The market restaurant will be re-opened within a few days by P. J. Angel, and it is expected that it will be enlarged soon in order to accommodate the patronage of the market during the peak of the season.

Two more innovations expected at the market this season is the sale of bananas from the platform in any quantity and also the packing of tomatoes which will be in charge of an expert.

Mr. Michael stated that he was putting forth every effort to make available all commodities and give the best possible service to truckers and others who patronize the market, so as to create as large a volume of business as possible which will reciprocate by affording a ready market for the products of the farmer of Seminole County and the vicinity.

Services for truckers at the state market include: Western Union with direct wire and full money order service, French's Cold Drink and Tobacco Shop-market service station for gas oil and tires, truck weighing scales, for weighing gross and net loads, citrus inspectors, Federal-State Market News Service and full police protection.

During the past few days, Mr. Michael has written hundreds of letters to former patrons extending to them a special invitation to visit Sanford and the market during the coming year and telling them of the many improvements at the market over last year.

Mr. Michael has set for the goal of the market this season a 71,000,000 volume of business.

DEATH WINS ELECTION

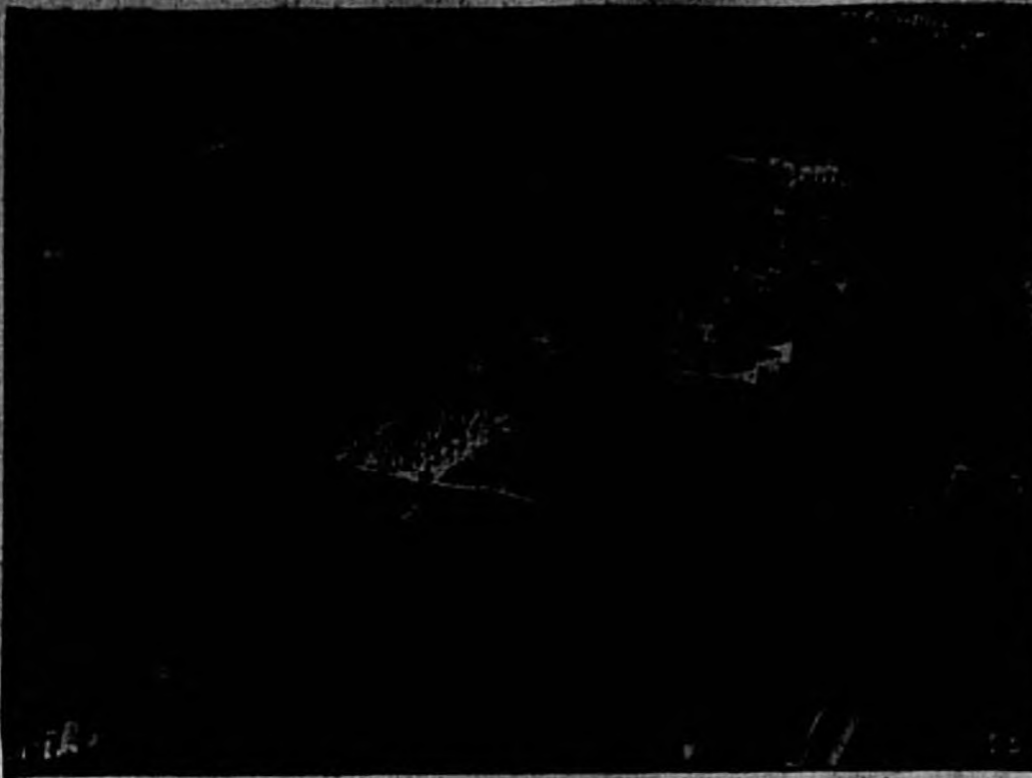

Woolfolk Predicts Firm Market For Growers Of Citrus

ORLANDO, Nov. 3.—Florida's citrus growers can expect a firm, satisfactory market on all of their early and mid-season fruit, B. B. Woolfolk, vice president of American Fruit Growers, declared here today in his Fall review of crop conditions and marketing prospects.

