## GOP cronyism? Verbal barbs fly

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The latest edition of the Seminole County Republican Executive Committee Stampede newsletter contains an angry challenge from Committee Chairman Jim Stelling.

Stelling said Wednesday that he wants his

fellow Republicans to quit fighting each other - and putting down attorney Ken Wright.

Although Stelling names no one specifically in the newsletter, there's an index notation from editor Bob Lewis: "Are you listening, Dick and Grant?"

The reference is to Seminole County Commissioners Dick Van Der Weide and Grant Maloy, who have opposed the hiring of Wright's

law firm - Shutta & Bowen - to handle litigation against the adult entertainment industry.



## A piece of movie history in Sanford

SANFORD - People driving past the Sanford Boat Works and Marina at 4130 Celery Avenue may wonder why a shrimp boat is docked there. Some may also believe the boat looks somewhat familiar. If so, they may recognize the "Jenny", the shrimp trawler featured in the movie Forrest Gump. Gump, along with former Army buddy "Lieutenant Dan" had a number of adventures in the award winning big screen epic.

The trawler arrived early this week after a four day trip from Beauford, South Carolina, down the St. Johns River, to the Ma-

rina, at the intersection of E. Celery Avenue and CR-415.

The trawler has been housed at the marina where plans are under way toward determining the amount of restoration and repairs which may be needed. It's life in salt water has clearly taken a toll on the integrity of the structure.

The aim is the eventual display of the boat in the lagoon surrounding Planet Hollywood Walt Disney World, which officials say will add to the extensive collection of film and television props at the attraction.

Forrest Gump has been listed as one of the top 10 money-earning motion pictures ever made.

## Heist bags \$300,000 in jewelry

SANFORD - Four suspects heisted a briefcase of jewelry and jewelry items from the Zales Jewelers at Seminole Towne Center Wednesday afternoon. The briefcase was carrying \$300,000 in property.

Around 3:37 p.m., an independent contractor/supplier with the briefcase went into Zales Jewelers. The supplier set the bag down for a moment leaving it open for the perpetrators. One of the suspects distracted the supplier and store employees while his accomplices took the briefcase. The suspects then exited JCPennys where getaway cars were waiting.

According to Sanford Police, one getaway car is supposedly red in color with a California license plate. The first three digits of the plate are 3SC. One suspect entered a black, sporty looking type vehicle that also pulled up to the door. Both cars left in an unknown direction.

Sanford Police have also released descriptions of the suspects:

Suspect 1: A Hispanic or Greek male at five-foot, two-inches weighing in at 150 pounds. He has a medium to dark complexion with a rounded face and wide nose. He has dark curly hair with a

regular cut. He had a thin mustache as well. He was wearing dark green shirt with collar and khaki long pants.

Suspect 2: A Hispanic or Greek male at 6 feet weighing between 175 to 180 pounds. The suspect has a thin build with a light olive complexion. He has dark hair cut close. The suspect was wearing a light tan button down shirt and light pants.

Suspect 3: A Greek-looking male between five-foot, five-inches and five-foot, six-inches weighing between 150 and 160 pounds. The suspect has a medium build and is light in complexion. He also has dark hair. He was wearing a green and white small checkered button down shirt with a collar. He was also wearing a white T-shirt and light colored jeans.

Suspect 4: A Hispanic female at five-foot, five-inches weighing about 120 pounds. She is small and petite with a medium to dark complexion. She has black curly hair that goes to the middle of her back. She was wearing a white lace shirt, white jeans and carrying a large black hand bag.

Sanford Police are currently pursuing leads, but there is nothing solid yet. Police are asking for anyone who has any information to call the station at (407) 323-3030.

## School lunches not what they used to be...they're better!

Lunch just ain't what it used to be.

Remember back when you were in high school? The menu consisted mainly of mystery meat with a couple of sides of overcooked vegetables, a white bread roll and some sugary snack or canned fruit?

