

More and more attention is being drawn to the fact that a substantial number of school classrooms across the country are far from filled.

One mofficial estimate puts the total of "under-ilized" U. S. classrooms at 40,000. But this is con-ferred a very rough guess. Neither the United States Office of Education nor any other education agency has undertaken surveys on this point.

The problem, not yet rated as of major proportions,

The problem, not yet rated as of major proportions, breaks late at least two principal parts:

One aspect is the steady movement of people from towns and rural areas to the bigger cities. Half of the nation's 5,000 counties lost population in the 1950-60 span. In 12 states, spotted all around the U.S. map, two thirds of the counties suffered losses.

These outward population shifts have stripped many schools of their enrollment potential. Some of these schools are being sustained by costly transportation arrangements that bring pupils considerable distances.

Every year the advancing school consolidation pro-rums in many states wipe out dreves of the smaller chools. Yet thousands still carry on, with attendance at tens down to 5 or 5 pupils as against perhaps 30 or 40

Half empty schools are, however, also a city prob-lem. The old and often crumbling residential cores of his and even moderate size cities show population losses.

Nine of our 12 largest cities recorded net declines in the 1950-1960 period.

Meanwhile, in that same decade, the uninterrupted flight to the suburbs boosted some outlying populations 50 per cent or more.

Many social and sconomic factors contribute to the

speed and force of this flight. Urban deterioration drives out many, especially the young, newly developing families with lots of children. As they go, the age level of the city area rises. Half-empty schools have been common in some cities for many years.

Other forces at work, rezoning of sectors for commercial use, the slashing through of broad expressways, the raising of taxes, the incoming or departure of job-

Obviously, many of these factors could not have been fully anticipated. Furthermore, some of the underused city schools are ancient enough to be torn down anyway. But there are also solid reports of empty seats in relatively new schools, some in suburban zones.

Here misjudgment, lack of foresight, planning not dovetailed with broader community growth, all seem




