WASHINGTON, Ed. 5-(/P)-The Trumen Administration asked Congress today to add 4 perclederal income tax rates, double the tax on gasoline and sharply boost levies on cigarettes, automobiles, appliances and other items.

The program, which would hit the pocketbooks of millions of taxpayers, would nearly triple the excise tax on automobiles and more than double the tax on television and radio sets, refrigerators and other appliances.

Three cents a pack would be ackied to the excise tax on eigerettes making the total 10 cents a pack. The excise whiskey would go up about 60 cents a fifth and the tax on an ordinary bottle of
