GREAT ALLIED WAR POWER IS PREDICTED

Manila Is Declared Open City As Japs Press Two-way Attack

U. S. Forces Repulse Repeated Thrusts In Lingayen Gulf Section On Luzon

Casualties Are Reported Heavy

Counter Measures Said Under Way By Allies To Halt Foe

(By Associated Press) The Japanese intensified their two-way assault on demoralized Manila, with a heavy artillery fight north-west of the capitol and violent tank battles to southeast where casualties are reported heavy on both sides, the Far East army reported today. "Very heavy pressure" against American and Filipino defenses southeast of Manila was admitted.

The U. S. War Department announced the repulse of repeated Japanese attacks on the main fighting line near the Lingayen Gulf on northern Luzon. General Douglas MacArthur advised he had reorganized and strengthened the defending forces of this area. The situation south of Manila, a heavy reinforcement of invaders is indicated. Brisk fighting is reported from other points on Luzon island.

U. S. forces in the Philippines are under way by Britain, the United States and other allies to reverse Japan's offensive advances in the Pacific. Greatly encouraged by the Philippine fight, the U. S. Army reported today that it had captured a Japanese transport and a destroyer—two off North Borneo and one on a reconnaissance flight.

The U. S. Army headquarters reported today the battle of the Philippines is "going well" on all fronts as Gen. Douglas MacArthur proclaimed Manila an open city to save it from the ravages of assault.

Alarms were raised later by Japanese planes, but they avoided the city proper and headed for outlying Nichols Airport and harbor fortresses. U. S. High Commissioner Francis B. Sayre declared the Philippine fight will be continued "to the last moment."

The two main fronts, in the Lingayen sector some 100 miles northwest of Manila and the Ansonman sector 75 miles southwest of Manila, were stabilized momentarily Thursday, and United States troops were reported inflicting heavy losses on the invaders.

British Capture 13,000 Nazis In Bengasi Retreat

Reds Report 20,000 Germans Killed In Sevastopol Fight

(By Associated Press) The British claimed today more than 13,000 Axis prisoners have been captured in North Africa and that heavy losses were inflicted on German forces attempting to retreat 60 miles south of Bengasi. Russia reported 20,000 Germans were killed in the six day battle at the besieged Russian Naval base of Sevastopol.

The Russians claimed the retreating Germans left 100 more villages behind on the Moscow front Christmas Day.

(By Associated Press) British troops have taken over the ruins of Bengasi, capital of Cirenaica and second largest town in the Fascist North African empire, and air and land forces are hammering on in relentless pursuit of Axis forces into Tripoli.

Capture of the seaport, with its strategic control of the military road and short railway lines into Libya, gave the British control of all Cirenaica, except for some pockets of enemy resistance still being cleared up.

Military observers estimated that most of the tanks of General Erwin Rommel's Libyan force had been wiped out. The wreckage of the Nazi leader's equipment was strewn all along the route of retreat.

Moscow reported stiffening German resistance to the Russian counter-offensive on the Moscow, Leningrad and Ukraine fronts, while in the far southern Crimean theatre a fierce battle raged as the Germans strove to better their way through the last defenses of besieged Sevastopol.

"We are indebted to Mr. Stekete, who is well known locally and has been a winter resident of Sanford for many seasons," Mr. Higgins declared. "We sent him the posters, which he put, without cost to us, on his billboards."

Mr. Higgins has received a copy of the Muskegon (Mich.) Chronicle that he said would be of interest to Mr. Stekete's friends. It is an extra edition, dealing with the former newsworthy of the paper, who have organized a club called the Goodfellows for the purpose of providing underprivileged children with Christmas gifts.

Florida Defense Unit Will Begin Rigid Training

Drill Nights For Company Changed To Each Thursday

Drill night for Company C, 4th Battalion of the Florida Defense Force has been changed from Tuesday to Thursday, effective Jan. 8, E. C. Harper, captain and director of the Seminole County unit which is composed of 65 men, stated this morning.

The fact that there are a number of names on the reserve waiting list of the unit, Harper pointed out, proves the willingness of men in this area, who are not in active branches of the Army, to serve their country.

