### Rape Charge Nets 12 Years

Homie J. Wilcox, 38, of Longwood, was given a 12-year sentence after entering a guilty plea before Circuit Judge Clarence Johnson Jr., to an assault with intent to commit rape charge.

Wilcox, a slim, anemic drifter weighing approximately 100 pounds, was arrested while hiding in a Maitland woman's home.

Barbara Pietrak, 48, Lake Kathryn Drive, called police after finding his bicycle in the bushes near her house.

After his arrest on burglary charges for being in the Pietrak house, investigation led authorities to charge him with two counts of rape of another woman but Thursday the state agreed to nolle prosequere one of the charges after Wilcox entered his guilty plea on the first.

Clad only in blue jeans and denim shirt, Wilcox admitted his guilt to the judge and admitted being in "trouble with the law" on previous occasions.

Judge Johnson told him, "You've been in trouble with the law for a long time" and added that "everyday had been judgment day as decisions had to be made."

"Up to now, the decisions you have made have not been too good," the judge advised.

With that he pronounced sentence and Wilcox was led away by sheriff's officers, leaving Gerald Rutburg, his attorney, and O. H. Eaton, prosecutor, staring at the creaky old courthouse floor.

In a second pleading, Eddie Booker Williams, 21, of Sanford, received a four-year probation after a guilty plea to breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony charge.

### Couple Arrested On Dope Charge

County Det. Sgt. Ray Parker and Sgt. William Vinton Thursday night arrested a Longwood couple on three counts of possession of marijuana after an investigation disclosed a marijuana farm was being operated near the man's house.

Parker said Dennis W. Duignan, 21, of Sandalwood Springs Road, and Sandra Lou Sartan, his 19-year-old girl friend, same address, were jailed after between 5000 marijuana plants were discovered on Douglas Road, south of 434, near Duignan's home.

Duignan's bond was set at \$5,000 for two counts of possession of marijuana and \$2,500 for one possession of marijuana count.

Parker said Duignan admitted growing the "pot" because he liked to smoke it but did not want to buy "grass" grown by someone else because "you never know what's in it."

Parker said the accused liked "organic type" marijuana for himself, but did not sell it to others. The detective said the two pounds of marijuana was discovered inside the couple's house.

### Jetliner Loses Tail Engine

LOS ANGELES AP—The tail engine of a Continental Airlines DC-10 that had just left Los Angeles, fell off Thursday, dropping nearly a ton of smoking hot metal on Hollywood and Beverly Hills. No one was hurt by the debris and the plane landed safely on its remaining two engines.

One 300-pound piece of the engine plunged into the front lawn of a Beverly Hills home and 40 to 50 pieces were scattered over a densely populated area about with a four-mile radius, police said.

Capt. Robert Glas, the pilot of the Chicago-bound jet, Flight 902 with 123 persons aboard, lifted the plane off from Los Angeles International Airport at 2 p.m. The engine began shedding parts about 10 minutes later.

No injuries were reported on the plane or on the ground and there were no reports of damage to structures on the ground.

One witness, Curtis Howard, a sheriff's deputy, said he looked up at the plane after he heard a sound like a sonic boom.

"Smoke and flames were coming from the rear of the plane," he said. "I saw a number of large pieces fall."

### Chinese Confirm Lin Piao's Death

ALGERS AP—The Chinese Embassy today confirmed Lin Piao, once Chairman Mao Tse-tung's political heir, died last year in a plane crash, fleeing to the Soviet Union after an unsuccessful plot to assassinate Mao.

It was the first official explanation of Lin's disappearance from public view last year. It was contained in a statement made to the Algerian government newspaper El Moudjahid.

The Peking correspondent of a Canadian newspaper, the Toronto Globe and Mail, reported Thursday that Mao had told two recent foreign visitors—Prime Minister Sirimavo Bandaranaike of Ceylon and Foreign Minister Maurice Schumann of France—of Lin's plot against him and his death.

The Chinese Embassy's statement said:

"Lin Piao died Sept. 13, 1971. The Lin Piao affair is a reflection of the battle between two lines which was taking place within the party for a long time. Lin Piao committed repeated errors and Chairman Mao Tse-tung fought many battles against him."

He indulged in anti-party activities and in a planned and premeditated way with a clearly determined program with the goal of usurping the leadership of the party, the government and the army. Chairman Mao Tse-tung unmasked his plot and aborted his maneuvers.