You probably didn't eat much of that bland fare if you even went to the lunchroom at all. These days, kids are flocking to the cafeteria, which is designed to be more like an inviting food court at the mall than the epicurean dungeons of yore.

"We want to present a more pleasing product for our customers," said Seminole County Public Schools food service coordinator Donna DeLoach. "The students really are our customers and we are aiming to find the kinds of

things they like to eat that still meet the dietary guidelines set by the federal government."

DeLoach added that the food court approach with a variety of different foods in a fast food environment is appealing to the students.

"The number of students who purchase meals has increased 25 percent in the last two years since we instituted this program," she noted.

Five of the county's seven high schools have opened food courts. The cafeteria at Lyman High in Longwood will require substantial renovation and the new Winter Springs High cafeteria will need to be redesigned before either of those schools could open a food court.

In January, both Oviedo High and Lake Brantley High in Altamonte Springs opened the new style facility to rave reviews from the students.

### Appeal denied

**TALLAHASSEE** - The appeal against the death sentence for convicted murderer Judy "Black Widow" Buenoano has been denied. Her lawyers appealed on grounds that it was unconstitutional to execute a female.

In its decision, the State Supreme Court determined that it was not unconstitutional, and that Buenoano should be executed as scheduled for 7:01 a.m. Monday, March 30.

Another appeal against the death sentence was denied. Gerald Stano, convicted of being a serial killer, will be electrocuted as scheduled at 7 a.m. Monday, March 23.

### Library money

The Seminole Library System has received a check for \$198,132.50 from the State Library of Florida. The check was given in accordance with a state statute which provides funding of county library systems.

According to Suzy Goldman, director of the county libraries and leisure services, this is one of two checks of equal amounts given to county systems each year. Another check for the same amount should be delivered within a few months. Goldman said the check will go into the library's general fund. She added, "We use this state aid to maintain the level of service that our customers have become accustomed to."

### Bird lovers wanted

The Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission is seeking people in Seminole and surrounding counties who have a bird feeder and can identify backyard birds. The program is called "Project Bunting Watch."

"We need people who maintain at least one bird feeder and live in the 10-county study area, to watch their feeders for a minimum of 30 minutes per week and collect data on what types of birds visit the feeders. It is important that participants are able to identify common backyard birds," said education special-

ist Jont Blakeslee.

Project Bunting Watch has been ongoing since 1996. Last year, 201 bird watchers participated. This year, the commission hopes to obtain 500 participants.

### Red Cross says thanks

Lynn Hinson, Board Chairman for the American Red Cross of Central Florida, this morning acknowledged and thanked the citizens of Central Florida for remarkable support following the tornadoes that devastated the area late last month.

"This community's generous contributions to help the victims of the recent Florida floods and tornadoes, as well as victims of other disasters, have helped us meet the urgent needs of our community," she said.

According to the latest figures, the tornado team has supplied 162,405 meals and snacks to victims and workers at the tornado site, including 133,995 yesterday alone.

Thus far, the Red Cross has received approximately \$3 million in donations.

# Two area groups staging musical events

## Guys & Dolls

The title speaks for itself. It's about guys and dolls. The stuff theater magic is made of. What the title doesn't tell us, the subtitle does: "A Musical Fable of Broadway".

When Guys and Dolls opened at Broadway's 46th Street Theatre on November 24, 1950, the next day's papers proclaimed Guys and Dolls "a perfect musical comedy." With music and lyrics by Frank Loesser and book by Jo Swerling and Abe Burrows II won the Tony Award for Best Musical in 1950. Forty-two years later in 1992 it won again, this time for Best Revival.