"The company will continue to drill only one night a week, but training will become more rigid and concentrated now that we are technically in the war. We are gradually receiving additional equipment and the unit is now comparable to the National Guard. These men are to take the place at home of those men who are now serving the United States in camps and bases throughout the nation," he said.

LOAN TO SALVADOR

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Congress Wednesday authorized the president to negotiate a \$450,000 armaments loan in the United States.

Jap Attack On Singapore May Be Intensified

Nipponese Gain One Great China Objective In Capture Of British Hongkong

(By Associated Press) With the fall of Hongkong, intensification of the offensive against Singapore is expected. The British radio reported today a Japanese push is developing down the center of the Malaya peninsula toward Kuala Lipis, 280 miles north of Singapore.

Chinese troops are still on the offensive in the Hongkong area despite the surrender of the British crown colony, but in the interior of China, the Japanese have launched a new drive toward the vital food supply point of Changsha, it was announced yesterday.

Chinese forces have cut the Canton-Kowloon railroad, 10 miles north of Hongkong territory, a military spokesman said, and fighting is now taking place on both sides of the railroad just above the border.

Meanwhile, attention has centered on the defense of British troops holding a line 300 miles north of Singapore against Japanese invasion forces.

Latest official reports indicated that the Japanese drive southward down the Malayan peninsula had been stemmed, with British troops now standing fast in the steaming "green hell" jungle.

"The situation remains unchanged," Far East headquarters said. "There has been some diving-bombing activity by enemy planes. The bombings were very haphazard, causing very little damage and few casualties.

Pier Plans Will Be Submitted To City Commission

Complete plans concerning the construction of a pier and jetty on Lake Monroe will be submitted to the City Commission at its next meeting by City Engineer Fred Williams, it was disclosed today.

The total cost will amount to \$1,047.86 for the pier and \$422.90 for the ramp, according to figures released by Mr. Williams. The City is said to desire the construction as an asset to the City and for the benefit of boatmen and fishermen. Original plans for Ft. Mellon Park included the building of such a pier, so it will be placed off the north end of Chapman Avenue in order to comply with the plans.

109 Men Will Be Drafted To Fill January's Quota

Largest Group Area Asked For Since Draft Beginning

The selective service quota for Seminole County during the month of January is 109 men, according to information received by E. B. Carter of the draft office on Second Street.

Volunteers from 18 to 21 years of age may enlist in any branch of the service only with the consent of parents or guardians, since the regular selective service age ranges from 21 to 35 years, the draft board head pointed out.

Of the quota, 39 white persons will be drafted and 70 colored men. White selectees will be sent to Orlando to the production station for rigid Army examination on Jan. 19 and negroes will leave to take the pre-induction examination Jan. 21.

Members of the local advisory board received information Wednesday afternoon from National Selective Service Headquarters in Washington, in regard to the present situation which reads: "The requirements for manpower in the armed forces cannot accurately be forecast at this time. I am sure of one thing, however, every such requirement will be met fully and wholeheartedly, and when the history of your accomplishment shall have been written, there will be no failure to explain."

Holland Declines To Suspend Boyle On Brady Charges

Governor Declares Drunkenness Shakes Public Confidence

Gov. Spessard Holland declined Thursday either to dismiss or suspend Assistant State Attorney Lloyd F. Boyle either on charges of drunkenness or official misuse of power as filed against him by Representative E. E. Brady, it was revealed today in a letter to Mr. Boyle from the Governor.

Deciding that "an unusually large number of reputable citizens you have made a good record as a public prosecutor. Gov. Holland reprimanded Mr. Boyle for the charge of drunkenness and said that such conduct "breeds disrespect for the court and for the law, aside from its disturbing effect upon the confidence which the public should have in law enforcement officers."

Gov. Holland's letter in full is as follows: "Honorable Lloyd F. Boyle, Assistant State Attorney, Sanford, Florida. "My dear Sir: "On Monday afternoon, Dec. 15, you attended the hearing at my office in Tallahassee on certain charges which had been preferred against you and which developed during the hearing into two specific charges as follows: "1. Public drunkenness in Sanford on two occasions early in this year, as I recall it in February and June. "2. Charge of misuse of your official power through holding open and on the docket for improper purposes an old prosecution against a citizen of Seminole County. The other matters mentioned all happened prior to my administration and were not proper matters for my inquiry.

