

Grindle Says He Stands Alone In Opposition

Local Lawmakers Favor Consolidated **Central Florida Expressway Authority**

State Rep. Art Grindle, R-Altamonte Springs, says he stands alone among the representatives and senators representing Seminole County in his opposition to consolidation of Central Florida expressway authorities. The others who favor consolidation say it would mean better funding and faster construction of a loop around greater Orlando that would bisect Seminole County.

Grindle said he isn't sure Seminole County residents want an expressway that would divide Sanford in half, taking out many of the few residential sections left in the city. And he hopes the state legislature won't pass such a bill that would take away control from the individual countles.

In fact, he tried to block introduction of a bill that would disband the Seminole County

Expressway Authority and the expressway authorities of Orange County, Orlando, Lake and Osceola counties. "I was told a bill wouldn't be introduced unless the local delegation was totally in support, and for a while I blocked the measure," he said. "But then I found out they introduced the bill anyway."

The bill was filed last week by Rep. Rich Crotty. R-Orlando, and Rep. Frank Stone, R-Casselberry, and co-sponsored by Rep. Stan Bainter, R-Eustis. and Thomas Drage, R-Winter Park, Grindle said. Bainter, interviewed Friday, said a similar bill was being filed in the Senate by the other Seminole County legislators, senators Richard Langley, R-Clermont. Toni Jennings, R-Orlando, and John Vogt, D-Merritt Island.


Bainter said the house bill, which would disband all area expressway authorities in favor of a Central Florida Expressway Authority that

would supersede all previous expressway decisions, has an effective date of July 1 - weeks before Seminole County's expressway study and decision is scheduled to be complete. But he said he felt Croity would be willing to extend the effective date to Sept. 30 so that Seminole County's recommendation could be taken into account.

"it's my personal feeling that we should go ahead with the bill and make the effective date Sept. 30 after the studies are complete." Bainter said. "We don't want to prevent them (Seminole County Expressway Authority) from doing that study, but I don't want to wait. I'm convinced we need a regional expressway authority and I'm convinced we need to wait until early fall."

He said the Lake County Commission had

But, as the Tass news agency announced, Shultz was in Moscow for a "Dusiness visit." Shultz's special plane touched down at 10:26 a.m. after a 2 1/2 hour hop from Helsinki, Finland, where he spent Sunday preparing for the highest-level U.S.-Soviet contacts in five, months. Shultz emerged from his Bocing 707 clutching a clip board and was greeted by Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Bessmertnyk and Soviet Ambassador to Washington Yuri Dubinin. Without making an arrival statement. Shultz entered a black Chaika limousine and roared away in a motorcade to begin the first round of talks with Shevardnadze.

"It shouldn't have gotten this far," Stump complained, "It's not like I want to build a nuclear reactor or something."

What he does want to build is a 1,100 sq. tt. home in an area zoned such that 1,300 sq. ft. is the recommended minimum.

The dispute arose over complaints from neighbors that the proposed home was incompati-

"Most of these homes were built in the 1950's," Stump said. "The average home in the neighborhood is between 700 and 800 Sq. Ft. and valued at between \$20,000 and \$25,000."

Stump claims his home will be 11/2 times larger than the average home in the area and will cost \$50,000.

'My home will not hurt property values," he said. "If anything it will help them."

As far as the garage goes. Stump says that the house across the street doesn't even have a carport, and that the zoning is such that there is no requirement for one.

Brent Carli, one of the planning and zoning board members who voted for the permit. agreed.

"Our codes say he can build the home," he said, "As a board we should approve it. This is not a spec home. He already has a

Neglected, Abused Children's Home Site On Agenda **Commissioners To Consider County Charter**

Location of a home for neglected and abused children and the possibility of the county going to a charter form of government will be discussed when the Seminole County Commission meets today and Tuesday.

Sharing Concern for Seminole County Shelter Children, Inc. is on today's workshop agenda. Commissioners will discuss the use of Consumers Wastewater property as a site for the shelter home. Last month, the commission turned down

a request to place the home near the county jail and juvenile detention center at Five Points. The alternate site is near the county sewage

treatment plant off Dike Road in south Seminole. At 10:45 a.m. Tuesday, a workshop is scheduled to hear a recommendation for a study to consider charter government. Charter government would, among other things, allow the constitutional officers such as the sheriff to be appointed rather than elected.