Guys and Dolls opens in brash Runyonland - the comic book Time Square of a hayseed's dreams - where cops, con men, slinking lasses, ladies of dubious morals and Salvation Army types parade. Nathan Detroit, a harried but avid gambler, has to raise \$1,000 to front the floating crap game he runs. Nathan bets the dashing Sky Masterson that Sly can't get the prim Sarah Brown, who runs a shabby Save-a-Soul mission to fall for him. After Sky sweeps Sarah down to Havana for a rendezvous, they fall for each other. Meanwhile, Nathan keeps jilting Miss Adelaide, the nightclub chanteuse to whom he has been engaged for 14 years, giving her a fierce case of psychosomatic sniffles from never marching to the altar. After appropriate comic complications, Nathan gets his game. Sly comes down to earth, Sarah saves a soul and Adelaide gets rid of her cold.

The musical is being presented by the Wekiva River Players March 20, 21, 22, 27, 28 and 29, 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday evenings, 2 p.m. Sunday afternoons at the Winter Park Ninth Grade Center

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## Get shots now for 7th-graders

Middle school nurses and guidance counselors in Seminole County are working together to inform current 8th graders of changes in immunization requirements for 7th graders in the 1998-99 school year.

The Department of Health and Department of Education changes mean it can take up to 6 months to complete the Hepatitis B series.

The requirements are:  
• T.D. booster (tetanus, diphtheria) unless a booster has been given in the past five years. This booster is not optional.  
• Second measles (preferably MMR)  
• Hepatitis B series (#1 given - #2 due 1 month later - #3 due 6 months later)

These immunizations must be completed before students can enter 7th grade next school year.

Students should take the completed Florida Certificate of Immunization (680 blue form) to his/her Middle School by May 1, even if the shot series is in progress.

These immunizations can be given by your family healthcare provider or the Public Health Department located at the following addresses: Public Health Department, 400 W. Airport Blvd., Sanford, FL 322-2724 or Public Health Department, Wilshire Plaza - S.R. 436, Casselberry, 331-4020.




## Eggs-actly physics

## National gas prices dip to 30-year low in March

HEATHROW - National gas prices are the lowest since 1959.

In Florida, AAA Auto Club South reports that the average price for Self-Serve Regular Unleaded is \$1.049 per gallon, down 3.6 cents from the February average of \$1.085 per gallon. This month's average is 22.3 cents less than it was one

year ago.

"The dramatic drop in prices continues due to falling crude oil prices, high inventories and a steady downturn in domestic demand for gasoline and heating oil," said Yoll Buss, manager of traffic safety for AAA Auto Club South.

This month, the lowest reported price for Self-Serve Regular Unleaded gasoline in Florida was 98.1 cents per

gallon in Port Richey, and the highest price was \$1.159 per gallon in Naples.

Here are the results of the March Fuel Gauge Survey: SELF-SERVE

Self-Serve Regular Unleaded prices fell 3.6 cents to an average \$1.049 per gallon. Mid-Grade Unleaded prices dropped 3.1 cents to an average \$1.180 per gallon, and Premium Unleaded prices decreased 2.4

cents to an average \$1.251 per gallon.

### FULL-SERVE

Full-Serve Regular Unleaded prices dropped one-tenth of a cent to an average \$1.512 per gallon. Mid-Grade Unleaded fell nine-tenths of a cent to an average \$1.603 per gallon, and Premium Unleaded prices dropped two-tenths of a cent to an average \$1.692 per gallon.

## Teens study teaching- firsthand

LONGWOOD - Lyman High Schools' Family and Consumer Science Program recently sent 40 juniors and seniors into 10 Seminole elementary schools to job shadow.

Early Child Care Education II teacher Dorene Roloff reports students spent a full day at the elementary school of their choice. Grades ranged from Pre-K through 2nd grade. Roloff also sponsors Lyman's Future Educators of America (FEA).

The recent experience was coordinated by the Dividends Office of Seminole County Schools. Some students job shadowed with their own former elementary teachers.

FEA members Robin Berry and Caity Potts, who both plan to teach elementary school after college, were among those who job shadowed. Berry selected Longwood Elementary because of her younger sister attending there. "I've wanted to be an elementary teacher since entering high school." She provided students "individual attention a teacher is too busy to do." Her experience with first graders "reinforced the fact you need a lot of patience."

