

HOOVER BACKS U. S. ENTRY IN WORLD COURT

Especially Significant Is Attached To New And Vigorous Plea By Chief Executive

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(AP)—With the World Court question rapidly assuming the proportions of a foremost political issue, especially significant was attached today to a renewed and vigorous plea for American adherence voiced by President Hoover.

From the chief executive's emphatic expression of the policy of this country, coming soon after the outbreak of opposition which followed the Illinois pronouncement a week ago, was drawn the inference that Mr. Hoover is prepared to wage a determined and aggressive fight for American membership in the international tribunal.

The President's appeal was expressed in an address delivered last night before the Daughters of the American Revolution in addition to his comment upon the court issue, he asserted that American security was fundamentally assured and that the results of the League of Nations conference, reflecting his view that the agreement reached in the British capital meant the abandonment of international rivalry in the construction of an armament.

Asserting that the friction of friction between the nations are ever present throughout the world, Mr. Hoover said that the remedy and the prevention of war lay in the creation of international agencies for regular, methodical disposal and solution of these controversies, so as to insure justice and avoid economic or national catastrophe.

"We need in all of the steps that have been taken to possible these means of amicable international dispute and then said:

"Statement over a generation have revealed that with the growth of international law and precedent, the nations can be confined to the peaceful settlement of a great number of the vital controversies of a world character if in the world had an international court to which all cases could be referred for amicable hearing and judgment, as even need upon law and justice.

Erickson Buys Out Miller's Interest In Funeral Parlor

Mr. Miller has been a member of both the Florida Funeral Directors and Embalmers Association and the State Board of Embalmers for a number of years, serving each as secretary and treasurer for long terms. Mr. Erickson, the former partner of Mr. Miller and the present owner of the funeral home, was born in this city and has resided here ever since. He entered the service of the funeral home in 1912, and in 1926 he became a partner. In 1927 Mr. Erickson passed the examination submitted by the State Embalmers board.

Giant Ford Airplane Lands On Lake Shore Flying Field For Two-Day Stay In City

With Capt. O. M. Goodfield, World War aviator and pilot, at the controls, a giant Ford plane landed on the newly constructed flying field on the lake shore this afternoon to witness the excitement of being the first motor-driven airplane to land on the local field. The ship is being brought here by the United States Army.

The plane, a Ford Model 1A, is a four-engine biplane with a wingspan of 225 feet, a length of 114 feet and a height of 40 feet. It is capable of carrying 100 passengers and is the largest airplane ever built in this country. It is being used for transport and is expected to be used for many years to come.

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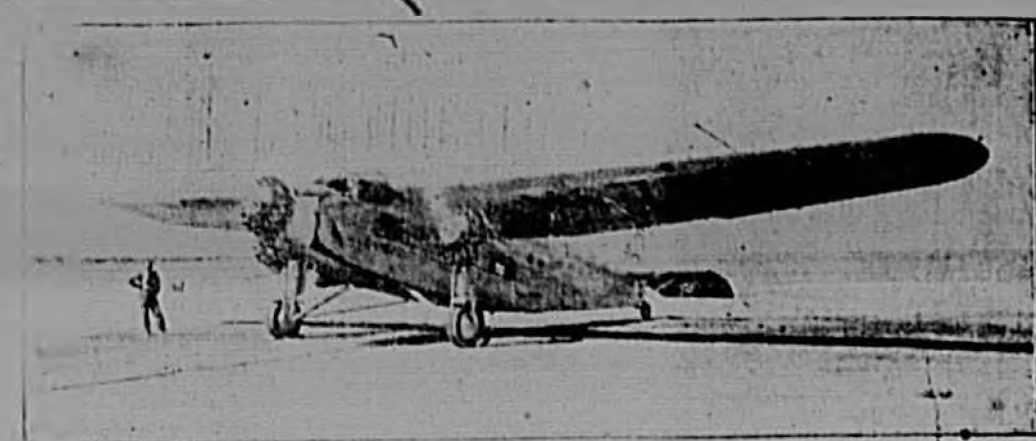
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TRI-MOTORED GIANT HERE

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DRY GROUP IS CRITICIZED FOR LAW VIOLATION

Tinkham States Anti- Saloon League Was Big Violator Of Cor- rupt Practices Act

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(AP)—A charge that the Anti-Saloon League has repeatedly violated the federal corrupt practices act was made today before the Senate lobby committee by Representative Tinkham, Republican, Massachusetts.

Saying the league had collected and expended \$67,000,000 from 1881 to 1926 inclusive, Tinkham testified that only "nominal returns" had been made to the clerk of the House of Representatives, of the sums used for "political purposes."

Tinkham, a wet, demanded that the committee obtain the names of at least 100 large contributors, and that these had never been made public.

He also requested the committee to summon Bishop James Cannon, D., of the Methodist Episcopal church, south and the book and papers of the Southern Methodist church of temperance, and social service, of which Cannon is chairman.

Cannon has informed the committee he would be glad to appear and furnish any information desired.

Tinkham already has requested that the committee investigate the record of temperance production and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church and the federal council of churches.

The witness presented the committee with a table intended to show the money collected and expended by the national Anti-Saloon League and 25 state leagues from 1910 to 1925 inclusive.

Tinkham argued that until 1920 the league was "a corrupt organization" and that its "corrupt practices" were "a disgrace to the nation."

The league and its state subsidiaries are a political committee under the working of the federal corrupt practices act, he contended, and the activities come within the terms of the federal corrupt practices act.

"It maintains a political organization in every state of the union and in many states, New York, and Illinois, notably it maintains expense and extensive headquarters."

The witness also stated that the league had spent \$100,000 in 1926 to elect a candidate for the office of governor in the state of New York.

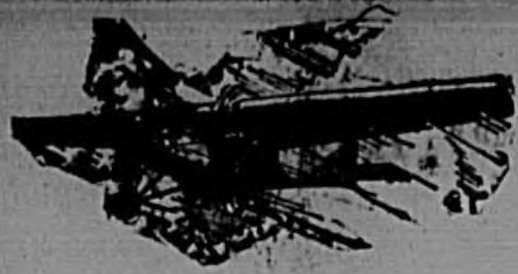