"While the government estimate increases the orange crop by around 1,500,000 boxes over last year, yet on account of general conditions, the time of maturity, and other favorable factors, I give no reason why growers should be stampeded, or lose confidence in the general outcome of the price levels on early and mid-season oranges," Mr. Woolfolk said, before seeing it conquered by the "Conditions are so much different than last year and in our competitor state of California, on account of the setback caused by the freeze of last January, the maturity of fruit has been retarded, shipments of Naval oranges from that state will not be in any volume until late in November. It is a fact that the old crop of California Valencia oranges is practically finished. This leaves a wide open market for Florida fruit throughout the United States, or at least in all of the markets of the Rocky Mountains. This situation can be expected to continue well into December," he said.

"Our situation here in Florida is also altogether different from any year I can remember," the Blue Goose executive continued. "The citrus crop has been distributed by nature herself. The blooming period this year extended over to seven months which will prevent the entire crop from maturing at one time. This will insure a regular movement of fruit to market."

"It is generally known that it requires nine months from the blooming time to the maturity of citrus fruits. Fruit must be this old to pass state and federal maturity tests," Mr. Woolfolk continued.

He declared that these reasons "we can expect a firm, satisfactory market on all of our mid-season fruit."

in China available for action, Dr. Hudson said. Japan is fighting mainly by money power and superior armaments. General Chiang hopes to end the invasion by exhausting Japan's money supply, and curtailing her war supplies.

Dr. Hudson also told the organization about General Chiang's wife who is a graduate of an American University. He declared that she is of great assistance to him as she speaks several different languages and she has been appointed head of the Government Aviation Department since the war began.

In closing his address, Dr. Hudson stated that China does not want war but will defend her own country as any other power would defend herself.

On Eve Of First Election Russians Told How To Vote

Election Is Cited As Showing Unparalleled Advantages Of New Constitution Given People By Dictator Joseph Stalin

MOSCOW, Nov. 4.—On the eve of their nation's 20th birthday, 100,000,000 soviet voters have been told how to cast their ballots in their first nationwide legislative election.

The election of the new supreme soviet, or bicameral council which is to replace the indirectly elected central executive committee that has been functioning all these years, is cited daily in the press as a great socialist event, fitting to commemorate the revolution of November 7, 1917.

It is cited also as showing the unparalleled advantages of the constitution given to the people by the chief of the communist party, Joseph Stalin.

Foreign observers regard the election as one of the few positive products of the constitution. As for such guarantees as freedom of speech and of the press, they know that no Russian would dare utter a word of criticism of the Stalin-regime within hearing of a policeman. They read in the official press that numerous editors have been removed because their papers seemed to deviate

from the straight line of Stalinism.

The election campaign, which is not a campaign of issues and personalities, but one of instruction in voting for government-approved candidates, seems to have done much to take the minds of the people off the wave of executions, arrests, dismissals and stiles, which unspooled in one of the bloodiest years since the revolution.

Thousands of propagandists and agitators have been sent to factories, apartment houses and collective farms over one-sixth of the earth's surface—the area of the Soviet Union—to explain the election law and intensify the mass instruction in voting for "politically reliable" candidates.

Most observers believe the blood purge has strengthened Stalin's power for the elections. Some believe the elections were delayed until the various republics which form the Soviet Union had purged of their enemies.

With many, if not most of the old Bolsheviks out of the way, Stalin and communism are

Labor Blames Duke For Use Of C. E. Bedaux

Inventor Of "Stretch-Out System" Called No Proper Person For Duke's Agent

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The Duke of Windsor will not change his designation of Charles E. Bedaux as his representative on his American tour despite American Federation of Labor criticism of Bedaux, the latter indicated today.

