LONDON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The Admiralty asserted today that several Italian submarines had been sent to help the German submarine campaign in the Atlantic.

U. S. Army pursuit planes attacked a greatly superior force of Japanese bombers and fighting planes in Java, shooting down one enemy bomber and one enemy pursuit ship, the War Department announced today.

One American plane is missing. The American planes were P-40 fighters. This was the first indication that planes of this type piloted by American Army fliers had reached the Netherlands East Indies.

A lull was reported in the fighting on the Batan peninsula in the Philippines.

From Melbourne, Australia, a hospital ship carrying wounded American soldiers and nurses was attacked today by Japanese bombers.

The Japanese have massed at least one division above Gen. MacArthur's left flank and another above his right.

Gen. MacArthur reported that enemy aerial activity was limited to a few sporadic bombing attacks which did no damage.

War Production Persistent Clamors Of Public Bring About Addition

LONDON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Lord Beaverbrook, high-ranking aide who accompanied Prime Minister Churchill to Washington, became Britain's Minister of War Production Wednesday night in a new cabinet post made to order for close coordination with the work of Donald M. Nelson, United States War Production chief.

Creation of the new post, fore-shadowed by Mr. Churchill in his address in the House of Commons last week, answered a persistent clamor of the press and public for an increase in the cabinet and for inclusion of a single responsible official charged with accelerating the nation's often criticized production rate of war supplies.

Mr. Churchill told the house, after Mr. Nelson's appointment in Washington, that "some similar office, not exactly with the same scope but with similar scope must be created here."

Lord Beaverbrook, busy little millionaire London publisher who skyrocketed into prominence by putting Britain's aircraft industry on a full war footing, seemed from the first a likely choice for the appointment.

Already minister of supply, he had held the groundwork for his new job on missions to which he had been sent in Washington and Moscow.

Incompleted Local Airport May Become Auxiliary Naval Field

An expenditure of from \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000 will be made on the new airport here if the Navy, now studying the possibility of increasing its bases in Florida, should decide to use the new airport as a secondary base, according to Representative Joe Hendricks.

"However," Mr. Hendricks explained, "these airports are merely in the study stages, and there is a possibility that they will only select a portion of them."

According to Mr. Hendricks, the Navy Department is studying the possibility of taking the airports at St. Augustine, Daytona Beach, Orlando, Sanford and Melbourne, to be used as secondary bases. "This is merely in the study stages at the present time," Mr. Hendricks said, "no appropriation is available but of course, the money will be made available when the Navy Department makes a request. If these fields

are taken over, each one will require an expenditure of between \$3,000,000 and \$5,000,000."

"I cannot give details as to installations and number of men to be located on the fields," he added, "I request that the people not annoy the Navy Department with letters or try to bring any pressure because it will be no avail. I shall be glad to follow this up and make announcements at the proper time. I have already supplied the Department with all information necessary from the cities concerned."

"Let me impress everyone reading this news again that these airports are merely in the study stages and there is a possibility that they will only select a portion of them and not all of them; but in my opinion, sooner or later, all of them will be selected," Mr. Hendricks concluded.

Soviets Are Told Occupied Republics To Return To Fold

The Russian declared officially today that 2,000 more German troops had fallen on the snowy battlefields far west of here on the road to Smolensk, and that the Red army still was rolling ahead in its mighty winter offensive despite fierce resistance by fresh Nazi troops.

Mr. George H. Earle, former United States minister to Bulgaria, said today in Washington that Bulgaria is so pro-Russian "there is no doubt whatever" that it will join the Soviet Union.

"Never in all history," he said in a report to Secretary of State Hull, "has there been such a tidal wave of hatred in Europe as now has welled up against the Germans."

Mr. Earle said he was questioned whether Hitler had enough men to hold the line on this condition of hatred very much longer. He said he had been reliably informed that the Germans are so short of manpower that only the best of their men and men over 35 are being used in such non-combatant duties as the customs service.