### 'Injection Of Economic Aid' Seen Rural Development Is Studied

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress is a step away from passing a rural renewal bill offering America's ailing countryside communities an injection of economic aid.

Ending the bickering over compromises reached by Senate-House conferees in a bill to get a bill passed this year, the House voted Thursday to accept proposals settling 52 disputes. This intricate agreement, putting together a rural development program authorizing about \$80 million a year in new grant funds and extensively expanding loan authority, was approved intact after the bill's supporters survived a major parliamentary challenge.

In the key test, rural-development advocates headed by Agriculture Committee Chairman W. H. Pogue, D-Tex., won 214-162 over a coalition guided by Government Operations Committee Chairman Chet Holifield, D-Calif., and Rep. John B. Anderson, R-Ill.

Holifield objected to the bill's provisions empowering the Agriculture secretary to coordinate rural-development activities. He claimed that would encroach on the jurisdiction of his committee which has approved its own bill to reorganize government community-development programs.

Anderson joined in a call for a separate vote on disputed provisions of the compromise. Then, the House passed the bill by 339 to 36 and the measure was aimed to the Senate.

## Senate Hands Nixon A Victory

### Votes To Speed Sub Development

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate has handed the Nixon administration a victory by voting to speed development of the Trident submarine, the most expensive ship ever built.

Opponents objected to accelerating development of the cruiser-sized atomic-powered vessel and its 21 nuclear warhead missiles, but not to the concept itself.

"I know weapons run into trouble at times, but this weapon is not a dream, or a brazen bluff," Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., said. "This is an established family of weaponry."

A letter from Vice Adm. Hyman Rickover, who is known as the father of the atomic sub, was quoted as saying Trident missiles could be fired at Russia from U.S. ports eliminating the need for overseas bases.

A job bank is now operating in Seminole County.

Horace Orr, president of Seminole Employment and Economic Development Company (SEEDCO), announced today his office is now in the process of taking job orders from employers, setting up a referral and placement system to assist in meeting the employment needs of the unemployed and jobless.

"SEEDCO is basically designed to promote and establish businesses and to generate jobs via these ventures. However, the establishment of a venture demands planning and preparation which does not allow us to become involved in providing more immediate and direct benefits to the people in the community," Orr said. ### Solons Frown On Session

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. AP—Strong opposition from senators virtually assured today that the Legislature will not call itself into special session to pass a law allowing execution of criminals.

With 11 legislators responding, it was far from clear whether there would be an immediate special session of the Legislature. It has held legislative sessions in a regular session and 24 have said they will not call it.

It takes a three-fifths vote of each house in the poll sent out by Secretary of State Richard Stone before legislators can call themselves into session. That comes to 25 senators and 71 House members.

Six senators, all Republicans, have voted for the special session and 13 are opposed. Legislators who remain undecided would have to call for the special session to meet the legal requirement of three-fifths.

Senate President Jerry Thomas (D-Fla.) wants an immediate special session and has attacked House Speaker Richard Pattengill (D-Miami) for opposing it.

But Senate President Deshaun M. Moore (D-Tallahassee) who will take office in November if Deshaun is appointed, said the Senate is opposed to a special session at this time.

Sen. Moore will be stepping into the next Senate session.