Bedaux said in a statement released through his press representative here that he talked with the Duke in Paris this morning by telephone and that England's abdicated king was "looking forward with all the enthusiasm of a young man to his visit to the United States."

Bedaux's statement was issued shortly after William Green, president of the A. F. of L. said he approved the action of the Baltimore Federation of Labor in criticizing the Duke for his selection of Bedaux to arrange the American itinerary of the Duke and Duchess.

Bedaux, a Frenchman, made a fortune in this country selling the so-called "stretch-out" system in American industry, and as such incurred the opposition of the American Federation of Labor as well as other labor groups. The "stretch-out" system is a means by which the production average of workmen is measured for the purpose of paying bonuses to those who produce above the average.

EZEKIEL LIVED ONCE

When I was asked how I came to write about Ezekiel I had to think for a few minutes, and then I said, "Why Ezekiel is a sort of re-creation of Bud!" And that I told my questioner about Bud.

When my sister and I were very small and lived on a farm in Tennessee, there was a little colored boy always about the place whom everyone called Ezekiel. I do not know where he came from, but he was there, helping about the place, washing dishes, bringing baskets of chips from the woodpile, always happy and polite. He was the one to start the exciting games, to bear most of the blame if tragedy overtook us, to accept gratefully the list of candy or fruit no one else cared for. I do not know if he received any pay for being there, or simply came because he loved us. I know my mother kept him patched and clean, and he ate his meals in the kitchen.

We had a little cousin who lived in Nashville and spent the summer with us in the country. Each summer when the tiny headed fellow arrived Bud behaved, automatically, his private property; his guide, counselor, friend. Bud must be there first thing in the morning, must think of something to play, pick "stickers" out of small, grubby bare feet, stand by the highchair at

meal times to see that the little boy got what he wanted to eat, and when things grew tiresome in the long, hot afternoons Bud must rock him to sleep.

Somewhere, during the business of starting to school, growing up and coming to Florida to live we lost Bud. I know no more where he went than where he came from. Do you think that as the years go by our thoughts turn back more and more often to childhood memories? Mine do.

One day I parked my car near the St. John's River to watch a crowd of darkies fishing. I heard a sudden rollicking laugh; and there was Bud, just as I remembered him; about seven years old, black, patched full of amiles and "manners," able to turn a quick, perfect "cartwheel" from a standing position. Bud reincarnated!

It was not long before this same small darky began to come to my back door to sell things: peas, avocado pears, boiled peanuts. And always after the transaction was made, he would ask in his soft, husky voice, "Is ya got a piece of ole braid 'ya ain't want?" He knew that if I had hot bread, pie or a piece of cake he was welcome to it.

And so Bud came back in Ezekiel. If I should dedicate my little book, I think I would say, "To Bud, very dark to make such a bright spot in my life."

Get Hunting Licenses Early, Urges Ware

It is only a few more days until the opening of hunting season and County Judge J. W. Ware today urged all local sportsmen to purchase their hunting licenses early in order to avoid the last minute stamp-ups.

Up to the present time only a few licenses have been issued, the judge said, and he feels that much trouble could be avoided if the hunters purchase their licenses early.

The license fee this year is \$10 for that which has been shown in previous years; \$12 for a County license, \$2.50 for hunting in a County other than your home county and \$5.50 for a State game license.

These fees apply only to residents of the State, non-residents are required to pay a much larger sum for the privilege of hunting.

In order that the sportsmen might be aware of the regulations governing hunting in the State and the various regulations of Game and Fresh Water Fish has issued a booklet entitled "Hunting regulations" which will be given with each license issued.

Senator Nye Says Forces Working To Upset Neutrality

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Senator Gerald P. Nye contended yesterday the "same forces which were at work destroying the spirit of neutrality and peace 12 years ago are once again engaged at that task."

As a speech prepared for delivery to the Chicago Rotary Club, the North Dakota Senator professed to see a similarity between events preceding United States' entrance into the World War and current discussions on the nation's neutrality policy.