Woman Spy Relates Espionage Activities

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—An espionage trip in the defense of the United States by a woman spy was disclosed today.

Miss Buehler, who has pleaded guilty to an espionage indictment, appeared as a government witness in New York's second spy case within six months—the trial of a man and a woman accused of espionage activity. Thirty-three men and women were sentenced to prison Jan. 2 as spies in the earlier case.

Firm Attacked On Delinquent Tax Fee

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Attorney General Tom Watson Tuesday attacked Governor Holland and Comptroller J. M. Lee quickly defended the legality of a State contract with Casey, Watson and Spauld, Miami law firm, to collect delinquent intangible taxes on a percentage fee.

Watson said the employment of attorneys by the Comptroller "creates a situation" in which he, as Attorney General, could not work "harmoniously and effectively" in representing the State.

Former Italian Envoy Speaks At Rollins

WINTER PARK, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Count Carlo Sforza, former Italian foreign minister, said today that "everybody now feels in Europe that the new post-war world can only be a community of free nations and that America must use her tremendous moral forces to bring such a world about."

The former minister spoke at a joint session of the Rollins college economic conference and Institute of International Relations.

"Nobody believes in the false 'new order' preached by Hitler and his former master and present ally, Mussolini," he said.

"Everybody in Europe feels that the old frontiers no longer mean what they used to mean; and they are in process of wholly breaking down."

U. S. Fleet Blasts Jap Bases

Seminole County Schools Open At 9:30 War Time On Monday

With the exception of the schools, which will observe War Time but will move their schedule up an hour by starting at 9:30 A. M., substantially all of the offices, businesses and transportation companies in Sanford will continue business as usual when clocks move ahead one hour Feb. 9. Stores that now open at 8:30 A. M. will continue to open at 8:30 A. M. after setting their clocks one hour ahead after War Time goes into effect on Monday.

Seminole County schools will adopt the new time, Superintendent T. W. Lawton said, but for the convenience of bus children, many of whom have to ride as much as 15 miles every morning, and in order to prevent extra expense, such as fuel costs, the schools will open at 9:30 A. M. War Time, which actually would be 8:30 A. M. under the present time. The schools will also close one hour later than heretofore beginning Monday.

Artillery Duels Rage Across Mile-Wide Strait Of Johore; Jap Planes Active

Chinese Troops Pour Into Burma

Dutch Naval Base, New Guinea Port Are Hit From Air

Despite continuous bombing and strafing by Japanese planes, Singapore's defenders have blasted enemy observation posts, knocked out opposing batteries and spread destruction in the transiting of Japanese troops in the jumping-off point for invasion of this island stronghold.

That the Japanese still have not won complete control of the air was demonstrated this morning by the Hurricane fighters of the R.A.F. which intercepted a large formation over Singapore, shot down one Japanese plane, probably another, and downed a third.

Large movements of Japanese troops through Johore State toward the shore facing Singapore Island was reported by British reconnaissance planes.

The Japanese siege armies still hesitated to gamble on a direct assault against Singapore today amid artillery duels across mile-wide Johore Strait while Japan's warplanes again attacked the Dutch naval base at the New Guinea.

British artillery held the Japanese invasion forces at bay at the east bank of the Salween River, forcing the enemy to turn north instead of crossing the Gulf of Martaban for a direct thrust against Rangoon, the Burmese capital. Japanese bombers bombed Rangoon twice before dawn this morning. Although Chinese troops are steadily pouring into Burma, they have received no orders to attack the enemy, the Chinese Government said today.

From Rangoon, Burma, the British officially acknowledged today that Japanese patrols had crossed the lower Salween River at several points since the invaders occupied Moulmein Saturday.

Clouds of smoke and dust rose over the stricken residential district in Singapore yesterday as ambulances and emergency squads swarmed in among the splintered houses and smashed automobiles to minister to the wounded and battle the flames.