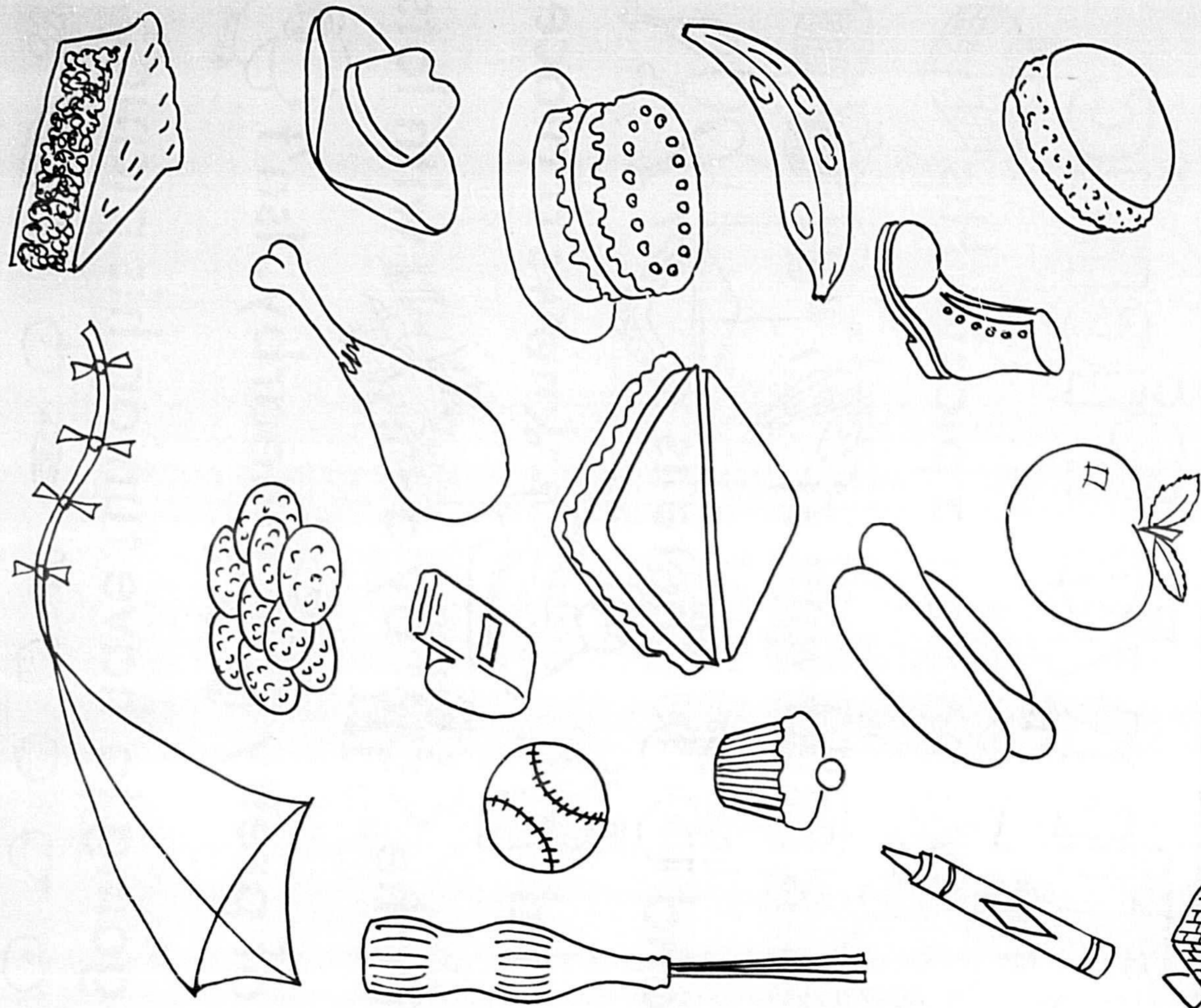

### Sheriff Trial Opens; Media Is Warned

TAVARES, Fla. (AP) — As the second-degree murder case of suspended Lake County Sheriff Willis McCall goes to trial, the news media is under a court warning that an editorial campaign to convict the defendant could lead to a contempt citation. Florida Supreme Court Justice James C. Adkins, assigned to preside over the highly publicized trial, was scheduled to consider motions in a hearing here today. One motion expected was a change of venue request to try the sheriff outside his rural home county.

McCall, 62, is charged with second degree murder in the alleged beating death of a black Lake County jail inmate. Adkins was warned that any publicity designed to effect the outcome of the case "may constitute a clear and present danger." As an example, he said a campaign to convict McCall may warrant judicial sanction and constitute grounds for contempt. In his order concerning press coverage of the trial, Adkins cautioned reporters and editorial writers to refrain from publishing reports of any "discreditable" acts of the accused "unless it is made a part of the court record."

"There's been a lot of publicity in the past that's not been too beneficial to the defendant's character and that's what I want to avoid," Adkins said. Besides cautioning the media, Adkins has instructed lawyers, court personnel, prospective witnesses and law enforcement officers involved in the case to avoid discussing it.

The judge said his order aimed at restricting press coverage was needed to reconcile "relative rights of the press and that of the individual to a fair trial."

He added, "These are guidelines merely to suggest press cooperation. If the media go out of bounds they are knocking on the door of the court."

The judge warned against publication of any statements, conclusions or "leaks" regarding the defendant's innocence or guilt, whether "implied or expressed."

McCall was Lake County sheriff for 28 years before Gov. Reubin Askew suspended him from office. The governor acted after a grand jury issued a three-count indictment accusing McCall in the death of a minor traffic offender who was in his custody.