The experience changed per-

ceptions, too. "It really opened my eyes about heterogeneous grouping. I think it holds a lot of students back and it discourages the ones who can't keep up. It frustrates them."

Lyman senior Caity Potts is taking both Child Care II and Child Care III because "I want to finish before I get out of high school." She will enter Seminole Community College in the fall. She will stay at UCF until she has her Ph.D.

She spent her day at Geneva Elementary in second grade where she hopes to teach someday. Why 2nd grade? "Just that age--an age when you're reviewing what you've learned. They have realistic ideas, but their imagination is soaring. It's fun."

She, too, was impressed with the amount of patience required of a teacher. "Kids are difficult. You have to know how to talk to them." She reports no negatives in her experience. "Kids are really open. They accepted me as soon as I got there."

FEA sponsor Roloff said the students "came back motivated, enthusiastic and had positive experiences to share."

Laughing, she also added that after a full day of shadowing a teacher, almost all of them went home and took a nap.

**Progress and shopping**

Herald staff writer David Frazier recently wrote about two long-time businesses in Oviedo, A. Duda and Sons, and Nelson and Company. Both have been operating since the early 1920s, and they are still going strong.

We see this as proof that commercial progress in a community doesn't always mean old businesses will be wiped out as some may believe.

Several years ago, when a major mall was first proposed in Sanford and most recently in Oviedo, there were nay-sayers who predicted the shopping centers would destroy downtown or area shopping. Now that the Seminole Towne Center is in operation, Sanford people, (most of them at least), know this isn't the case.

True, many businesses in downtown Sanford have closed doors, unable to keep up with competition at the mall. But there are others, some of which are indeed in direct competition, who are still thriving.

In most cases where this has happened, it was a matter of the earlier established businesses making plans for improvements. These may have included a new paint job; better window decorations; more modern lines of merchandise; and longer hours of operation.

A decade or more ago, people looking for (as an example) new clothing in downtown Sanford, might have found items which hadn't been in style for years. Yet they were available and were purchased.

Now, with competition from the malls, town merchants find it necessary to come up to modern standards and no longer hold merchandise from year to year, leading customers to believe they are the latest styles.

As a result, everyone has benefited, regardless of whether the shopping is at the mall or in the downtown and surrounding areas of the city.

Looking specifically at Sanford, there are a number of businesses which no longer exist. Their buildings have become antique shoppes or specialty shops. But customers need these offerings as well.

Again, everyone benefits.

Stopping commercial progress is similar to stopping your children from growing to adulthood. It is something we must expect. Likewise, we must expect that changes will be made as a result.

Learning to live with these changes should be the responsibility of not only the shop owners and operators, but of customers as well. There is nothing wrong with shopping at the mall. Likewise, there is nothing wrong with shopping downtown or in the outskirts.

It's not just the new look that is attracting the students, though. It's the food.

From pizza to bagel sandwiches, from soups to salads, there is something for everyone, DeLoach said.

"If they just want a plain bagel and cream cheese that's only \$1," DeLoach explained. "If they get a sandwich and chips and a drink, of course it's going to be a little more."

Food service coordinator Linda Daniels said students will eat what they like so the food service staff tries to give them a wide variety.

"Some kids want a donut and coffee. We try to emphasize the bagels and fruit juice which are

better for them by displaying those things more prominently, but if they want donuts and coffee, we have that too," she explained.

**Arrests made for child neglect**

FERN PARK - A mother and father have been arrested on child neglect charges. Seminole County Sheriff's Investigators Bill McNett and Andrea Slaby arrested Debbie S. Footman, 28, and her boyfriend Thomas H. Goings, 47, on Wednesday.

According to Sheriff's Lieutenant Jack Cash, deputies were originally called to the couples home at 222 Temple

In Fern Park, in response to a complaint that the woman had burned her child's hand on a stove.