Only 18 bombers took part in the raid, the record of the day, Wednesday and there was nothing to report on the first. Another sign of reduced Japanese air power was an official announcement that only 22 persons were killed and 90 wounded Tuesday compared to nearly 1,000 casualties on the island's worst day, Jan. 31.

(Singapore, with 25,000 defenders left and its remaining planes being transferred elsewhere, faces imminent capture and mounting anxiety over the news of the island's fall.)

"With oil tanks blazing and the waterfront torn asunder, the northern part of Singapore Island presents a black and lifeless appearance, broken only by mounds of trucks creeping along the coastal hills and by the appearance of transport planes. British activity is nil in Northern Singapore."

U. S. Planes Down Pursuit Ship And Bomber Over Java

B-40 Type Of American Fighter Airships Are Put In Use Against Japs

Lull Reported In Batan Fight

Allied Hospital Ship Is Attacked Nine Times In One Day

LONDON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The Admiralty stated today that several Italian submarines had "paid the ultimate penalty" after they had been sent to help the German submarine campaign in the Atlantic.

U. S. Army pursuit planes attacked a greatly superior force of Japanese bombers and fighting planes in Java, shooting down one enemy bomber and one enemy pursuit ship, the War Department announced today.

One American plane is missing. The American planes were B-40 fighters. This was the first instance of the use of this type of plane in the Pacific.

A full report is being made of the fighting on the island of Batan in the Philippines. From Manila, Australia, American planes were reported to have been shot down by Japanese fighters.

For nearly a week the Japanese have been hammering away relentlessly at the American-Philippine line in a drive toward Corregidor, 15 miles to the west of the gateway to Manila Bay.

They appear to be concentrating along the west coast, where the defenders previously routed two successive invasion attempts.

The Japanese apparently are attempting a sweep across the peninsula in the hope of trapping Gen. MacArthur's men and cutting off any chance of retreat to Corregidor.

Gen. MacArthur reported that enemy aerial activity was limited to a few sporadic bombing attacks which did no damage.

Artillery Duels Rage Across Mile-Wide Strait Of Johore; Jap Planes Active

Chinese Troops Pour Into Burma

Dutch Naval Base, New Guinea Port Are Hit From Air

(The Associated Press)—Despite continuous bombing and strafing by Japanese aircraft, Singapore's artillery has blasted enemy observation posts, knocked out opposing batteries and spread destruction in the train of the Japanese troops in the jumping-off point for invasion of this island stronghold.

That the Japanese still have not won complete control of the air was demonstrated this morning by the Hurricane fighters of the R. A. F. which intercepted a large formation over Singapore, shot down one Japanese plane, probably another, and damaged a third.

Large movements of Japanese troops through Johore State toward the shore facing Singapore Island was reported by British reconnaissance planes.

The Japanese siege armies still hesitated to gamble on a direct assault against Singapore today, and flaming artillery duels across the mile-wide Johore Strait, while Japanese warplanes again attacked the big Dutch naval base at Soerabaja, Java, and Port Moresby, New Guinea.

British artillery held the Japanese invasion forces at bay at the east bank of the Salween River, forcing the enemy to north instead of crossing the half of Matthan for a direct thrust against Rangoon, the Burmese capital. Japanese raiders landed Rangoon twice last night, but were driven back.

Although Chinese troops are steadily pouring into Burma, thus far they received no orders to attack the enemy, the Chinese Tungkong said today.

From Rangoon, Burma, the British officially acknowledged today that Japanese patrols had crossed the lower Salween River at several points since the Japanese occupied Moulmein Saturday.

Clouds of smoke and dust rose over the stricken residential district in Singapore yesterday as anti-aircraft and emergency squadrons earned in among the spinning houses and smashed automobiles to minister to the wounded and battle the flames.

Only 18 bombers took part in the raid, the record of the day. Wednesday and there was nothing to report on the first. Another sign of reduced Japanese striking power was an official announcement that only 22 persons were killed and 90 wounded Tuesday as compared to nearly 1,000 casualties on the island's worst day.

British activity is all in Northern Singapore."