County Administrator Ken Hooper is recom-

mending the commission establish a Charter Advisory Committee of nine members and also hire a consultant to advise the advisory committee on various options available to the charter form of government and to recommend a formula for charter development.

Other items on the agendas include refunding of road bonds and several public hearings Tuesday night on rezonings for developments. Kathy Tyrity

Heavy Snow Whitens West

A gusty storm that dumped heavy snow in Rocky Mountain states gained strength as it moved east today, threatening livestock and pounding Kansas with strong winds, heavy rain and hail the size of golf balls.

The storm, centered over northeast New Mexico, dumped 16 inches of snow at Red Mountain Pass, Colo., during the weekend, and up to 6 inches blanketed Beulah. Westeliffe and Silver Cliff in south-central Colorado. Up to a foot of new snow was expected In the southern Colorado foothills.

New Mexico state police dispatcher Mary Archuleta said carly today about 13 miles of state Highway 87 is closed between Raton and Clayton. mainly because of poor visibility in blowing snow.

"We've got blizzard conditions in the area. Visibility on Highway 87 is zero," she said. 'Crews have been out there all night sanding and doing what they can to try to get the highway open. But it's the visibility that's so bad and the crews can't do anything about that.'

Livestock advisories were posted across the upper Arkansas Valley and parts of Colorado, Kansas and South Dakota because of strong winds, cold temperatures and precipitation that were expected to stress young animais.

Showers and thunderstorms stretched from northern Texas across parts of Oklahoma and castern Kansas to the lower Missouri Valley. The National Weather Service said the storm was gaining in strength.

Hall the size of golf balls pounded Cedar Vale and Emporia in eastern Kansas, and a half-inch of rain fell in 20

minutes at Overbrook. Kan., where hall the size of pingpong balls fell.

Winds up to 80 mph blasted Ponca City, Okla., and 50-mph winds and marble-size hall were reported in Douglas County, Kan. Winds gusted to 69 mph Sunday at Tucumcari, N.M., and 68-mph winds were clocked at Guadalupe Pass, Texas.

In the East, rain fell in the lower Ohio Valley and in New York, southern New England, northeast North Carolina and northern Alabama. Winds clocked at 56 mph downed power lines Sunday night around Raleigh. N.C.

In Massachusetts, hit last week by the worst floods in 50 years, the Assahet. Concord and Charles rivers were still above flood stage but were receding, forecasters said. Officials said flood damage in the state might reach \$100 million. Hundreds of families were expected to begin returning to their homes along the Merrimack River, the site of some of the worst flooding. Thousands of acres of farmland in western Massachusetts remained flooded. delaying spring planting.

In Palm Springs, Calif., police are taking a hard line to keep a lid on spring vacation rowdlness that has disrupted this descrt resort city in previous years, but some students say the strategy could backfire. By Sunday afternoon, a beefed-up police force had arrested more than 200 people,

including one woman who stood up in the back of a black Corvette and bared her chest. Most of the arrests involved

Soviet sources in Beijing confirmed an April 3 announcement by Chinese Vice Foreign Minister Qian Qichen that Moscow has agreed to discuss "three major obstacles" which China says are blocking better Sino-Soviet ties.

The obstacles are Soviet troops in Afghanistan, Moscow's support for the Vietnamese occupation of Cambodia and the heavy militarization of the Sino-Soviet border.

A Soviet diplomat said the decision to discuss the three issues and anything else the Chinese wish to talk about - was first announced by Soviet chief negotiator Igor

NATION **IN BRIEF Hinckley Wants Out For Easter** Judge To Consider His Appeal

WASHINGTON (UPI) - John Hinckley Jr., confined to a mental hospital since he shot President Reagan five years ago, is asking a federal judge to let him leave for the first time on an unescorted visit for Easter.

Hinckley was expected to attend a hearing in federal court today before U.S. District Judge Barrington Parker, who is considering the request, which is supported by the hospital and opposed by the government.

