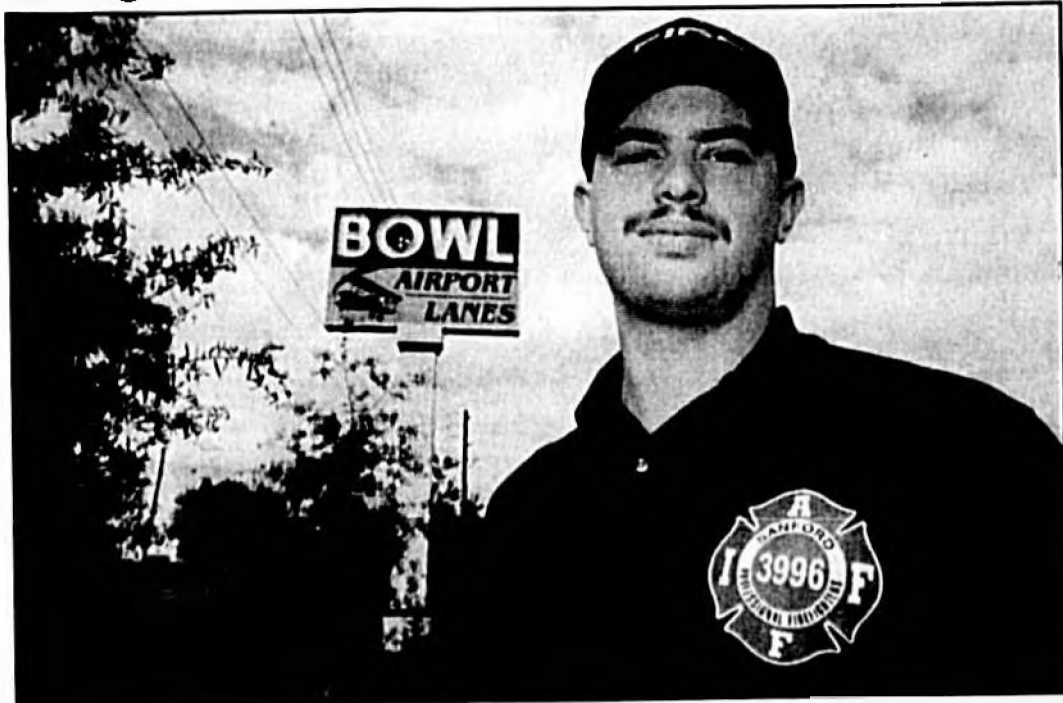

Her devotion to fashion and business provided her the opportunity to move to Nairobi, Kenya, with her husband Benjamin and their children. They lived there for four years and was captivated by the beauty of the people and their land. She used the technique of batik, an ancient art form, to render village scenes of the various tribes and wildlife in the region.

Levy's works were well received in artistic circles. Many of her paintings were part of private collections of diplomats and corporate executives in Kenya, the United States, France, Germany, Belgium, Italy, England and Hong Kong. After several years in the fashion business, she retired and returned to the United States, where her works were exhibited in Miami and Ft. Lauderdale.

Levy says her adopted country has become an incredible source of inspiration. She focuses her interest on historical sites such as the Old Hopper Elementary School — now a community center — and various historical homes and churches in the Sanford area.

Wimberly was charged with another count of grand theft and several other forgeries, but

LaFleur said "there's going to be a lot more cases as we dig into this."

Wimberly is also suspected of opening checking and credit card accounts with the

California man's information.

"Identity theft is a booming crime," LaFleur said, "but they tend to get greedy. They get away with one and they figure why not two, four, eight and so

on. It eventually caught up with him."

The boys' race went to Lake Brantley in a tie-breaker as both the Patriots and Lake Howell finished with 71 points.