"A desire to retain foreign trade with ill-considered haste, coupled with the adoption of America's pre-war neutrality policy, Senator Nye declared Secretary of Commerce Root recently stated the United States would lose a lot of foreign trade if its policy of neutrality were invoked in connection with the Sino-Japan conflict."

"Would that indicate that there had been any progress brought to bear upon the Department of Commerce, upon the cabinet, upon the President, that they refrain from invoking our present policy of neutrality?" he continued.

"In answer to his rhetorical question, 'Why isn't our policy of neutrality moved?' Senator Nye said:

"Because our present leader has carried a heavy pack over that he created himself... a contraction policy..."

"So there isn't any danger of war through a policy of quarantine? No more danger of war from that than there was in loosening the strings of our neutrality policy 20 years ago, which got us into the war finally?"

Senator Nye said invocation of the neutrality policy depended upon pressure from the people who "drive Congress to the writing of that law."

Five Fliers Killed In Airplane Collision

Civilian witnesses said the accident occurred while the planes were high above the airport, the larger plane circling while the smaller made repeated dives.

Goodsell said: "It happened so fast I don't know what went wrong."

"Everything was going fine," he added. "We were up 3000 to 3500 feet over the field, right up near the clouds. Then, all of a sudden, something happened."

Goodsell landed near the wreckage of the amphibian. Bowman landed several hundred yards away, near the ruins of the smaller plane.

Col. J. Vinton Birch, resident engineer for the Fisher body plant, said both planes seemingly went into power dives, each pilot trying to get under the

other. "They came together with a terrific crash," he said. "The wings of the big plane seemed to fold back and her pontoons fell off. Great pieces of fabric ripped from both planes and were wafted out into the sky."

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's youth army, which has been fighting the Japanese troops, is pouring into the south bank of the Yangtze River, Chinese soldiers reported today. They reported additional reports of non-combatants killed by the Japanese.

A group of influential Chinese officials, including agricultural, labor and commercial organizations, today issued a statement in which they urged Japan to respect Chinese territorial integrity. Japan, they charged, should be recognized as the aggressor in the conflict and held responsible for all consequences of the war.

The Shanghai front in North China was quiet.

Reports from a party of Chinese soldiers who had been in the Yangtze area, have reported that the Japanese had captured a number of war planes and a number of Japanese soldiers.

No. all trials are for political plots. Hundreds are for wrecking traps to prevent plans, or for attempting collective farming by cooperative methods. The latter tend to create discontent with the Soviet regime.

While political scientists find Russia has veered away from international revolution as dreamed by Lenin, its system follows the program of Marx and Engels for state socialism, which Soviet writers describe as a "step toward communism."

Since there is only one party, the communists in Russia, it is within the party that the Kremlin would see possible rivals for power. So dangerous has membership in the party become for any suspected of too much personal political ambition, some foreigners say, that many are believed to have exacted themselves out of the party by failing to pay their dues.

Pravda, the party's newspaper, recently complained that communists had been too busy filling the ranks of members in one city, which had 2,000 candidates for membership in the party, only 201 were accepted.

Of course, one should be very vigilant regarding such applications. Pravda said, "The people are afraid to recommend persons they know quite well."

That the strength of communism and the Soviet regime lies in Russia's youth which knows no other system, is recognized by Pravda and other official newspapers. An active member of the Young Communists League is under way. One reason the vote was given to every citizen at the age of 18, perhaps, was because the young voter could be relied on.

If anything should happen to Stalin and he appeared to lead when he was seen in public a few weeks ago, it is generally assumed the mantle he took from Lenin would be passed on to Andrei Alexandrovich Zhdanov, head of the communist organization in Leningrad.

At the moment, Stalin seems to be in Nikolai Tscholokhov's political politics to carry his policies.