McCall was charged with second degree murder, aggravated assault and aggravated battery in the April 23 death of Tommy Vickers, 37, of Miami. A coroner's report said Vickers died of a blow to the stomach.

According to the grand jury indictment, the white sheriff "knowingly and intentionally caused bodily harm... by kicking him in the stomach and abdomen" with his boot.

Vickers was moved from the jail to a nearby hospital where he died.

There's a heck of a lot of difference from writing an "opinion", much the same as this column; and a story of another color when one goes ahead and prints as "fact", a fabrication.

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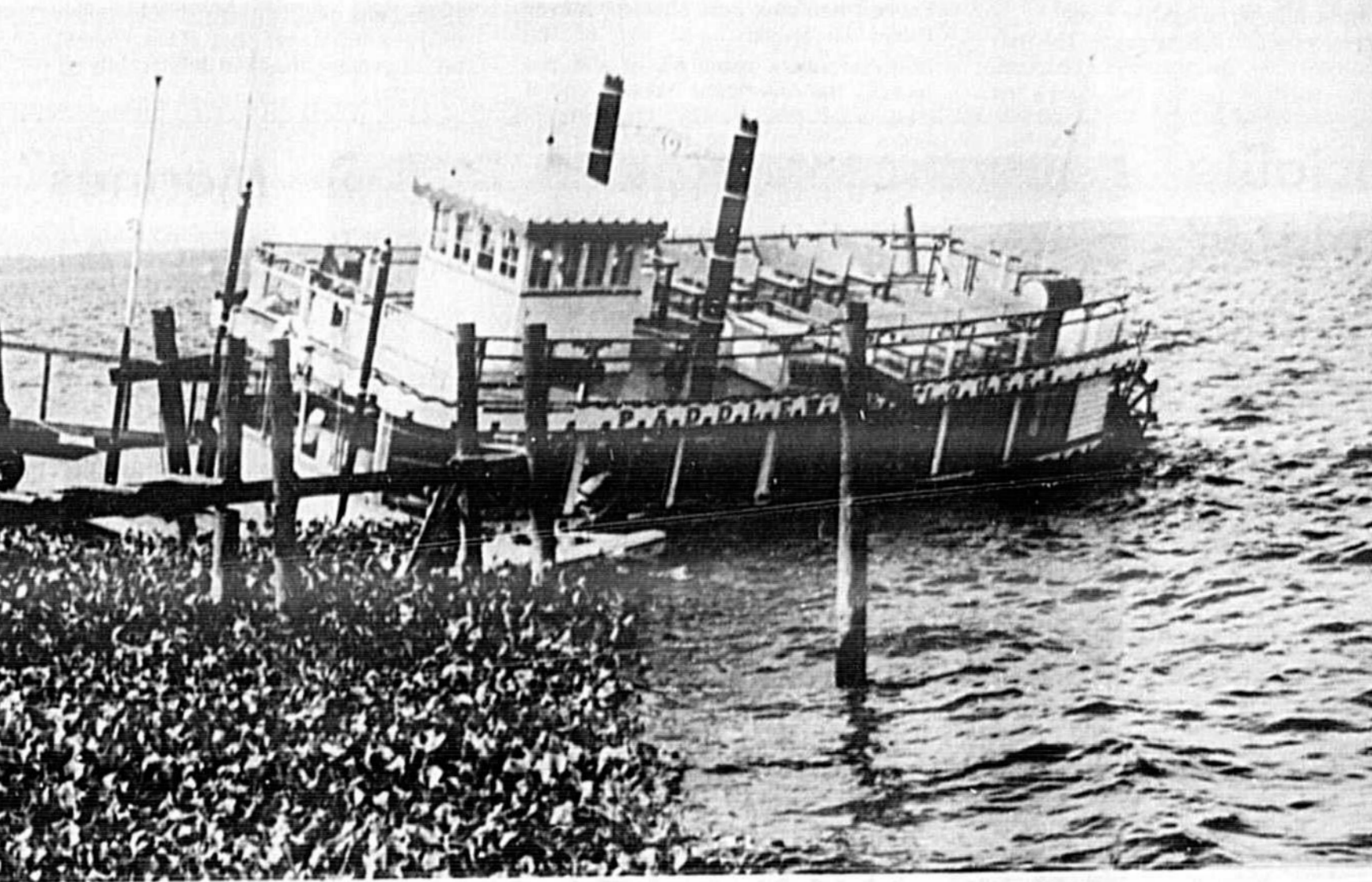
### Bacteria Breeds Fast Beware Of Some Picnic Foods