If Parker approves the April 19 visit with his parents, it would be the first time Hinckley, 31, has been allowed to leave St. Elizabeths Hospital without an escort since a jury found him not guilty by reason of insanity in 1982.

Court records said Hinckley has not received antipsychotic medication since October and that the hospital believes he "does not pose a danger to himself or others" if

given permission to make the trip. But a copy of part of a letter by Hinckley, filed Saturday as evidence by the government for today's hearing, revealed he planned to escape from the mental hospital.

Aides Plot Reagan Strategy

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (UPI) - President Reagan and his top aides are using this vacation week to plot domestic and foreign policy strategy for the coming months, say officials who accompanied him.

Since the late February resignation of chief of staff Donald Regan and the president's speech and press conference on the Iran-Contra affair, "There is a momentum going and the staff is energized," said one official who asked not to be identified.

Among the advisers summoned to this oceanside resort was long-time Reagan adviser and pollster Richard Wirthlin, who counseled chief of staff Howard Baker against having the president adopt a confrontational tone. with Congress as he tries to reform the budget process, the officials said.

CIA Chief Lied To Prober?

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The CIA station chief in Costa Rica lied to the Tower Commission in January about possibly illegal arms shipments to the Contras, perhaps to protect superiors, sources familiar with the probe say.

Tomas Castillo, the pseudonym of the CIA official, first told a commission investigator that he assisted only with six deliveries of non-military aid in 1986, which would have been legal, the sources said.

But when pressed later that day, Castillo acknowledged that under the direction of Lt. Col. Oliver North, the former National Security aide, he had coordinated nine arms shipments from a private American network to Contra rebels in the spring of 1986, they said.



Soviet officials responded that the issues were non-negotiable and, since they involved third nations in the case of Vietnam and Cambodia. should be settled by the Chinese in direct talks with those countries.

While the Soviets have now agreed to discuss all three obstacles, they still hold that Beijing must deal directly with the other nations involved to seek an actual solution.

"We said we will discuss these issues - not solve them." said a Soviet diplomat. "Some of these problems involve other countries and should be dealt with in bilateral talks directly between them and China.'

But the Chinese argue that without massive Soviet aid. Vietnam would be unable to sustain its 140,000 occupation troops in Cambodia.

The Soviet diplomat said that while Moscow does play a role in Vietnam and Cambodia, it was "impossible" for the Kremlin to influence them on China's behalf.

He said Soviet officials recently acknowledged that the occupation of Afghanistan was a mistake and noted Moscow withdrew six military regiments last October. Beijing initially welcomed the partial Soviet pullout from Afghanistan, which shares a small border with China. but later called it a trick to deceive world opinion.

Bombs Explode On Eve Of Civil War Anniversary

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Two cars packed with timed explosives blew up in a densely populated area of Christian east Beirut, wounding 15 people on the eve of the 12th anniversary of Lebanon's civil war.

The two car bombs blew up within five minutes of each other in the low-income neighborhood of Dora as hundreds of men, women and children - dressed in white and holding candles and leaves of olive trees - returned on foot from a Palm Sunday mass.

The twin blasts, which wounded 14 adults and one baby, destroyed the two booby-trapped cars parked 15 yards apart, said Yousef Bitar, a bomb disposal expert. The explosions also set fire to high-rise apartment buildings, badly damaged scores of shops and burned almost a dozen vehicles, witnesses said.

Bitar said the cars were packed with a total of 125 pounds of explosives. The two bombs, attached to timing devices, were planted under the back seats of the vehicles, he said.

Most of the injured were among churchgoers returning from a Palm Sunday mass at St. Joseph Church, 100 yards from where the cars were parked.

Pope Ends South American Tour

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI) - Pope John Paul II wrapped up a two-week, three-nation visit to South America that was marked by anti-military demonstrations in Chile and his plea for no more political disappearances in Argentina.

The 66-year-old pontiff, who handled hectic schedules in Uruguay, Chile and Argentina with only a few signs of fatigue, celebrated a Palm Sunday mass on the last day of his visit with more than 500,000 faithful on a downtown Buenos Aires avenue. It was the largest crowd John Paul had seen in Argentina.

