

Eckerson And St. Johns Battle Tonight

Canners Must Win To Cop League First Half Title

Clubs Play Off Battle Which Ended After Fistic Engagement

The long awaited battle to decide the first half champion of the City Basketball League will take place this evening at 8:30 o'clock when the Eckerson's Cannery and the St. Johns River Line tangle.

Should the Eckersons come through with the bacon in tonight's fracas, the first-half title will be theirs as the win will be their fifth in as many league games. The St. Johns, with four wins and one loss, need to come up on the top side tonight to establish a two-way tie for the initial-half crown, necessitating a play-off later in the season.

The two clubs clashed two weeks ago in a contest which was abruptly concluded after two minutes of play in the final quarter when two players, neither of whom were in the game at the time, attempted to settle a difference of opinion by the gentle art of fistfights. The melee that resulted as others tried to separate the pair, brought about

the unexpected finish of the battle, with the instigator later being definitely removed from activity in the league.

The contest tonight, while it is expected to be hard fought, as the two clubs are bitter rivals, is not anticipated to conclude in a similar manner to that of the preceding one in which the St. Johns were apparently well on their way to a victory, having led practically through the entire playing time and leading 17 to 12 at the time the game was called. The Rivermen, after being held to a 2-2 tie in the first half, had taken a 7-6 lead by half time and in the third period, had extended their margin to 16-12. In the two minutes played in the fourth quarter, the Rivermen accounted for the only tally, a field goal which gave them a five-point edge shortly before the excitement curtailed further play.

Gravett and Young are expected to start at the forward posts for the Cannery with Eckerson at center and Vargas and Fowler in the guard positions while the St. Johns will likely send in Whitten and Kelly on the offensive, Altman as center and Hughes and Kinlaw or Cordell at guards.

The first game of the evening will be the postponed National Guards-B squad contest, slated to get underway at 7:30 o'clock. The Guardsmen, with but one win, that by the forfeit route, in four starts, will give the scholastics a tough fight as they attempt to chalk up their second win. The little Feds have two wins and two losses to their credit for the first half of the season.

Sanford High Defeats Deland Bulldogs Again

Locals Win By 41-21 Score In Contest Here Last Night

Art Williams Is High Scorer In Contest, Tallies 13 Points

Getting off to a slow start which gave the opposition the advantage during the better portion of the first two periods, the Seminole High School basketball team managed to get up steam to come through with a 41-21 decision over the Deland cagers whom the Feds had defeated by a 42-27 count on the Deland floor a few weeks ago.

The visitors broke into the scoring column first to grab a 4-0 lead before the locals tallied once. The lead jumped back and forth for the next few minutes until the locals took matters into their own hands midway in the second quarter, grabbing the lead at 12 to 10 and keeping it for the rest of the battle which was hard fought all the way.

Sample tallied first with an underbasket shot and McMillin followed it up with a successful conversion. Shalburn's foul shot sent the count to 4-0 after which Williams tallied from the right side of the court to give Sanford its initial two points. Zachry's underbasket shot tied the count and two out of three foul shots made by the same worthy gave the locals a 6-4 edge. After Purdon and Morgan entered the contest, playing for the first time in a week due to their suspension along with Phillips, McMillin tapped in a rebound to tie the knot at 6-6. After Del Furguson had missed a double foul attempt the period ended with the count still knotted.

Phillips replaced Del Furguson at guard for the locals at the start of the second period which was opened by Denning's one-handed shot from the right side of the floor. Zachry made an underbasket shot to tie the count again but Sample came through with a similar tally to send Deland ahead, 10-8. Purdon tapped in a rebound to knot the count and Williams, tallying from inside the foul circle, sent the Celery Feds into the lead. Zachry widened the gap with an underbasket tally followed by Williams. Phillips made a shot from beneath the hoop and Deland called for time.

When play was resumed, McMillin missed an attempt from the foul line and Williams made two underbasket shots in succession to give the McLucas-tutored bats a 21-10 lead as the half passed into history.

Purdon opened the scoring in the third period with a pretty one-handed shot from the right corner which even brought a smile to his face. Kicklighter came through with a long shot from mid-court and Phillips made a twi-pley from the foul line. Williams followed it up with an underbas-

ket shot for time again. Resuming play, Morgan made a one-handed shot from the foul line and Kicklighter followed up with a charity shot. Morgan's long shot from the left side of the floor sent the count to 31-13 before the third period ended.

In the fourth quarter, Denning dribbled in for a two-pointer, Page made a one-handed shot from the right side, Kicklighter made one from outside the foul circle and Denning missed a foul shot. B. Furguson and Sample also missed similar attempts following which Del Furguson tapped in a rebound. Sample made a long shot from the right side of the court followed by Buck Furguson's underbasket tally. Stupler also made one from underneath the hoop and Williams tapped in a rebound. Denning's tally from beneath the basket after a fast dribble ended the scoring for the contest.

The play of the locals was fairly good, flashing more or less near perfection from time to time although weak points were prominent. The Bulldogs, although outplayed, were by no means out-fought in last night's encounter.

Art Williams set the scoring pace by tallying six times from the field and once from the foul line for a total of 13 points while Billy Zachry followed with three field goals and two fouls for a total of eight points. Sample and Denning, each with six points, led the attack of the Bulldogs.

The locals will see action again on the Seminole High School court this day night when the Landen Lions, who forced the Feds to the limit to win a 36-21 decision in an extra-period fray at Jacksonville almost two weeks ago, appear here.