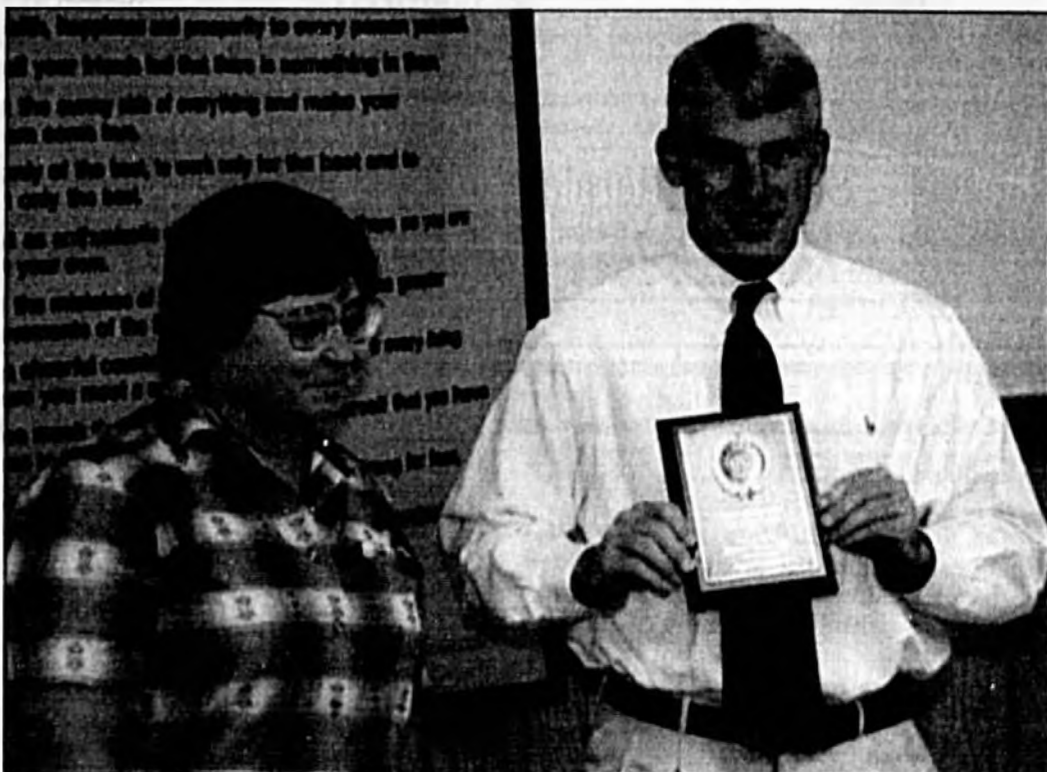
Lyman, Oviedo, Seminole, Lake Mary, and Winter Springs rounded out the field.

Even Seminole is not completely out of the picture yet as it is 4-5 and, with a little help, could get into a three-way tie that will have to be broken by strength of schedule, something the Tribe definitely played this season. But they would have to beat a Class 4A Palm Bay team that is undefeated this season and lost only once last year while winning the Class 6A State Championship.

Part of the luck would also have Ed White, which is also 4-5, losing its final game because it beat Seminole during the regular season.

Another game that figures to have a bearing on the playoffs is the Oviedo at Winter Park game.

While the Lions have already qualified, they could get a better seeding by finishing 8-2 instead of 7-3.

But most eyes will be on the Wildcats as they are 5-4 on the season and could get an At-Large spot with a win.

This Friday's schedule has Lake Mary taking on Lake Brantley at Tom Storey Field; Palm Bay taking on Seminole at Thomas E. Whigham Stadium; Lake Howell hosting Winter Springs at Richard L. Evans Field; Oviedo challenging Winter Park at Showalter Field; and Lyman going to Olympia High School in Orlando. All of the games are set to begin at 7:30 p.m.

Senior quarterback Fabier Fernandez finally stepped into the leadership role for Lake Brantley last Friday, running for 279 yards on 32 carries and scoring three touchdowns as the Patriots whipped Sandalwood in a 6A-District 1 contest at Tom Storey Field.

Fernandez was forced in to the signal-callers role when starter John Venters was lost for the season with a broken collar bone against DeLand in the fifth game of the season.

Lake Brantley had suffered since, losing three games in a row, and falling out of the district title hunt.

But when star running back Jamel Oliver, Seminole County's leading rusher, suffered a slightly injured ankle, the senior came to the rescue and now gives opponents another weapon to worry about.

Despite the injury, Oliver still had 69 yards on 12 carries and scored Lake Brantley's other two touchdowns.

The Patriots defense was as strong as usual, holding the Saints to just 68 rushing yards, while the Lake Brantley offense compiled 344 yards on the ground.

In another game from late Friday, Lake Howell saw its final playoff hope end when Merritt Island rebounded from a 14-3 halftime deficit to score 15 unanswered points to defeat the Silver Hawks 18-14 in a Class 4A-District 5 contest at Richard L. Evans Field.

Chad Passmore's four-yard run with 7:55 remaining capped the second half comeback for the Mustangs (6-3 overall, 3-2 in district), who remain alive for an at-large playoff berth.

Merritt Island's lead appeared short-lived however, as the Silverhawks (4-5 overall, 2-3 in 5A-6) marched down the field behind Brandon Marshall. The senior threw for 50 yards and ran for another 14 as Lake Howell had a first and goal at the Mustangs' five-yard line. But as it had done all evening, Merritt Island's defense rose to the occasion as stuffed the Silver Hawks on four straight plays.

In addition to passing for a game-high 124 yards, Marshall, a 6-foot-5-inch, 197 pounder, gave Lake Howell the early lead when he returned an interception 98 yards for a touchdown.

He also led the Silver Hawks to another score in the waning moments of the first half when he threw completions of 50 and 36 yards before tossing a 16-yard touchdown to MacArthur Walker for a 14-3 halftime lead.

Lake Howell appeared ready to put the game away in mid-way through the third quarter

as it had a first down at the Merritt Island 14, but Mustang linebacker Ryan Barwick grabbed a fumble out of the air and ran 83 yards for a touchdown to put the guests right back into the game.

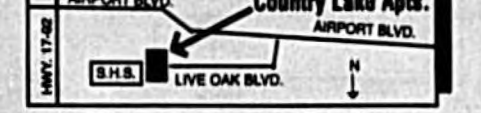