Sunday's mass was believed to be the first time a pope celebrated Palm Sunday outside the Vatican since the 14th century, when a series of French popes resided in Avignon, France, during a period of political and ecclesiastical turmoil in Italy.

Arrests Follow Woman's Death

JERUSALEM (UPI) - Israeli security forces arrested dozens of Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and Jerusalem following the killing of a pregnant Israeli woman, who was trapped in her burning car, the army said today.

Nine of those arrested were placed in administrative detention for six months, an army spokesman said.

'Dozens of arrests were made last night in Judea, Samaria (the occupied West Bank), and Jerusalem of PLO leaders," the spokesman said, referring to the Palestine Liberation Organization.

The spokesman declined to elaborate on the exact number of people arrested or to say whether it was in direct retallation for the firebombing that killed Ofra Moses, 34. But none of those arrested were believed responsible for the attack.

Nakasone Resignation Sought

TOKYO (UPI) - Japan's leading opposition party urged Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone to resign today after his governing Liberal-Democratic Party took one of its worst defeats in a decade in nationwide local elections.

The call by the Japan Socialist Party, claiming the LDP's election setback was a popular verdict on Nakasone's proposed nationwide sales tax, came after opposition parties made impressive dains in Sunday's voting

The Tetenbaums do own the building where they will be moving in September and that is one of the reasons they decided to move. But Tetenbaum said it's more because of the more viable market for specialty things.

"I think basically the world has gone to specialized shops." said Tetenbaum, who lived with his wife in Sanford for 25 years before moving to Longwood. "Every small town has one of these (family-owned department store), but unless their children are interested in running it. it often goes by the wayside."

When Jacobson opened the store in 1947. Arlene was in high school in Sanford about to meet her husband at a youth group gathering. He. from Orlando. later married her, finished an accounting degree at the University of Florida, did a tour with the Air Force and then joined Jacobson's with his father-in-law in 1957

The Tetenbaums remember when Jacobson had to staff 40 people at a time at the Sanford Avenue store because of all the customers at the Outlet. But most of the business was on Friday and Saturday.

The Tetenbaums have three children: Ron. Atlanta. Terri Siegel Atlanta, and Susan Sayban, Longwood. While all the children are accounting graduates, none of them chose to take up their parents' work.

Tetenbaum said the store had no serious financial problems. "It's just that the children chose not to operate it. And it's a great deal of work managing all the departments with the various items. We had infants, shoes. hats, boys, men's, women's, and accessories... We wanted some-

Israel didn't follow up on Nixon's hint, but years later, when the Reagan White House requested secret action, Israel agreed. The result was the Iran arms scandal.

Confederate Flag Generates New Round Of Controversy

COLUMBIA, S.C. (UPI) - Dispute in the South over the Confederate flag has reached a new crescendo, pitting white conservatives who cling to a symbol of Southern pride against a rainbow of opponents who shun what they call a banner of bigotry.

One focus of the modern battle over the "Southern Cross," originally the battle flag of Confederate troops, is the South Carolina statehouse.

The flag was raised over the building 25 years ago to commemorate the Civil War centennial and has stayed up since. The flag issue has split the community in the past, but recent racial incidents have fueled the dispute as never before.

"I don't think that flag has any more place on top of the statchouse than the flag that flew over the Alamo," said state Human Affairs Commissioner James Clyburn, whose opposition garnered him a death threat.

Clyburn takes the furor philosophically. "It's a battle flag, and I expect a battle," he said,

But state Sen. Glenn McConnell, of Charleston, said the issue is regional pride, not racial pride. McConnell, a longtime defender of things Southern, said he believes opponents do not understand the significance of the banner.

"Their position is based strictly on misin-formation," he said. "It symbolizes not race or hatred but ... the spirit of the South, its pride as a region and so much more."

McConnell seems to have the support of most state residents. A recent poll showed roughly 60 percent of South Carolinians believed the flag should continue to fly, while only 28 percent want to furl the banner.

Clyburn is a newcomer to the anti-flag movement, spurred on last fall by the hazing of a black cadet at The Citadel, a military school, by five sheet-draped whites. In addition, the band plays "Dixle" and students wave Confederate flags at football games there.