To what degree Stalin's popularity with the public is even now is difficult to gauge as the absence of popular manifestations for Hitler in Germany and Mussolini in Italy, Stalin continued to be idealized in hand-colored portraits and several news references to "our devoted father, teacher and leader."

Florida Brokers Begin New Fight To Remove Black

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—A group of Florida brokers, opening a new struggle to remove Hugo L. Black from the U. S. supreme bench yesterday, blamed stock market "volatility" on doubt as to the legality of the securities and exchange act and appealed to the tribunal to pass judgment on the law.

The action came in a petition filed by attorneys for the Ryan Florida Corp. of Tampa, the Ryan Florida Tex Oil company of St. Petersburg, Inc. Royalties company of St. Petersburg, and brokers associated with the three firms. The supreme court on Oct. 18 refused to review a decision by the fifth circuit court which rejected the contention by the same petitioners that the SEC is unconstitutional.

cause Justice Black, who participated in the verdict, was seated illegally.

The Floridians specifically are attacking constitutionality of the SEC by challenging the authority of the commission to issue blanket subpoenas for telegraphic correspondence. The lower court upheld the commission and it was indicated that Black participated in the supreme court's refusal to review this verdict.

In the petition filed yesterday, the brokers held that Black not only was constitutionally barred from a seat on the tribunal because no vacancy existed, and because he valued to ignore the emoluments of the office while in the senate, but they contended that the former Alabama senator was prejudiced on the issue of blanket subpoenas and thus was not qualified to sit in their case.

They referred to an incident that took place during the senate investigation of lobbying against the utility holding company act. A billiard table for telegrams bearing on the measure was issued by the committee which Black

headed.

Declaring that Black has "settled views," the petitioners said that these views on blanket subpoenas "were and are such as to render Justice Black unable to discharge his strong and fixed bent of mind toward said questions from a fair consideration of these causes."

Because of this contention and still insisting that Black was illegally seated, the petitioners asked that Justice Van Devanter, whom Black succeeded to the bench, be called back from retirement and that he participate in a rehearing of their case. The Floridians explained that unless Black is barred he would "in effect be sitting in judgment upon his own qualifications," and such participation would also render void any decision or order entered thereon.

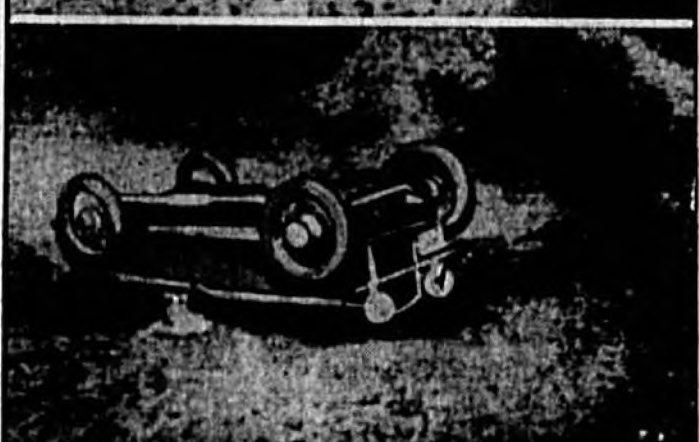
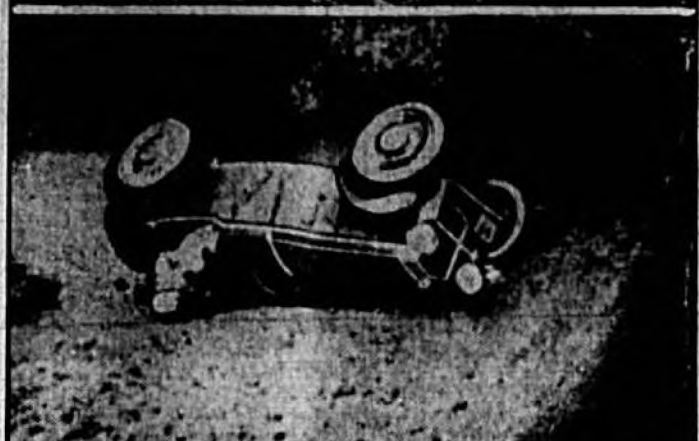

RE A Project Here Will Cost \$48,500

The Florida Public Service Company is sponsoring a Rural Electrification Project in Seminole, Orange, Highlands, Volusia, Lake and Polk counties which calls for the erection of 59.5 miles of lines for the service of nearly 250 rural customers, according to a report received here today.

