McCarthy is the author of the Florida Chancery Act.

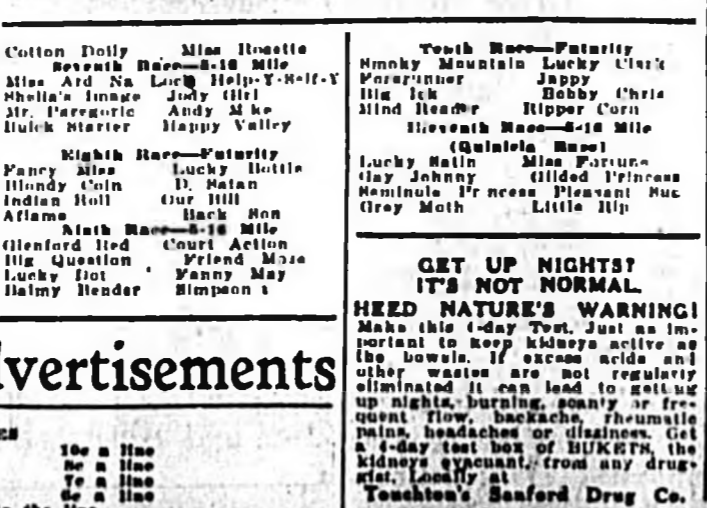
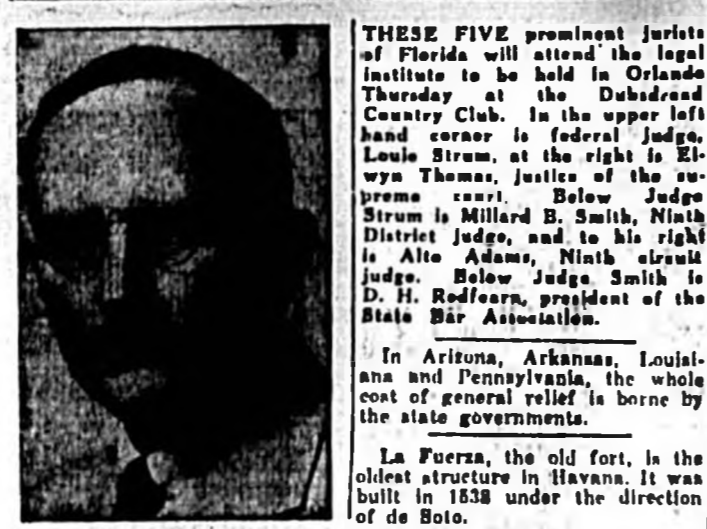

Heart Disease Proves Fatal To William Hodges

Dean Of Senate Had Ambition To Serve Term As Florida's Chief Executive

He Ran Twice For Governor

Solon Represented Leon County In Upper House 18 Years

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 17.—(AP)—William Cabot Hodges, dean of the Florida State Senate, died today without the realization of his greatest ambition—governorship.

The recurrence of a heart trouble ended his life at 64 1/2 A. M. at his picturesque suburban home here, Goodwood. He was 64. He tried twice to be elected as governor, in 1912 as a "Bull Moose" candidate, and in 1936 as a Democrat. He was named out of the last time in the first primary by Gov. Cose, who became the 27th governor.

Hodges planned to run again this year, but physicians advised him against it and he had prepared an announcement to be published tomorrow, that he would not run. The announcement said "it goes without saying that this conclusion is reached by me with a real regret, because naturally one who has long been in public service has an ambition to round out a long career as the State's chief executive." He represented Leon county in the State Senate for 18 years, and was Senate president in 1935.

Herndon Seeks Another Term As Clerk Of Court

O. P. Herndon announced today that he will be a candidate for re-election as Clerk of the Circuit Court for Seminole County, an office to which he was elected in 1936.

"During my term as County Clerk I have tried to serve the residents of Seminole County contentedly and efficiently and will continue to do so if re-elected," he stated.

James G. Sharon Enters Race For Seminole Judge

James G. Sharon today announced his candidacy for County Judge of Seminole County, a position he previously held for a number of years.

"I wish to announce to my friends that I am a candidate for the office of County Judge and will appreciate your help," Mr. Sharon stated.

Two Killed In Dupont Powder Plant Explosion

Blast Shatters Windows For 15 Miles; Sabotage Considered

GIBBSTOWN, NEW JERSEY, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Two men were killed today as an explosion of 6,000 pounds of nitrocellulose wrecked a unit of the Dupont powder works plant here, shattering buildings, and shattering windows for 15 miles.

Men were believed to have been in or near the small building wrecked. It was in a scattered row of buildings where the nitrocellulose was used in making high explosives. The shock was so severe it led to reports that the tri-state area of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Delaware had been shaken by an earthquake.

277,070 Pounds Of Food Given Needy In 1939