"I heard the evidence offered at the hearing, which was quite lengthy, and have also read the great mass of correspondence which has come to my office in connection with these charges. "Insofar as the second charge is concerned, I think there was probably a misunderstanding in connection therewith and you assured me that the prosecution in question had not been held on the docket for any improper reason and that you stood ready to dismiss it at once, which I understand you have since done. The matter seemed to boil down, therefore, to the issue of public drunkenness. "I am frank to say that I think

U. S. Has "Inflexible Purpose," He Tells Congress Members At Historic Session

Plotting Of War Charged To Axis

Initiative Will Be Taken Against Foe Sometime In 1943

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—(AP)—British Prime Minister Winston Churchill predicted today the United States and Britain will be producing, within a year or 18 months, "results in war power beyond anything ever seen in the Axis states."

He charged that Germany, Japan and Italy plotted and planned for war. Mr. Churchill, addressing a historic session of Congress, said Washington had an "inflexible purpose" in that the U. S. has well grounded confidence in the war's outcome. By 1943, production "will enable us to assume the initiative on an ample scale," he said.

From the capitol the prime minister returned to the White House and resumed his momentous talks with the President. Meeting sectionally with American officials meanwhile were the 80-odd technical experts who accompanied Mr. Churchill and Lord Beaverbrook, the British Supply Minister, on their unprecedented trip.

The current talks are preliminary. When they get down to tangibles, the other Allied nations—Russia, China, and the Dutch Indies, the British dominions and the Americas—are expected to be brought into council.

Installment Lenders Have To Sign Cards

ATLANTA, Dec. 26.—(Special)—Installment lenders and sellers were warned by W. S. McLaren, Jr., president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, that registration statements must be filed by Dec. 31, 1941. Failure to file firms liable to penalties imposed by that date will render such for operating without a license, as prescribed under Regulation W, the new installment control regulation. Mr. McLaren explained. The licenses are being issued, without charge, upon receipt of the registration statement from the applicants.

Orlando Has Marine Recruiting Station

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—(Special)—In order to meet the demand of the U. S. Marine Corps for more men, a District Headquarters Recruiting Station for Florida has been established at the Florida Bank Building in Orlando.

Commanded by veteran recruiting officer Major A. M. Robbins, the unit expects to furnish at least 300 recruits per month for the Marine Corps which is now driving for 164,000 men. All recruits accepted in Florida, whether enlisting for the duration, or for four years, will be sent to Orlando for final examination and enlistment prior to being transferred to Parris Island. Lynchings

Some hope for the ultimate eradication of the lynching evil is seen in the figures released this week by the Tuskegee Institute in Alabama which show that only four instances of such law violations occurred in the entire United States during the past year. This is one less than in the previous year, one more than in 1939, two less than in 1938, and four less than in 1937.

However, there would have been 19 lynchings this year if officers of the law had not shown the courage to do their duty and prevent them. All except one of these cases where lynchings were prevented took place in the South and reveal the complete change of attitude among law enforcement officers since the old days when negroes were pushed off the rear end of the train directly into the hands of an awaiting mob.

Unfortunately, Florida was one of the states in which a lynching occurred this year. The others were Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina. It is no credit to this state that it ranks with the worst in law violation of this kind. We hope that next year will see a complete change of heart in this respect. As a general rule law enforcement officers can prevent lynchings if they really want to and know the public is behind them.

Is Gambling Necessary?

Speaking as though he meant it, Spessard L. Holland, Governor of Florida, has ordered the closing of "all illegal gambling" in Dade and Broward counties. The territory specified means the Gold Coast of Florida, to which countless Americans flock during the winter for relaxation and entertainment. The language of his order was unmistakable. He directed the Sheriffs of the two counties "to use every lawful means and diligence to close out the gambling and bookmaking establishments and keep them out." The Governor said state investigators would be used to check on conditions and that federal help had been promised.

The action of the Governor draws this editorial comment from the Miami Daily News:

"There are two schools of thought as to the effect a gambling shutdown will have on the tourist season as well as on the general business level of Miami. But there is only one school of thought as to the effect it will have on community morals and also on the economic status of the ordinary man, woman and child. These factors are so compelling it is a wonder we have had to wait so many years for the experiment to be tried. If it is bad for business, that will become apparent soon enough. If it is not bad for business, it will be a priceless contribution to the future to have that information at hand. The Governor has done a big and courageous thing. He can be counted on to carry it through, for he is not only a man of honest convictions, he is a man of unusual courage."