"We tried to contact the two of them and went by the home several times," Cash said. "Finally, on one of our attempts, we saw a child looking through the window."

During the investigation however, it was determined that the two children, ages five and six, had been locked in the home unattended. Cash said the children were not able to

leave the house due to dead-bolts on the door. "However," he said, "they had full run of the inside of the residence."

Due to the potential of injury to the children being in the residence unsupervised, the mother and her boyfriend were each charged with child abuse (neglect). The mother and her boyfriend reportedly returned to the house while deputies were conducting their investigation.

Regarding the original complaint, Cash said that during a

post-arrest interview, deputies determined that Footman had earlier reportedly burned her son's hand on a hot stove. In an effort to teach him a lesson about trying to take a hot-dog which was being cooked. "Apparently she wanted to prove to him that someone could get burned touching the stove or taking hot food," Cash said.

In connection to the hand burning, Footman was given an additional charge of aggravated child abuse.

"A few members of our party, for strange and totally selfish reasons, have made it their mission in life to ruin Ken's reputation," Stelling wrote.

Stelling contends that the "few members" are trying to convince the public that Wright was not worthy to be hired by Seminole County in the legal fight against two renegade adult entertainment establishments.

"The most recent attempt by these Republicans," Stelling said, "was to feed half-truths and innuendo about Ken to a less-than-ethical reporter at Channel 9. It also didn't bother these Republicans to try and harm the reputation of another outstanding Republican, Commissioner Daryl McLain."

Stelling said that accusations continue that there is something improper or unethical about Wright and McLain owning a houseboat together, even though the Ethics Department for Florida found no ethics violation.

"These Republicans apparently only care about power and control and have no qualms at all about character assassination," Stelling said.

Maloy said today Stelling appears to be "very nervous and

paranoid about Channel 9's investigative report into politician cronyism in the Seminole County." Maloy suggested the GOP boss take his complaints to Channel 9.

Van Der Weide called the episode "Pure Jim Stelling — the best thing he could do is read the job description for Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee. The chairman is supposed to keep things on a level playing field. All he's doing now is showing his bias," Van Der Weide said.

At the end of the newsletter report, Stelling wrote, "I'm proud to call such an ethical and fine person as Ken Wright my friend. I do apologize for the negative tone of this column, but I am compelled to defend this fine Republican."

Stelling said that several of what he calls the "Old Guard" of Republicans were warned in the 1970s and 1980s that the party's real problems would begin when it became a majority in Florida.

"They were right," he said. "We have not had one single Democrat elected in Seminole County so now Republicans are fighting Republicans."

There are two commissioners races this year as Commission Chairman Randy Morris and Commissioner Win Adams seek re-election. They are opposed by Bob West and former commissioner Carlton Henley.

The political spring season has begun, some of it at public hearings where no one needs a scorecard to know who's who.

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - If you tried getting anywhere near the batting cages at the Lake Brantley Big Blue Bonanza baseball tournament Tuesday night, well, you might not have gotten anywhere near it.

Dozens of scouts from colleges and major league baseball teams were stacked around the cages as Lake Brantley shortstop Felipe Lopez and Seminole outfielder Tim Raines let's dispense with the Junior stuff, he's earned his individualism) took batting practice.

On another side of the field Seminole's Clyde "C3" Williams took infield practice while Lake Brantley pitcher Robbie Sitz got ready to warm up. Seminole pitcher Lance Odom was resting for his start on Wednesday.

What did they all have in common?

Well, in a few months, they could all be making an awful lot of money. All of them are seniors and all of them are being pursued by the big boys.

Lopez, Harris, Boeshko carry hosts to Big Blue crown







What causes colds?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please settle a family dispute. I believe that a cold is caused by a virus that is passed from person to person through coughing and sneezing. My husband claims that people get colds if they go out without a jacket or go to bed with wet hair. Who's right?