State Sen. Kay Patterson filed the first flag protest legislation 10 years ago. "Most people don't really know what it's like, but I have to go down there every day and walk into that chamber and see that flag staring down at me," said Patterson, who is black.

In a compromise bid, Patterson approached the Sons of Confederate Veterans, proposing the flag



leave the Capitol dome in favor of a commemorative flagpole beside the Confederate memorial on the Statehouse grounds. The "Sons of' are a powerful and vocal group with influence over the opinions of traditional Southerners.

'That is just not acceptable," said Jack E. Marlar, past commander of the organization. "South Carolina was the first state to secede from the Union. That was a very noble thing."

The NAACP, however, has called for removing the battle flag from statehouses everywhere.

"We don't need the stars and bars of the Confederate flag as a reminder of days gone by or days that should have been buried," said Earl T. Shinhoster, Southeast regional director of the NAACP.

Merchant Wins The District 7 Player Of Year

Merchant, a product of the Ovledo Little League program, has not seen many pitches to hit this season. Even though Mable has strategically inserted him at leadoff, the switching-hitting standout is consistently fed a ration of dipping curveballs and fastballs out of the strike zone.

"It's frustrating." Merchant admitted Saturday while the Lions were taking care of

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) - With one stunning stroke Sunday, a young boy's fantasy crystalized into reality. Augusta native Larry Mize sank a

140-foot chip shot on the second hole of a sudden-death playoff to capture the Masters championship over Australian Greg Norman, who has finished second or better in four of the last five major tournaments.

"You have big dreams as a child, and mine came true today," Mize said. "I grew up here, and those who live here know what this means. Winning the Masters is the one tournament I'd want to win most. I'll treasure it always.

"To get the green jacket from Jack Nicklaus and beat two such great players (Norman and Seve Ballesteros) in a playoff, it's hard to put into words. I've been trying to think about what to say."

Mize finished at 3-under-par 285 by making an eight-foot birdle putt on the final regulation hole. Norman and Ballesteros both went 3 under with

birdies on the next to last hole, the same site where Ben Crenshaw lost a share of the lead with a bogey.

"I was pretty nervous standing there with them (Norman and Ballestros)," Mize said. "I was happy to be with two of the greatest players, but I wasn't intimidated at all."

Ballesteros dropped out of the playoff when he three-putted the first extra hole. and Mize's chances appeared slim on the second hole when he missed the green by 60 feet.

The 28-year-old Georgian, whose only previous professional victory in more than five years on the PGA Tour was in the 1983 Memphis Classic, made that remarkable chip shot and picked up a check for \$162,000 to send his career carnings past \$1.15 million.

"Jack (Nicklaus) said to me 'This will

open a lot of doors." said Mize. "It's something I'll have with me the rest of my life.'

Mize said that while he used to play at the neighboring Augusta Country Club course, he turned down whatever chances he had to play the Augusta National when he was younger.

"I always fantasized about winning here," he said. "But I wanted to walt to play here until I earned myself a shot into the Masters."

Third-round co-leaders Crenshaw. Roger Malthie and Jodie Mudd, who started out birdle-eagle-birdle Sunday. were 1 shot behind the three playoff participants at 286. The next group, featuring defending champion Jack Nicklaus and former champions Tom Watson and Bernhard Langer of West Germany, were another three shots back at 289.

Norman said Mize's shot was more unbelievable than the one Bob Tway made out of a bunker on the final hole of last summer's PGA Championship to hand the Australian another secondplace finish in a major championship.

"I'd rather see someone make a freakish shot," Norman said, "than have someone win a tournament because someone else bogeyed."

Norman said that when he beat Mize in a playoff in last year's Kemper Open. "That was a different situation. That one went six holes. We both parred the first five and then Larry got into trouble at the sixth hole and that was that."