The project calls for an allotment from the Rural Electrification Administration of \$48,500. At present the REA has approved a regulation from the funds available for this project of \$2,115.32. The money is to be used for construction materials such as poles, wires and transformers.

\$10,000 Cut In Real Estate Taxes Is Made

Jenkins Reports 89 Percent Tax Collection For 1936; Railroads Still Out

Residents of Seminole county will pay \$10,000 less in State and county ad valorem taxes this year than last year, according to the 1937 tax roll recently completed by Sanford Doudney, Seminole county tax assessor.

In spite of the fact that the state ad valorem millage was increased 1 1/8 mills and the general school millage hiked from 10 to 10 1/2, a decrease of \$10,042.91 in the total taxes for 1937 has been afforded the taxpayers of this county, John D. Jenkins said today.

Even with the slight increase in the assessed valuations for the county, the total amount of taxes levied this year is \$307,088.38 as compared with the total of \$317,131.29 for the previous year.

The decrease in the amount of taxes was made possible by three mill reduction in the county road bond and interest sinking fund millage, the elimination of the 1/2 mill levy for the mother's pen

Col. Green's Sister Wins Estate Suit

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Settlement of a long court battle over the \$400,000 estate of Col. Edward H. Green was announced last night by Surrogate Harry E. Owen of Essex County. The surrogate awarded the bulk of the estate to Mrs. Matthew Astor Wilks, a sister who he said in turn agreed to pay \$500,000 to Colonel Green's widow, Mrs. Mabel Harlow Green.

Surrogate Owen rejected the widow's contention that a prenuptial agreement waiving her rights to a dower interest in Colonel Green's fortune was procured through fraud.

He ordered the Colonel's will, naming his sister principal legatee, admitted to probate.

No Argument Yet At Brussels Meet

BRUSSELS, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Conferees on the Chinese-Japanese conflict failed today to reach an agreement on the wording of the peace appeal to be sent to Japan. They adjourned until tomorrow.

Soviet Russia Has Built Largest Army In World With Geo. Cohan

By RICHARD G. MASSOCK MOSCOW, Nov. 5.—In 20 years of preparing to defend herself against attack by capitalist neighbors, Soviet Russia has built the world's largest army.

Its 1,600,000 men (including army, navy, air force, border guards and secret police), its estimated tank force of 4,500, its flying fleet of undisclosed thousands of planes are accepted by military experts as larger than any other today.

What the Red army could do in war, however, remains to be tested. It is one of the questions marks of Europe.

Soviet officials say the men are better physically than ever that they show greater skill in maneuvers, that mechanization has greatly strengthened their might, that they know how to defend the frontiers of the socialist fatherland against fascist aggressors.

Foreign observers in Moscow are inclined to believe here real strength lies in the masses of the Red army.

Diplomats returning to Moscow from summer vacations report that abroad in Europe they found a prevalent feeling that the wave of executions in the current blood purge had weakened Russia as a world power. Some statesmen outside, they said, reasoned that:

1. Either there was treason in the Red army, as charged in the trial and execution of Marshal Mikhail Tukhachevsky and seven other generals.

2. Or there was no treason and the charge that the generals were in the pay of Germany was a frame-up by a jittery dictator to get rid of them.

Weakness was indicated either way, they said.

The official Soviet press indignantly denies such reasoning. It insists the purge, which is supposed to have weeded out 10,000 officers of doubtful loyalty, has strengthened the army.