DR. GOTT

DEAR READER: You are. The cold virus is spread by person-to-person contact via water droplets from infected nasal-oral secretions. Thus, you can catch a cold if you are in close proximity to an infected person who sneezes or coughs. The cold virus can also be spread by kissing and by hand-to-mouth contact. For instance, if a cold-sufferer blows his nose and then opens a door, he may leave sufficient virus residue on the doorknob for another person entering the room to get the viruses on her hand, later spread the viruses to her nose or mouth, and come down with a cold several days later.

Going outside on a winter day without a coat (or to bed with wet hair) does not cause colds. However, whether we develop symptoms of a cold often depends on the strength of our immune systems. Becoming chilled or overtired can weaken our immune systems and thus make us susceptible to a variety of virus infections. Therefore, your husband is on the right track, although he is technically incorrect.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Because of severe asthma, I have been prescribed prednisone for many years. I am now 72. Should I have a bone density test?

DEAR READER: Without a doubt. Although prednisone, a steroid drug, is a remarkably effective remedy for many diseases (including asthma), it does have serious side effects when taken for extended periods. Such side effects include cataracts, diabetes, changes in mood, weakness, reduction in immunity and osteoporosis. Having taken prednisone for years, you are a prime candidate for some or all of these complications.

A bone density test will indicate how much calcium your bones have lost and whether aggressive anti-osteoporosis therapy is indicated. As you know, osteoporosis is marked by weak and brittle bones that break easily. Therefore, it's important for you to discover how much the prednisone has accelerated this condition. Your doctor can order the test, interpret the results and advise you about the need for therapy.

Also, while you're discussing this situation with your physician, ask him if inhaled steroids might be a better option than prednisone pills. There are several types of cortisone spray, and all are effective in treating asthma without the risks inherent in oral steroids.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 57-year-old man with impotence. This has been treated with hormone shots, but I am unhappy with the results. I drink two beers a day. Could this have any bearing on the injections?

DEAR READER: Impotence is a complex condition of varied causes, including circulatory problems, diabetes, many medications, emotional

factors, alcohol abuse — and hormone deficiency, one of the least common causes.

Two beers a day should not affect your potency or interfere with your testosterone injections. Thus, your incomplete response to the shots may indicate that a hormone deficiency is not the basis of your erectile dysfunction.

You should see a urologist for further testing and treatment. For example, you might be helped by a suction device, injections into the penis, a pellet of medication inserted into the urethra, surgery, or counseling. After testing you, the urologist should be able to prescribe the therapy that best suits your needs.

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

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WIN AT BRIDGE

The modern quandary

I spend much time mediating — as Mrs. Malaprop might have said — over the bidding sequences I give in this column. Should I stick to methods from the 1950s because most readers probably still use them? Or should I bring everyone into the 1990s? As regular readers will know, I lean toward the latter. I hope you agree with Dr. Samuel Johnson, who pointed out, "Curiosity is one of the most permanent and certain characteristics of a vigorous intellect." And there's always something to be gleaned from the play.

This deal features three modern bids that enjoy ubiquitous use in tournament bridge. First, North uses a transfer bid, his two-heart response

showing at least five spades. Then he makes a splinter bid: an unusual jump to show slam interest in spades with at most one club. After South cue-bids, North uses Roman Key Card Blackwood, the modern ace-asking convention that includes the trump ace as a fifth "ace." Finally, North bids an optimistic grand slam.

Now South exhibits his declarer-play expertise. Having to find the diamond queen, he sets out on a voyage of discovery. After winning with the club ace, South ruffs a club in the dummy, plays a trump to hand, ruffs a club, crosses to hand with a trump, draws the last trump, and cashes his heart tricks. What has South learned?

He knows that West began with three spades, at least three hearts and six clubs. So, he has at most one diamond. Declarer cashes dummy's diamond king, then runs the diamond jack. Nicely played!