"I had hoped I might have a shot at the Grand Slam this year." said Norman who led going into the final round of all. four of last year's major championships. "But as long as you get in contention all the time you are more likely to get into that situation," said Norman, who lost the PGA Championship last summer when winner Bob Tway sank a bunker shot on the final hole. "I'd rather see someone make a freakish shot," said Norman, than have someone win a tournament because someone clee bogeyed,' Last year, Norman beat Mize in a playoff in the Kemper Open. That was a different situation," Norman said. "That one went six holes. We both parred the first five and then Larry got into trouble at the sixth hole and that was that. Norman shot an even-par 72 Sunday that was good enough to put the 32-year-old Australian at 3-under 285 and into a playoff with Mize and two-time Masters champion Seve Ballesteros of Spain. 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Mantle Condition 'Serious' After Chest Pains

IRVING, Texas (UPI) - Former New York Yankees great Mickey Mantle was in serious condition Monday in Irving Community Hospital where he was taken Sunday night by paramedics from Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport, officials said.

Mantle began complaining of shortness of breath and severe chest pains while en route from New York to his Dallas home, and was met at the plane by medical personnel when it landed at 9:04 p.m., according to airport spokesman Joe Dealey Jr.

"He was evaluated at the scene by our medical personnel and taken to Irving Community Hospital, where he was admitted," Dealey said Monday.

Mantle arrived at the hospital's emergency room and was placed in the telemetry unit where his condition was being monitored, hospital spokeswoman Sharon Peters said.

Peters said Mantle was in serious condition but emphasized he had not suffered a heart attack.

Mantle, a switch-hitter, joined the Yankees in 1951, and his combination of power and speed made him heir to the pin-striped tradition of Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Joe DIMaggio.

The Hall of Famer finished his career in 1968 with 536 home runs. third highest in history at the time. and now seventh on the all-time list. Some of his homers are ranked

among the longest in history. One blast was estimated to have flow 565 feet.

Mantle played on some of the greatest teams in baseball history. During his first 14 seasons, the Yankees won 12 pennants.

The Oklahoma native finished his historic career with a .298 lifetime batting average and won three Most Valuable Player Awards, including one in 1956 when he captured the Triple Crown with a .353 average, 52 homers and 130 RBI.

He batted .300 or better in 10 seasons, led the league in RBI in

1956 and won four home run titles. He played in 12 World Series, hitting .257 with a record 18 homers, and 40 **RBI in 65 Series games.**

In 1961, Mantle hit 54 homers only to be eclipsed by friend and teammate Roger Maris, who set the all-time single-season mark of 61.

Mantle was cursed with bad knees that hampered his career, especially in the latter years, and he also suffered shoulder and hip problems. Pain was part of his game.

"He led the league in a lot of things in different years." Yankee official Jackie Farrell once said. "But he led the league in manhood every year."

Although a country boy from Spavinaw, Okla., who liked hillbilly music, Mantle had some Ruthian

playboy in him. His favorite afterdark companion was fellow Hall of Famer Whitey Ford and such funlovers as Hank Bauer and Billy Martin were among his friends. That group, along with eatcher Yogi Berra and pitcher Johnny Kucks, were involved in the so-called "Battle of the Copacabana" - an incident in a famous New York night club - that resulted in the Yankees trading Martin.

Mantle, born in Spavinaw on Oct. 20. 1931, was brought up to be a baseball player by his father, whose hero was former Detroit Tiger star catcher Mickey Cochrane, Mantle was named for Cochrane and his father nurtured his baseball skills as a boy.

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
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

Titanic Survivors Attend Memorial Service

WILMINGTON, Del. (UPI) -Nine survivors of the Titanic sinking got together after 75 years and heard "Nearer My God To Thee" played again at a memorial service for the 1,500 victims of the worst accident in maritime history.

The hymn was played by the Titanic's orchestra to calm passengers the night the "unsinkable" ship was sinking in the North Atlantic on its maiden voyage from Southampton. England, to New York.

Each of the survivors attending the memorial service Sunday lost relatives aboard the Titanic. the biggest and most luxurious passenger ship of its time. Edith Brown Haisman, 90, of Southampton, was 15 when her father kissed her and her mother goodbye as they boarded a lifeboat and said he would see them in New York. She re-

membered the elegantly dressed musicians performing to calm the fearful passengers scrambling into the ship's too few lifeboats.

"When I was standing up on the deck the band was playing. And as the Titanic was sinking it was playing 'Nearer My God to Thee.' That band played right up until the last minute," Halsman said.

Her lifeboat was about a half mile away when the Titanic finally sank on April 14, 1912. taking the orchestra, her father and more than 1,500 passengers to their deaths. Only 700 people survived and fewer than two dozen of those are still living.