LOS ANGELES — Dr. Marjorie Hampton has spent more time looking at potato salad than anyone else in America. She has studied it with a microscope at the beach. She has tested it with chemicals in the aisles of a supermarket. She has even counted potato salad bacteria in picnic baskets at a campground in the desert. Her conclusion: Potato salad is capable of starting colonies of dangerous bacteria while it sits at the beach campground or on a picnic table under the trees. One jar of the mayonnaise-laden salad, for instance, grew more than 10 million bacteria in five hours. And what Dr. Hampton has done for potato salad, she has done for cream pie, chocolate cake, yogurt and fried chicken. In each of these, Dr. Hampton, a University of California at Los Angeles nutritionist, found great civilizations of organisms — particularly in cold convenience foods bought at the supermarket and allowed to get hot on beaches or in parks. "For picnic bacteria, life begins at 40 — degrees," says Miss Esther Walsh, a therapeutic dietitian at a nearby hospital. "And it ends at 140 degrees. So keep food cold, or get it hot at the campground. In between, you have problems."

When a housewife picks up a cream pie in the supermarket, notes Miss Walsh, the pie will probably have a temperature of 38 or 39 degrees. In the picnic hamper it will begin to get its summer picnic fever, inching up to 65 or 70 degrees by the time the hot dogs are ready. "This is a fertile ground for bacteria," she says. "A warming pie is excellent as a start for bacteria food poisoning."

She wishes people would either redefrost their picnic menus or get ice chests. "For instance, an ice chest will adequately keep foods cold enough to stop the growth — as long as you keep it well stocked with ice."

### Three Other Trials On Docket 3 Drug Suspects Plead Guilty

The drug scene in Seminole County occupied the attention of Circuit Judge Clarence Johnson Jr. with pleas being taken this morning in the cases of three defendants, each charged with drug violations. Each of the youths were teenagers and were high school drop-outs, some continuing their education at Seminole Junior College.

Derek O'Donoghue, 18, entered a guilty plea to possession of drug paraphernalia. In the negotiated plea with the state O'Donoghue pleaded to a misdemeanor in admitting to the possession of less than five grams. Judge Johnson advised the defendant that, if he has a previous drug record, he faces a maximum sentence of five years in state prison. If he has no previous drug record the maximum sentence is one year in county jail.

The court accepted the plea, and allowed the defendant to remain on his present bond. A presentence investigation (PSI) was ordered.

Under the negotiations, the state agreed to nolle prosequere (drop) charges of possession of drug paraphernalia. Mike Lane, 19, pleaded guilty to the sale of a narcotic drug, when on June 17, he illegally delivered marijuana. The state agreed to nolle prosequere charges of possession of a narcotic drug. Judge Johnson told the youth the maximum sentence is five years in state prison and that the offense is a third degree felony. Lane was allowed to continue on bond, and placed under PSI.

On another plea, Steve Cummings entered a guilty plea to breaking and entering with intent to commit a misdemeanor, also a negotiated plea. The 17-year-old youth was charged with a two-count infraction of breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony and grand larceny. Defense Attorney James Freeland told the court it is his understanding, in the negotiations, that the state will drop charges of grand larceny in the information, as well as all other charges against the defendant pending in the county. The court admonished this to be too broad a scope, and finally elicited the information that there is only one other pending case of a similar nature, and subsequently the charges were dropped by the state.

Judge Johnson told the defendant he faces a maximum of five years in state prison in the incident in which he entered a dwelling at Red Bug Road. McMunnings was allowed to remain on bond and a PSI was ordered by the court.

Three defendants, Eugene Terrell, Jimmy P. Sparlock and Gary Vallant are docketed for trial the remainder of this week. Sparlock, 31, Longwood, is charged with buying, receiving, and concealing stolen property while involved with a large scale county burglary ring which was broken in January by sheriff's agents.

Terrell, whose trial was scheduled to begin this afternoon, is charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit a misdemeanor. Vallant is charged with possession of a central nervous stimulant and sale of the drug.

### Askew Not Queried Again By McGovern

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Presidential nominee George McGovern has not contacted Gov. Reubin Askew about accepting second place on the Democratic ticket if Sen. Thomas Eagleton drops off, an aide said today.

Deputy Press Secretary Harding said Askew "hasn't discussed it with anybody."