Foreigners here are inclined to believe the army, whatever its fighting power, now is thoroughly loyal, at least, to the Soviet regime and communism on which it is based.

Much of the mystery about the Red army is due to the exceptional secrecy with which it is cloaked against foreign eyes. With war from the Japanese or Germans constantly feared, it is believed that 400,000 men are kept on the eastern frontiers and 600,000 on the western borders of the Soviet Union. The remainder of the standing army is in home regions.

To reinforce the huge stand army, a reserve of 8,000, 800 to 10,000,000 trained men, who have completed their military service, is maintained.

Russia's defense budget this year was 25,130,329,000 rubles. That is about five billion dollars at the arbitrary official exchange rate, or about \$2,500,000,000 at the estimated actual value of the ruble. No other European country carries such

Japs Capture Four Villages On South Bank

Surprise Attack Is First Decisive Action Since Evacuation Of Chapei

Chinese Officers Belittle Setback

Japanese Tanks Are Active On Broad Front Making Gains

SHANGHAI, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Japanese troops in a surprise attack today drove the Chinese defenders from four villages on the south bank of Soochow Creek. This action was the first decisive engagement in the Shanghai fighting since the Chinese troops evacuated Chapei last week and enabled the Japanese to move 3,000 men across the creek on a line two miles west of Rubicon village.

The Japanese attack, according to a Chinese spokesman who belittled the setback, occurred while the Chinese troops were busy fighting off smaller Japanese units which previously had effected a crossing at Rubicon village about three miles west of Shanghai. Heavy rains greatly curtailed Japanese air bombardments.

Japanese tanks, followed by waves of steel helmeted infantrymen, smashed through Chinese positions today to occupy points within two and one-half miles of the vital Shanghai-Hangchow railway on the southwestern outskirts of Shanghai.

The Japanese also claimed sweeping successes in North China. They appeared to be completing their conquest of Shanai Province after slaughtering thousands of provincial troops and shattering remnants of Gen. Chu Teh's Eighth Route Army, the former Chinese communist army.

Increasing fear in Nanking indicated that the general will of the Chinese people for bitter-end resistance may be wavering. It was learned for example that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek has placed his own trusted leaders in positions of power in all doubtful provinces. They were instructed

London And Hoover Lock Horns On Plan To Call Convention

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—AM M. Landon, G. O. P. presidential candidate in 1936, last night joined with a powerful group of congressional Republicans in an eleventh hour attempt to prevent the calling of a mid-term party convention along the lines proposed by former President Herbert Hoover.

In a letter to Representative Joseph W. Martin Jr. (R-Mass.), who served as Landon's Eastern campaign manager last year, the former Kansas governor said he did not believe that 1937 was an "opportune time" for an off-year convention. If such a convention is ordered, Landon wrote, new delegates should be chosen who would be representative of every shade of opinion in the party "from Mr. Hoover on the one hand to Mr. LaGuardia (mayor of New York) on the other."

Reports in the capital that the proposed convention would not be called immediately were strengthened last night when Chairman John D. M. Hamilton of the national committee said in Chicago that he favors immediate appointment of a G. O. P. policy committee but advocated a delay in selecting a date and site for the off-year meeting.

Sound Movies Seen As Aid To Schools

The possibilities of a sound movie camera as an aid to teaching in the schools was discussed at the meeting of the principals of Sanford schools at the Junior High School yesterday, T. W. Lawton school superintendent, announced today.

Through the courtesy of the Curtis Publishing Co., the Sanford Junior High School has purchased a sound movie camera for use in Sanford schools, Mr. Lawton said, adding that a number of educational films can be procured from the University of Florida Extension Service at a very small cost.

Mr. Lawton said he thought that the movie camera is a useful addition to the school system and stated that he wished the school board was in a position to purchase a camera for each of the schools of the county.