"My father kissed both of us. He was smoking a cigar. He said. 'I'll see you in New York.' We never saw him again." Haisman recalled.

The memorial service reenacted the interdenominational Day Is Over."

Author Erskine Caldwell Dead At 83

SCOTTSDALE. Ariz. (UPI) - 1933. Caldwell continued his Erskine Caldwell, one of the world's most widely read authors who outraged many fellow Southerners with such earthy novels as "Tobacco Road" and "God's Little Acre," died during the weekend after a long battle with lung cancer. He was 83.

Caldwell, whose books were translated into more than 40 languages and sold more than 80 million copies, died Saturday night at his Paradise Valley home near Scottsdale.

A spokesman said in keeping with a family request for privacy, details of Caldwell's death and interment will not be disclosed. But it was known Caldwell, a heavy smoker, had several operations for lung cancer over the years and received extensive chemotherapy. It was the tall, outgoing Caldwell's pungent use of sex and language, his acute social comment and his prolific output that brought him early success and kept him among the world's most widely published authors for decades.

Following the enormous successes of "Tobacco Road" and "God's Little Acre" in 1932 and

steady one-book-a-year pace. The titles included "Trouble in July." "Tragic Ground." "The Sure Hand of God," "Love and Money" and "This Very Earth."

"God's Little Acre" was once the champion best-seller and still ranks 10th on the all-time fiction list, despite having been banned in Boston and reviled by many critics.

"Tobacco Road." dramatized by Jack Kirkland, opened on Broadway in December 1933 and broke box office records with an eight-year run of 3.182 performances. When it opened in Chicago in 1935, Mayor Edward Kelly called it obscene and shut it down. It later played in London and in 1941 was sanitized by Hollywood into a movie directed by John Ford from a script by Nunnally Johnson.

A screen version of "God's Little Acre" appeared in 1958. Some critics considered Caldwell's nearly 50 volumes of short stories his best work.

Collections of them appeared under such titles as "American Earth." "We Are the Living" and "Kneel to the Rising Sun." Caldwell's autobiographical

books included "Call it Experience" in 1951, and "With All My Might," published this year. Caldwell was born the only

child of a Presbyterian minister on Dec. 17, 1903, in Moreland. Ga. He had little formal schooling as his father moved from area to area, primarily in the South. Much of the time he was taught by his mother. Caroline.

While attending the universities of Virginia and Pennsylvania, Caldwell bounced around in a number of jobs. working in a pool hall and a variety store and selling underwater land in Alabama.

In Who's Who. Caldwell listed his occupations as "cotton picker, stage hand, professional football player, book reviewer. lecturer and motion picture screen writer."

Asked what advice he had for people considering a career as a writer, Caldwell told United Press International in the 1960s, 'I'd probably advise them not to. It's tough."

He spent one year as a cub reporter on the Atlanta Journal in 1925 before heading for Maine, where he gave himself five years to become a novelist.





DEAR READER - Diabetes is now classed as either type I (insulin-dependent) or type II (non-insulin-dependent). In the first type, diabetes develops relatively early in life, complications (such as acidosis, eye problems and arteriosclerosis) are more common and patients require insulin injections to control blood sugar.

In type II, the pancreas (which produces the body's own insulin) seems to wear out. Patients with this form of diabetes are older, have fewer complications and can be treated with diet alone or with anti-diabetes pills; insulin injections are not needed. Many people, as they age, tend to exhibit high blood sugars that result from being overweight or eating too many sweets. If they restrict their sugar intake (and . lose weight), these people usually will not require medi-

cine. The glycosalated hemoglobin test measures the specific fraction of glucose that is attached to hemoglobin, the blood cells' red pigment. It gives a general indication of an average bloodglucose level for the preceding several weeks. This is unlike the traditional blood-sugar determination, which indicates the specific glucose value at a given moment.

Evidently, your type II diabetes is under satisfactory control; your glyco-hemoglobin is normal, your afternoon blood glucose is normal and your fasting sugar is only minimally elevated. Continue your present program and check with your doctor periodically.

For the sake of completeness, I should add that there are two other forms of diabetes: types III