McGovern said over the weekend he was coming under intense pressure to replace Eagleton, who revealed recently he had undergone shock treatment for mental depression. Askew, who denied interest in a vice presidential bid throughout the Democratic campaign, was offered second place on the ticket but turned it down.

Harding was with Askew over the weekend in Pensacola, where the governor went to celebrate his mother's 72nd birthday.

Askew held an early birthday party for his mother since he, his wife Donna Lou, and their two children, Angela, 11, and Kevin, 9, are leaving Tuesday for a vacation in the North Carolina mountains.

Tentative schedules for rights-of-way acquisition and construction will also be discussed as will the DOT's relocation advisory assistance program.

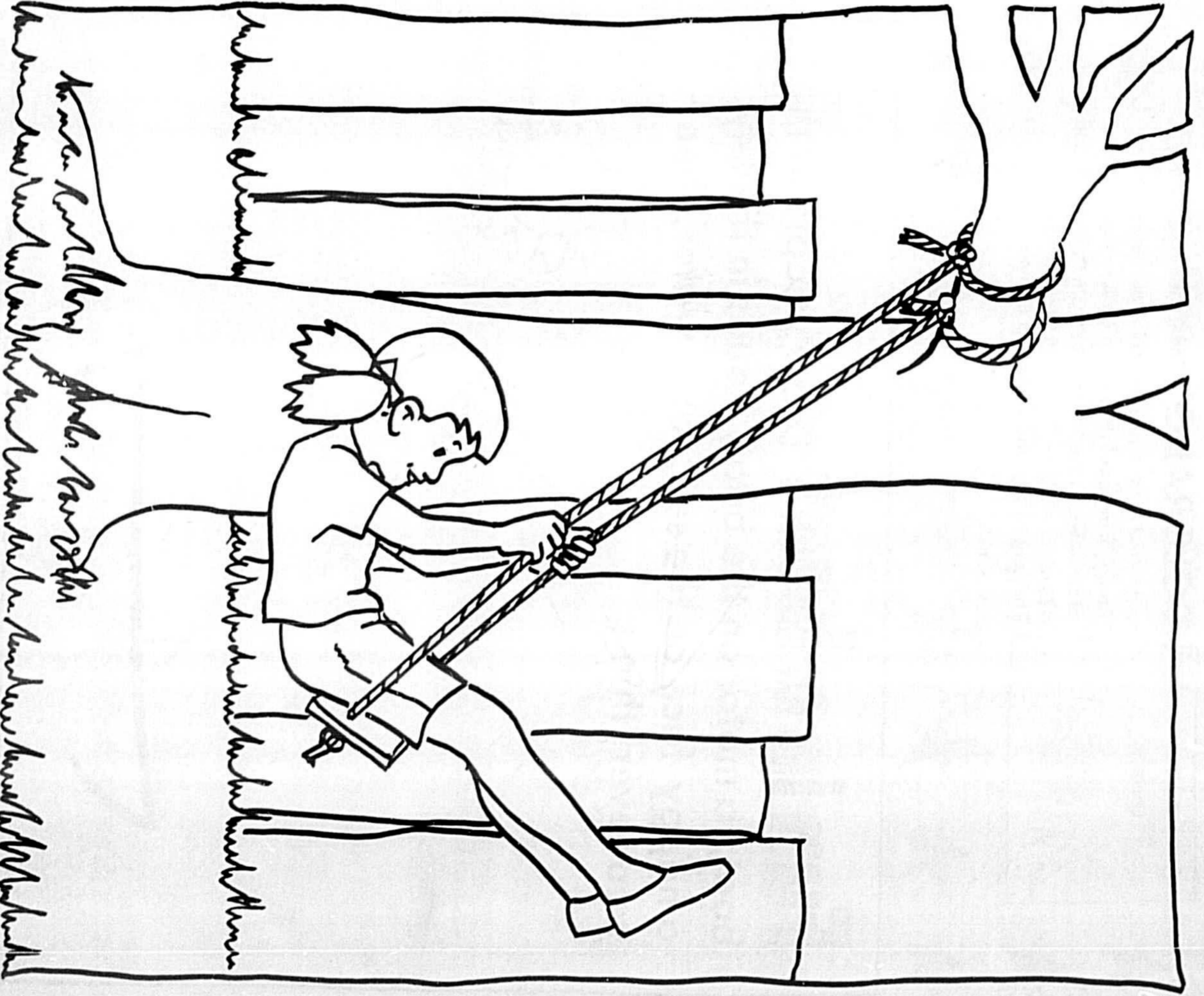