Instantaneous was the reaction of the business leaders of Miami. Many approved the ban. Others, who spoke anonymously, feared the experiment, saying Miami must have a "liberal policy" in order to attract visitors.

We shall have the opportunity, then, to ascertain whether a great winter resort can survive without widespread gambling, its attendant vices, and the infestation of gangsters which inevitably accompanies the operation of "rackets." One would think the sunshine, the beaches, the golf courses, the fishing, the racing with its legalized parimutuel betting, the football and other sports would be all the more attractive to visitors without gambling operated by crooks and gorillas and without the crime and violence their presence foments. It may be that Governor Holland spoke for something more than law and order in his declaration; maybe he spoke for good business, too.—Atlanta Journal.

Good Boys

Three white-haired old men stood watching the parade of troops here for the dedication of Ft. Homer H. Hesterly, new national guard armory being used by the third air force headquarters.

"The boys all look about the same age," said one. "Good husky boys, too," said another. "Yeah, they take the pick of our youth," said the third. "It's bad, but they have to do it—and they will," said the first.

"Yeah," said the two others. Their apparently simple conversation seemed to sum up not only the reaction of the silent crowds which watched the long parade but it seemed a timeless truth which the United States must recognize and act on until that great day when the true spirit of democracy shall banish war from the earth.—Tampa Times.

Education In the South

FLORIDA'S EDUCATIONAL SITUATION

It is said by some of the opponents of federal aid to education that the states should first put their fiscal houses in order. The southern states, those in greatest need of federal aid, have made much of the most notable progress in the nation in this respect.

The southern states lead the nation in the extent to which they depend upon state financial support of public schools in secondary education. Only 19 of the 48 states pay more than 10 percent of the cost of the total funds available for that purpose as compared with less than 50 percent for the nation as a whole. Only one of the 48 falls below the national average. There is no one of the southern states that has not received federal financial aid for its public schools.

When the federal government began its aid to education in 1921, it was not until 1931 that the national average for state aid to education reached 10 percent of the total funds available for that purpose. Today the national average is 16 percent, and the southern states are well above that mark.

from all the evidence that there can be no doubt that you were publicly intoxicated on at least one of the two occasions mentioned and that you have been intoxicated on the other occasion. I think that such conduct on the part of a law enforcement officer is reprehensible and breeds disrespect for the court and for the law, aside from its disturbing effect upon the confidence in which the public should have in law enforcement officers. I certainly trust that no repetition of this offense will occur during your term of office as in such case I shall feel that it is nothing less than my duty to promptly suspend you.

In view of the fact, however, that an unusually large number of reputable citizens of Seminole County state that you have a good record as a public prosecutor and that you should be retained in said position, and in view of the further fact that there were no reprehensible acts of offense reported or complained of as having occurred between June, 1941, and the date of the hearing, Dec. 15, I feel that it is neither necessary nor wise for me to suspend you at this time. I shall therefore, dismiss the case except as to the charge of drunkenness and hold said charge open, subject entirely to your future proper conduct in this regard during your term of office. We all make mistakes and I shall assume, in the absence of future misconduct on your part of the same kind, that this has been a simple mistake which a properly regretted by you as much as anyone else. I invited your co-operation in this matter and will hope that you make an efficient and satisfactory record in office in your official and personal conduct for the remainder of your term.

Free French Action Said Contrary To Recent Agreement

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Gaston Henry Hays, French Ambassador, said today after seeing Secretary of State Hull he had "no reason to doubt that French sovereignty will be re-established and maintained over St. Pierre and Miquelon," two small islands off Newfoundland which were taken over by Free French forces.

The sudden seizure Wednesday of the little islands off the Canadian coast by a Free French force under Admiral Muselier was described by the State Department yesterday as "an arbitrary action contrary to agreement."

The American reaction apparently was in keeping with an agreement made recently with French authorities in Martinique whereby it was hoped to keep French Atlantic possessions out of the opposing war camps, and also keep the harried Vichy government from moving farther toward the Axis.
